## Preinstalled Software

Oracle VTS <sup>†</sup>	/usr/sunvts	Provides hardware validation tests.

<sup>†</sup>These software components are part of the Oracle Solaris 11 OS distribution.

The preinstalled OS is ready to be configured at the appropriate point when you first apply power to the server.

Mandatory package updates might not be preinstalled. Ensure that you obtain and install all mandatory updates before you put the server into production. See “[Mandatory Oracle Solaris 11 OS Package Updates](#)” on page 14.

Refer to the Oracle Solaris documentation for instructions on installing and configuring the Oracle Solaris OS.

You can reinstall the OS along with mandatory package updates or patches instead of using the preinstalled OS. See “[Minimum Supported Versions of the Firmware, OS, and Software](#)” on page 13.

## IMPORTANT - Install Latest OS Updates, Patches, and Firmware

Some product features are enabled only when the latest versions of patches or firmware are installed. In order to retain optimal performance, security, and stability, installing the latest available patches or firmware is required.

Verify that the server firmware version is at a minimum 9.4.3 or higher.

1. Check the server firmware:

From the ILOM web interface, click System Information → Summary, then view the property value for the System Firmware Version in the General Information table.

From the command prompt, type:

```
-> show /HOST
```

2. Ensure the server firmware version is at the minimum required version, shown above, or a subsequent release, if available.
3. If required, download the latest available software release version from My Oracle Support at:  
<https://support.oracle.com>
4. If required, update the server firmware.

Refer to the information about performing firmware updates in the *Oracle ILOM Administrator's Guide for Configuration and Maintenance*. Ensure that you perform the preparatory steps described in that document before updating the firmware.

## Minimum Supported Versions of the Firmware, OS, and Software

You are required to install the latest available and supported versions of the system firmware, OS, and patches, for optimal performance, security, and stability. See [“IMPORTANT - Install Latest OS Updates, Patches, and Firmware” on page 12.](#)

Oracle Solaris 11 is the recommended OS for the SPARC T7 series servers. Oracle Solaris 11 provides simplified installation and maintenance, enhanced virtualization capabilities, and performance improvements. A more detailed list of Oracle Solaris 11 advantages is available at <http://www.oracle.com/technetwork/server-storage/solaris11/overview/index.html>.

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**Note** - If you configure the server with Oracle VM Server for SPARC, you can install various combinations of the minimum (or later) versions of the OS. For example, use Oracle Solaris 11.3 for the control domain, and Oracle Solaris 10 9/10 in a guest domain.

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## Mandatory Oracle Solaris 11 OS Package Updates

No package update is required at this time to use the preinstalled Oracle Solaris 11.3 OS with this server.

If you reinstall the OS, you might need to install certain package updates before you put the server and optional hardware or software components into production.

Install the most recent Oracle Solaris 11.3 Support Repository Update (SRU). Taking this action ensures that your server has the latest software for the best performance, security, and stability.

Use the `pkg info entire` command to display which SRU is currently installed on your server.

Use the `pkg` command or the package manager GUI to download any available SRUs from: <https://pkg.oracle.com/solaris/support>.

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**Note** - To access the Oracle Solaris 11 package update repository, you must have an Oracle support agreement that enables you to install a required SSL certificate and support key.

## Mandatory Oracle Solaris 10 OS Patches

If you choose to install the Oracle Solaris 10 OS in a guest domain, you must also install additional patches and in some cases, a patch bundle.

### Oracle Solaris 10 1/13 Mandatory Patches

A supported version of the OS is only supported in guest domains.

Installation Order	OS and Patches
1	Oracle Solaris 10 1/13.
2	<p>These mandatory patches:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>■ All patches up to October 2015 or later.</li> <li>■ KU150400-29.</li> </ul> <p>To install Oracle Solaris 10 1/13, you must use an image with the miniroot patched with KU150400-29, or higher.</p> <p>The correct image is provided in MOS patch 26032848. This image contains the original Oracle Solaris 10 1/13 software, and a miniroot image which includes kernel patch 150400-48. Downloading and using this image enables the installation of Oracle Solaris 10 1/13 on guest domains via jumpstart without the need to manually patch the packed miniroot.</p> <p>(optional) If, for some reason, you do not want to use the image provided in the MOS patch, you can use the prior method to manually patch the packed miniroot. You must also use this method to patch versions of Oracle Solaris older than Oracle Solaris 10 1/13. ## Oracle Solaris 10 8/11 Mandatory Patches

This version of the OS is supported only in guest domains.

Installation Order	OS and Patches
1	Oracle Solaris 10 8/11. <b>Note</b> - Until the Oracle Solaris 10 1/13 SPARC Bundle has been installed, Oracle Solaris 10 8/11 supports only 512 CPUs and 3840 Gbytes of memory. For servers exceeding those resources, reduce the resources until the Oracle Solaris 10 1/13 SPARC Bundle has been installed, or install a later version of Oracle Solaris.
2	Oracle Solaris 10 1/13 SPARC Bundle.  This bundle causes the OS to operate as the Oracle Solaris 10 1/13 OS, but the version number in the /etc/release file remains as Oracle Solaris 10 8/11.
3	These mandatory patches: <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>■ All patches up to October 2015.</li><li>■ KU150400-29.</li></ul> <p>To install Oracle Solaris 10, you must patch the miniroot of the installation media with KU150400-29, or higher. You can use the Oracle Solaris 10 JumpStart technology and finish scripts to patch the installed image. 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## Oracle Solaris 10 9/10 Mandatory Patches

This version of the OS is supported only in guest domains.

2	<p>Oracle Solaris 10 1/13 SPARC Bundle.</p> <p>This bundle causes the OS to operate as the Oracle Solaris 10 1/13 OS, but the version number in the /etc/release file remains as Oracle Solaris 10 9/10.</p>
3	<p>These mandatory patches:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>■ All patches up to October 2015.</li> <li>■ KU150400-29.</li> </ul> <p>To install Oracle Solaris 10, you must patch the miniroot of the installation media with KU150400-29, or higher. ## ▼ Obtain Oracle Solaris 10 Patches

1. **Sign in to My Oracle Support:**

2. **Select the Patches & Updates tab.**

**3. Search for a patch using the Patch Search panel.**

When searching for a patch using the Patch Name or Number field, you must specify the complete name or number of the patch. For example:

- Solaris 10 1/13 SPARC Bundle
- 13058415
- 147159-03

To search using a patch number without the revision number (last two digits), type % in place of the revision number. For example:

147159-%

**4. After you locate the patch, access the README and download the patch from the site.**

The patch README provides the patch installation instructions.

## Updating the System Firmware from a Version Earlier than 9.5.2.g

Upgrading the SPARC T7 server from a system firmware version earlier than 9.5.2.g requires a different procedure than the usual system firmware upgrade process, because the NAND flash memory on the SP is reformatted during the update. You must perform additional steps in order to retain configuration information.

If you need to use this procedure, read it thoroughly before attempting to proceed. Failure to accurately follow these steps can result in significant additional downtime before the server is restored to a fully functional state. Allow at least 40 minutes to perform this upgrade procedure on a SPARC T7 server.

Briefly, the procedure is as follows:

1. Determine which firmware version is currently on the server.

2. Power off the server.

3. Record your SP network settings.

4. Back up the current SP configuration.

5. Load the initial firmware image.

6. Restore the SP network connection.

7. Load the system firmware a second time.

The examples throughout this procedure show use of the CLI on a new Oracle SPARC T7-4 server to upgrade from system firmware 9.5.2.c to 9.5.2.g. These examples show a syntax that you can use on any Oracle SPARC T7 series server, but customer-specific values will vary. Variables are in *italics* and should not be entered directly.

Unless otherwise noted, you can perform the steps in this procedure using any of these methods:

- The server's local serial management connection
- The web browser-based network management connection
- The command-line SSH network management connection
- Oracle Enterprise Manager OpsCenter

Refer to the Oracle ILOM documentation for additional details about performing operations using the ILOM CLI or web interface.

Refer to the Oracle Enterprise Manager OpsCenter documentation for details on performing steps with that program.

## ▼ Check the Current Firmware Version

The upgrade to system firmware 9.5.2.g or later only requires additional steps if you are upgrading from system firmware 9.5.2.c or earlier. Check which version of the firmware is loaded on the server before continuing.

---

**Note** - You must have full user role privileges (i.e. `aucro`).

---

**1. Log in to the SP. Type:**

```
ORACLESP-<XXXXXXXX> login: root
Password:
Detecting screen size; please wait...done

Oracle(R) Integrated Lights Out Manager

Version X.X.X.X.rXXXXXX

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Hostname: ORACLESP-<XXXXXXXX>

```

**2. Display the current system firmware version. Type:**

```
-> show /HOST sysfw_version

/HOST
Properties:
    sysfw_version = Sun System Firmware 9.5.2.c YYYY/MM/DD HH:MM

->
```

**3. Determine your next steps:**

- **If your server firmware version is 9.5.2.g or later, load the latest firmware image.**

## ▼ Power Off the Server

**1. Power off the server. Type:**

```
-> stop /System
Are you sure you want to stop /System (y/n)? y
Stopping /System
```

->

**2. Verify that the server is powered off. Type:**

-> `show /System power_state`

/System

    power_state = Off
```

**3. Record your SP network properties.**

## ▼ Record SP Network Properties

During this firmware upgrade process, the SP network configuration information will be reset to factory defaults. You must note your current SP network properties before continuing with the firmware upgrade.

You will need this information later to restore SP network connection.

**1. Display the current SP network configuration information. Type:**

-> `show /SP/network ipaddress ipgateway ipnetmask ipdiscovery`

```
/SP/network
  Properties:
    ipaddress = XX.XX.XX.XX
    ipgateway = YY.YY.YY.YY
    ipnetmask = ZZ.ZZ.ZZ.ZZ
    ipdiscovery = static
```

->

**2. If your SP uses a static connection (i.e., if the ipdiscovery value is static), note the current network configuration properties.**

**Note** - If your SP uses a DHCP connection, the network configuration will be restored automatically.

## ▼ Back Up the Current SP Configuration

---

**Note** - You cannot use Oracle Enterprise Ops Center for this portion of the upgrade procedure.

---

- 1. Set a 16-character passphrase for encryption of the SP configuration information. Type:**

```
-> set /SP/config passphrase=<XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX>  
Set 'passphrase' to 'XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX'
```

```
->
```

Note the passphrase for later use.

- 2. Create the backup of the SP configuration information. Type:**

```
-> set /SP/config dump_uri=scp://<username>@<ip_address_or_hostname>/backup_XXXXXXX.xml
```

```
Enter remote user password: *****  
Dump successful.
```

```
->
```

The backup file might take several minutes to write, depending on the amount of platform-specific data in your configuration.

Note the name and location of the SP backup file.

---

**Note** - If you are upgrading the system firmware on more than one server, Oracle recommends using a different file name for each SP backup.

- 3. Load the initial firmware image.**

## ▼ Load the Initial System Firmware Image

**Note** - Loading the system firmware image might take up to 15 minutes.

---

## 1. Load the initial system firmware image. Type:

```
-> load -source http://<ip_address_or_hostname>/Sun_System_Firmware-9_5_2_g-
SPARC_T7-4.pkg /SP/firmware
```

NOTE: An upgrade takes several minutes to complete. ILOM will enter a special mode to load new firmware. No other tasks can be performed in ILOM until the firmware upgrade is complete and ILOM is reset.

```
Are you sure you want to load the specified file (y/n)? y
Preserve existing configuration (y/n)? y
```

Firmware update is complete.

After loading the initial image of the new system firmware, the SP automatically reboots from primary flash. During reboot, the SP will use factory defaults even if you answered **y** to the question, Preserve existing configuration (y/n)?

## Updating SP Firmware from the HOST

To update SP firmware from the HOST, Oracle is standardizing on the fwupdate utility. This utility is included in Oracle Solaris as part of the Oracle Hardware Management Pack (OHMP).

---

**Note** - Beginning with SPARC T7 servers, the sysfwdownload utility does not ship with SP firmware releases, and that utility is not supported.

---

When you follow the steps in that procedure, and have obtained a desired firmware package, this is the command that will update the SP from the HOST:

## Required Firmware Updates for X-Options

If you install the Oracle Flash Accelerator F160 PCIe Card or the Oracle 1.6TB NVMe SSD as an x-option, you must update the firmware to RA13, or a subsequent release if available. Servers ordered with this option installed already have the updated firmware.

For firmware upgrade instructions, refer to the NVMe card and SSD documentation at: <http://www.oracle.com/goto/oracleflashf160/docs>.

## Determine Correct Firmware for IO Devices

Some product features are enabled only when the latest versions of patches or firmware are installed. In order to retain optimal performance, security, and stability, installing the latest available patches or firmware is required. Confirm that the latest server firmware version is installed.

To easily determine the latest released version of supported firmware for available IO devices, locate the "IO Options Firmware 1.0" patch (patch number 25393974) on [My Oracle Support \(MOS\)](#).

This patch can be found in a "Product or Family (Advanced)" search, under the "Patches & Update" tab on MOS for any SPARC T7, S7 or M7 platform from Oracle. For example, a query for *SPARC S7-2L* will include *SPARC S7-2L IO Options Firmware 1.0*.

The patch only contains a README, with a table of available IO devices and a pointer to the latest supported firmware patch on MOS for each device.

## Installing and Booting Oracle Solaris 11 From Devices Connected to a USB Port

To install Oracle Solaris without using an IPS AutoInstall server on the network, you can use Oracle Solaris media in a DVD drive. The DVD drive can be built into the server or attached to a USB port. You also can boot from an ISO image copied to a DVD disk, hard drive, or SSD.

You can install Oracle Solaris 11.3 OS on this server from an image copied to a USB flash drive. That USB image is available for download at the same location as the ISO images <http://www.oracle.com/technetwork/server-storage/solaris11/downloads/index.html>.

You also can create a persistent device alias for a device connected to a USB port. The simpler alias name remains available for future installation or boot operations.

For more information about installing Oracle Solaris and creating persistent device aliases, refer to *Installing Oracle Solaris 11.3 Systems* at:

You can boot Oracle Solaris 11.3 from drives installed in the server (hard drive, SSD, or DVD drive) or from devices connected to a USB port.

For the path to identify a USB port in a boot command, refer to the list of devices output by the `show-dev OpenBoot` command.

## PCIe Slot Configuration Requirements for Aura7 PCIe Cards

The following PCIe slot configuration requirements exist for these servers when Aura7 PCIe cards are installed:

- In SPARC T7-4 servers that have Aura7 PCIe cards installed, you must install cards in slots 1/2/3/4/13/14/15/16 to avoid thermal concerns in the system.
- In SPARC T7-1 servers that have Aura7 PCIe cards installed, you can populate no more than four slots, which is two fewer than systems that use Aura6 PCIe cards.

## Oracle VM Server for SPARC Guidelines

If you plan to configure Oracle VM Server for SPARC on this server, follow these guidelines:

- Do not configure the Oracle Solaris 10 OS in the control domain, root domains, I/O domains, or service domains.
- You can configure Oracle Solaris 10 OS with the required patches and packages in guest domains.
- Be aware that instances of Oracle Solaris 10 with required patches and packages in a single guest domain are limited to 1024 virtual CPUs and 4 Tbytes of memory.

The majority of a physical domain's memory can be assigned to logical domains. However, a small portion of the PDomain's memory is preassigned to software components, the hypervisor, and certain I/O devices. To determine which portions of the memory are unavailable for logical domains, log in to the PDomain and type this command:

```
# ldm ls-devices -a mem
```

In the command output, look for the rows that include `_sys_` in the BOUND column. These portions of memory are not available for logical domains.

## Oracle Software in Silicon Features

The microprocessors for the SPARC T7 series servers offer co-engineered hardware and software capabilities that enable applications to run with the highest levels of security, reliability, and speed. This functionality is called as Oracle *Software in Silicon*.

Software in Silicon features include:

- **Silicon Secured Memory** – detects common memory access errors including:
  - Buffer overflows
  - Unallocated or freed memory access errors
  - "Double free" memory access errors
  - Stale pointer memory access errors

With Silicon Secured Memory enabled, an error is likely to be raised if an application tries to access memory to which it should not have access. This feature enhances application data integrity (ADI). (The Silicon Secured Memory feature is not supported for use with Kernel Zones at this time.)

- **Data Analytics Accelerator (DAX)** – Coprocessors perform query-related operations directly through the hardware, which improves Oracle Database performance. You can use DAX hardware acceleration for Oracle Database 12c in-memory database operations. (The DAX feature is not supported for use with Kernel Zones at this time.)

For more details on Silicon Secured Memory, refer to the Oracle Solaris 11.3 documentation.

To use DAX, you must configure the Oracle Database 12c in-memory feature. For instructions, refer to "Using the In-Memory Column Store" at:

## Oracle Solaris Fallback Miniroot Image Must Be Installed on a New SPM

When you replace the SPM in your server, you must install a fallback miniroot image that corresponds to the version of Oracle Solaris that are using. The miniroot image is not part of

the OS or firmware image that you install. Also, you must update the miniroot image when you install a new version of Oracle Solaris on the server, so the fallback image matches that version and SRU of Oracle Solaris.

You must download the fallback miniroot image for your hardware and your Oracle Solaris version from My Oracle Support at <https://support.oracle.com>. Then follow the procedure "Uploading a New Solaris Miniroot Package From SP to Host" in the *Oracle ILOM Administrator's Guide for Configuration and Maintenance*.

You will see the `defect.ilom.fs.miniroot-missing` error if you fail to install a fallback miniroot image. For example:

## Connecting a Terminal Device to the SER MGT Port

Crossover adapters are no longer provided in the shipping kit. To connect the server's SER MGT port to a terminal device, use an RJ-45 cable that is set up for a null modem configuration, in which the transmit and receive signals cross over.

## Some SPARC T7-2 Memory Risers Include Flat-Head Screws

Your SPARC T7-2 server could include a memory riser that is secured with a flat-head screw instead of the standard hex-head screw. If that is the case, use a No. 1 flat-blade screwdriver to service that memory riser.

When you use Oracle VM Server for SPARC, you can assign most of the memory in a SPARC T7 server to logical domains. However, a small portion of the server's memory is preassigned to software components, the hypervisor, and certain I/O devices. Also, if DIMM sparing is active, a portion of memory is reserved to enable the server to operate normally after a DIMM has failed.

To determine which portions of memory are unavailable for logical domains, type:

```
# ldm ls-devices -a mem
```

In the output, look for rows that include `_sys_` in the Bound column. Each of those portions of memory is not available for logical domains.

## javac Fails During Builds on T7 Platforms (19503356)

If you are developing Java applications on SPARC T7 servers, use JDK version 7u72 or later.

## Processes Hang in `nanosleep()` in an Oracle Solaris 10 Guest Domain (19690481)

To install Oracle Solaris 10, you must patch the miniroot of the installation media with KU150400-25, at minimum. You can use the Oracle Solaris 10 JumpStart technology and finish scripts to patch the installed image. Refer to MOS article 1501320.1 for instructions on how to patch a packed miniroot at <https://support.oracle.com>.

If you are unfamiliar with the Oracle Solaris 10 JumpStart technology, contact your support representative or Oracle Support for documentation that describes how to configure an Oracle Solaris 11 zone as an Oracle Solaris 10 1/13 JumpStart server.



## Oracle VTS System Exerciser Disk Test Fails On eUSB Device Due to Delayed taskq (18154963)

Under heavy load, one or more of the embedded USB devices used on SPARC T7 and SPARC M7 servers to accommodate boot archives (not intended for direct customer use) might experience disconnect and reconnect events, with messages similar to this one appearing on the console or in syslog:

## Excessive Messages Generated for a Power Supply Fan Fault (19951780)

When the fan on a power supply fails, fault messages are repeatedly generated and cleared until you replace the power supply.

On the Oracle Solaris console, the repeated messages are similar to this:

## Servers With Missing Miniroot Indicate Cooling in the List of Affected Subsystems (20922954)

This issue was fixed in system firmware 9.5.2.g.

If the miniroot volume is missing in a system, the property `/System/Open_Problems` shows Cooling in the list of affected subsystems:

Cooling should not appear in the Subsystems column because the miniroot volume has nothing to do with the cooling subsystem.

If the miniroot volume is missing from the system, this Cooling message can be safely ignored. In addition, there is no interruption in service.

## Oracle Solaris Should Process `os-root-device` Only Upon Boot (21077998)

After Oracle Solaris is installed on the server with its root file system stored on an iSCSI device that is accessed using IP over Infiniband (IPoIB), if Oracle Solaris is subsequently reinstalled onto other storage devices, booting the newly installed Oracle Solaris instance attempts to mount the root file system from the previously installed iSCSI devices using IPoIB. This situation is due to the continued presence of the `os-root-device` NVRAM variable. For example:

## Logical Domains Virtual Disk Access Failed - Oracle Solaris Cluster Not Coming Up Following Single-Node Reboot (21421237)

This issue appears on the configuration of a two-node Oracle Solaris 3.3 3/13 cluster plus the Oracle Solaris 10 1/13 recommended patch set and quorum devices using the SCSI-2 protocol, configured as Oracle VM Server for SPARC guest domains serviced by Oracle Solaris 11.3 I/O domains.

If one node leaves the cluster, either due to a node halt, panic, reboot event, or loss of cluster interconnect (that is, split brain), delayed SCSI-2 access to a quorum device might lead to a panic on the other cluster node, producing an error similar to this one:

**Workaround:** On guest domains running Oracle Solaris 10 1/13 plus recommended patches, configure the quorum device to use the SCSI-3 protocol.

**Recovery:** If the workaround is unsuccessful, reboot the server. Collect any panic core dumps and contact your service representative.

## Fault Repair From the SPM Does Not Work In a Multi-Hop Between a Control Domain and the Root Domain (21459393)

This issue was fixed in Oracle Solaris 11.3.2.4.

If an I/O domain diagnoses a fault against a device to which it has direct access, the fault information is visible in the primary (that is, control) domain and in Oracle ILOM, as well as in the I/O domain that diagnosed the fault. However, if you attempt to repair the fault from Oracle ILOM, the repair action fails. No error message is displayed, but the fault is still present if you execute subsequent `fmadm` commands from the I/O domain.

---

**Note** - This issue applies to all the repair-related variants of the `fmadm` command `fmadm acquit`, `fmadm repair`, `fmadm repaired`, and `fmadm replaced`.

---

**Recovery:** If you encounter this bug, execute the `fmadm repair` command in the affected I/O domain and the repair operation works as intended.

## sun4v\_pcbe\_enable Warning Appears When Starting a Guest Domain Running Oracle Solaris 10 (21466955)

When running Oracle Solaris 10 in a guest domain, this message appears on the guest domain console upon start up:

Starting with Oracle Solaris 11.3, the `cpustat(1M)` command can monitor the performance counters in SPARC T7 and M7 processors.

## ixgbev Driver Does Not Properly Report a Link State Change to the MAC Layer (21629053)

This issue was fixed in Oracle Solaris 11.3.2.4.

If you reboot the root domain with I/O Resiliency (IOR) enabled (that is, logical domains failure policy set to `ignore`) the I/O domain might fail to initiate an `ixgbev` network interface.

For example, before rebooting non primary root domain (NPRD), type:

## Flash Logging Is Broken in Hypervisor (21646012)

The flash file used to log the console before the SPM is available (saved to /HOST/console/bootlog) does not work properly.

In some rare cases, the boot flash output stops when the hypervisor initiates during start up. The console log is still available once the SPM is started, in /HOST/console/history.

If the server encounters an error when the SPM is down or before the SMP boot sequence finishes, the error might not be logged in the system flash log for later recovery and diagnosis. In addition, the error does not appear in the fault management shell or in show faulty output.

If the system flash log write action collides with a saved LDoms configuration, the LDoms configuration might be overwritten. On the next power-on event, the server boots into factory default mode, and the saved XML configuration file is available on the boot disk.

**Recovery:** To recover the configuration, enable recovery mode and reboot the server.

1. Enable recover mode.

## Solaris OS Fails to Drop to OpenBoot Upon Retirement of SCC Cores and L2DS (21644300, 21772653)

This issue was fixed in Sun System Firmware 9.5.2.

If the primary domain is configured without enough resources (two SCCs or fewer) and correctable errors trigger an FMA retirement action affecting both these SCCs, then the domain



hangs upon reboot. Other domains are not affected, and continue to run normally as long as their own network cards and drives are still available. If an error triggers a domain retirement, you can view the fault using the `fmadm faulty` command.

This issue is the root cause of a domain retirement if the fault is reported on the same cores running the primary domain, and the primary domain hangs upon reboot.

**Workaround:** Ensure that the primary guest domain is assigned two SCCs or more (that is, a minimum of two SCCs and a few additional cores) on the same node.

**Recovery:** Force reset the domain (`reset -f /HOST`) to regain access. Upon reboot the server is unable to access the most recently saved SPM configuration, and reverts to the factory default configuration instead.

## Sun Dual 10GbE SFP+ PCIe Low Profile Adapter Card Faulted With `virtual_TTE_invalid` Error (21694361, 21848425)

CR 21694361 was fixed in Sun System Firmware 9.5.2.

This issue occurs when guest domains configured using PCIe virtual functions are rebooted. In that case, if the guest domain owning the virtual function reboots, the system might generate `TTE_Invalid` errors during the reboot process. These errors are harmless and can be ignored, but they will trigger system faults.

For example, type:

## The Solaris OS Sometimes Fails to Recover Following a QRAP Event (22022572)

This issue is present if `mreg-uc` ereports with the `error-condition` field is set to QRAP.

## Virtual\_TTE\_invalid Error On Assigned IOV Device (22138210)

When the primary or root domain is rebooted, the I/O domain is notified to suspend the assigned virtual functions from domain being rebooted, and resume them when the reboot is complete. However, in some cases the resume notification might be issued prematurely, causing the I/O domain to fail to resume one or more of its assigned virtual functions. This issue occurs only on M7/T7 platforms when the LDOMS failure policy on the I/O domain is not set, or is set to ignore.

Two symptoms indicate this failure:

- A warning on the console in the I/O domain (also logged in `/var/adm/messages`)
- An FMA fault in the primary or root domain to which the physical function is assigned

The warning from the I/O domain console is as follows:

```
WARNING: pxsoft_msi_resume: retry limit exceeded.
```

The FMA fault in the primary or root domain is `fault.io.pciex.device-invreq (PCIEX-8000-8R)`. It includes an `ereport.io.pciex.rc.epkt` error report with the following string:

```
event_name = Virtual_TTE_invalid
```

To list any logged FMA error reports, type:

```
# fmdump -e
```

For a verbose listing which might include the `event_name = Virtual_TTE_invalid` string, type:

```
# fmdump -eV
```

The warning from the I/O domain console is as follows:

```
WARNING: pxsoft_msi_resume: retry limit exceeded.
```

If this issue occurs, one or more assigned virtual functions will no longer work properly in the I/O domain following a primary or root domain reboot. The device drivers for the affected virtual functions cannot process any interrupt signals from the underlying hardware devices.

### Recovery

To recover from this issue and regain the affected virtual functions, reboot the affected I/O domain.

To make the I/O domain more resilient against this issue, configure the following setting in its `/etc/system` file:

```
set pxsoft:pxsoft_resume_max_retries=1024
```

This setting only impacts the resume operations of virtual functions in the I/O domain. You must reboot I/O domain for this new setting to take effect.

### **Mitigation**

This issue occurs if an I/O domain is assigned multiple virtual functions coming from multiple physical functions in the same PCIe bus. You can avoid this issue if you assign virtual functions in the I/O domain only from a single physical function of that PCIe bus.

## **Saved LDOMs Configuration Fails To Boot After Upgrading the Server With an Additional Processor Module (22012359, 22161099)**

---

**Note** - Oracle does not recommend using named device bindings in LDOMs configurations.

---

This issue occurs on a SPARC T7-4 server when you attempt to reboot into an existing LDOMs configuration that uses named resource bindings after you have upgraded the server with an additional processor module. Factory default mode is incorrectly selected during reboot. The server boots into recovery mode, and named resource bindings specified in the previous LDOMs configuration are ignored.

### **Recovery**

If you made a record of your LDOMs configuration before adding the processor module, regenerate the LDOMs configuration as described in the Workaround.

If you need immediate access to the old configuration, follow these steps:

1. Remove the processor module from PM1 and boot the server.  
Refer to the *SPARC T7-4 Server Service Manual* for removal instructions.  
The server reverts to its previous configuration, including the named resource bindings.
2. Make a record specific CPU and memory bindings of the LDOMs configuration.
3. Install the processor module into PM1 and boot the server.



Refer to the *SPARC T7-4 Server Service Manual* for installation instructions.

4. Regenerate the LDOMs configuration.
5. Save the LDOMs configuration and make it the default boot configuration.

Subsequent reboots will use the saved LDOMs configuration.

### Workaround

Regenerate the LDOMs configuration:

1. In ILOM, set the server boot configuration to factory-default.
2. Install the processor module into PM1.  
Refer to the *SPARC T7-4 Server Service Manual* for installation instructions.
3. Reboot the server into the factory default configuration.
4. Create your desired LDOMs configuration.
5. Save the LDOMs configuration and make it the default boot configuration.

Subsequent reboots will use the saved LDOMs configuration.

## T7-x Observes Dropped Characters Running SysFW 9.7.4 (25506535)

If you copy a large amount of text on OBP or Solaris while running SysFW 9.7.4, some the characters might be dropped. In the example below show at OBP, when the text `select /pci@301/pci@1/scsi@0` is copied from line 2 to line 5, the `scsi@0` text is unexpectedly dropped.

Another possible scenario to encounter the issue is to use script to enter a long OBP or Solaris command.

**Workaround:** If you encounter this issue, manually type the commands instead of copying a large amount of text.

**Workaround:** Another option is to disable console logging from Oracle ILOM, however choosing this option means you will not get a log of console output when the SP is degraded for later retrieval. To use this workaround, type this command at the Oracle ILOM prompt:

```
-> set /HOST/console logging=disabled
```

## Do Not Use Certain Hynix 32GB DIMMs on T7 Servers (23284277, 23284255, 23222472)

Do not use Hynix 32GB DIMMs with date codes WW1532 to WW1617 in SPARC T7 series servers.

## Net Install of 11.3SRU21b4 and b5 Panics With NVME Devices Installed (26241738)

SPARC T7 and SPARC S7 servers with NVMe disk drives may experience Oracle Solaris OS panic during Oracle Solaris 11.3 SRU21 OS net install or boot.

For example:
