

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CHAPTER 1

Empirica Signal overview

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Introduction to the Empirica Signal software

The Empirica Signal software is a web-based analysis environment for generating statistical scores for combinations of drugs and events in a drug safety database, and for detecting unexpected associations of drugs and events (signals).

Assumptions

This guide assumes familiarity with the following activities:

- Setting Linux file permissions.
- Administering Oracle WebLogic Server.
- Configuring Linux services.
- Setting up and configuring the Oracle Database software.

Physical configuration options

The Empirica Signal software is typically installed in a two-tier configuration, using separate database server and application server machines. The provisioning and basic setup of the two systems is outside the scope of this document.

Components of the installation package

The installation package contains the following components.

Signal-8_1_0_1_XXX.zip	Build that you install, where XXX is the build number.

RGPS_8_1_0_1_XXX.tar.gz	RGPS add-on package for R.

Signal-8_1_0_1_XXX- OBIEE.zip	Components for configuring Oracle Business Intelligence for Topics reporting.
Update_AM_8_0_for_Signal_8_ 1_0_1_XXX.zip	Scripts for upgrading Argus Mart 8.0 for use by Empirica Signal 8.1.
Argus_Prep_2_0_0_0_YYY.zip	Scripts for installing Argus Signal Management.

CHAPTER 2

Planning your installation

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How to use this document

This document contains the procedures that guide you through both the installation and upgrade processes.

Sections that are installation-specific or upgrade-specific are labeled as such. Procedures without installation-specific or upgrade-specific labels are applicable to all upgrades and installations.

If you are upgrading from release 8.1 to release 8.1.0.1, proceed to *Upgrading from release 8.1 to release 8.1.0.1* (on page 77).

Prerequisites for upgrading (upgrade only)

You can upgrade from release 7.3, 8.0, or 8.1 to release 8.1.0.1 of the Empirica Signal software.

If you are running a release that is earlier than 7.3, you must upgrade to release 7.3 before upgrading to release 8.1.0.1. For information on upgrading to release 7.3, see the *Empirica Signal Installation and Upgrade Instructions* for release 7.3.

If you are upgrading from release 8.1 to release 8.1.0.1, proceed to *Upgrading from release 8.1 to release 8.1.0.1* (on page 77).

Migrating the database (upgrade only)

If you are migrating your database from Microsoft Windows to Linux, or upgrading from an earlier version of the Oracle Database to version 12c, back up your database first. Work with a database administrator to migrate the contents of your database to a Linux system.

Preparing the environment on the application server for installation or upgrade

Before you install the Empirica Signal software, prepare the application server by performing the procedures described in *Getting the application server ready for the Empirica Signal application with WebLogic 12c* (on page 95) or *Getting the application server ready for the Empirica Signal application with WebLogic 11g* (on page 111).

Note: Oracle recommends using WebLogic 12.1.3 and Java 1.8 with Empirica Signal 8.1.

Information to collect before you begin

 Before you begin, collect the following information about the setup of the database and application servers. You will need this information for the installation or upgrade.

Database server

- TNSNAMES entry for the database.
- Service name and SID for the database.

Note: In Oracle database 12c, the service name might be for a pluggable database.

- system and sys password for the database.
- Time zone setting of your database so you can set the Oracle WebLogic Server instance to the same time zone.

Note: Oracle recommends using the UTC time zone for both servers.

- The location of the data files for the instance, if you plan to create the tablespaces in the same location. For example:
 - u01/app/oracle/oradata/<sid>/'

For installations, be prepared to provide passwords for the Empirica Signal and empirica_admin database accounts that will be created in these steps. If you are installing Topics, also be prepared to provide a password for the topic_workflow database account that will be created.

For upgrades, be prepared to provide the passwords for the existing Empirica Signal database account. Also be prepared to provide a password for the empirica_admin database account that will be created. If you have Topics installed, also be prepared to provide the password for the existing topic_workflow database account.

Application server

JDK installation location, such as:

```
/usr/java/jdk1.8.x_xx
or
/usr/java/jdk1.7.x_xx
```

Note: Oracle recommends using Java 1.8 and WebLogic 12.1.3.

- The following information about the Oracle client:
 - Oracle base location, such as:

/u01/app/oracle

• Oracle home location, such as:

```
/u01/app/oracle/product/12.1.0
```

- The following information about WebLogic:
 - Installation location, such as:

```
/u01/app/oracle/Middleware
or
/u01/app/oracle/product/fmw12c/
```

• URL for the WebLogic Server Administration Console, such as:

```
https://<servername>:7002/console
```

• URL for Oracle Enterprise Manager, such as:

```
https://<servername>:7002/em
```

- User name and password of a WebLogic Server administrator.
- For single sign-on (SSO) installations, the following information:
 - Native login port number to use for initially changing the Empirica Signal admin password.
 - Port number used for normal SSO Empirica Signal connections on the server.
 - SSO logout URL.
 - SSO header, which contains the user name.
 - Session timeout value for the single sign-on setup in the organization.

CHAPTER 3

Preparing the application server

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Required privileges for the database server

You must have access to a user account that allows the user to start and stop the Oracle database.

This account should not have sudo privileges.

This document refers to this user account as the non-privileged user account on the database server.

Required privileges for the application server

You must have access to the following accounts on the application server:

• A user account that allows the user to start and stop the Empirica Signal Oracle WebLogic Server instance.

This account should not have sudo privileges.

This document refers to this user account as the non-privileged user account on the application server.

Unless otherwise specified in this document, the non-privileged user should perform all activities.

• A user account that has sudo privileges. This user executes certain steps as root.

This document refers to this user account as the privileged user account on the application server.

Setting the default file creation umask

Note: If you are upgrading from Empirica Signal 8.0 using the same application server, skip this section.

You modify the default file creation umask so that by default, users in your group have read-only access to files you create. Users outside your group have no access to the files you create.

Perform these steps using the non-privileged user account on the application server.

1 Navigate to your home directory, for example:

```
$ cd ~
```

- 2 Using a text editor, open the **.login** file.
- 3 Add the following command to the file: umask 027
- 4 Save and close the file.

Unpacking the installation files into the installation directory

The installation directory stores Empirica Signal components during the installation process.

Perform these steps using the non-privileged user account on the application server.

Note: If you have previously installed Empirica Signal 8.0 on the same application server, before executing the steps below, rename the old Signal_Install directory. For example, change its name to Signal_Install_old.

1 Unpack the **Signal_Install-8_1_0_1_XXX.tar.gz** file into a directory that is accessible to the WebLogic software, for example:

```
$ cd /u01/stage
$ tar xvf /u01/stage/Signal_Install-8_1_0_1_XXX.tar.gz
```

The /u01/stage/Signal_Install directory is created.

Note: In this document, <INSTALL_DIR> refers to the directory created in this step. The document assumes that you are installing to this directory.

- 2 Unpack the **Signal-8_1_0_1_XXX.zip** file:
 - a Unpack the contents of the **Signal-8_1_0_1_XXX.zip** file into the directory, for example:

```
$ unzip Signal-8_1_0_1_XXX.zip -d /u01/stage/Signal_Install/Signal
```

- b Provide non-privileged account the execute permission on the **MGPS** subdirectory, for example:
 - \$ chmod u+x /u01/stage/Signal_Install/Signal/WEB-INF/classes/MGPS
- 3 If you use Empirica Topics, unpack the **TopicsService-8_1_0_1_XXX.zip** file into the **TopicsService** subdirectory in the installation directory, for example:

```
$ unzip TopicsService-8_1_0_1_XXX.zip -d
/u01/stage/Signal_Install/TopicsService
```

- 4 Unpack the **Signal-8_1_0_1_XXX-Database.zip** file:
 - a Create a **Database** directory:

```
$ mkdir /u01/stage/Database
```

b Unpack the contents of the **Signal-8_1_0_1_XXX-Database.zip** file into the directory, for example:

```
$ unzip Signal-8_1_0_1_XXX-Database.zip -d /u01/stage/Database
```

Adding the database TNSNAMES entry

You add an entry to the **tnsnames.ora** file on the application server to configure the connection to the Oracle database.

If your **tnsnames.ora** file does not contain an entry for the database server, perform these steps using the non-privileged user account on the application server.

- 1 Navigate to the **<ORACLE_HOME>/network/admin** directory, for example:
 - \$ cd <ORACLE_HOME>/network/admin
- 2 If the **tnsnames.ora** file does not exist in the directory, create the file.
 - For more information, see the Oracle Database Online Documentation.
- 3 Using a text editor, open the **tnsnames.ora** file.
- 4 Add an entry that points to the database server using information from the **tnsnames.ora** file on the database server.

Note: In this document, <TNS_NAME> refers to the name you assigned in the entry created in this step.

Setting up the application database account (installation only)

Perform these steps using the non-privileged user account on the application server.

- 1 Navigate to the /u01/stage/Database directory, for example:
 - \$ cd /u01/stage/Database
- 2 Review the 1_create_webvdme_tablespaces_linux.sql file:
 - a Using a text editor, open the **1_create_webvdme_tablespaces_linux.sql** file, for example: \$ vi 1_create_webvdme_tablespaces_linux.sql
 - b Locate the **datafile_path** variable.
 - To create Empirica Signal data files in a location other than the default location of your database, specify the location as the value of the **datafile_path** variable, for example:

```
DEFINE datafile_path = '/u01/app/oracle/oradata/<sid>
```

Note: The path must end in a forward slash (/).

- d Save and close the file.
- 3 Create the Signal tablespace:
 - Execute the 1_create_webvdme_tablespaces_linux.sql script as the Oracle system user, for example:
 - \$ sqlplus system@<TNS_NAME> @1_create_webvdme_tablespaces_linux.sql

A password prompt appears.

- b Type the Oracle **system** account password.
- 4 Create the Empirica Signal database user account and schema:
 - a At the SQL*PLUS prompt, execute the **2_create_webvdme_oracle_user.sql** script as the Oracle **sysdba** user:
 - \$ sqlplus sys@<TNS_NAME> as sysdba @2_create_webvdme_oracle_user.sql

A password prompt appears.

b Type the Oracle sys account password.

A second password prompt appears.

- c Type a password for the Empirica Signal database account.
- d Retype the password.

Note: You use the password in a later step.

A third password prompt appears.

- e Type a password for the **empirica_admin** account.
- f Retype the password.

- 5 Populate the application schema:
 - a At the SQL*PLUS prompt, execute the **3_create_all.sql** script as the Empirica Signal database user, for example:
 - \$ sqlplus webvdme@<TNS_NAME> @3_create_all.sql

A password prompt appears.

b Type the Empirica Signal database account password that you created in a previous step.

Setting up the Topic Workflow database account (optional, installation only)

You create a Topic Workflow tablespace and user account to enable the Empirica Topics feature. Do not perform this procedure if you do not use Empirica Topics.

For more information, see the *User Guide*.

Perform these steps using the non-privileged user account on the application server.

- 1 Navigate to the /u01/stage/Database directory, for example:
 - \$ cd /u01/stage/Database
- 2 Create the **topic_workflow** database user account:
 - a Start SQL*PLUS.
 - b Execute the **create_topics_oracle_user.sql** script as the Oracle **system** user, for example:
 - \$ sqlplus system@<TNS_NAME> @create_topics_oracle_user.sql

A password prompt appears.

c Type the Oracle **system** account password.

A second password prompt appears.

- d Type a password for the **topic_workflow** database account.
- e Retype the password.

Note: You use the password in a later step.

- 3 Create sample topic tables:
 - a Execute the **create_sample_topics_tables.sql** script as the **topic_workflow** database user, for example:
 - \$ sqlplus topic_workflow@<TNS_NAME> @create_sample_topics_tables.sql

A password prompt appears.

- b Type the **topic_workflow** account password that you specified in a previous step.
- 4 Create sample topics:
 - a Execute the **populate_sample_topics_tables.sql** script as the **topic_workflow** database user, for example:
 - \$ sqlplus topic_workflow@<TNS_name> @populate_sample_topics_tables.sql You are prompted to type a password.
 - b Type the **topic_workflow** account password that you specified in step 2.

Setting up the test data database account (installation only)

This procedure is optional.

Perform these steps using the non-privileged user account on the application server.

- 1 Navigate to the /u01/stage/Database directory, for example:
 - \$ cd /u01/stage/Database
- 2 If the **TEST_IQOQ** database account exists, drop the account:
 - a Start SQL*PLUS.
 - b Execute the **drop user** command as the **system** user, for example:

```
$ sqlplus system@<TNS_NAME> A password prompt appears.
```

c Type the Oracle system account password.

```
SQL> drop user TEST_IQOQ cascade;
```

- d Exit SQL*PLUS.
- 3 Create the **test_iqoq** database user account and tables:
 - a Execute the **4_create_test_iqoq_oracle_user.sql** script as the Oracle **system** user, for example:

```
$ sqlplus system@<TNS_NAME> @4_create_test_iqoq_oracle_user.sql
```

A password prompt appears.

b Type the Oracle **system** account password.

A second password prompt appears.

- c Type a password for the **TEST_IQOQ** database account.
- d Retype the password.

Note: You use the password in a later step.

- 4 Populate the **TEST_IQOQ** tables:
 - Execute the **5_populate_test_iqoq.sql** script as the **TEST_IQOQ** database user, for example:

```
$ sqlplus TEST_IQOQ@<TNS_NAME> @5_populate_test_iqoq.sql
```

A password prompt appears.

b Type the **TEST_IQOQ** database account password.

Applying upgrade scripts to Empirica Signal 7.3 or 8.0.x schemas (upgrade only)

Perform these steps using the non-privileged user account on the application server.

- 1 Navigate to the **Database** directory, for example:
 - \$ cd /u01/stage/Database
- 2 If you are upgrading from version 7.3.3.3/4/5 to 8.1.0.1:
 - a Execute the **update_7_3_3_1_to_8_0.sql** script as the Empirica Signal database user, for example:
 - \$ sqlplus webvdme@<TNS_NAME> @update_7_3_3_3_to_8_0.sql

A password prompt appears.

- b Type the Empirica Signal database account password.
- c Review the **disabled_userlist.txt** file in the current directory.

The file contains user names for accounts that are locked out of the application due to excessive failed login attempts.

- d After the upgrade is complete, you may log in to the Empirica Signal application and disable these users. For more information, see the *User Guide*.
- e Create the empirica_admin account:
- f Execute the **create_dbadmin_user.sql** script as the Oracle **sys** user, for example:
 - \$ sqlplus sys@<TNS_NAME> as sysdba @create_dbadmin_user.sql webvdme

A password prompt appears.

g Type the Oracle **sys** account password.

A second password prompt appears.

- h Type a password for the **empirica_admin** account.
- i Retype the password.

After a few moments, the script is completed.

- Type **exit** to change user accounts.
- k To complete the schema upgrade to version 8.0, perform the following command:
 - \$ sqlplus system@<TNS_NAME> @update_proxy_authentication.sql webvdme
- l When prompted, type the Oracle system account user password.
- m After the script completes, type exit.

- n If you use the Topics feature, update the Empirica Topics schema:
 - Execute the **update_twc_7_3_3_3_to_8_0.sql** script as the **topic_workflow** user, for example:
 - \$ sqlplus topic_workflow@<TNS_NAME> @update_twc_7_3_3_3_to_8_0.sql
 - A password prompt appears.
 - Type the **topic_workflow** account password.
 - A prompt for the Empirica Signal database account appears.
 - Type the name of the Empirica Signal database account. For example, webvdme.
- 3 As the Empirica Signal database user, execute the **update_8_0_to_8_1.sql** script to update the schema from 8.0 to 8.1, for example:
 - For Empirica Signal 8.0:
 - $\$ sqlplus webvdme@<TNS_NAME> @update_8_0_to_8_1.sql A password prompt appears.
- 4 Type the Empirica Signal database account password.

Note: If you upgrade from Empirica Signal 8.0.1, an error message appears when ALTER TABLE PASSWORD_HISTORY is attempted, because the column being added already exists in the table. This is expected behavior and can be ignored.

Installing unlimited strength encryption Java libraries

Note: Oracle recommends using WebLogic 12.1.3 and Java 1.8. If you are upgrading from Empirica Signal 8.0 and you have decided to not use WebLogic 12.1.3 with Java 1.8, skip this section.

You install the Java Cryptography Extension (JCE) Unlimited Strength Jurisdiction Policy Files to extend the security features in Java.

Perform these steps using the non-privileged user account on the application server.

1 Navigate to the jre/lib/security directory within your Java installation. For example:

```
$ cd /usr/java/jdk1.8.x_xx/jre/lib/security
```

- 2 Create a backup copy of the following files in another directory:
 - local_policy.jar
 - US_export_policy.jar
- 3 Download the **jce_policy-8.zip** file:
 - a In an Internet browser, navigate to the Java SE Downloads website. For example:

```
http://www.oracle.com/technetwork/java/javase/downloads/index.html
```

- In the Additional Resources table, locate the Java Cryptography Extension (JCE) Unlimited Strength Jurisdiction Policy Files for JDK/JRE 8 entry.
- c Click **Download** for the entry.
 - The Download page appears.
- d Select Accept License Agreement.
 - A confirmation message appears.
- e Download the **ice_policy-8.zip** file to a temporary directory.
- 4 Navigate to the directory that contains the **jce_policy-8.zip** file.
- 5 Unpack the **ice_policy-8.zip** file. For example:

```
$ unzip jce_policy-8.zip
```

The **UnlimitedJCEPolicyJDK8** subdirectory is created. The subdirectory contains the following files:

- README.txt
- local_policy.jar
- US_export_policy.jar
- 6 Navigate to the **UnlimitedJCEPolicyJDK8** subdirectory.
- 7 Copy the **local_policy.jar** and **US_export_policy.jar** files to the **jre/lib/security** directory within your Java installation. For example:

```
$ cp -f *.jar /usr/java/jdk1.8.x_xx/jre/lib/security/
```

8 Verify that the file permissions on the **local_policy.jar** and **US_export_policy.jar** files are set to rw-r--r-- (644).

Installing MGPS

Install the MGPS program that supports Multi-item Gamma Poisson Shrinker (MGPS) data mining. For more information, see the *User Guide*.

The MGPS file is included with the Empirica Signal installation files.

Perform these steps using the non-privileged user account on the application server.

- 1 Create a **bin** directory to store the **MGPS** file, for example:
 - \$ mkdir -p /u01/app/oracle/product/Signal/bin
- 2 Navigate to the **INSTALL_DIR>/Signal/WEB-INF/classes** directory, for example:
 - \$ cd /u01/stage/Signal_Install/Signal/WEB-INF/classes
- 3 Copy the **MGPS** file to the **/bin** directory, for example:
 - \$ cp MGPS /u01/app/oracle/product/Signal/bin
- 4 Verify that the non-privileged user account on the application server has execute permissions on the **MGPS** file.
 - \$ chmod u+x /u01/app/oracle/product/Signal/bin/MGPS

Note: Remember the path to the **MGPS** file. You will set it in the **listener.properties** file, in the **Setting up the listener.properties file** (on page 56) section.

Installing the RGPS add-on package to the R library

If you have R version 3.0.1 installed, you can optionally install the RGPS add-on package to enable Regression-adjusted Gamma Poisson Shrinker (RGPS) computations in Multi-item Gamma Poisson Shrinker (MGPS) data mining runs. For more information, see the *User Guide*.

The RGPS add-on package is included with the Empirica Signal installation files.

Perform these steps using the privileged user account on the application server.

- 1 In a command shell, navigate to the directory containing RGPS_8_1_0_1_XXX.tar.gz.
- 2 Execute the following command:
 - \$ sudo R CMD INSTALL RGPS_8_1_0_1_XXX.tar.gz

Installing and configuring the X Windows Virtual Frame Buffer (Xvfb)

You install X Windows Virtual Frame Buffer (Xvfb) to enable graphs in Empirica Signal.

Prerequisites:

- Yum is installed.
- Yum is configured to use the appropriate configuration file.
- Your system can connect to the yum repositories.

Perform these steps using the privileged user account on the application server.

- 1 Determine whether Xvfb is installed:
 - a Execute the following command in a command shell:

```
$ which Xvfb
```

If a path to Xvfb appears, Xvfb is already installed. Alternatively, Xvfb is not installed.

- b If Xvfb is already installed, skip to step 3.
- 2 Install Xvfb:
 - a Type the following command to initiate the installation:

```
$ sudo yum install Xvfb
```

A password prompt might appear.

If a password prompt appears, type the password for the privileged user account on the application server.

A confirmation prompt appears.

- c Type Y, and press Enter.
- 3 Execute the following **cp** and **chkconfig -add** commands to enable Xvfb:

```
$ sudo su - root
# cp <INSTALL_DIR>/service/xvfb /etc/rc.d/init.d
# /sbin/chkconfig --add xvfb
```

where <INSTALL_DIR> is the Empirica Signal installation directory. For more information, see *Unpacking the installation files into the installation directory* (on page 19).

4 Execute the **chkconfig** --list command to verify that the installation was successful, for example:

```
# /sbin/chkconfig --list xvfb
```

The following response appears:

```
xvfb 0:off 1:off 2:off 3:on 4:off 5:on 6:off
```

5 Execute the **start** command to start Xvfb, for example:

/etc/rc.d/init.d/xvfb start

The following response appears:

Starting X Virtual Frame Buffer

6 Type **exit** to terminate your session as the root user.

Modifying the default Oracle WebLogic Server configuration files

Note: Oracle recommends using WebLogic 12.1.3 and Java 1.8. If you are upgrading from Signal 8.0 and you have decided to not use WebLogic 12.1.3 with Java 1.8, skip this section.

Perform these steps using the non-privileged user account on the application server.

1 Navigate to the Oracle WebLogic Server domain **bin** directory, for example:

```
$ cd /u01/app/oracle/fmw12c/user_projects/domains/empirica/bin
```

Note: The example command is for Oracle WebLogic Server 12c. If you use Oracle WebLogic Server 11g, the path to the WebLogic default **bin** directory might differ as follows: /u01/app/oracle/Middleware/user_projects/domains/empirica/bin.

- 2 Edit the **setDomainEnv.sh** file:
 - a Using a text editor, open the **setDomainEnv.sh** file.
 - b At the end of the file, add the following lines:

```
# Local Customization
export TZ=UTC
export LANG=en_US.UTF-8
export DISPLAY=localhost:99.0
```

Note: If you do not use the UTC time zone, edit the text accordingly.

- c Save and close the file.
- 3 Make the edits below:
 - For WebLogic 11g, edit the **setDomainEnv.sh** file.
 - For WebLogic 12c, edit the **setStartupEnv.sh** file.
 - a Using a text editor, open the file.
 - b Search for lines containing the following text:

```
com.oracle.db.jdbc7-dms.jar
```

c Use the hash character (#) to comment out each line, and then replace each line as follows:

```
if [ "${PRE_CLASSPATH}" != "" ] ; then
    #PRE_CLASSPATH="${PRE_CLASSPATH}${CLASSPATHSEP}${COMMON_COMPONENTS_HO
    ME}/modules/features/com.oracle.db.jdbc7-dms.jar"
    PRE_CLASSPATH="${PRE_CLASSPATH}$${CLASSPATHSEP}$${ORACLE_HOME}/jdbc/lib
    /ojdbc7.jar"
    export PRE_CLASSPATH
else
    #PRE_CLASSPATH="${COMMON_COMPONENTS_HOME}/modules/features/com.oracle
    .db.jdbc7-dms.jar"
    PRE_CLASSPATH="${ORACLE_HOME}/jdbc/lib/ojdbc7.jar"
    export PRE_CLASSPATH
```

d Search for lines containing the following text:

```
java.awt.headless=true
```

e Use the hash character (#) to comment out each line, and then replace each line with a copy of the original, but without -Djava.awt.headless=true. For example:

```
#EXTRA_JAVA_PROPERTIES="${EXTRA_JAVA_PROPERTIES} -
Dem.oracle.home=/scratch/u01/app/oracle/product/Middleware12c/em -
DINSTANCE_HOME=/scratch/u01/app/oracle/product/Middleware12c/user_projec
ts/domains/empirica -Djava.awt.headless=true -
Doracle.sysman.util.logging.mode=dual_mode"
EXTRA_JAVA_PROPERTIES="${EXTRA_JAVA_PROPERTIES} -

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Setting up the Empirica Signal properties files

Setting up the webvdme.properties file for Empirica Signal

You create and edit the webvdme.properties file to supply important properties to the Empirica Signal software.

Before you begin, if you intend to configure the Empirica Signal software to use single sign-on (SSO) with Oracle Access Manager (OAM), refer to *Setting up Oracle Access Manager (OAM)* (on page 94) for configuration details.

Perform these steps using the non-privileged user account on the application server.

- 1 If you are installing the Empirica Signal software on this server for the first time, create a directory for temporary files created by the Empirica Signal application if it has not already been created, for example:
 - \$ mkdir /u01/app/oracle/product/Signal/temp
- 2 Set the permissions on the directory containing the log file to enable write access for the nonprivileged user account.
- 3 Navigate to the **<INSTALL_DIR>/Signal/WEB-INF/classes** directory, for example:
 - \$ cd /u01/stage/Signal_Install/Signal/WEB-INF/classes
- 4 Copy the **template_webvdme.properties** file into the same directory, and name the copy **webvdme.properties**, for example:
 - \$ cp template_webvdme.properties webvdme.properties
- 5 Using a text editor, open the **webvdme.properties** file.
- 6 Edit the parameters according to the following table:

Setting up the listener.properties file

Perform these steps using the non-privileged user account on the application server.

- 1 Navigate to the **<INSTALL_DIR>/Signal/WEB-INF/classes** directory, for example:
 - \$ cd /u01/stage/Signal_Install/Signal/WEB-INF/classes
- Copy the **template_listener.properties** file into the same directory, and name the copy **template.properties**, for example:
 - \$ cp template_listener.properties listener.properties
- 3 Using a text editor, open the **listener.properties** file.
- 4 Edit the parameters according to the following table:

Before you begin, note the value of the **serverid** property in the **listener.properties** file. For more information, see **Reviewing the listener.properties file** (see "**Setting up the listener.properties file**" on page 56).

Perform these steps using the non-privileged user account on the application server.

1 Navigate to the **<INSTALL_DIR>/Signal/WEB-INF/classes** directory, for example:

```
$ cd <INSTALL_DIR>/Signal/WEB-INF/classes
```

2 Copy the **template_report_listener.properties** file into the same directory, and name the copy **report_listener.properties**, for example:

```
$ cp template_report_listener.properties report_listener.properties
```

- 3 Using a text editor, open the **report_listener.properties** file.
- 4 If the value of the **serverid** property in the file is the same value as the **serverid** property in the **listener.properties** file, change the value.
- 5 Save and close the file.

Setting up the webvdme-fonts.properties file

Perform these steps using the non-privileged user account on the application server.

 - \$ cd /u01/stage/Signal_Install/Signal/WEB-INF/classes
- 2 Copy the **template_webvdme-fonts.properties** file into the same directory, and name the copy **webvdme-fonts.properties**, for example:

```
$ cp template_webvdme-fonts.properties webvdme-fonts.properties
```

- 3 Using a text editor, open the **webvdme-fonts.properties** file.
- 4 To support Asian fonts in PDF output, specify the Albany WT Unicode font as the base font, for example:

```
iText.TABLE_WRITER_BASE_FONT_PATH=ALBANYWTJ.TTF
iText.CASE_SERIES_DETAIL_BASE_FONT_PATH=ALBANYWTJ.TTF
iText.TOPIC_WRITER_BASE_FONT_PATH=ALBANYWTJ.TTF
```

The Albany WT Unicode font is packaged with the Empirica Signal installation files.

- 5 (Upgrade only) If you customized the **webvdme-fonts.properties** file for the previous release of the Empirica Signal software:
 - a Install Linux versions of the fonts to preserve on the application server.
 - b Update the **webvdme-fonts.properties** file with the names of the fonts you installed.
- 6 Save and close the file.

Setting up the log4j.properties file for Empirica Signal

You edit the log4j.properties file to specify where you want to store Empirica Signal log files.

Perform these steps using the non-privileged user account on the application server.

- 1 Navigate to the **<INSTALL_DIR>/Signal/WEB-INF/classes** directory, for example:
 - \$ cd /u01/stage/Signal_Install/Signal/WEB-INF/classes
- 2 Using a text editor, open the **log4j.properties** file.
- 3 Set the **log4j.appender.defaultAppender.File** parameter to the file for storing Empirica Signal log messages, for example:
 - $\label{log4j.appender.file=/u01/app/oracle/product/Signal/logs/we berror.log$
- 4 (Upgrade only) If you customized the **log4j.properties** file for the previous release of the Empirica Signal software, apply the customizations to the **log4j.properties** file for the current release
- 5 Save and close the file.
- 6 Set the permissions on the directory containing the log file to enable write access for the non-privileged user account.

Setting up the log4j.properties file for Empirica Topics

You edit the log4j.properties file to specify where you want to store Empirica Topics log files.

Perform these steps using the non-privileged user account on the application server.

- 1 Navigate to the **INSTALL_DIR>/TopicsService/WEB-INF/classes** directory, for example:
 - \$ cd /u01/stage/Signal_Install/TopicsService/WEB-INF/classes
- 2 Using a text editor, open the **log4j.properties** file.
- 3 Set the **log4j.appender.defaultAppender.File** parameter to the file for storing Empirica Topics log files, for example:
 - $\log 4j$.appender.defaultAppender.File=/u01/app/oracle/product/Signal/logs/topicswebservice.log
- 4 (Upgrade only) If you customized the **log4j.properties** file for the previous release of the Empirica Signal software, apply the customizations to the **log4j.properties** file for the current release.
- 5 Save and close the file.

Setting up the Idap.properties file

To integrate Empirica Signal with LDAP, you store information about the LDAP configuration in the **ldap.properties** file. For more information, see the LDAP section in the *User Guide*.

Preserving custom home pages, images, and release notes from a previous release (upgrade only)

Perform these steps using the non-privileged user account on the application server.

Perform these steps to preserve any customizations you made to release 7.3.3.3 or 8.0 and to copy Release Notes documents from previous releases.

1 Copy any relevant Release Notes documents from the previous installation location to the new installation location. For example, copy the Release Notes documents from one of the following locations:

```
C:\Lincoln\apps\webvdme\webapps\web_root\relnotes
or
    /u01/stage/Signal_Install_old/Signal/relnotes
to the following location:
```

/u01/stage/Signal_Install/Signal/relnotes

Note: You do not need to copy the following documents: Release Notes documents for data releases that are no longer on your server, MedDRA documents for releases that are no longer on your server, Release Notes documents for prior releases of the Empirica Signal software, a PDF document of the User Guide for prior releases, and the Logistic Regression in Empirica Signal 7.1 PDF document.

2 Copy any custom content, such as custom home pages, from the previous installation location to the new installation location. For example, copy your file from one of the following locations:

```
C:\Lincoln\apps\webvdme\webapps\web_root\customhomes
  or
  /u01/stage/Signal_Install_old/Signal/customhomes
to the following location:
  /u01/stage/Signal_Install/Signal/customhomes
```

3 Copy any custom images from the previous installation location to the new installation location.

For example, copy your file from one of the following locations:

```
C:\Lincoln \apps\webvdme\webapps\web_root\image
or
/u01/stage/Signal_Install_old/Signal/image
to the following location:
/u01/stage/Signal_Install/Signal/image
```

Making the Release Notes available within the application

- If you are upgrading from Signal 8.0 and you have decided to not use WebLogic 12.1.3 with Java 1.8, perform the following steps:
 - a In the Deployments table, select **Signal**.
 - b In the Deployments table on the right, click **Stop**, and then **Force stop now**.
 - c In the Deployments table, select **Signal**.
 - d In the Deployments table on the right, click **Delete**.
 - e On the left panel, click Activate Changes.
 - f In the Change Center section on the left, click Lock & Edit.
- 6 In the Deployments table, click **Install**.

The Install Application Assistant wizard appears.

- 7 In the Locate deployment to install and prepare for deployment page:
 - a In the Path field, type the path to the **<INSTALL_DIR>**.
 - b Click Next.
 - c Select Signal.
 - d Click Next.
- 8 In the Choose targeting style page:
 - $a \quad \ \, Select \ \hbox{Install this deployment as an application}.$
 - b Click Next.
- 9 In the Select deployment targets page:
 - a Select SignalServer.
 - b Click Next.

- 5 In the Deployments table, click **Install**.

The Install Application Assistant wizard appears.

- 6 In the Locate deployment to install and prepare for deployment page:
 - a In the Path field, type the path to the **<INSTALL_DIR>**.
 - b Click Next.
 - c Select TopicsService.
 - d Click Next.
- 7 In the Choose targeting style page:
 - $a \quad \ \, Select \ \hbox{Install this deployment as an application}.$
 - b Click **Next**.
- 8 In the Select deployment targets page:
 - a Select TopicsServer.
 - b Click Next.

After a few moments, the TopicsService deployment is created.

TopicsService appears in the Deployments table.

The deployment State changes to Prepared.

- 13 In the Deployments table, select the TopicsService deployment.
- 14 Expand the Start drop-down list, and select Servicing all requests.
- 15 If prompted to confirm, click Yes.

The deployment State changes to Active.

Setting up the Topics web service security policy

1 In an Internet browser, navigate to the Oracle WebLogic Server Administration Console, for example:

```
https://<server_name>:7002/em
```

- 2 Log in using the administrator credentials provided to you by the system administrator.
- 3 In the navigation pane, expand Application Deployments, and select Topics-Service.
- 4 In the Web Services table, click **EmpiricaTopicsPort**.

After one or two minutes, information about the EmpiricaTopicsPort web service appears.

- 5 Click the **WSM Policies** tab.
- 6 Click the Attach/Detach icon.
- 7 Search for, then select the row for one of the following policies in the Available Policies table:
 - If you configured SSL—oracle/wss_username_token_over_ssl_service_policy
 - If you did not configure SSL—oracle/wss_username_token_service_policy
- 8 Click Attach.

The policy appears in the Attached Policies table.

9 Click Validate.

A confirmation message appears.

- 10 Click OK.
- 11 Click **OK** again in the upper-right corner of the page.

After one or two minutes, the application applies a user name token service policy to the Topics web service.

CHAPTER 7

Post-installation configuration

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Setting the passwords of the system and admin users (installation only)

The **system** account is used internally by the Empirica Signal software. You cannot use the **system** account to log in to the Empirica Signal software.

The **admin** account is a superuser account and is not an SSO user account. You use the **admin** account to log in initially so you can create local users and configure the Empirica Signal software.

You must set the passwords for the product installation to be complete.

Perform these steps using the non-privileged user account on the application server.

- 1 Navigate to the **<INSTALL_DIR>/bin/PasswordReset** directory, for example:
 - \$ cd /u01/stage/<INSTALL_DIR>/PasswordReset
- 2 Using a text editor, open the **runPasswordReset.sh** file.
- 3 Check the values of these environment variables and change them as necessary to the correct locations for your system:
 - a COMMON_COMPONENTS_HOME is the path to the oracle_common subdirectory in the WebLogic Middleware directory.
 - b JPS_CONFIG_FILE is the path to the OPSS configuration file, which is located in the config/fmwconfig subdirectory of the WebLogic domain home directory by default.
 - c JPS_MANIFEST_JAR is the path to the JPS_MANIFEST_JAR file for your version of WebLogic Server.
 - d INSTALL_ROOT—Change this to the value of <INSTALL_ROOT>.
- 4 Save and close the file.
- 5 Set the password for the **system** user:
 - a In the command shell, execute the **runPasswordReset.sh** script for the **system** user, for example:
 - \$./runPasswordReset.sh system override-passwordmustchange

Logging information appears, and then a password prompt appears.

b Type the password for the **system** user, and press **Enter**.

By default, the password must contain at least eight characters, including an uppercase character, lowercase character, acceptable symbol, and number.

A confirmation prompt appears.

c Retype the password, and press **Enter**.

If the passwords match, a confirmation message appears.

Alternatively, an error message appears.

d If an error message appeared, run the command again and type matching passwords.

- 6 Set the password for the **admin** user:
 - a In the command shell, execute the **runPasswordReset.sh** script for the **admin** user, for example:
 - \$./runPasswordReset.sh admin

Logging information appears, and then a password prompt appears.

b Type the password for the **admin** user, and press **Enter**.

Note: You use this password to log in to the Empirica Signal application as the **admin** user.

The password must contain at least eight characters, including an uppercase character, lowercase character, acceptable symbol, and number.

A confirmation prompt appears.

c Retype the password, and press **Enter**.

If the passwords match, a confirmation message appears.

Alternatively, an error message appears.

d If an error message appeared, run the command again and type matching passwords.

Configuring the Empirica Signal software

Before users can use Empirica Signal, you must complete the following tasks. For information about each task, see the *User Guide*.

1 In a Microsoft Internet Explorer browser window, navigate to the login page, for example:

```
https://<server name>:7004/Signal
```

The example is for a site that requires SSL and does not use single sign-on. If your site does not require SSL connections, use:

```
http://<server name>:7003/Signal
```

If your site uses SSO, use the native login port provided to you by Oracle or the administrator who configured SSO for the application.

If the login page appears, the site is set up correctly.

- 2 Log in as the **admin** user:
 - Username—admin
 - Password—The password you created in the previous procedure.

Note: For upgrades, use the credentials from your previous installation.

See Setting the passwords of the system and admin users (installation only) (on page 70).

If this is a new installation, you are prompted to change your password:

a Change your password.

You are logged out of the software.

b Log in as the **admin** user with the new password.

The home page appears.

- 3 Set your site options:
 - a Click Settings, and then click Set Site Options.

The Site Options page appears.

- b Verify the SMTP server name.
- c If R version 3.0.1 is installed on your system, and you set the rgps parameters in the listener properties file, select **Enable RGPS Option in MGPS Data Mining Runs**.

Alternatively, verify that the option is deselected.

For more information, see **Setting up the listener.properties file** (on page 56).

- d In the following fields, specify the email address for your support team:
 - From Email Address
 - Feedback Email
 - Error Email

The default email address is for the Empirica Signal support team (eSignalcontact_ww_grp@oracle.com).

- e Verify that all other site options are set correctly.
- f Click Save.
- 4 Click **Exit**.

You are logged out.

- 5 If your site uses SSO, create a new user and test the SSO login:
 - a Create an SSO user in your SSO application.
 - b If you self host Empirica Signal and use Oracle Access Manager (OAM) for SSO, create the same user in the Empirica Signal application.
 - If Oracle hosts your instance of Empirica Signal, you do not need to perform this step.
 - c In a Microsoft Internet Explorer browser window, navigate to the login page.
 - The login prompt appears.
 - d Log in as the newly created SSO user.
 - The home page appears.
 - e Click Exit.

You are logged out.

Installing report data (installation only)

You install a small data stub on the Oracle database to enable the standard reports in the Empirica Signal application. The data stub includes the AERS (1q03:S) data configuration. Do not perform this procedure if the AERS68_TO_1Q03 data set is already installed on the application server.

Before you begin, locate the data_stub.zip file. The zip file contains:

- An Oracle DMP file.
- SQL scripts.
- A shell (.sh) script.
- An IMP file.

Perform these steps using the non-privileged user account on the application server.

- 1 Unpack the **Data_Stub.zip** file:
 - a Create a /u01/stage/data_stub directory, for example:
 - \$ mkdir /u01/stage/data_stub
 - b Unzip the **Data_Stub.zip** file into the data_stub directory, for example:
 - \$ unzip Data_Stub.zip -d /u01/stage/data_stub
 - c Verify that the /data_stub directory contains the same files as the Data_Stub.zip file.
- 2 Create the tablespaces and accounts used to store the production data:
 - a Using a text editor, open the /u01/stage/data_stub/create_prod.sql file.
 - To create the data file in a location other than the default location of your database, specify the alternate location in the **DATAFILE PATH** variable.
 - In a command shell, use the following command to navigate to the /u01/stage/data_stub directory:
 - \$ cd /u01/stage/data_stub
 - d Type the following command on one line to execute the script:
 - \$ sqlplus system@<TNS_NAME> @create_prod

A password prompt appears.

e Type the Oracle system account password.

A second password prompt appears.

- f Type a password for the **AERS68_TO_1Q03** account.
- g Confirm the password.

Note: Remember this password for later in this procedure.

The create_prod.sql script creates a tablespace for the data consisting of one 40 MB data file.

- 3 To load the data into the Oracle database:
 - a Edit the **load_prod.imp** file, supplying your Oracle instance at the end of the userid line, for example:

```
userid=AERS68_TO_1Q03@orcl
```

- b Execute the following command to give execute permissions to **load_prod.sh**:
 - \$ chmod u+x load_prod.sh
- c Execute the **load_prod.sh** file using the following command:
 - \$./load_prod.sh
- Type the password for the **AERS68_TO_1Q03** account. You created the password in step 2f.
- To import the supplied standard **AERS (1Q03: S)** configuration into the Empirica Signal application:
 - a Log in to the Empirica Signal application using the **admin** user name.
 - b Click Settings, and click Manage Configurations.
 - c Click Import Configurations.
 - d Type the following account name:

```
AERS68_TO_1Q03
```

- e Click OK.
- f Verify that the **AERS (1q03: S)** standard configuration is listed on the Manage Configurations page.
- g On the Manage Configurations page, click the row menu, and click **Edit**.
- h On the Modify Configuration page, click **Validate Now**.
- i Click Continue.

Note: For more information on working with configurations, see the User Guide.

Optionally, delete the **/data_stub** directory and its contents. These files are no longer needed.

Importing the Sample Topic Workflow Configuration (installation only)

This section describes how to import the Sample Topic Workflow Configuration for use in the Empirica Signal application.

These steps are required only if you intend to use the Topics feature and you have performed the steps in *Setting up the Topic Workflow database account (installation only)* (on page 23). However, Oracle recommends that you perform these steps so that you will have a sample configuration to copy and use as a template for new configurations. Do not edit the sample configuration.

- 1 Log in to the Empirica Signal application using the **admin** username.
- 2 Click Settings, and click Manage Topic Workflow Configurations.
- 3 Click Import Workflow Configuration Account.

A dialog box appears, asking you to confirm the restoration. This message appears even if no topic workflow configurations were deleted.

- 4 Click **OK**.
- 5 Type the following account name:
 - TOPIC_WORKFLOW
- 6 Click Import.
- 7 Verify that the Sample Topic Workflow Configuration is listed on the Manage Topic Workflow Configurations page.

For information about working with topic workflow configurations, see the *User Guide*.

CHAPTER 8

Upgrading from release 8.1 to release 8.1.0.1

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Required privileges for the application server

To upgrade from Empirica Signal release 8.1 to release 8.1.0.1, you must have access to the following accounts on the application server:

• A user account that allows the user to start and stop the Empirica Signal Oracle WebLogic Server instance. Unless otherwise specified in this document, this user must perform all activities.

Note: This account must not have sudo privileges. This document refers to this user account as the non-privileged user account on the application server.

• A user account that has sudo privileges. This user executes certain steps as root.

Note: This document refers to this user account as the privileged user account on the application server.

Unpacking Empirica Signal 8.1.0.1 files into the installation directory

Perform these steps using the non-privileged user account on the application server.

1 Move the **<INSTALL_DIR>/Signal** directory to **<INSTALL_DIR>/Signal_8_1** as backup. For example:

```
mv /u01/stage/Signal_Install/Signal /u01/stage/Signal_Install/Signal_8_1
```

2 Make a new **<INSTALL_DIR>/Signal** directory. For example:

```
mkdir /u01/stage/Signal_Install/Signal
```

In a command shell, navigate to the directory containing **Signal-8_1_0_1_XXX.zip** and unpack its contents into the **<INSTALL_DIR>/Signal** directory. For example:

```
$ unzip Signal-8_1_0_1_XXX.zip -d /u01/stage/Signal_Install/Signal
```

4 Provide the non-privileged account execute permission on the MGPS subdirectory. For example:

```
$ chmod u+x /u01/stage/Signal_Install/Signal/WEB-INF/classes/MGPS
```

Note: If you don't use Empirica Topics, skip to the next section.

5 Move the **<INSTALL_DIR>/TopicsService** directory to **<INSTALL_DIR>/TopicsService** _8_1 as backup. For example:

```
mv /u01/stage/Signal_Install/TopicsService
/u01/stage/Signal_Install/TopicsService_8_1
```

6 Make a new **<INSTALL DIR>/TopicsService** directory. For example:

```
mkdir /u01/stage/Signal_Install/TopicsService
```

Navigate to the directory containing **TopicsService-8_1_0_1_XXX.zip** and unpack its contents into the **<INSTALL_DIR>/TopicsService** directory. For example:

```
$ unzip TopicsService-8_1_0_1_XXX.zip -d
/u01/stage/Signal_Install/TopicsService
```

Installing the RGPS add-on package to the R library

If you have R version 3.0.1 installed, you can optionally install the RGPS add-on package to enable Regression-adjusted Gamma Poisson Shrinker (RGPS) computations in Multi-item Gamma Poisson Shrinker (MGPS) data mining runs. For more information, see the *User Guide*.

The RGPS add-on package is included with the Empirica Signal installation files.

Perform these steps using the privileged user account on the application server.

- 1 In a command shell, navigate to the directory containing RGPS_8_1_0_1_XXX.tar.gz.
- 2 Execute the following command:

```
$ sudo R CMD INSTALL RGPS_8_1_0_1_XXX.tar.gz
```

Setting up the Empirica Signal properties files

Restoring site-specific properties files

Perform these steps using the non-privileged user account on the application server.

- In a command shell, navigate to the backup directory **<INSTALL_DIR>/Signal_8_1/WEB-INF/classes**.
- 2 Copy the **webvdme.properties** file to the installation area. For example:
 - \$ cp webvdme.properties /u01/stage/Signal_Install/Signal/WEB-INF/classes
- 3 Copy the **listener.properties** file to the installation area. For example:
 - \$ cp listener.properties /u01/stage/Signal_Install/Signal/WEB-INF/classes
- 4 Copy the **report_listener.properties** file to the installation area. For example:
 - \$ cp report_listener.properties /u01/stage/Signal_Install/Signal/WEB-INF/classes
- 5 Copy the **webvdme-fonts.properties** file to the installation area. For example:
 - \$ cp webvdme-fonts.properties /u01/stage/Signal_Install/Signal/WEB-INF/classes
- 6 Copy the **log4j.properties** file to the installation area, overwriting the existing file. For example:

CHAPTER 9

Troubleshooting

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Issue: An error occurs when you try to log in because the application cannot connect to the database.

Resolution:

Try these steps in order, testing after each step to determine whether the issue is resolved.

1 Restart WebLogic using the following commands:

```
$ ./stopWebLogic.sh
$ nohup ./startWebLogic.sh > /dev/null &
```

- 2 In the WebLogic Administration Console, verify that the data source user name is set up as **EMPIRICA_OPSS** with the correct password. Test the connection.
- 3 In the Oracle Enterprise Manager, under System Policies, verify the codebase paths match the installation.
- 4 To check for specific permission errors, enable debugging, and examine error messages in the log file:
 - a Open the WebLogic start script (**startWebLogic.sh**) in your domain directory, for example: /u01/app/oracle/Middleware/user_projects/domains/empirica/bin
 - b Add the following text below the **# START WEBLOGIC** entry in the file:

```
\label{local-prions} $$ JAVA_OPTIONS = "${JAVA_OPTIONS} - Djava.security.debug=access, failure - Djps.auth.debug=true - Djps.auth.debug.verbose=true"
```

c Restart WebLogic using the following commands:

```
$ ./stopWebLogic.sh
$ nohup ./startWebLogic.sh > /dev/null &
```

Examine the **startWebLogic.sh** output to see whether it contains the following permission error:

```
java.security.AccessControlException: access denied
```

e If the error exists, look below the error at the code source, such as the following text:

```
CodeSource=file:/u01/app/oracle/product/Middleware/user_projects/domains
/empirica/servers/SignalServer/stage/Signal/Signal/...
```

- f In Enterprise Manager, update the permission codebase paths in System Policies to reflect the missing permission.
- g Restart WebLogic using the following commands:

```
$ ./stopWebLogic.sh
$ nohup ./startWebLogic.sh > /dev/null &
```

h After the permission issue is resolved, remove the debug options, and start WebLogic using the following commands:

```
$ ./stopWebLogic.sh
$ nohup ./startWebLogic.sh > /dev/null &
```

Issue: The password for the OPSS database account changes.

This issue occurs when the password for the **EMPIRICA_OPSS** account expires or changes, for example, due to password expiration policies.

Resolution:

You must register the new password in the following locations:

- The bootstrap wallet file.
 - a In a command shell, navigate to the directory for the bootstrap wallet file using a command such as:

```
$ cd /u01/app/oracle/Middleware/user-
projects/domains/empirica/config/fmwconfig.
```

- b In a command shell, start **WLST** using a command such as:
 - \$ /u01/app/oracle/Middleware/oracle_common/common/bin/wlst.sh
 The following prompt appears:

```
wls:/offline>
```

c Execute the following command:

```
modifyBootStrapCredential(jpsConfigFile='./jps-config.xml',
   username='<user>', password='<new password>')
where:
```

- <user> is the name of the OPSS schema database account, such as EMPIRICA_OPSS.
- < new password> is the new password of the OPSS schema database account.
- d To exit WLST, execute the **exit()** command.
- The data source associated with the OPSS schema database account.
 - a Open the WebLogic Administration Console.
 - b Expand Services, and select Data Sources.
 - c Select the **Data Source** entry.

If you followed the recommendations in *Creating a data source for credential access* (on page 109), the data source is named **Empirica Credential Store**, and the JDNI name is jdbc/mds/opss.

- d Select the Configuration tab, and select the Connection Pool tab.
- e In the Change Center section on the left, click **Lock & Edit**.
- f Scroll to the **Password** and **Confirm Password** fields.
- g Type the account password in both fields, and click **Save**.
- h In the Change Center section on the left, click **Activate Changes**.

Issue: The password for the MDS account changes.

This issue occurs when the password for the **EMPIRICA_MDS** account expires or changes, for example, due to password expiration policies.

Perform the following steps to register the new password in the data source associated with the MDS schema database account.

- 1 Open the WebLogic Administration Console.
- 2 Expand Services, and select Data Sources.
- 3 Select the **Data Source** entry.
- 4 Select the **mds-owsm** data source.
- 5 Select the **Configuration** tab, and select the **Connection Pool** tab.
- 6 In the Change Center section on the left, click Lock & Edit.
- 7 Scroll to the **Password** and **Confirm Password** fields.
- 8 Type the account password in both fields, and click **Save**.
- 9 In the Change Center section on the left, click **Activate Changes**.

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Setting up Oracle Access Manager (OAM)

To configure the Empirica Signal application to use single sign-on (SSO) using Oracle Access Manager (OAM), an OAM administrator runs the OAM register script. This script creates an OAM agent and uses an XML file as input, such as the following XML sample.

Replace the bold values with appropriate values for your installation. In the following example, EmpiricaSignal is the name of your registered SSO agent or Webgate ID. The name must be unique in the OAM environment.

Note: For any input, do not include trailing whitespace. Most text is case sensitive. Paths might vary depending on your environment.

Prerequisites

- JDK version 8 update 111 (or later) must be installed on the application server.
- The application server must have enough free space. For more information, see the System Requirements section in the *Release Notes*.
- Oracle 12c database must be installed on the DB server.

Note: You must have access to a database account with SYSDBA privileges.

• Oracle 12c database client must be installed on the application server.

Setting environment variables

In this procedure, you edit configuration scripts, which set environment variables for the command shells you use. You must log out and log in again for the changes you make in this section to take effect.

In this section, you configure environment variables for your application server using your privileged account and using sudo. This section requires you to edit files, using commands such as the following. The first command logs you in as root. If you are prompted for your password after typing this command, type your password, not the password of root.

```
$ sudo su - root
# vi <file_name>
# exit
```

To set environment variables:

- 1 Edit the /etc/profile file, as follows
 - a Add the following lines to the file.

A boot identity file contains the user credentials for starting and stopping an instance of WebLogic Server. An administration server or managed server can refer to this file for user credentials instead of prompting at the command line to provide them. Because the credentials are encrypted, using a boot identity file is more secure than storing plain text credentials in a startup or shutdown script. There can be a different boot identity file for each server in a domain.

For the Production Mode domain, you can create the boot identity file manually, as explained below.

1 Check that the following directory is present in the domain directory: \$WL_HOME/user_projects/domains/<domain_name>/servers/AdminServer

Note: If the directory is not present, the server has not yet been started after WebLogic 12c server installation. Start the AdminServer using the ./startWebLogic.sh command from the \$WL_HOME/user_projects/domains/<domain_name>/bin directory.

- 2 If the AdminServer was started with the start script in a Terminal window, click Ctrl + C in that window to stop the server.
- 3 Navigate to the domain directory \$WL_HOME/user_projects/domains/<domain_name>/servers/AdminServer directory, for example:

 $/u01/app/oracle/product/weblogic12c/Middleware/user_projects/domains/empirica/servers/AdminServer$

- 4 Create a subdirectory called **security**.
- 5 Navigate to the **security** directory and execute the following command:

```
$ cat - > boot.properties
username=weblogic
password=<domain_password>
```

- 6 To save the file and exit the editor, press **Ctrl+D**.
- 7 From the \$WL_HOME/user_projects/domains/<domain_name>/bin directory, restart the server using the ./startWebLogic.sh command.
- 8 When messages that say **RUNNING** appear, press **Ctrl+C**.
- 9 From the

\$WL_HOME/user_projects/domains/<domain_name>/servers/AdminServ
er/security directory, execute cat boot.properties to verify that:

- The user name and password have been encrypted by the server.
- A comment has been added with the timestamp when encryption occurred.

/u01/app/oracle/product/weblogic12c/Middleware/user_projects/domains/empirica/bin

where *< listen_address>* is the value you entered in *Creating and configuring the WebLogic domain* (on page 102).

 - Database User Name—For example, EMPIRICA_OPSS.
 - Password, Confirm Password—Type the password that you entered when you installed RCU.
- 10 Click Next.

The Test Database Connection page appears.

11 At the top of the page, click **Test Configuration**.

A Connection Test Succeeded message appears.

12 Click Next.

The Select Targets page appears.

- 13 From the Servers list, select **AdminServer**, **SignalServer**, and **TopicsServer**.
- 14 Click Finish.
- 15 In the upper-left corner of the page, in the Change Center section, click **Activate Changes**.

A message appears, indicating that the changes have been activated. The Credential Store Data Source entry is created.

Associating the credential store with the data source

- In an internet browser, enter the URL for the Oracle Enterprise Manager, such as the following: https://eservername>:7002/em
- 2 In the left pane, expand **WebLogic Domain**, and select **empirica**.
- In the right pane, expand the **WebLogic Domai**n drop-down menu at the top of the page, and select **Security > Security Provider Configuration**.
 - The Security Provider Configuration page appears.
- 4 In the Security Stores area, click **Change Store Type**.
 - The Configure Security Stores page appears.
- 5 From the Store Type drop-down list, select **Oracle Database**.
- 6 Next to the Data Source JNDI Name field, click **Select**, select the **Empirica Credential Store**, and click **OK**.
- 7 In the Data Source Properties area, type the:
 - **User name**—Name of the database user name, such as EMPIRICA_OPSS.
 - **Password, Confirm Password**—Password for the schema that you created in *Installing RCU and creating repositories* (on page 117).
- 8 In the Root DN field, type **cn=root**.
- 9 Select **Create new domain**.
- 10 In the Domain Name field, type **empirica**.
- 11 Click **OK**.

A message appears, indicating that the domain must be restarted.

12 Click Yes.

The domain restarts. A confirmation dialog box appears and displays the results.

13 Click Close.

The credential store is set up.

14 Stop and restart the WebLogic server.

Restarting the SignalServer and TopicsServer managed servers

1 In an internet browser, enter the URL for the WebLogic Administration Console, such as the following:

https://<servername>:7002/console

2 In the left pane, expand **Environment**, and select **Servers**.

The Summary of Servers page appears.

- 3 Select the **Control** tab.
- 4 From the list of servers, select **SignalServer** and **TopicsServer**.
- 5 From the Shutdown drop-down list, select **Force Shutdown Now**.
- 6 After the states of the SignalServer and TopicsServer change to Shutdown, select the checkboxes for **SignalServer** and **TopicsServer** in the table, and click **Start**.

Configuring SSL

The WebLogic server is configured by default to use a demo SSL certificate. This certificate is intended for demonstration purposes only. Do not use the demo SSL certificate for production environments.
