The Sun[™] Management Center 3.5 Version 6 Supplement for Sun Fire Entry-Level Midrange Systems provides instructions on how to install, configure, and use Sun Management Center software on these Sun Fire entry-level midrange systems:

- Sun FireTM E2900
- Sun Fire V1280

Note – Sun Management Center 3.5 Version 6 does *not* support Netra[™] 1280 systems.

This supplement is intended for system administrators who install and use Sun Management Center 3.5 software to monitor and manage these systems.

Read this supplement after the *Sun Management Center Installation and Configuration Guide*, which provides detailed instructions for installing and configuring Sun Management Center software, and the *Sun Management Center User's Guide*, which provides detailed instructions for using Sun Management Center software.

Sun Fire Entry-Level Midrange Systems Add-On Software

Sun Management Center software allows you to monitor Sun systems from a system such as a workstation or server. You can also use Sun Management Center software to manage various remote operations and applications through the network. The Sun Fire entry-level midrange systems add-on software allows the Sun Management Center software to function with Sun Fire entry-level midrange systems. The following models are supported with this release of the software:

- Sun Fire E2900
- Sun Fire V1280

Note – This release of Sun Management Center 3.5 Version 6 does *not* support Netra[™] 1280 systems.

You can access Solaris Operating System views only through the Sun Management Center agent running on a Sun Fire entry-level midrange systems domain. (*Platform* administration, which is supported in in Sun Management Center for Sun Fire midrange systems, is not supported for entry-level midrange systems.)

After the add-on software has been installed on a host machine, you can run Sun Management Center software on that host machine to access the system controller in Sun Fire entry-level midrange systems.

System Icons

TABLE 1-1 shows typical icons for Sun Fire entry-level midrange systems. Small alarm icons are added to the lower right corner of these icons in the event of an alarm state, such as with the critical alarm icon depicted here.

Identifying Hardware Domains

By default, the hardware domain Details window opens to the Module Browser tab. FIGURE 1-1 illustrates the Details window for a typical domain. The window includes icons for Hardware, Operating System, Local Applications, and Remote Systems domains, as well as six tabs: Info, Module Browser, Alarms, Module Manager, Applications, and Hardware. In the example in FIGURE 1-1, the hardware domain icon is displayed with a critical alarm.

About the Examples Used in This Document

Many steps or operations shown in this document can be accomplished in more than one way. For the sake of brevity, only one way is shown in an operation, usually the easiest or quickest way.

For example, in the main console window, you can choose from six possible ways to open a Details view of Sun Fire entry-level midrange systems:

- Click once on the Sun Fire entry-level midrange icon in the hierarchy view (left side of the window), then click the Tools menu in the top bar, and select Details.
- Do the same as above in the topology view (right side of the window).
- Double-click the Sun Fire entry-level midrange icon in the hierarchy view.
- Double-click the Sun Fire entry-level midrange icon in the topology view.
- Right-click the icon in the hierarchy view and choose Details from the pop-up menu.
- Do the same in the topology view.

Similarly, there are multiple ways to expand (or uncompress) an icon. As shown in FIGURE 1-2, you can:

- Click the Expand All button (not available in some windows).
- Click the Uncompress symbol next to the icon.
- Double-click the icon in the hierarchy or topology views.

Caution – Use the installation scripts and the setup scripts provided with the Sun Management Center software. Do *not* manually add packages or manually change configuration files.

Your Sun Management Center installation and setup scripts or Wizard panels might not display exactly the same messages in exactly the same sequence as the examples shown in this supplement. However, these examples show the basic messages you will receive in approximately the sequence you will receive them. Your actual installation and setup scripts depend on the add-on components you choose to install and other choices you make.

See Appendix A to perform these functions using the command line interface (CLI).

Obtaining the Add-On Software

Refer to the *Sun Management Center 3.5 Version 6 Release Notes for Sun Fire Entry-Level Midrange Systems* for information about obtaining the Sun Management Center 3.5 Version 6 add-on software.

Add-On Software Packages

The Sun Management Center add-on software packages for Sun Fire entry-level midrange systems correspond to the architectural layers of Sun Management Center. The following is an overview of these packages:

SUNWeslw8s – Server-specific package

Provides libraries and other files needed by the Sun Management Center server to monitor supported Sun Fire entry-level midrange systems. This software must be installed on all Sun Management Center server systems in addition to the base Sun Management Center software.

SUNWeslw8a – Agent-specific package

Provides libraries and other files needed by the Sun Management Center agent to monitor supported Sun Fire entry-level midrange systems. This software must be installed on all Sun Management Center–monitored Sun Fire entry-level midrange systems in addition to the base Sun Management Center agent software.

Note – Your Sun Fire entry-level midrange system domain can serve as a Sun Management Center server. In this case, the agent package, SUNWeslw8a, is installed on the Sun Management Center server host.

■ SUNWeslw8c – Agent and server common installation package

Provides scripts and Java[™] class files to support graphical user interface (GUI) setup, Agent update, and add-on installation and removal.

Supported Systems and Environments

The minimum Sun Fire entry-level midrange systems firmware and operating systems supported in this release are described in the *Sun Management Center 3.5 Version 6 Release Notes for Sun Fire Entry-Level Midrange Systems*. Refer to that document also to learn about recommended patches for this release.

Dynamic Reconfiguration Add-On

The dynamic reconfiguration (DR) add-on included in the Sun Management Center product does not work with Sun Fire entry-level midrange systems. Therefore, do not load the DR software on Sun Fire agents supported by this add-on.

Preparing for Add-On Software Installation

Before beginning the add-on software installation process, you should know which systems in your network will function as servers and consoles, and which Sun Fire entry-level midrange systems will be monitored by the servers and consoles.

Installation Process Overview

The following four steps comprise an overview of the installation process described in the remainder of this chapter.

- 1. If you have been managing Sun Fire V1280 systems using the Sun Management Center add-on software for Netra systems, you must remove the existing agent software from the Sun Fire V1280 systems. See "Updating Existing Netra Software on the Sun Fire V1280" on page 10.
- 2. Ensure that you have installed the latest update for Sun Management Center 3.5 base software, plus any other add-on software you require. See "Upgrading to Sun Management Center 3.5 Update 1 Software" on page 11.
- 3. Install Sun Management Center 3.5 Version 6 Software for Sun Fire entry-level midrange systems. See "Installing and Setting Up New Sun Management Center 3.5 Update 1 Add-On Software Using the Install Wizard" on page 12.
- 4. Set up all newly installed base and add-on software. See "Setting Up the Sun Fire Entry-Level Midrange Systems Add-On Software Using the Setup Wizard" on page 13.
- 5. Start the base and add-on software.

Updating Existing Netra Software on the Sun Fire V1280

If you have been managing Sun Fire V1280 systems using the Sun Management Center add-on software for Netra systems, you must remove the existing agent software from the Sun Fire V1280 systems, then install and set up Sun Management Center 3.5 Version 6 add-on software in its place. You do not have to remove the server-specific add-on software for Netra systems from the Sun Management Center server host if it is required to support any other platforms for which you use it.

▼ To Update Existing Sun Management Center 3.5 Add-On Software for Netra Systems

1. Remove the existing Netra add-on software from the Sun Fire V1280 agent. See the following references depending on whether you are using the CLI or GUI:

- CLI To use the CLI command es-uninst to uninstall the Sun Management Center 3.5 add-on software for Netra systems, see Appendix A.
- GUI To use the Sun Management Center Uninstall Wizard, es-guiuninst, to uninstall the Sun Management Center 3.5 add-on software for Netra systems, refer to "Uninstalling Sun Management Center 3.5" in Appendix A of the Sun Management Center Installation and Configuration Guide for detailed options and instructions.
- 2. Install and set up the new add-on software for Sun Fire entry-level midrange systems on the server and domains.

See the following references depending on whether you are using the CLI or GUI:

- CLI To install and set up using the CLI, see Appendix A.
- GUI To install and set up using the Wizards, see "Installing and Setting Up New Sun Management Center 3.5 Update 1 Add-On Software Using the Install Wizard" on page 12.

Note – Installing Netra add-on software *after* SunFire entry-level midrange systems add-ons have been installed is unsupported.

Upgrading to Sun Management Center 3.5 Update 1 Software

Refer to the *Sun Management Center 3.5 Update 1 Supplement* for information about upgrading from Sun Management Center 3.5 software or earlier to 3.5 Update 1 core software. Refer to the *Sun Management Center 3.5 Version 6 Release Notes for Sun Fire Entry-Level Midrange Systems* for information about software requirements for your system and to the latest version of *Sun Management Center Release Notes* for your version of the core software.

Installing and Setting Up New Sun Management Center 3.5 Update 1 Add-On Software Using the Install Wizard

This section provides a summary of installing the latest version of Sun Management Center 3.5 base software and Sun Fire entry-level midrange systems add-on software using the Install Wizard. Chapter 6, Installation and Setup, of the *Sun Management Center Installation and Configuration Guide*, describes in detail how to install all the software. If you prefer to use the command-line interface (CLI), see Appendix A.

▼ To Install the Software

You can install the console, server, and agent layers either separately or in combination.

- 1. Log in as superuser on the host machine.
- 2. Change the directory to the *path*/sbin directory, where *path* is the location of the Sun Management Center 3.5 CD or the disk copy of the CD.
- 3. Install the Sun Management Center 3.5 base software using the es-guiinst script.

Note – Be sure you click Store Response Data during the Sun Management Center 3.5 base software setup process if you want to use the setup-responses-file to duplicate the current machine's setup on other machines. That way all of your responses will be stored in /var/opt/SUNWsymon/install/setup-responses-file. For more information, refer to "Setting Up Base Products and Add-Ons on the Solaris Platform" in the *Sun Management Center Installation and Configuration Guide*.

- 4. Change to the directory where you installed the base software in Step 3 (*installed_directory/SUNWsymon/sbin*).
- 5. Run the es-guiinst script again with a pointer to the path where you placed the Sun Fire entry-level midrange systems add-on software for Version 6. Use the disk1 image (addon_path/disk1/image).

A list of add-on products you can install is displayed.

6. Select the Sun Fire Entry-Level Midrange Systems add-on software, and click Next.

The Setup Wizard is launched.

Setting Up the Sun Fire Entry-Level Midrange Systems Add-On Software Using the Setup Wizard

This section describes how to set up the Sun Fire entry-level midrange systems using the Sun Management Center Setup Wizard. For more details about the entire software setup process, refer to Chapter 6, "Installation and Setup," of the *Sun Management Center Installation and Configuration Guide*.

Note – When the Back button at the bottom of a panel is enabled (not grayed out), you can click on it to take you back to the previous operation. When the back button is grayed out (not enabled), you cannot go back to the previous operation.

▼ To Set Up the Add-On Software Using the Wizard GUI

Set up the add-on software both on the Sun Management Center server and on the Sun Fire entry-level midrange systems where you will be running the software.

1. Type es-guisetup on the system where the add-on software is installed to start the Sun Management Center Setup Wizard.

Once the Sun Management Center base software setup is complete, the Wizard displays the following message:

Click Next to set up the following products: Sun Fire Entry-Level Midrange Systems

2. Click Next to start the setup procedure.

The Sun Fire entry-level midrange systems Setup panel displays the following message:

3. Click Next to continue.

The Sun Fire entry-level midrange systems Setup panel displays the following message:

Sun Fire Entry-Level Midrange Systems Domain Agent setup is complete.

Using Advanced Wizard Setup Options

The base Sun Management Center Setup Wizard provides these advanced setup options when the current Sun Management Center installation is already configured:

Note – Use the Reconfigure All option instead of the Remove Setup Configuration option at this time.

- *Reconfigure All* Removes all current setup configurations and immediately reruns the Setup Wizard.
- *Configure Add-On Products* Sets up the add-on products only.
- Recreate the Sun Management Center Database (server only) Recreates the database.
 You are given the option to clear all data, or save and use the data in the recreated database.
- *Remove Setup Configuration* Returns your Sun Management Center installation to the post-install and pre-setup state. All configuration and database information is removed. This is useful when you need to perform other tasks prior to rerunning the Setup Wizard.

The Config-Reader Module

A Config-Reader module, Entry-Level Midrange Config Reader, is automatically loaded during installation. You can use the Config-Reader module to see the physical view and logical view of your host.

In addition, the Config-Reader module monitors your hardware and alerts you whenever there is a problem. For example, this module checks for dual inline memory module (DIMM) errors.

The Config-Reader icon is located under the Hardware icon in the Details window (FIGURE 3-1).



1. In the Sun Management Center console, double-click a Sun Fire entry-level midrange system icon.

The Details window is displayed (FIGURE 3-1).

2. Double-click the Hardware icon in the left frame of the Details window.

The Entry-Level Midrange Config Reader icons are displayed. (FIGURE 3-2).

If the icons are not displayed, the Entry-level Midrange Config Reader module is not loaded. See "Loading the Config-Reader Module" on page 18 for information about loading the module.

3. Double-click the Entry-Level Midrange Config Reader icon.

All devices in the system are displayed (FIGURE 3-3).

4. Double-click a device icon to display properties and values for that device.

Loading the Config-Reader Module

If the icon for the Entry-Level Midrange Config Reader module is not displayed in the Module Browser tab of the Details window for your Sun Fire entry-level midrange systems (as seen in FIGURE 3-2), the corresponding module is not loaded. In that case, you can manually load the module, as shown below.

▼ To Load a Module

1. In the Sun Management Center console, double-click the Sun Fire entry-level midrange system icon.

The Details window is displayed (FIGURE 3-1).

2. Click the Module Manager tab in the Details window.

3. Select Entry-Level Midrange Config Reader in the Available Modules list, then click Load.

The Module Loader pop-up window is displayed.

- 4. Click OK in the Module Loader pop-up window.
 - If you have sufficient access privileges, the pop-up window closes, and the module moves into the Modules with Load Status list.

• If you do not have sufficient access privileges, the pop-up window displays an error message. See the *Sun Management Center User's Guide* for information about access privileges.

The tables in this section describe the data properties contained in each of the domain Config-Reader tables, as well as related alarms.



Caution – The property values in tables are updated at five-minute intervals. Alarms can be generated only when the property values are updated, so an alarm can be delayed by up to five minutes. This delay can be particularly important when monitoring temperature.

When selected, the Config-Reader data property tables are displayed in the Module Browser tab of the Details window. For more information, refer to Chapter 7, "Browsing Information About a Managed Object," in the *Sun Management Center User's Guide*.

System Properties

TABLE 3-1 provides a brief description of the properties for the Sun Fire entry-level midrange system that contains the domain.

Property	Description
Name	Fixed value: system.
Operating System	Displays the operating system running on the machine, such as SunOS 5.9.
Operating System Version	Displays the operating system version.
System Clock Frequency	Displays the clock frequency in megahertz (MHz).
Architecture	Displays the architecture of the machine, a fixed value of sparc.
Hostname Of The System	Displays the network name of the host.
Machine Name	Displays the machine type, such as sun4u.
System Platform	Displays the hardware platform of the system, such as Sun-Fire-V1280.
Serial Number	This field is blank () for Sun Fire entry-level midrange systems, as they do not display a machine-readable serial number.
Timestamp	Displays the time stamp value for the time when the system information was extracted.
Raw Timestamp	Displays the raw time stamp value for the time when the system information was extracted.
Total Disks	Displays the total number of disks present in the system, including externally attached disks and disk-like devices.
Total Memory	Displays the total memory present in the system in megabytes (MB).
Total Processors	Displays the total number of CPUs present in the system.
Total Tape Devices	Displays the total number of tape devices present in the system, including external tape devices.
Module Status	Displays the status of the config-reader module, including any errors. Example: OK.

TABLE 3-1System Properties

System Alarms

A *critical alarm* is generated when the value of Module Status is not OK. (rule rcr4u228)

CPU Unit Properties

TABLE 3-2 provides a brief description of the properties for CPUs on a Sun Fire entrylevel midrange systems domain.

Property	Description
Name	Displays the system name and slot number for this unit, such as SB0/P0.
Board No	This field is blank () for Sun Fire entry-level midrange systems.
Clock Frequency	Displays the clock frequency in megahertz (MHz)
СРИ Туре	Displays the processor type, such as sparcv9.
Dcache Size	Displays the size of data cache (Dcache) in kilobytes (KB)
Ecache Size	Displays the size of external cache (Ecache) in kilobytes (KB)
Fru	Indicates whether the unit is a field-replaceable unit. The value is always no.
Icache Size	Displays the size of instruction cache (Icache) in kilobytes (KB).
Model	Displays the processor model, such as SUNW, ultraSPARCIII+.

 TABLE 3-2
 CPU Unit Properties

Property	Description
Processor Id	Displays the identification number of the processor; or, in the case of a chip multithreading (CMT) processor, displays the processor ID for each core, separated by a comma.
CPU Status	Displays the operational status of the CPU: online, offline, power off, no interrupts, or unknown. If you set a CPU to spare using the psradm -s command, its status is offline. In the case of a chip multithreading (CMT) processor, if at least one core per processor has a status of either online or no interrupts, the CMT's status is online. Using the CLI to Install, Set Up, Uninstall, Start, and Stop Sun Management Center Software

This appendix describes how to install, set up, uninstall, start, and stop Sun Management Center software from the CLI. For more details, refer to the *Sun Management Center Software and Installation Configuration Guide*. If you prefer to installing using the installation GUI, see Chapter 2.

Installing and Setting Up the Software Using the CLI

First ensure that the latest update for Sun Management Center 3.5 base software is installed on your systems. Refer to the *Sun Management Center Installation and Configuration Guide* for instructions about installing this software.

Also ensure that any required patches are installed on your systems.

Refer to the *Sun Management Center 3.5 Version 6 Release Notes for Sun Fire Entry-Level Midrange Systems* for details about software requirements for the server, domain, and console layers.

▼ To Install the Add-On Software Using the CLI

1. As superuser, change the directory to the *path*/sbin directory, where *path*/sbin is the location where the base Sun Management Center software has been installed.

2. To install the add-on software, run the es-inst command in the sbin directory.

The es-inst script prompts you for a source directory.

3. Type the source directory of the image of the Sun Management Center 3.5 Version 6 add-on software.

Refer to the *Sun Management Center Installation and Configuration Guide* for more information about the es-inst command and its options.



Caution – If the general Sun Management Center 3.5 software package is already installed, and you are installing *only* the Sun Fire supplement software, enter **n** (for no) when you are prompted to begin the setup process. Typing **y** (for yes) might cause the loss of any customized setup information, such as security keys.

Note – If you are installing the *full* Sun Management Center 3.5 software package, you have the option of running the setup script at the end of the installation procedure. If you choose not to run the setup script at that time, you can run it later. The setup script (es-setup) is in *path*/sbin, where *path* is the directory where the Sun Management Center software is installed. This step sets up all Sun Management Center agents, including the platform agent.

4. Install the add-on software on the server and on any Sun Fire entry-level midrange agent systems that you will monitor.

Read the Caution and Note in Step 1 above.
