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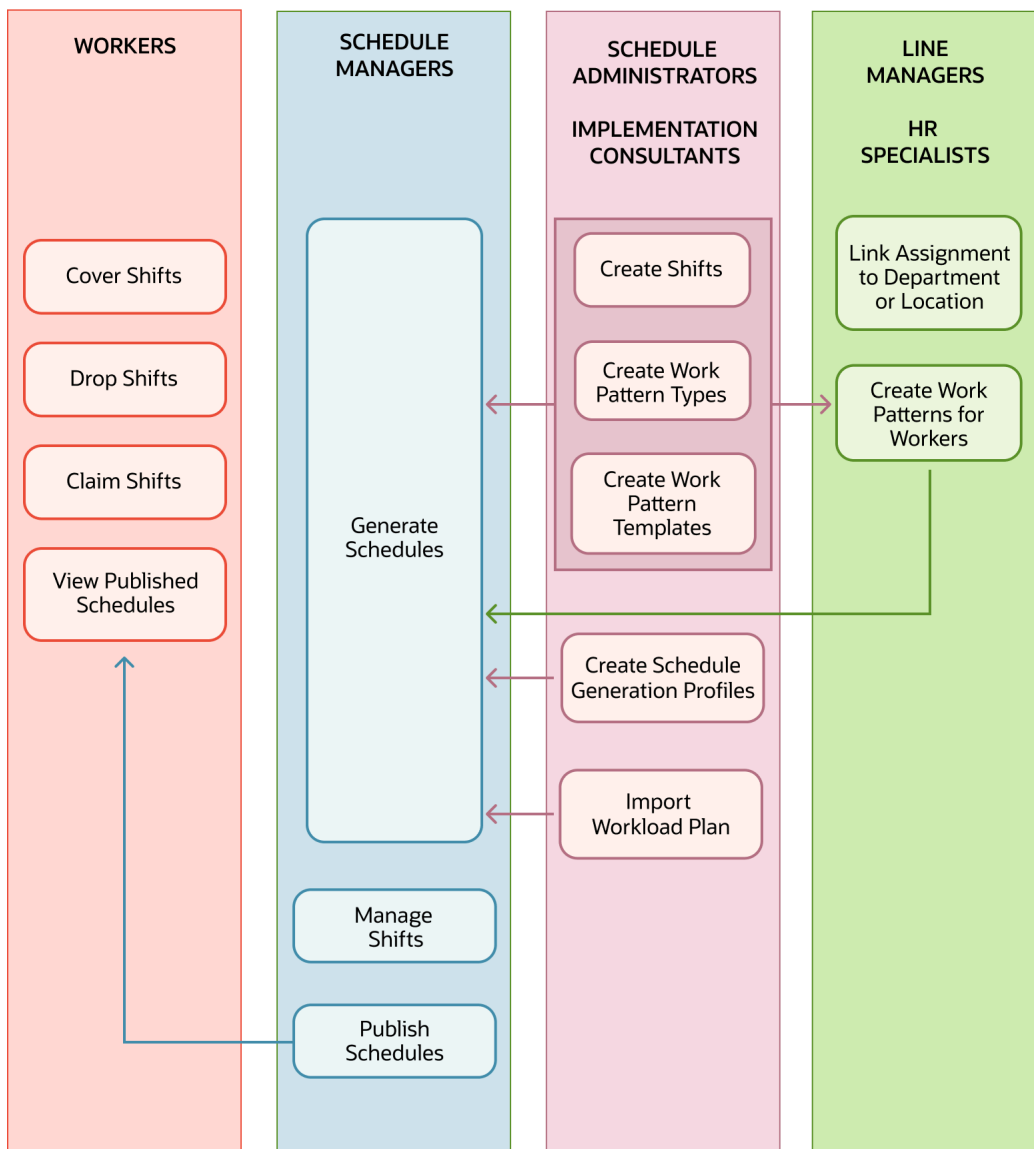
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1 Overview

Overview of Workforce Scheduling

Schedule the appropriate quantity of qualified workers where you need them.

- Implementation consultants and schedule administrators can create a library of shifts, work pattern types, and work pattern templates. They can also create rules to assign the work pattern templates as work patterns to worker assignments. They create schedule generation profiles that link schedule managers to staffing departments and schedule periods. And they can import workload plans.
- Line managers link worker assignments to departments or locations so that they can be assigned work patterns and schedule managers can generate appropriate workforce schedules. The line managers can also manually add work patterns to worker assignments.
- Schedule managers generate and publish workforce schedules, and manage schedule shifts to optimize worker resources.
- Workers can use their calendars to view their published schedules, claim open shifts, and submit requests to cover, and drop shifts.



Here's the workforce scheduling cycle:

1. Import your workload.
2. Generate draft and planned schedules.
3. Self-schedule shifts.
4. Balance the schedules.
5. Create more shift opportunities.
6. Publish the final schedules.
7. Fill opportunities and shift swaps.
8. Approve or deny submitted shift requests, such as cover, drop, and withdraw claim.



Workforce Scheduling Setup and Maintenance Tasks

You can address simple to complex scheduling methods with your workforce scheduling configurations. Configure Workforce Scheduling to support your policies by completing these tasks in the order listed.

Here’s how to find tasks:

- 1. In the Setup and Maintenance work area, on the Tasks panel tab, click Search.
- 2. On the Search page, search for and select the task.

2 Extended and Common Lookups

Configure Key Lookups for Workforce Scheduling

If you're using scheduling groups with your staffing plans, you need to configure the lookup. Optionally configure shift categories, such as adding DAY, EVENING, NIGHT, and 24H_ONCALL. And optionally

1. In the Setup and Maintenance work area, search for and click the **Manage Common Lookups** task.
2. On the Manage Common Lookups page, search for and select the relevant lookup type.
 - ORA_PER_SCHEDULING_GROUP: Categorize jobs with the skills needed for a specific workforce scheduling shift.
 - ORA_HWM_PREMIUM_SHIFT_CODE: Further qualify premium shift types for workforce scheduling.
 - ORA-HTS-ENT-SHIFTS-CATEGORY: Let schedulers more easily filter the shifts library for relevant shift, such as Day, Evening, Night, or 24h On-call shifts.
 - ORA-HTS-SHIFT-CHANGE-REASON: Add reasons for cover and drop shift requests, such as Approved absence, Childcare, or Medical emergency.
3. Add 1 lookup code for each shift category or change reason. The Meaning value is what people see in the drop-down lists and as read-only values, so provide concise, meaningful values. Use descriptions to add fuller explanations for the meanings that implementors and application administrators can review when managing the lookup.
4. Save your changes.

Add Shift Types for Workforce Scheduling

Ensure workforce schedule accuracy by defining and managing shift types for your workloads and shifts, such as PRECEPTOR, TRAINEE, MEETING, and LIGHT_DUTY. This extended lookup is delivered with the On-call and Work codes. The extended name for Work is Regular.

Shift types can be on-call or work, and work shift types also have productivity percentages.

- HCM integration specialists can import workload with shift types.
- Schedulers can generate schedules based on shift type, for example, generating on-call schedules that have only shifts with the On-Call shift type. Schedulers can also see and edit the shift type.

Coverage variances on various workforce scheduling pages account for the scheduled productivity set with the work shift types.

1. In the Setup and Maintenance work area, search for and click the **Manage Extended Lookup Codes** task.
2. On the Extended Lookup Codes page, scroll to and select the Workforce Schedule Shift Types lookup type.
3. Add your codes. You can also edit the extended names for the delivered codes. People see the extended names on the various shift and scheduling pages, so make sure the names make sense for your schedulers and workers.
4. Review the additional information for the delivered shift types, and add it for any shift types you added.
 - The context value for all workforce schedule shift types needs to be Workforce Schedule Shift Type Properties.

- By default, the Percentage of productivity value is 100. Here are example changes that you might make:
 - Preceptor: 80
 - Trainee: 20
 - Light duty: 50

5. Save your changes.

3 Approval Configurations

Align Approval Workflows for Drop, Cover, and Swap Shift Requests with Organizational Policies

Align Approve Shift Cover, Approve Shift Drop, Approve Shift Swap, and Approve Shift Request processes with your organization's policies, including whether to bypass approvals. Use the **Tools > Transaction Console** task to review, configure, and test the rules.

Configure an Expiration Policy for Swap Shift Approvals

To make sure that swap shift approvals are completed within a certain period, you can configure an expiration policy. By default, managers with area of responsibility for the department associated with the requested shift swap get the approval notifications.

1. In the Setup and Maintenance work area, search for and select the **Manage Task Configurations for Human Capital Management** task.
2. In BPM Worklist, on the Task Configuration tab, search for and select **SwapShiftApprovalTask**.
3. On the Tasks to be configured toolbar, click the **Edit** task icon.
4. On the Deadlines subtab, set a due date, if needed.
5. Set the expiration policy.

- a. Expand the Expiration Settings section.
 - b. To ensure that all approvals are completed within a certain period, select **Task Level**.
 - c. Enter a duration.
 - d. Leave the **Expire only** option selected.
 - e. Optionally select the **Exclude Saturday and Sunday** checkbox.
6. On the Tasks to be configured toolbar, click the **Commit** task icon.

4 Notifications and Alerts

Notify Workers and Managers About New, Updated, and Deleted Work Patterns

Workforce scheduling provides three alerts that you can configure using the Alerts Composer tool. By default, they notify a worker when they've a new, update, or deleted work pattern. You can change them to also notify the worker's manager.

Alert Template	Description
HTS Work Pattern Created	Notification to worker that they've a new work pattern assigned.
HTS Work Pattern Updated	Notification to worker that their work pattern was updated.
HTS Work Pattern Deleted	Notification to worker that their work pattern was deleted.

Alert Notifications for Workforce Scheduling

These notifications keep workers and schedule managers informed about the generated schedules, upcoming publish schedule dates, and the self-scheduling process. You can review and edit these delivered alerts using **Tools > Alerts Composer**.

Sent by Process Workforce Scheduling Alerts

Schedule the Process Workforce Scheduling Alerts process to run at appropriate intervals for the hospital schedules, such as daily or weekly. Use the **Tools > Scheduled Processes** task and the Process Workforce Scheduling Alerts process.

5 Shifts, Work Pattern Types, Work Patterns, and Notifications

Shifts in Workforce Scheduling

A shift is a defined block of work used to create work patterns. You also use them to identify operating shifts for schedule generation profiles, and when managing workforce schedules.

Create shifts using the **My Client Groups > Workforce Scheduling > Shifts** quick action. You can also use the **Setup and Maintenance Workforce Deployment Workforce Scheduling Enterprise Shifts** task.

A shift includes a name, work duration, and start time. It can include a total break duration. The work and break durations decide the total duration. For example, you create the Union Day shift with these settings:

- The start time is 8:00 am.
- The work duration is 8 hours.
- The total break duration is 60 minutes.
- The calculated total duration is 9 hours.

Work patterns that use this shift could include two 15-minute paid coffee breaks and one 30-minute unpaid meal break.

CAUTION: Be sure to enter times and durations that are in 15-minute intervals, such as 15, 30, and 45.

When appropriate you can let workers exceed their FTE without any validation warnings for the worker or scheduler by configuring shifts that allow overtime. Exceeding FTE without validation warnings happens when workers accept open shifts or requests to cover shifts that allow overtime. It also applies when they claim shifts that allow overtime during self-scheduling.

You can encourage workers to work certain shifts by including an incentive amount when configuring or assigning the shift. And to help people more quickly find appropriate shifts, include a category, such as Day, Evening, or Night.

Tip: Any reports that you create that include shift start times, end times, and work durations will show the values in only minutes because that's how they're stored. Only the applicable pages include calculations to convert stored minutes over 59 into hours and minutes.

Work Pattern Types in Workforce Scheduling

You can use duration, start and end times, flexible days, and flexible days and times work pattern types to identify the shift period type to use in work patterns.

You create these work pattern types using the **Setup and Maintenance > Workforce Deployment > Workforce Scheduling > Work Pattern Type** task.

Type	Description	Typical Use
Duration	These patterns define the work period using a duration, such as 8 hours on fixed workdays.	Hourly administrative and support workers where the duration and days are required, but the time is flexible
Start and end times	These patterns define the work period using start and end times, such as 8:00 am and 5:00 pm on fixed workdays.	Workers in fixed department roles that don't correspond to patient volume variability, such as management roles
Flexible days	These patterns define the work period using start and end times, such as 8:00 am and 5:00 pm and support flexible working days over a multiweek cycle.	Workers using only self-scheduling periods or open shifts
Flexible days and times	These patterns define the work period using a duration, such as a maximum daily duration of 8 hours, and support flexible working days over a multiweek cycle.	Workers using only self-scheduling periods or open shifts

Flexible working days are the days when the worker needs to be available to work. To derive time totals and absence information, you need to use duration and start and end time shifts and work patterns. That information can't be derived from flexible shifts and patterns.

Work pattern types also identify the type and nature of any included breaks. For example, breaks can occur at a fixed time, any time during a specified range, or any time during the shift. And they can be paid or unpaid.

CAUTION: Be sure to break durations are in 15-minute intervals, such as 15, 30, 45, or 60 minutes.

Work Pattern Templates in Workforce Scheduling

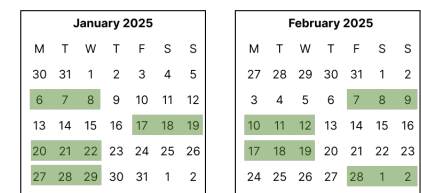
To identify the shifts framework for groups of workers during a specific cycle, create work pattern templates. The shifts can have specific start and end times or durations for specific days. Or they can be flexible.

You can use work pattern templates to create work patterns for individual users, or assign them to workers who meet specific criteria. Create work pattern templates using the **My Client Groups > Workforce Scheduling > Work Pattern Templates** quick action. You can also use the **Setup and Maintenance > Workforce Deployment > Workforce Scheduling > Work Pattern Templates** task.

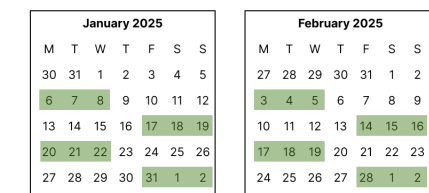
After creating templates, you can assign them using assignment rules. You need to schedule the Process Events process to generate the configured assignments, if the process isn't already scheduled.

You can configure a cycle for work pattern templates that use a duration or start and end times work type. You need to consider the schedule period when setting the template cycle. For example, you have a schedule period of 6 weeks. For the templates that correspond to those schedules, it would seem that you can set up templates with a 2, 3, or 6 week cycle depending on the pattern. But a set of workers needs to work Friday through Sunday of their middle week, in a 3-week cycle. You can achieve this pattern in your 6-week schedule period by entering a template cycle of either 3 or 6 weeks as shown in the first calendar set, but not 2 weeks, as shown in the second calendar set.

For multiweek templates, you can also set a shift to be a nonworking week. This framework is used to decide the workers' default contractual schedules.

Assigned work pattern templates don't show on worker Work Patterns pages. After assigning a template, you need to generate the workforce schedule that should include the assignees and confirm they're included appropriately.

Work Patterns in Workforce Scheduling

To identify the shifts framework for a worker during a specific cycle, create a work pattern for their work assignment. The shifts can have specific start and end times or durations for specific days. Or they can be flexible.

For multiweek patterns, you can also set a shift to be a nonworking week. This framework is used to decide the worker's default contractual schedule. Here's an example of how the same assignment might vary depending on the work pattern type.

Cycle	Start and End Times	Flexible Days and Times
Week 1	Work Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 8:00 am to noon	Can work Monday, Wednesday, and Friday for a maximum of 4 hours

Cycle	Start and End Times	Flexible Days and Times
	Work Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday from noon to 4:00 pm All the shifts include a 15-minute paid break that can be taken any time during the shift	Can also work Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday for a maximum of 6 hours All the shifts include a 15-minute paid break that can be taken any time during the shift
Week 2	Work Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday from 2:00 pm to 8:00 pm. Includes a 15-minute paid coffee break at 4:00 pm, and a 30-minute unpaid meal break at 6:00 pm	Can work on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday for a maximum of 6 hours Can take a 15-minute paid coffee break between noon and 3:00 pm and a 30-minute unpaid meal break between 5:00 pm and 7:00 pm

Nonflexible work patterns are validated to ensure the weekly hours total to the standard working hours defined for the worker assignment. For example, if a worker has an assignment-level FTE of 40 hours, then their work pattern needs to total to 40 hours for any week. Flexible work patterns aren't validated.

To create a work pattern, use the **My Client Groups > Workforce Scheduling > Work Patterns** quick action. On the Work Patterns page, search for and select a specific work assignment to see the existing inactive and active work patterns. You can also add other work patterns here. Or you can load work patterns for worker assignments using HCM Data Loader.

Tips

As a line manager or HR specialist, you can assign work patterns to only the workers you've permissions to access.

A worker's work assignment can have only one work pattern active at a time and work pattern dates can't overlap. The work assignment can have gaps between when one work pattern ends and another pattern starts.

The fields that you see when adding shifts depend on the selected work pattern type. For example, start and end times types include time fields while duration types don't. You can add existing shifts to the work pattern or create the appropriate shift while you're creating the work pattern.

For flexible work patterns, the days or days and times are when the person needs to be available to work that assignment. You don't need to schedule them to work on all the specified days and at all the specified times. For example, Kris's manager schedules Kris to work the week 1 pattern on Mondays and Fridays from 9:00 am to noon. They don't schedule Kris to work at all on Wednesdays.

6 Schedule Generation and Management

Schedule Generation Profiles for Workforce Scheduling

As a schedule administrator, you can define schedule generation profiles that identify the staffing departments and policies governing specific scheduling processes. You can also set scheduling rules to make sure schedules comply with policies and regulations.

Schedule managers then use their profiles to generate the workforce schedule for their workers according to their work patterns.

You manage these profiles using the Schedule Generation Profiles quick action for **My Client Groups > Workforce Scheduling**. You can also use the Workforce Schedule Generation Profiles task in the Setup and Maintenance work area. The task is in the Workforce Deployment offering, Workforce Scheduling functional area.

You can save a draft of the schedule generation profile and finish it over time. When you're ready, you can create the profile so that schedulers can use it as soon as it becomes active.

You can create more profiles by duplicating an existing profile, and you can edit and delete profiles as long as no schedule was generated using it. As soon as a profile is used to generate schedules, you can't change or delete existing staffing departments. But you can add more staffing departments.

Create a separate schedule generation profile for each unique combination of these settings:

- Schedule plan
- Operating shifts
- Schedulers and staffing departments
- Included or excluded jobs and positions
- Scheduling rules
- Shift time deviation rules

Basic and Schedule Plan Information

When you create a schedule generation profile, you enter basic details, such as the name, identifying code, active start and end dates, and a description. For the active start date, pick the date for the first day of the work week and the start of the first cycle. For example, the first day of the week is Monday and the cycle should start the first full week in 2025, so you pick 6-Jan-2025. This date is used to populate the read-only Start Date and First Day of Week fields of the Schedule Plan tab, Schedule section.

Schedule Periods

You define the schedule periods, including how many weeks are in the schedule cycle, the day start time for your staffing departments, and which 2 consecutive days to consider as the weekend.

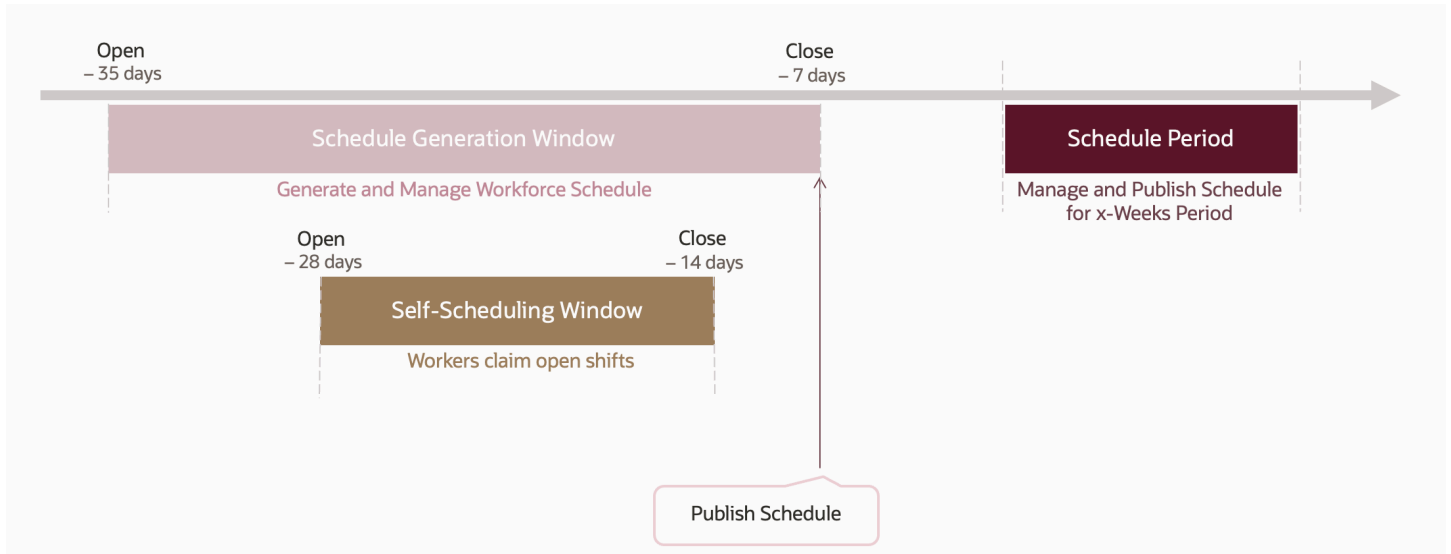
Scheduling Windows

You define the schedule generation window and the optional self-scheduling window contained within it. Schedule managers start working on their schedules when the schedule generation window opens. They publish the schedules to

their workers after the self-scheduling window officially closes, if defined, and before the schedule generation window closes. Workers can claim open shifts during the self-scheduling window, and scheduling managers can assign the requested shifts.

You define the schedule generation window and optional self-scheduling window by specifying how many days before the schedule period starts to open and close each window. For example, you create a profile with these windows:

- The schedule generation window opens 90 days before the schedule period starts. And the window closes 30 days before the schedule period starts.
- The self-scheduling window opens 60 days before the schedule period opens. And the window closes 45 days before the schedule period starts. The self-scheduling window start and end dates need to be inside the schedule generation window start and end dates.



Coverage Panel Intervals

You can add day intervals for the coverage variance panel that schedulers open below their schedules. These intervals help them identify where they're overstaffed, understaffed, or staffed appropriately. You can also specify whether to send reminder notifications to schedulers to finish their schedules for publishing.

Operating Shifts, Schedulers, and Staffing

You add the shifts to use when generating the open shifts and the worker schedules. You add the schedule managers who will use the profile to generate and publish schedules for the added staffing departments. And you can specify whether schedulers can schedule floating resources. Scheduler start dates default to the schedule generation profile start date. If a scheduler will start managing the generated schedules in the future, overwrite the default start with the appropriate date.

CAUTION: You also need to *assign the areas of responsibility* for each scheduler in the profile. Use the Schedule Manager responsibility type and Approval usage. This usage ensures the schedulers get the relevant self-service notifications. The scope needs to include the departments and locations that are in their schedule generation profiles. For example, a scheduler's profile and responsibility scope both have the Maternity department for Miami, but not Los Angeles. Thus they manage only the Maternity, Miami schedule.

Jobs and Positions

You can optionally identify specific jobs and positions to include or exclude when generating schedules for the specified staffing departments. You can't include some jobs and positions and exclude others. You can only include or exclude all. If you don't add any jobs or positions, the profile can be used to generate schedules for all jobs and positions.

Scheduling Rules

You can enable and set these scheduling rules:

- The maximum consecutive days workers can work
- The maximum number of weekends workers can work in a schedule period
- A minimum rest period between the ending shift of 1 day and starting shift of the next day

Shift Time Deviation Rules

You can specify shift time deviation rules to use in time and labor schedule deviation calculations and validations.

- A grace period
- Start early and late periods
- End early and late periods

Workload Management for Workforce Scheduling

As a schedule manager, you can review the detailed workload requirements on read-only workload pages. You can see the consolidated workload data for the baseline and current real-time workload requirements for each job, competency, and shift type. For more focused review, you can filter by job role.

The workload baseline, adjusted, and actual requirements are imported using HCM Data loader and the Workload Plan object. The imported information is then processed using the Workload Consolidation process. You can view the results of the consolidation on the workload management pages and in the coverage by variance drawer of specific workforce schedules.

Open the Workload Management page using the **My Client Groups > Workload Management** quick action.

Generate Workforce Schedules

As a schedule manager, generate workforce schedules for workers in the specified staffing departments that you support. Use the My Client Groups > Workforce Schedules quick action.

On the Workforce Schedules page, the Generate Schedule button opens the Generate schedule drawer where you select the appropriate schedule generation profile, staffing departments, scheduling period, and schedules.

Generate schedules using one of these options:

Schedule Generation Option	Description
Only fixed time work patterns	Generate the schedules for only workers who have fixed days and time work patterns.
Open shifts and fixed time work patterns	Generate the schedules for only workers who have fixed days and time work patterns. Then generate open shifts that match the remaining workload. Workers can claim these open shifts during the self-scheduling period, and schedule managers can assign them.
Automatically assigned	Generate schedules that match the workload for all workers given their work patterns, their weekly FTE hours and the configured scheduling rules.

Note: The workforce schedules you can generate depend on the staffing departments for schedule generation profiles with you as a scheduler, and your area of responsibility.

When the generate schedule process runs, it checks the schedule against these items:

- Scheduling rules set in the schedule generation profile
- Workers' work patterns
- Overlapping shifts

- Approved absences
- Department assignments
- Overstaffing and understaffing coverage variances

To apply these rules correctly, the process also considers the previous and next schedules for the affected workers. For example, while checking that the rest period between work shifts is honored, the process needs to see if the worker was scheduled to work the day before this schedule period starts.

Manage Workforce Schedules

Manage the workforce schedules for the staffing departments you support using the My Client Groups > Workforce Schedules quick action. For example, view a schedule and any associated notes, add open shifts, assign shifts, publish future schedules, and unpublish schedules.

You can see the shifts organized by job or worker, for the day, week, or 2 weeks on the schedule page. And you can view critical information when you hover your mouse over a shift. You can also open the shift details drawer by right-clicking and selecting shift details.

To review Job view coverage variance details for each day, in both 1-week and 2-week timelines, open the coverage variance drawer under the schedule. You can review the number of hours or workers you're overstaffed or understaffed for each job by daily intervals. Overstaffing and understaffing variance hours appear in red to help you identify schedule gaps.

To review schedule metrics for workers with shifts, such as their FTE, total scheduled regular hours for the metrics range, scheduled on-call hours, and total scheduled hours for the whole schedule period, open the drawer under the Worker view. For floating resources, total scheduled includes all departments their scheduled for, not just the department the schedule is for. Total scheduled doesn't include on-call hours, absences, or paid breaks. If the total scheduled hours don't match the worker's FTE in the metric range, the hours are highlighted in red.

You can validate the schedule against these items:

- Scheduling rules set in the schedule generation profile
- Workers' work patterns
- Overlapping shifts
- Absences that are approved or pending approval
- Department assignments
- Overstaffing and understaffing coverage variances

To apply these rules correctly, the process also considers the previous and next schedules for the affected workers. For example, while checking that the rest period between work shifts is honored, the process needs to see if the worker was scheduled to work the day before this schedule period starts.

Use the Jobs view **More Actions > Validate Schedule** option.

You're limited in what you can do with shifts during the self-scheduling windows. For example, you can't publish the schedule during this window or change worker-claimed shifts.

Note: The workforce schedules you can access depend on the staffing departments for schedule generation profiles with you as a scheduler, and your area of responsibility.

Tips

- Shifts with day start times that fall on the previous or next day are marked on the calendar day with an * (asterisk).
- Public holidays defined for locations and using geographical trees show on workforce schedules, as do pending and approved absences. So do shifts with swap, drop, and cover requests. You can access pending approval details from the shift details drawer.
- Color bars on the left side of shifts identify assignment sources and if the worker is a floating resource:
 - Black: Automatically staffed as part of the schedule generation process
 - Green: Assigned worker is floating from another department
 - Teal: Worker assigned the shift to them self
 - Lavender: Scheduler assigned the shift

7 Worker Self-Scheduling

Overview of Workforce Self-Scheduling

You can proactively manage your workforce schedules by selecting regular and on-call shifts that align with your preferences and availability. Do this during self-scheduling windows and after a schedule is published using the Calendar task for **Me > Workforce Scheduling**.

You'll get notifications that a self-scheduling window is opening shortly, that the window is open, that it's closing soon, and that it's closed. You'll also get notifications if new shifts become available for a published schedule.

You can withdraw requests to claim shifts during the self-scheduling window. You can drop shifts and ask others to cover shifts for you during the schedule period. You can also accept coverage requests from others.

You can swap your assigned shift with up to three other shifts, if your shift start time is at least 72 hours away. If your request gets declined and there's still time, you can try again with different shifts. Otherwise, you need to work your original shift. You can also withdraw each swap shift request separately.

Overview of Availability Preferences in Workforce Scheduling

Manage your availability preferences, such as working more hours or picking up shifts that let you work overtime. Or define a rest day when you'd prefer not to work. Preferences can be one-time or repeat weekly on specific days.

Use the Calendar task on **Me > Workforce Scheduling**.

You can view your availability preferences directly in your calendar. When you show Availability preferences and Open shifts, you get to see if your additional availability matches with open shifts. This lets you quickly make informed decisions about picking up an open shift. Similarly, if you requested a rest day, you'll see it directly in your calendar alongside other relevant schedule and absence information.

When you're claiming a shift during a self-scheduling period, if you set a rest day, you'll see when the shift overlaps with the rest day. You can still claim the shift and override the rest day submitted, as appropriate.
