# Overview of the Installation Process

The installation process involves the following:

- **Plan your installation:** This chapter offers an overview of the steps required to install Oracle Application Express. During the planning phase, you should determine whether to install a full development environment or runtime environment. You should also determine which Web Listener to use. Available options include the Oracle Application Express Listener, the embedded PL/SQL gateway, or Oracle HTTP Server and mod\_plsql.
  - A full development environment provides complete access to the Application Builder environment to develop applications. A runtime environment is an appropriate choice for production implementations in which you want to run applications that cannot be modified. To learn more, see "About the Oracle Application Express Runtime Environment" on page 1-2.
- 2. Verify installation requirements: "Oracle Application Express Installation Requirements" describes the minimum requirements that your system must meet before you install the software.
- **Install the software:** The required installation steps depend upon which Web Listener you decide to use.

# **Upgrading from a Previous Release of** Oracle Application Express

If you have release 1.5.x, 1.6.x, 2.0.x, 2.2.x, 3.0.x, 3.1.x, 3.2.x, 4.0x or 4.1x of Oracle Application Express, following any of the installation scenarios in this guide upgrades your Oracle Application Express instance to release 4.2 and creates Oracle Application Express 4.2 database objects in a new schema and migrates the application metadata to the new release.

# **About the Oracle Application Express Runtime Environment**

For testing and production instances, Oracle Application Express supports the ability to install just a runtime version of Oracle Application Express. This runtime environment minimizes the installed footprint and privileges and improves application security since in a runtime instance developers cannot inadvertently update a production application.

An Oracle Application Express runtime environment enables you to run production applications, but it does not provide a Web interface for administration. A runtime environment only includes the packages necessary to run your application, making it a more hardened environment. You administer the Oracle Application Express runtime environment using SQL\*Plus or SQL Developer and the APEX\_INSTANCE\_ADMIN API. 

## About Oracle Application Express Listener and Oracle HTTP Server with mod\_plsql

Oracle Application Express Listener communicates directly with the Oracle Application Express engine. Oracle HTTP Server uses the mod\_plsql plug-in to communicate with the Oracle Application Express engine within the Oracle database. Oracle Application Express Listener and the Oracle HTTP Server function as communication brokers between the Web server and the Oracle Application Express objects in the Oracle database. More specifically, they map browser requests into database stored procedure calls over a SQL\*Net connection. The following graphic illustrates the Oracle Application Express architecture using the Oracle Application Express Listener.

Note this three tier architecture consists of the following components:

- Web browser
- Oracle Application Express Listener or Oracle HTTP Server with mod\_plsql
- Oracle database containing Oracle Application Express

The major advantage of Oracle Application Express Listener or Oracle HTTP Server (Apache) with mod\_plsql is the separation of the mid-tier and the database tier. Note that this architecture is appropriate for Oracle Real Application Clusters (Oracle RAC) environments. See "Selecting a Web Listener in an Oracle RAC Environment" on page 1-4.

#### Where Images Are Stored When Using Oracle HTTP Server


In an Oracle HTTP Server or Oracle Application Server configuration, images are stored on the file system in the location referenced by the alias /i/. If you are upgrading Oracle Application Express from a prior release, you can locate the images directory on the file system, by reviewing the following files and searching for the text alias /i/:

- Oracle HTTP Server distributed with Oracle Database 11g release 1 and later see the dads.conf file.
- Oracle Application Server 10g—see the marvel.conf file.

Specific examples for locating the text alias /i/ can be found in "Downloading from Oracle Technology Network" on page 3-1.

## About the Embedded PL/SQL Gateway

Oracle XML DB Protocol Server with the embedded PL/SQL gateway installs with Oracle Database. It provides the Oracle database with a Web server and also the necessary infrastructure to create dynamic applications. The embedded PL/SQL gateway runs in the Oracle XML DB Protocol server in the Oracle database and includes the core features of mod\_plsql. The following graphic illustrates the Oracle Application Express architecture using the embedded PL/SQL gateway.



As shown in the previous graphic, the embedded PL/SQL gateway consists of a simple two tier architecture: a Web browser and an Oracle database containing the embedded PL/SQL gateway and Oracle Application Express.

Advantages of the embedded PL/SQL gateway include:

- Ease of configuration
- Included in the database
- No separate server installation

#### Security Considerations When Using the Embedded PL/SQL Gateway

The embedded PL/SQL gateway runs in the database as part of the XML DB HTTP Protocol Listener. Because the HTTP Listener runs in the same database where Oracle Application Express is installed, it is not possible to separate the HTTP listener from the database. For this reason, Oracle does not recommend the use of the embedded PL/SQL gateway for applications that run on the Internet.

### Where Images Are Stored When Using the Embedded PL/SQL Gateway

When running Oracle Application Express with the embedded PL/SQL gateway, images are stored directly in the database within the Oracle XML DB repository. You can access images by using the WebDAV feature of Oracle XML DB or by using FTP. To learn more, see "Accessing the Repository Using Protocols" in Oracle XML DB Developer's Guide.

### Selecting a Web Listener in an Oracle RAC Environment

When running Oracle Application Express in an Oracle Real Application Clusters (Oracle RAC) environment, Oracle recommends that you use Oracle Application Express Listener or Oracle HTTP Server with mod\_plsql. Oracle Application Express Listener or Oracle HTTP Server with mod\_plsql permit you to specify a connection in the service name format, so that one HTTP Server can access all nodes.

Oracle recommends that you do not select the embedded PL/SQL gateway option for Oracle RAC installations. The embedded PL/SQL gateway uses an HTTP Server built into the database instance, and because of this, it does not take advantage of the Oracle RAC shared architecture.

# Oracle Application Express Installation Requirements

This chapter describes the requirements for installing Oracle Application Express.

## Oracle Database Requirement

Oracle Application Express release 4.2 requires an Oracle database (Enterprise Edition, Standard Edition or Standard Edition One) that is Release 10.2.0.4 or higher. Oracle Application Express 4.2 can also be used with Oracle Database Express Edition 10g Release 2 and later. The Oracle HTTP Server is not included with the distribution of Oracle Database Express Edition.

Note: You can upgrade the version of Oracle Application Express in Oracle Database Express Edition 10g Release 2 (10.2) and later, by installing Oracle Application Express release 4.2. For more information, see the Oracle Application Express Learn More page on the Oracle Technology Network (OTN).

## Checking the shared\_pool\_size of the Target Database

**Note:** Ignore this requirement if your configuration defines specific memory target values for the database initialization parameters SGA\_ TARGET (in Oracle Database 10g and 11g) or MEMORY\_TARGET (in Oracle Database 11*g*).

Oracle Application Express requires the shared\_pool\_size of the target database to be at least 100 MB.

To check the shared\_pool\_size of the target database:

**1.** Start the database:

```
SOL> STARTUP
```

**2.** If necessary, enter the following command to determine whether the system uses an initialization parameter file (initsid.ora) or a server parameter file (spfiledbname.ora):

```
SQL> SHOW PARAMETER PFILE;
```

This command displays the name and location of the server parameter file or the initialization parameter file.

**3.** Determine the current values of the shared\_pool\_size parameter:

```
SQL> SHOW PARAMETER SHARED_POOL_SIZE
```

**4.** If the system is using a server parameter file, set the value of the SHARED\_POOL\_ SIZE initialization parameter to at least 100 MB:

```
SQL> ALTER SYSTEM SET SHARED_POOL_SIZE='100M' SCOPE=spfile;
```

- **5.** If the system uses an initialization parameter file, change the value of the SHARED\_POOL\_SIZE parameter to at least 100 MB in the initialization parameter file (initsid.ora).
- **6.** Shut down the database:

```
SOL> SHUTDOWN
```

**7.** Restart the database:

SOL> STARTUP

## **Browser Requirements**

To run or develop Oracle Application Express applications, Web browsers must have JavaScript enabled. The following browsers are required to develop applications in Oracle Application Express:

- Microsoft Internet Explorer 7.0 or later
- Mozilla Firefox 14 or later
- Google Chrome 21 or later
- Apple Safari 5.0 or later

Oracle Application Express applications can be developed that support earlier Web browser releases, including Microsoft Explorer 6.0. Application Express has a number of advanced widgets, such as date pickers, which may not work correctly on earlier browsers.

## Web Listener Requirements

In order to run Oracle Application Express you must have access to one of the following:

Oracle Application Express Listener

Oracle Application Express Listener is a Java-based Web server. It features file system caching, offers improved file upload capability, and is certified with Oracle WebLogic Server, Oracle Glassfish Server, and OC4J.

Embedded PL/SQL gateway

Oracle XML DB Protocol server with the embedded PL/SQL gateway installs with Oracle Database 11g Release 1. It provides the database with a Web server and the necessary infrastructure to create dynamic applications.

Oracle HTTP Server and mod\_plsql

Oracle HTTP Server uses the mod\_plsql plug-in to communicate with the Oracle Application Express engine within the Oracle database.

The following products include appropriate versions of HTTP Server and mod\_plsql:

- Oracle Database 10g Companion CD Release 2
- Oracle Database 11g Release 1 or 2

# **Disk Space Requirement**

Oracle Application Express disk space requirements are as follows:

- Free space for Oracle Application Express software files on the file system: 278 MB if using English only download (apex\_4.2\_en.zip) and 935 MB if using full download (apex\_4.2.zip).
- Free space in Oracle Application Express tablespace: 275 MB
- Free space in SYSTEM tablespace: 100 MB
- Free space in Oracle Application Express tablespace for each additional language (other than English) installed: 60 MB

# Oracle XML DB Requirement

Oracle XML DB must be installed in the Oracle database that you want to use. If you are using a preconfigured database created either during an installation or by Database Configuration Assistant (DBCA), Oracle XML DB is already installed and configured.

**Tip:** The installer does a prerequisite check for Oracle XML DB and will exit if it is not installed.

**Tip:** The installation of Oracle XML DB creates the user ANONYMOUS. In order for Oracle Application Express workspace provisioning to work properly, the ANONYMOUS user must not be dropped from the database.

### PL/SQL Web Toolkit

Oracle Application Express requires the PL/SQL Web Toolkit release 10.1.2.0.6 or later. For instructions on determining the current release of the PL/SQL Web Toolkit, and for instructions on installing release 10.1.2.0.6, please review the README. txt file contained in the directory apex/owa.

# **Downloading from Oracle Technology Network**

**Note:** Within the context of this document, the Apache Oracle home directory (ORACLE\_HTTPSERVER\_HOME) is the location where Oracle HTTP Server is installed.

### Recommended Pre-installation Tasks

Before installing Oracle Application Express, Oracle recommends that you complete the following steps:

- Review and satisfy all Oracle Application Express installation requirements. See "Oracle Application Express Installation Requirements" on page 2-1.
- Shut down with normal or immediate priority the Oracle Database instances where you plan to install Oracle Application Express. On Oracle Real Application Clusters (Oracle RAC) systems, shut down all instances on each node.

An alternative to shutting down the database is to prevent all users from accessing Oracle Application Express when upgrading your installation from a previous

release of Oracle Application Express. Oracle only recommends this option in high availability production environments where planned outages are not available. For all other scenarios, the database should be shut down.

To disable access to Oracle Application Express when the existing installation is using the Application Express Listener, shut down the appropriate application server where the Application Express listener is deployed.

To disable user access to Oracle Application Express when the existing installation is using the Oracle HTTP Server with mod\_plsql, you should either shut down the Web server or disable the Application Express Database Access Descriptor of the Web server.

For an existing installation using the embedded PL/SQL gateway, you should disable the Oracle XML DB Protocol Server by setting the HTTP port to 0. This can be accomplished by starting SQL\*Plus, connecting as SYS to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed, and running:

```
EXEC DBMS_XDB.SETHTTPPORT(0);
```

Once you have prevented access from Oracle Application Express users, you should log into SQL\*Plus as SYS, connecting to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed, and query V\$SESSION to ensure there are no long running sessions which would interfere with the upgrade process.

**3.** Back up the Oracle Database installation.

Oracle recommends that you create a backup of the current Oracle Database installation before you install Oracle Application Express. You can use Oracle Database Recovery Manager, which is included in the Oracle Database installation, to perform the backup.

**4.** Start the Oracle Database instance that contains the target database.

After backing up the system, you must start the Oracle instance that contains the target Oracle database. Do not start other processes such as a Web Listener. However, if you are performing a remote installation, make sure the database listener for the remote database has started.

### Install the Oracle Database and Complete Pre-installation Tasks

Oracle Application Express requires an Oracle database that is Release 10.2.0.4 and later or Oracle Database 10g Express Edition. To learn more, see the Oracle Database Installation Guide for your operating environment and "Recommended Pre-installation Tasks" on page 3-1.

## Download and Install Oracle Application Express

To install Oracle Application Express:

For installations where the development will be in English only, download the file apex\_4.2\_en.zip from the Oracle Application Express download page. Where the development will include languages other than English, download apex\_ 4.2.zip from the Oracle Application Express download page. See:

http://www.oracle.com/technetwork/developer-tools/apex/downloads/index.html

Note that the actual file name may differ if a more recent release has shipped since this document was published.

- Unzip downloaded zip file:
  - If English only, unzip apex\_4.2\_en.zip as follows, preserving directory names:
    - UNIX and Linux: \$ unzip apex\_4.2\_en.zip
    - Windows: Double click the file apex 4.2 en.zip in Windows Explorer
  - If multiple languages, unzip apex\_4.2.zip as follows, preserving directory names:
    - UNIX and Linux: \$ unzip apex\_4.2.zip
    - Windows: Double click the file apex 4.2.zip in Windows Explorer

**Note:** You should keep the directory tree where you unzip the files short and not under directories that contain spaces. For example, within Windows unzip to C:\TEMP.

- Change your working directory to apex.
- 4. Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role. For example:
  - On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

**5.** Select the appropriate installation option.

Full development environment provides complete access to the Application Builder environment to develop applications. A Runtime environment enables users to run applications that cannot be modified. To learn more, see "About the Oracle Application Express Runtime Environment" on page 1-2.

Available installation options include:

Full development environment. Run apexins. sql passing the following four arguments in the order shown:

```
@apexins.sql tablespace_apex tablespace_files tablespace_temp images
```

#### Where:

- tablespace\_apex is the name of the tablespace for the Oracle Application Express application user.
- tablespace\_files is the name of the tablespace for the Oracle Application Express files user.
- tablespace\_temp is the name of the temporary tablespace or tablespace
- *images* is the virtual directory for Oracle Application Express images. To support future Oracle Application Express upgrades, define the virtual image directory as /i/.

#### Example:

```
@apexins.sql SYSAUX SYSAUX TEMP /i/
```

**Note:** If you receive the following error, please exit SQL\*Plus and change your working directory to where you unzipped the installation file, for example C: \TEMP in Windows, before starting SQL\*Plus:

```
SP2-0310: unable to open file "apexins.sql"
```

Runtime environment. Run apxrtins.sql passing the following arguments in the order shown:

@apxrtins.sql tablespace\_apex tablespace\_files tablespace\_temp images

- tablespace apex is the name of the tablespace for the Oracle Application Express application user.
- tablespace\_files is the name of the tablespace for the Oracle Application Express files user.
- tablespace\_temp is the name of the temporary tablespace or tablespace group.
- images is the virtual directory for Oracle Application Express images. To support future Oracle Application Express upgrades, define the virtual image directory as /i/.

#### Example:

@apxrtins.sql SYSAUX SYSAUX TEMP /i/

**See Also:** *Oracle Database PL/SQL Language Reference* for more information about SQL\*Plus

When Oracle Application Express installs, it creates three new database accounts:

- APEX\_040200 The account that owns the Oracle Application Express schema and metadata.
- FLOWS\_FILES The account that owns the Oracle Application Express uploaded
- APEX\_PUBLIC\_USER The minimally privileged account is used for Oracle Application Express configuration with Oracle Application Express Listener or Oracle HTTP Server and mod\_plsql.

If you configured RESTful Web services, then these additional accounts will be created:

- APEX\_REST\_PUBLIC\_USER The account used when invoking RESTful Services definitions stored in Oracle Application Express.
- APEX\_LISTENER The account used to query RESTful Services definitions stored in Oracle Application Express.

If you are upgrading from a previous release, then FLOWS\_FILES already exists and APEX\_PUBLIC\_USER is created if it does not already exist.

**Tip:** Oracle Application Express must be installed from a writable directory on the file system. See "Reviewing a Log of an Installation Session" on page A-1.

# Change the Password for the ADMIN Account

In a new installation of Oracle Application Express, or if you are converting a runtime environment to a development environment, you must change the password of the ADMIN account. In an upgrade scenario, the password will be preserved and carried over from the prior release. If you are unsure of the password for the ADMIN account in an existing installation you can run the commands below to reset the password.

**Tip:** You use the ADMIN account to log in to Oracle Application Express Administration Services and manage an entire Oracle Application Express instance.

To change the password for the ADMIN account:

- 1. Change your working directory to the apex directory where you unzipped the installation software.
- 2. Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role. For example:
  - On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

**3.** Run apxchpwd.sql. For example:

```
@apxchpwd.sql
```

When prompted, enter a password for the ADMIN account.

#### **Restart Processes**

After you install Oracle Application Express, you must restart the processes that you stopped before you began the installation.

# Configure APEX\_PUBLIC\_USER Account

It is important to correctly configure the APEX\_PUBLIC\_USER account to enable proper operation of Oracle Application Express.

#### Unlocking the APEX\_PUBLIC\_USER Account

The APEX\_PUBLIC\_USER account is locked at the end of a new installation of Oracle Application Express. You must unlock this account before configuring the database access descriptor (DAD) in a new installation.

**Tip:** If you are upgrading from a prior release of Oracle Application Express, this step is unnecessary.

To unlock the APEX PUBLIC USER account:

- 1. Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role. For example:
  - On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
```

Enter password: SYS\_password

#### On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

#### **2.** Run the following statement:

ALTER USER APEX\_PUBLIC\_USER ACCOUNT UNLOCK

### Changing the Password for the APEX\_PUBLIC\_USER Account

The APEX PUBLIC USER account is created with a random password in a new installation of Oracle Application Express. You must change the password for this account before configuring the database access descriptor (DAD) in a new installation.

**Tip:** If you are upgrading from a prior release of Oracle Application Express, this step is unnecessary.

To change the password for the APEX\_PUBLIC\_USER account:

- Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role. For example:
  - On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

**2.** Run the following statement:

```
ALTER USER APEX_PUBLIC_USER IDENTIFIED BY new_password
```

Where new\_password is the new password you are setting for APEX\_PUBLIC\_ USER. You will use this password when creating the DAD in the sections that follow.

About Password Expiration in Oracle Database 11g In the default profile in Oracle Database 11g, the parameter PASSWORD\_LIFE\_TIME is set to 180. If you are using Oracle Database 11g with Oracle Application Express, this causes the password for APEX\_ PUBLIC\_USER to expire in 180 days. As a result, your Oracle Application Express instance will become unusable until you change the password.

To prevent this behavior, create another profile in which the PASSWORD\_LIFE\_TIME parameter is set to unlimited and alter the APEX\_PUBLIC\_USER account and assign it to the new profile.

### Download and Install Oracle Application Express Listener

To download the Oracle Application Express Listener:

Download the latest release of the Oracle Application Express Listener, apex\_ listener.version.number.zip, from the Oracle Application Express download page. See:

http://www.oracle.com/technetwork/developer-tools/apex-listener/downloads/index.html

Note that the version.number in the file name reflects the current release

- **2.** Unzip the downloaded zip file into a directory (or folder) of your choice:
  - UNIX and Linux: unzip apex\_listener.version.number.zip
  - Windows: Double-click the file apex\_listener.version.number.zip in Windows Explorer
- Locate the installation guide for Oracle Application Express Listener and follow instructions to complete installation and configuration steps.

#### Disabling Oracle XML DB Protocol Server

If you were previously using the embedded PL/SQL Gateway and now wish to use Oracle Application Express Listener, you need to disable the Oracle XML DB Protocol server.

To disable Oracle XML DB Protocol server:

- Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role. For example:
  - On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

**2.** Run the following command:

```
EXEC DBMS XDB.SETHTTPPORT(0);
```

# Configure RESTful Services

In a new installation of Oracle Application Express, you configure RESTful Services by running the configuration script apex\_rest\_config.sql. This step is optional and only needs to be completed if you wish to use RESTful Services with the Oracle Application Express Listener on the instance. Once configured, the instance administrator can control the availability of the feature. If the instance administrator has disabled RESTful Services for this Application Express instance, RESTful Services are not available for this instance and the RESTful Services icon does not display. See "Configuring SQL Workshop" in *Oracle Application Express Administration Guide*.

**Note:** RESTful Services requires Oracle Application Express Listener 2.0 or later.

To configure RESTful Services in Oracle Application Express:

- 1. Change your working directory to the apex directory where you unzipped the installation software.
- 2. Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role. For example:
  - On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

**3.** Run apex\_rest\_config.sql. For example:

```
@apex_rest_config.sql
```

When Prompted, enter a password for the APEX\_LISTENER and APEX\_REST\_ PUBLIC\_USER accounts.

When configuring RESTful Services in Oracle Application Express, it creates two new database accounts.

- APEX\_LISTENER The account used to query RESTful Services definitions stored in Oracle Application Express.
- APEX\_REST\_PUBLIC\_USER The account used when calling RESTful Services definitions stored in Oracle Application Express.

## Enable Network Services in Oracle Database 11g

By default, the ability to interact with network services is disabled in Oracle Database 11g Release 1 or 2. Therefore, if you are running Oracle Application Express with Oracle Database 11g Release 1 or 2, you must use the new DBMS\_NETWORK\_ACL\_ ADMIN package to grant connect privileges to any host for the APEX\_040200 database user. Failing to grant these privileges results in issues with:

- Sending outbound mail in Oracle Application Express.
  - Users can call methods from the APEX\_MAIL package, but issues arise when sending outbound email.
- Using Web services in Oracle Application Express.
- PDF report printing.

**Tip:** To run the examples described in this section, the compatible initialization parameter of the database must be set to at least 11.1.0.0.0. By default a 11g database will already have the parameter set properly, but a database upgraded to 11g from a prior version may not. See "Creating and Configuring an Oracle Database" in Oracle Database Administrator's Guide for information about changing database initialization parameters.

### **Granting Connect Privileges**

The following example demonstrates how to grant connect privileges to any host for the APEX\_040200 database user. This example assumes you connected to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role.

```
DECLARE
  ACL_PATH VARCHAR2 (4000);
BEGIN
  -- Look for the ACL currently assigned to '*' and give APEX_040200
  -- the "connect" privilege if APEX_040200 does not have the privilege yet.
  SELECT ACL INTO ACL PATH FROM DBA NETWORK ACLS
  WHERE HOST = '*' AND LOWER_PORT IS NULL AND UPPER_PORT IS NULL;
  IF DBMS_NETWORK_ACL_ADMIN.CHECK_PRIVILEGE(ACL_PATH, 'APEX_040200',
     'connect') IS NULL THEN
     DBMS_NETWORK_ACL_ADMIN.ADD_PRIVILEGE(ACL_PATH,
     'APEX_040200', TRUE, 'connect');
  END IF;
EXCEPTION
  -- When no ACL has been assigned to '*'.
 WHEN NO_DATA_FOUND THEN
 DBMS_NETWORK_ACL_ADMIN.CREATE_ACL('power_users.xml',
    'ACL that lets power users to connect to everywhere',
    'APEX_040200', TRUE, 'connect');
  DBMS_NETWORK_ACL_ADMIN.ASSIGN_ACL('power_users.xml','*');
END;
/
COMMIT:
```

The following example demonstrates how to provide less privileged access to local network resources. This example is used to enable access to servers on the local host only, such as email and report servers.

```
DECLARE
 ACL_PATH VARCHAR2(4000);
BEGIN
  -- Look for the ACL currently assigned to 'localhost' and give APEX_040200
  -- the "connect" privilege if APEX_040200 does not have the privilege yet.
  SELECT ACL INTO ACL PATH FROM DBA NETWORK ACLS
  WHERE HOST = 'localhost' AND LOWER_PORT IS NULL AND UPPER_PORT IS NULL;
  IF DBMS_NETWORK_ACL_ADMIN.CHECK_PRIVILEGE(ACL_PATH, 'APEX_040200',
     'connect') IS NULL THEN
     DBMS_NETWORK_ACL_ADMIN.ADD_PRIVILEGE(ACL_PATH,
     'APEX_040200', TRUE, 'connect');
  END IF;
EXCEPTION
  -- When no ACL has been assigned to 'localhost'.
```

```
WHEN NO_DATA_FOUND THEN
 DBMS_NETWORK_ACL_ADMIN.CREATE_ACL('local-access-users.xml',
    'ACL that lets users to connect to localhost',
    'APEX_040200', TRUE, 'connect');
 DBMS_NETWORK_ACL_ADMIN.ASSIGN_ACL('local-access-users.xml', 'localhost');
END;
COMMIT;
```

### Troubleshooting an Invalid ACL Error

If you receive an ORA-44416: Invalid ACL error after running the previous script, use the following query to identify the invalid ACL:

```
REM Show the dangling references to dropped users in the ACL that is assigned
REM to '*'.
SELECT ACL, PRINCIPAL
 FROM DBA_NETWORK_ACLS NACL, XDS_ACE ACE
WHERE HOST = '*' AND LOWER_PORT IS NULL AND UPPER_PORT IS NULL AND
      NACL.ACLID = ACE.ACLID AND
      NOT EXISTS (SELECT NULL FROM ALL_USERS WHERE USERNAME = PRINCIPAL);
```

#### Next, run the following code to fix the ACL:

```
DECLARE
 ACL_ID RAW(16);
 CNT
          NUMBER;
BEGIN
 -- Look for the object ID of the ACL currently assigned to '*'
 SELECT ACLID INTO ACL_ID FROM DBA_NETWORK_ACLS
  WHERE HOST = '*' AND LOWER_PORT IS NULL AND UPPER_PORT IS NULL;
 -- If just some users referenced in the ACL are invalid, remove just those
  -- users in the ACL. Otherwise, drop the ACL completely.
 SELECT COUNT(PRINCIPAL) INTO CNT FROM XDS_ACE
  WHERE ACLID = ACL_ID AND
        EXISTS (SELECT NULL FROM ALL_USERS WHERE USERNAME = PRINCIPAL);
 IF (CNT > 0) THEN
   FOR R IN (SELECT PRINCIPAL FROM XDS_ACE
               WHERE ACLID = ACL_ID AND
                   NOT EXISTS (SELECT NULL FROM ALL_USERS
                                 WHERE USERNAME = PRINCIPAL)) LOOP
     UPDATE XDB.XDB$ACL
        SET OBJECT_VALUE =
              DELETEXML (OBJECT_VALUE,
                        '/ACL/ACE[PRINCIPAL="'||R.PRINCIPAL||'"]')
      WHERE OBJECT_ID = ACL_ID;
   END LOOP;
 ELSE
   DELETE FROM XDB.XDB$ACL WHERE OBJECT_ID = ACL_ID;
 END IF;
END;
REM commit the changes.
```

COMMIT:

Once the ACL has been fixed, you must run the first script in this section to apply the ACL to the APEX\_040200 user. See "Granting Connect Privileges" on page 3-44.

### Security Considerations

Oracle highly recommends you configure and use Secure Sockets Layer (SSL) to ensure that passwords and other sensitive data are not transmitted in clear text in HTTP requests. Without the use of SSL, passwords could potentially be exposed, compromising security.

SSL is an industry standard protocol that uses RSA public key cryptography in conjunction with symmetric key cryptography to provide authentication, encryption, and data integrity.

### About Managing JOB\_QUEUE\_PROCESSES

JOB\_QUEUE\_PROCESSES determine the maximum number of concurrently running jobs. In Oracle Application Express Release 4.2, transactional support and SQL scripts require jobs. If JOB\_QUEUE\_PROCESSES is not enabled and working properly, you cannot successfully execute a script.

Viewing JOB\_QUEUE\_PROCESSES in Oracle Application Express You can also view the number of JOB\_QUEUE\_PROCESSES on the About Application Express page.

To view the About Application Express page:

- Log in to Oracle Application Express. See "Logging in to Your Workspace" on page 3-52.
- **2.** On the Administration list, click **About Application Express**.

The current number JOB\_QUEUE\_PROCESSES displays at the bottom of the page.

Viewing JOB\_QUEUE\_PROCESSES from SQL\*Plus You can also view the number of JOB\_ QUEUE\_PROCESSES from SQL\*Plus by running the following SQL statement:

SELECT VALUE FROM v\$parameter WHERE NAME = 'job\_queue\_processes'

### Changing the Number of JOB\_QUEUE\_PROCESSES

You can change the number of JOB\_QUEUE\_PROCESSES by running a SQL statement in SQL\*Plus:

To update the number of JOB\_QUEUE\_PROCESSES:

- 1. Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role:
  - On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SOL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

**2.** In SQL\*Plus run the following SQL statement:

```
ALTER SYSTEM SET JOB_QUEUE_PROCESSES = <number>
```

For example, running the statement ALTER SYSTEM SET JOB\_QUEUE\_ PROCESSES = 20 sets JOB\_QUEUE\_PROCESSES to 20.

### About Developing Oracle Application Express in Other Languages

The Oracle Application Express interface is translated into German, Spanish, French, Italian, Japanese, Korean, Brazilian Portuguese, Simplified Chinese, and Traditional Chinese. A single instance of Oracle Application Express can be installed with one or more of these translated versions. Developers can choose to run the Application Express development environment in any of the installed languages by simply selecting the language from the Application Builder log in screen or home page.

In order to install other languages you must use the apex\_4.2.zip file which contains the extra files referenced below. If you previously downloaded apex\_4.2\_ en.zip, then you do not need to re-install Oracle Application Express. Simply download apex\_4.2.zip and unzip the file into the same directory where you unzipped apex\_4.2\_en.zip.

The translated version of Oracle Application Express should be loaded into a database that has a character set that supports the specific language. If you attempt to install a translated version of Oracle Application Express into a database that does not support the character encoding of the language, the installation may fail or the translated Oracle Application Express instance may appear corrupt when run. The database character set AL32UTF8 supports all the translated versions of Oracle Application Express.

You can manually install translated versions of Oracle Application Express using SQL\*Plus. The installation files are encoded in AL32UTF8.

**Note:** Regardless of the target database character set, to install a translated version of Oracle Application Express, you must set the character set value of the NLS\_LANG environment variable to AL32UTF8 before starting SQL\*Plus.

The following examples illustrate valid NLS\_LANG settings for loading Oracle Application Express translations:

American\_America.AL32UTF8 Japanese\_Japan.AL32UTF8

#### Installing a Translated Version of Oracle Application Express

Whether you are installing for the first time or upgrading from a previous release, you must run the load\_lang.sql script to run a translated version of Oracle Application Express.

The installation scripts are located in subdirectories identified by a language code in the unzipped distribution apex/builder. For example, the German version is located in apex/builder/de and the Japanese version is located in apex/builder/ja. Within each directory, there is a language loading script identified by the language code (for example, load\_de.sql or load\_ja.sql).

To install a translated version of Oracle Application Express:

- 1. Set the NLS\_LANG environment variable, making sure that the character set is AL32UTF8. For example:
  - Bourne or Korn shell:

```
NLS_LANG=American_America.AL32UTF8
export NLS_LANG
```

C shell:

setenv NLS\_LANG American\_America.AL32UTF8

For Windows based systems:

```
set NLS_LANG=American_America.AL32UTF8
```

- 2. Navigate to the directory under apex/builder based on the language you need to install. For example for German, navigate to apex/builder/de. Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role. For example:
  - On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SOL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

**3.** Execute the following statement:

```
ALTER SESSION SET CURRENT_SCHEMA = APEX_040200;
```

Execute the appropriate language specific script. For example:

@load\_lang.sql

Where lang is the specific language (for example, load\_de.sql for German or load\_ja.sql for Japanese).

## Create a Workspace and Add Oracle Application Express Users

You access the Oracle Application Express home page by logging in to a workspace using a Web browser. Your Web browser must have JavaScript enabled. See "Browser Requirements" on page 2-2.

A workspace is a virtual private database allowing multiple users to work within the same Oracle Application Express installation while keeping their objects, data and applications private. Each workspace has a unique ID and name.

An instance administrator can create a workspace manually within Oracle Application Express Administration Services or have users submit requests. Oracle Application Express Administration Services is a separate application for managing an entire Oracle Application Express instance. See "Creating Workspaces" and "Managing Workspace Requests" in *Oracle Application Express Administration Guide*.

#### Creating a Workspace Manually

To create an Oracle Application Express workspace manually:

- Log in to Oracle Application Express Administration Services. Oracle Application Express Administration Services is a separate application for managing an entire Oracle Application Express instance. You log in using the ADMIN account and password created or reset during the installation process.
  - In a Web browser, navigate to the Oracle Application Express Administration Services application.

Because your setup uses Oracle Application Express Listener, go to:

http://hostname:port/apex/apex\_admin

## Where:

hostname is the name of the system where Oracle Application Express Listener is installed.

port is the port number assigned when configuring the Oracle Application Express Listener. In a default installation, this number is 8080. To learn more, see Oracle Application Express Listener Installation and Developer Guide.

apex is the service name defined when configuring the Oracle Application Express Listener.

- **b.** On the Login page:
  - In Username, enter admin.
  - In Password, enter the Oracle Application Express administrator account password you specified in "Change the Password for the ADMIN Account" on page 3-5.
  - Click Login to Administration.

Note that, depending on your setup, you might be required to change your password when you log in for the first time.

Next, create a workspace.

- Click Manage Workspaces.
- Under Workspace Actions, click **Create Workspace**.

The Create Workspace Wizard appears.

- **4.** For Identify Workspace, enter the following:
  - **a.** Workspace Name Enter a unique workspace name.
  - **b.** Workspace ID Leave Workspace ID blank to have the new Workspace ID automatically generated. A Workspace ID must be a positive integer greater than 100000.
  - **c.** Workspace Description Enter a workspace description.
  - d. Click Next.
- For Identify Schema, specify whether you are re-using an existing schema or creating a new one.

If you are using an existing schema:

- For Re-use existing schema, select **Yes**.
- **b.** Select a schema from the list.
- c. Click Next.

If you are creating a new schema:

- **a.** For Re-use existing schema, select **No**.
- Enter a schema name and password.
- Specify a space quota.
- d. Click Next.
- For Identify Administrator, enter the Workspace administrator information and click **Next**.
- **7.** Confirm your selections and click **Create Workspace**.

## **Creating Oracle Application Express Users**

To create an Oracle Application Express user account:

- 1. Log in to Oracle Application Express Administration Services as described in the previous section. See "Logging in to Oracle Application Express Administration Services" in Oracle Application Express Administration Guide.
- **2.** Click the **Manage Workspaces** icon.

The Administration page appears.

- 3. Click Manage Developers and Users.
- **4.** Click **Create User**.

The Create User page appears.

- **5.** Under User Attributes, enter:
  - **a. Username** Enter the username used to log in to the system. Restrictions include:
    - Maximum length of 100 characters
    - No spaces
    - Only these special characters are permitted: ampersand (@) and period (.)
  - **Email Address** Enter the valid email address for this user.
  - **First Name** Enter the first or given name to further identify the user.
  - **Last Name** Enter the last or family name to further identify the user.
  - **Description** Enter comments about this user.
  - **Default Date Format** Enter the default Oracle date format for the user. This controls the default date format within SQL Workshop.
- **6.** Under Account Privileges:
  - **a. Workspace** Select a workspace from the list.
  - **Default Schemas** Specify the default schema used for data browsing, application creation, and SQL script execution.

When using workspaces that have more than one schema available, this schema is the default. This setting does not control security, only the user's preference.

**c.** User is a workspace administrator - Specify if this user should have workspace administrator privileges.

Administrators are given access to all components. Additionally, they can manage user accounts, groups, and development services. Components may not be available if they are switched off by Instance Administrators.

**d. User is a developer** - Specify if this user should have developer privileges.

Developers must have access to either Application Builder, SQL Workshop, or both. These components may not be available if they are switched off by the Instance Administrator.

- **Application Builder Access** Determines whether a developer has access to the Application Builder.
- **SQL Workshop Access** Determines whether a developer has access to the SQL Workshop.
- **Team Development Access -** Determines whether a developer has access to the Team Development.

h. Set Account Availability - Select Locked to prevent the account from being used. Select **Unlocked** to allow the account to be used.

If the user has exceeded the maximum login failures allowed, specified in Workspace Preferences, then their account will be locked automatically.

#### **7.** Under Password:

- **Password** Enter a case sensitive password.
- **Confirm Password -** Enter the password again.
- Require Change of Password On First Use Select No to allow the user to use the same password until it expires. Select Yes to require the user to change the password immediately when logging in the first time.
- 8. Click Create User or Create and Create Another.

### Logging in to Your Workspace

Once you create a workspace, you must log in to it using your login credentials (that is, the workspace name, user name, and password).

- apex is the service name defined when configuring the Oracle Application Express Listener.

The Login page appears.

- **2.** Under Login, enter the following:
  - Workspace field Enter the name of your workspace.
  - Username field Enter your user name.
  - Password field Enter your case-sensitive password.
- Click **Login**.

Note that, depending on your setup, you might be required to change your password when you log in for the first time.

## Install the Oracle Database and Complete Pre-installation Tasks

Oracle Application Express requires an Oracle database that is Release 10.2.0.4 or later or Oracle Database 10g Express Edition. To learn more, see the Oracle Database Installation Guide for your operating environment and "Recommended Pre-installation Tasks" on page 3-1.

## Download and Install Oracle Application Express

To install Oracle Application Express:

1. For installations where the development will be in English only, download the file apex\_4.2\_en.zip from the Oracle Application Express download page. Where the development will include languages other than English, download apex\_ 4.2.zip from the Oracle Application Express download page. See:

http://www.oracle.com/technetwork/developer-tools/apex/downloads/index.html

Note that the actual file name may differ if a more recent release has shipped since this document was published.

- 2. Unzip downloaded zip file:
  - If English only, unzip apex\_4.2\_en.zip as follows, preserving directory
    - UNIX and Linux: \$unzip apex 4.2 en.zip
    - Windows: Double click the file apex\_4.2\_en.zip in Windows Explorer
  - If multiple languages, unzip apex\_4.2.zip as follows, preserving directory names:
    - UNIX and Linux: \$unzip apex\_4.2.zip
    - Windows: Double click the file apex\_4.2.zip in Windows Explorer

**Note:** You should keep the directory tree where you unzip the files short and not under directories that contain spaces. For example, within Windows unzip to C:\TEMP.

- **3.** Change your working directory to apex.
- 4. Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role. For example:
  - On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

- Disable any existing password complexity rules for the default profile. See "Configuring Password Protection" in *Oracle Database Security Guide*.
- **6.** Select the appropriate installation option.

Full development environment provides complete access to the Application Builder environment to develop applications. A Runtime environment enables users to run applications that cannot be modified. To learn more, see "About the Oracle Application Express Runtime Environment" on page 1-2.

Available installation options include:

Full development environment. Run apexins.sql passing the following four arguments in the order shown:

```
@apexins.sql tablespace_apex tablespace_files tablespace_temp images
```

## Where:

- tablespace\_apex is the name of the tablespace for the Oracle Application Express application user.
- tablespace\_files is the name of the tablespace for the Oracle Application Express files user.
- tablespace\_temp is the name of the temporary tablespace or tablespace group.
- images is the virtual directory for Oracle Application Express images. To support future Oracle Application Express upgrades, define the virtual image directory as /i/.

#### Example:

```
@apexins.sql SYSAUX SYSAUX TEMP /i/
```

**Note:** If you receive the following error, please exit SQL\*Plus and change your working directory to apex:

```
SP2-0310: unable to open file "apexins.sql"
```

Runtime environment. Run apxrtins.sql passing the following arguments in the order shown:

@apxrtins.sql tablespace\_apex tablespace\_files tablespace\_temp images

#### Where:

- tablespace\_apex is the name of the tablespace for the Oracle Application Express application user.
- tablespace\_files is the name of the tablespace for the Oracle Application Express files user.
- tablespace\_temp is the name of the temporary tablespace or tablespace group.
- *images* is the virtual directory for Oracle Application Express images. To support future Oracle Application Express upgrades, define the virtual image directory as /i/.

#### Example:

@apxrtins.sql SYSAUX SYSAUX TEMP /i/

When Oracle Application Express installs, it creates three new database accounts:

- APEX\_040200 The account that owns the Oracle Application Express schema and metadata.
- FLOWS\_FILES The account that owns the Oracle Application Express uploaded
- APEX\_PUBLIC\_USER The minimally privileged account used for Oracle Application Express configuration with Oracle Application Express Listener or Oracle HTTP Server and mod\_plsql. 'This account is created to enable a later switch to a different HTTP server.

If you are upgrading from a previous release, then FLOWS\_FILES already exists and APEX\_PUBLIC\_USER is created if it does not already exist.

**Tip:** Oracle Application Express must be installed from a writable directory on the file system. See "Reviewing a Log of an Installation Session" on page A-1.

# Change the Password for the ADMIN Account

In a new installation of Oracle Application Express, or if you are converting a runtime environment to a development environment, you must change the password of the internal ADMIN account. In an upgrade scenario, the password will be preserved and carried over from the prior release.

**Tip:** You use the ADMIN account to log in to Oracle Application Express Administration Services and manage an entire Oracle Application Express instance.

To change the password for the ADMIN account:

- 1. Change your working directory to the apex directory where you unzipped the installation software.
- 2. Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role. For example:

#### On Windows:

SYSTEM\_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA Enter password: SYS\_password

#### On UNIX and Linux:

\$ sqlplus /nolog SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA Enter password: SYS\_password

#### **3.** Run apxchpwd.sql. For example:

@apxchpwd.sql

When prompted, enter a password for the ADMIN account.

## Configure the Embedded PL/SQL Gateway

The embedded PL/SQL gateway installs with the Oracle Database 11g. However, you must configure it before you can use it with Oracle Application Express. To accomplish this, you run a configuration script and unlock the ANONYMOUS account.

**Note:** The Oracle XML DB Protocol Server with the embedded PL/SQL gateway is not supported before Oracle Database 11g.

### Running the apex\_epg\_config.sql Configuration Script

In a new installation, you configure the embedded PL/SQL gateway by running the configuration script apex\_epg\_config.sql. Then, you unlock the ANONYMOUS account.

**Note:** If you are upgrading and have previously configured the embedded PL/SQL gateway, skip this section and go to "Updating the Images Directory When Upgrading from a Previous Release" on page 3-23.

To run the apex\_epg\_config.sql configuration script:

- Change your working directory to the apex directory where you unzipped the Oracle Application Express software.
- Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role. For example:

On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

- 3. Run apex\_epg\_config.sql passing the file system path to the base directory where the Oracle Application Express software was unzipped as shown in the following example:
  - On Windows:

```
@apex_epg_config.sql SYSTEM_DRIVE:\TEMP
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
@apex_epg_config.sql /tmp
```

Enter the following statement to unlock the ANONYMOUS account:

```
ALTER USER ANONYMOUS ACCOUNT UNLOCK:
```

## Updating the Images Directory When Upgrading from a Previous Release

If you are upgrading Oracle Application Express from a previous release, you must run the apxldimg.sql script to update the images directory.

**Tip:** If you are not upgrading from a prior release of Oracle Application Express, this step is unnecessary. The images will be loaded by running apex\_epg\_config.sql as described in the prior section.

To run the apxldimg.sql script:

- Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role:
  - On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

- 2. Run apxldimg.sql passing the file system path to the base directory where the Oracle Application Express software was unzipped as shown in the following example:
  - On Windows:

```
@apxldimg.sql SYSTEM_DRIVE:\TEMP
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
@apxldimg.sql /tmp
```

**Tip:** The above examples assume that you unzipped Oracle Application Express in a directory called TEMP on Windows and tmp on UNIX or Linux.

## **Verifying the Oracle XML DB Protocol Server Port**

The embedded PL/SQL gateway runs in the Oracle XML DB Protocol Server in the Oracle database. You can determine if the Oracle XML DB Protocol Server is enabled by verifying the associated port number.

To verify the port number where the Oracle XML DB Protocol Server is running:

- Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role:
  - On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

**2.** Enter the following statement to verify the port number:

```
SELECT DBMS_XDB.GETHTTPPORT FROM DUAL;
```

If the port number returns 0, the Oracle XML DB Protocol Server is disabled.

**3.** To enable it, follow the instructions in "Enabling Oracle XML DB Protocol Server" on page 3-24.

#### Enabling Oracle XML DB Protocol Server

The embedded PL/SQL gateway runs in the Oracle XML DB Protocol Server in the Oracle database.

To enable Oracle XML DB Protocol Server:

- Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role. For example:
  - On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SOL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

**2.** Enter a statement similar to the following:

```
EXEC DBMS_XDB.SETHTTPPORT(port);
For example:
EXEC DBMS_XDB.SETHTTPPORT(8080);
```

**Note:** Port numbers less than 1024 are reserved for use by privileged processes on many operating systems. To enable the XML DB HTTP listener on a port less than 1024, such as 80, review the following documentation:

- "Accessing the Repository Using Protocols" in *Oracle XML DB* Developer's Guide.
- "Protocol Address Configuration" and "Port Number Limitations" in Oracle Database Net Services Reference.

## Enable Network Services in Oracle Database 11*g*

By default, the ability to interact with network services is disabled in Oracle Database 11g Release 1 or 2. Therefore, if you are running Oracle Application Express with Oracle Database 11g Release 1 or 2, you must use the new DBMS\_NETWORK\_ACL\_ ADMIN package to grant connect privileges to any host for the APEX\_040200 database user. Failing to grant these privileges results in issues with:

- Sending outbound mail in Oracle Application Express. Users can call methods from the APEX\_MAIL package, but issues arise when sending outbound email.
- Using Web services in Oracle Application Express.
- PDF/report printing.

**Tip:** To run the examples described in this section, the compatible initialization parameter of the database must be set to at least 11.1.0.0.0. By default an 11g database will already have the parameter set properly, but a database upgraded to 11g from a prior version may not. See "Creating and Configuring an Oracle Database" in Oracle Database Administrator's Guide for information about changing database initialization parameters.

#### **Granting Connect Privileges**

The following example demonstrates how to grant connect privileges to any host for the APEX\_040200 database user. This example assumes you connected to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role.

```
DECLARE
 ACL_PATH VARCHAR2 (4000);
BEGIN
  -- Look for the ACL currently assigned to '*' and give APEX_040200
 -- the "connect" privilege if APEX_040200 does not have the privilege yet.
 SELECT ACL INTO ACL_PATH FROM DBA_NETWORK_ACLS
```

```
WHERE HOST = '*' AND LOWER_PORT IS NULL AND UPPER_PORT IS NULL;
  IF DBMS_NETWORK_ACL_ADMIN.CHECK_PRIVILEGE(ACL_PATH, 'APEX_040200',
     'connect') IS NULL THEN
     DBMS_NETWORK_ACL_ADMIN.ADD_PRIVILEGE(ACL_PATH,
     'APEX 040200', TRUE, 'connect');
 END IF:
EXCEPTION
  -- When no ACL has been assigned to '*'.
 WHEN NO_DATA_FOUND THEN
 DBMS NETWORK ACL ADMIN.CREATE ACL('power users.xml',
    'ACL that lets power users to connect to everywhere',
    'APEX_040200', TRUE, 'connect');
 DBMS_NETWORK_ACL_ADMIN.ASSIGN_ACL('power_users.xml','*');
END;
COMMIT;
```

The following example demonstrates how to provide less privileged access to local network resources. This example would enable indexing the Oracle Application Express Online Help and could possibly enable email and PDF printing if those servers were also on the local host.

```
DECLARE
 ACL PATH VARCHAR2 (4000);
BEGIN
  -- Look for the ACL currently assigned to 'localhost' and give APEX_040200
  -- the "connect" privilege if APEX_040200 does not have the privilege yet.
  SELECT ACL INTO ACL_PATH FROM DBA_NETWORK_ACLS
  WHERE HOST = 'localhost' AND LOWER_PORT IS NULL AND UPPER_PORT IS NULL;
  IF DBMS NETWORK ACL ADMIN.CHECK PRIVILEGE (ACL PATH, 'APEX 040200',
     'connect') IS NULL THEN
     DBMS_NETWORK_ACL_ADMIN.ADD_PRIVILEGE(ACL_PATH,
     'APEX_040200', TRUE, 'connect');
 END IF;
EXCEPTION
  -- When no ACL has been assigned to 'localhost'.
 WHEN NO DATA FOUND THEN
 DBMS_NETWORK_ACL_ADMIN.CREATE_ACL('local-access-users.xml',
    'ACL that lets users to connect to localhost',
    'APEX_040200', TRUE, 'connect');
 DBMS NETWORK ACL ADMIN.ASSIGN ACL('local-access-users.xml', 'localhost');
END:
COMMIT;
```

#### Troubleshooting an Invalid ACL Error

If you receive an ORA-44416: Invalid ACL error after running the previous script, use the following query to identify the invalid ACL:

```
REM Show the dangling references to dropped users in the ACL that is assigned
REM to '*'.
SELECT ACL, PRINCIPAL
 FROM DBA_NETWORK_ACLS NACL, XDS_ACE ACE
WHERE HOST = '*' AND LOWER_PORT IS NULL AND UPPER_PORT IS NULL AND
      NACL.ACLID = ACE.ACLID AND
       NOT EXISTS (SELECT NULL FROM ALL_USERS WHERE USERNAME = PRINCIPAL);
```

Next, run the following code to fix the ACL:

```
DECLARE
 ACL_ID RAW(16);
 CNT NUMBER;
BEGIN
 -- Look for the object ID of the ACL currently assigned to '*'
 SELECT ACLID INTO ACL_ID FROM DBA_NETWORK_ACLS
  WHERE HOST = '*' AND LOWER_PORT IS NULL AND UPPER_PORT IS NULL;
 -- If just some users referenced in the ACL are invalid, remove just those
 -- users in the ACL. Otherwise, drop the ACL completely.
 SELECT COUNT(PRINCIPAL) INTO CNT FROM XDS_ACE
  WHERE ACLID = ACL_ID AND
        EXISTS (SELECT NULL FROM ALL_USERS WHERE USERNAME = PRINCIPAL);
 IF (CNT > 0) THEN
   FOR R IN (SELECT PRINCIPAL FROM XDS_ACE
              WHERE ACLID = ACL_ID AND
                   NOT EXISTS (SELECT NULL FROM ALL USERS
                          WHERE USERNAME = PRINCIPAL)) LOOP
     UPDATE XDB.XDB$ACL
        SET OBJECT_VALUE =
            DELETEXML (OBJECT_VALUE,
                       '/ACL/ACE[PRINCIPAL="'||R.PRINCIPAL||'"]')
      WHERE OBJECT ID = ACL ID;
   END LOOP;
 ELSE
   DELETE FROM XDB.XDB$ACL WHERE OBJECT_ID = ACL_ID;
 END IF;
END:
REM commit the changes.
COMMIT;
```

Once the ACL has been fixed, you must run the first script in this section to apply the ACL to the APEX\_040200 user. See "Granting Connect Privileges" on page 3-25.

# Security Considerations

Oracle highly recommends you configure and use Secure Sockets Layer (SSL) to ensure that passwords and other sensitive data are not transmitted in clear text in HTTP requests. Without the use of SSL, passwords could potentially be exposed, compromising security.

SSL is an industry standard protocol that uses RSA public key cryptography in conjunction with symmetric key cryptography to provide authentication, encryption, and data integrity.

## About Managing JOB\_QUEUE\_PROCESSES

JOB\_QUEUE\_PROCESSES determine the maximum number of concurrently running jobs. In Oracle Application Express Release 4.2, transactional support and SQL scripts require jobs. If JOB\_QUEUE\_PROCESSES is not enabled and working properly, you cannot successfully execute a script.

Viewing JOB\_QUEUE\_PROCESSES in Oracle Application Express You can also view the number of JOB\_QUEUE\_PROCESSES on the About Application Express page.

To view the About Application Express page:

- Log in to Oracle Application Express. See "Logging in to Your Workspace" on page 3-52.
- Click the **Administration** icon.
- From the Tasks list, click **About Application Express**.

The current number JOB\_QUEUE\_PROCESSES displays at the bottom of the page.

Viewing JOB\_QUEUE\_PROCESSES from SQL\*Plus You can also view the number of JOB\_ QUEUE\_PROCESSES from SQL\*Plus by running the following SQL statement:

```
SELECT VALUE FROM v$parameter WHERE NAME = 'job_queue_processes'
```

### Changing the Number of JOB QUEUE PROCESSES

You can change the number of JOB\_QUEUE\_PROCESSES by running a SQL statement in SQL\*Plus:

To update the number of JOB\_QUEUE\_PROCESSES:

- Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role:
  - On Windows:

```
SYSTEM DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

#### **2.** In SQL\*Plus run the following SQL statement:

```
ALTER SYSTEM SET JOB_QUEUE_PROCESSES = <number>
```

For example, running the statement ALTER SYSTEM SET JOB\_QUEUE\_ PROCESSES = 20 sets JOB\_QUEUE\_PROCESSES to 20.

## About Running Oracle Application Express in Other Languages

The Oracle Application Express interface is translated into German, Spanish, French, Italian, Japanese, Korean, Brazilian Portuguese, Simplified Chinese, and Traditional Chinese. A single instance of Oracle Application Express can be installed with one or more of these translated versions. Developers can choose to run the Application Express development environment in any of the installed languages by simply selecting the language from the Application Builder log in screen or home page.

In order to install other languages you must use the apex\_4.2.zip file which contains the extra files referenced below. If you previously downloaded apex\_4.2\_ en.zip, then you do not need to re-install Oracle Application Express. Simply download apex\_4.2.zip and unzip the file into the same directory where you unzipped apex\_4.2\_en.zip.

The translated version of Oracle Application Express should be loaded into a database that has a character set that supports the specific language. If you attempt to install a translated version of Oracle Application Express into a database that does not support the character encoding of the language, the installation may fail or the translated Oracle Application Express instance may appear corrupt when run. The database character set AL32UTF8 supports all the translated versions of Oracle Application Express.

You can manually install translated versions of Oracle Application Express using SQL\*Plus. The installation files are encoded in AL32UTF8.

> **Note:** Regardless of the target database character set, to install a translated version of Oracle Application Express, you must set the character set value of the NLS LANG environment variable to AL32UTF8 before starting SQL\*Plus.

The following examples illustrate valid NLS\_LANG settings for loading Oracle Application Express translations:

American\_America.AL32UTF8 Japanese\_Japan.AL32UTF8

#### Installing a Translated Version of Oracle Application Express

Whether you are installing for the first time or upgrading from a previous release, you must run the load\_lang.sql script to run a translated version of Oracle Application Express.

The installation scripts are located in subdirectories identified by a language code in the unzipped distribution apex/builder. For example, the German version is located in apex/builder/de and the Japanese version is located in

apex/builder/ja. Within each of directory, there is a language loading script identified by the language code (for example, load\_de.sql or load\_ja.sql).

To install a translated version of Oracle Application Express:

- 1. Set the NLS\_LANG environment variable, making sure that the character set is AL32UTF8. For example:
  - Bourne or Korn shell:

```
NLS_LANG=American_America.AL32UTF8
export NLS_LANG
```

C shell:

```
setenv NLS_LANG American_America.AL32UTF8
```

For Windows based systems:

```
set NLS LANG=American America.AL32UTF8
```

- 2. Navigate to the directory under apex/builder based on the language you need to install. For example for German, navigate to apex/builder/de. Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role. For example:
  - On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

**3.** Execute the following statement:

```
ALTER SESSION SET CURRENT_SCHEMA = APEX_040200;
```

**4.** Execute the appropriate language specific script. For example:

```
@load_lang.sql
```

Where lang is the specific language (for example, load\_de.sql for German or load\_ja.sql for Japanese).

# Configuring the SHARED\_SERVERS Parameter

The embedded PL/SQL gateway uses the shared server architecture of the Oracle database. To achieve acceptable performance when using the embedded PL/SQL gateway, ensure the SHARED\_SERVERS database initialization parameter is set to a reasonable value (that is, not 0 or 1). For a small group of concurrent users, Oracle recommends a value of 5 for SHARED\_SERVERS.

Consider the following example:

- Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role. For example:
  - On Windows:

SYSTEM\_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA Enter password: SYS\_password

#### On UNIX and Linux:

\$ sqlplus /nolog SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA Enter password: SYS\_password

#### **2.** Run the following statement:

ALTER SYSTEM SET SHARED SERVERS = 5 SCOPE=BOTH;

## Create a Workspace and Add Oracle Application Express Users

You access the Oracle Application Express home page by logging in to a workspace using a Web browser. Your Web browser must have JavaScript enabled. See "Browser Requirements" on page 2-2.

A workspace is a virtual private database allowing multiple users to work within the same Oracle Application Express installation while keeping their objects, data and applications private. Each workspace has a unique ID and name.

An instance administrator can create a workspace manually within Oracle Application Express Administration Services or have users submit requests. Oracle Application Express Administration Services is a separate application for managing an entire Oracle Application Express instance. See "Creating Workspaces" and "Managing Workspace Requests" in *Oracle Application Express Administration Guide*.

#### Creating a Workspace Manually

To create an Oracle Application Express workspace manually:

- Log in to Oracle Application Express Administration Services. Oracle Application Express Administration Services is a separate application for managing an entire Oracle Application Express instance. You log in using the ADMIN account and password created or reset during the installation process.
  - **a.** In a Web browser, navigate to the Oracle Application Express Administration Services application.

Because your setup uses the embedded PL/SQL gateway, go to:

http://hostname:port/apex/apex\_admin

#### Where:

hostname is the name of the system where Oracle XML DB Protocol Server is installed.

port is the port number assigned to HTTP on the Oracle XML DB Protocol Server. In a default installation, this number is 8080.

apex is the database access descriptor (DAD) defined in the configuration file.

- **b.** On the Login page:
  - In Username, enter admin.
  - In Password, enter the Oracle Application Express administrator account password you specified in "Change the Password for the ADMIN Account" on page 3-21.
  - Click Login to Administration.

**See Also:** See "Logging in to Oracle Application Express Administration Services" in Oracle Application Express Administration Guide.

Next, create a workspace.

- 2. Click Manage Workspaces.
- **3.** Under Workspace Actions, click **Create Workspace**.

The Create Workspace Wizard appears.

- For Identify Workspace, enter the following:
  - **a.** Workspace Name Enter a unique workspace name.
  - **b.** Workspace ID Leave Workspace ID blank to have the new Workspace ID automatically generated. A Workspace ID must be a positive integer greater than 100000.
  - **c.** Workspace Description Enter a workspace description.
  - d. Click Next.
- For Identify Schema, specify whether you are re-using an existing schema or creating a new one.

If you are using an existing schema:

- **a.** For Re-use existing schema, select **Yes**.
- Select a schema from the list.
- c. Click Next.

If you are creating a new schema:

- **a.** For Re-use existing schema, select **No**.
- **b.** Enter a schema name and password.
- Specify a space quota.
- d. Click Next.
- For Identify Administrator, enter the Workspace administrator information and click Next.
- Confirm your selections and click **Create Workspace**.

#### **Creating Oracle Application Express Users**

To create an Oracle Application Express user account:

- 1. Log in to Oracle Application Express Administration Services as described in the previous section. See "Logging in to Oracle Application Express Administration Services" in *Oracle Application Express Administration Guide*.
- **2.** Click the **Manage Workspaces** icon.

The Administration page appears.

- 3. Click Manage Developers and Users.
- Click **Create User**.

The Create User page appears.

- **5.** Under User Attributes, enter:
  - **a. Username** Enter the username used to log in to the system. Restrictions include:
    - Maximum length of 100 characters
    - No spaces
    - Only these special characters are permitted: ampersand (@) and period (.)
  - **Email Address** Enter the valid email address for this user.
  - **First Name** Enter the first or given name to further identify the user.
  - **Last Name** Enter the last or family name to further identify the user.
  - **Description** Enter comments about this user.
  - **Default Date Format** Enter the default Oracle date format for the user. This controls the default date format within SQL Workshop.
- **6.** Under Account Privileges:
  - **a. Workspace** Select a workspace from the list.
  - **Default Schemas** Specify the default schema used for data browsing, application creation, and SQL script execution.

When using workspaces that have more than one schema available, this schema is the default. This setting does not control security, only the user's preference.

**c.** User is a workspace administrator - Specify if this user should have workspace administrator privileges.

Administrators are given access to all components. Additionally, they can manage user accounts, groups, and development services. Components may not be available if they are switched off by Instance Administrators.

**d. User is a developer** - Specify if this user should have developer privileges.

Developers must have access to either Application Builder, SQL Workshop, or both. These components may not be available if they are switched off by the Instance Administrator.

- **Application Builder Access** Determines whether a developer has access to the Application Builder.
- **SQL Workshop Access** Determines whether a developer has access to the SQL Workshop.
- **Team Development Access -** Determines whether a developer has access to the Team Development.

h. Set Account Availability - Select Locked to prevent the account from being used. Select **Unlocked** to allow the account to be used.

If the user has exceeded the maximum login failures allowed, specified in Workspace Preferences, then their account will be locked automatically.

#### **7.** Under Password:

- **Password** Enter a case sensitive password.
- **Confirm Password -** Enter the password again.
- Require Change of Password On First Use Select No to allow the user to use the same password until it expires. Select Yes to require the user to change the password immediately when logging in the first time.
- 8. Click Create User or Create and Create Another.

## Logging in to Your Workspace

Once you create a workspace, you must log in to it using your login credentials (that is, the workspace name, user name, and password).

To log in to your workspace:

1. In a Web browser, navigate to the Oracle Application Express Login page.

- port is the port number assigned to HTTP on the Oracle XML DB Protocol Server. In a default installation, this number is 8080.
- apex is the database access descriptor (DAD) defined in the configuration file.

For users who have upgraded from earlier releases, or who have a custom configuration, this value may be htmldb or something else. Verify your DAD with your Oracle Application Express administrator.

The Login page appears.

- **2.** Under Login, enter the following:
  - Workspace field Enter the name of your workspace.
  - Username field Enter your user name.
  - Password field Enter your case-sensitive password.
- Click **Login**.

Note that, depending on your setup, you might be required to change your password when you log in for the first time.

# Download and Install Oracle Application Express

To install Oracle Application Express:

For installations where the development will be in English only, download the file apex\_4.2\_en.zip from the Oracle Application Express download page. Where the development will include languages other than English, download apex\_ 4.2. zip from the Oracle Application Express download page. See:

http://www.oracle.com/technetwork/developer-tools/apex/downloads/index.html

Note that the actual file name may differ if a more recent release has shipped since this document was published.

- Unzip downloaded zip file:
  - If English only, unzip apex\_4.2\_en.zip as follows, preserving directory names:
    - UNIX and Linux: \$unzip apex\_4.2\_en.zip
    - Windows: Double click the file apex\_4.2\_en.zip in Windows Explorer

- If multiple languages, unzip apex\_4.2.zip as follows, preserving directory
  - UNIX and Linux: \$unzip apex\_4.2.zip
  - Windows: Double click the file apex\_4.2.zip in Windows Explorer

**Note:** You should keep the directory tree where you unzip the files short and not under directories that contain spaces. For example, within Windows unzip to C:\TEMP.

- **3.** Change your working directory to apex.
- Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role. For example:
  - On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE:\ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS password
```

- **5.** Disable any existing password complexity rules for the default profile. See "Configuring Password Protection" in Oracle Database Security Guide.
- **6.** Select the appropriate installation option.

Full development environment provides complete access to the Application Builder environment to develop applications. A Runtime environment enables users to run applications that cannot be modified. To learn more, see "About the Oracle Application Express Runtime Environment" on page 1-2.

Available installation options include:

Full development environment. Run apexins. sql passing the following four arguments in the order shown:

```
@apexins.sql tablespace_apex tablespace_files tablespace_temp images
```

#### Where:

- tablespace\_apex is the name of the tablespace for the Oracle Application Express application user.
- tablespace\_files is the name of the tablespace for the Oracle Application Express files user.
- tablespace\_temp is the name of the temporary tablespace or tablespace group.
- *images* is the virtual directory for Oracle Application Express images. To support future Oracle Application Express upgrades, define the virtual image directory as /i/.

#### Example:

```
@apexins.sql SYSAUX SYSAUX TEMP /i/
```

**Note:** If you receive the following error, please exit SQL\*Plus and change your working directory to apex:

```
SP2-0310: unable to open file "apexins.sql"
```

Runtime environment. Run apxrtins.sql passing the following arguments in the order shown:

@apxrtins.sql tablespace\_apex tablespace\_files tablespace\_temp images

#### Where:

- tablespace\_apex is the name of the tablespace for the Oracle Application Express application user.
- tablespace\_files is the name of the tablespace for the Oracle Application Express files user.
- tablespace\_temp is the name of the temporary tablespace.
- *images* is the virtual directory for Oracle Application Express images. To support future Oracle Application Express upgrades, define the virtual image directory as /i/.

#### Example:

@apxrtins.sql SYSAUX SYSAUX TEMP /i/

When Oracle Application Express installs, it creates three new database accounts:

- APEX\_040200 The account that owns the Oracle Application Express schema and metadata.
- FLOWS\_FILES The account that owns the Oracle Application Express uploaded
- APEX\_PUBLIC\_USER The minimally privileged account used for Oracle Application Express configuration with Oracle Application Express Listener or Oracle HTTP Server and mod\_plsql.

If you are upgrading from a previous release, then FLOWS\_FILES already exists and APEX\_PUBLIC\_USER is created if it does not already exist.

**Tip:** Oracle Application Express must be installed from a writable directory on the file system. See "Reviewing a Log of an Installation Session" on page A-1.

# Change the Password for the ADMIN Account

In a new installation of Oracle Application Express, or if you are converting a runtime environment to a development environment, you must change the password of the internal ADMIN account. In an upgrade scenario, the password will be preserved and carried over from the prior release.

**Tip:** You use the ADMIN account to log in to Oracle Application Express Administration Services and manage an entire Oracle Application Express instance.

To change the password for the ADMIN account:

- 1. Change your working directory to the apex directory where you unzipped the installation software.
- 2. Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role. For example:
  - On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

**3.** Run apxchpwd.sql. For example:

```
@apxchpwd.sql
```

When prompted, enter a password for the ADMIN account.

#### **Restart Processes**

After you install Oracle Application Express, you must restart the processes that you stopped before you began the installation. In addition, restart Oracle HTTP Server.

## Configure Oracle HTTP Server Distributed with Oracle Database 11 g or Oracle Application Server 10g

This section describes how to configure Oracle HTTP Server with mod\_plsql distributed with Oracle Database 11g or Oracle Application Server 10g.

#### Unlocking the APEX\_PUBLIC\_USER Account

The APEX\_PUBLIC\_USER account is locked at the end of a new installation of Oracle Application Express. You must unlock this account before configuring the database access descriptor (DAD) in a new installation.

**Tip:** If you are upgrading from a prior release of Oracle Application Express, this step is unnecessary.

To unlock the APEX\_PUBLIC\_USER account:

- 1. Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role. For example:
  - On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

**2.** Run the following statement:

```
ALTER USER APEX_PUBLIC_USER ACCOUNT UNLOCK
```

### Changing the Password for the APEX PUBLIC USER Account

The APEX\_PUBLIC\_USER account is created with a random password in a new installation of Oracle Application Express. You must change the password for this account before configuring the database access descriptor (DAD) in a new installation.

**Tip:** If you are upgrading from a prior release of Oracle Application Express, this step is unnecessary.

To change the password for the APEX PUBLIC USER account:

- Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role. For example:
  - On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

**2.** Run the following statement:

```
ALTER USER APEX_PUBLIC_USER IDENTIFIED BY new_password
```

Where new\_password is the new password you are setting for APEX\_PUBLIC\_ USER. You will use this password when creating the DAD in the sections that follow.

**About Password Expiration in Oracle Database 11** In the default profile in Oracle Database 11g, the parameter PASSWORD\_LIFE\_TIME is set to 180. If you are using Oracle Database 11g with Oracle Application Express, this causes the password for APEX\_

PUBLIC\_USER to expire in 180 days. As a result, your Oracle Application Express instance will become unusable until you change the password.

To prevent this behavior, create another profile in which the PASSWORD\_LIFE\_TIME parameter is set to unlimited and alter the APEX PUBLIC USER account and assign it to the new profile.

### Copying the Images Directory

Whether you are loading a new installation or upgrading from a previous release, you must copy the images directory from the top level of the apex\images directory, for example C: \TEMP, to the location on the file system containing the Oracle home for Oracle HTTP Server.

#### Topics:

**Copying the Images Directory After an Upgrade** During an upgrade, you overwrite your existing images directory. Before you begin the upgrade, to ensure that you can revert to the previous version, Oracle recommends that you create a copy of your existing images directory for Oracle Application Express, indicating the release number of the images (for example, images\_3\_1).

To locate the images directory on the file system, review the following files for the text alias /i/:

- Oracle Application Server 10*g*—see the marvel.conf files.
- Oracle HTTP Server distributed with Oracle Database 11g—see the dads.conf

When you locate the images directory path, copy the existing images directory to a backup location.

Use the following command syntax to copy the apex\images directory from the Oracle Database home to the existing images directory path, overwriting the existing images:

- Oracle Application Server 10g:
  - On Windows:

```
xcopy /E /I APEX_HOME\apex\images ORACLE_HTTPSERVER_HOME\Apache\images
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
cp -rf APEX_HOME/apex/images ORACLE_HTTPSERVER_HOME/Apache
```

- Oracle HTTP Server distributed with Oracle Database 11g:
  - On Windows:

```
xcopy /E /I APEX_HOME\apex\images ORACLE_HTTPSERVER_HOME\ohs\images
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
cp -rf APEX_HOME/apex/images ORACLE_HTTPSERVER_HOME/ohs
```

In the preceding syntax examples:

- APEX\_HOME is the directory where the Oracle Application Express software was unzipped, for example C:\TEMP if installing on Windows.
- ORACLE\_HTTPSERVER\_HOME is the existing Oracle Application Server or Oracle HTTP Server Oracle home.

Copying the Images Directory in a New Installation After installation, copy the directory apex/images.

- Oracle Application Server 10g:
  - On Windows:

```
xcopy /E /I ORACLE_HOME\apex\images ORACLE_HTTPSERVER_HOME\apache\images
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
cp -rf $ORACLE_HOME/apex/images ORACLE_HTTPSERVER_HOME/Apache
```

- Oracle HTTP Server distributed with Oracle Database 11g:
  - On Windows:

```
xcopy /E /I ORACLE_HOME\apex\images ORACLE_HTTPSERVER_HOME\ohs\images
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
cp -rf $ORACLE_HOME/apex/images ORACLE_HTTPSERVER_HOME/ohs
```

In the preceding syntax examples:

- ORACLE\_HOME is the directory where the Oracle Application Express software was unzipped, for example C:\TEMP if installing on Windows.
- ORACLE\_HTTPSERVER\_HOME is the existing Oracle Application Server or Oracle HTTP Server Oracle home.

#### Configuring Oracle HTTP Server 11g or Oracle Application Server 10g

Perform the following post installation steps outlined in this section.

#### Topics:

**Note:** Within the context of this document, ORACLE\_HTTPSERVER\_ HOME is the location where Oracle HTTP Server is installed.

**Editing the dads.conf File** If this is a new installation of Oracle Application Express, you must edit the dads.conf or marvel.conf file. The dads.conf file contains the information about the Database Access Descriptor (DAD) to access Oracle Application Express.

To edit the dads.conf file:

- 1. Use a text editor and open the dads.conf.
  - Oracle Application Server 10g:
    - On Windows see:

ORACLE\_HTTPSERVER\_HOME\Apache\modplsql\conf\dads.conf

On UNIX and Linux see:

ORACLE\_HTTPSERVER\_HOME/Apache/modplsql/conf/dads.conf

- Oracle HTTP Server distributed with Oracle Database 11g:
  - On Windows see:

ORACLE\_HTTPSERVER\_HOME\ohs\modplsql\conf\dads.conf

On UNIX and Linux see:

 $\textit{ORACLE\_HTTPSERVER\_HOME}/ohs/modplsql/conf/dads.conf$ 

2. In the dads.conf file, replace ORACLE\_HTTPSERVER\_HOME, host, port, service\_name, and apex\_public\_user\_password with values appropriate for your environment. Note that the apex\_public\_user\_password is the password you changed in "Changing the Password for the APEX\_PUBLIC\_USER Account" on page 3-39.

Note that the path listed is only an example. The path in the dads.conf file should reference the file system path described in "Copying the Images Directory" on page 3-40.

The PlsqlNLSLanguage setting determines the language setting of the DAD. The character set portion of the PlsqlNLSLanguage value must be set to AL32UTF8, regardless of whether or not the database character set is AL32UTF8. For example:

#### UNIX and Linux

If database is 10g and lower, execute the following:

ORACLE\_HTTPSERVER\_HOME/opmn/bin/opmnctl stopproc ias-component=HTTP\_Server ORACLE\_HTTPSERVER\_HOME/opmn/bin/opmnctl startproc ias-component=HTTP\_Server

**Note:** If you are using Oracle HTTP Server that is included with Oracle Fusion Middleware 11.1.1, you may need to replace the ias-component name above if the name given to the component was something other than HTTP\_Server when it was installed. The default name is ohs1.

### Disabling Oracle XML DB Protocol Server

If you were previously using the embedded PL/SQL Gateway and now wish to use Oracle HTTP server and mod\_plsql, you need to disable the Oracle XML DB Protocol server.

To disable Oracle XML DB Protocol server:

- Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role. For example:
  - On Windows:

```
SYSTEM DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password

**2.** Run the following command:

```

# Enable Network Services in Oracle Database 11*g*

By default, the ability to interact with network services is disabled in Oracle Database 11g Release 1 or 2. Therefore, if you are running Oracle Application Express with Oracle Database 11g Release 1 or 2, you must use the new DBMS\_NETWORK\_ACL\_ ADMIN package to grant connect privileges to any host for the APEX\_040200 database user. Failing to grant these privileges results in issues with:

- Sending outbound mail in Oracle Application Express. Users can call methods from the APEX\_MAIL package, but issues arise when sending outbound email.
- Using Web services in Oracle Application Express.
- PDF/report printing.

**Tip:** To run the examples described in this section, the compatible initialization parameter of the database must be set to at least 11.1.0.0.0. By default an 11g database will already have the parameter set properly, but a database upgraded to 11g from a prior version may not. See "Creating and Configuring an Oracle Database" in Oracle Database Administrator's Guide for information about changing database initialization parameters.

### Granting Connect Privileges

The following example demonstrates how to grant connect privileges to any host for the APEX\_040200 database user. This example assumes you connected to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role.

     'connect') IS NULL THEN
      DBMS_NETWORK_ACL_ADMIN.ADD_PRIVILEGE(ACL_PATH,
     'APEX_040200', TRUE, 'connect');
  END IF;
EXCEPTION
  -- When no ACL has been assigned to '*'.
 WHEN NO_DATA_FOUND THEN
 DBMS_NETWORK_ACL_ADMIN.CREATE_ACL('power_users.xml',
    'ACL that lets power users to connect to everywhere',
    'APEX_040200', TRUE, 'connect');
 DBMS_NETWORK_ACL_ADMIN.ASSIGN_ACL('power_users.xml','*');
END;
COMMIT:
```

The following example demonstrates how to provide less privileged access to local network resources. This example would enable indexing the Oracle Application Express Online Help and could possibly enable email and PDF printing if those servers were also on the local host.

  -- the "connect" privilege if APEX_040200 does not have the privilege yet.

```

```
DBMS_NETWORK_ACL_ADMIN.ADD_PRIVILEGE(ACL_PATH,
     'APEX_040200', TRUE, 'connect');
 END IF;
EXCEPTION
 -- When no ACL has been assigned to 'localhost'.
 WHEN NO_DATA_FOUND THEN
 DBMS_NETWORK_ACL_ADMIN.CREATE_ACL('local-access-users.xml',
    'ACL that lets users to connect to localhost',
    'APEX_040200', TRUE, 'connect');
 DBMS_NETWORK_ACL_ADMIN.ASSIGN_ACL('local-access-users.xml', 'localhost');
END;
COMMIT;
```

### Troubleshooting an Invalid ACL Error

If you receive an ORA-44416: Invalid ACL error after running the previous script, use the following query to identify the invalid ACL:

```
REM Show the dangling references to dropped users in the ACL that is assigned

SELECT ACL, PRINCIPAL
 FROM DBA_NETWORK_ACLS NACL, XDS_ACE ACE

      NOT EXISTS (SELECT NULL FROM ALL_USERS WHERE USERNAME = PRINCIPAL);
```

#### Next, run the following code to fix the ACL:

 -- If just some users referenced in the ACL are invalid, remove just those
 -- users in the ACL. Otherwise, drop the ACL completely.
 SELECT COUNT(PRINCIPAL) INTO CNT FROM XDS_ACE
  WHERE ACLID = ACL_ID AND
        EXISTS (SELECT NULL FROM ALL_USERS WHERE USERNAME = PRINCIPAL);
 IF (CNT > 0) THEN
   FOR R IN (SELECT PRINCIPAL FROM XDS_ACE
              WHERE ACLID = ACL_ID AND
                   NOT EXISTS (SELECT NULL FROM ALL_USERS
                                WHERE USERNAME = PRINCIPAL)) LOOP
     UPDATE XDB.XDB$ACL
        SET OBJECT_VALUE =
             DELETEXML (OBJECT_VALUE,
                        '/ACL/ACE[PRINCIPAL="'||R.PRINCIPAL||'"]')
      WHERE OBJECT_ID = ACL_ID;
   END LOOP;
 ELSE
   DELETE FROM XDB.XDB$ACL WHERE OBJECT_ID = ACL_ID;
 END IF;
```

Once the ACL has been fixed, you must run the first script in this section to apply the ACL to the APEX\_040200 user. See "Granting Connect Privileges" on page 3-44.

## Security Considerations

Oracle highly recommends you configure and use Secure Sockets Layer (SSL) to ensure that passwords and other sensitive data are not transmitted in clear text in HTTP requests. Without the use of SSL, passwords could potentially be exposed, compromising security.

SSL is an industry standard protocol that uses RSA public key cryptography in conjunction with symmetric key cryptography to provide authentication, encryption, and data integrity.

## About Managing JOB\_QUEUE\_PROCESSES

JOB QUEUE PROCESSES determine the maximum number of concurrently running jobs. In Oracle Application Express Release 4.2, transactional support and SQL scripts require jobs. If JOB\_QUEUE\_PROCESSES is not enabled and working properly, you cannot successfully execute a script.

Viewing JOB QUEUE PROCESSES in Oracle Application Express You can also view the number of JOB\_QUEUE\_PROCESSES on the About Application Express page.

To view the About Application Express page:

- 1. Log in to Oracle Application Express. See "Logging in to Your Workspace" on page 3-52.
- **2.** Click the **Administration** icon.
- From the Tasks list, click **About Application Express**.

The current number JOB\_QUEUE\_PROCESSES displays at the bottom of the page.

Viewing JOB\_QUEUE\_PROCESSES from SQL\*Plus You can also view the number of JOB\_ QUEUE\_PROCESSES from SQL\*Plus by running the following SQL statement:

### Changing the Number of JOB\_QUEUE\_PROCESSES

You can change the number of JOB\_QUEUE\_PROCESSES by running a SQL statement in SQL\*Plus:

To update the number of JOB\_QUEUE\_PROCESSES:

- Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role:
  - On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SOL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

**2.** In SQL\*Plus run the following SQL statement:

ALTER SYSTEM SET JOB_QUEUE_PROCESSES = <number>
```

For example, running the statement ALTER SYSTEM SET JOB\_QUEUE\_ PROCESSES = 20 sets JOB\_QUEUE\_PROCESSES to 20.

# About Running Oracle Application Express in Other Languages

The Oracle Application Express interface is translated into German, Spanish, French, Italian, Japanese, Korean, Brazilian Portuguese, Simplified Chinese, and Traditional Chinese. A single instance of Oracle Application Express can be installed with one or more of these translated versions. Developers can choose to run the Application Express development environment in any of the installed languages by simply selecting the language from the Application Builder log in screen or home page.

In order to install other languages you must use the apex\_4.2.zip file which contains the extra files referenced below. If you previously downloaded apex\_4.2\_ en.zip, then you do not need to re-install Oracle Application Express. Simply download apex\_4.2.zip and unzip the file into the same directory where you unzipped apex\_4.2\_en.zip.

The translated version of Oracle Application Express should be loaded into a database that has a character set that supports the specific language. If you attempt to install a translated version of Oracle Application Express into a database that does not support the character encoding of the language, the installation may fail or the translated Oracle Application Express instance may appear corrupt when run. The database character set AL32UTF8 supports all the translated versions of Oracle Application Express.

You can manually install translated versions of Oracle Application Express using SQL\*Plus. The installation files are encoded in AL32UTF8.

**Note:** Regardless of the target database character set, to install a translated version of Oracle Application Express, you must set the character set value of the NLS\_LANG environment variable to AL32UTF8 before starting SQL\*Plus.

The following examples illustrate valid NLS\_LANG settings for loading Oracle Application Express translations:

American\_America.AL32UTF8 Japanese\_Japan.AL32UTF8

### Installing a Translated Version of Oracle Application Express

Whether you are installing for the first time or upgrading from a previous release, you must run the load\_lang.sql script to run a translated version of Oracle Application Express.

The installation scripts are located in subdirectories identified by a language code in the unzipped distribution apex/builder. For example, the German version is located in apex/builder/de and the Japanese version is located in apex/builder/ja. Within each of directory, there is a language loading script identified by the language code (for example, load\_de.sql or load\_ja.sql).

To install a translated version of Oracle Application Express:

- 1. Set the NLS\_LANG environment variable, making sure that the character set is AL32UTF8. For example:
  - Bourne or Korn shell:

```
NLS_LANG=American_America.AL32UTF8
export NLS_LANG
```

C shell:

setenv NLS\_LANG American\_America.AL32UTF8

For Windows based systems:

set NLS\_LANG=American\_America.AL32UTF8

- 2. Navigate to the directory under apex/builder based on the language you need to install. For example for German, navigate to apex/builder/de. Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role. For example:
  - On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SOL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

**3.** Execute the following statement:

ALTER SESSION SET CURRENT\_SCHEMA = APEX\_040200;

Execute the appropriate language specific script. For example:

```
@load_lang.sql
```

Where lang is the specific language (for example, load\_de.sql for German or load\_ja.sql for Japanese).

## About Obfuscating PlsqlDatabasePassword Parameter

The PlsqlDatabasePassword parameter specifies the password for logging in to the database. You can use the dadTool.pl utility to obfuscate passwords in the dads.conf file.

You can find the dadTool.pl utility in the following directory:

For UNIX and Linux based systems:

ORACLE\_HTTPSERVER\_HOME/Apache/modplsql/conf

For Windows based systems:

ORACLE\_HTTPSERVER\_HOME\Apache\modplsql\conf

### **Obfuscating Passwords**

To obfuscate passwords, run dadTool.pl by following the instructions in the dadTool.README file.

## Create a Workspace and Add Oracle Application Express Users

You access the Oracle Application Express home page by logging in to a workspace using a Web browser. Your Web browser must have JavaScript enabled. See "Browser Requirements" on page 2-2.

A workspace is a virtual private database allowing multiple users to work within the same Oracle Application Express installation while keeping their objects, data and applications private. Each workspace has a unique ID and name.

An instance administrator can create a workspace manually within Oracle Application Express Administration Services or have users submit requests. Oracle Application Express Administration Services is a separate application for managing an entire Oracle Application Express instance. See "Creating Workspaces" and "Managing Workspace Requests" in *Oracle Application Express Administration Guide*.

#### Creating a Workspace Manually

To create an Oracle Application Express workspace manually:

Log in to Oracle Application Express Administration Services. Oracle Application Express Administration Services is a separate application for managing an entire Oracle Application Express instance. You log in using the ADMIN account and password created or reset during the installation process.

**a.** In a Web browser, navigate to the Oracle Application Express Administration Services application.

Because your setup uses Apache and mod\_plsql, go to:

http://hostname:port/pls/apex/apex\_admin

#### Where:

hostname is the name of the system where Oracle HTTP Server is installed.

port is the port number assigned to Oracle HTTP Server. In a default installation, this number is 7777.

pls is the indicator to use the mod\_plsql cartridge.

apex is the database access descriptor (DAD) defined in the mod\_plsql configuration file.

- **b.** On the Login page:
  - In Username, enter admin.
  - In Password, enter the Oracle Application Express administrator account password you specified in "Change the Password for the ADMIN Account" on page 3-21.
  - Click Login to Administration.

Next, create a workspace.

- 2. Click Manage Workspaces.
- **3.** Under Workspace Actions, click **Create Workspace**.

The Create Workspace Wizard appears.

- For Identify Workspace, enter the following:
  - **a.** Workspace Name Enter a unique workspace name.
  - **b.** Workspace ID Leave Workspace ID blank to have the new Workspace ID automatically generated. A Workspace ID must be a positive integer greater than 100000.
  - **c.** Workspace Description Enter a workspace description.
  - d. Click Next.
- **5.** For Identify Schema, specify whether you are re-using an existing schema or creating a new one.

If you are using an existing schema:

- **a.** For Re-use existing schema, select **Yes**.
- **b.** Select a schema from the list.
- c. Click Next.

If you are creating a new schema:

- For Re-use existing schema, select **No**.
- Enter a schema name and password.
- Specify a space quota.
- d. Click Next.
- For Identify Administrator, enter the Workspace administrator information and click Next.
- Confirm your selections and click **Create Workspace**.

## **Creating Oracle Application Express Users**

To create an Oracle Application Express user account:

- Log in to Oracle Application Express Administration Services as described in the previous section. See "Logging in to Oracle Application Express Administration Services" in *Oracle Application Express Administration Guide*.
- Click the **Manage Workspaces** icon.

The Administration page appears.

- Click Manage Developers and Users.
- Click **Create User**.

The Create User page appears.

- Under User Attributes, enter:
  - **Username** Enter the username used to log in to the system. Restrictions include:
    - Maximum length of 100 characters
    - No spaces
    - Only these special characters are permitted: ampersand (@) and period (.)
  - **Email Address** Enter the valid email address for this user.
  - **First Name** Enter the first or given name to further identify the user.
  - **Last Name** Enter the last or family name to further identify the user. d.
  - **Description** Enter comments about this user.
  - **Default Date Format** Enter the default Oracle date format for the user. This controls the default date format within SQL Workshop.
- **Under Account Privileges:** 
  - **Workspace** Select a workspace from the list.
  - **Default Schemas** Specify the default schema used for data browsing, application creation, and SQL script execution.
    - When using workspaces that have more than one schema available, this schema is the default. This setting does not control security, only the user's preference.
  - User is a workspace administrator Specify if this user should have workspace administrator privileges.

Administrators are given access to all components. Additionally, they can manage user accounts, groups, and development services. Components may not be available if they are switched off by Instance Administrators.

**d. User is a developer -** Specify if this user should have developer privileges.

Developers must have access to either Application Builder, SQL Workshop, or both. These components may not be available if they are switched off by the Instance Administrator.

- **e.** Application Builder Access Determines whether a developer has access to the Application Builder.
- f. SQL Workshop Access Determines whether a developer has access to the SQL Workshop.
- **g. Team Development Access** Determines whether a developer has access to the Team Development.
- **Set Account Availability** Select **Locked** to prevent the account from being used. Select **Unlocked** to allow the account to be used.

If the user has exceeded the maximum login failures allowed, specified in Workspace Preferences, then their account will be locked automatically.

#### **7.** Under Password:

- **Password** Enter a case sensitive password.
- **Confirm Password** Enter the password again.
- Require Change of Password On First Use Select No to allow the user to use the same password until it expires. Select **Yes** to require the user to change the password immediately when logging in the first time.
- 8. Click Create User or Create and Create Another.

### Logging in to Your Workspace

Once you create a workspace, you must log in to it using your login credentials (that is, the workspace name, user name, and password).

For users who have upgraded from earlier releases, or who have a custom configuration, this value may be htmldb or something else. Verify your DAD with your Oracle Application Express administrator.

The Login page appears.

- Under Login, enter the following:
  - Workspace field Enter the name of your workspace.
  - Username field Enter your user name.
  - Password field Enter your case-sensitive password.
- 3. Click **Login**.

Note that, depending on your setup, you might be required to change your password when you log in for the first time.

# Post Installation Tasks for Upgrade Installations

Once you have verified that your upgrade installation was successful and all upgraded applications function properly, you should remove schemas from prior Oracle Application Express installations.

# Remove Prior Oracle Application Express Installations

The database users associated with schemas from prior installations are privileged users and should be removed when they are no longer necessary. Removing schemas from a prior installation is a two step process. First you verify if a prior installation exists and then you remove the schemas.

### Verify if a Prior Installation Exists

To verify if a prior installation exists:

- Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS. For example:
  - On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SOL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

**2.** Run the following query:

```
SELECT username
  FROM dba users
WHERE (username LIKE 'FLOWS_%' OR USERNAME LIKE 'APEX_%')
  AND USERNAME NOT IN (
       SELECT 'FLOWS_FILES'
```

```
FROM DUAL
UNION
SELECT 'APEX_PUBLIC_USER' FROM DUAL
UNION
SELECT SCHEMA s
  FROM dba registry
WHERE comp_id = 'APEX');
```

If the results contain entries in the form FLOWS\_XXXXXX or APEX\_XXXXXX where XXXXXX represents six numbers, those entries are candidates for removal.

### **Remove Schemas from Prior Installations**

To remove schemas from prior installations:

- Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role. For example:
  - On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

**2.** Execute a statement similar to the following example:

```
DROP USER FLOWS_030000 CASCADE;
```

# Fix Invalid ACL in Oracle Database 11g

After following the instructions in Remove Prior Oracle Application Express Installations" on page 3-53, you may need to fix an invalid ACL if you are running Oracle Database 11g and you enabled network services for the prior Oracle Application Express schema.

To fix an invalid ACL:

- 1. Change your working directory to the apex directory where you unzipped the installation software.
- 2. Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role. For example:
  - On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

**3.** Execute a statement similar to following:

```
EXEC DBMS_NETWORK_ACL_ADMIN.DELETE_PRIVILEGE('power_users.xml', 'FLOWS_
```

# **Performance Optimization Tasks**

Performance of web applications heavily depend on their size and how often a browser has to request static content like images, CSS and JavaScript files. To improve performance, most web servers allow you to enable on-the-fly file compression and settings on how long browsers can cache a file. Please see your web server manual on how to enable gzip compression and setting the expired header attribute for optimal performance of your Application Express application.

# **About the Oracle Application Express Runtime Environment**

The Oracle Application Express runtime environment enables users to run a production application without supporting the ability to change or edit the application. It includes only the packages necessary to run your applications, making it a more hardened environment. It does not provide a Web interface for administration.

You administer the Oracle Application Express runtime environment using SQL\*Plus or SQL Developer and the APEX\_INSTANCE\_ADMIN API. To learn more see, "Managing a Runtime Environment" and in Oracle Application Express Application Builder User's Guide.

On UNIX and Linux:

$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

**3.** Run apxdvins.sql. For example:

```
@apxdvins.sql
```

# Converting a Full Development Environment to a Runtime Environment

Export all Websheet applications prior to converting a full development environment to a runtime environment. When you convert a development environment to runtime, existing Websheet data grids and reports will be deleted from all workspaces. Converting the environment back to a full development environment will not restore these Websheet data grids or reports.

To convert an Oracle Application Express full development environment to a runtime environment:

- 1. Change your working directory to the apex directory where you unzipped the installation software.
- 2. Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role. For example:
  - On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

**3.** Run apxdevrm.sql. For example:

@apxdevrm.sql

# Reviewing a Log of an Installation Session

The apexins.sql script creates a log file in the apex directory using the naming convention installyyyy-MM-DD HH24-MI-SS.log. In a successful installation, the log file contains the following text:

```
Thank you for installing Oracle Application Express.
Oracle Application Express is installed in the APEX_040200 schema.
```

If the log file contains a few errors, it does not mean that your installation failed. Note that acceptable errors are noted as such in the log file.

# Verifying the Validity of an Oracle Application Express Installation

You can verify the validity of an Oracle Application Express installation by running the following query:

```
SELECT STATUS FROM DBA REGISTRY
WHERE COMP_ID = 'APEX';
```

If the result is VALID, you can assume the installation was successful.

# Cleaning Up After a Failed Installation

In a successful installation the following banner displays near the end of the installation:

```
Thank you for installing Oracle Application Express.
Oracle Application Express is installed in the APEX_040200 schema.
```

To reinstall, you must either drop the Oracle Application Express database schemas, or run a script to completely remove Application Express from the database, depending upon the installation type.

# Reverting to a Previous Release After a Failed Upgrade Installation

In the case of a failed upgrade installation, you may want to revert Oracle Application Express to a previous release and then remove the schemas associated with the current release.

# Verifying If You Have a Previous Release of Oracle Application Express

To verify whether you have a previous release of Application Express:

- Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role. For example:
  - On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

**2.** Execute the following command in SQL\*Plus:

```
select username from dba users
    where regexp_like(username, '(FLOWS | APEX)_\d{6}')
        and username <> (select table_owner from all_synonyms
        where synonym_name = 'WWV_FLOW'
        and owner = 'PUBLIC')
```

If the query above returns any rows, the database contains a previous release of Oracle Application Express.

### Reverting to a Previous Release

To revert to a previous Oracle Application Express release:

- 1. If you altered your images directory, you must point the text alias /i/ back to images directory for the release you wish to revert to. See "Copying the Images Directory After an Upgrade" on page 3-40.
- 2. Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role:

On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

- **3.** Depending upon the release you are reverting to, execute the appropriate command in SQL\*Plus:
  - **a.** To revert to Oracle Application Express Release 1.5, execute the following:

```
ALTER SESSION SET CURRENT_SCHEMA = FLOWS_010500;
exec flows_010500.wwv_flow_upgrade.switch_schemas('APEX_040200','FLOWS_
010500');
```

**b.** To revert to Oracle Application Express Release 1.6, execute the following:

```
ALTER SESSION SET CURRENT_SCHEMA = FLOWS_010600;
exec flows_010600.wwv_flow_upgrade.switch_schemas('APEX_040200','FLOWS_
010600');
```

**c.** To revert to Oracle Application Express Release 2.0, execute the following:

```
ALTER SESSION SET CURRENT SCHEMA = FLOWS 020000;
exec flows_020000.wwv_flow_upgrade.switch_schemas('APEX_040200','FLOWS_
020000');
```

**d.** To revert to Oracle Application Express Release 2.2, execute the following:

```
ALTER SESSION SET CURRENT_SCHEMA = FLOWS_020200;
exec flows_020200.wwv_flow_upgrade.switch_schemas('APEX_040200','FLOWS_
020200');
```

- To revert to Oracle Application Express Release 3.0, execute the following:
  - Change your working directory to apex in the 3.0 source.
  - Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role:

### On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE:\ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

### On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

Execute the following:

```
set define '^'
@apexvalidate x x FLOWS_030000
ALTER SESSION SET CURRENT_SCHEMA = FLOWS_030000;
exec flows 030000.wwv_flow_upgrade.switch_schemas('APEX_040200','FLOWS_
```

```
030000');
ALTER SESSION SET CURRENT_SCHEMA = SYS;
exec validate_apex;
```

- To revert to Oracle Application Express Release 3.1:
  - Change your working directory to apex/core in the 3.1 source.
  - Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role:

#### On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE:\ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

### On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

Execute the following commands:

```
@wwv_flow_val.plb
@wwv_dbms_sql.sql
@wwv_dbms_sql.plb
```

- Change your working directory to apex in the 3.1 source.
- Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role:

### On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

#### On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

Execute the following:

```
set define '^'
@apexvalidate x x FLOWS_030100
ALTER SESSION SET CURRENT_SCHEMA = FLOWS_030100;
exec flows_030100.wwv_flow_upgrade.switch_schemas('APEX_040200','FLOWS_
030100');
ALTER SESSION SET CURRENT_SCHEMA = SYS;
exec validate_apex;
```

- To revert to Oracle Application Express Release 3.2:
  - Change your working directory to apex/core in the 3.2 source.
  - Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role:

#### On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

### On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

Execute the following commands:

```
@wwv flow val.plb
@wwv_dbms_sql.sql
@wwv_dbms_sql.plb
```

- Change your working directory to apex in the 3.2 source.
- Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role:

### On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE:\ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

#### On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

Execute the following:

```
set define '^'
@apexvalidate x x APEX_030200
ALTER SESSION SET CURRENT_SCHEMA = APEX_030200;
exec apex_030200.wwv_flow_upgrade.switch_schemas('APEX_040200','APEX_
030200');
ALTER SESSION SET CURRENT_SCHEMA = SYS;
exec validate_apex;
```

- **h.** To revert to Oracle Application Express Release 4.0:
  - Change your working directory to apex/core in the 4.0 source.
  - Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role:

#### On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

#### On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

Execute the following commands:

```
@wwv_flow_val.plb
@wwv_dbms_sql.sql
@wwv_dbms_sql.plb
```

- Change your working directory to apex in the 4.0 source.
- Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role:

#### On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE:\ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

### On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

Execute the following:

```
set define '^'
@apexvalidate x x APEX 040000
ALTER SESSION SET CURRENT SCHEMA = APEX 040000;
exec apex_040000.wwv_flow_upgrade.switch_schemas('APEX_040200','APEX_
040000');
ALTER SESSION SET CURRENT_SCHEMA = SYS;
exec validate_apex;
```

- To revert to Oracle Application Express Release 4.1:
  - Change your working directory to apex/core in the 4.1 source.
  - Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role:

#### On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

#### On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

Execute the following commands:

```
@wwv_flow_val.plb
@wwv_dbms_sql.sql
@wwv_dbms_sql.plb
```

- Change your working directory to apex in the 4.1 source.
- Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role:

On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE:\ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

#### On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

Execute the following:

```
set define '^'
@apexvalidate x x APEX_040100
ALTER SESSION SET CURRENT_SCHEMA = APEX_040100;
exec apex_040100.wwv_flow_upgrade.switch_schemas('APEX_040200','APEX_
040100');
ALTER SESSION SET CURRENT_SCHEMA = SYS;
exec validate_apex;
```

# Removing the Oracle Application Express Release 4.2 Schema

After you have reverted to the prior release you can remove the Oracle Application Express 4.2 schema.

To remove the release 4.2 schema:

- 1. Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role:
  - On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

**2.** Execute the following command:

```
DROP USER APEX_040200 CASCADE;
```

Once you have removed the Oracle Application Express 4.2 schema, you can now attempt the upgrade again.

# Removing Oracle Application Express from the Database

This section describes how to remove the Oracle Application Express schema, synonyms, and users from the database without deleting the database. If you are going to delete the database, then you must complete these steps.

**Note:** Do not follow these steps if you have upgraded your database from a prior release, and still want to use the prior release of Oracle Application Express. For information about reverting to a prior release, see "Reverting to a Previous Release" on page A-2. If you are not sure whether you have completed a new installation or an upgrade installation, follow the steps in "Cleaning Up After a Failed Installation" on page A-1 to verify if a previous release of Application Express exists in the database

To remove Oracle Application Express from the database:

- Change your working directory to the apex directory where you unzipped the Oracle Application Express software.
- Start SQL\*Plus and connect to the database where Oracle Application Express is installed as SYS specifying the SYSDBA role:
  - On Windows:

```
SYSTEM_DRIVE: \ sqlplus /nolog
SOL> SOL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

On UNIX and Linux:

```
$ sqlplus /nolog
SQL> SQL> CONNECT SYS as SYSDBA
Enter password: SYS_password
```

**3.** Execute the following command:

```
SQL> @apxremov.sql
```

4. After successfully removing Application Express using apxremov.sql, you must exit your current SQL\*Plus session and reconnect prior to attempting another install using apexins.sql.

# Images Displaying Incorrectly in Oracle Application Express

If images in Oracle Application Express do not display correctly, you may have more than one definition of the /i/ alias. To address this issue:

- If possible, rename the first instance of /i/ to a different alias name.
- Alternatively, copy the images from the ORACLE\_HOME\apex\images directory to the directory defined by the first /i/ alias.

# **Page Protection Violation**

This may be caused by manual alteration of protected page items. If this error occurs after installation when trying to log into Application Express, then stop and start the APEX Listener. If you are unsure of what caused this error, please contact the application administrator for assistance.
