unavailable, or moderate impact but increasing with time, or minimal impact and stable.
■ Did the problem affect one user, several users, or all users?
■ Has anything changed? For example, if this is an operation that used to work and now fails, what is different? Can you undo any recent changes, to verify whether they are relevant to the issue?
■ Can the problem be reproduced? This is a critical question for support analysts. For example, did the problem recur on the same system, under the same circumstances? Can the problem be reproduced on another system? Additionally:
Does installing a software component fail on all client machines, or just one?
■ Do all clients fail to connect to the server, or just one?
■ If you are able to restart the server or database, does restarting the database or rebooting the server or client machine (if applicable) make a difference?
Keep copies of the Oracle alert log, any trace files, core dumps, and redo log files recorded at or near the time of the incident. Oracle Support Services may need these to further investigate your problem.
To help analyze problems:
■ Archive or delete old alert logs. When the database is started without an alert log, a new one is created. In some cases, if you force the problem to recur with a new alert log, the timestamps for the recorded events may

indicate which events are relevant.

- Archive or delete old trace files. To check whether the file was modified, right-click and select Properties. The *Properties* dialog box displays the modification date.
- Check the operating system error logs, especially the System log and Application log. These files are relevant to the Oracle Server. To view these files, from the Start menu, choose Programs > Administrative Tools > Event Viewer, and choose System or Application from the Log main menu.

Prerequisites

- Object-relational database management concepts

Additional Information: If you are not familiar with object-relational database management concepts, see *Oracle8i Concepts*.

Intended Audience

This manual is intended for anyone who wants to display database query results in HTML format. You must have Windows NT User Login privileges on the machine you query from to use Oracle Web Publishing Assistant. You need a Windows NT Administrator account to install and maintain Oracle Web Publishing Assistant.

		or whatever you may have called your Oracle home.
		In this Optimal Flexible Architecture (OFA)-compliant release, all subdirectories are no longer under a top level ORACLE_HOME directory. There is now a new top-level directory called ORACLE_BASE that by default is C:\ORACLE. If you install Oracle8i Enterprise Edition or Oracle8i for Windows NT release 8.1.6 on a clean computer (that is, there is no other Oracle software on the computer), the default settings for the first Oracle home directory is C:\ORACLE\ORA81. If you run Oracle Universal Installer again and install release 8.2.x, the second Oracle home directory is called \ORA82. These Oracle home directories are located directly under ORACLE_BASE. All directory path examples in this guide follow OFA conventions.
%ORACLE_HOME%	SQL> @%ORACLE_ HOME%\ADMIN\DB_ NAME\ADHOC\CATALOG.SQL	In SQL*Plus commands, you may see %ORACLE_HOME%. SQL*Plus is able to locate your Oracle Home directory using the %ORACLE_HOME% variable. This convention can be used in Server Manager, SQL*Plus, Export Utility, and Import Utility.

HOME_NAME	Oracle <i>HOME_NAME</i> TNSListener	Represents the Oracle home name.
		The home name can be up to sixteen alphanumeric characters. The only special character allowed in the home name is the underscore.

Introducing Oracle Web Publishing Assistant

You have an Oracle database and tablespaces filled with useful information. You want to share this information with your co-workers, customers, and the rest of the world. How can you get this information, and present it in an easy-to-read format?

Oracle Web Publishing Assistant Web-enables an Oracle database, offering high performance and scalability with a user-friendly interface. Use the Oracle Web Publishing Assistant Create Web Page Wizard to create Web page queries which are displays of data retrieved from an Oracle database merged with HTML Web pages. The default HTML template provided with Oracle Web Publishing Assistant is Java-enabled, providing scalability to accommodate your query results. Oracle Web Publishing Assistant uses database connection sharing and the Oracle Call Interface (OCI8) to improve performance and maximize server resources.

To make the Web page available on an intranet or the World Wide Web, you must configure a Web server. A Web server is not necessary if you only want to view the page locally. To view the page locally, use your Web browser to open the file. See "Software Requirements" on page 1-6.

Note: To use Oracle Web Publishing Assistant, you need Windows NT User Login privileges on the computer from which you query.

You can download trial versions of Oracle Web Server or Oracle Web Application Server from the Oracle Corporation Web site at http://www.oracle.com.


Recent Feature Updates

This release of Oracle Web Publishing Assistant offers updated features:

- The Preview function replaces the Open function. To preview a Web page, click Preview on the toolbar. The Web page is opened with your Web browser. See "Administering Web Page Queries" on page 3-11 for more information.
- The "When Data Changes" scheduling option has been added to the scheduling options. This scheduling option when selected allows Oracle Web Publishing Assistant to automatically update your Web page query whenever the database is modified. See "Creating New Web Page Queries" on page 3-3 for more information.
- The "Manually" scheduling option has been added to the scheduling options. This scheduling option requires you to manually generate your Web page by clicking Generate. See "Creating New Web Page Queries" on page 3-3 for more information.
- Modification of file properties is now possible when you open the properties of an existing Web page query. You can change any aspect of the Web page query. including the template, scheduling option, and the query. See "Administering Web Page Queries" on page 3-11 for more information.
- The default template .HTX uses a Java applet, which provides high scalability and reliable formatting across different platforms and browsers. See "Tutorial 1: Using the Generated Default Template" on page 4-2 for more information.
- The template syntax now includes more keywords to enable greater control in displaying query results. See "Designing Templates" on page 2-2 for more information.
- Oracle Web Publishing Assistant now uses database connection sharing and the Oracle Call Interface version 8 (OCI8) to improve performance.
- Synonyms of tables or views can be selected from the database hierarchy to build queries. See "Creating New Web Page Queries" on page 3-3.
- The file listing is automatically refreshed every minute.
- The scheduling option uses buttons instead of drop-down lists, improving the interface. See "Creating New Web Page Queries" on page 3-3.
- The maximum characters per column returned from the database has been increased from 2000 to 4000.

About the Interface

Oracle Web Publishing Assistant features an easy-to-use toolbar interface that enables you to create new and administer existing Web page queries:



Menu and Toolbar

Perform administrative tasks using either the menu or the toolbar. The menu provides the same functionality as the toolbar, but the menu also includes commands that enable you to modify the look of Oracle Web Publishing Assistant. For example, you can change the listing to icons, and display or hide the status bar and toolbar.

The toolbar provides easy access to Oracle Web Publishing Assistant functionality:

File Listing

The file listing shows you the:

- Web page query files that you have scheduled
- location of the files in your system
- scheduling option you have specified for that Web page query
- last date and time the Web page query was modified

Double-click a Web page query file name in the listing to preview the Web page in your Web browser. Because Oracle Web Publishing Assistant uses an asynchronous processing model, the actual Web page may not have been generated immediately. If the page does not yet exist when you double-click the file in the listing or click Preview, Oracle Web Publishing Assistant prompts you to create the page immediately.

Installing Oracle Web Publishing Assistant

Before installing this product, review Oracle8i Enterprise Edition Release Notes included in this package for the most recent information about this product.

Oracle Web Publishing Assistant is automatically installed with Oracle8i for Windows NT, if you choose a Typical installation.

> **Note:** You must have a Windows NT Administrator account to install and maintain Oracle Web Publishing Assistant.

See Oracle8i Installation Guide for Windows NT for instructions.

De-installing Oracle Web Publishing Assistant

To de-install Oracle Web Publishing Assistant:

- Stop Oracle Web Publishing Assistant services.
 - Choose Start > Settings > Control Panel.
 - Double-click Services.
 - Select OracleWebAssistant, and click Stop.
 - Click Close to close the control panel.
- Choose Start > Programs > Oracle Installation Products > Oracle Universal Installer.

The *Welcome* window for Oracle Universal Installer appears.

Click Installed Products.

The *Inventory* dialog box appears.

Select Oracle Web Publishing Assistant and click Remove.

Understanding Oracle Web Publishing Assistant

This chapter discusses how the different components of Oracle Web Publishing Assistant work together to deliver Web-enabled Oracle database information.

Using Sample Templates

Oracle Web Publishing Assistant provides you with sample templates (located in ORACLE BASE\ORACLE HOME\ASSISTANTS\OWAST\SAMPLES). Use these templates to become familiar with creating Web page queries.

The default template (.HTX) uses a Java applet to format the database query information into a spreadsheet-like Web page. The new Java-enabled Web page template:

- expands to accommodate query results
- provides reliable formatting
- allows browser independence

See Chapter 4, "Using the Tutorials" for more information on the available templates.

Designing Templates

If you want to design your own templates, use the Oracle Web Publishing Assistant keywords in the HTML extension files (.HTX) to control how the Web page is constructed. The Oracle Web Publishing Assistant keywords used in .HTX files are:

- Keyword <%begindetail%>, <%enddetail%>
- Conditional Logic Keyword <%if%>, <%else%>, <%endif%>
- Variable CurrentRecord
- Variable CurrentDate
- Variable MaxColumn
- Variable QueryId

The template syntax is supported by HTML editors like Microsoft Frontpage. Templates can be modified at any time. Oracle Web Publishing Assistant uses the modified template when generating your Web page at the next scheduled generation time.

If you modify your original query after generating a Web page, then Oracle Web Publishing Assistant prompts you to modify your template. Oracle Web Publishing Assistant launches your default template editor. You can then choose to use the original template, modify your existing template, or use a new template. See "Administering Web Page Queries" on page 3-11 and Oracle Web Publishing Assistant Online Help for more information.

Keyword <%begindetail%>, <%enddetail%>

This keyword surrounds a section of the HTML extension file in which the data output from the Oracle database will be merged. Within the section, the column names are delimited with <% and %> which are used to mark the position of the data returned from the query.

For example:

```
<%begindetail%>
<%ename%>: <%sal%>
<%enddetail%>
```

lists the columns ENAME (employee name) and SAL (salary). You can refer to any column in this manner. You can refer to column names in other sections of the extension file. If no records are returned from the query, the <%begindetail%> section will be omitted.

Conditional Logic Keyword <%if%>, <%else%>, <%endif%>

Your template can contain conditional logic with an if-then-else statement to control how the Web page is constructed. One common usage of an if-then-else statement is to insert a condition to display the results from the query on the first row with a <%begindetail%> section. If no records are returned by the query, the following message appears in the resulting HTML file:

```
Sorry, no employees had salaries greater than 5000.
```

By using the <%if%> statement and a built-in variable CurrentRecord, you can tailor the output so that the error message is displayed when no records are returned by the query.

> **Note:** Conditional logic statements must exist entirely before, inside, or after the <%begindetail%> and <%enddetail%> block.

Nested <%if%> statements are not allowed (you cannot nest an <%if%> statement within a <%if%> statement.

The syntax is structured as:

```
<%if condition%>
HTML text
[<%else%>
HTML text1
<%endif%>
```

where *condition* is of the form:

value1 operator value2 and *operator* can be one of the following:

Operator	If	
EQ	value1 equals value2	
LT	value1 is less than value2	
GT	value1 is greater than value2	
CONTAINS	any part of value1 contains the string value2	

The operands *value1* and *value2* can be column names, a built-in variable, or a constant. See the section "Variable CurrentRecord" on page 2-5 for more information.

Here is an example:

Variable CurrentRecord

The CurrentRecord variable contains the number of times the <%begindetail%> section has been processed. The first time through the <%begindetail%> section, the value is zero (0). The value of CurrentRecord changes every time another record is retrieved from the database.

Variable CurrentDate

The CurrentDate variable shows the date and time of the Web page generation. This variable cannot be used inside <%if%> statements. If you do not specify a date format, the default format used is DD/MMM/YYYY (for example, 05/MAY/1999). The default time format is HH:MM:SS A.M./P.M. (for example, 10:01:15 A.M.). You can change the date and time format using these codes:

Variable MaxColumn

The MaxColumn variable <%MaxColumn%> specifies the number of columns returned by the query.

Variable Queryld

The QueryId variable <%QueryId%> provides a unique identifying number for the generated Web page. You can use this number when troubleshooting Oracle Web Publishing Assistant. See Appendix B, "Troubleshooting" for more information.

Generated Web Page Queries

Web page queries generated by Oracle Web Publishing Assistant consist of two types of information:

Information Type	Description
Static Information	Stored in a template.
Dynamic Information	Retrieved from the database and merged with the static information from the template.

This model of page generation has two benefits:

Flexibility

The template layout is compatible with popular HTML editors such as Microsoft Frontpage. You can modify the templates in any way you want, whenever you want.

Performance

The database does not need to be accessed every time a Web page is viewed. The database only needs to return results from the query, therefore performance is not negatively impacted.

Settings in the Windows NT Registry

Oracle Web Publishing Assistant registry values are located under the key HKEY_ LOCAL_MACHINE\SOFTWARE\ORACLE\HOMEID.





Determine how you want the Web page to look, before entering a query to create a Web page. Oracle Web Publishing Assistant provides you with sample templates that you can use (ORACLE_BASE\ORACLE_HOME\ASSISTANTS\OWAST\SAMPLES*.HTX), or you can create your own template using any HTML editor.	See "Designing Templates" on page 2-2.

Creating New Web Page Queries

Oracle Web Publishing Assistant merges the results of your database query with an HTML template (use the default template provided with the product or a template that you design). The result is a Web page query.

To create a new Web page query:

If you are using multiple Oracle homes functionality, the command to start a tool includes a *HOME NAME*, where *HOME NAME* indicates the name of a different Oracle home. Note that the first Oracle home created on your computer does not have *HOME_NAME* appended to the group. For example:

To start Oracle Web Publishing Assistant from the first Oracle home, choose:

Start > Programs > Oracle for Windows NT > Application Development > Oracle Web Publishing Assistant.

To start Oracle Web Publishing from an additional Oracle home, choose:

Start > Programs > Oracle for Windows NT - HOME NAME > Application Development > Oracle Web Publishing Assistant.

The Oracle Web Publishing Assistant Welcome screen appears:



The first time you run Oracle Web Publishing Assistant, a Create Web Page button appears. This button will not appear in subsequent uses of Oracle Web Publishing Assistant if you have Web page queries scheduled.

The next time you want to create a new Web page query, click New in the toolbar to launch the Create Web Page Wizard.

If you do not want the welcome screen to appear the next time you start the Oracle Web Publishing Assistant, clear the check box on the bottom of the welcome screen.

Click Create Web Page.

The Create Web Page Wizard (Step 1 of 4) screen appears.



Enter database login information, and click Next:

Specify the time intervals at which Oracle Web Publishing Assistant should create your Web page. You can specify the time interval (minutes, hours, or days) between Web page builds. For example, you can choose to have your Web page created every 5 minutes, every 36 hours or every 31 days. The maximum time interval is 744 hours (31 days).

When Data Changes



Automatically updates your Web page whenever the relevant data in the database is modified. You can only use this scheduling option when you select a table from the database hierarchy to build your query.



- Specify whether you want Oracle Web Publishing Assistant to use a default template or a template file that you have already created. Browse to locate the file, or enter the file name in the field. Click Finish.

The Summary Screen appears.

Click OK to dismiss the screen.

All Web pages, except those scheduled to be created Manually, are automatically generated at this time. If you specified a scheduling option for some time in the future, your Web page will also be regenerated at that scheduled time.

Administering Web Page Queries

Using Oracle Web Publishing Assistant, you can perform administrative tasks on your Web page queries, such as changing the resulting Web page formatting, modifying the query syntax, and scheduling updates. Oracle Web Publishing Assistant provides an easy-to-use, graphical interface for you to administer your Web page queries. The menu and toolbar are briefly described in the section "Before You Start" on page 3-2.

After you have created and scheduled your Web page queries, the (Web page query) files appear in the file listing of the Oracle Web Publishing Assistant. Oracle Web Publishing Assistant enables you to maintain your Web pages graphically.

Previewing a Scheduled Web Page Query

To preview a Web page query:

Double-click the Web page query file name from the listing.

Alternatively, select the file name from the listing, and click Preview on the toolbar. You can also choose Preview from the Web Page menu, or using the right mouse button, right-click on the file name. Choose Preview from the pop-up menu.

Due to the asynchronous processing model used by Oracle Web Publishing Assistant, it is possible that your scheduled Web page query has not yet been generated. If it has not been generated, Oracle Web Publishing Assistant asks if you want to generate it now.

Oracle Web Publishing Assistant launches your Web browser, if you have associated your Web browser with the Web page query file type.

Generating Web Page Queries

To generate scheduled Web pages:

- Select the Web page query file name from the listing.
- Click Generate on the toolbar, or from the Web Page menu, choose Generate.

Alternatively, using the right mouse button, right-click the file name. Choose Generate from the pop-up menu.

Oracle Web Publishing Assistant generates the Web page immediately and refreshes the listing automatically.

3. Double-click the Web page query file name in the listing to view.

Oracle Web Publishing Assistant launches your Web browser.

Deleting Scheduled Web Page Queries

To delete a scheduled Web page:

- Select the Web page query file name to be deleted from the listing.
- Click Delete on the toolbar, or from the Web Page menu, choose Delete.

Alternatively, using the right mouse button, right-click on the file name. From the pop-up menu, choose Delete.

Deleting the Web page query file name in this way does not delete the related .HTX or .HTM files.

Viewing and Modifying Properties of Web Page Queries

View properties of Web page queries to review and modify the settings used to create the page.

To view and modify the properties of the Web page queries:

- Select the Web page query file name from the listing.
- Click Properties on the toolbar, or choose Properties from the Web Page menu.

Alternatively, using the right mouse button, right-click the file name. Choose Properties from the pop-up menu.

The Properties screen appears.

Click the tabs to see the properties:

Refreshing the Listing of Web Page Queries

Refreshing is automatic in this release of Oracle Web Publishing Assistant. If you want to refresh immediately, choose Refresh from the View menu.

Editing Templates

You can edit templates from within the Properties screen or by opening the template file using your HTML editor.

To edit the template from within the Properties screen:

- Select the Web page query file name from the listing.
- Click Properties on the toolbar, or from the Web Page menu, choose Properties. Alternatively, using the right mouse button, right-click the file name. From the pop-up menu, choose Properties.
- Click the File Options tab.

This tab shows where your Web page query is stored (file name and full path), and it shows which template you used to create the query.

Click Edit.

The template is opened with the program associated with that file type, or if there is no program associated, Oracle Web Publishing Assistant launches Notepad.

- **5.** Edit the template.
- **6.** Save the file.

Oracle Web Publishing Assistant uses the revised template file for the next scheduled or next requested Web page generation.

Editing Query Syntax

To change your query:

- Select the Web page file name from the listing.
- 2. Click Properties on the toolbar, or from the Web Page menu, choose Properties. Alternatively, using the right mouse button, right-click the file name. From the pop-up menu, choose Properties.
- **3.** Click the Query tab.
- Edit the SQL statement in the field.

About the Tutorials

Each tutorial in this chapter uses increasingly more complex templates to format retrieved database information. To learn how the different effects are achieved, view the template structure in an HTML editor or view the source code from within your browser.

Tutorial 1: Using the Generated Default Template

The first tutorial uses the default template. This template is a simple page, which will display information retrieved from one table using a Java applet. The database query used in the tutorial retrieves information from the SCOTT.EMP table (installed automatically when you install Oracle8 using the Typical Installation option).

Oracle Web Publishing Assistant merges the results of the database query with the template. The result is a Web page query. All of your scheduled Web page queries are listed in the Oracle Web Publishing Assistant file listing.


To create the Web page:

1. Start Oracle Web Publishing Assistant.

Choose Start > Programs > Oracle for Windows NT > Application Development > Oracle Web Publishing Assistant.

Oracle Web Publishing Assistant appears. If you have never created a Web page query using the Create Web Page Wizard before or if you do not have any Web page queries scheduled in the listing, then the welcome screen appears with a Create Web Page button. To bypass the welcome screen upon subsequent use of Oracle Web Publishing Assistant, clear the check box on the screen.







The Web page you have created thus far is similar to the Web page in the second tutorial, except that the employee names are linked.

The next section explains how you can further develop the page by incorporating a frame which shows a set of information from a separate query on the same Web page. In this example, you will create a frame which shows the details of each employee listed in the first column of the Web page when the name of that employee is clicked.

Note that when you pass the mouse pointer over the employee name, an HTML file is linked to the name. The file each employee name points to is what you will be creating in the next section, such as EMP#HTM, where EMP# is the employee number. After you complete the next section, the result will be a file EXAMPLE3.HTM which incorporates the files MAIN.HTM and EMP#.HTM.

To illustrate, the first employee listed is KING. The employee number associated with KING is 7839. In order to create the frame of information, you must know the employee number of each employee. This example will stop with employee KING, but you can create as many as you want.



To continue with Tutorial 3 and create the second part of the Web page:

- **12.** Repeat Step 3.
- **13.** Repeat Step 4.
- 14. Select the Enter a SQL Statement method for creating a query, and click Import SQL From Text File.

Use the predefined SQL script EXAMPLE3A.SQL to enter the SQL statement. For more information on how to use the script, see Step 5.

The statement reads:

select empno, ename, job, sal, comm, hiredate, dname from emp a, dept b where a.deptno = b.deptno and empno=emp# order by sal desc; where *emp#* is the employee number.

- **15.** Click Next.
- **16.** Enter 7839.HTM as the file name for the first employee record for employee KING.

Select Use Template File. Navigate to *ORACLE_BASE\ORACLE_* HOME\ASSISTANTS\OWAST\SAMPLES\DETAIL.HTX.

17. Click Next.

The Summary Screen appears, confirming that the Web page creation was successful. Click Finish to dismiss the screen.

18. Open the resulting Web page EXAMPLE3.HTM (located in *ORACLE*_ BASE\ORACLE_HOME\ASSISTANTS\OWAST\SAMPLES directory) in your Web browser. The page looks like this:



19. Repeat Steps 10 through 16 for each frame you want to create.

Note that only the files MAIN.HTM and EMP#.HTM appear in the file listing. The file EXAMPLE3.HTM will not appear in the file listing of Oracle Web Publishing Assistant:



When you are finished creating the frames, your resulting Web page will allow a user to see the Employee Details of each of the employees by clicking on the employee name. The information contained in the frame shows the information relevant to the selected name.

Oracle Web Publishing Assistant Repository

The Oracle Web Publishing Assistant Repository stores configuration information. The repository must reside in the registry of the same machine where Oracle Web Publishing Assistant service is running.

The registry keys (values) are part of the service name registry key itself, allowing for multiple repositories, one for each service. Key names which appear in italics can exist multiple times. All keys listed are sub-keys except for the lowest level which are values.

Troubleshooting

This appendix discusses troubleshooting Oracle Web Publishing Assistant.

Questions and Answers

This section includes answers to some common questions about Oracle Web Publishing Assistant.

My file does not immediately refresh in the Modified column when I click Generate. What should I do?


The file listing will automatically refresh within one minute. If you want to refresh immediately, then choose Refresh from the View menu.

When deleting a Web page query, I get the error message "Unable to remove job from Windows NT scheduler". What does this message mean?

This message is informational. Usually this message indicates that the job has already been removed from the Windows NT scheduler.

How can I display the Web page query file names in alphabetical order in the file listing?

Click the File Name column. The Web page query file names will be sorted in alphabetical order, rather than in order of the time created. If you click File Name again, then the listing order will reverse.



Can I order Web page queries in different ways?

You can order Web page queries in the listing by File Name, Location, Schedule, and (time and date) Modified. Click on the column name you wish to sort by.

I deleted a Web page query from the listing, but I still see the .HTM and .HTX files on my hard drive. Why?

Deleting the Web page query from the listing only removes the item from the repository and does not remove any of the associated .HTM or .HTX files. Remove these files manually.

The scheduling choice When Data Changes does not always appear as an option when I use the Create Web Page Wizard. Why?

You can only select When Data Changes if you select a table from the database hierarchy when you use the Create Web Page Wizard.

I created a Web page query using the scheduling option Immediately. Why doesn't the Web page query appear on the listing?

The scheduling option Immediately creates the Web page once when you finish with your Web page query creation. You have not scheduled it to be generated again. Therefore, it will not appear in the listing. To view the Web page query, open the file from within your Web browser application.

I am trying to build a database guery using the database hierarchy in the Create Web Page Wizard, but I keep getting an error message indicating that the guery specified is invalid. Why?

Check to see if you specified additional query criteria. The additional query criteria is appended to your query, and incorrect syntax can cause the query to be invalid.

If my Web page query does not get generated, where is the error recorded? All errors are logged in the Windows NT application event queue. Events in the application event queue can be viewed using the Windows NT Event Viewer. Choose Start > Programs > Administrative Tools > Event Viewer.

I have a Web page query which is scheduled to be updated on a regular basis, but it is not being updated anymore. What causes this condition, and how can I restart updates without restarting the service?

Check the Windows NT Event Viewer to see why the Web page query is no longer being updated. To restart updates, start Oracle Web Publishing Assistant, and click Generate. The Web page query is updated, and it will continue to be updated according to the scheduling option you set.

If I click Generate several times in rapid succession, many errors appear in the **Event Viewer. Why?**

You cannot generate a Web page query that is already being generated. If a Web page query is already being generated, then the page generator initialization will fail. An error will be written in the application event queue. You can ignore the errors since they will have no impact on Oracle Web Publishing Assistant other than the page will not be generated.

What are the OWPA trigger(s) and tables that are in my database account? The trigger(s) and tables with the prefix OWPA_ are Oracle Web Publishing Assistant objects. They are used to enable the Oracle Web Publishing Assistant service to monitor changes in the database.

How can I copy all of my Web page queries to another PC?


Oracle Web Publishing Assistant does not feature an export function, but you can use the Windows NT registry editor to export the repository information from the registry:

1. At the MS-DOS command prompt, type:

C:\> REGEDIT

Navigate to HKEY_LOCAL_ MACHINE/SYSTEM/CurrentControlSet/Services/OracleWebAssistant/WebP ages.

All of the Web page queries are listed under WebPages.



- Select the Web page query you want to export by clicking once on the number corresponding to the Query Id which appears in the File Options tab of the Properties window. See "Viewing and Modifying Properties of Web Page Queries" on page 3-12.
- From the Registry menu, choose Export Registry File...
- Specify the volume you want to export the file to, and enter a file name. Confirm that the Export Range is correct.
- Click Save.

If I select the On Date(s) of the Month scheduling option and choose 31, when will updates occur given that not all months have 31 days?

The Web page will be updated only in those months that have 31 days.

I cannot set my system default locale to French. Why?

Due to French government regulations on encryption, you cannot set your system default locale to French (Standard) in the Regional Settings Control Panel of Windows NT.

I cannot enter the time using the spin box with the default time style. Why? In some language versions on Windows NT, the spin box for entering time in Web Publishing Assistant does not function properly with the default time style. To work around this problem, change the default time style from within the Control Panel before running the Assistant. To change the default time style, click on the "Regional Settings" icon in the Control Panel and select the "Time" property page, and change the time style to "hh:mm:ss".
