From Office applications, you access Oracle Smart View for Office functionality through ribbon commands.

The **Smart View** ribbon contains commands for connecting to various data source providers, launching the Home panel and Options panel, performing operations such as Refresh or Submit Data, and viewing sheet information and health check parameters. The Smart View ribbon is always present.

When you connect to a data source provider (other than Oracle Hyperion Reporting and Analysis), the corresponding provider ribbon is displayed. Each ribbon displays only the commands supported for that data source provider and mode. For example, in the following illustration for Oracle Hyperion Planning, when you access a Planning form, the Planning ribbon is displayed; when you enter ad hoc analysis (see Ad Hoc Analysis), the Planning Ad Hoc ribbon is displayed.

Smart View Panel

From the Smart View Panel, you can manage data source connections, access data and task lists, and create reports.

The Smart View Panel, opened from the Smart View ribbon, is displayed by default on the right side of the Microsoft Office application. You can move, resize, or close the Smart View Panel from the down arrow in the title bar.

The Smart View Panel contains the following panes:

- Home—A panel that displays links to Shared Connections and Private Connections as well as a list of recently used items—ad hoc grids, forms, and tasks lists—that you can click to establish a connection.
- **Shared Connections**—A drop-down menu of available connections from Oracle Hyperion Shared Services and a tree view of the contents of the currently selected connection.
- **Private Connections**—A drop-down menu of available connections saved on the local computer and a tree view of the contents of the currently selected connection. You can also enter a URL to connect directly to a data source here.
- Task Lists—A tree list of tasks from which you can manage your tasks. This pane opens only when you select a task list from Shared Connections or Private Connections.



- Action Panel—A list of operations available based on the selection in the shared connection, private connection, or task list tree.
- **Document Contents**—A task pane in the Smart View Panel that provides a view of the connections and content existing in the current Office document. For more information, see Using the Document Contents pane.
- **Other**—If the administrator has installed and configured your Oracle Smart View for Office system with extensions, there may be other panels; for example, Oracle BI EE or Narrative Reporting Home.

Installing Smart View

In the Help Center, select your Smart View release, then select *Oracle Smart View for Office Installation and Configuration Guide*, and then locate the "Installing Browser Add-ons" topic in the "Installing Smart View" chapter.

Also, take note of the information in Windows, Office, and Smart View Locale Settings when installing Smart View.

Windows, Office, and Smart View Locale Settings

On your Smart View client machine, the following locale settings should match:

- Smart View language option
- Microsoft Office language
- Windows Regional Settings
- Windows operating system

Running Smart View in a language other than the language of the machine's Windows operating system, system locale, or Office language, may result in incorrect data being returned. For example, if the Windows operating system, system locale, and Office language are English, and you run Smart View in Russian, reports or chart data may display incorrectly.

Ensure that on your Smart View client machine, the locale settings noted above match.

Shared Connections and Private Connections

You connect to data sources through shared or private connections in Oracle Smart View for Office.

Generally, you can connect to one provider data source per sheet. However, for the following providers, you can connect to multiple instances of the same data source type per sheet, slide, or document: Planning, Planning Modules, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, FreeForm, Financial Consolidation and Close, Tax Reporting, Oracle Essbase cloud and on-premises, Oracle Analytics Cloud, and Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition.

As a Smart View user, you may have access to shared connections, private connections, or both.

Starting in release 20.200, you can access your connections using vanity URLs, also referred to as custom URLs.

Shared Connections

You can create shared to connections to Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud sources and on-premises Oracle Hyperion Enterprise Performance Management Workspace sources.

For EPM Workspace connections, you can connect to multiple provider types per connection. Figure 3 illustrates this type of connection.

For EPM Cloud sources, there are two ways to use a shared connection:

One cloud provider per shared connection.

For example, shared Connection "A" connects you to your Planning business process instance; shared Connection "B" connects you to your Financial Consolidation and Close business process instance.



Figure 1 illustrates this type of connection.

 Multiple EPM Cloud providers per shared connection. In this case, all supported cloud providers must reside on the same domain.

For example, your organization is hosting Planning, Financial Consolidation and Close, and Tax Reporting on the same domain. Shared Connection "C" connects you to all three business process instances.

In Smart View, this type of connection applies only to these EPM Cloud business processes:

- * Planning
- * Planning Modules
- * FreeForm
- * Financial Consolidation and Close
- * Tax Reporting
- * Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management
- Narrative Reporting
- Account Reconciliation

Figure 2 illustrates this type of connection.

EPM Cloud Service Administrators: See *Administering Planning*, Connecting Environments in EPM Cloud for information on setting up multiple providers on a single shared connection.

Shared connections are either:

- Accessed from a central server or host location and available to multiple users through the Smart View Panel.
- Stored on each Smart View client machine *or* on a web server in an XML file created by an administrator. The connections in the XML file are then available to the user through shared connections in the Smart View Panel.

See Accessing Shared Connections from an XML File in the Oracle Smart View for Office Installation and Configuration Guide for information on preparing and distributing this XML file.

You cannot edit or rename shared connections, but you can save them as private connections, which you can edit and rename.

Private Connections

Private connections are those that you create by saving a shared connection to your local computer, by using a wizard, or by entering a URL to a provider data source. When you create a private connection, it becomes the active connection.

Figure 4 illustrates this type of connecting, showing connections created using a wizard and connections created using the Quick Connection method.



Note:

When working with Oracle Analytics Cloud, Oracle BI EE, Oracle Essbase, and Narrative Reporting, you must use a private connection, or add the private connection information to a shared connection XML file, as described in Accessing Shared Connections from an XML File in the Oracle Smart View for Office Installation and Configuration Guide.

Examples of Shared and Private Connections

Following are examples of the various types of connections and how they would appear in the Smart View Panel. This will give you an idea of what to expect when you're connecting to data sources in Smart View.

• Shared connection to a single EPM Cloud data source.

In the example drop-down menu in Figure 1, the user has access to a connection to a Planning data source (this is the **EPM Cloud** option) and to Financial Reporting (the **Reporting Settings** option).

• Shared connection to multiple EPM Cloud data sources on the same domain.

In the example drop-down menu in Figure 2, the user has access to multiple supported EPM Cloud data sources; for example, FinPlan connects to a Planning data source, FinClose connects to a Financial Consolidation and Close data source, Wrkforce connects to a Workforce data source, Recon connects to an Account Reconciliation data source, and so on.

Your service administrator specifies the data source names you will see in the drop-down menu.

Private connections

The example drop-down menu in Figure 4 shows two connections, for Essbase and Oracle Hyperion Financial Management, that were created using the Private Connection wizard. The remaining connections displayed were created using the Quick Connection method and include, among others, connections to Oracle Hyperion Planning and Essbase.




Figure 3-4 Various Private Connections

Guidelines for Shared and Private Connections

 Starting in Release 20.200, you can use custom URLs, or vanity URLs to access data source providers from Smart View. To configure your custom URL, you use a third-party link shortener, such as T.ly, Bitly, Rebrandly, TinyUrl, or is.gd, or an open source solution, such as YOURLS. Then, depending on the configuration, use the custom URL as your shared connection, private connection, or quick connection.

Note:

- When using a vanity URL, there is the possibility of transmitting sensitive data to your third-party link shortening vendor. For example, when performing a refresh or a submit, you may be transmitting password information during the transaction.
- The extension installation and update command, Check for Updates, New installs, and Uninstalls, in the Options dialog, Extensions tab is not supported when logged in using a vanity URL.

Administrators or Smart View users can create vanity URLs. For detailed information on creating vanity URLs, see the documentation from the third-party link shortener of your choice.

- For some data sources, you can connect to only one data source per worksheet. Exceptions and other connection guidelines are noted below.
- Planning, Planning Modules, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, FreeForm, Financial Consolidation and Close, and Tax Reporting:

You can connect to multiple databases on a single worksheet, as described in Changing Connections in EPM Cloud Multiple-Grid Worksheets.

- Essbase cloud and on-premises:
 - When connecting to Oracle Essbase cloud, you must use a private connection.
 - You can connect to multiple Essbase databases on a single worksheet, as described in Changing Connections in Multiple-Grid Worksheets.



- If external authentication is disabled, for security reasons, you must provide your user name and password each time you connect to a different application on the same server.
- Once connected to an Essbase database, users can view database notes associated with the database. To display database notes, from the Smart View Panel, right-click the name of the Essbase database, and then select **Database Note**. You cannot edit these database notes from Smart View. Database notes can be implemented in VBA by using the VBA function, HypGetDatabaseNote (see HypGetDatabaseNote in the Oracle Smart View for Office Developer's Guide).
- Oracle Analytics Cloud and Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition
 - When connecting to Oracle Analytics Cloud or Oracle BI EE, you must use a private connection.
 - You can connect to multiple catalogs on a single sheet, as described in Connecting to Multiple Oracle Analytics Cloud Data Sources and Connecting to Multiple Oracle BI EE Data Sources.
- When connecting to Narrative Reporting, you must use a private connection.

Connecting Using a Shared Connection

Use the procedure in this topic to connect to supported data sources using a shared connection.

To connect to a data source using a shared connection:

1. From the Smart View ribbon, click **Panel**.

Note:
To open a recently used item, click an item under Recently Used, and
then skip to step 3. You can click $\stackrel{\frown}{=}$ to pin items to this list.

- From the Smart View Panel or from the drop-down menu displayed when you click the down arrow next to , select Shared Connections.
- 3. In the **Connect to Data Source** dialog or the **Login** dialog, enter your user name and password.

Note:

- When accessing a cloud data source, the business process domain name appears next to Welcome in the Login dialog. If you need to change domains, click the **change domain** link, enter the new cloud Identity Domain name, and click **Go**. Then proceed with entering your user name and password.
- Depending on how your administrator configured Oracle Smart View for Office, you may or may not be required to enter your user name and password as you change data providers and Office applications.
- 4. In the Shared Connections panel, in the field labeled Select Server to proceed, select a data source type from the drop-down menu.

Once you select a data source type, the connections available for the selected data source are displayed in a tree list in the Smart View Panel.

5. In the Smart View Panel, navigate the tree list, and then double-click the item—form, ad hoc grid, Smart Slice, task list, or catalog-that you want to open.

You can also open items by right-clicking them and making a selection; or selecting an option from the Action Panel at the bottom of the Smart View Panel.

6. Optional: After the item is opened on the grid, to easily locate it in the tree view, click the

```
arrow next to real and select Locate Worksheet Connection.
```

Note:

Depending on how the administrator configured Smart View, you may or may not be required to enter your user name and password as you change data providers and Office applications.

Connecting Using a Private Connection

Use the procedure in this topic to connect to supported data sources using a private connection.

To connect to a data source using a private connection:

1. From the Smart View ribbon, click **Panel**.

Note:

To open a recently used item, click an item under **Recently Used**, and then skip to step 4. You can click 📁 to pin items to this list.

2. From the Smart View Panel or from the drop-down menu displayed when you click the down arrow next to Δ , select **Private Connections**.



3. In the Private Connections panel, in the field labeled **Select Server or enter Provider url to proceed**, select a connection from the drop-down menu.

Alternatively, enter a connection URL in the field, and then press Enter. For examples of the URL syntax to use, see Private Connection URL Syntax.

 In the Connect to Data Source dialog or the Login dialog, enter your user name and password.

Note:

- When accessing a cloud data source, the business process domain name appears next to Welcome in the Login dialog. If you need to change domains, click the change domain link, enter the new cloud Identity Domain name, and click Go. Then proceed with entering your user name and password.
- Depending on how your administrator configured Oracle Smart View for Office, you may or may not be required to enter your user name and password as you change data providers and Office applications.
- 5. In the Smart View Panel navigate the tree list, and then double-click the item form, ad hoc grid, Smart Slice, task list, or catalog—that you want to open.

You can also open items by right-clicking them and making a selection; or selecting an option from the Action Panel at the bottom of the Smart View Panel.

6. Optional: After the item is opened on the grid, to easily locate it in the tree view,

click the arrow next to 🟓 and select Locate Worksheet Connection.

Setting the Active Connection for a Sheet

You can connect to different data source providers on the different sheets within a workbook by setting the active connection for each sheet.

To set the active connection for a worksheet:

1. Create a named connection by saving a shared or private connection as a private connection.

This process is described in Saving Connections as Private Connections. Once these connections are available to you, you can set the active connection for a sheet to one of these private, or *named*, connections, as shown in the following steps.

2. Open a workbook and connect to a named private connection.

Optionally, you can begin without connecting. You will be asked for your login credentials in the next step.

3. In the Smart View ribbon, select **Connections**, then **Active Connections**, and, if it is not already selected, then select the check box next to the connection name.

If you did not connect in the previous step, then you will not see a connection name in the **Active Connections** list.

If you do not see the connection name in the **Active Connections** list, then select **Connections**, then **Named Connections**, and then select the check box next to

the connection name. You can then view the active connection for the sheet by selecting **Connections**, and then **Active Connections**.

4. **Optional:** Switch to another sheet and repeat the above steps to set the active connection for that sheet.

Disconnecting from Data Sources

You can disconnect from the current connection or from all connections.

To disconnect only from the *current* connection:

- 1. From the Smart View Panel, select the connection that is currently open in the tree list.
- 2. Optional: To find this connection quickly, click the arrow next to real and select Locate Worksheet Connection.
- 3. Right-click and select **Disconnect**.

Disconnecting from the current connection does not invalidate single-sign on (SSO).

To disconnect from *all* connected shared connections and private connections:

- 1. From the Smart View Panel, click 🙆
- 2. Select Disconnect All.

This selection invalidates SSO, and you must log in again the next time you connect.

Note: When specifying the <server> parameter, always include the domain name parameter, <domain>. For example: http(s)://<server>.<domain>:<port>/workspace/SmartViewProviders

To create a shared connection in Smart View:

- 1. From the Smart View ribbon ribbon, click **Options**.
- 2. In the **Options** dialog box, select the **Advanced** tab.
- 3. In the **Shared Connections URL** text box, enter the connection URL provided to you by your Smart View administrator.

The URL syntax for on-premises connections is:

http(s)://<server>.<domain>:<port>/workspace/SmartViewProviders

The URL syntax for a cloud connection to a single cloud business process is:

http(s)://<serviceURL>/workspace/SmartViewProviders

The URL syntax for a cloud connection to multiple Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud business processes on the same domain is:

http(s)://<serviceURL>/HyperionPlanning/SmartView

Note:

EPM Cloud Service Administrators: See *Administering Planning*, Connecting Environments in EPM Cloud for information on setting up multiple providers on a single shared connection.

Starting in release 20.200, for vanity URLs (also referred to as custom URLs), using the syntax above, enter the URL you have configured with your third-party link shortening vendor. The syntax you use in your configuration depends on whether you are connecting to an on-premises data source, a single cloud business process, or multiple cloud business processes on the same domain. For example:

http(s)://<yourVanityURL>

- 4. Click **OK** to close the **Options** dialog box.
- 5. Connect by following the procedure in Connecting to Data Sources.

To create a private connection using the wizard:

- 3. In the Action Panel, click Create new connection to display the Add Connection wizard.

Alternatively, click the arrow next to 📌 and select Create new connection.

- In Add Connection URL, enter the URL for the private connection, then click Next.
 Follow the syntax guidelines in Private Connection URL Syntax.
- 5. In Add Connection Application/Cube, navigate to the application and database to work with, select it, and then click Next.
- 6. In Add Connection Name/Description, enter a friendly name for the connection and an optional description.
- 7. Click Finish.
- 8. **Optional:** To select a private connection, click the drop-down arrow in the connection text box in the Smart View Panel.

Using the Quick Connection Method

You can create a private connection using the quick connection method if you know the URL. URLs are generally provided to you by your Oracle Smart View for Office administrator.

To create a private connection using the quick connection method:

- 1. From the Smart View ribbon, click Panel.
- 2. From the Smart View Panel, click the arrow next to ¹, and then select **Private Connections**.



3. In the text box, enter the URL or the local storage directory for the data source to which you want to connect.

Saving Connections as Private Connections

You can save shared or private connections as private connections and give them user-friendly names.

Although you cannot create shared connections without administrative privileges, you can save them as private connections. You can also save a private connection. In both cases, when saving these connections as private, you can provide a user-friendly name. These connections are referred to as *named* connections.

To create a private connection from a shared or private connection:

- **1**. Connect using a shared or private connection.
- 2. In the Smart View Panel, in the tree list for a shared or private connection, select an item to save as a private connection.

You can select either an application name or a database name.

3. From the Action Panel, select Add to private connections.

This option is available only if the selected item is enabled for saving as a private connection.



4. **Optional:** From **Save as Private Connection**, edit the name and description of the connection.

Oracle Smart View for Office appends connection URL_application name to the name of the item you selected. For example, if you selected a database named ABC in the application XYZ, the default connection name is:

ABC - <connection URL> XYZ

You can alter this name to make it more user-friendly; for example, you might change it to:

MyABC

5. Click OK in the Save as Private Connection dialog.

The connection name is displayed in the following:

- The Shared Connections tree list, indicated as private by a small arrow, indicated
- The Private Connections tree list, indicated as private by a small arrow, indicated
- The Private Connections tree after selecting the server name, grouped under application type (such as Planning), from the private connection drop-down list
- 6. To ensure that the current worksheet is connected to the newly created private connection, in the Smart View ribbon, select **Connections**, then **Active Connections**, and then select the check box next to the new connection name.

Alternatively, once you perform a Smart View action (for example, select **Ad hoc analysis** from the Action Panel), the connection is automatically made.

You can modify connections in two different ways: modify a private connection or modify the connection information for individual entities within an Office document.

Additionally, you can use the Edit Connection command to modify connections for Oracle Hyperion Financial Reporting images and fully fomatted reports.

 Modify a private connection. You can modify a private connection to change the server, application, or database information for all data providers associated with the connection.

The connection information can be changed whether you are connected or not.

For example, you may be working in a test environment using a private connection. When you are ready to move to a production environment, you



change the server information for that private connection to access the new environment.

This procedure is described in Modifying Private Connections.

• Modify the connection information for individual entities within a document. You can modify the connection information for individual entities within a document using the Document Contents panel. You can change connections per sheet. Or, in a sheet containing multiple entities, you can change the server connection for one or more of the individual entities.

For example, while connected to Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition, you may have inserted a compound view containing 10 graphs. Now you would like to pull data from a different Oracle BI EE server for three of the graphs. Using the Document Contents panel, you can modify the connection information for the each of the three graphs to point to the new Oracle BI EE server.

This procedure is described in Modifying Connections within an Office Document.

• Modify the connection information for individual Financial Reporting images and fully formatted reports images in Office documents. Using the Edit Connection command accessed from the Smart View ribbon, you can change the connection information for entities in Excel, Word, and PowerPoint. This is useful when sharing an Office document between departments or when moving from a test to a production environment.

See Modifying Connections for Financial Reporting Images and Fully Formatted Reports.

Note:

When you modify connection information, the new data source that you point to must contain all the dimensions and members of the previous data source. Any missing dimensions or members in the new data source will cause errors upon refresh.



Modifying Connections within an Office Document

From the Document Contents pane, you can change connections for Oracle Smart View for Office objects within an Office document. This is useful when sharing an Office document between departments that point to different servers or when moving from a test to a production environment.

You can change the connection properties for all entities in a document that share the same connection information (for example, all worksheets or grids that point to the



same application and database on a particular server). Or, in an Excel workbook, you can change the connection information sheet by sheet.

To modify connections from the Document Contents pane:

1. Open the Office document.

Note:

Narrative Reporting: To change the connection information for Smart View content in an Excel doclet, you must open the doclet from the report package and then check it out. See Checking Out Doclets.

- 2. In the Document Contents pane, from the drop-down list box, perform an action:
 - Select a sheet from a selected document
 - Select a particular connection
 - Select All Connections
- 3. Select the Modify Connection link at the bottom of the pane.

Alternatively, right-click a connection name or sheet name and select **Modify Connection**. You can also modify connections as follows:

- To modify a connection for all sheets in the workbook, select the top-level tree node connection name in Document Contents
- To modify a connection for a specific sheet, select the connection name under the specific sheet-level tree node

The Edit Connection - URL page of the wizard is displayed.

- 4. In the URL drop-down list, select an existing connection or enter a new connection URL.
- Click Next and in Edit Connection Application/Cube, expand Servers, and navigate to the application and database to which you want to connect, depending upon the provider requirements.

Alternatively, select the **Advanced Setup** check box and manually enter the information for **Server**, **Application**, and **Cube/Database**, as the provider requires.

- 6. Click Finish.
- 7. Select the **Refresh** link at the bottom of the Document Contents pane.
- 8. To save the modified connection information, save the workbook.

Narrative Reporting: Be sure to upload and check in the Excel doclet you're working with. The modified connection information is saved when you upload and check in the doclet. See Uploading and Working with Page Attributes and Slide Masters and Checking In Doclets.

Modifying Connections for Financial Reporting Images and Fully Formatted Reports

You can change connections for Oracle Hyperion Financial Reporting fully formatted reports or images within an Office document using the **Private Connections** dialog, which is accessed from the **Connections** button on the Smart View ribbon.

This is useful when sharing an Office document between departments or when moving from a test to a production environment.

Before you begin, ensure the following:

- The data source you're changing *to* must contain the same folder structure and report as the original data source.
- You are working with a Financial Reporting report as follows:
 - Excel: Fully formated reports or images




- PowerPoint and Word: Images




To modify the connection for Financial Reporting entities:

- **1.** Select a Financial Reporting entity in Word.
- 2. In the Smart View ribbon, select **Connections**, then **Reporting and Analysis Document**, and then **Edit Connection**.



3. In the **Private Connections** dialog box, select a data source from the drop-down menu, select the data source name in the tree, and then click **OK**.





4. If you are prompted to log in, then provide your user name and password to the new data source.

The Import Workspace Document dialog is displayed.

- 5. In Import Workspace Document, when the Finish button is enabled, click it.
- 6. Refresh the Office document.

When the refresh is complete, a message notifies you of the number of pages that were updated.

7. Repeat this procedure for any other entities within the Office document

About Managing Connection URL Mappings

Connection URL mappings allow you to migrate from one environment to another environment. Administrators configure mappings that replace old connection URLs with new URLs. The mappings can be managed from the Private Connections drop-down menu by selecting the **Manage URL Mappings** option.

After mapping, private and named connections are immediately migrated to the new URLs when Microsoft Excel is reopened. The new mappings persist even if a mapping is deleted. Any saved workbooks with functions using these private connections will continue to use the new URLs.



Working with Saved Workbooks Containing Ad Hoc Grids

 You configure the remapping of a URL only once, and then restart Microsoft Excel. Any workbook you open that used the old URL will automatically start using the new URL. The application and cube name and the outline must remain the same for refresh and other operations to complete successfully.

To summarize, once a mapping is created, then restart Excel, open a workbook, refresh, and then save the workbook. Thereafter, the workbook will always use the new URL. Subsequently, anytime you open a workbook that uses the new mapping, be sure to perform a refresh and save on that workbook.

- As a best practice, in ad hoc sheets in saved workbooks, you must perform a refresh and save the workbook for the new URL to persist. After the refresh and save, the mapping can be deleted, for both named and unnamed connections, and the new URL will continue to be used.
- If you are planning to delete the mapping but still want unnamed connections in a saved sheet to use a new URL, then you must activate each sheet and refresh it before saving the workbook. As a best practice, Oracle recommends using the Refresh All Worksheets command and then saving the workbook.
- If a mapping is deleted before the sheets were refreshed and saved, then the old URL will be used.
- If a mapping is deleted after the sheets were refreshed and saved, then the new URL will continue to be used.

Limitations


- Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition and Oracle Analytics Cloud are not supported.
- Oracle Hyperion Financial Management: Mappings will work only if the cluster name and application are same in the new and old environment.
- Oracle Essbase on-premises and Essbase cloud: Sheets created in the cloud environment do not work in the on-premises environment. Alternatively, sheets created in the on-premises environment do not work in the cloud environment.
- Nested URL mapping is not supported.
- Ensure that you enter the correct URL. URL entries are not validated, so it is possible to enter an incorrect URL entry.







About Deleting Connection URLs

You can delete connections using the Delete Connection URLs dialog box.

You can delete the following connection URL types:

- Private connection URLs that were created using the quick creation method
- Shared connection URLs
- Extension update URLs

Understand these guidelines when deleting connection URLs:

 To delete connections URLs as described in Deleting Connection URLS, Oracle Smart View for Office 11.1.2.5.620+ is required.



- To begin the process, the Smart View Panel must be in private connection mode, no matter the URL type that you're deleting.
- You cannot delete private connections that were created using the Private Connection Wizard.
- You must first click Delete, and then OK to accept the delete. Clicking Delete only does not fully delete the connection or extension update URLs.
- To cancel a delete operation, you can press the Escape key or clicking the X button in the top right corner of the dialog.
- Clicking the OK button without first clicking the Delete button is the same as cancelling the action; nothing will be deleted.
- When deleting shared connections URLs, the URL that is currently displayed in the Shared Connection URL field of the Options dialog, Advanced tab, will not be deleted.
- If a data source provider gives Smart View the URL from where extension updates can be obtained, this URL gets added to the local user's Smart View properties files. This occurs only when the user creates a private connection.


The user may want to delete URLs that are no longer used or that belong to a server that has been decommissioned to avoid Smart View querying those locations for updates.

If a URL that is deleted needs to be used again, that URL will be added back to the local user's properties file the next time a private connection is made to that provider.



3. In the **Delete Connection URLs** dialog box, select the check box next to the URLs to delete, and then click **Delete**.

To select all URLs of a given type for deletion, click the **Select All** button, and then click **Delete**.



Note:

When deleting all shared connections URLs using the **Select All** button, the URL that is currently displayed in the Shared Connection URL field of the Options dialog, Advanced tab, will not be deleted.

To cancel any selected deletions, do not proceed to the next step, but instead, press **Escape** or click the X button in the top right corner of the dialog.

You can select URLs for deletion and click **Delete**, and then switch between URL types and make more selections and click Delete, before proceeding to the next step, where the deletions will be permanently accepted.

4. To accept the deletions, click **OK**.

Clicking **Delete** only does not fully delete the connection or extension update URLs. You must click **OK** to accept the deletions.

Global Options and Sheet Level Options

Oracle Smart View for Office provides two types of options: *global* options and *sheet* options.

- Global Options
- Sheet Options

Global Options

Global options are options that apply to the entire current workbook, including any *new* worksheets added to the current workbook, and to workbooks that are created later.

Changes to global option settings also affect *existing* worksheets and workbooks, and other Office documents.

The following are global options:

- Advanced Options
- Extensions
- Cell Styles

Note:

Use the **OK** button when saving global options. Changes to global options become the default settings for all existing and new worksheets and workbooks so it is not necessary to use **Save as Default Options** or **Apply to All Worksheets** with global options. **Save as Default Options** and **Apply to All Worksheets** are used with the sheet level option settings only.

Sheet Options

Sheet level options are options that are specific to the worksheet for which they are set. Sheet options are applicable only in Excel. You do not set sheet options in Word or PowerPoint.

These options are available for saving sheet level options:

• **OK**—The sheet level option changes apply only to the current sheet in the current workbook. The changes do not apply to existing sheets or to new sheets in the current workbook. They do not affect any existing workbooks or new workbooks.

In PowerPoint or Word, **OK** only applies to selections made on the **Advanced** tab (which are global options, not sheet options).

Additionally, **Save as Default Options**, **Apply to All Worksheets**, and **Export Options** are accessed in Excel by clicking the arrow in the OK button in the **Options** dialog box.

 Save as Default Options—The sheet level options changes are also the default option settings for *new* worksheets in the current workbook and for any *new* workbooks, and any other new Office documents. Changes to sheet level option settings do not affect *existing* worksheets or workbooks.

For example, in Excel, assume you made changes to member options and selected **Save as Default Options**. You must access each existing worksheet individually, and make those same changes, if you want the changes to be propagated to existing worksheets in the workbook. This allows for different sheet level options on different worksheets. However, the changes are automatically propagated to any new worksheets you create within the current workbook and to any new workbooks.

Note:

The **Save as Default Options** option is not available in PowerPoint or Word.

Apply to All Worksheets—The sheet level options changes apply to all *existing* worksheets with Oracle Smart View for Office content within the current workbook. They do not apply to any new worksheets within the current workbook, to other *existing* workbooks, or to *new* workbooks.

For example, assume you made changes to member options and selected **Apply To All Sheets**. The changes are propagated to all existing worksheets with Smart View content within the current workbook. This allows for quick updating of sheet level options in the current workbook. However, these changes are not propagated to any new worksheets in the current workbook, to existing workbooks, or to new workbooks.

Note:

The **Apply to All Worksheets** option is not available in PowerPoint or Word.

 Export Options—This option is used by service administrators to set default options and export them to an options.xml file for distributing to users. This is to ensure consistent application of Smart View configurations across users in their organization.

As a service administrator, you can export options present under the **Member Options**, **Data Options**, **Advanced**, and **Formatting** tabs available in the **Options** dialog. However, the configurations under the **Cell Styles** tab and the **Shared Connection URL** under the **Advanced** tab cannot be exported.



Note:

- * The **Export Options** option is not available in PowerPoint or Word.
- * This option is visible only if you have write access to the **cfg** folder.
- Reset—Options are reset depending on whether an options.xml file distributed by your service administrator is present in the <SmartView Install>/cfg folder (for example, C:\Oracle\SmartView\cfg):
 - If the options.xml file is not present, then Reset reverts Smart View options to their system defaults.
 - If the options.xml file is present, then Reset uses the options set by your service administrator.

Note:

As a best practice, Oracle recommends that you do not manually modify the options in the <code>options.xml</code> file, as it can result in errors and mismatch. If you make any changes manually to the <code>options.xml</code> file, then when you click **Reset**, you may get the error message, *Option data mismatch. Please check cfg/options.xml*.

After clicking **Reset**, close and reopen the Office application to see the default options.



Changes to global option settings become the default for all existing and *new* Microsoft Office documents.

It is not necessary to use **Apply to All Worksheets** or **Save as Default Options** with these options.





Cell Styles

Cell Styles control the display of certain types of member and data cells.

On the **Cell Styles** page, you can specify formatting to indicate certain types of member and data cells. Because cells may belong to more than one type (for example, a member cell can be both parent and child), you can set separate styles for each type and also set the order of precedence for how cell styles are applied. The Planning Admin Extension also supports cell styles when editing dimensions.

Cell style options are global options, which apply to the entire current workbook, including any *new* worksheets added to the current workbook, and to any workbooks and worksheets that are created henceforth. Changes to global option settings become the default for all existing and *new* Microsoft Office documents.

It is not necessary to use **Apply to All Worksheets** or **Save as Default Options** with these options.

Guidelines

Consider the following guidelines while using cell styles.

- If a cell belongs to multiple member or data types, then as a best practice, Oracle recommends setting only one property (font, border, or background color) per type. For example, a data cell may contain supporting details and cell text at the same time. If all three style properties are set for each data type, then depending on the precedence of styles specified, properties for cells with higher priority will completely overwrite properties of cells with lower priority. If only one property per cell type is set (for example, a border for supporting details and a font style for cell text), then the cell can more easily be identified as belonging to all the applicable cell types.
- Smart View 20.200+ allows the setting of all three style properties per cell type. For example, you may set a font style, a background color, *and* a border color for parent members.

Smart View releases earlier than 20.200 allow the setting of only one style property per cell type. For example, you may set a font style *or* a background color



or a border color for parent members, but you cannot set all three styles for parent members.

- You can indicate parent and child member cells by applying **Parent** and **Child** cell styles, which are separate from the default **Members** cell style. After setting the styles, you can enable them in the following ways:
 - Deselect the check box for Members cell type and select the Parent and Child cell types. This will remove formatting from blank member cells also.
 - Keep the check box for Members cell type selected. Move the Parent and Child cell types above the Members cell type to set the priority of cell styles.
- The precedence overrides the conflicting styles but continues to preserve and display non-conflicting styles. For example, you have set the Parent and Child cell types in a higher order of precedence, that is moved them above the Member cell type. Now, if you set the border colors for parent and child cell types and the background color for member cell type, the parent and child cells will display the border colors and also the background colors set for member cell type, since these are two different styles that do not conflict with each other.
- If a root level dimension does not have any children or none of its children are enabled in the provider application cube, then it is considered as a child member and the Child cell style is applied to it.
- There is a difference between how parent and child cell styles are displayed in forms and ad hoc grids.
 - In forms, the members for which the Start Expand property is enabled in the provider application are considered as parents and the cells under them are their children. So the Parent cell style is applied to such expandable members. Since forms have a static layout and cannot be zoomed into, the parent cells which are not expandable and do not have any children enabled are not displayed in the Parent cell style. Instead, such cells are indicated with the Member or Child cell style, as they are appear at the lowest level.
 - In ad hoc, the hierarchy set in the outline is followed and you can zoom in and out to see all the parent and child members. So the Parent and Child cell styles appear properly based on the outline. If a member is both a parent and a child, then the Parent cell style is applied to it.

For example, Expense and Revenue are parent member cells under Account, such that Expense is set as expandable, while Revenue is not. Expense has Utilities and Rent as children, which are enabled in the form. Revenue has Salary and Commission as children, which are not enabled in the form. When you set cell styles and refresh the form, the Parent cell style is applied to Account and Expense but not to Revenue, since only expandable members and members with children enabled are considered as parents. As Revenue is at the lowest level, it is indicated with Child cell style. Now if you open it in ad hoc, both Expense and Revenue members are indicated with Parent cell styles, since both can be zoomed into to reveal their respective children.

Setting Cell Styles

To set a cell style:

- **1**. Expand the list of available cell types.
- 2. Select a cell type.
- 3. Select **Properties** and specify any combination of font style, background color, and border color, per your requirements.



You may apply one, two, or three style types.

If a check box for a style property is cleared, click the property to define the style. If a check box for a style property is checked, and you want to clear or remove the style, click the property.

In the following example, to add a background color, click **Background**. To clear the font style, click **Font**. To clear the border style, click **Border**.

- 4. To re-order precedence of cell styles, use the **Move Up** and **Move Down** buttons or drag and drop the cell styles.
- 5. Click **OK**. The setting takes effect after you refresh or perform a drill operation.
- 6. **Optional:** To revert cell styles or precedence to the default styles of the connected Smart View provider, click **Default Styles.**
- 7. **Optional:** To set your selections on this page as default settings, click the arrow in the **OK** button, and then select **Save as Default Options**.

Extension options are global options—set from Excel, Word, or PowerPoint—which apply to the entire current document, including any *new* worksheets added to the current workbook, new slides added to the current presentation, or new pages added to the current document, and to all Microsoft Office documents that are created henceforth, including Excel workbooks and worksheets, PowerPoint presentations and slides, and Word documents. Changes to global option settings become the default for all existing and *new* Microsoft Office documents.

The first time users open the **Extensions** tab of the **Options** dialog box, it contains a list of the extensions that are currently installed to leverage Oracle Smart View for Office functionality for other Oracle products. See Supported Smart View Extensions for a complete list of supported extensions. Other extensions that can be downloaded and installed are made visible using the **Check for Updates, New Installs, and Uninstalls** link on the dialog box.

Note:

- You can enable and disable extensions, and install, update, and uninstall extensions from Excel, PowerPoint, or Word.
- It is not necessary to use **Apply to All Worksheets** or **Save as Default Options** with the Extensions options.
- In some Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud products, you can download and install certain extensions from the browser. See Downloading and Installing Clients in Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud Getting Started with Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud for Users for more information.

The **Extension Alerts** dialog helps you to keep your installed EPM Cloud extensions up-to-date. If you haven't already installed these extensions, the dialog informs you that they're available for install.

If you haven't already installed extensions, the dialog informs you of the extensions available for install. If you have already extensions, the dialog informs you when there are updates available.

To view the Extension Alerts dialog:

- **1.** Connect to Narrative Reporting.
 - a. Open Office, select the Smart View ribbon, and then click **Panel**.
 - b. In the Smart View Panel, select Private Connections, then choose your

connection from the drop-down list, and then click

If any extensions are already installed (for example, Narrative Reporting), then select **Library** in Narrative Reporting Home to view the tree and expand the Library node.

If no extensions are installed, then in the tree, select the Library node.

c. In the Action Panel, click Connect.

Upon connection, Oracle Smart View for Office compares the extension versions available on the provider environment with the versions installed on your computer. 

Your Oracle Smart View for Office administrator may move an extension installer to a non-default location and then notify you of the installer location. If this happens, complete the following procedure.

Note:

The non-default location of an extension installer can be a URL, or a local or network folder.

To override the default download URL or folder location:

- 1. From the Smart View ribbon, select **Options**, and then **Extensions**.
- 2. Select the Override default download URL check box.

The text box and browse button are activated, as shown in Figure 1.

3. Enter a URL in the text box, or click and navigate to the local folder or the network folder specified by your Smart View administrator.

The UpdateList.xml file is automatically appended to either the URL or the folder specified.

Enabling and Disabling Extensions

To enable an extension:

- 1. From the Smart View ribbon, select **Options**, and then **Extensions**.
- 2. Locate the extension in the list and select the **Enable** check box.

After you select the check box, the label changes to Enabled.

3. **Optional:** To disable an extension, locate the extension in the list and clear the **Enabled** check box.

Note:

When extensions are enabled in Oracle Smart View for Office, cascading a report with a large number of members can cause Excel to stop responding. As a best practice to avoid this from happening, disable any extensions that are installed from the Smart View Options dialog box, Extensions page. Then, restart Excel and repeat the cascade operation.



Adjusting Display when Working with Extensions

If the windows associated within an installed extension are not rendering and displaying properly in Oracle Smart View for Office, go to the **Health Check** dialog and ensure that the **Browser Emulation Mode** option is enabled (not set to **Disable**). To do this:

- 1. From the Smart View ribbon in Excel, click the arrow next to **Help**, and then select **Health Check**.
- 2. Click **Recommended Settings** at the bottom of the dialog.
- 3. Click Yes in the confirmation dialog.
- 4. Click Update Settings, and then click Close.
- 5. Restart Excel and log in.

For more information, see Performing a Health Check On Your System.

Uninstalling Extensions

The **Remove** link, **Remove**, appears next to any extension names that you are authorized to uninstall.

Note:

Your Oracle Smart View for Office administrator determines which extensions you are authorized to uninstall.

To uninstall an extension:

- 1. From the Smart View ribbon, select **Options**, and then **Extensions**.
- 2. Click the Check for Updates, New Installs, and Uninstalls link.

Smart View checks for any extensions that can be removed.

3. In the extensions list, locate the extension to uninstall and click the Remove link,

Remove

You are prompted that the extension will be uninstalled when the Office application is restarted. All Office applications must be closed to completely remove the extension.

4. Close all Office applications, including Outlook, and restart.

Tip:

All open Office applications must be closed in order to complete the uninstallation correctly. As a best practice, check the Windows Task Manager and close any other Office applications or processes that are running, including Outlook.

You can choose whether to display all members on the grid and hide the POV toolbar or to display the POV toolbar containing the POV members.

- POV Manager The Point of View (POV) is the starting point for forms, ad hoc grids, and functions.
- Filtering by Attribute
 In an ad hoc grid, you can filter by attributes in dimensions that contain attribute members.
- Filtering by Subsets

For dimensions that contain attribute members, you can select attributes and set conditions for them to display only those members that meet these conditions.

- Selecting Period-to-Date Members
 In time dimensions, you can set up period-to-date members, called Dynamic Time Series
 members, if defined. For example, to see year-to-date data at the end of August, you can
 set up a Dynamic Time Series member that includes data for January through August.
- Specifying Member Perspective Use the Varying Attribute filter to specify member perspective for varying attributes when selecting members.



- Viewing Member Information You can view detailed information about any member on an ad hoc grid. The information displayed depends on the data source type to which you are connected.
- Working with Aliases and Alias Tables
 Aliases are alternate names for database member names.
- Defining Member Name Display in the Member Selector You can change how member names are displayed in the Member Selection dialog box by choosing a Member Name Display option.
- Displaying Qualified Names of Duplicate Members Different members or member aliases may have identical names.
- Qualified Name Display in Alternate Hierarchies
 Qualified name behavior for alternate hierarchies affects runtime and member selector behavior on forms and ad hoc grids.
- Viewing Dimension Properties
 Using the Insert Properties command in the Essbase ribbon, you can quickly view the properties of a dimension in an ad hoc grid.

About Dimensions and Members

Dimensions are data categories used to organize business data for retrieval and preservation of values.

Dimensions usually contain hierarchies of related *members* grouped within them. For example, a Year dimension often includes members for each time period, such as quarters and months.

You can select members for the grid from the Member Selection dialog box available from the data source ribbon, from the POV toolbar, or by entering the member name using free-form mode.

Dimension and Member Naming Limitation

There are some limitations to consider when naming dimensions and members.

If you use Oracle Smart View for Office cell functions (described in Functions), then do not use these characters in member names, dimension names, or variable names.

- Hash mark (#)
- Semicolon (;)
- Comma (,)

These characters are reserved for delimiters in Smart View cell functions.



Best Practices for Numeric Member Names

Use the best practices noted in this topic when working with numeric member names in Oracle Smart View for Office.

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase, Planning, Planning Modules, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Tax Reporting

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Planning, Oracle Hyperion Financial Management

When working with numeric member names in Smart View:

- Prefix numeric member names with an apostrophe (').
- Before entering numeric member names, select the member cells or an entire column, then use Excel to set the format of the selected cells to "Text."
- If you have already entered numeric member names, select the member cells or an entire column, use Excel to set the format of the selected cells to "Text," then press F2 and Enter to trigger Excel to update the cell type.

The best practices noted above also need to be used when working with member names consisting of Boolean or date values.

Selecting Members from the Member Selector

You select members for a variety of purposes within Oracle Smart View for Office: ad hoc grids, functions, and the POV Manager.

The Member Selection dialog boxes in these locations may vary slightly, and not all options are always available. You can select members for one dimension at a time.

Note:

 In this topic, EPM Cloud refers to these data source providers: Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Planning, Planning Modules, and Tax Reporting.

References to Oracle Hyperion Planning refer to on-premises Planning.

Oracle Essbase and EPM Cloud:

To quickly add attribute dimensions onto an ad hoc or free-form grid, follow the instructions in Inserting Attribute Dimensions on the Sheet. You can then use the instructions in this topic to select and work with members from attribute dimensions.

Figure 1 shows the **Member Selection** dialog box with the Year dimension and its members as examples.

To select members:

- 1. To display the **Member Selection** dialog box, which contains a tree list of available members for the dimension selected, do one of the following:
 - Select a dimension or member on the grid, and then from a provider ad hoc ribbon, click **Member Selection**. For example, from the Planning Ad Hoc ribbon or the Essbase ribbon, click **Member Selection**.
 - From an open dialog box enabled for member selection, click **Member Selection**.
 - On a blank worksheet, from the Smart View Panel, right-click a cube name and select Member Selection. Use this method to select members for functions and references (see Functions).
 - Click on a user variable in a form.
 - Oracle Hyperion Financial Management: Click on a selectable dimension, row, or column in a form.
- 2. From Member Selection, to change the dimension, click the Dimension Selector

button (for example, Year) and select a dimension.



Note:

When connected to an EPM Cloud data source, with the **Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior** option set to **Standard**, and the Smart View **Member Name Display** option set to **Member Name and Alias**, the dimension displayed in the **Member Selection** dialog will show the default dimension, regardless of the dimension or member you selected for an alias column on the grid. Perform this step to select the dimension you require.

3. Optional: To find a specific member in the tree list, enter a member name, or part of a

member name, in the search field and click

The first result in the member list is highlighted. Click again to locate the next member that contains the search string you entered.

Alternatively, you can press the F3 key instead of clicking the 2010 button.

💙 Tip:

For searches on alphabetic characters only, you may also press the **Enter** key after you have typed your search criteria in the search field. After locating a matching member, pressing **Enter** again can result in an error message. You may use the **Enter** key for successive searching, but after locating a matching result, it is a best practice to always place the cursor back in the search field before pressing **Enter** again.

Note:

- If the alias table for the Member Selection dialog is set to None (see step 6), you may search by member name. If you change the alias table to Default or to any other alias table, then you must search according to the corresponding aliases defined for the Default alias table or any other selected alias table.
- Essbase and Narrative Reporting accept asterisks (*) and question marks
 (?) as wild cards. The asterisk can be substituted for a group of characters; the question mark can be substituted for only one character.

For example, to search for all member names that start with the word, Total, To* and To?al are valid search strings; however, To? is not.

The search string cannot begin with an asterisk. For example, * ${\tt Total}$ and *otal are not supported search strings.

4. **Optional:** Click the arrow in and select an option to change the criteria for displaying members in both the right pane of the Member Selection dialog box and on the grid or form:



- Essbase:
 - Hierarchy—Displays members in standard hierarchy format.
 - Attribute—Display members by attributes. See Filtering by Attribute.
 - Subset—Display a subset of members based on a set of conditions. Filtering by Subsets.
 - Dynamic Time Series—Display members by the latest period on which to base the to-date calculation. See Selecting Period-to-Date Members.
- EPM Cloud and Oracle Hyperion Planning:
 - Hierarchy—Display members in standard hierarchy format.
 - Attribute—Planning only. Display members by attributes in an ad hoc grid. See Filtering by Attribute.
 - EPM Cloud only:

Substitution Variables—Display members based on selections made in the **User Variables** tab of the **Preferences** dialog box.

Note:

The **Substitution Variables** option displays when you access **Member Selection** from a user variable in a form.

- Dynamic Time Series—Display members by the latest period on which to base the to-date calculation. See Selecting Period-to-Date Members.
- Financial Management:
 - **Hierarchy**—Display members in standard hierarchy format.
 - Member lists—Display members either by system-generated or usergenerated member lists. Note that system-generated member lists are designated with brackets; for example, [member list name].
- Narrative Reporting:
 - Hierarchy—Display members in standard hierarchy format.
 - Dynamic Time Series—Display members by the latest period on which to base the to-date calculation. See Selecting Period-to-Date Members.
- 5. **Optional:** To find a specific member or group of members in the tree list, click

and select one of these filters (filter options may vary by data source type):

- Descendants to select all descendents of the selected member
- **Descendants Inclusive** to include the selected member and all descendents of the selected member
- Children to select only the children of the selected member
- **Children Inclusive** to include the selected member and only the children of the selected member
- Siblings to select all siblings of the selected member



- Siblings Inclusive to include the selected member and all siblings of the selected member
- **LSiblings** to include only the members that appear before the selected member with the same parent
- LSiblings Inclusive to include the selected member and its left siblings
- RSiblings to include only the members that appear after the selected member with the same parent
- RSiblings Inclusive to include the selected member and its right siblings
- **Parent** to select only the parent of the selected member
- **Parent Inclusive** to include the selected member and only the parent of the selected member
- Ancestors to select all the ancestors of the selected member
- Ancestors Inclusive to include the selected member and all ancestors of the selected member
- Base to select only the bottom-level hierarchy members of a hierarchy
- Level 0 Descendant to display all descendants of the selected member that have no children
- Level to display the Level dialog box, where you select one level in the hierarchy of members
- **Generation** to display the Generation dialog box, where you select one generation in the hierarchy of members
- **UDA** to display the UDA dialog box, where you select a user-defined attribute (available only if defined by the administrator)

Note:

Narrative Reporting does not support filters.

6. Optional: To choose display and selection options for members in the Member

Selection dialog box, click **E** and perform an action:

- To place a check in the check box next to the applicable members, choose from **Check Children**, **Check Descendants**, or **Check Base Members**.
- To clear all check marks, select Clear Checks.
- To view expanded or collapsed dimensions, select Expand All or Collapse All.
- To view information about a member, select the member, then select **Member Information**. Click the **Alias** tab to view alias table information, if available.

Applies to Essbase, EPM Cloud, Narrative Reporting, Oracle Hyperion Planning, .

• To apply an alias table to the members in the **Member Selection** dialog box, select **Alias Table**, and then select an alias table.

Note that alias table selections made in the **Member Selection** dialog box apply only to the dialog box and not to the grid in the Office document.

7. Under **Members**, select the members that you want to use.





The members are transferred from the member tree list to the selection tree list in the pane on the right.

- **9. Optional:** If this is the first member selection that you make in a blank worksheet, select one of these buttons:
 - 💷 to display the selected members vertically, in a column
 - Image: Boost of the selected members horizontally, in a row
- 10. Click OK to close the Member Selection dialog.

The members selected are displayed in the grid.

11. From the ribbon, click **Refresh** to update the data on the grid to correspond to the selected members.

Note:

Once the selected members are in the grid, you must perform a **Refresh** before selecting another member in the grid and launching **Member Selection** again. If you do not refresh the grid, then **Member Selection** is launched in the context of the first dimension of your cube outline.

12. Optional: Repeat this procedure to select additional members, after you first refresh the grid as instructed in the previous step.

Selecting Members from the POV Toolbar

The POV is the default starting point for dimensions in a data source connection.

From the POV toolbar, you can select members and filters for the dimensions that you want to include in the grid and move members to and from the grid.

The modified POV applies only to the selected sheet. For existing sheets in the workbook, and any new sheets, the modified POV will not be applied.

Each connection is associated with only one POV. However, the same connection to different worksheets within a workbook may have different POVs.

POVs can be managed as described in POV Manager.

Note:

Oracle Hyperion Financial Management displays the User Point of View by default. See the *Oracle Hyperion Financial Management User's Guide* for information.

For Oracle Essbase and Narrative Reporting connections, see Displaying the POV Toolbar.



Placing Members and Dimensions from the POV Toolbar onto the Grid

To select dimensions and members from the POV toolbar:

- **1**. Do one of the following:
 - Enter the name of a member over its corresponding dimension on the POV toolbar, and then click **Refresh** on the POV toolbar.
 - Click the down arrow next to a dimension on the POV toolbar, then click the ellipsis (...), and then select members as described in Selecting Members from the Member Selector.

Note:

In the **Member Selection** dialog box, it is possible to select more than 5000 members for the POV. However, be aware that the POV toolbar can only display the first 5000 selected members.

2. From the POV toolbar, right-click the down arrow next to the member and drag it to the grid.

To move a member or dimension back to the POV toolbar for editing, right-click its cell and drag it to the POV toolbar.

3. Repeat as necessary to place all dimension and members that you want to include on the grid.

Note:

The modified POV applies only to the selected sheet. For existing sheets in the workbook, and any new sheets, the modified POV will not be applied.

- To save these POV selections in the worksheet, you must refresh before you save the worksheet.
- 5. Optional: To hide the POV toolbar, click POV on the data source ribbon.

The **POV** button toggles to hide or display the POV toolbar. When you finish working with the POV toolbar, you can hide it until you need to display it again.

Note:

Starting with Oracle Smart View for Office 11.1.2.5.520, when connected to duplicate member databases, the member name only should display by default in the POV. However, for workbooks saved in Smart View 11.1.2.5.510 and earlier, the qualified member name displays in the POV. To change the display of member names in the POV, open the **Member Selection** dialog box from the POV, then click **OK**.



Example 6-1 Example POV Usage

Figure 1 shows, from left to right, a POV in the following conditions:


- 1. Product, Market, and Scenario are the starting dimensions in the POV.
- 2. Colas is selected as the Product member.

In the **Member Selection** dialog box, it is possible to select more than 5000 members for the POV. However, be aware that the POV toolbar can only display the first 5000 selected members.

Although only one dimension member at a time can display in the POV, note that in **Member Selection**, up to 5000 members can be selected for the drop-down list for a dimension in the POV. The members you select are accessible in the POV by clicking the drop-down arrow for the dimension.

3. **Colas** has been moved to the grid (and it can be moved back to the POV toolbar), so that only Market and Scenario remain in the POV.





Selecting Members Using the Cell-Based POV

You can select members directly from cells in the page dimension row of a grid rather than using the POV toolbar.

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase, Planning, Planning Modules, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Tax Reporting

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase

The cell-based POV is available by clicking a page POV dimension cell, then selecting the down arrow, , that appears to the right of the cell; it works the same as the POV toolbar.






Figure 6-3 Selecting a Dimension Cell and Clicking the Down Arrow

Click the ellipsis button,, that appears in the cell-based POV and select members in the **Member Selection** dialog box, and then click **OK**. Now, look at the dimension cell again. The first member you selected appears in the dimension cell, and the other members are available by clicking the down-arrow in the cell-based POV and selecting them. After each selection, click **Refresh** to view the updated data.

Using the Essbase Sample Basic application and database as an example, for the Product dimension, if you select Root Beer, Cream Soda, and Fruit Soda in the **Member Selection** dialog box, then "Root Beer" appears in the dimension cell, as shown in Figure 2. Click **Refresh** to view the data for Root Beer.

Now click the arrow next to the cell, , and make another selection from the cell-based POV; for example, Cream Soda (Figure 3).

Click Refresh to update the data. Notice that the data has changed (Figure 4).

You can also directly type a member name in the search field of the cell-based POV drop-down. In this case, you can select only one member at a time. Click **Refresh** to view updated data. Type another member name in the search field each time you want to change the POV.

You can still use the POV toolbar as before by toggling the **POV** button on the provider ribbon. The cell-based POV and the POV toolbar selections are automatically synchronized, regardless of where the selections are made. If you change to a different alias table, the cell-based POV is populated with the proper alias names.

Note:

This feature is available only for installations with Essbase and Oracle Hyperion Provider Services 11.1.2.1.102 and later.

Entering Members in Free-Form Mode

If you are familiar with the dimensions and members of your database, you can enter their names directly into cells using *free-form mode*.

You can use aliases from the alias table associated with the current grid in free-form mode.

Note:

Oracle Essbase, Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud Ad Hoc:

If you enter an alias from a different alias table, it will revert to the alias from the current alias table.

After connecting to a data source, you can enter member names as follows:

- By entering a member name in a blank cell
- By replacing a member name in a cell with a different member from the same dimension

You can still use the POV, member selection, and other ad hoc operations in free-form grids. See Free-Form Mode.



Displaying the POV Toolbar

You can choose whether to display all members on the grid and hide the POV toolbar or to display the POV toolbar containing the POV members.

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase, Planning, Planning Modules, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Tax Reporting, Narrative Reporting

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase

By default, all members are displayed on the grid, and the POV toolbar is hidden. The members in the first row of the grid are called "page" dimensions. In this mode, you can format POV member cells the same as you do other member and data cells, and select members using the Member Selection button in the ribbon.

When you display the POV toolbar, the page dimensions move to the POV toolbar. When you hide the POV toolbar, the page dimensions move back to the first row of the grid.

If you choose to display the POV toolbar containing the POV members, you can use the POV toolbar to select members and move them to and from the grid as described in Selecting Members from the POV Toolbar.

To display the POV toolbar:

- 1. Select the provider ad hoc ribbon. For example, Planning Ad Hoc ribbon.
- 2. Click the POV button.

Figure 1 shows the POV toolbar on the grid. **Measures** and **Year** are displayed on the grid; POV members **Product**, **Market**, and **Scenario** are displayed on the POV toolbar.

To hide the POV toolbar and display all members on the grid:

- **1.** Select the Provider ribbon.
- 2. Click the POV button to toggle it off.



Note: Essbase: On worksheets that contain multiple grids, the POV button is disabled. In multiple-grid worksheets, the POV toolbar is hidden, and all members are displayed the grid.

In Figure 2, the **POV** button is toggled off, the POV toolbar is hidden, and all members are on the grid.

Note:

- In some cases, in workbooks with multiple sheets where each sheet contains a different query or template, if you drag the POV toolbar to the top of a sheet and dock it, you may see two POV toolbars on that sheet. This can occur on any number of sheets where the POV toolbar has been docked. Click the X in the right corner of one of the POV toolbars to close it, or refresh the sheet.
- You should hide the POV toolbar before editing the grid and refreshing, or an error can result upon refresh. For example, before adding a new row to the grid, click the **POV** button to toggle it off so that Page dimensions are displayed in row 1 of the sheet.

POV Manager

The Point of View (POV) is the starting point for forms, ad hoc grids, and functions.

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase, Planning, Planning Modules, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Tax Reporting

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Planning, Oracle Hyperion Financial Management

Using the POV Manager in Oracle Smart View for Office, you can change the default POV for forms and ad hoc grids, and the background POV for functions.



Note:

As a best practice, always use a private connection when working with the POV Manager. If you have already connected using a shared connection, use the **Add to Private connections** command to save the current shared connection as private. See Saving Connections as Private Connections.

With the POV Manager, you can perform the following operations:

- Select members for the default POV and edit the default POV (not applicable to Financial Management)
- Select members for the background POV for functions
- Save a POV to a workbook
- Copy a POV and paste it to a different worksheet or workbook
- Edit a POV
- Delete a POV (not applicable to Financial Management)

Note:

In Essbase, if a member linked to a Smart List is in the POV, you may not be able to change some values in the Smart List for some members present in the worksheet.

For Financial Management, the last refreshed POV (either in the Financial Management web interface or in Smart View) becomes the default POV and is used by Smart View when accessing a form or ad hoc grid.

Additionally, for Financial Management, the POV Manager can only be used to set the background POV for functions.

Selecting Members for the Default or Background POV

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase, Planning, Planning Modules, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Tax Reporting

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Planning, Oracle Hyperion Financial Management

In the POV Manager, you can select members as follows:

- To use as a default POV for the ad hoc grids of a given connection
- For the background POV for dimensions when you use functions

As a best practice, Oracle recommends a maximum of 1,000 members for the ad hoc POV.

Select members for or edit the POV before starting work on an ad hoc grid.

Note:

In this procedure, you will work with saved private connections. As a best practice before you begin, ensure that you have created a saved private connection (also referred to as a named connection), as described in Saving Connections as Private Connections.

To select members for the default POV:

- 1. Open a workbook and connect to a named private connection.
- 2. Set the active connection for the sheet by selecting **Connections**, then **Active Connections**, and then select the check box next to the connection name.

If you do not see the connection name in the **Active Connections** list, select **Connections**, then **Named Connections**, and then select the check box next to the connection name.

- 3. From the Smart View ribbon, select Function, and then Manage POV.
- 4. Expand the POV list.
- 5. From the **Active** POV list, select the active connection for which you are changing the POV.
- 6. Click **Member Selector**, and then select the members that you want to use for the POV. See Selecting Members from the Member Selector.

From the POV Manager, you can select only one member per dimension. If you use aliases, the POV Manager loses the selected members.

- 7. Click Close.
- 8. To refresh the worksheet, select **Refresh**.
- 9. To save the POV to the workbook, save the workbook.



Note:

After you start working on the ad hoc grid, you can select or change members as described in Selecting Members from the Member Selector.

Copying and Pasting a POV

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase, Planning, Planning Modules, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Tax Reporting

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Planning, Oracle Hyperion Financial Management

You can use the POV Manager to copy and paste a POV to another sheet in a workbook, or from one workbook to another if the data source is exactly the same for both workbooks.

Note:

In this procedure, you will work with saved private connections. As a best practice before you begin, ensure that you have created a saved privated connection (also referred to as a named connection), as described in Saving Connections as Private Connections.

To copy and paste a POV:

- 1. Open all workbooks that you plan to work with.
- 2. Set the active connection for the sheet by selecting **Connections**, then **Active Connections**, and then select the check box next to the connection name.

If you do not see the connection name in the **Active Connections** list, then select **Connections**, then **Named Connections** list and then select the check box next to the connection name.

- 3. From the Smart View ribbon, select Function, and then Manage POV.
- In the left pane of POV Manager, expand the Active or Saved node, and then select the application connection that you want to copy.

Note:

You may copy the POV from the **Active** node and paste it on a blank worksheet under the **Saved** node.

Likewise, you may copy a POV from the **Saved** node and paste it to the **Active** node.

 Optional: From the POV Manager, click Member Selector, and then select members for the POV (described in Selecting Members for the Default or Background POV), and then save the workbook.



Note:

You may make changes to a POV under the **Saved** node, but the changes will only take effect in the sheet where you paste the changed POV, and not in the sheet where you changed the POV.

6. Select the POV under the **Active** node or any POV under the **Saved** node, and click the **Copy** button.

The Copy button is enabled only when a POV under Active or Saved is selected.

Remember, a POV can be copied from the **Active** node and pasted to a blank worksheet on the **Saved** node; or copied from a **Saved** node and pasted on the **Active** node.

- In the left pane of the POV Manager, expand Active, or expand Saved to select the workbook and worksheet (which must be blank) that you want to paste the POV into.
- 8. Click Paste.
- 9. Refresh the worksheet containing the copied POV.

If the worksheet remains blank after the **Refresh**, see step 2 to set the active connection for the sheet, the click **Refresh** again.

Deleting a POV

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase, Planning, Planning Modules, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Tax Reporting

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Planning

To delete a POV that is saved in an Office document:

- 1. From the Smart View ribbon, select **Function**, and then **Manage POV**.
- 2. Expand the POV list.
- 3. From the **POV** drop-down list, select the worksheet that contains the POV that you want to delete.
- 4. Select the POV that you want to delete.
- 5. Click Delete.
- 6. Click Close.
- 7. To refresh the worksheet, select Refresh.

Filtering by Attribute

In an ad hoc grid, you can filter by attributes in dimensions that contain attribute members.

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase, Planning Ad Hoc, Financial Consolidation and Close Ad Hoc

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase



To filter by attribute:

- 1. Select an attribute dimension on the grid, and then open **Member Selection** as described in Selecting Members from the Member Selector.
- 2. Click and select Attribute.
- 3. From Attribute, click 🙆.
- 4. From Subset, in Dimension, select a dimension; for example, Ounces.
- 5. In Member, select an attribute member, for example, Ounces_16.

- 7. Optional: to change the displayed attribute, change the selections in Dimension and Attribute and click **Set**.
- 8. Click OK.

Your selections are displayed in the tree list in **Member Selection**, where you can select from among them for inclusion in the grid.

Filtering by Subsets

For dimensions that contain attribute members, you can select attributes and set conditions for them to display only those members that meet these conditions.

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase

To filter by condition:

- 1. Select an attribute member on the grid, and then open **Member Selection** as described in Selecting Members from the Member Selector.
- 2. Click and select Subset.
- 3. From Subset, in Dimension, select an attribute dimension; for example, Ounces.
- 4. In Member, select an attribute member; for example, True.

Click Add

5.

- 6. In Dimension, select another attribute dimension; for example, Pkg Type.
- 7. In Member, select another attribute member; for example, Bottle.
 - Click & Add

An AND condition statement is created; for example, [True] AND [Bottle].

- 9. Optional: To change the condition statement, highlight the AND condition statement and select Operator, and then AND or OR.
- 10. Optional: Nest conditions by selecting more attributes, then Add, and then Root.
- 11. Click OK.



Your selections are displayed in the tree list in **Member Selection**, where you can select from among them for inclusion in the grid.

Selecting Period-to-Date Members

In time dimensions, you can set up period-to-date members, called Dynamic Time Series members, if defined. For example, to see year-to-date data at the end of August, you can set up a Dynamic Time Series member that includes data for January through August.

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase, Planning, Narrative Reporting

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Planning

To select a Dynamic Time Series member:

- 1. Select a time dimension on the grid, and then open **Member Selection** as described in Selecting Members from the Member Selector.
- 2. Click and select **Dynamic Time Series** to display available Time Series Members in the member tree list.
- 3. Select a time series member from the member tree list and click
- 4. From **Select DTS Member**, select the latest period on which to base the to-date calculation; for example, **Aug**.
- 5. Click OK.
- 6. **Optional:** Repeat step 3 through step 5 as necessary to add other Dynamic Time Series members.
- 7. Click OK.

The Time Series Member is displayed on the grid as, in this example, **Y-T-D(Aug)**. After you refresh, the year-to-date data through August is displayed.

Specifying Member Perspective

Use the Varying Attribute filter to specify member perspective for varying attributes when selecting members.

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase

Note:

Member perspective may not be enabled in your Oracle Smart View for Office system. Your options for member perspective are enabled and configured by the Administrator.

To specify member perspective:

1. From Member Selection, under Filter, select Varying Attribute.



- 2. In Filter Arguments, click 🙆.
- 3. Specify an attribute to set the perspective, and then click **OK**.
- 4. In Varying Attribute Args under Varying Attribute, click the ellipsis button.
- 5. In Subset, in Dimension, enter an attribute dimension.
- 6. In Member, enter an attribute member, and then click Set.
- 7. Click OK.
- 8. In Varying Attribute Args, under Perspective, click the ellipsis button.
- 9. From Perspective, select one of the following:
 - **Snapshot.** One set of independent dimension members to identify the members of base dimension associated with the varying attribute. Here the start and end tuple are same.
 - **Range.** A finite range of independent dimension members. A range can be specified only for continuous independent dimensions ("Year" is an example). For discrete independent dimensions, you can make only one selection.
- 10. Click OK.

Viewing Member Information

You can view detailed information about any member on an ad hoc grid. The information displayed depends on the data source type to which you are connected.

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase, Planning, Planning Modules, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Tax Reporting

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Financial Management, Oracle Hyperion Planning

You access the **Member Information** dialog from the provider ad hoc ribbon in Smart View. For example, in Smart View, connect to a Planning data source and create a new ad hoc grid or open a saved one. Select a member cell and then, from the Planning Ad Hoc ribbon, select **Cell Information**.

You can also use these methods to access the Member Information dialog:

- In the ad hoc grid, right-click the selected member cell, then select **Smart View**, and then select **Cell Information**.
- In the **Member Selection** dialog, select a member in the right pane, and then from the **Options** button drop-down menu, select **Cell Information**.

To view member information:

1. Select a member in the grid.

Essbase only: You can view member information for a member cell or a data cell. For other data providers, you can view information only for a member cell.

2. From the data provider ad hoc ribbon, select **Cell Information**.

Information is displayed on the following tabs. Only the tabs that are applicable to the member and connection are displayed.



- **Information:** A list of general information about the member such as dimension, level, generation, and so on. These properties may vary based on the selected member and dimension type.
- Aliases: A list of alias tables and corresponding aliases associated with the member
- **Attributes:** A table of the dimensions, members, and types of attributes associated with the member
- Formula: The formula associated with the member
- **Comments:** A list of comments associated with the member
- User Defined Attributes: A list of user defined attributes (attributes of the member defined by the administrator
- 3. **Optional:** To save the information in an Excel file, select **Save**.
- 4. Click Close.

Working with Aliases and Alias Tables

Aliases are alternate names for database member names.

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase, Planning, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Narrative Reporting, Tax Reporting

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Planning, Oracle Hyperion Financial Management

Note:

- In Financial Management, aliases are called "descriptions."
- Database member names are often stock numbers or product codes; their aliases can be more descriptive. For example, in the Sample Basic database, the alias name for the database member 100 is Colas. Aliases are stored in *alias tables* as part of a database. Dimensions can be associated with multiple alias tables.
- You can select an alias table for the current worksheet or for a connection.
- For Essbase, the special characters of Equal To sign (=) and Single Quote sign (') are supported in member names and aliases in Oracle Smart View for Office. For example, =units, 'price.

Selecting Alias Tables

If more than one alias table has been created in the database, you can select an alias table for the current worksheet or for a private connection.

Selecting an Alias Table for the Current Worksheet

Selecting an Alias Table for the Connection

ORACLE[°]

Selecting an Alias Table for the Current Worksheet

The alias table selected here applies only to the current worksheet and not to future connections.

To select an alias table for the current worksheet:

- **1**. From a worksheet, connect to a data source.
- 2. From the Essbase or ad hoc ribbon, select **Change Alias** to display a list of available alias tables.
- 3. Select an alias table for the worksheet.

The new alias table is applied automatically.

Note:

Planning, Financial Consolidation and Close, Tax Reporting: In Native mode, if the floating toolbar had been displayed and then repositioned on the sheet, the position will change after applying the new alias table. If needed, you can reposition the floating toolbar again. (Native mode means that the **Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior** option for your application is set to **Native**.)

Selecting an Alias Table for the Connection

You can select an alias table for private connections only. If you want to select an alias table for a shared connection, first save the shared connection as a private connection. See Saving Connections as Private Connections.

An alias table selected for a private connection is permanent until changed and will be used each time you use this connection. Setting an alias table for your private connection may help prevent the "Member out of place " error that appears after refreshing an ad hoc sheet which has data copied from other sheet using Microsoft Office copy and paste commands.

To select an alias table for the connection:

- 1. From a worksheet, connect to a data source using a shared connection and then save it as a private connection. For more information, see Saving Connections as Private Connections.
- 2. Connect to the private connection you created in the previous step.
- 3. Right-click the connection name and select **Set Alias Table**.

You can also select the connection, click **More** in the Action panel, and select **Set Alias Table**.

4. Select an alias table for the connection.

The new alias table is applied the next time you open the connection.



Aliases from Different Alias Tables

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase, Planning, Planning Modules, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Narrative Reporting, Tax Reporting

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase

Essbase, Narrative Reporting: If you enter a name from an alias table that is not associated with the current grid, its corresponding alias from the alias table that *is* associated with the current grid is displayed after you refresh. For example, if you enter Qtr1 into a grid that is associated with the Long Names alias, then after you refresh, Quarter1 is displayed.

Planning Ad Hoc, Planning Modules Ad Hoc, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management Ad Hoc, Financial Consolidation and Close Ad Hoc, FreeForm Ad Hoc, Tax Reporting Ad Hoc: Only one currently active alias table is supported. If you enter a name from an alias table that is not the active table for the current grid, the alias member is considered an unknown member.

Displaying Member Names and Aliases in Grid

Cloud data source types: Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Planning, Planning Modules, Tax Reporting, Oracle Essbase

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase

If you are connected to an Essbase data source, or an Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud Standard-mode application, you can display member names and their aliases from the currently selected alias table together in the same row.

Note:

- This feature applies only to row members and not to column members.
- To enable the Member Name and Alias option for Smart View users working with ad hoc grids, Service Administrators set the application option Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior, to Standard. All new and recreated applications are automatically set to Standard.
- Member names and their aliases are displayed in rows even when an alias table is not used, that is, when it is set to **None**. When the **Member Name and Alias** option is selected and the alias table is set to **None**, the row dimensions retain the aliases based on the last used alias table, while the POV columns are not impacted and continue to display the member names or aliases based on the last used alias table.

To display both member names and aliases:

1. In Oracle Smart View for Office, log in to a Standard-mode EPM Cloud application or an Essbase application.



You may establish a connecting by using a saved workbook containing ad hoc grids, or by starting a new ad hoc grid.

- 2. From the Smart View ribbon, select **Options**, and then **Member Options** in the left panel.
- 3. Under General, for Member Name Display, select Member Name and Alias.
- 4. In the Smart View ribbon or provider Ad Hoc ribbon, click Refresh.

For row members, both member names and their corresponding aliases are displayed. In this example, Product database member names are shown in column A, and their aliases in column B.

Displaying Aliases in the Member Selector

Cloud data source types: Planning, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Narrative Reporting, Tax Reporting, Oracle Essbase

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Planning

You can display aliases for member names in the Member Selection dialog box.

To select alias tables for displaying member names in Member Selection:

- 1. Display the **Member Selection** dialog box, as described in Selecting Members from the Member Selector.
- 2. To change the dimension, click the **Dimension Selector** button in the top left of the dialog box, and then select a dimension.
- 3. Click the **Options** button, then select **Alias Table**, and then select an alias table from the list.

The member names displayed in the Member Selector are changed according to your selection.

Defining Member Name Display in the Member Selector

You can change how member names are displayed in the Member Selection dialog box by choosing a Member Name Display option.

Data source types: Oracle Hyperion Financial Management



Using this option allows you to display members in the **Member Selection** dialog box differently from how they are displayed on the sheet.

The selection you make in the **Member Selection** dialog box does not affect how members are displayed in the worksheet. Members in the sheet are displayed according to the setting you choose in the **Member Name Display** field of the **Options** dialog box, **Member Options** tab.

For example, when connected to Financial Management, using the **Member Name Display** field in the **Options** dialog box, you can choose to display member names *with* their descriptions in the worksheet . Separately, in the **Member Selection** dialog box, you can choose to display member names *without* their descriptions.

Note:

Oracle Essbase, Narrative Reporting: Use alias tables to change the member name display. See Displaying Aliases in the Member Selector.

To define how member names are displayed:

- 1. Display the **Member Selection** dialog box, as described in Selecting Members from the Member Selector.
- 2. In the **Member Selection** dialog, to change the dimension, click the **Dimension Selector** button in the top left of the dialog box and select a dimension.
- 3. Click the **Options** button, then select **Member Name Display**, and then select an option:
 - Member Name to display qualified names.

Note:

If you select **Member Name** in free-form mode, in an ad hoc grid, if you insert a column and type a member name in the new column and want to change the alias table for the sheet, you must first refresh the sheet before changing the alias table.

- **Member Name and Description** to display qualified names and descriptions (aliases) in the same cell.
- **Description Only** to display aliases only.

Note:

If you select **Description Only** in free-form mode, qualified names are displayed initially. After you manually add, remove, or edit any comments and refresh, aliases are displayed.

The member names displayed in the **Member Selector** are changed according to your selection.



Displaying Qualified Names of Duplicate Members

Different members or member aliases may have identical names.

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase, Narrative Reporting

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase

For example, a database may have two members named "New York," one for New York City and one for New York State. Both members can appear as "New York" in the grid, but if you want to distinguish between them, you can display their qualified names instead. Qualified names include the member name and the names of its ancestors to the level that uniquely defines the member; for example, [Market].[New York].

When you first perform an ad hoc query on a database that supports duplicate member names, the default for the **Member Name Display** display option for members in the both grid and the POV is **Member Name Only**

Perform the procedure in this topic to display qualified member names in the grid and POV.

Note:

In Narrative Reporting, duplicate member names are allowed across dimensions, but they are not allowed within dimensions.

To display the qualified names of duplicate members:

- 1. From the Smart View ribbon, select **Options**, and then select **Member Options** in the left panel.
- 2. From the Member Name Display drop-down menu, select Distinct Member Name.
- 3. Click OK.
- 4. Refresh the grid.

Duplicate members in the grid are displayed as qualified names. In this example, New York City is displayed as [East].[New York]. New York State is displayed as a sibling of East, West, and South: [Market].[New York]:

Qualified Name Display in Alternate Hierarchies

Qualified name behavior for alternate hierarchies affects runtime and member selector behavior on forms and ad hoc grids.

Cloud data source types: Planning, Planning Modules, Financial Consolidation and Close

About Qualified Member Name Display in Alternate Hierarchies

When connected to Planning, Planning Modules, or Financial Consolidation and Close, alternate hierarchies are supported in the Entity dimension. One entity can have multiple parents, and contribute differently to each parent. These members are referred to as *partially shared* entities, where only a part of input data is shared across all instances of the entities.

In Oracle Smart View for Office, displaying partially shared members requires that member names and aliases are *qualified*, so that users can uniquely reference the specific instance of a member and can then enter appropriate values based on this context. Qualified names include the member name and the names of its ancestors to the level that uniquely defines the member. The most common example is the Percentage Contribution (PCON) metric used for weighted consolidations in Financial Consolidation and Close.

The qualified name behavior for alternate hierarchies is explained in these topics:

Starting in 17.01, Planning, Planning Modules support the option to qualify member names as part of form design. This option, **Show Qualified Names**, is only exposed when you have a dimension enabled for Partial Share. This option has three possible values:

- Never
- As Needed
- Always

By default, to maintain backwards compatibility the "Never" option is selected. "Never" is also used when this option is not exposed. Note that this is a runtime option and does not impact design time member selectors. Here is the expected behavior on forms for each option:

- Never
 - PBCS, EPBCS: All member names are not qualified.



- FCCS: All member names are not qualified.
- As Needed
 - PBCS, EPBCS: Base members are NOT qualified. Shared members are qualified.
 - FCCS: Both base members WITH SHARES and shared members are qualified. Base member without shares are not qualified.
- Always
 - PBCS: All members are qualified.
 - FCCS: All members are qualified.

Expected Runtime Behavior for Aliases on Forms

Alias behavior should behave the same as for member names with these exceptions:

- When showing qualified aliases both components (parent and child) must have aliases otherwise, the member name or qualified member name is returned as per selected option.
- Duplicate aliases are also qualified when "As Needed" or "Always" option is selected.

Expected Runtime Behavior on Ad Hoc Grids

Member names are qualified or not based on the Smart View **Member Name Display** option setting. There are two values to support the partial share feature: **Distinct Member Name Only** and **Member Name Only**. Here is the expected behavior for each option:

- Member Name Only
 - PBCS, EPBCS: All members are not qualified.
 - FCCS: All members are not qualified.
- Distinct Member Name Only
 - PBCS, EPBCS: Behaves the same as the "As Needed" option for forms above.
 - FCCS: Behaves the same as the "As Needed" option for forms above.

Expected Runtime Behavior for Aliases on Ad Hoc Grids

Alias behavior should be the same as in Expected Runtime Behavior on Forms, but also subject to the Smart View ad hoc alias options.

- If the "None" alias table option is selected, then you should see same behavior for members in ad hoc grids as in Expected Runtime Behavior on Forms.
- If an alias table is selected, then the aliases from that table should be used and ad hoc options for members apply. Note that alias behavior for aliases on forms applies as well based on Smart View ad hoc settings.

Expected Member Selector Behavior on Ad Hoc Grids

The Member Selector will work based on the setting in the Smart View "Member Name Display" option.

The Member Selector will display the qualified names for shared members by default.



Expected Member Selector Behavior on Forms

The Member Selector will work based on form settings for aliases and behave like the "As Needed" setting on forms.

Viewing Dimension Properties

Using the **Insert Properties** command in the Essbase ribbon, you can quickly view the properties of a dimension in an ad hoc grid.

Data source types: Oracle Essbase

To view the properties of a selected dimension:

- 1. Ensure that you are working with an ad hoc grid connected to Essbase.
- 2. In the Essbase ribbon, select Insert Properties.

The **Select Properties** dialog is displayed, listing the available properties for the dimension.

3. Using the check boxes, select the properties to view on the grid, as shown in Figure 1.

Alternatively, click **Select All** to select all dimension properties.

The selected dimension properties and their values are displayed in the columns to the left of the selected dimension. In the grid, the dimension properties column headings are designated as follows:

Dimension Name: Property Name

For example:

You may continue working with the grid using ad hoc commands, such as **Zoom In** and **Keep Only**, while the dimension properties are displayed, as long as the properties have been inserted to the left of the grid.

Note:

This feature will be supported in an upcoming release of Essbase.

Additionally, administrators must set up the database in Essbase for dimension property viewing in Oracle Smart View for Office.

5. **Optional:** After viewing the dimension properties, you may delete the columns containing the dimension properties and still continue working in the ad hoc grid.

- Specifying Data Perspective

Data perspective enables you to specify the perspective to use for viewing data of varying attributes, which are dimension attributes that vary with respect to independent continuous and discrete dimensions.

• Working with Smart Lists

You can enter data using custom drop-down selection lists called Smart Lists, which are accessed from data cells in forms and ad hoc grids.

• Working with Drill-Through Reports

Predefined by administrators, drill-through reports are available to users from specified individual data cells.

- Working with Linked Reporting Objects A *linked reporting object* is a cell note, external file, or URL that is linked to a data cell in an Oracle Essbase database, and which can be retrieved by Oracle Smart View for Office users in Excel.
- Cell Comments You can add comments to data cells.



Adding Attachments

Documents can be attached to individual data cells by way of URLs (Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud and Oracle Hyperion Planning) or files (EPM Cloud only).

 Viewing Cell History You can view the history of changes made to a data cell or range of data cells.

Refreshing Data

You can refresh data using the Refresh button on the Smart View ribbon, and you can refresh data in individual reports by using the Refresh link in the Document Contents pane.

Data source types: All

Note:

Refresh is not supported on protected worksheets.

Refreshing from a Ribbon

Data source types: All

In Excel, you can retrieve and refresh data for the current worksheet or for all worksheets in the workbook using the **Refresh** icon on the Smart View ribbon, shown in Figure 1.

This type of refresh action applies to entire sheets, documents and slides and includes data in all ad hoc grids and reporting objects, such as function grids, tables, or charts.

Figure 7-1 Refresh Icon



Depending on the data provider to which you are connected, the Refresh icon can either be a split button with Refresh options or a simple, one-function Refresh button.



Note:

- On ad hoc sheets, Excel filters are retained after refresh.
- To refresh individual reporting objects, such as function grids, tables, or charts, see Refreshing Individual Reports from Document Contents.
- Selected POV members are reverted to dimension members after deleting some columns and refreshing a spreadsheet. To avoid this, click the POV button to hide the POV toolbar. Then ensure that you do not delete the column that contains the Page members.

To use Refresh, choose an option:

To refresh the entire current worksheet, from any ribbon, click **Refresh**.

In Word or PowerPoint, when you click **Refresh**, all data points copied into the document or presentation are refreshed.

Note:

In Oracle Essbase worksheets that contain multiple grids, you can also refresh only a selected range of cells (see About Multiple Grids on a Worksheet).

 Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition only: To clear the contents of the entire current worksheet and replace it with the latest members and data, click the down arrow in Refresh, and then select Replace and Refresh.

Note:

The **Replace and Refresh** option applies only to reports in Oracle BI EE and Oracle Hyperion Financial Reporting.

 To refresh all worksheets in the current workbook, click the down arrow in Refresh, and then select Refresh All Worksheets.

The **Refresh All Worksheets** operation applies only to visible worksheets; it does not apply to hidden worksheets.

Refreshing Individual Reports from Document Contents

Data source types: All

You can refresh data in individual reports by using the **Refresh** link in the **Document Contents** pane.

In Oracle Smart View for Office, reports consist of report queries and their associated reporting objects. These are listed in the **Document Contents** pane. From **Document Contents**, you can individually refresh report queries and their associated reporting objects, such as:



- Function grids
- Tables
- Charts
- Dynamic data points

Note:

The procedures and examples in this topic discuss refreshing individual reports and reporting objects from the **Document Contents** pane. To refresh all reporting objects in worksheets or workbooks, documents, and slides or presentations, you can use the **Refresh** icon on the Smart View ribbon or a provider ribbon, as described in Refreshing from a Ribbon.


To refresh individual reports in the **Document Contents** pane:

1. Navigate to the individual report query that contains the associated reporting objects to refresh.

The **Refresh** link, ^{Q Refresh}, appears in **Document Contents** only after a reporting object has been inserted for an individual report query.

For example, in Figure 1, a function grid is to be refreshed. Note that the "Demo" report query for the function grid is selected, not the function grid itself.

Figure 7-2 Report Query for Function Grid Selected for Refresh



2. In the Document Contents pane, click Refresh.

You can also right-click on the report query and select Refresh from the context menu, as shown in Figure 2.






Figure 7-3 Refresh Using Right-Click Menu

The reporting objects for the selected report query are refreshed; the rest of the report queries and associated reporting objects remain unrefreshed.

Example 7-1 Notes About Refreshing Individual Reporting Objects in Excel


 You can refresh report queries individually in Excel with the exception of report queries containing function grids.

For example, if two report queries contain function grids, then refreshing one query will revert the other query's function grid to the #NEED REFRESH (unrefreshed) state. This only occurs with function grids. The other reporting objects, such as tables or charts, will refresh normally.

For example, on Sheet 1 in Figure 3, refreshing Report Query 1 will refresh the associated grid and function grid; however, the function grid associated with Report Query 2 will convert to the unrefreshed state while the chart refreshes normally. The report query and associated reporting objects on Sheet2 are unaffected.



Figure 7-4 Selecting a Report Query to Refresh in Excel Where Two Report Queries Contain Function Grids



To refresh all items on the sheet, including multiple function grids, select Sheet1 in the **Document Contents**, as shown in Figure 4, and then click Refresh.

 In Excel, if a reporting object from a single report query is inserted on multiple sheets, then selecting the report query and clicking Refresh will refresh the reporting object on each sheet where it appears.

Example 7-2 Other Refresh Examples

The examples in this section use a Word document to describe the refresh options available depending on the selection made in the **Document Contents** pane.

Figure 5 shows a Word document selected in the **Document Contents** pane. Clicking Refresh will refresh all report queries and their associated reporting objects in the document.

Figure 7-6 Word Document Selected for Refresh




Figure 6 shows a report query selected in the **Document Contents** pane. The report query

contains two reporting objects, a grid and an Office table. Clicking ^{Refresh} will refresh only the selected report query and its two associated reporting objects; other report queries and their reporting objects in the document remain unrefreshed.

Note:

Refreshing an individual sheet or slide will refresh the report queries and reporting objects associated with the selected sheet or slide. For example, if you select a sheet that contains multiple report queries, all reporting objects associated with the multiple report queries on the selected sheet will be refreshed.

Refreshing an entire document will refresh all the report queries in the document and their associated reporting objects.

In Figure 7, two reporting objects are associated with a report query, one reporting object is selected. Notice that Refresh is not available.







Figure 7-8 One of Two Reporting Objects Selected - Refresh Not Available

Figure 8 shows a report query selected in the **Document Contents** pane. The report query

contains a single reporting object, a function grid. Clicking ^{Refresh} will refresh only the selected report query and its associated reporting object; other report queries and their reporting objects in the document remain unrefreshed.

In Figure 9, a single reporting object associated with a report query is selected. Notice that Refresh is not available.






Figure 7-10 Individual Reporting Object Selected - Refresh Not Available

You can update any type of data in the data source by submitting changed data from forms and ad hoc grids. If you make changes while disconnected, you can submit the changes after you reconnect.

Note: Submit Data functionality is generally supported by all data source types. However, refer to the individual Submit Data topics for specific data source support.

Best Practices for Using the Submit Data Options

- When using the **Submit Data** option:
 - While connected to Essbase releases 11.1.2.1.102 and later, you can submit data without first refreshing in free-form mode.
 - While connected to Planning ad hoc, Financial Management ad hoc, or Essbase releases earlier than 11.1.2.1.102, you must refresh the grid before modifying the data when you are in free-form mode.
- When working with an aggregate storage database, you can only submit data from the lowest level (level 0) of a hierarchy.
- You can use the Submit Data Without Refresh and Submit Data Range options to submit cell data from cells that were modified by a user who does not have Smart View installed.
- In worksheets that support multiple grids, you can perform the **Submit Data** commands for only one grid at a time.

If you try to submit data for more than one grid at a time—that is, if you have selected cell ranges in more than one grid—the first range returned by Excel will be used to determine the selected grid and the submit will be performed only on that grid.

- If you are submitting data from forms:
 - In Planning or Financial Management forms, you can lock any cell or range of cells to protect the data until the data is refreshed or submitted. In Financial Management, locking the cell does not lock the actual data cube but only the cell in the form. When the data is refreshed or submitted, the cell is no longer locked.
 - Some cells may no longer exist in the form definition. This behavior may happen if form definition or access privileges have changed, or if rows or columns are suppressed. In these cases, only writable cells that exist in the new form definition are saved. This behavior applies to both cells and supporting detail changes, and also applies when working with forms while connected to or disconnected from the data provider.
 - When you are working in a form and you click Submit Data, you are actually writing data back to the latest POV selected in the POV toolbar. As a best practice, Oracle recommends performing a Refresh whenever you make changes to the POV. The refresh updates the data on the sheet to reflect the latest POV change.



 On forms opened in Smart View from the web application, some calculated and read-only cells can be edited without an error message being displayed, although the changed data cannot be submitted.

- 3. Essbase only: If you are working in free-form mode with an Essbase on-premises release earlier than 11.1.2.1.102, from the Essbase ribbon, select **Refresh.**

Submitting Data Without Refreshing

Submit Data Without Refresh allows users to submit all data from the worksheet.

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase, Planning Ad Hoc, Planning Modules Ad Hoc, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management Ad Hoc, Financial Consolidation and Close Ad Hoc, FreeForm, Tax Reporting Ad Hoc

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Planning Ad Hoc, Oracle Hyperion Financial Management Ad Hoc



Submit Data Without Refresh includes all data cells that you have explicitly modified (made dirty) and those that were not modified. All data cells are marked dirty and submitted. Once the submit operation is complete, the entire grid will be refreshed.

To submit data without first refreshing:

- **1.** Connect to the data source.
- 2. **Optional:** To help you identify modified cells, set a cell style for dirty cells, as described in Cell Styles.
- 3. Modify data as needed.
- From the provider ribbon, select Submit Data, then Submit Data Without Refresh.
 Data for all cells on the sheet is submitted, whether or not the cells are dirty.

Note:

- When updating text datatype values in free-form mode, the Submit Without Refresh action should be used. This applies to Standard Ad Hoc mode only (the application setting, Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior=Standard.)
- If you are working with multiple grids on a worksheet, see Best Practices for Using the Submit Data Options.

Cloud data source types: Planning Ad Hoc, Planning Modules Ad Hoc, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management Ad Hoc, Financial Consolidation and Close Ad Hoc, FreeForm, Tax Reporting Ad Hoc

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Planning Ad Hoc, Oracle Hyperion Financial Management Ad Hoc

You can submit contiguous and non-contiguous single cells or cell ranges.

To submit data:

- 1. Connect to the data source.
- 2. Modify data as needed.

Alternatively, you may have opened a workbook that you received from a user who does not have Oracle Smart View for Office and modified the worksheet. Smart View cannot detect those cells as dirty, so you will need to be informed by that user which cells were modified or added.

- **3. Optional:** To help you identify modified cells, set a cell style for dirty cells, as described in Cell Styles.
- 4. Select the data ranges you want to submit.

You can select contiguous and non-contiguous single cells or cell ranges.

5. From the provider context ribbon (for example, the **Planning Ad Hoc** ribbon), select **Submit**, then **Submit Data Range**.



Only cell data from selected cells is submitted. If there are dirty cells on the sheet outside the range of selected cells, the modified value is not submitted and those cells will revert back to the value that was last stored with the provider.

Note:

After you submit new or changed data, you need to calculate the data in the database to reflect your changes. Your options for calculating data depend on your data source. To calculate data, you must have security access rights to the data.

In Oracle Smart View for Office, you can use a calculation script to calculate a database in Essbase on-premises or cloud. Calculation script types can be Essbase or MDX.

Additionally:

- Essbase and MDX calculation scripts are created by your Essbase administrator for your specific system.
- When launched, Essbase and MDX calculation scripts can prompt you to enter variable information, called runtime prompts.
- Essbase and MDX calculation scripts are supported for aggregate storage and block storage databases.
- MDX calculation scripts can contain multiple MDX queries.
- To change the solve order of a member POV before running a calculation, see Changing the Solve Order of a Selected POV.
- Essbase cloud only:
 - Detailed tracing information can be provided upon execution of an Essbase calculation script. The tracing information is displayed only if your Oracle Essbase administrator has configured the calculation script for tracing.
 - You can run calculations on asymmetric grids. To do this, your administrator must first prepare calculation scripts that specify selected tuples to calculate. See Calculating Asymmetric Grids Using Tuples.

Administrators:

- Do not use the Smart View Manage and Execute Queries dialog to execute multiple MDX queries at once. Instead, select an MDX script and run it from the Calculation Scripts dialog.

To select and launch a calculation script:

- 1. Connect to the data source and create an ad hoc query or open an existing report file.
- 2. Select the data cell on which you plan to run a calculation script.
- 3. From the Smart View ribbon, select **Calculate**.

The Calculation Scripts dialog box is displayed.

- 4. At the top of the dialog, under **Cube**, select a database from the list of databases that belong to this application.
- 5. Under Calculation Script, select a script.

The **Cube** column shows the cube to which the calculation belongs, and the **Type** column shows the calculation type:

- Script signifies an Essbase calculation
- MDX Calc signifies an MDX calculation.
- 6. If the calculation script includes runtime prompts, enter or select the input type specified by the runtime prompt, summarized in the following table.

Note:

Depending on how the runtime prompts have been set up by your Essbase administrator, information for some prompts can be hand-typed. Ensure that the runtime prompt values that you enter are valid. You cannot launch a calculation script until all runtime prompt values are valid.

- 8. Click **OK** to close the message box
- Essbase cloud only: If the calculation script was configuring for tracing, then view the information in the Calculation Result dialog box, and then click OK to close the dialog.

Alternatively, copy and paste the information from the **Calculation Result** dialog and save it in your favorite text editor.

The **Calculation Result** dialog box contains detailed information on the calculation that was executed when the script was launched. For example:

- **11**. Click **Submit** to submit the changed data back to the database.

Calculating Asymmetric Grids Using Tuples

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase

Tuple calculation for asymmetric grids lets Oracle Smart View for Office users execute calculations for the specific scope of member selections in a grid or calculation script, avoiding over-calculation.

A calculation *tuple* is a way to represent a data slice of members, from one or more sparse dimensions, to be used in a calculation FIX statement.

By default, when multiple members from different dimensions are in a calculation FIX statement, or are part of the grid POV in Smart View, the calculation scope is all possible combinations (a Cartesian-product) of all member combinations from different dimensions. This can result in more calculations than are needed when working with asymmetric grids. With tuple calculations, the scope of calculations can be more precise and efficient.

Administrators set up tuple calculations in Essbase as they do other calculations that they create for users to run from Smart View, based on their specific data set and business needs.

As a Smart View user, you run tuple calculations for asymmetric grids as you would any other calculation. You may be asked to specify runtime prompts, depending on how your administrator set up the tuple calculation.



Note:

- You can run tuple calculations on asymmetric grids starting in Smart View release 11.1.2.5.800. Check that your Essbase data source supports calculation tuples.
- Administrators: Using the tuple calculation feature, you can define calculation scope as selected member tuples in an asymmetric grid. Special syntax in FIX statements helps you specify which tuples to calculate. See Calculate Selected Tuples in Using Oracle Essbase, for more information on tuple calculations.

In Smart View, to run a tuple calculation on an asymmetric grid, follow the instructions for running a calculation in Running Essbase Calculations.

Select a script written for tuple calculations on asymmetric grids. Your administrator can advise you which scripts you should run.

Example 7-3 Running Tuple Calculations on an Asymmetric Grid

The examples in this scenario are based on an example gallery template for tuple calculation. The gallery template is available in Essbase versions that support calculation tuples.

Start with the asymmetric grid shown below. The grid is asymmetric because we do not see the same member hierarchies in the row and column dimensions.

We'll show the result of running three different types of calculations on the asymmetric grid, and then the effect those calculations have on the symmetric grid.

The scripts are configured to increment the data cells by 1 each time they are run, with different results on the symmetric grid for each type of calculation.

The first script we'll run calculates everything in the grid POV, not only the member combination shown in the grid below. In the asymmetric grid, after a refresh, all data cells now equal 2.

We submit the cells in the asymmetric grid, then go to the symmetric grid and refresh it. Note that on refresh, every Entity, Version, Scenario and Site for the Product/Market combination is calculated, even though they aren't on the asymmetric grid. This is because, by default, absent a tuple calculation, Essbase calculates the Cartesian product of the combinations seen in the grid. The result is that all cells in the POV are incremented by 1, so you will see a value of 2 in all data cells in the symmetric grid:




Figure 7-14 Symmetric Grid After Running Default Calculation on Asymmetric Grid and Refresh

Second, we'll run a more limited calculation on the asymmetric grid, shrinking the calculation scope to Product and Market grid tuples so that fewer intersections are calculated. The **Calculation Result** message shows us the scope of this calculation:

In the symmetric grid, note on refresh that only the Product/Market tuples already included on the asymmetric grid are calculated, along with all Site/Version/Entity combinations. These are all the columns of rows 5 through 10, and row 12. These cells now show a data value of 3. The Product/Market tuples not shown in our asymmetric grid are not calculated in the symmetric grid; their data cell value is still 2. For this calculation, only Product and Market combinations were specified for tuples. The tuples and all members for unspecified dimensions (those not specified in the FIX statement) are calculated.

The tuple calculation specifies that only the indicated Entity, Site, Market, Product, Version combinations on our asymmetric grid should be calculated. After running the calculation, the **Calculation Result** dialog shows an even smaller calculation scope:

Move to the symmetric grid and refresh. Remember, the tuple calculation specified that only the Entity, Site, Market, Product, Version combinations indicated on our asymmetric grid should be calculated. On the symmetric grid, you can see that only rows 5 through 10 and row 12 and columns C and M, are incremented to 4. These are the tuples that correspond to the data that was incremented in the asymmetric grid, and are highlighted in yellow below:

The examples in this section showed you the effects of three calculations on an asymmetric grid and a symmetric grid. We looked at the result of each calculation on each type of grid. We learned that by selecting tuples, you can focus calculations in the active Smart View grid, limiting their scope to specific slices of data in your cube.

Changing the Solve Order of a Selected POV

Data source types: Oracle Essbase

Using the **Cell Information** command on the Essbase ribbon, you can view information about a data cell, such as its POV and data consolidation property. Additionally, you can change the solve order of the data cell at the member intersection, or POV, that you selected.

Solve order is a value that represents the order, or priority, of a member when a calculation is performed. Users can view and change the solve order by editing the solve order value in the **Data Cell Information** dialog box.

The selected data cell must contain a dynamic member in the POV.

To change the solve order of a data cell:

- 1. In an ad hoc grid or report, select a data cell.
- 2. In the Essbase ribbon, click 💆 Cell Information to view the Data Cell Information dialog box.

For example, Figure 1 shows a simple ad hoc query based on the Sample Basic application and database. We select cell B3, at the intersection of Qtr1 and Profit:

3. Select a member row in the Data Cell Information dialog and click Edit.

The cursor is placed in the **Solve Order** field, where you can type a new value.

Alternatively, double-click the value in the **Solve Order** field and type a new value.

Valid solve order values are between 0 and 127.

If you enter a value above 127, you will be prompted to enter a value between 0 to 127. Note that members with a solve order of zero, 0, will not be listed in the dialog.

- 4. **Optional:** To change the solve order value for any other members in the POV, repeat step 3.
- 5. Click **OK** to commit all solve order changes.
- 6. Repeat this procedure to change the solve order of any other data cells.
- 7. Run the calculation you require, following the instructions in Calculating Data in Essbase.

Consolidating Data

Consolidation is the process of gathering data from dependent entities and aggregating the data to parent entities.

Data source types: Oracle Hyperion Financial Management



Before you start:

- To use the **Consolidate** option, you must have security access rights to the data and you must be assigned the **Consolidate** security role.
- To use the **Consolidate All** option, you must be assigned the **Consolidate All** security role.

To consolidate data:

- 1. Select a cell or range of cells for which you want to run consolidation.
- 2. From the data source ad hoc ribbon, select **Consolidate**, then select one of the following options:
 - Consolidate to consolidate data for the selected entities.
 - Consolidate All to consolidate data for all entities, whether or not they contain data
 - Consolidate All With Data to consolidate the selected entities only if they contain data.
 - Calculate Contribution to calculate contribution values of all dependent entities.
 - Force Calculate Contribution to force calculation to run for all selected contribution values.

Working with Currencies

In forms enabled for currency conversion, you can enter data in a currency other than the base currency of a cell.

Translating Currencies in Financial Management

Data source types: Oracle Hyperion Financial Management

Converting currencies is called "translating data" in Financial Management. You can translate data from the entity's input currency to any other currency defined in the application. Currencies are not associated with a parent-child entity pair, so you can translate data on demand, separately from the consolidation process.

In ad hoc grids, if you have security access rights to the data, you can convert, or translate, values from one currency to another. To translate data:

- 1. Select a cell or range of cells.
- 2. From the data source ad hoc ribbon, select Calculation, then select one of the following:
 - To translate the selected cells, select Translate.
 - To force translation to run for all selected cells, select Force Translate.



Changing Currency in Planning

In forms enabled for currency conversion, you can enter data in a currency other than the base currency of a cell. Currencies in the drop-down list can be designated as the local currency.

Note:

To override the base currency for an entity, the cell must be displayed in the local currency, and its version must be bottom-up. The application must be a multi-currency application and the form should support multi-currency.

To enter cell data in a local currency other than the base currency for the cell:

- 1. In a form, select a local currency member for the cell.
- 2. Optional: To look up the currency's code, select View, then Currency.

Available Currencies shows the application's currencies. Note the Currency Code for the currency you want to work with, and close the window.

3. In the right column, HSP_InputCurrency, type the new Currency Code in the data cell.

Typing the currency code in the data cell overrides the base currency for the entity.

- 4. Click **Submit** to submit the new currency code to the Oracle Hyperion Planning server.
- 5. Enter the currency value in the left column, HSP_InputValue, of the data cell.
- 6. Click **Rules on Form** and select the Calculate Currencies rule to calculate and save the new currency value.

If the Calculate Currencies calc script is set to run when the form is saved, and the form is enabled for multiple currencies, the data value is displayed in the currency you selected.

Adjusting Values in Data Cells

You can adjust the value of one or more data cells by a specified number or percentage if the cells contain numerical data.

If you adjust the value of a cell that contains an Excel formula, the adjusted value overwrites the formula.

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase, Planning, Planning Modules, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Tax Reporting

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Financial Management, Oracle Hyperion Planning

To adjust data values:

1. Click the data cell that contains the value to adjust.



- 2. From the data source ribbon, select Adjust.
- 3. From Adjust Data, select an option then enter the number or percentage by which you want to adjust the value of the cell.
- 4. Click Adjust Data.

Resolving Data Validation Errors

Your administrator can set up data validation rules to ensure that data meets company guidelines.

Cloud data provider types: Planning, Financial Consolidation and Close, Tax Reporting

On-premises data provider types: Oracle Hyperion Planning

For example, your administrator can set:

- Criteria for the data you enter, called data validation rules
- Background colors to call your attention to data validation errors
- Messages that tell you what the criteria is

The **Data Validation** pane displays in the Smart View Panel, listing the cells containing validation errors, grouped by validation rule.

Figure 1 is an example of these elements.

If the data in a form doesn't meet the criteria in the data validation rules, follow the steps in this topic to fix the errors.

To resolve data validation errors in simple forms and composite forms:

1. In a form with errors, hover your cursor over the cell having a non-default colored background to view the validation message.



Your administrator typically calls your attention to cells having data validation rule errors by displaying them with a colored background. Pop-up text displays the validation rule.

2. Click in each data cell that has validation errors and resolve each error based on the instructions in the data validation message.

You can also locate cells to resolve by reviewing the cells listed in the **Data Validation** pane of the Smart View Panel.

As you resolve errors, those cells are removed the list.

- 3. In composite forms, repeat this for each form having data validation errors.
- 4. If there's more than one message in a cell, view the pop-up messages and resolve the errors.
- 5. When you've resolved all errors, submit the data.

The cells' colored backgrounds and the data validation messages no longer display in the grid and the **Data Validation** pane no longer displays in the Smart View Panel.



💎 Tip:

If your POV doesn't include valid members, you can clear the current members by clicking on the editable dimensions in the POV, and then selecting **<Clear Selection>**. You can then select members from the dimensions that are included in the valid intersection definition.

Specifying Data Perspective

Data perspective enables you to specify the perspective to use for viewing data of varying attributes, which are dimension attributes that vary with respect to independent continuous and discrete dimensions.

For example, suppose a cola product is sold in both cans and bottles in several different geographical markets over the course of a year. If the packaging (cans or bottles) varies depending on the market or changes from one type to the other during the year, the packaging type is a varying attribute. The data associated with the cola would be different depending on the time of year and the market.

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase

Note:

Data perspective may not be enabled in your Oracle Smart View for Office system. Your options for data perspective are enabled and configured by your Smart View administrator.

To specify data perspective:

- 1. From the Essbase ribbon, select Data Perspective.
- 2. From **Perspective**, under **Selection**, select an option (see Data Perspective Illustration for examples of options).
 - **Reality** to display the data with no perspective.
 - **Last** to display the data for the last level 0 member of each continuous independent dimension. For example, if Year is the continuous dimension and December is the last member of Year, then the data for December is displayed.
 - **Start** to display the data for the first level 0 member of each continuous independent dimension. For example, if Year is the continuous dimension and January is the first member of Year, then the data for January is displayed.
 - Custom if you want to specify both continuous and discrete members. For this
 option, select a Varying Attribute from the drop-down list. Then, for the dimensions
 listed under Independent Dimension, select members under Members. If you select
 Set Dimensions Only, all independent dimensions across all varying attribute are
 displayed, enabling you to apply a common perspective to all.
- 3. Click **OK**, then refresh the grid.



Example 7-4 Data Perspective Illustration

In our example of cola sold in cans and bottles, suppose the Administrator has specified the following attributes for the cola packaging types to reflect how the cola was sold in Texas and California markets during the year:

- Can: California, January—December year
- Can: Texas, July—December
- Bottle: Texas, January—June

Figure 1 illustrates the Reality perspective. The data shown for California and Texas is data for the entire year. Since bottles were not sold in California, no data is returned (indicated here by #Meaningless).

Working with Smart Lists

You can enter data using custom drop-down selection lists called Smart Lists, which are accessed from data cells in forms and ad hoc grids.

On-premises data source types: Oracle Hyperion Planning

A Smart List is a drop-down selection list displayed in a form or ad hoc grid cell as an alphanumeric text description, but stored in the database as a number. For example, an integer Smart List for a reporting cycle may have the values 1-5, for Yearly (1), Quarterly (2), Monthly (3), Daily (4), and Hourly (5). The values that are displayed on the form or ad hoc grid are Yearly, Quarterly, Monthly, Daily, and Hourly. When you select one of these values on the form or ad hoc grid, and submit the data, the number associated with it is stored in the database. This means that you do not have to remember the numeric values associated with each time period in the reporting cycle.

In Oracle Smart View for Office, you access Smart Lists from custom drop-down lists in form or ad hoc grid cells. When clicking into cells whose members are associated with a Smart List, you click the down arrow that appears directly to the right of the cell, then select a drop-down list option instead of typing data; in fact, you cannot type in a cell that contains a Smart List.

For example, a data form may contain a Smart List called Justification that provides selections for Research, Customer Feedback, and Expansion. When you click into Account cells named Reason (whose members are associated with the Justification Smart List), a down arrow is displayed. When you click the down arrow, it expands into a drop-down list with the following selections:

- Research
- Customer Feedback
- Expansion

You then select one of the Smart List options as the value for the cell.

To enter a Smart List value in a form or ad hoc grid cell:

1. Open a form or ad hoc grid in Excel.

See Opening Forms in Excel or Starting Ad Hoc Analysis.

2. In the form or ad hoc grid, click into the data cell for which you want to select a Smart List option.

A down arrow is displayed to the right of the cell; for example:

Note: Only cells whose members are associated with Smart Lists contain Smart List drop-down lists.

3. Click the down arrow for the cell.

The down arrow expands into a Smart List drop-down list with options from which you can choose; for example:

4. From the Smart List, select an option.

The option you select is entered into the data cell.

After selecting a value, the cell becomes "dirty" and the data is ready to submit; for example:

Guidelines for Working with Smart Lists

- You cannot type in cells that contain Smart Lists. You must enter data by selecting a value from the Smart List.
- In forms containing Smart Lists, after deleting all values in a row in order to enter and submit new data, the Smart Lists in that row are empty.

Workaround: Remove row values, and then perform a **Submit** (that is, you submit #Missing values) or a **Refresh**. The Smart List drop-down arrows are then displayed properly. Now, you can enter new values for the same row.



- Smart Lists are supported with the HsGetValue and HsSetValue functions. However, with functions, you will not see the Smart List drop-down options. Instead:
 - HsGetValue Simply retrieves the Smart List value as a string value.
 - HsSetValue Submits the value as a string value.
- Smart Lists must be set up and enabled by an administrator before you can use them in Smart View. For more information on enabling Smart Lists for forms and ad hoc grids, see the information Smart Lists in the relevant administration guide; for example:

From Smart View, you can drill through to the detailed data in a database as follows:



- Oracle Hyperion Planning, Financial Management, or supported Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud data sources: You can drill through from your application to detailed data in Oracle Hyperion Financial Data Quality Management, Enterprise Edition or Oracle Hyperion Financial Data Quality Management data sources.
- Supported EPM Cloud data sources: In Smart View, using the Drill-Through Launch option, you can choose to launch drill-through reports in a browser or on a new Excel sheet, or be prompted to make that choice at run time. The Drill-Through Launch option is located on the Advanced tab of the Options dialog. For more information, see Setting the Drill-Through Launch Option.

Administrators: For more information on configuring drill-through, see these topics in *Administering Data Integration for Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud*:

- Oracle Hyperion Planning data source: You can launch drill-through reports only in a web browser, and not in a new Excel sheet. Service Administrators or users who are familiar with editing the properties.xml file can default the launch of drill-through reports in the web browser using the disableDTLaunchType property present in the Smart View properties.xml file. For more information, see Defaulting and Disabling the Launch Method for Drill-Through Reports.

- Essbase cloud:
 - You can drill through to relational databases or to URLs.
 - You can select multiple cells for drill-through to relational data in Excel sheets.
- Essbase on-premises: You can drill through to Oracle General Ledger, to relational databases, or to URLs.

Essbase on-premises administrators:

- For applications created in Oracle Essbase Administration Services, users can drill through to Oracle General Ledger.
- For applications created in Oracle Essbase Studio, users can drill through to relational databases. You can require a user name and password to access the drill-through report. You can also configure drill-through to URLs.

Consider these guidelines when working with drill-through reports:

- A cell can be associated with multiple drill-through reports.
- Cells that contain drill-through reports can be indicated on the grid by a cell style (see Cell Styles).
- The data displayed in a drill-through report is dynamic.
- You cannot use alias names for drill-through; you must use member names.



Note:

Mozilla Firefox, Google Chrome, and Microsoft Edge require a browser-specific add-on for drill-through. Follow the instructions on installing the add-on for these browsers in the *Oracle Smart View for Office Installation and Configuration Guide*, Installing Browser Add-ons.

Setting the Drill-Through Launch Option

Specify your drill-through launch preference: drill-through to a web page, or drill-through to an Excel sheet.

Data source types: Planning, Planning Modules, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Tax Reporting

When connected to a supported Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud service and using Data Integration to load data for drill-through reports, you can launch the reports in a browser or on a new Excel sheet.

Specify your launch preference using the **Drill-Through Launch** option, located in the **Options** dialog. **Advanced** tab.

To specify your drill-through launch preference:

- 1. In the Smart View ribbon, select **Options**, and then **Advanced**.
- 2. For Drill-Through Launch, select your preferred launch method:
 - In Web Browser—Always launch in a browser

Note:

Always select this option for Oracle Hyperion Planning data sources as drillthrough reports from Oracle Hyperion Planning can be launched only in a web browser, and not in a new Excel sheet. This option may appear selected by default and not editable for you, based on the configurations set by your administrator.

- In New Sheet—Always launch on a new Excel sheet
- Prompt Me to Choose Target—Prompt me to choose browser launch or Excel sheet launch at runtime
- 3. Click OK.

Note:

Advanced options are global options. Changes to global options become the default settings for all existing and new worksheets and workbooks so it is not necessary to use **Save as Default Options** or **Apply to All Worksheets** with global options.



4. Launch a drill-through report, as described in Accessing Drill-Through Reports

Defaulting and Disabling the Launch Method for Drill-Through Reports

The method of launching drill-through reports from Smart View can be set as default and disabled for users.

Data source types: Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Planning, Planning Modules, Tax Reporting

Note:

The task in this topic is for Service Administrators or users who are familiar with editing the properties.xml file located in the <Smart View Install>/cfg folder (for example, C:\Oracle\SmartView\cfg).

Drill-through reports can be launched either in a web browser or in a new Excel sheet. Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud users can select the preferred method in the **Drill-Through Launch** option in the **Advanced** tab of **Options** dialog.

However, for on-premises Oracle Hyperion Planning data sources, drill-through reports can be launched only in a web browser.

Using the disableDTLaunchType property present in the Smart View properties.xml file, you can disable the selection of **Drill-Through Launch** options for users in the **Advanced** tab and default it to the web browser for supported EPM Cloud data sources.

To default and disable the drill-through launch options:

- 1. In your Smart View installation, navigate to the SmartView\cfg folder.
- 2. Make a backup copy of the original properties.xml file.
- 3. Open properties.xml for editing.
- 4. Locate the following entry:

<disableDTLaunchType>0</disableDTLaunchType>

5. Change the disableDTLaunchType value to 1 to make web browser as the default method for launching drill-through reports

<disableDTLaunchType>1</disableDTLaunchType>

- 6. Save the updated file.
- 7. Restart the Excel application.

Accessing Drill-Through Reports


Depending on your data source connection, you can drill through to web pages or Excel sheets.

To access a drill-through report:



1. Select a data cell associated with a drill-through report.

Oracle Essbase cloud: You can select multiple cells for drill-through to relational data in Excel sheets.



- 2. From the data source ribbon, select Drill-through.
- **3.** If there are multiple drill-through reports associated with the cell, select a report from the list and click **Launch**.

If only one drill-through report is associated with the cell, the drill-through report launches directly.

Note:

Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud:

- If connected to a supported EPM Cloud service and using Data Integration to load data for drill-through reports, the report is launched according to the selection you made in Setting the Drill-Through Launch Option.
- The first time that you click a drill-through cell and the browser launches, you may be asked to log in to your cloud service and the drill-through report may not be displayed as expected. You can return to the sheet in Oracle Smart View for Office and click the drill-through cell again to launch the drillthrough report. Or, to avoid this error, you may sign in to the business process in the browser first, before launching drill-through from Smart View.

Note:

Oracle Essbase on-premises only:

If required, enter a user name and password. The user name and password fields are displayed only if required to access the drill-through report. If a user name and password are not required, then these fields are not displayed.

Drilling Through to Source Data

With Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud data providers, you can drill through to web pages or Excel sheets.

When working with EPM Cloud data providers, and performing a drill through from Oracle Smart View for Office to display drill data, the system now supports two ways to display the source data:



- Drill through to the source landing web page using a hyperlink. In this case, when you initiate a source drill, the system launches the source landing page in your default browser.
- Drill through to the source data using an EPM Integration Agent query. In this case, the source data is queried and the data is displayed in a new Excel sheet in Smart View.

This topic focuses on drilling through to source data and displaying it in Excel.

When this drill-through option is enabled, your first drill-through operation takes you from your main worksheet to a staging sheet. From the staging sheet, you can drill further into a data cell to the source data for the selected cell. Drill-through to source is available on any data cell for any dimension/member combination in the staging sheet. From the source sheet, you can navigate back to the staging sheet, and then back to the main sheet.

Note:

Service Administrators: To use this feature, you must first execute a SQL query in the source database and display the results in a pop-window inside Data Integration. For more information, see Creating a Drill Down to a Source System Without a Landing Page in Administering Data Integration for Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud.

To drill-through to source data:

1. Before you begin, in the **Options** dialog, **Advanced** tab, set the **Drill-Through** Launch option to In New Sheet or Prompt Me to Choose Target.

See Setting the Drill-Through Launch Option for information on setting this option.

2. Right-click on a drill-through cell, and from the context menu, select **Smart View**, and then **Drill-Through**.

You can also click the **Drill-Through** option on the provider ribbon.

If prompted for a drill-through option, select Open as new sheet.

In the following example, we're using cell styles to call out the drill-through cells in a form. The drill-through cells are pink. Right-click on a drill-through cell and select **Smart View** in the context menu to view the submenu, where we'll select **Drill-Through**.

Drill-through to source is available on any data cell for any dimension/member combination in the staging sheet.

Optionally, from the **Smart View** context menu on the staging sheet, you can select **Go to Main Sheet** to return to the sheet from which you began.

4. **Optional:** In the source sheet, to navigate back to the staging sheet, right-click a cell and select **Smart View**, and then **Go to Staging Sheet**.

Note:

- This navigation works even if you rename the staging or main sheet.
- Be aware that when reusing the main or staging sheet to perform a Smart View action, such as opening a form or starting a new ad hoc grid, the links for the Go to Main Sheet and Go to Staging Sheet commands still persist. If you rely on those links, and the content on the main or staging sheet is changed, then you may be directed to a cell where there is no drill-through information or the drill-through information is no longer applicable.

Cloud data source types: Planning, Planning Modules, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Tax Reporting

Use the **Sheet Info** command in the Smart View ribbon to view details about the cell intersection and POV of the cell from which the drill-through report was launched.

To view the source POV of a drill-through report launch cell:

1. Ensure that you have enabled drill-through launch on to a sheet.

In the **Options** dialog, **Advanced** tab, you should select either **In New Sheet** or **Prompt Me to Choose Target**. For more information, see Setting the Drill-Through Launch Option.

- 2. Launch a drill-through report on to a new sheet, as described in Accessing Drill-Through Reports.
- 3. Select the Smart View ribbon, and then select Sheet Info.

The POV of the intersection of the drill-through launch cell is shown in the **Sheet Information** dialog box. In the example POV shown in Figure 1, we see these information categories related to the cell intersection:

- Row members
- Column members
- POV members



• Page members

We also see a General section showing that we we're working with a drill-through sheet.

In Oracle Smart View for Office ad hoc mode, when drill-through is launched, the POV section of **Sheet Information** dialog shows the member names corresponding to the alias table selected on the ad hoc sheet.

4. **Optional:** Click **Save** to save the POV information in a separate sheet in the workbook.

💙 Tip:

As a best practice, copy and paste the POV information from the new sheet to a permanent file for your own reference.



Working with Linked Reporting Objects

A *linked reporting object* is a cell note, external file, or URL that is linked to a data cell in an Oracle Essbase database, and which can be retrieved by Oracle Smart View for Office users in Excel.

Attaching a Linked Reporting Object to a Data Cell

You can attach one or more linked reporting objects to a data cell.

To attach a linked reporting object to a data cell:

1. Ensure that you're working with a connected worksheet.

Note:

If you are working with a saved ad hoc sheet or a grid layout that contains no data yet (for example, a free-form grid), you are not required to refresh the sheet first. Ensure that you are connected to the data provider, then right-click the correct database in the Smart View Panel, and then select **Set Active Connection for this Worksheet**.

- 2. Select a data cell.
- 3. From the Essbase ribbon, select Linked Objects.
- From Linked Reporting Objects, click Attach
 and select one of the following:
 - Cell Note to attach an annotation to the data cell
 - File to attach an external file to the data cell
 - URL to attach a URL to the data cell

The dialog box appropriate to your selection is displayed.

- 5. Enter information as follows:
 - Cell Note: Enter text for the note. Then click Close. The first few words of the note are displayed in the Description column of the Linked Reporting Objects list.



- File: Use the Browse button to navigate to the file that you want to attach to the data cell. You can add a brief description for the file. Then click Close.
- URL: In URL, enter a URL for a web site, a network or local directory, or a document in a network or local directory. You can add a brief description for the URL. Then click **Close**.
- 6. Repeat the procedure to attach other linked reporting objects as needed.

The objects that you created are displayed in the **Linked Reporting Objects** list as shown here:

To edit or delete a linked reporting object, use the **Edit** button \checkmark or **Delete** button \Join . Deleting an object removes it from the database.

To launch a reporting object from a data cell:

1. Ensure that you're working with a connected worksheet.

Note:

If you are working with a saved ad hoc sheet or a grid layout that contains no data yet (for example, a free-form grid), you are not required to refresh the sheet first. Ensure that you are connected to the data provider, then right-click the correct database in the Smart View Panel, and then select **Set Active Connection for this Worksheet**.

- 2. Select the data cell that is associated with the linked object that you want to launch.
- 3. From the Essbase ribbon, select Linked Objects to display Linked Reporting Objects.
- 4. From Linked Reporting Objects, select the linked object to launch.
- 5. Click . The linked reporting object launches as follows:
 - Cell notes are displayed in the Cell Note dialog box.
 - Files are opened.
 - URL objects are opened in the default web browser.
 - Linked partitions—see Launching Linked Partitions.

Launching Linked Partitions

A linked partition connects two databases by means of a data cell.

Using a data cell associated with a linked partition, you can navigate from the database connected to the current grid to a second database. Because the two databases may have different dimensions, you can see the data in different contexts. When you launch a linked partition, a new spreadsheet that displays the dimensions from the linked database opens. From there, you can drill down into the dimensions of the linked database.

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase

To launch a linked partition:

- **1**. Select a data cell associated with a linked partition.
- 2. From the Essbase ribbon, select Linked Objects.
- 3. From Linked Reporting Objects, select the linked partition (displayed as Linked in the list).
- 4. Click

The linked partition is launched in a new spreadsheet. From this spreadsheet, you can drill down to data in the linked database.

Cell Comments

You can add comments to data cells.

You can add one or more comments per data cell. Each data cell can contain comments from multiple users.

Cloud data source types: Planning, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Tax Reporting

On-premises data source types: Oracle Hyperion Planning

In release 11.1.2.5.620 and later, Oracle Smart View for Office conforms to the character limit set in Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud and Oracle Hyperion Planning. Depending on the permission level assigned to you by the administrator, you may be able to do any of the following in a data cell:

- Add comments.
- View the comments that you and other users have added.
- Delete comments that you have entered. You cannot delete comments added by other users.

Cells that contain comments can be associated with a cell style. See Cell Styles.

To add comments to a data cell:

1. Select one data cell or a range of data cells in an ad hoc grid.

Use the **Shift** key to select a range of data cells. Do not use the **Ctrl** key to select cell ranges.

- 2. From the provider ribbon or provider ad hoc ribbon, select **Cell Actions** and then **Comments**.
- 3. From Comments, click 👺
- 4. If you selected a range of cells in step 1, you can either enter comments for one cell at a time or apply a comment to all selected cells.
 - To enter a comment for one cell, select the cell from the drop-down menu.
 - To enter a comment for all selected cells, select Apply to all selected cells.
- 5. In the field at the right, enter a comment. If you want to format the comment, use HTML tags.



6. Click losave the comment.

The comment is displayed in the list of comments to the left of the comment field. This list contains comments entered by all users.

- 7. Click OK.
- 8. **Optional:** To delete a comment, click X. You can delete only the comments that you have entered.

Adding Cell Comments in Financial Management

Cells in ad hoc grids, forms, Smart Slices, and the Query Designer can contain multiple comments. Comments within a cell are differentiated by their labels, which are defined in Oracle Hyperion Financial Management. You cannot create labels in Oracle Smart View for Office.

You select from these defined labels to add and view in Smart View. You cannot edit or delete labels, but you can edit and delete comments.

Viewing and Adding Cell Comments

To view or add cell comments in Financial Management:

- **1**. Select a cell in the grid.
- 2. From the ribbon, select Cell Comments.

Any comments currently associated with the cell are displayed in the Cell Comments list.

- **3.** To add a comment, from **Cell Comments**, select a label from the drop-down menu.
- 4. Click 🚏

The selected cell text label is added to the list of labels.

- 5. Click in the field under **Cell Text** and add a comment.
- 6. Repeat as needed to add other labels.
- 7. Click OK.

The labels in the list are now associated with the cell.

Note:

After submitting a cell that has a pipe character (|) and caret ($^{\land}$), the submitting removes all pipe characters and adds "c" after any caret.

Editing and Deleting Cell Comments

To edit or delete cell comments in Financial Management:

- **1**. Select a cell in the grid.
- 2. From the HFM ribbon, select **Cell Comments**.



- 3. From Cell Comments, select a comment in the list and then do one of the following:
 - 🛛 To edit the comment, select 🗹. After editing, click 🖉
 - To delete the comment from the cell, select the **Delete** button. The comment is removed from the list. Deleting a comment removes it only from the selected cell; it remains available for selection from the drop-down menu.
- 4. Click OK.

Note:

In Financial Management, you can use functions HsSetText and HsGetText to submit and retrieve cell text to and from the data source. See Functions.

Adding Attachments

Documents can be attached to individual data cells by way of URLs (Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud and Oracle Hyperion Planning) or files (EPM Cloud only).

Cloud data source types: Planning, Planning Modules, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Tax Reporting

On-premises data source types: Oracle Hyperion Planning

Note: In this topic, "documents" can mean URLs or files.

Each data cell can contain multiple documents attached by one or more users. Depending on the permission level assigned to you by the administrator, you may be able to do any of the following in a data cell:

- Attach documents by way of URLs (EPM Cloud and Oracle Hyperion Planning).
- Attach documents as files (EPM Cloud only).

Note:

File attachments are not supported for on-premises Oracle Hyperion Planning.

- View the documents that you and other users have attached.
- Edit and delete documents that you have attached. You cannot edit or delete documents attached by other users.

Cells that contain attachments can be associated with a cell style. See Cell Styles.



Note:

If you are migrating from an on-premises environment to EPM Cloud, and your forms have Oracle Hyperion Enterprise Performance Management Workspace URL attachments that reference documents uploaded in the EPM Workspace, you cannot access these documents in Oracle Smart View for Office. Instead, you can attach the documents directly to the form.

To attach documents to a data cell:

- 1. Select one data cell or a range of data cells in an ad hoc grid or form.
- 2. From the provider ribbon or provider ad hoc ribbon, select **Cell Actions**, and then **Attachment**.

For example, select **Cell Actions**, and then **Attachment** from the Planning ribbon or Planning Ad Hoc ribbon.

- 3. In the Attachments dialog, click the Attach button, ^{**} Attach *, and select File or URL.
 - File—For EPM Cloud data sources only. Continue to step 4.
 - **URL**—For EPM Cloud and Oracle Hyperion Planning data sources. Continue to step 5.
- 4. EPM Cloud only: If you selected File in step 3, then, in the Select File to Attach to Cell dialog, navigate to the file that you want to attach, select it, and click Open.

The file is uploaded to the selected cell.



Note:

The following are some best practices for attaching files.

- Each file you attach must have a unique file name, whether you are attaching files to the same cell or to different cells in a range.
- In order for other users to see files that you attach, the files must be selected from a location that is accessible to other users, such as a shared network location.
- To attach files to cells in a range, select a cell from the drop-down list in the Attachments dialog, navigate to the file, select it, and click Open to upload the file to the selected cell. Repeat for each different file you want to attach to different cells in the range.
- There is no size limit enforced on cell attachments, but larger files will impact performance.
- 5. If you selected **URL** in step 3, a new row is added where you enter the following information:
 - Click in the cell under **Description** to add a brief description.
 - Click in the cell under **Reference** to enter the URL location of the document or web
 page that you want to attach.

When you save the URL attachment in the next step, the **User** and **Date Entered** fields will be automatically populated.

Note:

You can attach a URL to a range of cells. If you select a range of cells, you can either attach URLs to one cell at a time or attach the same URL to all selected cells.

- To attach a URL to one cell in the range, select the cell from the drop-down menu, select Attach, then URL, and then enter the Description and Reference.
- To attach one URL to all selected cells in the range, select **Apply to all selected cells**.
- 6. If you attached only URLs, or attached a combination of URLs and files, then, to save

your attachment selections, click

If you attached only files, then a save is not required and the **Save** button, **I**, is not enabled.

- 7. Repeat this procedure to add attachments as you require.
- Optional: For URL attachments, to edit a Reference entry, select the attachment row to edit, click 2, edit the reference, and then click 2.



Editing the **Reference** entry for File attachments is not supported. Instead, delete the entry (see the next step) and reattach the file, as described in the above steps.

9. Optional: To delete an attachment, select the attachment in the list, then click

Delete, 💌, and then click Save, 🖳

10. Click Close.

Launching Attachments

To launch an attached document:

- **1**. Select the cell that contains the attachment.
- 2. From the provider ribbon or provider Ad Hoc ribbon, select **Cell Actions** and then **Attachment**.

For example, in the Planning ribbon or Planning Ad Hoc ribbon, select **Cell Actions**, and then **Attachment**.

3. Select an attachment row and, in the left column, click the download link:

Click 🖉 to launch a file.

Click 🗒 to launch a URL.

Viewing Cell History

You can view the history of changes made to a data cell or range of data cells.

For each change listed, the user who made the change, date, old value, and new value are displayed.

Cloud data source types: Planning

On-premises data source types: Oracle Hyperion Planning

Note:

Cell history is available only if data auditing is enabled by the Planning administrator, as described in the *Oracle Hyperion Planning Administrator's Guide*.

To display cell history:

- 1. Select one data cell or a range of cells in a Planning ad hoc grid.
- 2. From the **Planning Ad Hoc** ribbon, select **Cell Actions** and then **Cell History** to display the **Change History** screen.
- **3.** If you selected multiple cells in step **1**, select one cell at a time from the drop-down menu in **Change History** to view its history.

Working with Forms in Excel

Forms are grid displays in which you can enter data into the database from Excel and view and analyze data or related text.

Certain dimension member values are fixed, giving you a specific view into the data.

Using Oracle Smart View for Office, you can work with forms in Excel with these Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud data sources:

- Planning
- Planning Modules
- Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management
- Financial Consolidation and Close
- FreeForm
- Tax Reporting

And with these Oracle Enterprise Performance Management System data sources:

- Oracle Hyperion Financial Management
- Oracle Hyperion Planning

Guidelines for Forms Opened in Smart View

Consider the following guidelines while working with forms opened in Smart View:



- You can modify data values but not the form structure in forms.
- · Values submitted to the database from Excel must be non-formatted data.
- If the administrator changes the form definition while you're working with the form in Excel, Oracle recommends that you close the form and reopen it. This action ensures that the newest form definitions are displayed.
- Customizations made to forms are preserved when you save or refresh only if they are made outside the grid or if they are made to thousands and decimal separators.
- Excel worksheets are always protected to prevent entering data for read-only cells. Therefore, some Excel functions, such as AutoSum and F9, are disabled.
- Forms with slashes (/) in their names are not supported in Smart View. If you try to open a form with slashes in the name (for example, Cash In/Out), Smart View considers it as invalid and does not open the form. So, as a best practice, avoid using slashes in form names if you want to work on them in Smart View.
- Starting Smart View Release 21.110, Excel no longer terminates intermittently after entering data in a form and clicking outside the modified cell.

Opening Forms in Excel

You can open forms in Excel.

Cloud data source types: Planning, Planning Modules, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Narrative Reporting, Tax Reporting

On-premises data source types: Oracle Hyperion Financial Management, Oracle Hyperion Planning

To open a form:

- 1. Connect to a data source.
- 2. In the Smart View Panel, perform an action:
 - To open one form, expand the tree list and select the form you want to open. Then click **Open form** on the Action Panel.
 - To open multiple forms, expand the tree list and select a forms folder. Then click **Open forms** on the Action Panel. In **Select Form**, follow the instructions to open one or more forms.

In the Smart View Panel, simple forms are indicated with the III icon.



Depending on data source provider, other form types that you can open from the Smart View Panel are:

- June 2015
 Smart Forms (see Smart Forms)
- Flex forms (see Flex Forms)
- Baved ad hoc grids (see Saving Ad Hoc Grids)
- Image: Dashboards (see Dashboards)

Check the documentation links above for provider support for each form type.

3. Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud and Oracle Hyperion Planning only: To view any instructions that may be associated with the form, from the provider ribbon, (for example, the Planning ribbon), select **More** and then **Instructions**.

Using Excel Formulas in Forms

You can create Excel formulas in form cells inside or outside the grid if the cells are not readonly or locked.

Cells that contain cell text can contain Excel formulas, but cells containing supporting detail (such as Planning cells) or line item detail (such as Oracle Hyperion Financial Management cells) cannot.

Formulas are preserved in forms when you refresh the form even without saving the data, later open the saved worksheet, and when you expand or collapse rows and columns.

If you move a referential formula, its cell references are updated to reflect the new location.

In forms, you are prompted to save the workbook as an Excel file if you do any of the following (but you temporarily lose access):

- Change the current page
- Take a Oracle Hyperion Planning form offline
- Select a different form
- Connect to a different data source

Working with User Variables

You can make user variable selections from the buttons in the POV toolbar in Oracle Smart View for Office.

Cloud data source types: Planning, Planning Modules, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Tax Reporting

On-premises data source types: Oracle Hyperion Financial Management, Oracle Hyperion Planning

When an Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud or Oracle Hyperion Planning form contains user variables, or when a Financial Management data form has selectable dimensions, rows, or columns, you can modify them in Smart View.

When you click on the user variable buttons, the **Member Selection** dialog box is displayed. You then select members applicable for the user variable. Any filters that apply to the



selected user variable are loaded and viewable from the filter drop-down list. Once selections are made, you can easily change one or more of the user variable buttons, thus changing the POV of a form in Smart View.

Figure 1 shows an example of user variables in a Planning form, where Allocation Expense, Allocation Quarter, and My Segment are user variables that can be modified to change the POV of the form.

Figure 8-1 Example of User Variables in a Planning Form



In an example scenario, in data form design mode in Financial Management, you can select either a member list or multiple members for a dimension, such as Period, and use the Period dimension on a row or column with the @CUR function. The Period dimension will then be represented in Smart View with user variables.

Additionally, if you use the relative time period functionality in a Financial Management data form, you can have a member from the same dimension appear on the row, column, and POV. Smart View displays the relative time period members as user variables in the POV toolbar. For information on using the relative time period functionality and for setting up selectable dimensions, rows, and columns in Financial Management, see the *Oracle Hyperion Financial Management Administrator's Guide*.

To work with user variables for forms:

1. In the Smart View Panel, connect to a data source and open a form.

Notice the available user variables in the POV toolbar across the top of the sheet. Selectable buttons are enabled, non-selectable buttons are grayed out.

- 2. Click a user variable button to display the Member Selection dialog box.
- 3. From **Member Selection**, select one or members to add to the selected user variable button.

EPM Cloud and Oracle Hyperion Planning: Alternatively, click the arrow in

and select **Substitution Variables** to select members as substitution variables.

- 4. In the Filter drop-down list, select an applicable filter (if filters are available).
- 5. Click OK.
- 6. Repeat step 3 through step 5 for all user variables buttons for which you want to select members and apply filters.
- 7. To use the user variable buttons, click each button for which you want to apply selected members, and make a selection from the drop-down list.
- 8. Click **Refresh** to view the updated form.

EPM Cloud and Oracle Hyperion Planning Form Behavior in Smart View

Forms behave differently in Oracle Smart View for Office than they do in Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud and Oracle Hyperion Planning applications.

Cloud data source types: Planning, Planning Modules, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, FreeForm, Financial Consolidation and Close, Tax Reporting



On-premises data source types: Oracle Hyperion Planning

- Attributes in EPM Cloud and Oracle Hyperion Planningforms are not displayed in Smart View.
- Saving ad hoc grids as forms is not supported for grids containing attributes.
- In forms containing custom attributes:
 - Smart View does not support using custom attributes as filters for base (regular) dimension members. The web interface supports this and displays custom attributes at runtime in the format:

```
base/regular dimension member name(small rectangle symbol).associated attribute dimension member name
```

- Both the web interface and Smart View support using custom attribute dimensions as independent dimensions; for example, placing them on rows, columns, or the page POV, as with regular dimensions.
- Multiple levels in an outline are displayed differently in Smart View than pages on the web application. Smart View displays up to four levels, while the web application displays up to two levels.
- Excluding members does not affect totals on a form. When a member is excluded in the form definition (layout), the member is only excluded from displaying on the form; the member is not excluded from calculation.
- If an administrator hides a dimension in the row axis of a form, this dimension does not display in the row header of the form in Smart View.
- If an administrator has set up a form to use formatting from the web application, and not from Smart View, then no Smart View formatting options (from the Options dialog, Formatting tab) will be applied. This is true whether the Use Cell Styles or Use Excel Formatting option is selected in Smart View.
- In composite forms, sections that display as charts in the web application will display as grids in Smart View.
- In forms, the handling of decimal place settings between Excel, Smart View, and Oracle Hyperion Planning may, at times, cause rounding issues in submitted data. This can occur even when the decimal precision is set to two decimal places in both Excel and Oracle Hyperion Planning. For example, in a form, you may enter 68.68, but Smart View sends the data to Oracle Hyperion Planning as 68.67999999999, instead of 68.68.
- If row drop-down menus are enabled on a form, then Smart Push (which pushes data from different cubes into one form) cannot be used.
- When connected to an EPM Cloud provider, dynamic members, or "members onthe-fly," can be added in forms (and ad hoc grids) in the using business rules. See Launching Business Rules in Excel.

Oracle Hyperion Planning does not support the use of dynamic members.

- When you create a formula on members that calculates the value for a Summary Time Period and then you modify the data for the Summary Time Period member, sometimes Smart View considers that cell to be a dirty cell.
- In Smart View, the display order of business rules attached to a form differs from the display order in Oracle Hyperion Planning.
- When two forms are on two separate worksheets, the rule variable on the first form changes to the default value after refreshing the page dimension on the second



form. This may cause the business rule to invoke an incorrect value for a runtime prompt variable. If this happens, display the runtime prompt to see its value before submitting the rule for execution.

- In Smart View, the currency symbol in a cell is displayed differently from the Oracle Hyperion Planning web interface when the Oracle Hyperion Planning option, "Allow multiple currencies per entity," is set to true.
- When the application Page preference, Indentation of Members, is set to "Indent level 0 members only," the indentation of dimensions in a form may be displayed incorrectly.
- Excel grouping is expanded when Adjust Column Width and Row Height is checked (Options dialog, Formatting tab). If you want to preserve Excel grouping, do not use the Adjust Column Width and Row Height option. The Excel grouping expanded/collapsed state cannot be restored programmatically, and Excel automatically expands everything if the row height/column width is automatically adjusted.

Displaying the Floating Toolbar in Planning Forms

The floating toolbar is displayed when you click a data cell in a Planning form.

The floating toolbar provides quick access to these commands:

- Supporting Details
- Cell Comments
- Drill-through
- Attachments

To display or suppress the floating toolbar in Planning forms:

1. In the Smart View ribbon, click **Options**, and then select the **Advanced** tab.

You do not need to be logged in to set this option.

- 2. Perform an action:
 - To display the floating toolbar, select the Display floating toolbar on forms check box.

This check box is selected by default.

- To suppress the floating toolbar display, clear the Display floating toolbar on forms check box.
- 3. Click OK to save your selection.

Saving Ad Hoc Grids

Cloud data source types: Planning, Planning Modules, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, FreeForm, Financial Consolidation and Close, Tax Reporting

On-premises data source types: Oracle Hyperion Planning

If you have been assigned the ad hoc grid creator role, you can save ad hoc grids.



Note:

In this topic, references to forms apply to Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud Planning, Planning Modules, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, FreeForm, Financial Consolidation and Close, and Tax Reporting; and to on-premises Oracle Hyperion Planning.

To save an ad hoc grid:

1. With the ad hoc grid active, from the provider ad hoc ribbon, click **Save Ad Hoc Grid**.

Saving ad hoc grids is not supported for grids containing attributes.

- 2. In **Save Grid As**, enter a name, path to the location where you want to save the grid, and description for the grid.
- **3. Optional:** Select **Submit Formatting** to save any Excel formatting or cell style changes that have been applied to the grid.

See Saving Native Excel Formatting to EPM Cloud for additional notes and guidelines about saving formatting in ad hoc grids and forms.

Note:

EPM Cloud applications: If your Service Administrator has set the **Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior** option to **Standard** in your application, then the **Submit Formatting** option is not available.

4. Click OK.

The saved grid is displayed in the Smart View Panel tree list in the location that you selected in step 2.

- 5. To open a saved grid as an ad hoc grid (indicated by ¹/₂):
 - In Oracle Smart View for Office 21.100+, double-click the grid in the tree list. When double-clicking a saved ad hoc grid in the tree, the default is to open it as an ad hoc grid.
 - In Smart View 20.200 and earlier, right-click the grid in the tree list and select **Ad hoc analysis**.

Alternatively, you can right-click the ad hoc grid in the tree and choose to open it as a form.

Performing Ad Hoc Analysis in Forms

Cloud data source types: Planning, Financial Consolidation and Close, Tax Reporting

On-premises data source types: Oracle Hyperion Planning

If you have been assigned the ad hoc user role by the administrator, you can perform ad hoc analysis on forms that have been enabled for ad hoc by the administrator.



To perform ad hoc analysis in forms:

- **1.** Do one of the following:
 - Open the form and then, from the Smart View ribbon, click **Analyze**. This button is enabled only if the current form has been enabled for ad hoc analysis.
 - Select the form in the Smart View Panel and click **Ad hoc analysis** in the Action Panel.

Note:

You may see a difference in the grid POV depending on which method you used to launch ad hoc.

2. See Ad Hoc Analysis for information about performing ad hoc analysis.

Using the Drop-down Member Selector on Row Dimensions in Forms

Data source types: Planning, Financial Consolidation and Close, Tax Reporting

In forms, service administrators and form designers can set up easy-to-use drop-down member selectors on row dimensions. When these drop-down selectors are enabled, the form users can directly select a member from the drop-down list on the row dimension in the form.

The drop-down member selector also allows users to add data to member rows that may have otherwise been suppressed.

In forms where members have been excluded, drop-down member selectors can be configured to display or hide the excluded members.

When using the drop-down member selector, keep in mind the following:

- There is no visual notification as to which members have drop-downs enabled; you must click a dimension cell and, if a down arrow appears next to the cell, then there is a dropdown list enabled.
- The drop-down content (list of members) is controlled by the form definition for the corresponding segment.
- Selections are not retained. The drop-down selection will be lost on refresh. If you perform a Refresh after selecting a member from the drop-down, the selection is lost and the form returns to its original state.
- The drop-down selection will be lost on saving data. Modifying data cells and saving the Excel worksheet will not retain modified drop-down selections.
- When selecting and working with shared members or members associated with duplicate alias names, the drop-down member selector displays member names for shared members and duplicate aliases, not their qualified or distinct alias names. You can enter and submit data without encountering a "member out of place" error.
- Composite forms: Using the drop-down member selector with row dimensions is not supported.
- In Smart View, data cannot be submitted when a form has drop-down member selectors and calculated rows and columns.



To use this feature in Oracle Smart View for Office requires configuration in the Form Designer in the web interface. The service administrator or form designer specifies the drop-down selectors as segment properties for particular dimensions. For example, suppose there are two dimensions placed on row axes, Entities and Line item; the member selector drop-down may be enabled for the Entity dimension members, for the Line item dimension members, or for both. Configuration is described in *Administering Planning*.

In Smart View, to use the drop-down selector in a form, click on row dimension or member names in a form. If a drop-down arrow appears, click it to view and select members from the drop-down list, as shown in Figure 1.

Inserting Charts

Starting in release 11.1.2.5.700, you can insert forms as charts into Microsoft PowerPoint, giving you a graphical display of the information in the form.

Data source types: Planning, Planning Modules, Financial Consolidation and Close, Tax Reporting

Oracle Smart View for Office renders the form information as a chart in PowerPoint. You can use the chart tools in PowerPoint to change the chart design and format. You can insert a Smart View POV reporting object to change the POV of the chart.

Certain forms may or may not make ideal charts. Some form data may not present itself well in chart format. For example, a balance sheet form may not make a useful chart. However, a monthly revenue form may be a good candidate for the chart format. Oracle recommends investigating with the forms available to you and working with the forms designers to meet your requirements for charts.

Note:


- The Insert Chart functionality is not available in Word or Excel.
- Smart View does not support directly inserting stepped and curved line charts. When inserting a stepped or curved line chart, Smart View will substitute the closest match, a default line chart.

To insert and edit a chart in PowerPoint:


- 1. Launch PowerPoint and connect to the data source.
- 2. Navigate to the form and select it.
- 3. In the Action Panel, select Insert Chart.

Alternatively, right-click the form name and select Insert Chart; for example:





The chart is inserted on the slide, where it can be selected and edited; in the following example, the slide width has been stretched from its initial state:




- 4. **Optional:** To change the POV of the chart, insert the POV control and modify the POV.
 - a. In the Document Contents pane, select the data source for the chart, then select Insert New Reporting Object/Control.



c. Click the **Slide Show** icon in the task bar at the bottom right of the PowerPoint window to enter slide show mode where you can modify the POV.



d. In slide show mode, use the drop-down lists in the POV toolbar to make the required changes.

- e. In the POV toolbar, click Refresh.
- f. Repeat the steps to change the POV as needed; when finished, exit slide show mode.

You can press the **Esc** key to exit slide show mode.

5. Continue with any further chart design and format edits, and then save the PowerPoint presentation as needed.

Cell-Level Security in Smart View

A cell in a form may be secured according to a cell-level security definition.

Applies to: Planning, Planning Modules, Tax Reporting

Cell-level security enables Service Administrators to restrict who can view data in the application by defining rules that remove read or write access to cells that a user would normally have access to due to their regular security.

Cell-level security is defined as an exception to the existing member security. For example, a Department Manager requires access to all accounts in their own department, but only a certain account in all other departments. With the usual metadata security the Manager would have access to all accounts across all departments; using cell-level security enables the Service Administrator to control the intersection of all accounts with the Manager's department and only the specific account in all other departments.

Cell-level security uses rules, similar to valid intersection rules, to deny read or write access to users viewing certain cell intersections anywhere a cell is shown (for example, forms, runtime prompts, ad hoc reports, dashboards, and so on). When cell-level security rules are applied, users with read access can see the data value in a cell but the cell is not editable. If users are denied read access to a cell, the value displayed in the cell is #noaccess.

Cell-level Security provides the ability to restrict or remove user security at the lowest level of dimensional granularity, which provides more flexibility and access control than metadata security alone. This feature allows for cross-dimensional security, which means the same dimension member from one dimension may have different access based on combinations of other dimension members.



Note the following when working with cell-level security in Oracle Smart View for Office:

- If a user does not have access to a cell, cell styles are not applied to cells for Comments and Attachments. However, these styles are applied when using the same form or grid in the web.
- Ribbon commands, right-click menu commands, and floating toolbar commands in Smart View will still be enabled, even if cell-level security has resulted in the cell containing #NoAccess. For example, if the cell contains #NoAccess, the user can attempt to perform a cell-level command, such as Supporting Detail, Attachments, Cell History, or Cell Comments, but these commands are not valid for #NoAccess.

Service Administrators define cell-level security in the web application. For more information, see Defining Cell-Level Security in *Administering Planning*.

About Valid Intersections

Data source types: Planning, Planning Modules, Financial Consolidation and Close, Tax Reporting, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management

Your Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud administrator can enable applications for valid intersections. In forms, valid intersections allow you to view or enter data only at predefined "valid" intersections.

For example, valid intersections might consist of a subset of Segment members which are valid only with a limited list of departments, or specific programs which are valid only for certain time periods.

Forms that are enabled for valid intersections can provide faster data entry and simplified plan validation resulting in higher quality data, as well as easier maintenance of data entry forms. Data integrity is still maintained at "invalid" intersections.

When valid intersections are defined in an application, then cell intersections considered "invalid" are read-only.

💡 Tip:

In Oracle Smart View for Office, when an invalid intersection in POV is observed or selected, this message is displayed:

"Data form cannot be displayed due to invalid intersection in Page and POV. Please choose a different intersection."

Select a valid intersection member in the POV to clear the message.

To select members when valid intersections are enabled in a form:

1. Open a form.

The form renders with member selections as specified in the form definition, adhering to your access rights for dimensions, and applies valid intersection groups with the most recently used as current selections.

Verify that the form is enabled for valid intersections by looking for the <Clear Selection>
 option at the bottom of the Page drop-down member selectors.

If an application is enabled for valid intersections, the **<Clear Selection>** option appears at the bottom of the Page drop-down member selectors.

For example, in Option in the POV Drop-Down Member Selector, the **<Clear Selection>** option is highlighted in the Page drop-down list for the Entity dimension.

The form generally behaves as any simple Planning form; however, when working with valid intersections, the selections available to you in the Page selector for a dimension may depend on the member you chose in the Page selector for a different dimension.

Example 8-1 Working with Valid Intersections in Page Drop-down Lists

Valid intersection rules are set up by Planning administrators in the Planning web application. In Figure 3, valid intersection rules are set up as follows.

- When the 403:Sales member is selected in the Entity dimension, all products in the Product dimension are available for selection.
- When the 410:International Sales member is selected in the Entity dimension, then the members P_260:Game, P_270:Camera, and P_280:Television are not available for selection. All other members are available for selection.
- When the 421:Sales NorthEast member is selected in the Entity dimension, then the members P_220:Software Suite and P_250:Network Card are not available for selection. All other members are available for selection.

The scenario shown in Figure 5, where there are no members to select from in the Product dimension Page drop-down list, might come about in at least a couple of different ways. For example, the Planning administrator may have configured any of the following:

- Defined a valid intersection rule that excludes members of the Product dimension when 440:Sales Central is selected for the Entity dimension.
- Defined a valid intersection rule that excludes P_260:Game, P_270:Camera, and P_280:Television when 440:Sales Central is selected for the Entity dimension, but the form is designed for only those three members.

In either case, when 440:Sales Central is selected for Entity, there are no Product members to select from in the Page drop-down list, and only **Select Member>** is displayed.

About Flex Forms

Flex forms are a form type that provides flexible row and column management in Oracle Smart View for Office.

Data source types: Planning, Planning Modules, Financial Consolidation and Close, Tax Reporting



Flex forms retain all regular form properties and features, such as running business rules attached to the flex form. However, using flex forms, you can rearrange row and column members, and sort or move rows or columns. Modified row or column order is maintained on refresh and during submit. You can also filter data using Excel's filtering functionality. Dimension and member row cells and all data cells in a flex form are unprotected. Only the top left blank cells of a flex form are protected.

In the web interface, during form definition, administrators select **Enable flex form on rows**, **Enable flex forms on columns**, or both, under **Smart View Options** in the **Layout** tab to enable flex form-specific features.

In Smart View, the **Sheet Info** dialog displays the **Sheet type** for flex forms as "Flex form." Flex forms can be part of task lists and you can open them as flex forms from a task list.

Note:

Flex forms are used only in Smart View and not in the web interface.

General Guidelines for Flex Forms

- You can modify both row and column members in flex forms.
- Any modification to a flex form will not be persisted between sessions.
 When a user modifies a flex form, the modified grid layout will only be persisted in the context of the current session. Reopening a flex form reverts the flex form layout to its original state.
- You may insert and delete rows and columns in a flex form using the **Insert** and **Delete** options on the right-click menu in Excel.
- Access permission settings are honored in flex forms.
- Valid intersections are honored in flex forms.
- Business rules may be run on flex forms.
- When a flex form with a business rule or Groovy rule to add a new dimension member (member on-the-fly) is executed from the form, the new member will not appear on the flex form after a refresh. To see the new member on the flex form, you must relaunch the flex form from the Smart View Panel.
- Flex forms can be opened as flex forms from a Task List.
- There is limited support for spreading in flex forms.
 Spreading is supported only in cases where the Account dimension is on rows and the Period is a column dimension and the Period column is not a flex dimension.

Note:

During form design, the Smart View option, **Show invalid members for flex form**, must be disabled.

You may delete rows and columns using the **Delete** key. However, when deleting rows or columns containing multiple dimensions, be sure to select all the dimension members in the row or column before pressing **Delete**.
 In the following example, there are three row dimensions on a flex form, Accounts, Market, and Year:

```
D-Acc US Market FY18
D-Acc US Market FY19
D-Acc US Market FY20
```

To remove the row for FY18 using the Delete key, be sure to select all three dimension members, D-Acc, US Market, and FY18 using the Ctrl key or Shift key, then press Delete.



- Copy and paste is limited to the scope of the form definition. Flex forms must adhere to the hierarchies as defined in the form. Therefore, you cannot have any flex form members that are not part of the defined row or column members of the form.
- Subtotaling calculation scripts and currency conversion calculation scripts will be generated and executed based on the original form definition.
- In the form definition, if Enable flex form for rows, Enable flex form for columns, or both, are selected, a flex form opened as a simple form can preserve comments in cells outside the form after refresh.
 However, when opened as a flex form:
 - If both the Enable flex form for rows and Enable flex form for columns options are selected, then comments are not preserved.
 - If only the Enable flex form for rows option is selected, then comments entered to the right of the form are preserved after refresh. Comments are not preserved if they are entered directly below the form.
 - If only the Enable flex form for columns option is selected, then comments entered below the form are preserved after refresh. Comments are not preserved if they are entered to the right of the form.
- When working with flex forms with multiple dimensions on rows or columns (when two or more dimensions with multiple members are placed on a row or columns):
 - By design, + and for expand/collapse are not supported for flex forms. Instead, use the Expand/Collapse command on the right-click Smart View context menu.
 - During form definition, to place dimensions members on separate rows or columns, in Member Selection on the flex form, choose Place selection in separate rows or Place Selection in Separate Columns. See Selecting Members for Forms in Administering Planning.
- When a user adds a member that is a parent or child of a member already present on a flex form and refreshes, the child member will be collapsed, even in cases where the Dimension property, **Start expanded**, is selected during form design. To the user, it may look like the child member was removed, but the child member can be viewed by expanding the parent using the Expand/Collapse commands on the Smart View context menu.
- When entering numeric member names or shared members on a flex form, enter a single quotation mark (') before the member name.

For example, for a numeric member name, such as 4077, enter:

'4077

For shared members, enter member names in the format:

'[Parent].[Shared Member]

For example:

```
'[Sales Director 2].[410]
```

'[Default Sales Director 2].[Default International Sales]

- When a flex-enabled form is opened in an ad hoc mode, the row dimension indentation is lost on submitting data. Refreshing the data restores the indentation to normal.
- User variables, dynamic user variables, dynamic user variables with attributes, and substitution variables are supported on flex form rows and columns. Users should change variables on the POV and perform a refresh for the rows and columns to update them to the new members.



- Excluded members may be entered on flex form rows or columns. Members that are excluded in the form definition can be entered on flex form rows and users are able to enter values and submit.
- In the form definition, when **Enable flex form for rows**, **Enable flex form for columns** or both are enabled, then the Segment properties **Hide** and **Read-only** are not supported for either rows or columns. **Hide** and **Read-only** are supported only in simple forms.
- An administrator can configure action menus to run business rules or open a flex form or simple form from a flex form (or simple form). The action menu items are accessed from the right-click Smart View context menu. The action menu items may be defined to appear on the right-click menu anywhere on the flex form or when right-clicking, for example, in specific dimensions, members, rows, columns, or cells.

Right-click menus that are available in the web application for the POV and Page dimensions are not available on flex forms in Oracle Smart View for Office.

In *Administering Planning*, for information on setting up action menu items for flex forms, see Administering Action Menus; for additional information on flex forms, see Designing Flex Forms.

Selecting Members in Flex Forms

Users can select row or column members to add to a flex form using the **Member Selection** dialog box, available from the provider ribbon; for example, from the Planning ribbon. The **Member Selection** option is available only on flex forms, not on simple forms.

Note:

The **Member Selection** option is available in Oracle Smart View for Office 21.100+.

Use the **Member Selection** dialog to add row or column members to a flex form, similar to adding members to an ad hoc grid. The members you can add depend on the underlying form definition for the row or column dimensions:

- If the Dimension Properties setting, Flex beyond form definition, is selected, users may select members outside those specified in the form definition. For example, suppose a form includes only the Computer Accessories members from the Product dimension. If Flex beyond form definition is selected for the Product dimension, then users may add other members from Product, such as Notebooks or Tablets, to the flex form. These members will be retained upon refresh. For more information, see Flexing Beyond the Form Definition.
- In the form definition of a flex form, if specific members are not part of a dimension, then, even though you may be able to select and add those members in the **Member Selection** dialog, those members will be removed upon refresh.



Note:

To add members outside the form definition, enable **Flex beyond form definition** on the applicable dimensions.

Member Selection uses the default alias table defined at the application level. When members are inserted on the grid, the members are displayed as member names until a Refresh is performed, and then aliases are displayed corresponding to the application setting.

Filtering and Sorting in Flex Forms

- Filtering does not disable **Submit Data** as it is only hiding certain rows.
- Sorting disables Submit Data as it changes member order in the column. After sorting you must refresh to submit data.
- To avoid undesirable sorting results, do not apply sorting to an entire column. Instead, select the grid members to sort, and then use Excel's Sort commands, Sort A to Z or Sort Z to A, or perform a custom sort.
- After applying a filter to a row or column dimension, and then applying a sort within the filter drop-down dialog, the sort indicator arrow appears on the filter button within the grid. However, after a Refresh, the sort indicator arrow on the filter button is no longer displayed.
- Excel grouping is expanded in two cases:
 - Filters are used. In this case, grouping is expanded on rows.
 - Adjust Column Width and Row Height is checked (Options dialog, Formatting tab)

If you want to preserve Excel grouping, do not use filters or the **Adjust Column Width and Row Height** option. The Excel grouping expanded/collapsed state cannot be restored programmatically, and Excel automatically expands everything if filtering is applied or the row height/column width is automatically adjusted.

Using Suppression Options in Flex Forms

• In the form designer, the Use database suppression option is not supported; however, the Suppress missing blocks, Suppress missing data - Rows, and Suppress missing data - Columns options are supported.

Note:

Groovy rules are not supported in flex forms when suppression options are enabled.

• The Suppress missing blocks, Suppress missing data - Rows, and Suppress missing data - Columns options defined in the web for a flex form are applied only when first opening the flex form in Oracle Smart View for Office. Depending on the form definition, flex form users can enter members on columns or rows even though the suppression options are enabled in web form. Users can also enter data and submit data for the suppressed members.

If the suppression options in the Smart View **Options** dialog, **Data Options** tab, for **Suppress Missing Blocks**, **Suppress Missing Rows**, and **Suppress Missing**



Columns are selected, they are applied to the flex form. Users can uncheck these options in Smart View and then add members (by typing them on the sheet or using **Member Selection**), enter data, submit data, and refresh the flex form.

Flexing Beyond the Form Definition

During form definition, when the **Flex beyond form definition** property is applied to row or column dimensions in flex forms, Oracle Smart View for Office users may enter members outside the form definition for dimensions within the row or column axis of the form. This allows flex form users to enter data for members that are not displayed on the flex form. Users must have access to the valid members that they enter.

For example, using the Vision application, suppose the Product dimension is placed as a row dimension in a flex form. During form definition, only the Sentinal Standard Notebook and Sentinal Custom Notebook members in the Product dimension have been selected for display on the form. By enabling the **Flex beyond form definition** option for the Product dimension, Smart View users may enter other products from the Product dimension, such as Mouse or Keyboard, in the rows in the flex form. As long as they have access to those members, users can either add rows for additional members to the existing flex form or replace existing Product members with the Product members they require. To illustrate, note the following hierarchy:

```
Product
   Notebooks <<this hierarchy is displayed in flex form)
      Sentinal Standard Notebook
   Sentinal Custom Notebook
   Computer Accessories <<this hierarchy is not displayed in flex
form)
      Keyboard
      Mouse</pre>
```

In a flex form with **Flex beyond form definition** disabled (not selected), users cannot add Computer Accessories or its descendants. Users can add Notebooks and its descendants.

In a flex form with **Flex beyond form definition** enabled (selected), users can add Computer Accessories and its descendants as well as Notebooks and its descendants.

During form definition, note the following when enabling the **Flex beyond form definition** property:

- In Dimension Properties, the Flex beyond form definition option will only be visible if either the Enable flex form for rows or Enable flex form for columns option, or both, is selected in Smart View Options.
- When there are multiple dimensions on the form rows, Oracle recommends that you select the Flex beyond form definition property for each applicable row or column dimension individually. You may use the Dimension Properties option, Apply to all row | column | page dimensions, to apply the Flex beyond form definition property to all dimensions; however, use with care as all other dimension property selections will also be applied to all other dimensions.

See Designing Flex Forms in Administering Planning.



Retaining Invalid Members on Flex Forms

In flex forms, you can retain invalid members on the sheet after a refresh.

When entering member names in a flex form, errors may occur; for example, you may:

- Mistype or misspell a name, creating an invalid member in the cell See Example of Misspelled Member Name.
- Make an error when copying and pasting member names from one sheet to another, or within the same sheet, resulting in invalid members See Example of Missing Member Name on Multi-Dimension Row
- Enter a member name that is beyond the form definition, resulting in an invalid member See Example of Member Name Entered that is Outside of Form Definition

Before the 23.07 update, when these situations occurred, the rows or columns with invalid members were removed from the sheet upon refresh, making it difficult to know what the issue was, and forcing you to reenter member names.

Starting in the 23.07 update, the flex form can retain any invalid members on the form after refresh. To accomplish this, the EPM Cloud Service Administrator enables the **Show invalid members for flex form** check box under **Smart View Options** in the **Layout** tab of the form definition, described in Enabling the Invalid Member Option.

Note:

- The Show invalid members for flex form check box is enabled only when Enable flex form for rows or Enable flex form for columns, or both, are enabled.
- In rows and columns containing multiple dimensions, if even a single member is invalid, all members on the row or column are highlighted as invalid. For example, if a row contains the *Tablet* and *Current* members, and you type *Tablet* correctly, but type *Currnt* in error, both the Tablet and Currnt members will be highlighted as invalid. You should examine all the highlighted member names and correct those that are typed incorrectly.
- After inserting a blank row or column into the flex form and clicking **Refresh**, if no member names were entered, then the inserted row or column is highlighted as an invalid member row or column and remains on the flex form as a blank row or column.
- Attempting to delete an entire row or column by selecting the invalid member cells of a row or column and prssing the **Delete** key will result in invalid members in the member cells upon refresh. To delete entire rows or columns on a flex form, use the **delete entire row** or **delete entire column** operations in Excel.

Following are some example scenarios that show you how to work with invalid members on the sheet.



Example of Misspelled Member Name

For example, based on the the Vision application form, HR Expenses, you open the form as a flex form. The Service Administrator has enabled the Smart View options, "Enable flex form for rows" and "Show invalid members for flex form."

After clicking Refresh, Smart View calls out the row for you with the member cells highlighted and the data cells displaying #InvalidMember.

Example of Missing Member Name on Multi-Dimension Row

#InvalidMember is displayed on the flex form in Smart View when a row or column has multiple members and you miss entering a member on a member cell in that row or column. In the following example, there are two dimensions on the rows. You added three rows after row 17. The members from the Product dimension in Column A, rows 18, 19, and 20, were typed correctly. But you did not type any entries in the same rows in Column B. Those cells are missing the member name from the Scenario dimension. This is the result after clicking **Refresh**.

To correct this issue, add the "Current" member in Column B, rows 18, 19, and 20, and then **Refresh**.

Example of Member Name Entered that is Outside of Form Definition

#Invalidmember is displayed on the flex form in Smart View when you enter a member that is beyond the form definition.

For example, suppose that in the form, the Year dimension is limited to FY17, FY18, and FY19. But in the application outline, the dimension contains many more members, such as FY20, FY21, FY22, and FY23.

When designing a flex form, if the Service Administrator has selected the "Flex beyond form definition" option for the Year dimension, then you may add members that are outside of the form definition, such as FY20. If the "Flex beyond form definition" option is not selected, then adding a member that is outside of the form definition will result in invalid members, even though the members exist in the outline.

In the following case, the "Flex beyond form definition" option was not selected for the Year dimension on the column. You add a column and enter FY20, and then click Refresh. Note below that column I now contains invalid members.

To remedy this, your Service Administrator should select the **Flex beyond form definition** option for the Year dimension. With this option selected, you may enter the members that are outside of the form definition, click **Refresh**, and retain the members on the flex form.

Enabling the Invalid Member Option

Enabling the new **Show invalid members for flex form** check box lets users easily, see, understand, and correct any error they may have made in entering member names in flex forms.

To retain invalid members on a flex form, a Service Administrator performs these steps from the Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud web interface:

- 1. From the Navigator, under Create and Manage, click Forms.
- 2. Select an existing form to edit or, in the Form and Ad Hoc Grid Management page, click the Actions drop-down menu and click Create Simple form.
- 3. In the form definition page, under Smart View Options in the Layout tab, select the Enable flex form for rows and Enable flex form for columns check boxes, as you require. You may select one or both of these options.
- 4. Select the **Show invalid members for flex form** check box. This option is displayed only when a row or column flex option is selected, as described in the previous step.
- 5. Optionally, for individual rows or columns, in **Dimension Properties**, enable the **Flex beyond form definition** option, as you require.
- 6. Save the form.

Retaining Formula, Label, and Comment Rows and Columns on Flex Forms

In Oracle Smart View for Office 23.200+, you can retain formula rows and columns on flex forms by enabling the "Show invalid members for flex form" option during form definition. When a Service Administrator enables this option, formula rows and columns are retained on the flex form after a refresh or a submit.

Note:

Formula rows and columns are also referred to as *label* or *comment* rows and columns.

After a refresh or submit operation, all members and data on a formula row or column are highlighted using the same cell style as used for invalid members, described in Retaining Invalid Members on Flex Forms.

In earlier Smart View releases, formula rows and columns were not supported in flex forms. Upon submit, a message noted that a refresh must first be performed; and upon refresh, the formula rows and columns were removed from the flex form.

Note:

Attempting to delete an entire row or column by using the **Delete** key to delete only the member cells of a row or column will result in invalid members in the member cells upon refresh. To delete entire rows or columns on a flex form, select the entire row or column, right-click, and then select **Delete** from the Excel context menu.

Enabling the **Show invalid members for flex form** option gives users the versatility of flex forms when working with forms containing formula rows and columns.

Retaining Modified Members on Flex Forms After POV or User Variable Change

To retain modified members on a flex form after a POV or user variable change, you enable the **Flex Forms: Preserve Grid on POV and User Variable Changes** option.

In the Smart View ribbon, click **Options**, then select the **Member Options** tab, and then select the option, **Flex Forms: Preserve Grid on POV and User Variable Changes**.



If this option is not selected, any added rows or columns in the flex form will be removed upon a POV or user variable change.

After selecting the **Flex Forms: Preserve Grid on POV and User Variable Changes** option, add or delete members on the flex form grid, and click **Refresh**. Then change a POV member and click **Refresh**; or change a user variable and the flex form refreshes automatically. Your modified members are retained. You can now enter and submit data against the modified POV and user variables in any of the members in the flex form, including any newly-added members. Optionally, change the POV or any user variable again and refresh, and then continue entering data against the updated POV and user variables.

Smart Push with Flex Forms

- Smart Push is supported on flex forms.
- On a filtered flex form, Smart Push does not honor the context of the selected form.

Unsupported Features on Flex Forms

- These form features are not supported for flex forms:
 - Segment Properties:
 - * Hide
 - * Read-only
 - * Enable drop-down for dimensions (row dimension drop-down member selectors)
 - * Suppress hierarchy

Note:

After rows are rearranged or sorted, Segment properties will not be retained.

- The Submit Without Refresh option
- Using flex forms inside composite forms
- Enabling **Show Currency** for the Entity dimension.
- Data validation rules within forms are not supported when using flex forms. Instead, convert data validation rules to Groovy rules.
- Flex forms are not supported for:
 - Dashboards



- Smart Forms
- Use with the Task Manager extension

Working with Flex Forms in Smart View

With flex forms, you can rearrange row and column dimensions, sort them, and insert valid members or aliases from corresponding dimensions.

Perform a refresh prior to submitting data in the modified form Smart View. Upon refresh, invalid members, comments, and empty rows or columns are removed and the Submit Data button is enabled.

To work with a flex form:

- 1. Connect to a data source.
- 2. In the Smart View Panel, double-click a flex form (indicated by $\overline{\psi}$).

You can also right-click the flex form you want to open, and then select **Open flex form**.

3. Modify the data as per your requirements.

For example, some actions you may perform are:

- Rearrange or move row and column members
- Insert rows and columns
- Add members. You can add members using **Member Selection** (on the provider ribbon) or hand-typing member names.
- Sort rows and columns using the **Sort** button on the Excel **Data** ribbon
- Filter on row and column members or data using the **Sort & Filter** on the Excel Home ribbon or the **Filter** button on the Excel **Data** ribbon
- Sort row and column members using the Sort & Filter button on the Excel Home ribbon, the Sort button on the Excel Data ribbon, or the filter on the form
- Run a business rule from the provider ribbon or from an action menu
- Right-click a member or data cell to access the **Smart View** context menu; applicable commands for the cell are available on the menu
- Delete rows and columns



Note:

- The **Submit Data** button is disabled when you edit row members. Filtering is not considered editing; if you only add filters, you may still submit data.
- In the Smart View Options dialog, Formatting tab, the Repeat Member Labels is required to be enabled for flex forms. You may attempt to clear the check box, but upon refresh, the check box will again be selected and the Repeat Member Labels option will be enabled.
- The operations you can perform on rows and columns depend on the selections made during form definition. To perform operations on rows, the **Enable flex form on rows** option must be selected. To perform actions on columns, the **Enable flex forms on columns** option must be selected. These options are described in Setting Smart View Form Options in Administering Planning.
- 4. **Optional:** To retain added members on a flex form after a POV or user variable change:
 - a. In the Smart View ribbon, click **Options**.
 - b. In the Options dialog, select the Member Options tab.
 - c. Select Flex Forms: Preserve Grid on POV and User Variable Changes.

Note:

If this option is not selected, any added rows or columns in the flex form will be removed upon a POV or user variable change.

- d. Optional: Add or delete members in the flex form, and click Refresh.
- e. Perform these tasks as you require:
 - Change a POV member and click **Refresh**
 - Change a user variable; the flex form refreshes automatically.

Your modified members are retained. You can now enter and submit data against the modified POV and user variables in any of the members in the flex form, including any newly-added members.

f. **Optional:** Change the POV or any user variable again and refresh, and then continue entering data against the updated POV and user variables.

For additional information, see Retaining Modified Members on Flex Forms After POV or User Variable Change.

- 5. Optional: If your Service Administrator has enabled the Show invalid members for flex form option when designing the form:
 - a. Add the rows, columns, or both, as you require.
 - b. Type or copy member names into the new rows, columns, or both.
 - c. Click Refresh.



Any invalid member cells are highlighted and #InvalidMember is displayed in the corresponding data cells.

- d. Review the invalid member cells and correct any mistyped or missing members, and then click **Refresh**.
- e. Repeat the previous step until all invalid members are corrected.

For more information, see Retaining Invalid Members on Flex Forms.

- 6. **Optional:** Right-click a cell in the form and, from the context menu, select **Smart View**, and then select a provider action menu item:
 - To run a business rule, select the name of the busines rule.
 - To open a flex form or simple form, select the form to open.

In flex forms, only the above actions are supported on action menus.

Note:

Action menu options may differ depending on the member or data cell you select. The selections available depend on the form definition.

7. Click Refresh.

On refresh, Oracle Smart View for Office maintains modifications and removes invalid members from the form.

Note:

The **Submit Data** button is enabled only after the refresh. However, the modified form layout is not stored on the server; it is maintained only in the context of the current session.

8. To submit changed data, in the provider ribbon, click Submit Data.

Note:

The **Submit Data** button is enabled only after refresh.

9. To revert to the original flex form layout, reopen the flex form.

The modified form is not stored on the server; it is maintained only in the context of the current session. Reopening the flex form reverts the flex form layout to its original state.

Opening a Flex Form in Ad Hoc Mode and Submitting Data

You can open a flex form in ad hoc mode, just like any regular form, use ad hoc analysis to modify the grid layout, and submit data.

To open a flex form in ad hoc mode and submit data:

1. Connect to a data source.



- 2. In the Smart View Panel, expand the tree list and select the flex form you want to open in ad hoc mode.
- 3. Click Analyze.

The form opens in a new sheet in the ad hoc mode.

- 4. Modify data and grid layout per your requirements.
- 5. Click Submit Data.
- 6. Go back to the sheet with the flex form.
- 7. Click Refresh.

The original layout and modified data appears in the flex form.

If you are unfamiliar with Oracle Hyperion Financial Management, see the Financial Management documentation, available on the Oracle Help Center. To open this library, from the Smart View ribbon, click the arrow next to **Help**, and then **Documentation**.

When working with Financial Management 11.1.2.2.300 or later, if you use the relative time period functionality, such as @CUR, in a Financial Management data form, you can have a member from the same dimension appear on the row, column, and POV. Oracle Smart View for Office displays the relative time period members as user variables in the POV toolbar. See Working with User Variables for more information. When working with Financial Management releases earlier than 11.1.2.2.300, if you use the @CUR functionality in a data form, when the form is imported into Smart View, the @CUR member is taken from the background POV for the selected application.

The Active Member option is available only if the application has been set up for Organization by Period. For information on Organization by Period, see the Financial Management documentation.

Adding Financial Management Members

If you are unfamiliar with Oracle Hyperion Financial Management, see the Financial Management documentation, available on the Oracle Help Center. To open this library, from the Smart View ribbon, click the arrow next to **Help**, and then **Documentation**.

If enabled by the administrator, you can insert and save additional rows of members and data. Totals are updated to reflect the new data.



For example, suppose a data form has been defined for an account with transactions for IC1, IC2, and IC4. You could select members IC3 and IC5 for insertion into the form. The form is refreshed with the new data and the new rows are displayed in the appropriate hierarchical order.

To add members to data forms:

- 1. Open a data form.
- 2. From the HFM ribbon, click Add Member.

A cell style can be designated for Add Member.

See Cell Styles.

3. From the member selector, select the members for which to enter data.

Note that the selections available in the **View** and **Filters** options may not be consistent with the selections available for the same form in the Financial Management web application.

4. Click OK.

The new members are listed in the member list.

Note:

Member search does not work on forms that contain the Add Member button.

Using Financial Management Linked Forms

Administrators can define links in data forms from one form to another to enable drill-through to a more specific data entry view. For example, a form that contains summary account balances can link to a corresponding form with the account details. The link from one form to another applies to an entire row. A form can contain up to 64 linked forms.

To use linked forms:

- 1. In a data form, select a row that contains linked forms. Linked forms are indicated by the following icon:
- 2. Right-click and select HFM Linked Forms, then select the form name.

A new form is displayed in a separate browser window.

3. When you finish using the linked form, click **Close**.



To start ad hoc analysis:

- **1.** From **Recently Used**, **Shared Connections**, or **Private Connections** on the Smart View Panel, select one of the following:
 - Smart Slice
 - Form
 - Plan type
 - Cube or model

Note:

You can also start ad hoc analysis from a supported web application or business process. For instructions, see Opening Forms and Ad Hoc Grids from Web Applications (Web Launch).

2. From the Action Panel, select Ad hoc analysis.

Alternatively, right-click the object in the Smart View Panel and select **Ad hoc analysis**. An ad hoc grid is placed on the sheet and the data provider ribbon is displayed.



Tip:

If an error appears similar to "Ad hoc grid cannot be opened as there are no valid rows of data," then, as a best practice, you should clear the suppression options in the **Data Options** tab of the Smart View **Options** dialog box. Ensure that all **Suppress Rows** and **Suppress Columns** options are cleared.

- Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud and Oracle Hyperion Planning: Ensure that the Suppress missing blocks option is cleared.
- EPM Cloud Administrators: You can enable a form option, Remove Form Suppressions in Ad Hoc, that allows Oracle Smart View for Office users to perform ad hoc on forms that have row and column suppression options selected in the form definition. See the administration documentation for your EPM Cloud business process for more information.
- 3. Use the ribbon buttons to perform ad hoc analysis on the current worksheet.

If you are familiar with the dimensions and members of your database, you can use *free-form mode* by entering dimension and member names directly into cell to design and create an ad hoc grid. See Free-Form Mode.

Inserting Attribute Dimensions on the Sheet

When performing ad hoc analysis, you can use the Insert Attributes command to insert attribute dimensions or members on the worksheet.

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase, Planning Ad Hoc, Planning Modules Ad Hoc, FreeForm Ad Hoc, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management Ad Hoc, Financial Consolidation and Close Ad Hoc, Tax Reporting Ad Hoc

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase

To insert attribute dimensions or members on a worksheet:

- Connect to your data provider and perform an ad hoc analysis by either selecting the Ad hoc analysis option in the Action Panel, or typing members in free-form format on the worksheet.
- 2. In the provider ad hoc ribbon, click the Insert Attributes button, 🚜 Insert Attributes.
- 3. In the **Insert Attributes** dialog box, select the attribute dimensions to add to the sheet, and then click **OK**.

Optional: All attribute dimensions are selected by default. To add only a subset of attribute dimensions, perform one of the following tasks:

- Clear the check boxes next to the attribute dimensions to omit from the sheet.
- Click Deselect All, and then select the check boxes next to the attribute dimensions to add to the sheet.
- 4. **Optional:** To select a single attribute member to add to the sheet (rather than the entire attribute dimension):



- a. Click [1], next to an attribute dimension text box.
- **b.** In the **Member Selection** dialog box, select the check box next to the attribute member to add and click \ge .

You can select only one attribute member per dimension.

- c. Click OK.
- d. Repeat these substeps for each attribute member to add to the sheet.

Note that you can also hand type an attribute member name in the attribute dimension text box; however, attribute member names must be correctly capitalized and spelled in order to be recognized by Oracle Smart View for Office. If you capitalize a member name incorrectly or otherwise misspell it, an error occurs.

Now you can work with the attribute dimensions in the same way you would if you had used the **Member Selection** dialog box or free-form to place attributes on the sheet. Along with the other dimensions, you can pivot the attribute dimensions between rows and columns on the grid, and pivot them between the POV and the grid. **Related Topics:**

Inserting Attribute Dimensions on the Sheet--Example

Using Essbase Sample Basic, from the Action Panel, select **Ad hoc analysis** to place dimensions, including page dimensions, on the worksheet, as shown in Figure 1.

Now click Insert Attributes, 📲 Insert Attributes.

In the Insert Attributes dialog box, note that all attribute dimensions are selected by default:

Click **OK** and you can see, as shown in Figure 2, that the attribute dimensions Caffeinated, Ounces, Pkg Type, Population, and Intro Date have been added to the worksheet as page dimensions.

You can also choose to add attribute members, instead of attribute dimensions, to the

sheet. In the **Insert Attributes** dialog box, click if for an attribute dimension and select an attribute member to use.

In the **Insert Attributes** dialog box, notice that the attribute dimensions Caffeinated, Pkg Type, and Populations, the attribute members Caffeinated_True, Bottle, and Medium are selected:

Guidelines on Inserting Attributes

Keep in mind the following guidelines when inserting attributes:

- If an attribute is already present on the grid, then it will not be available for selection in the **Insert Attributes** dialog box.
- The grid must be in refreshed state. If the grid is in free-form state prior to refresh, then Oracle Smart View for Office prompts you to manually refresh.
- When the attributes are inserted on the grid, the grid is automatically refreshed.
- **Oracle Essbase only:** If the POV toolbar is toggled off, and there is no page dimension row present in the sheet, then a page dimension row will be added to the top of the sheet when inserting the attribute dimensions.
- In the Insert Attributes dialog box:
 - You can select to insert the entire attribute dimension, or one attribute member from a dimension.
 - If a member name is left blank in the attribute text box, then that dimension is in a deselected state and will not be inserted.



- If you have inserted a single attribute member using the **Insert Attributes** command and dialog box, you can use **Member Selection** to add other members from the same attribute dimension to the grid.
- The **Insert Attributes** operation is not supported for Query Designer or Smart Slice design sheets.
- Insert Attributes is not supported for multiple grid sheets.
- When filtering on attributes at the Generation 3 level in an attribute dimension, Smart View only displays members up to the Generation 2 level.

Preserving Excel Formulas in Ad Hoc Grids

You can associate Excel formulas with member and data cells in ad hoc grids and set cell styles to identify such cells.

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase, Planning, Planning Modules, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Tax Reporting, Narrative Reporting

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Financial Management, Oracle Hyperion Planning

By default, formulas are preserved when you perform ad hoc operations, except for **Pivot** and **Undo**.

💉 Note:

- To achieve faster execution of queries, you can disable the preservation of formulas and comments. However, if you disable this option, formulas are overwritten when you perform ad hoc operations.
- Narrative Reporting: Only Refresh operations are supported when Preserve Formulas and Comments in ad hoc operations (except pivot and undo) is selected. Other ad hoc operations, such as Zoom In or Keep Only, are not supported.
- After Financial Management 11.1.2.2.xxx, the custom dimensions in Financial Management applications are referred via alias names in Oracle Smart View for Office formulas. Smart View can no longer interpret the formulas. Formulas in the old format in saved workbooks will not work. The dimension identifiers will, therefore, need to be updated for each formula to reflect the new alias names for the custom dimensions.

To specify preservation of formulas in ad hoc grids:



- 1. From the Smart View ribbon, click **Options**, and then **Member Options** in the left panel.
- 2. Do one of the following:
 - To preserve formulas in ad hoc grids, select **Preserve Formulas and Comments in** ad hoc operations (except pivot and undo).
 - To disable preservation of formulas, clear Preserve Formulas and Comments in ad hoc operations (except pivot and undo). Do this only if you do not need to preserve formulas and you want faster execution of queries.

Note:

Although the **Preserve Formulas and Comments in ad hoc operations** (except pivot and undo) option appears in **Member Options**, the selection you make applies to formulas in both member and data cells.

3. Click OK.

Preserving Excel Formulas Within and Outside of Essbase Ad Hoc Grids

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase

Formulas Within the Grid

Starting in Oracle Smart View for Office 11.1.2.5.810, formulas will be retained in Essbase grids after performing **Undo** or **Redo**.

Note:

Ensure that you have selected the **Preserve Formulas and Comments in ad hoc** operations (except pivot and undo) option in the Options dialog, Member Options tab.

To retain the formulas, you must first perform a **Refresh** operation on the grid that contains formulas. The **Refresh** action adds the formulas to the undo buffer.

In some cases, an **Undo** doesn't work as expected after a zoom operation when formulas are outside of the grid. In this case, for more reliable formula preservation when performing **Undo** or **Redo** after a zoom operation, set up your grid as shown in Formulas Outside the Grid.

Formulas Outside the Grid

For smoother functioning of Essbase ad hoc analysis when formulas are present outside of the grid, as a best practice, Oracle recommends that you add a simple comment in any blank cell of the last column. The formula will be retained when you refresh the grid. The formula will be lost on pivots and undo.



Note:

Ensure that you have selected the **Preserve Formulas and Comments in** ad hoc operations (except pivot and undo) option in the **Options** dialog, **Member Options** tab.

In the example below, a formula is added to cell E4, outside of the grid. In order to preserve this formula during refreshes, a comment should be added to a blank cell in column E. In the example, the word "comment" is added to cell E1.

The comment is needed especially if you are performing an active ad hoc analysis This helps Essbase and Smart View to keep the content lying outside the grid intact during refresh and other ad hoc operations such as **Zoom In** and **Zoom Out** or **Keep Only** and **Remove Only**. Without the comment, you may lose the formulas outside the grid when performing these ad hoc operations.

Formatting Ad Hoc Grids

You can use either Oracle Smart View for Office or Excel to control grid formatting.

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase, Planning, Planning Modules, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Tax Reporting, Profitability and Cost Management

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Financial Management, Oracle Hyperion Planning

To set Smart View formatting options:

- 1. From the Smart View ribbon, click **Options**.
- 2. From Options, to set cell styles, select Cell Styles in the left pane.

Cell styles indicate certain types of member and data cells.

3. To set other Smart View formatting options, select **Formatting** from the left pane (**Use Excel Formatting** on this page is not a Smart View formatting option).

See Smart View Options for descriptions of options.

4. Click OK.

To apply Smart View formatting selections to data cells created by zooming:

- **1**. From the grid, select a formatted data cell.
- 2. From the Essbase or Planning Ad Hoc ribbon, select Preserve Format.

Using Excel Formatting

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase, Planning, Planning Modules, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Narrative Reporting, Tax Reporting

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Financial Management, Oracle Hyperion Planning

If you use Excel formatting, your formatting selections, including conditional formatting, are applied and retained on the grid when you refresh or perform ad hoc operations.

When you use Excel formatting, Oracle Smart View for Office does not reformat cells based on your grid operations, and it does not mark cells as dirty when you change data values. Smart View does preserve the formatting on the worksheet between operations.

Using Excel formatting is generally preferable for highly formatted reports, and you must use Excel formatting for data sources whose application-specific colors are not supported by the Excel color palette.

To use Excel formatting on ad hoc grids:

- 1. From the Smart View ribbon, select **Options**.
- 2. From **Options**, select **Formatting** from the left pane.
- 3. Select Use Excel Formatting.
- 4. Optional: To copy parent cell formatting to zoomed-in cells, select Move Formatting on Operations.

With this option selected, formatting also stays with members when you pivot.

Note:

Formatting can affect performance, especially during ad hoc operations when **Move formatting on operations** is enabled. For this reason, selection of this option does not persist when moving between sheets in a workbook or between sessions, and its selection cannot be saved. See the description of **Move formatting on operations** in Formatting Options for more information on using this option.

5. Click OK.



Example 9-1 Excel Formatting and Merged Cells

To *preserve* the merged cell formatting during ad hoc operations (except Pivot and Undo), you must select both **Use Excel Formatting** and **Preserve Formulas and Comments in ad hoc operations** options.

To *replicate* merged cell formatting during ad hoc operations (except Pivot), you must select all of **Use Excel Formatting**, **Preserve Formulas and Comments in ad hoc operations**, and **Formula Fill** options.

Example 9-2 Excel Formatting and Member Indentation

With the **Use Excel Formatting** option selected, and the **Member Indentation** option set to **None**, row members retain their indentation. The loss of indentation applies only to column members.

Note that the **Indentation** option applies only to ad hoc sheets; it does not apply to forms. See "Indentation" in the table in Member Options.

Enabling Attribute Association Processing in Ad Hoc Grids

Attribute association processing allows Essbase cells at intersections associated with attributes to display the value specified for the **#Invalid/Meaningless** option.

When you select **Enable Attribute Association Processing**, the attribute intersection cells that are called out have no association with the base dimension. In some cases, these cells may be varying attributes.

By default, the **Enable Attribute Association Processing** option is cleared. When cleared, the data values of attribute cells having no association to the base dimension are displayed as #Missing, instead of displaying the value specified in **#Invalid/ Meaningless**.

Note:

When the **Enable Attribute Association Processing** option is selected, ad hoc query performance may be slower.

For example, suppose you create an ad hoc grid showing sales in bottles for all products in the Product dimension. For Cola and Diet Cola, bottles are not available, but bottles are available for all the other products in the Product dimension. In this case, the attribute Bottle has no association with Cola or Diet Cola.

With the **Enable Attribute Association Processing** option selected, cells for Cola and Diet Cola sales in bottles would display #Invalid by default, as shown in Figure 1. Note that you could define your own label for these cells.

Clear the **Enable Attribute Association Processing** option, and cells at those same intersections, where the attribute is not associated with the base dimension, would display as #Missing, as shown in Figure 2. In this case, you do not know which attribute cells are actually missing data, and which attribute cells have no association with the base dimension and, therefore, would never contain data.

To enable attribute data cells that have no association with the base dimension to display the label defined in **#Invalid/Meaningless**:

- **1.** From the Smart View ribbon, select **Options**, and then select **Data Options**.
- 2. In the **Replacement** section:
 - Select Enable Attribute Association Processing.
 - For the **#Invalid/Meaningless** option, select **#Invalid** or specify a label to display in attribute cells that are not associated with the base dimension.
- Run the ad hoc query and note the cells containing the value you specified for #Invalid/ Meaningless; these are the attribute cells that are not associated with the base dimension.



Zooming In and Out

Zoom in on members in the grid to display data for their children and descendants.

You can zoom in on members in the grid to display data for their children and descendents.

Note:

Zoom In and Zoom Out operations are not supported in these cases:

• On member formula cells when connected to an aggregate storage database.

Zoom operations on member formula cells are supported only when connected to a block storage database.

• On views inserted from Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition or Oracle Analytics Cloud data sources.

Essbase; and Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud Standard-mode applications, such as Planning: You can zoom in to display data for members of the same level, same generation, or sibling level as the selected member.

Essbase: You can zoom in to display data for members that are defined by the formula of the selected member when connected to block storage databases.



Note:

In the Zooming In and Out topics, references to EPM Cloud Standard-mode applications apply to these business processes: Planning, Planning Modules, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, and Tax Reporting. In an EPM Cloud Standard-mode application, the business process application setting, **Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior**, has been set to **Standard**.

Zooming In

You can zoom in on one cell at a time.

You can also zoom in on a range of cells when connected to these data sources: Oracle Essbase, Narrative Reporting, and Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud Standard-mode applications.

Zooming in on multiple cells, especially on all levels, results in a large number of cells being selected. If the data suppression options like suppress rows with no data or missing values are not enabled, it may lead to insufficient memory and failure to load worksheets while zooming in. To prevent this issue, a governor limit for the number of selected cells is set. It works in the following ways:

- If the number of selected cells is within the threshold, then the zoom in operation happens successfully, without any performance issues like out of memory and worksheet loading failures.
- If the number of selected cells exceeds the threshold, then a warning message informs users about the inability to load data as the number of cells before suppression exceeded the threshold. You can reduce your cell selection range to proceed with the zoom in operation.

Zooming in to a Selected Level

To zoom in to a selected level:

1. Select a member.

You can select a range of members when connected to these data sources: Oracle Essbase, Narrative Reporting, and Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud Standard-mode applications, such as Planning.

- 2. From the data source ribbon, click the down arrow next to **Zoom In**, and then select one of the following options.
 - Next Level—To retrieve data for the children of the selected members
 - All Levels—To retrieve data for all descendants of the selected members
 - Bottom Level—To retrieve data for the lowest level of members in a dimension

These Zoom In options are available for Essbase; and EPM Cloud Standard-mode applications, such as Planning, only:

- **Same Level**—To retrieve data for all members at the same level as the selected member
- Sibling Level—To retrieve data for the siblings of the selected members
- **Same Generation**—To retrieve data for all members of the same generation as the selected members
- **Formulas**—To retrieve data for all members that are defined by the formula of the selected member. The formula can be a member equation or a consolidation to the parent.

Formulas applies to Essbase only.

Note:

When you zoom in on a page dimension, the page dimension is pivoted to a row dimension.

Zooming in to the Default Level

To zoom in to the default zoom level, do one of the following:

• Select a member, and then click **Zoom In** on the data source ribbon.



You can select a range of members when connected to these data sources: Oracle Essbase, Narrative Reporting, and Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud Standard-mode applications, such as Planning.

To specify a default zoom level, see Setting a Default Zoom Level.

• Double-click a member.

Double-click zooming must be enabled; see Enabling Zoom on Double-Click.

Zooming in on Shared Members in EPM Cloud

Data source types: Planning, Financial Consolidation and Close, Tax Reporting

In 16.12 and earlier, Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud did not support shared members. When a member was placed on an ad hoc grid, it was always considered a base member, even if it was supposed to be a shared member.

EPM Cloud 17.01+ supports shared members in ad hoc grids and recognizes whether a member is a base member or a shared member. If your administrator enables the application setting, **Allow drill down on shared members in ad hoc**, then zooming in on shared members is supported in Oracle Smart View for Office (17.04+). In this case, zooming in on shared members is effectively the same as zooming in on the corresponding base members. You can zoom in on shared members one level at time.

If your administrator enables the application setting, **Drill to All Levels in Base** (21.09+), and you're working with a Standard mode application, you can zoom in beyond just the shared members into all levels or only the bottoms levels within the base hierarchy using the Zoom In options, **All Levels** and **Bottom Level**.

Note:

When the **Drill to All Levels in Base** check box is enabled in the application, then the multi-member zoom feature is not supported.

Example Shared Member Zoom In

This example describes the results you will see when your application is set to Standard mode, Allow drill down on shared members in ad hoc is set to Yes, and Drill to All Levels in Base is enabled.

Figure 1 shows three hierarchies under the Entity dimension. In the <code>entity_10</code> hierarchy, all members descend from <code>entity_10</code>. In the <code>entity_12</code> hierarchy, all members descend from <code>entity_12</code>. In the <code>entity_14</code> hierarchy, there are descendent members of <code>entity_14</code> as well as the shared members, <code>entity_10</code> and <code>entity_12</code>. The shared members include their descendents.

Note:

In a Native mode application, you can achieve the results shown in the Zoom In to All Levels example, if **Allow drill down on shared members in ad hoc** set to **Yes**, and **Drill to All Levels in Base** disabled; however, you will need to zoom in one level at a time on the shared members till you reach the bottom level of each hierarchy. You will not be able to zoom in directly to the botton level of the shared members.

Zooming Out

Zooming out collapses the view to the next upper level.

To zoom out:

1. Select a member.

You can select a range of members when connected to these data sources: Oracle Essbase, Narrative Reporting, and Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud Standard-mode applications, such as Planning.

2. From the data source ribbon, click **Zoom Out**.

Setting a Default Zoom Level

You can specify a default level for zooming operations. This setting applies to the **Zoom In** button and to double-click zooming if it is enabled (see Enabling Zoom on Double-Click).

To set a **Zoom In** default level:

- 1. From the Smart View ribbon, select **Options**, and then select **Member Options** in the left panel.
- 2. From the Zoom In Level drop-down menu, select one of the following levels:
 - Next Level to retrieve data for the children of the selected members
 - All Levels to retrieve data for all descendants of the selected members
 - Bottom Level to retrieve data for the lowest level of members in a dimension

These Zoom In options are available for Oracle Essbase; and Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud Standard-mode applications, such as Planning:

- **Same Level** to retrieve data for all members at the same level as the selected member
- Sibling Level to retrieve data for the siblings of the selected members



• Same Generation to retrieve data for all members of the same generation as the selected members

This Zoom In option is available for Essbase:

Formulas to retrieve data for all members that are defined by the formula of the selected member. The formula can be a member equation or a consolidation to the parent.

3. Click OK.

Selecting Members to Display when Zooming

You can set options to specify which members are retained and displayed as you zoom in and out.

To set member display options for zooming:

- 1. From the Smart View ribbon, select **Options**, and then select **Member Options** in the left panel.
- 2. Under Member Retention, select:
 - Include Selection to display both the selected member and the members retrieved as a result of zooming. For example, zooming in on the selected member Qtr1 retrieves data for Jan, Feb, Mar, and Qtr1. If not selected, only the members retrieved as a result of the zoom are displayed: Jan, Feb, and Mar.
 - Within Selected Group to zoom in only on the selected group of cells, leaving the unselected cells as is. This setting is meaningful only when there are two or more dimensions down the grid as rows or across the grid as columns. (This setting also applies to Keep Only and Remove Only.)
 - **Remove Unselected Groups** to remove all dimensions and members *except* the selected member and the members retrieved as a result of zooming.
- 3. Click OK.

Enabling Zoom on Double-Click

In Oracle Smart View for Office, if double-clicking for ad hoc operations is enabled, you can zoom in to the default zoom level and zoom out by double-clicking in a member cell.

To enable double-clicking for zooming:

- 1. From the Smart View ribbon, select **Options**, and then select **Advanced** in the left panel.
- 2. Under Mode, select Double-click for Operations.



If you do not select **Double-click for Operations**, then double-clicking retains Excel functionality and puts the cell into edit mode.

3. Click OK.

Note:

In blank worksheets, double-clicking the first time retrieves the default grid and thereafter zooms in or out.

Zooming and Formatting

You can apply the formatting of the cell that you zoom in on to the cells that are created by zooming. For Oracle Smart View for Office formatting, this ability applies to data cells. For Excel formatting, this ability applies to member cells.

Excel Formatting

To apply Excel formatting selections to member cells created by zooming, from the Smart View ribbon, select **Options**. Then select all these options:

- From the **Formatting** page, select these options:
 - Use Excel Formatting
 - Move Formatting on Operations
- From the Member Options page, select Preserve Formulas and Comments in ad hoc operations (except Pivot)
- Oracle Essbase only: From the Member Options page, select Formula Fill

Zooming Operations in Cells that Contain Formulas

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase

If member or data cells are associated with formulas, you can propagate these formulas to the cells retrieved as a result of zooming in. For example, if member <code>Qtr1</code> is associated with a formula, then the formula can be propagated to <code>Jan</code>, <code>Feb</code>, and <code>Mar</code> when you zoom in on <code>Qtr1</code>.

To propagate formulas:

- 1. From the Smart View ribbon, click **Options**, and then select **Member Options** in the left panel.
- 2. Under Comments and Formulas, ensure that Preserve Formulas and Comments in ad hoc operations (except pivot) is selected.



3. Select Formula Fill.

Note:

- With the Formula Fill option enabled, some zoom operations may be time consuming. For example, a zoom in to the bottom level of a large hierarchy (described in Zooming in to a Selected Level) may take a long time to complete.
- Although these options—Preserve Formulas and Comments in ad hoc operations (except pivot) and Formula Fill—appear in Member Options, they apply to formulas in both member and data cells.
- 4. Click OK.

Specifying Ancestor Position in Ad Hoc Grids

Use the **Ancestor Position** option to specify the ancestor position for hierarchies as **Top** or **Bottom**. The **Ancestor Position** option is located in the **Member Options** tab of the **Options** dialog.

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase, Planning Ad Hoc, Planning Modules Ad Hoc, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close Ad Hoc, FreeForm, Tax Reporting Ad Hoc

On-premises data source types: Oracle Hyperion Financial Management Ad Hoc, Oracle Hyperion Planning Ad Hoc

Note:

Essbase only: The ancestor position is set in the application by your Essbase administrator. By default, the ancestor position is set to **Bottom**. To set the ancestor position to **Top**, an administrator must set the application config setting, SSANCESTORONTOP, to True.

- Users: See the example grids in Zoom in Results Selecting Ancestor Position - Top and Zoom in Results Selecting Ancestor Position - Bottom.
- Administrators: To set this option, see SSANCESTORONTOP.

To specify the ancestor position for hierarchies in ad hoc grids:

1. Connect to your database.



For example, in Planning, you may connect to a cube or a form that is enabled for ad hoc. In Essbase, you connect to an application and database.

- 2. In the Smart View ribbon, select **Options**, and then select **Member Options**.
- 3. In Ancestor Position, select Top or Bottom.

The default is **Bottom**.

- 4. Click OK to close the Options dialog.
- 5. Perform an ad hoc analysis by selecting the **Ad hoc analysis** option in the Action Panel.
- 6. Perform a zoom-in on a dimension or member and check the result.

For example:

- If you select **Top**, the resulting hierarchy layout should resemble the layout shown in Figure 1.
- If you select **Bottom**, the resulting hierarchy layout should resemble the layout shown in Figure 2.
- 7. Continue ad hoc operations, such as zoom-in and pivoting.

Note:

- Changing the **Ancestor Position** setting has no effect on the dimension and member layout in an existing grid. You will only see the change when you perform a zoom-in operation.
- In an existing grid, or in the middle of a series of ad hoc analysis operations, changing Ancestor Position option (from Bottom to Top or from Top to Bottom) can result in non-uniform hierarchy display in the grid.

Example 9-3 Zoom in Results Selecting Ancestor Position - Top

In this example, we zoom in on the Account dimension. After zooming in, the Account ancestor is shown at the top of its children members. Next, we zoom in on Statistics. After zooming in, the Statistics ancestor is shown at the top of its children members.

Working with Excel Filters on Ad Hoc Sheets

Excel filters are retained when performing ad hoc in cases where the ad hoc operation results in the same set of column dimensions.

Data source types: All supported Oracle Smart View for Office providers, cloud and onpremises, ad hoc only

For example, set filters on the members of the Measures dimension as follows:

If you zoom in on the row dimension, Year, the result set retains the Excel filters that were set in the column dimensions because the column dimensions and members didn't change.

Guidelines

- Excel filters are retained for most ad hoc operations, such as Zoom In, Zoom Out, Remove Only, and Keep Only, Undo, and Redo, as long as the same set of column dimensions appear in the result set.
- Excel filters are also retained after a Submit or a Refresh.
- Excel filters are not retained for Pivot or Pivot to POV operations.
- Excel filter retention is not supported on multiple-grid sheets. For example, after creating filters in one grid, then moving to a second grid and creating filters on it, the filters on the first grid will be lost.

However, there may be some cases where the filters are retained. For example, if two adjacent grids both start on the same row, then the filters may be retained. Because of these variations, Oracle cannot assure that Excel filters will be retained on multiple-grid sheets.

- Excel grouping is expanded in two cases:
 - Filters are used. In this case, grouping is expanded on rows.
 - Adjust Column Width and Row Height is checked (Options dialog, Formatting tab)

To preserve Excel grouping, do not use filters or the **Adjust Column Width and Row Height** option. The Excel grouping expanded/collapsed state cannot be restored programmatically, and Excel automatically expands everything if filtering is applied or the row height/column width is automatically adjusted.

Pivoting

Pivoting changes the orientation of the data on the worksheet. You can move dimensions between rows and columns and between the grid and the POV.

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase, Planning, Planning Modules, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Narrative Reporting, Tax Reporting



On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Financial Management, Oracle Hyperion Planning

Additionally:

- One or more dimensions can be pivoted from the grid to the POV toolbar.
- One dimension at a time can be pivoted from the POV toolbar to the grid.
- A single dimension, and even zero dimensions, can remain on the POV toolbar.
- You can select only one dimension or one member at a time to pivot between rows and columns on the sheet. In cases where multiple members from the same dimension are on the grid, then all members in the dimension will be pivoted.
- When you pivot a member from the grid to the POV, the member selected on the grid becomes the POV for that dimension. For example, if pivot Qtr2 of the Year dimension from the grid to the POV, then Qtr2 becomes the POV for the Year dimension.

Pivoting Dimensions Between Rows and Columns

You can pivot a dimension or members between rows and columns. There must be two or more dimensions, or members from two or more dimensions, in the row or column that contains the dimension that you want to pivot. That is, you cannot pivot the last row dimension or the last column dimension on a grid.

When you pivot a member, the other members in its dimension are also pivoted.

When you pivot between rows and columns, Oracle Smart View for Office moves the selected dimension to the outermost row or column on the opposite axis. For example, when you select to pivot a dimension to a row, the system moves the dimension to the top of the grid.

Note:

When the **Use Excel Formatting** option is selected (as described in Using Excel Formatting), member and numeric formats may unexpectedly change after pivot operations. For example, member names may be centered and numeric values may be left justified. You can reset the grid to the proper format using the Excel formatting options.

To pivot a dimension or member:

- 1. Select a dimension or member.
- 2. From the data source ribbon, click **Pivot**.

Alternatively, you can drag a dimension from the row or column and drop it on the target row or column.

Row dimensions are pivoted to the topmost column dimension.

Column dimensions are pivoted to the left-most row dimension.



Note:

You pivot members by selecting them from the POV, as described in Selecting Members from the POV Toolbar.

Pivoting Dimensions Between the Grid and the POV Toolbar

You can select to pivot a dimension out of the ad hoc grid to the Point of View (POV), or out of the POV to the grid. You can also pivot a member; if you do so, the other members in its dimension are also pivoted.

To pivot a dimension or members between the POV toolbar and the grid, perform one of the following tasks:

• To pivot a dimension to the POV, select the dimension in the grid. In the provider

ribbon, click the arrow in the **Pivot** button, **Pivot**, and then select **Pivot to POV**.

Alternatively, right-click a dimension and drag it from the grid and drop it on the POV toolbar.

You can also pivot a member. Select one member only; you do not need to select multiple members. Selecting one member pivots all members in the dimension.

 To pivot a dimension from the POV to the grid, right click the arrow next to the dimension name in the POV toolbar, then drag the dimension and drop it on the grid.

Example 9-5 Pivoting Notes

- You can leave any number of dimensions on the POV; for example, 0, 1, or more dimensions can be left on the POV.
- After pivoting the last dimension from the POV toolbar to the grid, the POV toolbar is hidden. You can always bring it back by clicking the POV button in the provider ribbon.
- The grid must always contain at least two dimensions: one row dimension and one column dimensions. When there is only one row dimension and one column dimension on a grid, you must first pivot the replacement dimension on to the grid before you can pivot a dimension out of the grid.

For example, if you want to pivot the row dimension off of the grid, then you must first pivot the replacement row dimension on to the grid, and then pivot the unwanted row dimension off of the grid.

 You can manually type a dimension or member name to replace a dimension or member name in the grid or the POV toolbar.

Similarly, you can delete a dimension or member from the grid, refresh the grid, and the deleted dimension or member is moved from the grid and will display on the POV toolbar.

• You can pivot members by selecting them from the POV, as described in Selecting Members from the POV Toolbar.



Removing Selected Members From the Grid

You can remove members and their associated data from the grid.

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase, Planning, Planning Modules, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Narrative Reporting, Tax Reporting

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Financial Management, Oracle Hyperion Planning

Keep Only and **Remove Only** operate on all instances of the selected members in the grid within the selected group.

To remove members from the grid, use the Remove Only or Keep Only command:

- Select the member cells that you want to remove. Then, from the data source ribbon, click **Remove Only**. All selected members in the dimension are removed.
- Select the member cells that you want to keep. Then, from the data source ribbon, click **Keep Only**. All other members in the dimension are removed.

Example of Keep Only and Remove Only

The results of **Keep Only** and **Remove Only** depend on how the selected group is evaluated within the grid. A group consists of two or more dimensions down the grid as rows or across the grid as columns.

To use the **Keep Only** or **Remove Only** command, the selected member must have a group of members associated with it. Members do not have to be from the same dimension to be considered a group. The selected member shouldn't be the lowest or last member of the group.

For example, in Figure 1, you could think of New York, Florida, Connecticut, and New Hampshire as individual groups that all contain the January member. We want to keep the data for January for those four states. Yet, when we select Jan, and then click **Keep Only**, the grid doesn't change. This is because Jan is not its own group, it's actually a member of a group originating with the Market dimension, and also belongs to the New York, Florida, Connecticut, and New Hampshire groups.

Inserting Rows and Columns

In ad hoc grids, you can insert calculating and non-calculating columns and rows within or outside the grid.

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Financial Management

Inserted rows and columns, which may contain formulas, text, or Excel comments, are retained when you refresh or zoom in.

Always refresh the grid before inserting rows or columns.



Displaying and Suppressing Repeated Members

If you have stacked dimensions in an ad hoc grid, you can display or suppress repeated members.

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase

This topic describes using the **Repeated Members** option in the **Options** dialog box, **Data Options** tab, **Suppress Rows** group. This option only applies to Essbase data sources. To use the other data suppress options in the **Suppress Rows** and the **Suppress Columns** group, see **Data Options**.

When working with stacked dimensions in an ad hoc grid, and the **Suppress Repeated Members** option is selected, Essbase positions the suppressed member label above the labels in the next row, up to the first column dimension, using the "proximity rule". With the proximity rule, when repeated members are suppressed, Essbase compares the stacked dimensions row by row. It groups the non-repeating, unsuppressed members under the closest suppressed member in the previous row. Essbase can then determine which member is being queried and retrieves the data accordingly.

The scenario that follows shows the proximity rule in action.

Using the Sample Basic database, select the **Ad hoc analysis** option. The Measures, Product, Market, Scenario, and Year dimensions are retrieved on the worksheet as shown in Figure 1.

Now, from the Smart View ribbon, select **Options**, then select the **Data** tab. In the **Suppress Rows** group, select the **Repeated Members** options. Then refresh the sheet. The resulting grid looks similar to Figure 4. For each of the column dimensions in rows 1 and 2, where there were suppressed repeated members, the member label is centered above the labels in the next row.

The data in columns C, D, E, F, and G belong to the East member; the data in columns H, I, J, K, and L belong to West. Using the proximity rule, Scenario in column G belongs to East because it is only two columns from the East member, but three columns from the West member.

The Measures dimension label applies to the entire grid.

Using the Suppress Repeating Members Option with 11.1.2.2.102 and Earlier Workbooks

You must perform the steps in this topic before you begin using your workbooks with Oracle Smart View for Office 11.1.2.5.200 and later.

If you are working with spreadsheets that were created and used with version 11.1.2.2.102 or earlier of Smart View, Oracle Essbase, and Oracle Hyperion Provider Services, you must complete the following steps in order to assure that row and column data aligns properly with their parent members:

- 1. Make a backup copy of your workbook.
- 2. In the Data tab of the Options dialog box, clear the Repeated Members option.
- 3. Refresh the workbook. You may refresh the entire workbook or refresh each sheet individually.
- 4. Go back to the **Data** tab of the **Options** dialog box, and select the **Repeated Members** option.
- 5. Perform the refresh operation again.

The workbook is ready for use with Smart View version 11.1.2.5.200 and later.

In Essbase, you can create multiple grids on one worksheet. These grids can be connected to the same data source or to different Essbase data sources. You can retrieve data in these grids and shift them on the worksheet.



Note:

If you are using an Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud data source to create multiple ad hoc grids on a sheet, see Working with Multiple-Grid Worksheets in EPM Cloud.

Guidelines and Best Practices

Note the following guidelines, best practices, and limitations while working in worksheets that support multiple grids:

• You can submit data for only one grid at a time.

If you try to submit data for more than one grid at a time—that is, if you have selected cell ranges in more than one grid—the first range returned by Excel will be used to determine the selected grid and the submit will be performed only on that grid.

- If Preserve Formulas and Comments in ad hoc operations (except pivot and undo) is selected, you can preserve formulas on the sheet using the Undo option on the rightclick Smart View context menu from within the grid. This option is only supported after a refresh has been performed once formulas are added to the sheet, and only for one undo action. This option is only supported for one undo action. The Undo option on the Smart View ribbon is not enabled for multiple-grid sheets. See Preserving Excel Formulas Within and Outside of Essbase Ad Hoc Grids.
- Multiple-grid worksheets are not supported for Smart Slices.
- As a best practice, do not use Microsoft Excel's Name Manager or Name Box to rename named ranges. Instead, use one of the following methods to rename named ranges:
 - Use the Rename Range command in the Document Contents pane of the Smart View Panel. See Renaming Ranges on Multiple-Grid Worksheets
 - Use the VBA function, HypModifyRangeGridName, described in the Oracle Smart View for Office Developer's Guide.
- On multiple-connection multiple grid worksheets, as a best practice, ensure that there is enough space between grids to accommodate pivot and zoom operations on the individual grids. A loss of metadata may occur on sheets with three or more database connections and where grids are placed too close together.
- As a best practice to ensure that you are refreshing the desired range, use the Document Contents pane to first select the range, and then click the Refresh link in the pane. After refresh, select the range again from Document Contents to highlight the updated range.
- These items on the Smart View ribbon are disabled:
 - Undo
 - Redo

Instead, to access the **Undo** and **Redo** commands when working with a multiple-grid sheet, ensure that your cursor is in the affected grid. As a best practice, use the **Document Contents** pane to ensure that you have selected the correct grid. Then, right-click and select **Smart View** from the context menu, and then select **Undo** or **Redo**, as required.

Note:

Multiple-grid worksheets are not supported for Smart Slices.

4. When prompted to change the worksheet to support multiple grids, select Yes.

Note:

If you started with an ordinary single-grid worksheet, and want to add other grids to the sheet, see Converting Ad Hoc Worksheets to Multiple-Grid Worksheets.

- 5. To create another grid on the worksheet:
 - a. Select a different range of cells.
 - **b.** From the Smart View Panel, right click an application, and then select **Ad Hoc Analysis**.
- 6. Repeat step step 5 as necessary to add grids to the worksheet.

Starting in Oracle Smart View for Office 11.1.2.5.400, the creation of multiple-grid worksheets using refresh is no longer supported.

Renaming Ranges on Multiple-Grid Worksheets

When you place ranges on a multiple-grid worksheet, Excel assigns each range a name by default. The strings used in the name ranges may not be particularly user friendly. For example, a range based on the Essbase Demo Basic database might look like this:

Demo Basic C2034305 D2AC 449B B4AE 56EA047EDF05 1

A more user-friendly name would be helpful for all users of the workbook, but changing the name using the Excel Name Manager could cause a loss of metadata in Oracle Smart View for Office.

Use the **Rename Range** command in the Smart View Document Contents pane to change the name to a more descriptive or user-friendly name.



To rename ranges on a multiple-grid worksheet:

1. In the Document Contents pane, highlight the range to rename in the tree, and then click **Select**.



The **POV** button is enabled for Essbase multiple-grid worksheets that contain only one grid, making it possible for you to toggle the button to show or hide the POV toolbar. The **POV** button remains disabled on multiple-grid worksheets that contain more than one grid.

On multiple-grid worksheets that contain one grid, the POV dimensions are displayed both in the grid and in the toolbar. On regular ad hoc worksheets, POV dimensions are displayed in the grid only if the POV toolbar is hidden.

Typically, Oracle Smart View for Office grids consist of member names on rows above and columns on the left of the data grid. Using the range retrieval capabilities of worksheets enabled for multiple grids, you can create grids with different layouts.

For example, you can create "butterfly" reports, with a column of members between two columns of data cells.

Cascading Reports and Ad Hoc Grids

You can create separate reports for any or all of the members of one or more dimensions in a report based on an ad hoc grid or Smart Slice query.

You can then cascade these reports separately across the worksheets of an Excel workbook. For reports created in the Report Designer, you can also cascade reports across slides in a PowerPoint presentation. Worksheets or slides are created as needed to accommodate all reports.

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase, Planning, Planning Modules, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Tax Reporting

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Financial Management

Formulas, comments and other text, Smart Slice function grids, charts, tables, and sliders are included in cascaded reports.

Essbase only: Cascading is supported for multiple-grid worksheets.



Note:

When extensions are enabled in Oracle Smart View for Office, cascading a report with a large number of members can cause Excel to stop responding. You may disable any extensions that are installed from the **Smart View Options** dialog box, **Extensions** tab. After disabling, restart Excel and repeat the cascade operation.

To cascade an ad hoc grid or Smart Slice report:

- 1. Open an ad hoc grid or Smart Slice report on the worksheet.
- 2. From the **Essbase** ribbon or from the data provider ad hoc ribbon (for example, **Planning Ad Hoc**), select **Cascade**, and then one of the following:
 - Same Workbook to use the current workbook
 - New Workbook to use a new workbook
 - Different Workbooks to cascade each report to a different workbook
- 3. In Select Cascade Members, click in next to each dimension to launch Member Selection, where you select the members from each dimension for which you want to create reports.

One report will be generated for each member you select. A message indicating the number of reports to be generated appears in the bottom left of the dialog.

In the example dialog below, members were selected for the Product and Scenario dimensions. For Product and Scenario, after selecting members in **Member Selection**, quotation marks are applied to the member names. For the Market dimension, because **Member Selection** was not launched and no members selected, then no quotation marks are applied. The message at the bottom of the dialog indicates that four cascaded sheets will be generated.

Tip:

To hand-type member names in the **Select Cascade Members** dialog, as a best practice, you must enclose the member names in quotation marks. This applies to both single name member names and member names containing a comma (,). For example, to select a member named "Laptops" and a member named "Tablets, Smartphones", type:

"Laptops", "Tablets, Smartphones"

Additionally, separate each member name with a comma, as shown.

Note:

In the **Select Cascade Members** dialog box, JAWS is not reading the "Number of cascaded sheets" label and the number when reciting the dialog content. In JAWS, go to **Utilities**, then **Settings**, then **User**, then **Screen echo**, and then select **Echo all text**.

4. Click **OK** to begin cascading.

Depending on your earlier cascade selection, the resulting reports are created on separate worksheets in the current workbook or in a new one. Each worksheet tab is named for the dimensions and members of the report it contains. Click a worksheet tab to view a report.

To see a list of all the worksheets, right-click the left or right arrow at the bottom left of Excel:

In our example using the "Product", "Market", and "Scenario" dimensions, the following reports were created:

To display a specific report, select the report in the list, and then click **OK**.

Note:

- Worksheet tab naming depends on your cascade selections, and the number of resulting sheets. Excel creates each sheet name using the first 30 characters of the selected dimension names, regardless of the length of the dimension names. If this results in more than 30 characters, then the first 28 characters are used and appended with ~n where n is a unique number (1,2,3,...).
- As a best practice, do not use any the following special characters in dimension, member or alias names:

 $\{ \ \}$ () [] @ \setminus . – = < + ' " ~~|~~

- Cascading may be very slow for large grids.
- When extensions are enabled in Smart View, cascading a report with a large number of members can cause Excel to stop responding. You may disable any extensions that are installed from the Smart View Options dialog box, Extensions tab. After disabling, restart Excel and repeat the cascade operation.



Using Substitution Variables

Substitution variables are global or per-application placeholders that represent variable values.

Cloud data source types: Planning

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Planning

Application designers or administrators define and manage substitution variables and their corresponding values; Oracle Smart View for Office users can enter a substitution variable into the grid and retrieve its value by refreshing.

For example, the designation "&CurMnth" might be a substitution variable representing the current month. Let's suppose the value for substitution variable "&CurMnth" is August. When you enter &CurMnth into a grid, Smart View displays August after a refresh. Later, if the value is changed to September, then September is displayed after a refresh when you enter &CurMnth.

When connected to Planning, some substitution variables that you enter may represent ranges. For example, "&NewMnthPeriod" might represent the month range of October through December. Or, "&NewQtrPeriod" might represent the quarter hierarchies of Quarter 1 and Quarter 2.

For more information about substitution variables, see the respective data source type documentation available in the Oracle Help Center.

To retrieve the value for a substitution variable:

1. Enter a substitution variable into a cell in the grid.



Substitution variable names must begin with an ampersand (&).

2. From any ribbon, select Refresh.

The current value defined for the substitution variable replaces the substitution variable in the cell (and for any cells in the current worksheet that contain the substitution variable; for example, all instances of &CurMnth would be changed).

Note:

When substitution variables are used in a form, the last column (the rightmost column) in forms is dropped or hidden when the form is opened in Smart View.



Detecting Comments and Unknown Members on Essbase Sheets

You can set options in Oracle Smart View for Office to detect comments and unknown members on Oracle Essbase sheets.

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase

On-premises data source types: Essbase

When you are connected to an Essbase provider, you can enable options in Smart View that allow you to quickly detect:

- Unknown members on a grid
- Text typed outside the grid; for example, your own notes on a sheet

In Smart View, cells containing these types of data are referred to as comments.

You can set options in Smart View that allow you quickly and easily spot comment cells, including invalid, or unknown, members in the grid or pertinent notes you may have made on a sheet outside of the grid.

For example, in an Essbase database on the server, a member named "Oregon Coast" member is renamed "Oregon". Smart View tracks this change and shows it to you if you define a cell style to call out comments. Then, you can quickly note the change and correct it in the grid.

To call out comments on Essbase sheets, you set these options in Smart View

- Preserve Comments and Unknown Members
- Enhanced Comment Handling
- Use Cell Styles

Optionally, define a distinctive cell style for comments.

You can then easily identify comment cells on the sheet, and further select and work with them in the **Comment Edit** dialog box.

The Preserve Formulas and Comments in ad hoc operations (except pivot) option must be selected to enable these options.

- b. In Formatting, select Use Cell Styles.
- c. In Cell Styles, expand Common, and then select the check box next to Comment Cells. Optionally, right-click Comment Cells and define a Font, Background, or Border for cells containing comments.
- 2. Click OK.

Optionally, click the arrow in the **OK** button and choose either **Save as Default Options** or **Apply to All Sheets**. These options are described in "Sheet Options" in Smart View Options.

To view comment cells in an Essbase sheet:

- 1. Be sure to complete the steps in Enabling Comment Display in the Sheet
- 2. Open a workbook containing a grid, connect to an Essbase provider, and click **Refresh**.
- 3. On the sheet, note the cells containing comments and unknown members.

In the example in Figure 1, cell C4 is an unknown member and Oracle Smart View for Office marked the cell as a comment. The member name was probably changed in the underlying Essbase database. The comment style indicates to us that this member needs attention.

Additionally, a second comment in the sheet notes that the Oregon Coast member name needs to be changed to Oregon. This comment is a note someone made outside of the grid and confirms to us that the member name has been changed on the server and that the member needs to be manually updated in the grid.



About the EPM Books Extension

In Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud, Books are a collection of one or more Reports, Books, and other documents, that you generate into a single PDF or Excel output (for Excel output caveats, see the Note below).

Using the EPM Books extension for Oracle Smart View for Office, you can import Books in to Microsoft Excel and work with them by changing POV values and refreshing. You can also open and work with Books that were downloaded in Excel format from the web application.

Note:

Only Reports are included in the Excel Books opened or imported in Smart View. Other documents—such as Word files, PDF files, or inserted Books—are omitted when imported into Smart View.



From the Books panel in Smart View, you can view properties for a Book, and import Books into Excel.

Each Book you import is a "job." Check the **Jobs Console** in the Books panel for the status of the job. You do not need to wait for a job to complete to invoke another job or perform other operations in the panel or elsewhere in Smart View. You can refresh job status, delete selected jobs, or delete all completed jobs in the Jobs Console. You can also view the status of jobs running on other servers that contain Books in your EPM Cloud environment.



With the Books ribbon, you can change the POV of the Reports in the Book, and refresh the book content. You can also use the Inspect button to view properties of the Book, including the POV.

Guidelines for Working with Books in Smart View

 Changing the POV: In 23.08+, Excel supports member selection in the Select POV dialog if a dimension's Book POV option is set to "Allow All Members." The Select option appears at the bottom of the drop-down list, and launches the Member Selection dialog.

If a dimension's Book POV option is set to "Display Selected Values," the list of available members to choose from is displayed in the drop-down list for each dimension and POV changes will be properly reflected upon refresh in Excel.

- Nested Books are not supported in Excel. For example, if there is a Book contained within a Book, the inner Book will be suppressed. The resulting Excel workbook will not contain the content related to the nested inner Book.
- PDF and Word documents inserted as part of a Book are not supported. When a Book
 includes other documents of type PDF or Word, they will be omitted from the Excel
 workbook.

Downloading and Running the Smart View Installer

To download and run the Oracle Smart View for Office installer:

- 1. Start your Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud business process in a web browser, and log in with your user name and password.
- 2. In the upper-right corner of the web interface, select the arrow next to your user name to display the user menu, and then select **Downloads**.
- 3. In Downloads, under Smart View, click Download From Oracle Technology Network.
- 4. In the Oracle Smart View for Office page, click Download Now.
- In the Oracle Licence Agreement popup window, select the I reviewed and accept the Oracle License Agreement check box, and then click the Download button for the current Smart View release.

Note:

If the Oracle sign-in page is displayed, then sign in with your Oracle user name (usually your email address) and password.

- 6. Follow the steps for your browser to download the ZIP file, and save it to a folder on your computer; for example, save it to the **Downloads** folder.
- Navigate to the folder that you used in the previous step, and then double-click SmartView.exe or right-click SmartView.exe and select Run as administrator to start the installation wizard.

Note:

Whenever possible, as a best practice, Oracle recommends using the **Run as administrator** command when installing Smart View.

8. Select a destination folder for Smart View, and then click **OK**; for new installations, Smart View is installed by default in:

C:/Oracle/SmartView



Note:

If you are upgrading an installation of Smart View, then the installer defaults to the folder where you previously installed Smart View.

9. When installation is complete, click OK.

The tab for the Smart View ribbon is displayed the next time you open Microsoft Excel, PowerPoint, or Word.

Creating Connections to EPM Cloud Business Processes

Cloud data source types: Planning, Planning Modules, Financial Consolidation and Close, Tax Reporting, Narrative Reporting

After you install Oracle Smart View for Office, as described in Downloading and Running the Smart View Installer, you can create connections to the Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud business process that you will be using with Books.

Connections require information about your service URL. Your Smart View administrator should provide you with the information that you need to create the connection.

You can use shared or private connections for most business processes. To connect to Narrative Reporting, use the quick connection method in Smart View.

To create connections to the business processes that you will be using with Books:

- 1. Launch Microsoft Excel.
- 2. From the Smart View ribbon, click Panel.
- **3.** To create shared connections to most supported business processes, follow the instructions in Creating Shared Connections.

You can use shared connections with these business processes:

- Planning
- Planning Modules
- Financial Consolidation and Close
- Tax Reporting
- Narrative Reporting

Note:

Narrative Reporting requires a private connection, described in the next step.

4. To create a private connection to any supported business process, see Creating Private Connections.

As a best practice, Oracle recommends using the quick connection method when creating private connections for Books, described in Using the Quick Connection Method.



For the private connection syntax appropriate to your supported business processes, see Private Connection URL Syntax.

5. Once you've created a connection, expand the tree in the Smart View Panel and navigate to the application and database that you want to work with.

If you are prompted to log in, enter your login credentials.

6. Continue the setup process with "Installing the Books Extension."

Installing the EPM Books Extension

Cloud data source types: Planning, Planning Modules, Financial Consolidation and Close, Tax Reporting, Narrative Reporting

This topic covers installing the EPM Cloud Books extension from within Oracle Smart View for Office.

Before you begin this procedure, complete the steps in "Creating Connections to Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud Business Processes."

Note: You can also install the extension from the business process web interface; for example, from the Planning web interface. To install the extension from the web, see: Downloading and Installing Clients in Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud Getting Started with Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud for Administrators Downloading and Installing Clients in Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud Getting Started with Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud for Users

To install the Books extension from Smart View:

1. In the Smart View ribbon, select **Options**, and then **Extensions**.

Note:

If the **Extension Alerts** dialog was displayed when you completed the steps in "Creating Connections to EPM Cloud Business Processes", then you should already be in the **Extensions** tab of the **Options** dialog.

- 2. Click the Check for Updates, New Installs, and Uninstalls link.
- 3. In Select Location for Extension Updates, select the check box that corresponds to your Books connection, and then click Get Updates.

The dialog box expands to display a message window providing you with the progress and status of the extension query.

4. Click Close in the Select Location for Extension Updates dialog to return to the Extensions tab of the Options dialog.



- In the list of extensions in the Extensions tab, locate EPM Cloud Book and click the Install link, Install, to launch the installer.
- 6. In the popup dialog asking "Apply this extension update?", click **Yes**, and then click **OK** to close the **Options** dialog, **Extensions** tab.

7. In the message dialog informing you that the installation is successful and instructing you to restart Office, click **OK**, and then close and restart Office.

Note:

If you need to uninstall the Books extension, use the **Check for Updates, New Installs, and Uninstalls** link in the Smart View **Options** dialog, **Extensions** tab. The extension will be flagged for removal. Select the **Remove** link in the **Extensions** tab, and restart Office when prompted. The process is described in Uninstalling Extensions.

Launching the EPM Books Panel in Smart View

From Office, you can launch the EPM Books panel whenever you connect to an Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud business process that contains Books.

Complete the procedures in Setting Up the Books Extension in Smart View before beginning the procedure in this topic.

To log in to an EPM Cloud business process and launch the Books panel in Oracle Smart View for Office:

- 1. Launch Microsoft Office (Excel, Word, or PowerPoint).
- 2. Select the Smart View ribbon, and then click Panel.
- 3. In the Smart View Panel, select **Private Connections**.



Figure 10-4 Arrow for Quick Connection Drop-down List







Importing Books into Smart View

To import Books into Oracle Smart View for Office: Before you begin importing Books, you should have already connected to a data source and launched the EPM Books panel, as described in Launching the EPM Books Panel in Smart View.

1. In the list of Books in the EPM Books panel, click 🕨 next to the Books to import.

Clicking begins the import process.

For each Book you import, a row is added to the Jobs Console pane in the Books panel.

Figure 1 shows the Books panel with three jobs in the Job Console; one with Completed status and two in progress with Started status. The panel is expanded so that you can see all columns in the Jobs Console.





Working with Downloaded Books in Smart View

To work with a downloaded Book in Oracle Smart View for Office:

1. Complete the steps in Importing Books into Smart View.

The Book is imported in to Smart View and the Books ribbon is displayed, as shown in Figure 2.

2. Click the links in the Table of Contents tab (Figure 2) to view the Reports contained in the Book.

Each worksheet tab is a report that is part of the Book that was imported and downloaded to Smart View.

You can also click the worksheet tabs in after the Table of Contents tab to view the various Reports in a Book.

Figure 1 shows an example worksheet containing a Report.

A message notifies you that refresh operation with the newly-selected POV values is in progress. Click **OK** in the message. The Jobs Console will display a new job row. You



can check the status of the job and download the Book once the job is completed. The newly-downloaded Book will show the updated results that reflect the new POV values.

4. To view properties for the Book, in the Books ribbon, click **Inspect**.

In Smart View, the path information in **Location** will always display the language set in the web application, even if Smart View is set to a different language. For example, in the web application, if the **Language** option in the **User Preferences**, **General** tab is set to Japanese, and the **Language** option in the Smart View **Options** dialog, **Advanced** tab, is set to French, then the path information in the **Book Properties** dialog, **Location** field, will display as Japanese.

As a best pratice, Oracle recommends that the **Language** setting in Smart View **Options** match the **Language** setting in **User Preferences** in the web interface.

5. To refresh the currently-selected report, in the Books ribbon, click **Refresh**.





Use the **Refresh** command when data is changed in the business process; for example, when a change is made in Planning data.

In addition to downloading Books from the Jobs Console in the EPM Books panel, you can also refresh the status of jobs, remove jobs, and display jobs from the current connection or all connectons from which you have imported Books.

About the Jobs Console

The Jobs Console in the EPM Books panel displays a list of *jobs*. A job represents a process of importing a Book in to Oracle Smart View for Office. In the Jobs Console, you can refresh the status of jobs, download imported Books to Smart View, remove jobs, and list jobs from the current connection or all connectons from which you have imported Books.

The top portion of the Books panel lists all Books available for import from the current data source connection. Once you import a job, a job is added to the Jobs Console. Each row in the Jobs Console lists the jobs that you have import for the current connection. You can also choose to toggle the display to show jobs for all connections from which you have imported Books.

Figure 1 shows an example of the Books panel with Books listed in the Books list. All Books in the current connection have been imported and the jobs are shown in various states in the Jobs Console.

For each job, the Jobs Console provides the following information:

- **Status**—The status of the job, indicated by an icon:
 - Omega-Job is in progress. Click to update the job status.
 - 📩 —Job is completed. Click to download the job.
 - — An error has occurred. Click to view the error message.
- **Submitted**—The date and time the job was submitted for import.
- **Book**—The name of the Book that was submitted for import.
- Status Description—Valid status descriptions are: Started, Completed, and Error.
- **Job ID**—An internal ID issued for each job by the business process.

The Jobs Console toolbar, located above the list of jobs, provides options for managing jobs, including a refresh option, delete options, and an option for selecting to display jobs from the current connection or all connections from which you have imported Books. The Jobs Console toolbar is shown in Figure 2.

Before you begin working with jobs in the Jobs Console, you should have already connected to a data source that hosts Books and launched the EPM Books panel, as described in Launching the EPM Books Panel in Smart View.

To manage jobs in the Jobs Console in the EPM Books panel, completed any of these optional tasks:

- 1. To display jobs, perform a task:
 - To display jobs corresponding to Books that you have imported, but not yet deleted, from any business process that hosts Books, select All Servers from the Current Server/All Servers toggle button in the Jobs Console toolbar; for example:

When you select **All Servers**, the **Jobs Console** will display all jobs that you have imported but not yet deleted, from the current connection and any other business processes, even if you are not currently connected.

 To display jobs from Books that you have imported, but not yet deleted, from the current connection, select Current Server from the Current Server/All Servers toggle button in the Jobs Console toolbar.

The **Jobs Console** will display jobs from imported Books of all status types: in-progress jobs, completed jobs, and jobs that resulted in error.

- 2. To refresh the status of jobs in the **Jobs Console**, perform a task:
 - To refresh all jobs for the current connection, click the Refresh all jobs button, Q, in the Jobs Console toolbar:





The status of all jobs that you have submitted from the current connection are refreshed.

 To refresh a specific job in the Jobs Console list, click I in the Status column on the row for the job. For example,

The status of the selected job is refreshed.

- 3. To delete completed jobs in the Jobs Console, perform a task:
 - To delete all completed jobs from all business processes from which you have imported jobs, select All Servers from the toggle button in the Jobs Console toolbar, and then click .

Completed jobs are deleted from any business process from which you have imported jobs, including business processes to which you are not currently connected.

 To delete all completed jobs from the business process to which you are currently connected, select Current Server from the toggle button in the Jobs Console toolbar, and then click ¹/₁₆.

Completed jobs are deleted from the current connection.

• To delete a specific completed job from the current connection in the Books panel, select the row for the job in the **Jobs Console** and click

You can use the **Control** key to select more than one contiguous or noncontiguous job from the list, and then click $\widehat{\mathbf{m}}$.

Toggle between **Current Server** and **All Servers**, as you require. You can delete from selected jobs from the current connection or all connections from which you have imported Books.

The selected jobs are deleted from the list of jobs in the Jobs Console

Reports is a cloud-based reporting solution for creating Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud financial and managerial reports. It enables users to insert charts and grids utilizing EPM Cloud Platform sources such as Planning or Narrative Reporting, into a report.

You can import or insert reports as ad hoc queries and as fully formatted reports from Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud data sources into Oracle Smart View for Office to perform further operations on them.

About Reports

You can import or insert reports as ad hoc queries and as fully formatted reports from Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud data sources into Oracle Smart View for Office to perform further operations on them.

Supported data sources include:

- EPM Cloud: Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Narrative Reporting, Planning, Planning Modules, Tax Reporting
- Oracle Essbase cloud
- Oracle Profitability and Cost Management Cloud Essbase Provider
- Oracle Fusion Applications Essbase Provider
- Oracle Essbase Analytic Provider Services (APS)

Reports is a cloud-based reporting solution for creating EPM Cloud financial and managerial reports. It enables users to insert charts and grids utilizing EPM Cloud sources such as Planning or FreeForm, into a report.

Report grids are tables that contain data from external data source connections. Administrators add grids to Reports, defining the dimension layout, selecting members, and then formatting the grid. Using text, dimensions, members, and formulas, administrators define the grid content.



Reports functionality and the Reports folder are available only in Excel.

Using Smart View for Excel, you can:

• Import the report grids as ad hoc grids.

Perform supported ad hoc operations on the grids, such as pivoting and member selection, directly against the data source.

The grids can be saved and then used as sources for embedded content in report package doclets.

See Importing Reports as Ad Hoc Queries.

Import or insert Reports in to Excel workbooks as fully-formatted reports.

If **Preview POV** is enabled for reports, you can select the POV while importing or inserting the report.

If prompts are included in the report, you specify the prompts during import or insert.

Note that there will be some differences between reports imported or inserted in the web and reports imported in to Excel, described in Differences between Reports and Reports Imported in Excel in Designing with Reports for Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud, available on the Oracle Help Center, Books tab, for your EPM Cloud business process.

- Once imported, you can:
 - Change the POV and refresh the report data, as needed.
 - Edit the prompts.
 - Refresh the workbook with the latest report data.
 - Distribute the report to others as Excel files.
 - Generate an ad hoc grid from the report, and then perform further ad hoc operations for the purpose of data analysis.

See Importing or Inserting, and Working with Fully Formatted Reports.

You can also use the "Download as Excel" and "Download as Excel Ad Hoc" commands in your web application to import Reports in to Smart View for Excel, described in Working with Reports in Smart View in Working with Reports for Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud. Note the following considerations while working with reports downloaded using the "Download as Excel Ad Hoc" command:

- All non-suppressed, hidden, and visible data rows and columns in a report's ad hoc grid are also imported in Smart View. Row or column headings that were hidden in the web application view also appear in the respective dimensions, and are not moved to the POV. This enables in importing all dimensions, including the hidden ones, so that ad hoc analysis can be performed easily in Smart View.
- Only data rows and columns are imported in Smart View. Non-data details are static and remain unchanged even after a grid is refreshed. So to avoid confusion, all non-data details such as text, formula, separator and notes rows and columns are omitted when importing any ad hoc grids present in reports.



Service Administrators: During report design, you can configure reports to use the **Member Selection** dialog in prompts or the POV by performing these tasks:

- Clear the Display Suggestions Only option when defining POV dimensions
- Do not specify a Choice List when defining prompts

In both cases, users can launch the **Member Selection** dialog to select the members to which they have access for the POV and prompts.

For reports with multiple data sources:

- When a dimension name is unique among the data sources, then the Member Selection dialog can be made available for the POV (clear Display Suggestions Only) and prompts (do not specify a Choice List).
- When the same dimension name occurs in more than one of the multiple data sources, then a suggestions or a choice list must be defined for the POV and prompts.

Note:

For more information, see Designing with Reports for Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud, available on the Oracle Help Center, **Books** tab, for your EPM Cloud business process.

Importing Reports as Ad Hoc Queries

You can import Reports in to Oracle Smart View for Office as ad hoc queries, on which you can then perform available ad hoc operations.

The procedure in this topic describes importing Reports as ad hoc grids starting in Smart View for Excel.

You can also use the "Download as Excel Ad Hoc" command in your web application to import Reports as ad hoc grids in to Smart View for Excel, described in Working with Reports in Smart View in Working with Reports for Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud.

Note:

Before you begin, launch Smart View in Excel and connect to a supported Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud data source as described in Connecting to Data Sources.

To import a report in to Smart View as an ad hoc query:

1. In the Smart View Panel, navigate to the **Reports** folder.

All reports available in the business process can be accessed from the **Reports** folder.



- For most EPM Cloud business processes, the **Reports** folder is located under the application folder.
- For Narrative Reporting, the **Reports** folder is located under the **Library** folder.
- 2. Expand a report to view the available grids, and then select a grid.
- 3. In the Action Panel, click **Import as ad hoc query**.

Alternatively, right-click the grid and select **Import as ad hoc query**.

The report grid is rendered as an ad hoc query in Smart View. The provider ad hoc ribbon and POV toolbar are displayed.

Note:

- Formatting that is displayed when the report is viewed in the web application is not available when the grid is imported in to Smart View.
- Report grid text and formula rows and columns are not imported into Excel; only data is imported.
- When working with an EPM Cloud application that is set to "Native" mode (Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior option = Native), the POV dimensions are displayed both in the POV toolbar and as page dimensions on the grid.

Additionally, performing a **Change Alias** operation may cause a "Member out of place" error.

4. Perform ad hoc operations as required.

For example, you can:

- Zoom in on members
- If available, click the **POV** button in the data provider ad hoc ribbon to display or hide the POV toolbar
- Pivot POV dimensions or members to the grid
- Use Member Selection to change the grid point-of-view

Importing or Inserting, and Working with Fully Formatted Reports

You can import or insert reports in to Oracle Smart View for Office as fully formatted reports.

The procedure in this topic describes importing or inserting Reports in Smart View for Excel. You can also use the "Download as Excel" command in your web application to



import Reports in to Smart View for Excel, described in Working with Reports in Smart View in Working with Reports for Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud.

Note:

Before you begin working with fully formatted reports in Smart View, launch Smart View in Excel and connect to a supported Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud data source.

To import or insert, and then work with a fully formatted report:

1. In the Smart View Panel, navigate to the **Reports** folder.

All reports available on the instance can be accessed from the **Reports** folder.

Note:

- For most EPM Cloud business processes, the **Reports** folder is located under the application folder.
- For Narrative Reporting, the **Reports** folder is located under the Library folder.
- 2. Select a report and then, in the Action Panel, choose an option:
 - **Import Formatted Report**—Choose this option if you plan to import a single report into a workbook. This option allows for one report per workbook.

Each subsequent report you select for import will be imported to a new workbook.

• **Insert Formatted Report**—Choose this option if you plan to insert multiple reports into one workbook. This option allows for multiple reports per workbook.

Each subsequent report you select for insert will be added to the same workbook.

Alternatively, right-click the report and select the **Import Formatted Report** or **Insert Formatted Report** as you require.

If the report contains a preview POV upon launch, perform step 3. If the report contains prompts, perform step 4. If there are no prompts or preview POV, then the fully formatted report is rendered as follows:

- If you selected **Import Formatted Report**, then the report is rendered in to a new Excel workbook.
- If you selected **Insert Formatted Report**, then the report is rendered in to the current Excel workbook.

If **Print All Selections** is enabled during report design, the worksheet names will reflect the report name followed by the first POV dimension that was enabled for **Print All Selections**, truncating the sheet name as needed to meet Excel's 31-character limit.

Note that the report may contain a number of grids, charts, text objects and images laid out across one or more pages. All such objects are brought in to the Excel workbook upon import. Text boxes in the report are converted to images in the imported Excel sheet. In some cases, you may need to manually resize the image box in Excel to match the report presentation. To resize an image, use Excel's image formatting tool. Right-click



the image and select Size and Properties. In Format Picture, set Scale Height and Scale Width to 100%.

3. If **Preview POV** is enabled for reports, you can choose to use the default POV by clicking **OK** in the **Select POV** dialog; or, you can change the POV as described in Previewing POV in Reports and then click **OK**.

The fully formatted report is, depending on your selection, imported or inserted with the selected POV and is rendered in to a new workbook or the current workbook.

 If the report contains prompts, you can choose to use the default prompts by clicking OK in the Select Prompts dialog; or, you can change the prompts as described in Editing Prompts in Reports and then click OK.

The fully formatted report is imported or inserted with the selected prompt and is rendered in to a new workbook or the current workbook.

- 5. **Optional:** After importing or inserting the report:
 - To edit the POV of a sheet, click the Edit POV button in the Report group of the Smart View ribbon, and follow the procedure in Changing the POV in Reports.
 - If prompts are available to edit, click the Edit Prompts button in the Report group of the Smart View ribbon, and follow the procedure in Editing Prompts in Reports.
- 6. Optional: To refresh the imported report when the underlying data in the report changes during your session, click the **Refresh Report** button in the **Report** group of the Smart View ribbon.

Note:

- The **Report** group is displayed in the Smart View ribbon only when the report is open. **Refresh Report** maintains the open workbook and also maintains the user formula.
- When you refresh an existing exported, imported, or inserted report in Excel, the existing report gets refreshed in the same Excel workbook.
- You can only refresh reports in Excel that are in the original workbook.
- If you move or copy report sheets to another workbook, they cannot be refreshed.
- 7. **Optional:** To create an ad hoc grid from an imported grid or chart, select a cell inside the grid or select the chart image and, in the Smart View ribbon, click **Analyze**.

In a sheet containing multiple reports, select one report, and then click **Analyze**.

The ad hoc grid is launched in a separate worksheet.



- If your report includes percentages, note that percentage formatting is part of the number formatting applied to the values. Importing a formatted report shows applied number formatting. In the ad hoc grid, bare numbers are shown without any formatting.
- Modifications to prompts and POVs are not taken into account when performing Analyze. The newly inserted ad hoc grid (or analyzed grid) will always show the default grid.
- The Analyze command is not supported in these cases:
 - On a formatted reported with grouping.
 - On an analyzed grid.

See Importing Reports as Ad Hoc Queries for information on working with the ad hoc grid.

8. **Optional:** To view the properties of a report, in the tree in the Smart View Panel, select a report and click **Properties**.

Alternatively, right-click the report name and select **Properties** to access **Report Properties**.

In the **Report Properties** dialog, view these report properties: **Name**, **Description**, **Path** (if located in a folder other than the default), **Created By** (a user name), **Created On** (a date), and **Modified On** (a date).

9. Optional: Use the Excel Save or Save As commands to save the workbook.

Previewing POV in Reports

Previewing the POV gives you the ability to control and edit it before importing or inserting a report.

In Oracle Smart View for Office 23.100+, when you import or insert a report from an EPM Cloud business process or Narrative Reporting, you can preview and set the POV.

Before you begin, you need to enable the User Preference option for Reports, **Preview POV**, in the web application as follows:

- In Narrative Reporting, navigate to Tools, select User Preferences, and then select the Preview POV check box in the Reporting tab.
- From an Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud business process, navigate to Tools, select User Preferences, and then select the Preview POV check box in the Reports tab.

After saving the user preferences, restart Microsoft Excel if it is already open, and connect to the business process in Smart View.

To preview and select the POV when importing or inserting a report:

 In the Select POV dialog, view the default POV specified for the report and click OK if you want to proceed importing the report without changing the POV; to edit the POV, proceed to the next step.



If you click **Cancel** in the **Select POV** dialog box, the import or insert process is cancelled and the report is not imported in to Smart View.

- 2. To edit the POV of the report, perform either of the following tasks as you require:
 - Select a value in each dimension drop-down list and click **OK**.
 - Select the drop-down menu for a POV dimension, click Select...; then, in the Member Selection dialog, choose a member for the POV, and then click OK.

Note:

Be sure to choose only one member in the **Member Selection** dialog.

You can also edit the POV after importing or inserting the report by following the procedure in Changing the POV in Reports.

Editing Prompts in Reports

If the report contains prompts, you can choose to take the default prompts when importing or inserting, or change the prompts.

To choose the default prompts, click **OK** in the **Select Prompt** dialog.

To edit the prompts, use the procedure in this topic.

Be sure to choose only one member in the Member Selection dialog.

The sheets in the resulting workbook will appear in alphabetical order, just as they were listed in the dialog. You can manually reorder the Excel worksheets, if required.

- 2. To edit the prompts after the report is imported or inserted:
 - a. In the Smart View ribbon, click Edit Prompts, Letter Prompts.
 - **b.** Repeat the actions noted in step 1 for each prompt that you want to edit, and then click **OK** to import the report.



Editing prompts reloads the formatted report.

Changing the POV in Reports

You can change the POV in a fully formatted report.

Note: Before you begin: You should have imported the report as described in Importing or Inserting, and Working with Fully Formatted Reports . Save the workbook if there are changes that you want to keep. The workbook will be closed and regenerated when you edit the POV.

To change the POV in an imported or inserted report.

1. Click Edit POV, ^L Edit POV, in the Smart View ribbon to launch the Select POV dialog.

Use the drop-down arrow in each field to locate drop-down lists indicating that the dimension POV can be changed.



Editing the POV reloads the formatted report.

- 2. If the drop-down list contains a fixed list of options, select an option from the list.
- 3. If the drop-down list contains the Select... option:
 - a. Click Select... to open the Member Selection dialog.



b. In the left pane of the Member Selection dialog, expand the members where

necessary, then select one member and click *b* to move it to the right pane, and then click **OK** to return to the **Select POV** dialog.

Note:

- Be sure to choose only one member in the **Member Selection** dialog.
- Only one member from the current dimension can be selected at a time. To select a member from a different dimension, you must exit **Member Selection** and then choose **Select...** from the drop-down list of a different dimension in the **Select POV** dialog.
- The designer of your report specifies during POV definition whether the drop-down list is static or contains a **Select** option indicating that member selection is allowed for the POV (described in Defining the Grid Point of View in the Reports Designing with Reports for Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud).
- **4.** After making your selections to the dimensions you require in the **Select POV** dialog, click **OK**, taking the newly selected members as your POV selections.

The formatted report is regenerated using the updated POV.

About Smart Forms

Create and manage Smart Forms in Oracle Smart View for Office.

Data source types: Planning, Planning Modules, Financial Consolidation and Close, Tax Reporting

Note:

Administrators: Smart Forms are supported for Native-mode applications only. In Native-mode applications, the **Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior** option is set to **Native**. For more information, see the topics on application settings in the *Administering* guide for your cloud business process.

Starting with an ad hoc analysis grid, you can customize the grid by adding business calculations to it, in the form of Excel functions and formulas. These calculations don't affect metadata in the rest of the source application. The business calculations that you create and save in the Smart Form can then be executed in both Smart View and the provider web interface; for example, in Planning. In Smart View, the formulas are evaluated by Excel; in the web interface, the formulas are evaluated by the provider.

For example, say you're analyzing Planning data in Smart View. You want to calculate the average profit margin for four products. You can add a row to the grid, with the grid label of "Average Profit Margin." In the new row, add an Excel function for average profit margin, selecting the profit margin data cells for each of the four products. If the profit margin for each product appears in column D of the grid, then your function may be =AVERAGE (D5:D8). In Smart Forms, the Excel formulas and functions you add are referred to as *business calculations*. After you add the business calculation, the average profit margin is instantly displayed in the new row, but the new row will be saved only in the Smart Form, not the rest of the application.



To make this ad hoc grid with its grid labels and calculations available as a form in Planning, you select the **Save As Smart Form** option in the Planning ribbon in Smart View. Thereafter, in Planning or Smart View, you can open and use this Smart Form as a form, including any rows, columns, and business calculations you added. In Smart View, you can perform ad hoc against this Smart Form. You can even create a sandbox from a Smart Form.

The sections that follow provide descriptions and guidelines for working with Smart Forms.

Smart Forms

Smart Forms are a type of data form, created in Smart View and based on ad hoc grids, that have functionality not supported by regular data forms. Smart Forms support grid labels, along with business calculations in the form of Excel formulas and functions. In Smart View, you can save these ad hoc grids to the applicable provider, such as Planning, as Smart Forms. The business calculations and grid labels, along with any empty rows and columns, are saved as a part the Smart Form definition. Additionally:

- Beside calculated cells and empty rows and columns functionality, Smart Forms support extended Excel formatting features including cell merging.
- Smart Forms can be used by end users in the same way as regular forms in the applicable web interface or in Smart View.
- Smart Form design, as with form design in the application web interface, is not available for end users. You must have the Admin or Interactive User role to save ad hoc grids as Smart Forms.

As with regular forms, the administrator must assign read/write access to Smart Forms for end users.

- In Smart View, you design Smart Forms in Excel worksheets, meaning you can clearly see the Smart Form layout, even an asymmetric layout. In the provider web interface, you would need to create separate rows and columns to achieve this.
- When connected using a shared connection, the following Smart View functions are supported in Smart Forms: HsGetValue, HsSetValue, and HsActive.

When connected using a private connection, Smart View functions are not supported.

Note: When you open an a Smart Form containing a Smart View function, click **Refresh** to update the function cells with their correct values.

- In the provider web interface, while in design mode:
 - You can assign business rules to Smart Forms.
 - You cannot modify the Smart Form grid layout, Excel formatting, or business calculations.
- Smart Form functionality is available for ad hoc grids created with Planning, Financial Consolidation and Close, and Tax Reporting. Check with your service administrator about the availability of Smart Forms in your service.

Business Calculations

In Smart Forms, the Excel functions and formulas that you add to an ad hoc grid are referred to as *business calculations*. When a grid is saved as a Smart Form, end users



can execute the business calculations from the Smart View client, without adding members to the application metadata.

Business calculations are executed in Smart View utilizing Excel's calculation engine, and do not require queries to the provider. These runtime business calculations are supported in both Smart View and the data provider. Also note the following:

- Many Excel functions are supported in Smart Forms. If an Excel function is not supported, a message will notify you when you attempt to save the Smart Form.
- You can apply Excel formatting to the business calculation cells so that the figures display according to your preferences; for example, with dollar signs or decimal points.
- In the grid label row or column, you cannot enter only constants for the business calculation cells; for example, 1000 or 0.10 are not supported. If you want to use a constant in a calculated cell, be sure to prefix it with an equal sign (=); for example, =1000 or =0.10.

Grid Labels

Grid labels are used to provide placeholders in a grid for entering business calculations for corresponding data cell intersections. They are required in order to save an ad hoc grid with business calculations. Additionally:

- You enter grid labels manually in Excel in place of actual members in an ad hoc grid.
- Grid label names cannot match any actual member name in the data source application, or any member alias from any alias table. In case of a match, the actual member name or alias name will take precedence over the grid label name.
- Grid labels cannot consist of only blank spaces.
- Grid labels do not have any dimension properties.
- Grid labels are not visible in the Planning Dimension Editor and they are not sent to Oracle Essbase.
- Data cells created by the intersection of actual members with grid labels are referred to as *calculated cells*.

Creating Smart Forms

In Oracle Smart View for Office, you create Smart Forms by saving ad hoc grids that contain grid labels and business calculations.

Smart Forms are saved to Planning, Planning Modules, Financial Consolidation and Close, or Tax Reporting accordingly.

To create a Smart Form:

1. Follow the steps in Starting Ad Hoc Analysis to create an ad hoc grid.

Alternatively, open a form and, from the provider ribbon, click **Analyze** to convert the form to an ad hoc grid.

2. Add grid labels and business calculations (in the form of Excel formulas and functions), to the ad hoc grid.

See Smart Form Example Scenario



 After you have added grid labels and business calculations to an ad hoc grid, in the provider ad hoc ribbon, click Save As Smart Form.

4. In the Save Grid As Smart Form dialog box:

- In Grid Name, provide a name for the Smart Form.
- In Grid Path, browse to the location where you want to store the Smart Form.

You can also type a new folder name. The folder appears under the application in the Smart View Panel.

 Optional: Select Submit Formatting to save any custom Excel formatting changes that have been applied to the grid.

See Saving Native Excel Formatting to EPM Cloud for additional notes and guidelines about saving formatting in ad hoc grids and forms.

In the Smart View Panel, Smart Forms are designated with the 💀 icon.

Smart Form Example Scenario

Smart Forms start with an ad hoc grid.

The ad hoc grid is created either by opening an Planning, Financial Consolidation and Close, or Tax Reporting form for ad hoc analysis or by starting ad hoc analysis at the cube level, as shown in Figure 1.

Add a row by typing "entity2" for the Entity dimension, and the label "accountX" for the Account dimension on row 13, cells A13 and B13, creating on the row two grid labels. Cells C13:F13 will be calculated cells. In order to be used as grid labels, the member names "entity2" and "accountX" should not exist in any dimension and there should not be any alias with the same name in any alias table. However, note that in the basic ad hoc above, entity2 is a member name, so entity2 will be treated as a member.

Upon refresh, entity2 in cell A13 will take on the properties of a member, accountX in cell B13 will take on the properties of a grid label, and cells C13 and D13 will take on the properties of business calculation cells.

Notes

- You must enter grid labels in order to save an ad hoc grid with business calculations in the form of Excel formulas and functions.
- If an empty space is entered instead of a grid label, the grid behavior is determined by generic ad hoc rules, such as replacing empty member cell with the same member from this dimension or displaying an error in case the grid becomes malformed.
- You can enter grid labels at any dimension location for an axis: innermost, outermost, or any location in the middle.
- You can enter business calculations only on rows and columns created by grid labels.
- You may type a member name in a grid label row, but it must be placed within the correct dimension. If the member name is entered out of place, and is already in use by the applicable data provider in another dimension, a message is returned upon Refresh, prompting you to change the label name.

Now you can save the ad hoc grid as a Smart Form, as described in Creating Smart Forms. By doing this, our grid labels and business calculations are also saved to the applicable data provider.

The provider will identify "accountX" as a grid label on refresh by displaying it as an ad hoc "comment" row or column (blank cells background). The "entity2" label will take on the same properties as the other entity2 members in the grid, as this member name already exists in the provider database.

Other Examples

Using the Vision sample application, here is an example of a Smart Form, saved from an ad hoc grid, then later opened as a form in Oracle Smart View for Office.

In Figure 5, the business calculation was constructed to show the average gross quarterly profit and average gross total profit for two years, FY13 and FY14. It also shows cell styles applied to the grid label and business calculations cells.

13 Task Manager

Cloud data source types: Planning, Planning Modules, Financial Consolidation and Close, Tax Reporting

Task Manager helps to define, execute, and report the interdependent activities of a business process. It provides centralized monitoring of all tasks and provides a visible, automated, and repeatable system of record for running a business process.

In Oracle Smart View for Office, you can connect to your worklist, work on Task Manager tasks assigned to you, and perform various actions within Excel using the Task Manager Extension.

The available actions, depending on your user role, are as follows:

- Assignee: Submit Task
- Approver: Approve and Reject Task
- Assignee or Approver: Claim and Release Task

Installing and Connecting to the Task Manager Extension

You must download and install Oracle Smart View for Office and the Smart View Extensions for Task Manager, Enterprise Journals, and Supplemental Data Manager.

To install the extensions from the web interface of your business process, see:

- Downloading and Installing Clients in Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud Getting Started with Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud for Administrators
- Downloading and Installing Clients in Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud Getting Started with Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud for Users

If an extension is available for you to install, you can install it from the Extensions tab of the Smart View Options dialog box. See Installing Extensions.

You must create a private connection to use with the Task Manager, Enterprise Journals, and Supplemental Data Manager extensions. For more information, see Using the Private Connection Wizard.

The private connection URL syntax for the three extensions are as follows:

After creating the connection, you will see the Task Manager connection listed in the drop-down menu in the **Private Connection** panel. You can use this connection to connect to your worklist. Once connected, the **Task Manager** ribbon appears and provides various actions to work on Task Manager tasks from Smart View.

Viewing Schedules and Tasks

Using Oracle Smart View for Office, you can view your Task Manager tasks and schedules and work on them directly in Smart View.

You can only view those tasks and schedules for which you are authorized. This is the **Display My Tasks** view of the worklist that you see the web application, so not all the tasks that you have visibility to see will be shown. The **All Schedules** sheet displays a list of the tasks that you are currently working on. You can double-click a task or row to open the task and perform actions on it. After a task has been submitted or approved, it is no longer displayed on the list.

Depending on your current role (for example, Assignee, Preparer, or Approver), the options such as **Approve** or **Reject** change to match the associated role. If you have different roles, then you may need to log in as the specific role to perform different operations.

- 1. From the Smart View ribbon, click Panel.
- 2. In the Smart View panel, select Private Connections.
- 3. In the **Private Connections** panel, select the Task Manager connection from the drop-down menu.
- 4. Select the node and click **Connect** in the Action Panel.
- In the Login window, enter your User Name and Password, and then click Sign In.
- 6. In the **Private Connections** panel, double-click a schedule from the list of schedules available for you.

Alternatively, you can also right-click the schedule and select **Open** or select the schedule and click **Open** in the Action Panel.

- 7. In the schedule sheet, view the list of tasks for which you are authorized. You can view the following details:
 - Name: Displays the name of the task.
 - Assignee: Displays the name of the person to whom the task is assigned.
 - **Status:** Displays the status of the task such as Pending, Success, With Assignee and so on.
 - Priority: Displays the priority of the task such as Low, Medium, or High
 - Needs Attention: Displays whether the task needs attention or not.
 - **Workflow:** Displays the next step or action needed on the task. For example, Submit Task or Release Task.
 - **Quick Actions:** Displays the following options to open the task quickly, either within the Excel sheet or in the web browser.
- 8. Open the task that you want to view or work on. You can either double-click the task or use the following options from the **Task Manager** ribbon or the **Quick Actions** column to open the task.



- **Open**: Use this option to open the task details in the **Task Manager Task** dialog. You can use this open as an alternative to double-clicking a task row in the schedule sheet to launch the **Task Manager Task** dialog.
- **Open in Browser**: Use this option to open the integrated tasks in the web application within a browser. If you have not logged in to the web application in the current session, you will be prompted to establish a connection and log in as a one-time requirement. Thereafter, you can open the integrated tasks directly in the browser, view the task details, and take necessary actions.
- **Open in Excel**: Use this option to open the embedded artifacts such as forms and dashboards in Excel. Forms open in a new worksheet within the same workbook and dashboards open in a new workbook.

The Task Manager Task dialog opens and displays the task details.

9. For integrated tasks, use the embedded task links available in the task details within the **Task Manager Task** dialog to navigate to the relevant tasks.

For example, if the task is about Reviewing Financial Reports and you click **Open in Browser**, you will see a **Go to View Financial Reports** link in the **Task Manager Task** dialog. This way, you can view the contextual information (that is, the financial reports in this example) directly within the Task Dialog, instead of separately navigating from the web application.

- **10**. Perform the appropriate actions for the selected task:
 - Submit Task
 - Approve or Release Task
 - Claim or Release Task

You can perform these actions either from the **Task Manager** ribbon or in the **Task Manager Task** dialog.

Claiming or Releasing Tasks

Tasks can be assigned to a team or group of users. If you are a member of the team or group, you must claim the task before performing it. If you have claimed a task, you can release the task back to the team or group allowing another member to take the task.

After a task is claimed, other members of the team can still claim the task but doing this causes the initial user's claim to terminate, thus revoking that user's ability to perform the role functions and granting the ability to the user with the latest claim. The ability to claim a task from another user is required to accommodate cases where a claim has occurred; however, the user with the claim can't complete the role functions (for example, because of an absence).

Before any member of the team has claimed the task, email notifications go to the whole team. Once a team member has claimed the task, emails go to the active user instead of all team members.

To claim or release a task:

- 1. Open the schedule and select the required task.
- 2. From the Task Manager ribbon, do the following:
 - For tasks that are assigned to your team or group, click **Claim** to claim and work on them.



 For the tasks that you have claimed, click **Release** to release it back to the team or group.

Alternatively, you can double-click the task row to open the **Task Manager Task Dialog** and claim or release tasks.

- 3. If the task is claimed or released successfully, an acknowledgement message appears. Click **OK**.
 - When a task is claimed, the Assignee changes from the team or group to the member who claimed the task.
 - When a task is released, the Assignee changes from the member who released to the team or group.

Approving or Rejecting Tasks

As an approver, you can either approve or reject a task.

To approve or reject a task:

- 1. Open the schedule and select the required task.
- 2. From the Task Manager ribbon, click Approve or Reject.

Alternatively, you can double-click the task row to open the **Task Manager Task Dialog** and click **Approve** or **Reject**.

 If the task is approved or rejected successfully, an acknowledgement message appears. Click OK.

Submitting Tasks

When you complete the actions required for the task, you submit the task to be moved through the workflow to the next assignee.

To submit a task:

- 1. Open the schedule and select the task that you need to submit.
- 2. From the Task Manager ribbon, click Submit Task.

Alternatively, you can double-click the task row to open the **Task Manager Task**. **Dialog** and click **Submit Task**.

Note:

If you submit a task that is incomplete (for example, if a question is left unanswered), a validation error appears when you submit the task. You can double-click the task row to open the task in the **Task Manager Task Dialog** and review it.

If the task is submitted successfully, an acknowledgement message appears. Click OK.

- In Financial Close Management, you can integrate task lists into Outlook as described in Integrating Task Lists with Microsoft Outlook.

Administrators manage and assign access permissions for task lists. For more information, see the administration documentation for your data source.

Configuring the Opening of Reports from Task List

Reports from a task list can be configured to open in the web application or in the Office application.

Note:

The task in this topic is for Service Administrators or users who are familiar with editing the properties.xml file located in the <Smart View Install>/cfg folder (for example, C:\Oracle\SmartView\cfg).

Reports in a task list can be opened either in the web application or in the Office application from where you are accessing the task list. By default, the reports are configured to open in the Office application itself. To default this behavior, the GET call is used and is set in the tasklistURLLaunch property present in the Smart View's properties.xml file.

If you want to continue with the default behavior, ensure that your property file has this configuration: <tasklistURLLaunch>GET</tasklistURLLaunch>.

However, if you want the opening of reports to be redirected to the web application, then you can hide this property, so that a POST call is performed instead of a GET call.

To change the default behavior and open reports in the web application:

- 1. In your Smart View installation, navigate to the SmartView\cfg folder.
- 2. Make a backup copy of the original properties.xml file.
- 3. Open properties.xml for editing.
- 4. Locate the following entry:

<tasklistURLLaunch>GET</tasklistURLLaunch>

5. Hide this property by adding a comment as follows. Commenting will help you enable this property easily, if required in future. For example:

```
<! --
<tasklistURLLaunch>GET</tasklistURLLaunch>
-->
```

- 6. Save the updated file.
- 7. Restart the Office application.

- A color-coded status bar for the task list

To review the status of your process, you can create a detailed report of one or more task lists in an application in PDF or Excel worksheet format.

To create a task list report:

- 1. From the Smart View Panel, open a task list.
- 2. Right-click a task and select Create Report.
- 3. In the Report Wizard, use the arrow keys to move all task lists to be included in the report from **Available Task Lists** to **Selected Task Lists**, and then click **Next**.
- 4. Use the arrow keys to move the users and groups whose status you want to view from **Available Users** to **Selected Users** and then click **Next**.

Note:

When selecting groups, be aware that all users in the group assigned to a task will be listed in the report. This will result in the same task being listed for each user in the group. For example, if a task is assigned to a group consisting of 10 members, then that task will be listed 10 times in the report, once for each group member.

5. Select options to create your report, and then click Finish.

Depending on your selections, the report is created in PDF or Excel.

Integrating Task Lists with Microsoft Outlook

You can import task lists into Microsoft Outlook and use Outlook functionality to manage your tasks.

Changes to the status of tasks are sent back to the data source, but you cannot delete tasks in Outlook.



To import task lists into Microsoft Outlook:

- 1. Ensure that Outlook displays a Oracle Smart View for Office menu. If it does not:
 - a. Close Outlook.
 - **b.** In Excel, from the Smart View ribbon, click **Options**, and then **Advanced** in the left panel.
 - c. Clear Disable Smart View add-in in Outlook.
 - d. Click OK.
- 2. Open Outlook.
- 3. Click Smart View and select Task List.
- 4. Select Shared Connections or Private Connections.
- 5. From the Task List, click **Select application**.
- 6. In Select Application, from the drop-down menus, select the server and application associated with the task lists to import.
- 7. Click OK.

All task lists associated with the selected application are displayed in Task List.

8. Double-click a task list to display its individual tasks in Outlook Task Lists.

From here, you can apply Outlook functionality to your tasks. See the Outlook product documentation for information on working with tasks in Outlook.

You can still use the POV, member selection, and other ad hoc operations in free-form grids.

The components of Oracle Smart View for Office grids are described in Table 1.



Grid Component	Description
Row Dimension	A dimension or member placed down one column across one or more rows in a worksheet
Column Dimension	A dimension or member placed on a row across one or more columns in a worksheet
Page Dimension	A dimension that applies to the entire page (Oracle Essbase only)
Comments	Text added by the user
Data Region	Areas of the grid that contain data for dimensions or members
Blank Region	Areas of the worksheet that contain no entries

Guidelines and Best Practices for Free-Form

Consider these guidelines and best practices when working in free-form mode.

- Grids do not need to start in cell A1.
- A grid must have at least one row dimension and one column dimension.
- Each row dimension can contain members of only one dimension. Each column dimension can contain members of only one dimension.
- Members of one dimension can be entered only in one of the following regions:
 - In the same row
 - In the same column
 - Anywhere in the page dimension region (Oracle Essbase and Standard Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior-mode Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud applications only)
- The page dimension region can contain members of different dimensions, but no two members in the page dimension region can belong to the same dimension



(Essbase and Standard Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior-mode EPM Cloud applications only only).

- Dimensions entered into the page dimension region override any corresponding default or existing dimensions in the page dimension region. For example, if the page dimension contains a Year dimension, and you enter Qtr1, then Qtr replaces Year in the page dimension (Essbase and Standard Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior-mode EPM Cloud applications only only).
- The replacement labels specified in the **Data Options** page of the **Options** dialog apply in free-form mode.
- Numerical entries are identified as data in the data region, and as comments outside the data region. If you want to use a number as a member name, then as a best practice, precede the member name with a single quotation mark; for example, '100.
- As a best practice, precede member names that contain spaces between words with a single quotation mark.
- When connected to a database that supports duplicate member names, select **Distinct** Member Name on the Member Options page of the Oracle Smart View for Office
 Options dialog box to display fully qualified member names in the worksheet. To enter
 duplicate members, use this syntax for qualified member names:

```
[Income].[Other]
[Expenses].[Other]
```

- Aliases from the current alias table are permitted in free-form grids, but aliases from other alias tables are treated as comments.
- Dynamic Time Series members (Oracle Essbase) must use one of the following formats:
 - Q-T-D(Jan)
 - Y-T-D(Mar)
 - M-T-D(Jun)
- In an ad hoc grid, if you insert a column and type a member name in the new column, and want to change the alias table for the sheet, then as a best practice, you must first refresh the sheet before changing the alias table.
- If a member name contains a comma (,), then as a best practice, enclose the entire name in quotation marks (" ").

Use this syntax:

```
"mbr name, mbr name"
```

For example:

```
"Tablets, Smartphones"
```

• When updating text datatype values in free-form mode, the **Submit Without Refresh** action should be used. This applies to Standard Ad Hoc mode only (the application setting, **Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior=Standard**.)

Simple Grids in Essbase

In Essbase on-premises (starting with the 11.1.2.1.102 release) or Essbase cloud and Oracle Smart View for Office, free-form behavior is such that the POV members are placed on the first row of an Excel sheet. Column and row dimension members are placed on the grid starting after the POV row rows. This means that all the POV members become part of the grid.

Figure 1 shows a valid simple grid in Essbase, where Year is the row dimension, and Measures is the column dimension, beginning in row 1.

Stacked Dimensions

The first row that contains multiple members of the same dimension is a column dimension. All dimensions placed above this row are candidates for page dimension if they comply with the rules for page dimension. However, dimensions above this column dimension that are in the same column ("stacked") *and* have no other members are column dimensions and not page dimensions. Such grids are not valid.

In Figure 1, Product is a column dimension that is stacked on Profit; Market is a page dimension, because it is not stacked on Profit. Scenario is a page dimension, even though it is stacked on Profit, because its row is above a page dimension.



Comments can be placed as follows:



- Between row dimensions
- Between column dimensions
- Between page dimensions
- Between dimensions and data cells
- Interleaved with members of page dimensions
- Interleaved with members of row, column and page dimensions

Further, comment rows and comment columns can be interleaved with row and column dimensions.

• To the left, right, top, bottom of the grid.

Comments cannot be placed in data cells or in cells that intersect row and column dimensions in the upper right corner.

When working with comments:

- In Financial Management, comments will shift with Zoom in and Zoom Out operations, depending on the row or column.
- In Oracle Hyperion Planning or EPM Cloud, comments are supported both inside and outside of the grid boundaries.

Note:

Comments are not saved to the provider server in the free-form worksheet. For example, if you use the Save Ad Hoc Grid command with a Planning free-form or ad hoc grid, the formulas are not saved. However, you can retain the comments in a worksheet by performing a Save in Excel and saving the workbook.

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Financial ManagementOracle Hyperion Planning

You can enter Excel formulas in cells that can contain comments.

Note:

Excel formulas are not saved to the provider server in the free-form worksheet. For example, if you use the Save Ad Hoc Grid command with a Planning free-form or ad hoc grid, the formulas are not saved. However, you can retain formulas in a worksheet by performing a Save in Excel and saving the workbook.

Figure 1 shows a grid from an Essbase data source with Excel formulas in cells C8 and F8.

Duplicate Aliases in Free-Form Mode

Review the guidelines and examples in this topic when working with duplicate aliases in free-form mode.

Data source types: Planning

Planning supports duplicate aliases for members from different dimensions and for members within dimensions.

To use duplicate aliases, you must have, at a minimum, Oracle Smart View for Office 11.1.2.5.600, and you must be connected to Planning version 16.06 or later.

The guidelines are:

- Duplicate aliases are supported across dimensions and within dimensions.
- Aliases can have the same name as a member.
- Member names are still required to be unique so that they can be used in rules and form design to avoid name collisions.

When typing a duplicate alias name in free-form mode, and then refreshing, a message appears asking you to resolve the duplicate. You can do this either by using the Member Selector to select the correct alias name or by hand-typing the qualified name in this format:

```
[parent member name].[alias]
```

or

[parent alias].[alias]

Only duplicate alias names are supported, not duplicate member names; therefore, using the parent member name as a qualifier should be sufficient in many cases.

However, if [parent_alias] is also a duplicate, then the qualified name should be extended up to the first unique ancestor, in this format:

[grand parent member name].[parent alias].[alias]

or

[grand parent alias].[parent alias].[alias]

For example, suppose a database has the following Market and Geography dimension hierarchies, with duplicate alias names at the Region, State, and City level. In this scenario, East, New York (state), and New York (city) are duplicate alias names, as follows:

Market Geography East East New York New York New York New York



You want to enter the city, New York, from the Market dimension into a free-form grid. To do this, you could select the city, New York, from the Market dimension in the Member Selector. Or, you could type the qualified name as follows:

[Market].[East].[New York].[New York]

Attribute Dimensions in Free-Form Grids

Figure 1 shows an example of both page region and attribute usage. In this example, Pkg Type (an attribute dimension attached to the base member Product) and Budget are page dimensions. By drilling down on Pkg Type you can do attribute based analysis on measures as it relates to specific Product attributes. This can be further used to create a cross-tab analysis of product SKUs by attribute.

Alternatively, to quickly add attribute dimensions onto a free-form grid, follow the instructions in Inserting Attribute Dimensions on the Sheet. You can then use the member selection instructions in the Dimensions and Members to select and work with members from the attribute dimensions.

Submitting from Free-Form Grid with Scaling Options Enabled

Applies to: Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Planning, Planning Modules, Tax Reporting; Oracle Essbase

Starting in Smart View 23.200, when attempting a free-form submit with scaling options enabled, and using the **Submit** button in the Smart View ribbon or provider ad hoc ribbon, the following warning is shown:

You are in free-form mode. Perform a Refresh before Submit.

Click the **Details** button, and the following note is displayed:



Free-form submit is not allowed when scaling is enabled.

Using the **Submit Data Without Refresh** or **Submit Data Range** options on the **Submit** button in the provider ad hoc ribbon, the following warning is shown:

To submit scaled data, refresh the grid and submit. You are attempting free-form submit; data will not scale per scaling options and will be submitted as is. Do you want to continue?

If you decide to submit after viewing this message, then the data will be submitted as is.

Additionally, for any free-form submit, a status is shown in the Excel status bar until the submit processing is completed (this status remains depending on the processing time). The status lets you know that the values are being submitted as is, without considering the dirty status or scaling options set.

Note:

For EPM Cloud sources only:

- To take advantage of this feature, the **Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior** option in your application must be set to **Standard**.
- This feature applies to ad hoc grids in free-form mode and flex forms.

Creating Free-Form Reports

Follow the procedure in this topic to create a free-form report.

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase, Planning

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Financial Management, Oracle Hyperion Planning

To construct a free-form report:

- 1. Open a worksheet and connect to a data source.
- 2. In the worksheet, enter member names according to the rules specified in Guidelines and Best Practices for Free-Form.
- 3. Members may have duplicate names (for example, both East and West markets may contain a member named Portland Maine and Oregon). To enter a duplicate member name:
 - In Essbase, use Member Selection to select members.
 - In Financial Management, the Member Name Resolution window is displayed if the member you enter has a duplicate. From the drop-down list, select the dimension of the member you entered and click **OK**. Repeat as necessary.
- 4. Refresh the grid, or select Ad hoc analysis.
- 5. Perform further ad hoc operations and formatting as needed.



Retrieving Attribute Dimensions in Free-Form Mode

Follow the procedure in this topic to retrieve attribute dimensions in a free-form report..

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase

On-premises data source types: Essbase

In structured grid processing operations, attribute dimensions are not shown. In free-form, you can type an attribute dimension member in the grid and it will be processed and validated. Only the attribute dimension member that you added will be displayed and used during processing and validation; the remaining attribute dimension members will not be included. Structured grid operations that follow this free-form request will retain the attribute dimension member.

If the base dimension exists in the worksheet, you can also retrieve an attribute member by typing the name directly in the worksheet.

To retrieve an attribute dimension in free-form using Member Selection:

- 1. In a blank worksheet, select a cell.
- 2. From the data source ribbon, select Member Selection.
- 3. In the Dimension Name Resolution dialog box, select the attribute dimension.
- 4. To orient members vertically in the worksheet starting from the cell you selected in step 3, select the **Vertical Orientation** check box.

This check box is cleared by default; meaning that members will be oriented horizontally across the sheet from the cell you selected in step 3.

- 5. Click OK to launch the Member Selection dialog box.
- 6. Select the members to place on the worksheet.

Note:

You can also add attribute dimensions and members to the sheet.

Creating Asymmetric Reports

Follow the procedure in this topic to create asymmetric free-form report..

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase, Planning

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Planning

Reports can contain symmetric or asymmetric column groups. The symmetry the symmetry of column groups is determined automatically, based on the members you select.

Symmetric reports, as shown in Figure 1, are characterized by repeating, identical groups of members.

Asymmetric reports, as shown in Figure 2, are characterized by groups of nested members that differ by at least one member. There can be a difference in the number of members or in the names of members.

You can create asymmetric reports as follows:

- Enter member names in free-form mode.
- Zoom in with Within Selected Group selected on the Member Options page of the Options dialog box.
- Suppress rows that contain missing values, zero values, or underscore characters during data retrievals.

Note:

Retrieving data into an asymmetric report may take a long time on large reports.

Actions That May Cause Unexpected Behavior

Review this topic to learn about actions that may cause unexpected behavior in freeform reports.

Oracle Smart View for Office tries to preserve all comments, formulas, and customized report layouts. Some exceptions that may result in unexpected behavior are when the following actions are performed:

- Zoom in on a page dimension
- Pivot a dimension from the POV to a row or column
- Drag and drop a dimension from the POV to the worksheet
- Pivot a row dimension to a column dimension
- Switch the location of a row dimension to another row
- Switch the location of a column dimension to another column



- Change member aliases using the Change Alias Table command
- With Oracle Essbase data sources, cutting and pasting from Microsoft Word into an Excel worksheet may cause unexpected behavior because of hidden characters. If this happens, contact your administrator, who can identify the issue through logs.

Saving Office Documents to EPM Cloud

In Oracle Smart View for Office, you can save Microsoft Office documents to the Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud Library. Documents you save in the EPM Cloud Library can be made accessible to other users. You can also download saved files from the library.

Importing Metadata in Office Applications

Metadata consists of Oracle Smart View for Office artifacts such as the POV, alias tables, and connection information.

Viewing Sheet Information

In **Sheet Information**, you can view connection and other details for the current worksheet, delete Smart View metadata from a sheet or workbook, save the metadata to another sheet, and copy list items from the dialog to another sheet or document.

- Opening Forms and Ad Hoc Grids from Web Applications (Web Launch) From your web application, you can open forms and ad hoc grids in Oracle Smart View for Office. This action is also referred to as *web launch*.
- Opening Large Workbooks in Smart View Oracle Smart View for Office may stop responding when opening workbooks containing a large number of rows and columns, graphical objects, and Excel comments.
- Working Compatibly on Forms and Ad Hoc Grids Between Smart View and Smart View (Mac and Browser)
 You can work on the same forms and ad hoc grids in a compatible manner in both Smart View and Smart View (Mac and Browser).



- Entering Percentage Values in Forms and Ad Hoc Grids In forms and ad hoc grids, note the best practices outlined in this topic when entering values in cells defined as percentages.

Searching for Forms and Other Artifacts

You can search for forms and other artifacts present in your Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud business process starting Oracle Smart View for Office 23.100+.

Cloud data source types: EPM Cloud: Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Planning, Planning Modules, Tax Reporting

The ability to search helps you find and access forms and other artifacts you need faster. In addition to forms, you can also search for smart forms, flex forms, composite forms, ad hoc grids, reports, documents, task lists, and dashboards.

In the Smart View Home panel, you can search within the Library, Reports, Documents, and Task Lists folders.

Note:

- For searching documents, your service administrator must enable the Documents folder in Smart View. This is done by setting the value of <enableLibrary> property to 1 in the properties.xml file. You can then view the Documents folder in the Smart View Home panel and search its contents.
- Searching task lists requires the Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud update 23.08 or later.



The following are supported in search:

- Regular expressions
- Alphanumeric terms: For example, Plan2022, Q3-report, or expenses5Jul
- Case-insensitive search: For example, searching for "plan", "Plan", or "PLAN" fetches the same list of items which have this term in their names, irrespective of their case.

To search for forms and other artifacts:

- **1.** Connect to the data provider.
- 2. In the Smart View Panel, expand the tree view to view the list of items.
- 3. In the search box located above the tree view, type the term you want to search for and press **Enter**.

The list of matching items is filtered based on the searched term. The items are displayed with their respective icons in the search results for easy identification.

Note:

Though flex forms are searchable, they are displayed in the search results with the simple form icon and can only be opened as a simple form. You must navigate the tree in the Smart View Panel to locate and open a flex form as a flex form.

You can open an item directly from the search results. You can also right-click an item in the search results to view the context menu options specific to the selected item.

If there are no matching items for the searched term, the panel appears blank. You can clear the search box by clicking the Close icon.

Using the Document Contents pane

Document Contents is a task pane in the Smart View Panel that provides a view of—and allows you to perform actions on—the content existing in the current Office document.

The **Document Contents** pane displays Office objects in a tree format, allowing you to easily see and interact with the content in a workbook, presentation, or document, regardless of the provider or type of content and including content from extensions. Content is displayed based on the provider connection, or the document layout on sheets, slides, or pages.

Use the drop-down selection list to choose from content in your workbook. The drop-down list in Figure 1 shows a workbook with connections to on-premises Essbase and Planning using a shared connection. A third connection is shown to on-premises Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition using a private connection.

The drop-down list for the workbook in Figure 1 displays the content for the shared connection sheets, and options for viewing the content on the private Oracle BI EE connection sheet.







Figure 16-1 Document Contents Pane Showing the Drop-down List


Depending on the provider, you can perform a subset of tasks on selected objects from the **Document Contents** pane.

- For most providers, you can **Select**, **Refresh** or **Delete** content on a sheet, slide, or document.
- For most providers, you can insert reporting objects, and perform other tasks.
- For Oracle BI EE providers, you can perform additional tasks on individual views; for example, you can **Mask** a view, or review the properties of a view.

For example, in Figure 6, Sheet1 shows the Oracle Essbase ad hoc grid, ad hoc query and chart. You can also see the same artifacts on Sheet3 for Planning, but we're focusing on Sheet1. With the Sheet node selected for Sheet1, the **Refresh** and **Sheet Information** options appear at the bottom of the **Document Contents** pane.

Click **Sheet Information** to view the **Sheet Information** dialog box (Figure 5), where you can also choose to **Save** or **Delete** metadata for the sheet or workbook.

Select the object node in **Document Contents**, and the context changes showing the **Select**, **Insert New Report Object/Control**, **Refresh**, **Modify Connection**, and **Delete** options at the bottom of the pane (Figure 6).






Figure 16-6 An Essbase Ad Hoc Grid Selected in Document Contents

In general, content is grouped by Oracle Smart View for Office providers (Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Financial Management, Oracle Hyperion Planning, and Oracle Hyperion Reporting and Analysis). Content from Oracle BI EE is grouped separately. In workbooks containing multiple objects from different data sources, you can switch the view using the **Document Contents** drop-down menu shown in Figure 7.


Figure 16-7 Available Options in Document Contents Drop-Down Menu

For Smart View provider content, such as Planning or Essbase objects, you can click in the tree area of **Document Contents** and then hover over an object icon to view connection properties, such as Server, Application, Cube, URL, Provider, POV and Alias Table, as shown in Figure 9. Properties vary depending on the provider.

For Oracle BI EE content, select an Oracle BI EE object, and then use the **Properties** link at the bottom of **Document Contents** to launch the **View Properties** dialog, where you can view connection and other properties (see Figure 3).

For some providers, such as Essbase and Planning ad hoc, you can insert reporting objects such as a table native Office chart based on an ad hoc query or grid object. Select the grid or



query object in **Document Contents**, and then select **Inserting Reporting Object/ Control**. You are prompted to choose from Table or Chart:

Smart View
Insert new Reporting Object/Control To change the position of the Table, POV, or Slider control in Excel or Word, use Design Mode option from Document Contents drop-down menu.
Table Scrollable table control to display large amount of data. Supports dimension zoom in/out and pivot operation in conjunction with POV control.
Chart Native MS Office Chart object.
Cancel

Note:

When inserting 3-D charts for large datasets (for example, more than 3,000 cells) from the **Document Contents** pane, Microsoft Office consumes large amounts of memory and may fail.

To avoid this issue, Smart View renders the chart as 2-D.

For Smart Slices and Oracle Hyperion Financial Reporting, you can insert reporting objects such as function grids and slider controls. Refer to the following for more information on inserting these types of reporting objects from **Document Contents**:

Using Undo and Redo

When connected to a data source provider, the Undo option in the Smart View ribbon, undoes the last user action in a cell.

Undo, Olda, and **Redo**, Redo, behave differently depending on the data source to which you are connected.

Additionally:

 In ad hoc analysis with Oracle Hyperion Financial Management, Oracle Essbase or Narrative Reporting data sources, Undo undoes Zoom In, Zoom Out, Keep Only, Remove Only, or Refresh and restores the previous database view to the grid. Performing an Undo after modifying member data returns the sheet to its state before the last refresh, not to its state before the data modification.



- In forms, **Undo** undoes the last user action in a cell.
- In ad hoc grids for all providers, Excel formatting is not retained when performing an Undo.
- When you change the alias table, you will not be able to undo any previously performed actions. For example, you set the Number of Undo Actions option to 9. If you perform three ad hoc operations, such as Zoom In, Pivot, and then Keep Only, and then change the alias table, those three previously performed actions can no longer be undone. However, any supported actions you perform after changing the alias table are tracked and can be undone according to the setting in Number of Undo Actions. See Specifying the Number of Undo and Redo Actions for instructions on setting this option.

See also Undo Support By Provider.

Note:

You can only undo operations that are performed in Oracle Smart View for Office. You cannot undo operations that are performed on the provider server, such as calculation status.

Specifying the Number of Undo and Redo Actions

To specify the number of permitted undo and redo actions:

- 1. From the Smart View ribbon, select **Options**, then select **Advanced** in the left panel.
- 2. In **Number of Undo Actions**, specify the number of permissible **Undo** operations, 0 through 100.

This is also the number of **Redo** operations permitted.

3. Click **OK**. The setting takes effect after you refresh or perform a drill operation.

Copying and Pasting

You can copy and paste Oracle Smart View for Office ad hoc, data points, functions, and Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition content between Excel, Word and PowerPoint.

Copying, Pasting, and Refreshing Smart View Content

The following Oracle Smart View for Office content can be copied and pasted using the Copy and Paste buttons in the Smart View ribbon, and then refreshed using Smart View Refresh.

- Ad hoc—all applicable providers
- Data points—all applicable providers
- Functions—only HsGetValue (see also Copying and Pasting HsGetValue Functions)
- Oracle Analytics Cloud and Oracle BI EE content

Other content in Smart View will be pasted as static text, including content from Excel pivot tables, and forms such as Oracle Hyperion Financial Management forms and Planning forms.

Chart copy and paste is only supported for Oracle Analytics Cloud and Oracle BI EE charts. Charts based on other providers, such as Planning, do not always paste correctly. For example, if you insert a chart, then change the format (such as from bar chart to pie chart), and then copy and paste it, the chart will not paste correctly.

Copying Data Between Excel, Word, and PowerPoint

In Oracle Smart View for Office, you can copy data from Excel and paste it into Excel, Word, or PowerPoint. The data you copy and paste is dynamic between Office applications. You can copy and paste data from:

- Excel to Word and PowerPoint
- Excel to Excel (ad hoc only)
- Word to Word and PowerPoint
- PowerPoint to Word and PowerPoint

The data points retain their original Excel-based query information, enabling you to perform data analysis. Word and PowerPoint can contain data points from multiple data sources, such as Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Financial Management, and Oracle Hyperion Planning within one document.



Notes

- Dynamic data points are maintained only in Word and PowerPoint. If you copy and paste data points within Excel, the data points are not linked to the Excel grid.
- When copying and pasting from Word to PowerPoint, or vice versa, data is displayed in a straight line. The tabular format is preserved only when copying data from Excel into Word or PowerPoint.
- Numeric formatting in Excel is preserved when data is pasted into Word and PowerPoint. Apply numeric formatting in Excel before copying and pasting data.
- If the name of the connection to the data source contains a semicolon (;), you may not be able to paste function data points.
- Copying and pasting data points is limited to use with grids and functions. You can copy data points from forms or Excel pivot tables, but they will be pasted as static text.
- When you copy and paste a data cell within Excel, Smart View generates an HsGetValue function that appears in the Excel formula bar when the pasted cell is selected, Functions generated by Smart View contain the SVLink syntax; for example:

```
= HsGetValue("", "Measures#Measures", "Year#Year", "SVLink15131004130EOL",
"Row0", "Col0")
```

When copied and pasted, functions containing the SVLink syntax result in static text. These functions may, however, be used as a template for creating other HsGetValue functions, providing that you remove the SVLink syntax and replace it with the POV dimensions and members you require.

- On computers where Smart View is installed, an error occurs when updating links in PowerPoint that were copied from Excel to PowerPoint.
- Formatting is not retained when copying and pasting cells from Excel to Word.
- Number formatting is not retained when copying data points from Excel to Word or PowerPoint.
- When working with Financial Management ad hoc, and copying and pasting cells from Excel to Word, formatting is not retained even though the Use Excel Formatting option is selected.

To copy and paste data from Excel, Word, or PowerPoint to Excel, Word, or PowerPoint:

- 1. Select a data cell or range (may or may not include members).
- 2. From the Smart View ribbon, select **Copy**.
- 3. Open a Word or PowerPoint document, or another Excel worksheet or workbook.
- 4. If asked if you want to create a connection, click Yes.
- 5. From the Smart View ribbon, select **Paste**.
- 6. Refresh.



Note:

If you paste data into a Word document and save it in a different format such as .htm or .mht, you cannot refresh the data in these other formats.

7. Optional: To change the POV in Word or PowerPoint after you paste the data, click Manage POV and follow the procedure in Selecting Members for the Default or Background POV.

Retrieving Spreadsheets From Which Data Points Were Copied

To retrieve the Excel spreadsheets from which data points were copied:

- 1. In a Word or PowerPoint document into which Excel data points were pasted, select a data cell.
- 2. From the data source ribbon, select Visualize in Excel.
- 3. If asked to log on the data source, enter the user name and password.

Excel displays the spreadsheet associated with the data cells. You can perform ad hoc analysis on the data.

Viewing Cell POV and Server Information for Pasted Data Points

After copying and pasting data points from Microsoft Office applications, and then refreshing the Office document, you can select data points and view the POV and source server information.

This procedure applies to data points copied from Excel and pasted to Excel, Word, or PowerPoint, or copied and pasted between Word and PowerPoint.

To view the POV and source server information of a pasted data point:

1. In the target Office document, select the data point.

For example, if you copied and pasted an ad hoc grid from Excel to Word, then in Word, select a data point within the pasted and refreshed grid. In some cases, double-clicking the cell may be sufficient, but if there a decimal point in the cell, then you must select it manually.

The cell POV and server information is displayed as hover text, as shown in Figure 1.

2. To close the hover text, click anywhere on your screen.

Excel Copy and Paste Guidelines and Best Practices

Consider these guidelines and best practices while copuying and pasting in Excel.

 In data forms, after copying a cell, only a single paste is allowed. Pasting into subsequent cells is not supported.

Workaround: After pasting the cell once, you must copy the cell again in order to paste it into another cell.

In forms or ad hoc grids with hidden columns, you will have unexpected results if you attempt to copy two or more consecutive cells from a range containing visible and hidden cells and paste them into a range of visible and hidden cells. The copied cells will be pasted to both the visible and hidden cells. This is Excel behavior.

For example, suppose you are working with the following Year hierarchy on a form:

```
Year
Quarter
Month
```

On the form, the Quarter members are collapsed, so that the only visible members are Year and Month. Copy the values from one of the rows under the four Quarter cells, and paste them onto another row in another grid or form under Quarter, where the Quarter members are also collapsed.

You may expect to see each of the four Quarter values pasted into the same position as on the previous sheet, but this is not the case. The cells will paste into the first visible cell and into the next three hidden cells (for example, Jan, Feb, Mar).



Consider also that some Planning forms may also have spreading enabled, which can affect how the values are updated in the cells.

- Office Copy and Paste is not supported for copying and pasting Oracle Smart View for Office objects—such as charts, tables, or the POV—between slides, pages, and sheets. Smart View does not always handle the invalid copy gracefully. For example, in PowerPoint, if a Smart View chart is copied using Office Copy and Paste, an error message is displayed upon Refresh. Follow these best practices:
 - Do not use Office Copy and Paste to copy Smart View reporting objects. Instead, use Smart View Copy and Paste.
 - Do not copy and paste charts inserted using the Insert Chart command in PowerPoint. This applies to both Office Copy and Paste and Smart View Copy and Paste.
- Using the copy and paste functionality in Excel and then performing any Smart View operation (such as Refresh, Zoom In, or Submit) causes Smart View to stop responding in the following cases:
 - Copying a column to multiple columns if the column copied contains a Smart List or the database to which you're connected supports duplicate member names
 - Copying one Smart List cell to multiple cells

Copying one member cell to multiple cells if the database to which you're connected supports duplicate member names

To work around this, consider the following:

- While designing the ad hoc grid and copying and pasting columns or cells, ensure that the Member Name Display option is set to "Distinct Member Name Only." The Member Name Display option is in the Member Options tab of the Options dialog box.
- After pasting, save the workbook and reopen it, then perform the refresh.

Note:

In the topics on saving Office documents, EPM Cloud Platform refers to these business processes: Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Planning, Planning Modules, and Tax Reporting.

Users often share Office documents by emailing them or saving them to an internal location. Storing files in the Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud Library gives users another option for saving files in a central location and facilitates sharing documents with other users. Users can also download saved files from the library.

In order to view the folders and files under the **Documents** node in the Smart View Panel, users must be connected to their EPM Cloud business process. If users are not already connected, they will be prompted to sign in when using the **Save** or **Save As** options.

Guidelines about Documents, Folders, and Access

- EPM Cloud Platform:
 - You must have the Service Administrator or Power User role in order to save documents to EPM Cloud.
 - Any Word, Excel, or PowerPoint file that is up to 20 MB in size can be saved to the EPM Cloud Library. The files do not need to be related in any way to an EPM Cloud business process.



- EPM Cloud Service Administrators:
 - Smart View requires Write access to the <Smart View Install>/cfg folder, properties.xml file during runtime. An "Access Denied" error may occur when attempting to save if users do not have permission to write to this folder and file.
 - You can limit access to the Save and Save As options by configuring the enableLibrary property in the properties.xml file, described in Managing Access to Office Documents in EPM Cloud Library
 - Using an EPM Automate command or REST API, you can enable virus scan on Office documents saved to the EPM Cloud Library from Smart View.
 Enabling virus scanning helps you enhance the security of your OCI (Gen 2) environment by ensuring that no one can upload infected files to the environment. See:

- Narrative Reporting:
 - If you have enabled the Narrative Reporting extension, you will see some folders under the Library node repeated under the Documents node in the Smart View Panel. This is a virtual view of the folders and does not affect the behavior of the Save or Save As options. You can access your saved content from either location in the tree.
 - When saving a doclet from a report package, the doclet will lose all metadata associated with Narrative Reporting and the report package; it becomes a regular Office document. Upon Save or Save As, the Office document is closed. You can reopen the saved document from the location where you saved it by selecting it from the tree in the Smart View Panel.
 - There is no size limit for saving Narrative Reporting reports to the EPM Cloud Library.

Creating Folders in the EPM Cloud Platform Library Using the Web Interface

You may organize documents by creating folders in the EPM Cloud Platform Library using the web interface for your business process, such as Planning or Financial Consolidation and Close.

Applies to: EPM Cloud Platform



The procedure in this topic describes creating folders in EPM Cloud Platform business processes. You cannot create folders from Oracle Smart View for Office while connected to an EPM Cloud Platform business process.

Note:

- EPM Cloud Platform: In order to view the folders files in Smart View, under the **Documents** node in the Smart View Panel, you must be connected to your supported business process and have the System Administrator or Power User role.
- Narrative Reporting: To create folders in Narrative Reporting web, see Creating Artifacts in the Library in Narrative Reporting Authoring and Approving Doclets. Or, you can create folders from Smart View, described in Creating Folders in the Narrative Reporting Library Using Smart View.

To create Library folders in the EPM Cloud Platform web interface:

- 1. Log on to an EPM Cloud Platform web business process; for example, Planning.
- 2. In the Home page, click Reports.
- 3. At the left, click **Documents**.
- 4. Select the folder under which to create a new folder, click the **Actions** drop-down menu for the selected folder, and then select **Create Folder**.
- 5. In the Create Folder dialog, enter a folder name, and then click OK.

The folder you just created is displayed under the parent folder you previously selected.

For example, if you selected the **Library** folder, then the new folder appears under **Library** in the web; and under the **Documents** node in Smart View.

You can now save files to this folder.

- 6. **Optional:** Repeat these steps to add new folders or subfolders.
- 7. To save files in the Library folder (**Documents** node in Smart View) and other the folders you've created, see Saving Office Documents to EPM Cloud Library Using Smart View.

Creating Folders in the Narrative Reporting Library Using Smart View

You may organize documents by creating folders in the Narrative Reporting library. You can create folders in the tree structure in the Smart View Panel under the **Documents** node.

Applies to: Narrative Reporting

The procedure in this topic describes creating folders in Oracle Smart View for Office while connected to Narrative Reporting. To create folders in EPM Cloud Platform business processes, see Creating Folders in the EPM Cloud Platform Library Using the Web Interface. To create folders in Narrative Reporting web, see Creating Artifacts in the Library in Narrative Reporting Authoring and Approving Doclets.

In order to create folders in Smart View, and to view the folders and files under the **Documents** node in the Smart View Panel, you must be connected to a Narrative Reporting business process.



To create Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud Library folders in Smart View:

1. Connect to Narrative Reporting.

See Connecting Using a Private Connection.

- 2. In the Narrative Reporting Home, select Library.
- 3. In the Smart View Panel, expand Narrative Reporting, then expand Library.
- 4. Locate the **Documents** node in the tree.
- Right-click the Documents node and select New Folder.
 Alternatively, select Documents, and then select New Folder in the Action Panel.
- 6. In the **Create New Folder** dialog, enter a folder name, and then click **OK**.

The folder you just created is displayed under the **Documents** node.

You can now save files to this folder.

7. **Optional:** Repeat these steps to add new folders or subfolders.

Note:

If you have enabled the Narrative Reporting extension, you will see some folders under the **Library** node repeated under the **Documents** node in the Smart View Panel. When creating folders and subfolders, be sure to select the **Documents** node or a folder under the **Documents** node to access the **New Folder** command.

8. To save files in My Library and the folders you've created, see Saving Office Documents to EPM Cloud Library Using Smart View.

Saving Office Documents to EPM Cloud Library Using Smart View

You can save documents to Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud in the **Documents** folder or subfolders that you have created.

In Oracle Smart View for Office, you may save Microsoft Office documents (Word, Excel, and PowerPoint files) that are up to 20 MB in size to the EPM Cloud Library. However, there is no size limit for saving Narrative Reporting reports to the EPM Cloud Library. Documents you save in the EPM Cloud Library are accessible to other users with the proper access rights. You can also download saved files from the library.

Before you begin, create any folders you may require. See Creating Folders in the EPM Cloud Platform Library Using the Web Interface or Creating Folders in the Narrative Reporting Library Using Smart View.

To save Office documents to EPM Cloud:

1. Open an Office application (Word, Excel, or PowerPoint), and connect to an EPM Cloud business process.

If you aren't already connected, you will be prompted to sign in when you use the **Save** or **Save As** options.



2. Perform this step before saving an Office document to EPM Cloud the first time: In the Smart View Panel, navigate to a cube and, from the Action Panel, select Connect.

Alternatively, right-click the cube in the Smart View Panel and select **Connect**.

Note:

This step only needs to be performed once for each business process to which you plan to save Office documents.

3. To save the currently-opened Office document to the same folder from which it was opened, click **Save** in the Smart View ribbon.

Use the **Save** command after downloading and modifying a file. Clicking **Save** saves the file back to the same location in the **Documents** node.

Note:

Consider the following best practices:

If you have just started a new Office document, you must first perform a Save in the Office application. For example, if you just started a new Word file, save the file using the Save command in Word so that the file is saved locally or in a network location.

Then, when you click **Save** in the Smart View ribbon, Smart View saves the document with the name with which you saved the file in Office.

- When connected to an EPM Cloud OCI (Gen 2) environment where virus scanning is enabled, if the file you are attempting to save contains a virus, the file will not be saved.
- **Narrative Reporting:** By default, the **Save** option saves the Office file to My Library, which is your personal folder. A message alerts you to a successful or failed save; click **OK** in this message.

Other users will not have access to your My Library folder or the saved file. You can download and work with files saved to My Library. After downloading and modifying a file, click **Save** to save the file back to the same location in My Library. Use the **Save As** option to save the file to a folder location accessible to others within the EPM Cloud Library.

- 4. To save the currently-opened Office file to the folder you choose in the EPM Cloud Library, click **Save As**, then specify the settings below, and then click **Upload**.
 - Cloud Connection Select the library provider connection from the drop-down list.
 - Library folder location Use the Browse button to navigate to the folder to save the file.
 - **Document name** Enter a name for the file; the name does not need to be the same as the actual file name.
 - **Description** Enter an optional description for the saved file.

You and other users can download and work with files saved to folders in the EPM Cloud Library. Consider the following best practices:



- After downloading and modifying a file, click **Save** to save the file back to the same location in the EPM Cloud Library.
- Use the Save As option to save a downloaded file to a different folder location accessible to others within the EPM Cloud Library.
- While saving documents using the **Save As** option, the file extension is automatically added based on the default file extension of your document. For example, if your local Excel sheet has the old extension format of .xls, the sheet will be saved to the EPM Cloud Library with the same extension.
- To convert a document from an old Microsoft Office format (.xls, .doc, .ppt) to a new format (.xlsx, .docx, .pptx), use the Save As command of the Office application to first save the file locally in the new format, and then upload it to the EPM Cloud Library using the **Save As** feature of Smart View.
- 5. Repeat the previous steps for any other Office documents that you want to save to the **Documents** folder to a folder you choose in the EPM Cloud Library.

Managing Access to Office Documents in EPM Cloud Library

Narrative Reporting users and EPM Cloud Platform users with the Service Administrator or Power User role can limit user access to Microsoft Office documents in the EPM Cloud Library from Oracle Smart View for Office.

Note:

- The task in this topic is for Service Administrators or users who are familiar with editing the properties.xml file located in the <Smart View Install>/cfg folder (for example, C:\Oracle\SmartView\cfg).
- In EPM Cloud Platform, this feature is limited to users with Service Administrators and Power User roles.
- In Narrative Reporting, there is no user limitation by role.

The ability to access and save Office documents to the EPM Cloud Library is enabled by default in Smart View.

You can remove this access by setting the enableLibrary property to 0 in the Smart View properties.xml file. This file is located in the <Smart View Install>/cfg folder (for example, C:\Oracle\SmartView\cfg).

 Table 1 summarizes the effect of enabling and disabling the enableLibrary property

 for users with and without the Service Administrator or Power User role.

This procedure shows you how to disable and re-enable the enableLibrary property in the properties.xml

To disable the enableLibrary property and limit access to saving and downloading Office documents in Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud:

1. Open the Smart View properties.xml file with a text editor.

The properties.xml file is located in the <Smart View Install>/cfg folder (for example, C:\Oracle\SmartView\cfg).

2. Locate the following entry:

```
<!-- Enable Library on client. -->
     <enableLibrary>1</enableLibrary>
```

3. Change the enableLibrary value to 0; for example:

```
<!-- Enable Library on client. -->
     <enableLibrary>0</enableLibrary>
```

- 4. Save the updated file.
- 5. Distribute the file according to your internal processes.

Once the properties.xml file is distributed to users, the ability to access or use the **Save** and **Save As** options and view the **Documents** folder in the library will depend on each user's Service Administrator or Power User status, described in Table 1.

6. **Optional:** Re-enable the enableLibrary property by repeating this procedure, setting the property to 1; for example:

```
<!-- Enable Library on client. -->
     <enableLibrary>1</enableLibrary>
```

Once the properties.xml file is distributed to users, Narrative Reporting users and EPM Cloud Platform users with the Service Administrator or Power User role can use the **Save**



and **Save As** options that will now appear in the **Library** group on the Smart View ribbon the next time they start Smart View.

Importing Metadata in Office Applications

Metadata consists of Oracle Smart View for Office artifacts such as the POV, alias tables, and connection information.

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Financial Management, Oracle Hyperion Planning, Reporting and Analysis

In a new Office document, you may want to make use of Smart View content in an existing document that contains not only the formatting and layout that you need, but data points as well. Instead of recreating the Smart View content from scratch, you can reuse the work that is already available.

When you use the Microsoft Office copy and paste commands to copy Smart View content within or between Office documents, the static data and formatting is copied; but the Smart View metadata is not copied. This may cause a "Member out of place " error after refreshing an ad hoc sheet which has copied data in it. To prevent this error, you need to use the **Import Metadata** command to ensure that any additional data is also carried over to the new sheet.

By using the **Import Metadata** command, after the data is copied, you can import the metadata from the original Office document into the new Office document.

You can use the Office copy and paste commands to copy content within individual Office applications as follows:

- *From* an Excel worksheet *to* another worksheet within the current Excel workbook or *to* a different workbook
- *From* a Word document *to* the same or different page within the current Word document or *to* a different Word document
- *From* a PowerPoint slide or presentation *to* a slide within the current PowerPoint presentation or a different presentation

Guidelines and Best Practices for Importing Metadata

Note the following guidelines and best practices when copying, pasting, and importing metadata:

- Excel:
 - You can import metadata in the following:
 - * Ad hoc mode, including Smart Slices
 - Forms



- * Functions
 - * Query-bound functions in sheets created by Smart View copy and paste
 - * Non-query-bound functions created by the Function Builder
- * Worksheets that contain reports imported from Reporting and Analysis providers
- You cannot import metadata in worksheets that contain Report Designer objects, but such workbooks can be replicated by cascading as described in Cascading Reports and Ad Hoc Grids.

Note:

This procedure should be performed only by advanced users.

- Word:
 - You can copy and paste graphs
 - You can copy and paste entire tables containing data points or copy and paste individual data points inline, within existing text
 - Metadata must be imported from the same object or shape that was copied.
 - Metadata is copied only for the copied objects or shapes, only rather than copying all the metadata present in the source Word document.
 - For the Import Metadata command to work, there must be at least one copied Smart View object in the destination document, whether it is the current Word document or a different one.
 - Copying the POV or slider within the same Word document will result in incorrect behavior in the document.

PowerPoint:

- You must select a single slide to begin the import process. Smart View displays an error message if you invoke the **Import Metadata** command when either no slide is selected or multiple slides are selected.
- You must first copy objects before selecting the Import Metadata command; otherwise, Smart View prompts you with a message.
- The slide from which the object is copied and the slide from which the metadata is to be imported must be the same.
- Metadata is copied only for the copied objects or shapes, only rather than copying all the metadata present in the source slide.
- You can duplicate a slide containing a POV or slider, but importing the metadata will result in an error.
- Copying a POV or slider within the same presentation will result in incorrect behavior in the presentation.



To import metadata to a copied worksheet:

- **1.** Back up your work.
- 2. From the Smart View ribbon, select **Options**, then **Advanced**, and ensure that **Improved Metadata Storage** is selected.
- 3. Use Excel to copy a worksheet.

This operation copies the visible contents of the source worksheet but not the metadata (connection information, POV selections, alias tables, and such items) to the destination worksheet.

- 4. With the destination worksheet active, from the Oracle Smart View for Office menu, select **More**, then **Import Metadata** to display a list of all open workbooks and their corresponding open worksheets.
- 5. From the list, select the worksheet that contains the metadata that you want to import to the destination worksheet.
- 6. Click OK. You will be asked to confirm your selection.
- 7. Refresh.
- 8. To refresh the Document Contents pane, click

Before you begin, be sure to review the content in Importing Metadata in Office Applications.

Note: This operation cannot be undone.

To import metadata into a Word document:



- **1.** Back up your work.
- 2. From the Smart View ribbon, select **Options**, then **Advanced**, and ensure that **Improved Metadata Storage** is selected.
- 3. Use the Copy and Paste commands in Word to copy a Oracle Smart View for Office object, such as a graph or table.

This operation copies the visible contents of the source object, but not the metadata—for example, connection information, POV selections, alias tables, and other such items—to the destination document.

- With the destination document active, from the Smart View ribbon, click Import Metadata, ⁴ Import Metadata.
- 5. In the **Select document** dialog box, select the slide or presentation that contains the metadata to import to the destination slide or presentation, and then click **Import**.

In the following example, import_metadata_word.docx is the document from which we want to import metadata.



When importing metadata in Word, the active, or target, document is shown in the tree in the **Select document** dialog box. This is because, the active document can also be the destination document in cases where metadata is being import within a Word document.

A confirmation message is displayed.






- 6. Click **Yes** in the confirmation dialog box.
- 7. Refresh.

When successful, you will see that the **Document Contents** pane is updated with metadata for the document. An example is shown in Figure 1.

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Financial Management, Oracle Hyperion Planning, Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition, Reporting and Analysis

Before you begin, be sure to review the content in Importing Metadata in Office Applications.



Note:

This operation cannot be undone.

To import metadata into a PowerPoint slide or presentation:

- 1. Back up your work.
- 2. From the Smart View ribbon, select **Options**, then **Advanced**, and ensure that **Improved Metadata Storage** is selected.
- **3.** Use the PowerPoint copy command to copy information in any of the ways supported by PowerPoint; for example:
 - Copy individual objects and paste to the destination slide. The destination slide could be a part of source presentation or different presentation.
 - Duplicate a slide.
 - Copy a complete slide and paste into the same presentation or a different one.
 - Drag any slide and drop to another presentation.
 - Copy and paste an entire presentation.

This operation copies the visible contents of the source slides but not the metadata—for example, connection information, POV selections, alias tables, and other such items—to the destination slide or presentation.

- With the destination slide or presentation active, from the Smart View ribbon, click Import Metadata, W Import Metadata.
- 5. In the **Select slide** dialog box, select the slide or presentation that contains the metadata that you want to import to the destination slide or presentation, and then click **Import**.

Note that importing metadata from a presentation may be a time consuming operation, particularly for presentations with large number of slides and Oracle Smart View for Office metadata.

In the following example, Slide21 from Department Reports.pptx is the slide from which we want to import metadata.

Note:

When importing metadata from a slide to the active slide, the active slide is not shown in the tree in the **Select slide** dialog box. This is because the active slide is the destination slide where metadata is to be imported and is, therefore, not available for selection. For the same reason, when importing metadata from a presentation to the active presentation, the **Import** button is disabled when the active presentation is selected in the **Select slide** dialog box.

- 7. Refresh.




Figure 16-12 Document Contents Pane After Importing Metadata

Viewing Sheet Information

In **Sheet Information**, you can view connection and other details for the current worksheet, delete Smart View metadata from a sheet or workbook, save the metadata to another sheet, and copy list items from the dialog to another sheet or document.

1. From the Smart View ribbon, click **Sheet Info**.

Depending on the Oracle Smart View for Office data on the sheet, **Sheet Information** displays details on the following properties:

- **Connected**—Connection status; Yes if connected, No if not connected.
- Sheet Type—Ad hoc, Multiple grid ad hoc, or Form.
- Server—The name of the server to which the sheet is connected.
- **Application**—The application to which the sheet is connected.
- **Cube**—The cube, model, or database to which the sheet is connected.
- **URL**—The URL string of the data source provider to which the sheet is connected.
- **Provider**—The data source type to which the sheet is connected; for example, Oracle Hyperion Planning, Oracle Hyperion Financial Management, or Analytic Services (Oracle Essbase).
- **Provider URL**—The URL string of the data source provider to which the sheet is connected; this property is applicable to Analytic Oracle Hyperion Provider Services 11.1.1.4.x and earlier releases.
- **Friendly Name**—For private connections only. The data source connection name specified by the user when creating or editing a private connection, or when adding a shared connection to private connections.
- Alias Table—The current alias table.
- Associated Ranges—For multiple grid sheets. The sheet name, application, database, and a unique identifier for each grid in the multiple grid sheet. Multiple grid worksheets apply to supported Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud



business processes and Essbase data sources only. To use **Sheet Information** with multiple grid worksheets, see <u>Sheet Information Guidelines</u>.

- **Description**—For private connections only. The optional connection description entered by the person creating or editing the private connection.
- **Form Name**—The name of the form to which the sheet is connected. This properties applies when connected to forms in Planning and Financial Management only.
- Last Retrieved—The date and time that the last refresh was performed on the sheet.
- 2. **Optional:** Select the following options as needed.
 - **Delete**—Provides these options for deleting Smart View information, referred to as "metadata":
 - Delete worksheet metadata
 - Delete workbook metadata
 - Delete all metadata (deletes workbook metadata and all worksheets)
 - Save—Saves the Sheet Information content to an Excel spreadsheet.
- 3. Optional: To copy a selected item in the list to the clipboard, press Ctrl+C.

To copy the entire **Sheet Information** list, ensure that no items are selected in **Sheet Information**, then press **Ctrl+C**. If you have already selected an item in the list, then close **Sheet Information**, reopen it, and press **Ctrl+C**.

- 4. Click OK.
- 5. To view sheet information support by provider, sheet type, and connection status, see Sheet Information Support By Provider.

Sheet Information Guidelines

- Friendly names are for private connections only. The friendly name is the data source connection name specified by the user when creating or editing a private connection, or when adding a shared connection to private connections.
- When using the **Sheet Info** command with multiple grid worksheets, consider the following best practices:
 - To display information on all grids on a multiple grid worksheet, click anywhere outside of the grid boundaries, or select only one cell within a grid.
 - To display information for only one of the grids on a multiple grid worksheet, select the entire grid, and do not select any cells outside of the grid boundaries.
- When connected to Planning, it is not necessary to use the **Set as Default Connection** option to associate the sheet with an active connective. The association is made automatically immediately after connecting.
- When you associate a connection to an ad hoc worksheet using Set Active Connection, members may disappear from the worksheet when you refresh. Instead of associating a connection, as a best practice, perform direct ad hoc analysis on the worksheet.



• The **Sheet Information** dialog box is not supported, or has very limited support, for the following providers: Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition, Oracle Hyperion Financial Reporting, and Oracle Hyperion Strategic Finance.

Opening Forms and Ad Hoc Grids from Web Applications (Web Launch)

From your web application, you can open forms and ad hoc grids in Oracle Smart View for Office. This action is also referred to as *web launch*.

Cloud data source types: Planning, Planning Modules, FreeForm, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, Tax Reporting

On-premises data source types: Oracle Hyperion Financial Management, Oracle Hyperion Planning



Note:

Before you begin, note the following best practices:

- Mozilla Firefox, Google Chrome, and Microsoft Edge require a browserspecific add-on for web launch. Follow the instructions on installing the add-on for these browsers in the *Oracle Smart View for Office Installation and Configuration Guide*, Installing Browser Add-ons.
- Configure the download handling option on your browser to either launch the Smart View download link file (SVLNK) directly in Excel; or to save the SVLNK file, which you then double-click from the download location to launch in Excel. See the Note below for guidelines on setting the download option or refer to your browser help.
- For the best experience, start Excel before completing the following procedure.

To use web launch to open a form or ad hoc grid in Smart View:

- 1. In a supported Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud or Oracle Enterprise Performance Management System web application, open a form or ad hoc grid.
- 2. From the form or ad hoc grid in the web application, perform an action:
 - EPM Cloud: Select Actions, then Open in Smart View
 - EPM System: Select Actions, then Smart View

You are prompted by your browser depending on the download handling options you have selected to either save the file or open it in Excel.

If Excel is already open, the form or ad hoc grid is launched on a new sheet in the existing opened workbook along with the proper ribbon. For example, if you chose to open a Planning form in Smart View, then the Planning ribbon is displayed. You will be prompted for login if not already signed in.

If not already open, Excel is launched, you are prompted for login, and the form or ad hoc grid appears in Smart View along with the proper ribbon.



Note:

Set your web browser's download option to determine how the SVLNK files required for web launch are handled. Following are general references for accessing and setting the download options for supported browsers:

- Mozilla Firefox: Go to Tools, then Settings. Under Files and Applications, in the Applications section, choose an option for the question, "What should Firefox do with other files?"
- **Google Chrome:** Click the ellipsis, i, at the top left of the browser window, select **Settings**, and then **Download**. Choose to enable or disable the **Ask** where to save each file before downloading option.
- Microsoft Edge: Click the ellipsis, •••, at the top left of the browser window, select Settings, and then Download. Choose to enable or disable the Ask me what to do with each download option.

Opening Large Workbooks in Smart View

Oracle Smart View for Office may stop responding when opening workbooks containing a large number of rows and columns, graphical objects, and Excel comments.

To alleviate this problem, enable the **Improve Metadata Storage** option by selecting **Options**, then **Advanced**, and then select the **Improved Metadata Storage** check box.

In addition, when working with larger workbooks, or performing an operation that results in a large data set, a "not enough resources" error may occur. To alleviate this problem, break up your workbook into smaller workbooks. Upgrading to Office 64-bit may resolve the issue.

Working Compatibly on Forms and Ad Hoc Grids Between Smart View and Smart View (Mac and Browser)

You can work on the same forms and ad hoc grids in a compatible manner in both Smart View and Smart View (Mac and Browser).

Cloud data source types: Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Planning, Planning Modules, Tax Reporting, Oracle Essbase

Starting in 23.100, compatibility of forms and regular ad hoc grids (Standard mode) is supported between Smart View for Office and Smart View for Office (Mac and Browser) 23.04+. Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud forms, EPM Cloud ad hoc grids, and Essbase ad hoc grids are made compatible such that you can easily work on them between Smart View for Office and Smart View for Office (Mac and Browser).

For example:

- 1. Open a form or a regular ad hoc grid in Smart View on your desktop version of Microsoft Excel, change the POV, refresh or submit, and close the sheet.
- 2. Now, open the same form or grid in Excel 365 on a Mac or on browser using Smart View (Mac and Browser) and click Refresh first before starting any operations.



- 3. Observe that your POV selections are retained in the sheet, and you can continue working on it.
- 4. Once you make any changes to the POV in Smart View (Mac and Browser), click Refresh to save the changes. You should see the changes when you open the form again in Smart View.

The compatibility between both Smart View products ensures that Smart View:

- Identifies the type of sheet, whether form or ad hoc
- Displays the same sheet information in both products
- Retains the same POV and pages selections
- Displays the same data that is saved, refreshed, or submitted
- Retain preferences set in Data Options and Member Options under Smart View Options

Note:

Composite forms, flex forms, and multiple-grid ad hoc worksheets are not yet compatible between the Smart View products.

Enabling Compatibility in Smart View for Office

While this compatibility is always enabled for Smart View for Office (Mac and Browser), service administrators need to enable it in Smart View for Office.

Compatibility in Smart View for Office can be enabled in the following ways:

From the Health Check dialog:

This is an easier way of enabling compatibility from the Smart View user interface. From the Smart View ribbon, click the arrow next to **Help**, and then select **Health Check**. In the **Health Check** dialog, the **Compatibility** setting is present under **Smart View Options** and is **Disabled** by default.

- To enable it, click in the Fix/Update/Help Link column, select Enable, and then click Update Settings.
- To disable it, click in the Fix/Update/Help Link column, select Disable, and then click Update Settings.

For more information on the Health Check settings, see Performing a Health Check On Your System.

From the properties.xml file:

Service administrators can enable compatibility by uncommenting or enabling the JSONMetadata365URL property present in the Smart View properties.xml file. This file is located in the <Smart View Install>/cfg folder (for example, C:\Oracle\SmartView\cfg). Also, the detected connection URL may need to be mapped to the actual connection URL in Smart View for Office by using the **Manage URL Mappings** option. For more information, see Managing Connection URL Mappings.



Best Practices on Working Compatibly between Smart View Products

Consider the following best practices on compatibility between Smart View products:

- Whenever you open a form or ad hoc grid from Smart View for Office in Smart View for Office (Mac and Browser) and vice versa, it is recommended that you always click Refresh first before starting any operations on the sheet.
- It is recommended not to keep open the same form or ad hoc grid in both Smart View for Office and Smart View for Office (Mac and Browser) at the same time, as it can cause conflict between cell styles.
- When you create workbooks containing forms or ad hoc grid in Smart View for Office and open them in Smart View for Office (Mac and Browser), you have to first open the Smart View Home Panel and either click **Refresh** or open another sheet in order to launch the relevant provider context ribbon such as the Planning ribbon.

Entering Percentage Values in Forms and Ad Hoc Grids

In forms and ad hoc grids, note the best practices outlined in this topic when entering values in cells defined as percentages.

When entering a percentage value directly into a cell, enter the percent sign along with the percentage value. For example, to express "twenty percent" numerically, in the form or grid cell, enter

20%

Be sure to include the % sign, as follows:

• When entering a percentage value into the formula bar, enter the decimal point and the value, without the percent sign. For example, to express "twenty percent" numerically, in the formula bar, enter

You can use the **Decimal Places** option in the **Options** dialog, **Formatting** tab, for a more granular display of percentages. For example, in the grid below, the values in row 3 show 1%, but in the formula bar, we see the actual value of cell B3 is 0.5%.

In the **Options** dialog, **Formatting** tab, change the **Decimal Places** option to 2, and refresh the grid. This has the effect of adding two decimal places to all values in the grid. This change may be helpful for viewing the fractional percentage values, but may not help with reading and interpreting the grid overall:

Follow these best practices when entering fractional percentages:

- To enter a half percent numerically, in the form or grid cell, enter .5%
- To enter a half percent numerically in the formula bar, enter .005

In general, Oracle Smart View for Office mimics standard Excel behaviors in handling percentages. Read more about Excel and percentages in the Microsoft documentation here.

Enabling Automatic Cell Width and Height Adjustment

You can enable the automatic adjustment of Excel column width and row height to accommodate the contents of member and data cells.

- 1. From the Smart View ribbon, select **Options**.
- 2. In Options, from the left panel, select Formatting.
- 3. Select the Adjust Column Width and Row Height check box.
- 4. Click OK.
- 5. From any ribbon, select **Refresh** to adjust columns in the current sheet.

If **Adjust Column Width and Row Height** is not selected, you can adjust the width of columns manually.

Working with Shared Workbooks

Oracle Smart View for Office does not support Excel shared workbooks.

When the Excel option for sharing workbooks is enabled, Smart View operations are not supported.

To clear the shared workbook option in Excel, go to the **Review** ribbon, then click the **Share Workbook** button, and then clear the **Allow changes by more than one user at the same time** check box.

Working with Protected Worksheets

Oracle Smart View for Office operations, such as refresh and ad hoc, are not supported on protected sheets.

For example, you cannot perform Zoom In or Keep Only on protected sheets.



Printing POV Members in the Header and Footer

You can print active POV members in the header or footer of an Excel document.

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase, Planning, Planning Modules, Narrative Reporting, Financial Consolidation and Close, Tax Reporting

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Planning,



To print the active POV members in the header or footer of an Excel document:

1. In Excel, use your preferred method to add a custom header or footer.

For example, go to the Page Layout ribbon, then select **Print Titles**, then the **Header/Footer** tab, and then click **Custom Header** or **Custom Footer**.

2. In the header or footer text box, add the following statement:

POV:{}

You may also include any other text that you may require in the header or footer.

When you print the Excel document, the POV members are printed in the header or footer as specified, along with any other text you may have added.

Note:

In some cases, after adding the POV: {} statement, the POV members do not display in Print Preview mode the first time you launch Print Preview. However, they will print. After printing the sheet, then return to Print Preview to view the POV members in Print Preview mode.

Enabling and Disabling Smart View

Oracle Smart View for Office is enabled by default after installation.

You can disable Smart View within Smart View for all Microsoft Office applications on your computer or for Outlook alone.

Smart View may also be enabled through Office applications.

You can intentionally disable Oracle Smart View for Office from the Smart View ribbon for all Microsoft Office applications on your computer or for Outlook alone.

To disable Smart View for all Microsoft Office applications (including Outlook):

- **1.** From the Smart View ribbon, select **Help**.
- 2. Select About.
- Clear Enable Add-in to disable Smart View the next time you open an Office application. The Smart View ribbon remains, containing only the About button.

To enable Smart View for all Microsoft Office applications (including Outlook):

- 1. Start Excel, Word, or PowerPoint.
- 2. From the Smart View ribbon, select About.
- 3. Select Enable Add-in to enable Smart View the next time you open an Office application.
- To disable Smart View for Outlook only:
- 1. From the Smart View ribbon in Excel, Word, or PowerPoint, or from the Smart View menu in Outlook, select **Options**, then **Advanced** in the left panel.
- 2. Under Display, select Disable Smart View add-in in Outlook.

Enabling and Disabling Smart View from Microsoft Office

You can enable or disable Oracle Smart View for Office from **Add-ins** in Excel Options. This method is useful in cases where Smart View is disabled unintentionally, through a Microsoft Smart View error.

To enable or disable Smart View for all Microsoft Office applications (including Outlook):

- 1. In Office, go to File, then Options, and then Add-ins:
- 2. From Manage, select COM Add-ins, and then Go.
- 3. In COM Add-ins, perform a task:
 - Select the check box to enable the **Oracle Smart View for Office** add-in, and click **OK**.
 - Clear the check box to disable the Oracle Smart View for Office add-in.
- 4. Click OK.

Creating Functions

You can create Oracle Smart View for Office functions manually or by using the Function Builder.

Note that not all functions are available to all providers. See Table 1 for a list of functions and the supported providers.

Creating Functions in the Function Builder

In the Function Builder, you select a function and specify the connection and members that you want the function to use. The Function Builder then creates the function using the proper syntax and enters it into the selected cell. You can edit these functions.

The selections available to you in a given Function Builder field are limited by your selections in other fields of the Function Builder. For example, only the connections supported by the selected function are displayed, and only the dimensions supported by the function you select are displayed.

A cell reference can be selected for each function argument. If you know argument input values, you can create functions in offline mode. Type-in functionality is available for each argument. For more information, see Function Descriptions.

Note:

You can use functions that were created in the Function Builder prior to Release 11.1.2.2.310. However, starting with Release 11.1.2.2.310, the Function Builder uses commas (,) to separate member list arguments rather than semicolons (;). Both characters are supported by the new Function Builder, but when you modify a function created in the previous version, you are prompted to convert to the new comma-separated format. If you choose not to convert, then none of your modifications to the function are applied.



To create functions using the Function Builder:

1. Connect to the appropriate data source.

Function Builder supports shared, private, and URL connections. As a best practice, ensure that you are connected at the cube level. If you are connected at the application level, you may get a "Cube Not Selected" message when you use Smart View functions such as HsGetValue or HsSetValue. However, for Oracle Hyperion Financial Management, you can continue to connect at application level to use Smart View functions.

Oracle Essbase: If you are using a private connection, and your function is going to use an alias table, you must verify that the correct alias table or the "Default" alias table is set for the connection. In the Smart View Panel, right-click the database name, and select **Set alias table**. Ensure that the correct alias table is selected, and then refresh the sheet.

- 2. In the sheet, select the cell in which you want to enter the function.
- 3. In the Smart View Panel, navigate to the database on which you want to base the function, right-click the database name, and then select **Build Function**.

Accessing the Function Builder in this way will prepopulate the **Connection** field of the **Function Arguments** dialog box with specific connection information, as described in step 4.

Alternatively, from the Smart View ribbon, select **Functions**, and then **Build Function**.

When you access the Function Builder in this way, the **Connection** field in the **Function Arguments** dialog box is blank. You may provide connection information, as described in step 4. Or, if there is an active connection on the sheet, select HSACTIVE from the drop-down list.

4. In Select Function, select a function from the list and click OK.

Not all functions are available to all providers. See Table 1 for a list of functions and the supported providers.

The **Function Arguments** dialog box is displayed with the **Connection** field automatically populated with connection information in one of the following formats.

For shared connections:

WSFN | ProviderType | Server | Application | Database

The WSFN parameter above signifies that this function is a workspace function and uses a shared connection. Workspace functions support Oracle Hyperion Enterprise Performance Management Workspace or Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud connections.

For private connections:

PrivateConnectionName

• For URL connections:

URLFN | URL | Server | Application | Database

All the information needed to make a connection is part of the token, as shown above. If the token contains any invalid information, then generally a #NoConnection error is shown, with the following exceptions for the Server token:

- For EPM Cloud business processes, such as Planning, the Server token can be blank (or invalid)
- The Essbase Server token can be blank only
- Financial Management requires the Server token parameter

To manually enter the connection info, use the syntax above.

- 5. In **Function Arguments**, for each argument in the selected function, do one of the following:
 - Click the right-most button,

For example, for HsGetValue, click to select members from **Member Selection**; for HsLabel and HsGetVariable, select from drop-down lists of labels or variables.

Essbase: Note that when variable names are duplicated, their fully qualified name is displayed in the drop-down list. This helps to identify variables defined at the global, application, and database levels.

- To type arguments manually, enter the argument in the text box. For example, to type a member, use the format: dimension#member; such as Year#Qtr1 or Year#Jan.
- To use cell references, follow the procedure in Using Cell References.

Figure 2 shows a completed **Function Arguments** dialog box for the HsGetValue function.

The first error is that the Dimension name is invalid or not matching the selected alias. The second error is that the member name is invalid or not matching the selected alias.

- 8. To execute the function, follow the procedure in Running Functions.

Using Cell References

You can enter references to single cells for connection, label, data/text, or variable arguments. You can also enter references to two contiguous or noncontiguous cells for dimension/member references. References cannot be made to cell ranges of more than two cells.

To use cell references:

- 1. Follow the steps in Creating Functions in the Function Builder to open the Function Arguments dialog box.
- 2. In the Function Arguments dialog box, for each argument in the selected function, click

the Cell Reference button,

Depending on the type of argument selected, a Cell Reference dialog box is displayed.

 If you select a connection, label, data/text, or variable argument, the Select Single Cell Reference dialog box is displayed.

• For the **Dimension and Member Name Cell Reference** dialog box, do one of the following:



- Click a single cell to reference; for example, a cell that contains both a dimension and a member name.
- Pressing the Ctrl key, select two contiguous or noncontiguous cells; for example, a dimension and a member cell.

You may press **Ctrl**, click in two cells from different areas of the worksheet or two adjacent cells. Each cell selection much be performed by a single click while the **Ctrl** key is still pressed.

In **Function Arguments**, the text field for the argument contains the referenced cell or cells in the format shown in Table 1.

Notes: Consider the following best practices while using cell references:

 For a single cell reference, if the member name that you selected in step 3 is displayed as dimension#member in the grid, then the argument selection is complete.
 For example, if the member is displayed in the grid as Year#Qtr 2 in cell A3, then ""&A3&"" is complete.

If only the member name is displayed in the grid, then you must manually enter the dimension name followed by # between the first two sets of double quotation marks. For example, if the member is displayed as Qtr2 in cell A3, then you must enter Year# between the quotation marks: "Year#"&A3&""



- If an argument text field contains text before you select a reference cell, the cell reference text is appended to this text. Therefore, delete any unwanted text in the field before selecting a cell for reference.
- If a date cell is directly referred as input, then convert the input to the proper text format using a Text function as follows; in this example, cell B3 contains a proper date:

=HsSetValue(TEXT(B3,"dd/mm/yyyy"),"ConnectionName", "dim#member"...)

- If you plan to use HsGetValue functions with cell references that point to a connection name, see Example with Cell Reference to Data Source Connection in HsGetValue.
- 5. Click **OK** to insert the function in the selected cell.
- 6. Refresh.

Creating Functions Manually

See Microsoft documentation and support site for information about character and other Excel function limitations.

To create a function manually:

- **1.** In Excel, click the cell in which you want to enter the function.
- 2. Enter an equals sign (=).
- 3. Enter the function name; for example, enter HsSetValue
- 4. Enter parameters for the function according to rules described in Syntax Guidelines, using the information specific to each function in Function Descriptions.
- 5. To refresh the worksheet, from the Oracle Smart View for Office menu, select **Refresh.**

Functions are validated only when you refresh them.

Example 17-1 Syntax Guidelines

See Function Descriptions for the syntax of individual functions.

• To work with a shared connection, you must add to the function the WSFN identifier, which specifies a workspace function, along with a connection string. The format is:

"WSFN | ProviderType | Server | Application | Database", "POV"

For example, in the HsGetValue function for a shared connection to an Oracle Essbase data source, the WSFN identifier and connection string is added to the function as follows:

=HsGetValue("WSFN|Essbase|myserver|Sample|Basic", "Market#South")

For *ProviderType*, use one of the following case-sensitive strings:

 Essbase (for Essbase on-premises only; Oracle Essbase cloud requires private connection syntax)



- HFM (for Oracle Hyperion Financial Management)
- HP (for Oracle Hyperion Planning, Planning, Planning Modules, Financial Consolidation and Close, Tax Reporting)

For Financial Management, the *Database* parameter can be omitted, or it can be the same as the *Application* parameter. For consistency, Oracle recommends entering the application name for the *Database* parameter.

• To work with a URL connection, you must add to the function the URLFN identifier, which specifies a URL function, along with a connection string. The format is:

URLFN | URL | Server | Application | Database

For example the syntax for the HsGetValue function using the URL for a connection to a Planning business process:

HsGetValue("URLFN|URL|Server|Application|Database", "POV")

All the information needed to make a connection is part of the token, as shown above. If the token contains any invalid information, then generally a #NoConnection error is shown, with the following exceptions for the Server token:

- For Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud business processes, such as Planning, the Server token can be blank (or invalid)
- The Essbase Server token can be blank only
- Financial Management requires the Server token parameter
- Private connection parameters can have these values:
 - **Empty**: the default connection
 - HsActive: the active associated connection
 - The user-defined name for a private connection

If you specify a private connection, it must precede the POV.

• The POV is composed of *dimension#member* pairs, for example:

Entity#Connecticut

• Parent-child relationships are designated by a period, (.); for example:

Entity#UnitedStates.Maine

• The connection and each POV *dimension#member* pair can be split into separate function parameters, each parameter enclosed in quotation marks, ("), and separated by a comma, (,); for example:

"My connection", "Entity#UnitedStates", "Account#Sales"

Alternatively, the connection can be separated from the POV by a comma, (,), with the entire POV enclosed in quotation marks, ("), and with each *dimension#member* pair separated by semicolon, (;); for example:

"My connection", "Entity#UnitedStates; Account#Sales"



• Do not mix a dimension name and its aliases in functions. However, for members, you can either use the member name or its alias from the selected alias table.

Running Functions

You can run most Oracle Smart View for Office functions automatically using **Refresh** commands. For HsGetValue, use the **Submit Data** command.

To run functions and retrieve values:

- **1.** Open the worksheet that contains the functions you want to run.
- 2. Do one of the following:
 - For HsSetValue, from the Smart View ribbon, select **Submit Data**.
 - For other functions, select one:
 - To run functions and update all worksheets in the workbook, from the Smart View ribbon, select **Refresh all Worksheets**.
 - To run functions and update only the active worksheet, select **Refresh**.

Note:

- When opening a workbook containing Smart View functions, users may be prompted to connect if they are not already connected. You may dismiss this dialog to see the old value for these functions from the last retrieval.
- EPM Cloud Classic Environments: When working with a sheet containing multiple functions to multiple standalone EPM Cloudbusiness processes and using the URL connection format, you will be prompted to log in to each business process as each function on the sheet is refreshed. For example, if a sheet contains functions for Planning, Financial Consolidation and Close, and Tax Reporting, where each connects to a different service URL, you will be prompted to log in to each business process as functions are being run.

EPM Cloud OCI (Gen 2) Environments: Because different EPM Cloud business processes share the same service URL, you will not be prompted to log in to each business process as functions are being run.

- When a worksheet that contains saved functions is opened on a different computer from the one on which it was created, the functions include the full path of the original computer. Smart View automatically updates these function paths when you open the worksheet if all three of the following conditions are met.
 - The worksheet is unprotected.
 - The Excel option Ask to update automatic links is cleared.
 - When you open a workbook, if prompted to update link automatically, select Continue or Cancel. Do not select Edit Links.

Otherwise, you must manually update functions using the Excel Links option.

- For the numeric zero setting to be immediately applied for functions when the workbook is opened, perform these steps:
 - 1. In the Smart View **Options** dialog, **Data Options** tab, set the **#NoData/ Missing Label** option to **#NumericZero**.
 - Important! Be sure to select the Save as Default Options setting on the OK button to save this selection as the default for the current workbook and any workbooks that you open later.

Fixing Links in Functions

You may need to fix broken links in Smart View functions.

In workbooks containing functions, such as HsGetValue and HsSetValue, broken links can occur when you uninstall Oracle Smart View for Office on one drive and install it on another drive, or send a Smart View workbook file to a user who has Smart View installed on a different drive.



Tip:

Smart View functions (such as HsGetValue and HsSetValue), make use of the HsTbar.xla file, located in the <SmartViewInstallLocation>/bin/ folder. Excel caches the path to this file with every workbook where functions are used.

If users plan to share workbooks, then as a best practice Oracle recommends that Smart View is installed in the same location on each users' machine so that users do not need to apply **Fix Links** to adjust the path of HsTbar.xla file in their workbooks.

To fix broken links in functions:

- **1**. From the Smart View ribbon, select the arrow next to **Functions**.
- 2. From the drop-down menu, select Fix Links.

Copying and Pasting HsGetValue Functions

You may copy cells and ranges of cells containing the HsGetValue function from one Office application and paste them into Excel, Word or PowerPoint.

Note these guidelines when copying and pasting functions:

- Only cells containing the HsGetValue function may be copied and pasted. You
 may not copy and paste cells containing other functions.
- The data point generated will use the connection-level alias.
- Any cell references in the function will be replaced with its evaluated values. For example, if a function contains "Year#""&A2&"" for the dim#member combination, and cell A2 contains "Qtr2", then the function generated will have "Year#Qtr2" as the extracted value.
- Any POV changes applied on the data point query from the POV Manager will be applied only to the dimensions not present in the data point.
- Function XML may be exported from legacy applications.
- The following copy/paste scenarios are supported:
 - Functions from a single connection with no cell references.
 - Functions from a single connection with cell references.
 - Functions from multiple connections
 - Visualize in Excel—a grid with single intersection will be generated using the function POV.
 - Functions with case insensitive connection names.
- The following copy/paste scenarios are not supported:
 - Functions from an ad hoc grid (these will be pasted as static values).
 - Nested formulas.
 - Formulas with arithmetic operations; for example, divide or multiply.



- Other Excel functions; for example, IF or SUM.
- Functions containing the SVLink syntax. These are functions generated by Oracle Smart View for Office as a result of a Smart View copy and paste. Copying and pasting these functions results in static text.

To copy and paste functions:

- 1. Select the cell or range of cells to copy and perform an action:
 - In Excel, click Copy



- In Word and PowerPoint, click
- 2. If not already open, launch the Office application to which you want to paste the copied function cells.
- 3. Perform an action:
 - In Excel, select the cell where the copied functions will be pasted and, in the Smart View ribbon, click Paste.
 - In Word or PowerPoint, place the cursor at the point in the page or slide where the

Oracle Smart View for Office provides these functions. Click a function name to access description, syntax, and examples.

HsGetValue: Retrieves data from the data source for selected dimension members of a Point of View.

HsSetValue: Sends a value to the data source for selected dimension members of a Point of View.

HsGetSheetInfo: Retrieves detailed information about the current worksheet.

HsCurrency: Retrieves the entity currency for the selected members.

HsDescription: Displays the description for the default Point of View member.

HsAlias: Displays the alias of the specified dimension member.

HsLabel: Displays the label for the default Point of View member.

HsGetText: Retrieves cell text from the data source.

HsSetText: Sends cell text to the data source.

HsGetVariable: Retrieves the value for a substitution variable.



HsGetSharedConnectionURL: Identifies the shared connection data source that is being used.

Description

HsGetValue retrieves data from the data source for selected dimension members of a Point of View (POV).

When HsGetValue retrieves no data, the value specified for the #NoData/Missing Label replacement option is used (see Table 1).

When users select Refresh or Refresh All, only HsGetValue is called. When users select Submit, HsSetValue is called first, and HsGetValue is then called only if HsSetValue returns successfully.

The HsGetValue function supports the use of one attribute dimension and member with Essbase data sources. In Oracle Smart View for Office 11.1.2.5.710+, HsGetValue extends attribute support to Planning, Planning Modules, Financial Consolidation and Close, Tax Reporting data sources (see Example with Attribute).

In Smart View 11.1.2.5.720+, HsGetValue can be used to return enumerated data types, such as Smart List, text, and dates (see Example with Smart List).

With Narrative Reporting 24.02+, server-initiated refresh is supported for HsGetValue() functions built with Excel cell references.

Syntax

Private connection:

HsGetValue("PrivateConnectionName","POV")

Shared connection:

HsGetValue("WSFN|ProviderType|Server|Application|Database","POV")

URL connection:

HsGetValue("URLFN|URL|Server|Application|Database", "POV")

Common Function Error Codes

These are some common error codes displayed in functions.

#NO CONNECTION - You are not connected or logged on to a data source.

#Cube Not Selected - You are not connected at cube level.



#INVALID - Invalid metadata. Invalid cells that contain a value display the value as zero.

#LOCKED - The cell is locked.

#NO ACCESS - You do not have access to this cell.

#NO DATA - The cell contains NoData. You can select to display zeros instead of NoData. Cells use the Replacement text that you specify in the Options dialog box.

#INVALID INPUT - The HsSetValue data value is not valid, for example, a text string.

#READ ONLY - This is for the HsSetValue function only when the cell is Read-only.

#NO ROLE ACCESS - You do not have the Oracle Hyperion Financial Management LoadExcelData security role.

#NEEDS REFRESH - Data needs to be refreshed.

#INVALID DIMENSION - An invalid dimension is specified in the function.

#INVALID MEMBER - An invalid dimension member name is specified in the function.

#NAME - Excel does not recognize text in a formula. When you forward a worksheet that contains functions to a user who does not have Oracle Smart View for Office, they can view the same data as the functions on the worksheet. When the user edits or refreshes the function, it changes to #Name.

Creating a Smart Query

Create a Smart Query by defining one or more sets of members from the dimensions in an application.

To each member set, you can define and apply composite filters to further refine the data to be returned by the Smart Query. Using these sets and their filters, you can create a highly



complex query by defining unions, complements, and intersections of data from the different sets.

Once a Smart Query is created, you can use it for ad hoc reporting and analysis. Use the ad hoc reports created from Smart Queries to submit data. Smart Queries can be saved, reused, and shared. Sets and filters can be saved individually for use in other Smart Queries.

You cannot submit data directly from a Smart Query.

Creating a Smart Query involves performing the following procedures:

- 1. Defining Sets
- 2. Defining Set Filters
- 3. Building the Smart Query
- 4. Completing the Smart Query

Defining Sets

To define a set:

- 1. From the Smart View ribbon, select **Panel** to open the Smart View Panel.
- 2. From the Smart View Panel, connect to an Oracle Essbase cube or application.
- 3. From the Action Panel, select **New Smart Query Sheet** to display the Smart Query Panel in place of the Smart View Panel.

You can select the arrow next to \square to return to the Smart View Panel.

Default dimensions for the connection are displayed in the Smart Query Panel and on the worksheet. The Smart Query ribbon is displayed.

- 4. **Optional:** Pivot dimensions by dragging them from one area of the Smart Query Panel to another.
- 5. Select the name of a dimension under **Row**, **Column**, or **Point of View** to display it under **Sets for...**, where you define the set.

If the dimension exists in Row, Column, or Point of View , you can also start typing the dimension name in order to select it.

6. In Sets for ..., click the arrow next to the dimension name and choose Select Base Members.

For POV dimensions, the members you specify in this step are available for selection from drop-down menus in the Point of View section. You can also enter these names directly.

- From the popup menu, select a member level to include in the set or select Other to open the Member Selector, where you can select specific members.
- 8. Click the arrow next to the dimension name and select Add Custom Members (not available to Point of View dimensions).
- 9. Select from among specified values for the set.



Note:

When working with very long member names in Essbase, the Smart Query attempts to verify that the name works with Essbase. During the verification process, a numeric (for example, (1), (2), etc.) is appended to the long member name, signifying the number of verification attempts, up to 10 attempts. With each verification attempt, the numeric is incremented by one. Once the 10 attempts are completed, Smart Query proceeds with the last attempt, (9), so you can expect to see (9) appended to the member name.

Optional: Select **Other** to define members with MDX expressions (see the Essbase documentation) in **Custom Member Expression**.

MDX queries must be at least three characters long to accommodate the simplest member expression; for example, two operands and an operator. The **OK** button here is enabled only after the expression entered is validated.

Queries are given default names, but if you choose to rename an MDX query, do not use the following characters:

- Brackets ([])
- Double quotation marks (" ") or their XML-encoded representation (""", """, """, """, """)
- Single quotation marks (') or their XML-encoded representation ("'","'","'","'","'")
- **10. Optional:** To allow duplicate members in the set, click the arrow next to the set name and select **Allow Duplicates in Set** (not available to Point of View dimensions).

This setting applies only to the set for which it is selected. When there are multiple sets in a Smart Query, members are displayed in the grid for all sets in which they are selected even if **Allow Duplicates in Set** is *not* selected. For example, if Jan, Feb, and Mar are selected as members for one set, and Level 0 members of Year are selected in another set in the same query, then Jan, Feb, and Mar will each appear twice in the grid because they are members of both sets.

- 11. Optional: To rename the set, click the arrow next to the set name and select Rename.
- 12. To save a set, click the arrow next to the set name, then select **Repository**, and then **Save Set**.
- 13. In Repository Item, enter a name and description for the member set and click OK.
- 14. Optional: To add additional member sets for this dimension, click the arrow next to a set name and select Add New Set and repeat the procedure.
- **15.** Select other dimensions from the Smart Query Panel and repeat the procedure as necessary to add members for other dimensions.

Defining Set Filters

To define filters for a set:

1. From Sets for..., click the arrow next to a set name and select Add Filter.

A new filter is displayed under Filters for Set...

- 2. Click the arrow next to the filter name and select one of the following to define the filter:
 - Select Top/Bottom
 - Select Based on Value
 - Select Based on Value Specified by Members
 - String Match (This option does not support qualified member names.)
- 3. Repeat this procedure as necessary to add more filters to the set.

When you have created the sets and filters that you want to compose the Smart Query, proceed to Building the Smart Query.

Building the Smart Query

To build a Smart Query, you apply composite filters to select unions, complements, and intersections of members from the different sets. Unions are selections of members that belong to either but not both of two sets. Intersections are selections of members that belong to all specified sets. Complements are selections of members of one specified set that are not members of another specified set.


You can use sets and composite filters in any combination to create highly complex Smart Queries.

Union of Sets

To select members that belong to either but not both sets, define two or more filters as described in Defining Set Filters from the dimension in **Sets for...**. For example, in Figure 1, the query will return only Product, Level 0 members that are *either* packaged in cans (Product = Can) *or* are caffeinated (Product = Caffeinated_True).



Figure 18-1 Union of Sets



Intersection of Sets

Intersections include only the members that are common to all specified sets.

To select members common to all specified sets:

- **1.** Define a filter for a set as described in Defining Set Filters.
- 2. Click the arrow next to the filter name and select Add Filter.
- 3. Additional Filters and a subset filter are displayed.
- 4. Define the second filter.

In Figure 2, the query will return only Product, Level 0 members that are caffeinated *and* packaged in a can.

- 3. Click the arrow next to Additional Filters. and select Exclude.

In Figure 3, the query will return only Product, Level 0 members that are caffeinated but are not packaged in a can.

To complete the Smart Query:

- 1. From the Smart Query ribbon, select options for the Smart Query as follows:
 - Indentation (see Member Options)
 - Show Distinct Member Names (see Member Options)
 - Suppress Rows with No Data (see Data Options)
- 2. Optional: Select Change Alias to select an alias table.

The full names of duplicate and shared members are shown regardless of the selected alias table (if any). All other member names are shown according to the selected alias table.

- 3. To save the entire Smart Query definition, from the Smart Query ribbon, select **Save**.
- 4. In **Repository**, enter a name and description for the Smart Query.
- 5. Click OK.

Smart Queries are also saved within the workbook, so when you save a workbook, Smart Queries within it are also saved.

6. **Optional:** To perform ad hoc analysis, from the Smart Query ribbon, select **Analyze**.



Opening a Smart Query

You can open a Smart Query from a new worksheet or from an existing Smart Query worksheet.

Opening from a New Worksheet

To open Smart Query from a new worksheet:

- 1. From the Smart View ribbon, select **Panel** to open the Smart View Panel.
- 2. From the Smart View Panel, click the arrow next to 1, and then select Smart Query.
- **3.** From the Smart Query Panel, select **Open Definition** to display the **Repository** list of available Smart Queries.
- 4. Select a Smart Query from the list.
- 5. Click OK.

Opening from an Existing Smart Query Worksheet

To open an existing Smart Query:

- 1. From the Smart Query ribbon, select **Open** to display the **Repository** list of available Smart Queries.
- 2. Select a Smart Query from the list.
- 3. Click OK.
- When asked if you want to discard the existing Smart Query on the worksheet, click Yes. The Smart Query is opened on the current worksheet.

Copying and Pasting

In Excel, you can copy an entire Smart Query definition from one worksheet to another, and sets and filters to other Smart Queries.

Copying Smart Query definitions can be used as a means of sharing queries between users.

Copying Smart Query Definitions in Excel

You can copy a Smart Query definition to a different worksheet in the current workbook or in another workbook. If the worksheet into which you want to paste the definition already contains a Smart Query definition, it will be replaced by the pasted definition.

To copy a Smart Query definition from one worksheet to another:

1. Open the Smart Query worksheet that you want to copy.



- 2. From the Smart Query ribbon, select **Copy**.
- 3. Open a new worksheet.
- 4. Do one of the following:
 - To copy the entire definition to a *blank* worksheet, from the Smart Query Panel, select **Paste**.
 - To replace a Smart Query definition, from the Smart Query ribbon of the worksheet to be replaced, select **Paste**.

Copying Smart Query Sets and Filters

To copy a set, under **Sets for...**, click the arrow next to a set name and select **Copy Set**. You can then copy the set within the current Smart Query or to a different Smart Query using **Paste Set** from the same menu.

To copy a filter, under **Filters for Set...**, click the arrow next to a filter name and select **Copy Filter**. You can then copy the set within the current Smart Query or to a different Smart Query using **Paste Filter** from the same menu.

Copying Smart Query Reports to Word and PowerPoint

You cannot copy a Smart Query definition from Excel to Word or PowerPoint directly, but you can copy a grid or partial grid defined by a Smart Query from Excel to Word or PowerPoint. To do so, from the Smart Query ribbon, select **Analyze**. Then copy data as described in Copying Data Between Excel, Word, and PowerPoint.

Sharing Smart Query Definitions

You can share Smart Query definitions with other users.

The Smart Query definition includes definitions for rows, columns, POV, dimension sets, filters, sorting, and custom members.

The methods for sharing a Smart Query are:

- Email Sharing
- Workbook Sharing

The following topics explain each method.

Email Sharing

To share a Smart Query definition with other users via email:

- 1. In Excel, open the Smart Query worksheet containing the definition that you want to copy.
- 2. From the Smart Query ribbon, select **Copy**.
- 3. Open a blank email message and press Ctrl-V.

When pasted into an email message, the query definition will resemble a long line of alphanumeric characters.

- 4. Send the email message to the users you are sharing with.
- 5. Recipients of the Smart Query definition then perform the following tasks:



- a. In the email, select the Smart Query definition string and copy it to the Windows clipboard (use **Ctl+C** or the **Copy** command).
- **b.** Open a blank worksheet in a new or existing workbook.
- c. Optional: Connect to the appropriate data source.

If you do not connect to a data source, you will prompted to do so when you paste the definition in the next step.

d. From the Smart View ribbon for the active worksheet, click

The Smart Query populates the worksheet.

Workbook Sharing

To share a Smart Query in a workbook:

- 1. Save the Excel workbook that contains the Smart Query to share.
- 2. Send the Excel workbook to the users you are sharing with or place the workbook file in a shared network location and notify those users.
- 3. Recipients of the workbook containing the Smart Query definition then perform the following tasks:
 - a. Open the workbook either directly from the email or from the shared network location.

The Smart Query populates the worksheet.

b. In the Smart View ribbon, click **Refresh** to be prompted for login credentials in the **Connect to Data Source** dialog box.

Executing a Smart Query

Execute saved Smart Queries in the Manage and Execute Queries dialog box.

To execute a Smart Query:

- **1.** In Excel, connect to an Oracle Essbase data source.
- 2. From the Essbase ribbon, select Manage and Execute Queries to display the Manage and Execute Queries dialog box.
- 3. Select a Smart Query from the list in the left frame and click **Execute**.

The dialog box closes automatically and the Smart Query results appear on the sheet.

Deleting a Smart Query

You can delete Smart Queries from the list in the Manage and Execute Queries dialog box.

To delete a Smart Query:

- **1**. In Excel, connect to an Oracle Essbase data source.
- 2. From the Essbase ribbon, select Manage and Execute Queries
- 3. From the list in the left frame of the **Manage and Execute Queries** dialog box, select a Smart Query to delete.
- 4. Click the **Delete Query** button 🖳



- 5. Click **Yes** at the prompt to confirm the delete request.
- 6. Click the X in the upper right corner or click **Cancel** to close the dialog.

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Financial Management

It can be composed of a single member, a combination of single members, filters, or combination of single members and filters in any order. These components serve as boundaries to the data that users can view and work with in the Smart Slice. Any operation that can be done in Oracle Smart View for Office can be done within the confines of a Smart Slice.

An organization can have as many different Smart Slices as it needs to accommodate the specific data requirements of its users. For example, Smart Slices can be created for different sales geographical regions, different product lines, different time frames, or a combination of any of these dimensions.

You can view and work with any data within the boundaries of a Smart Slice, but not with data outside its boundaries. For example, in a Smart Slice that limits sales data to the Western region, you could drill down to data for California or Los Angeles, but could not navigate across to New York.

Creating Reports with Smart Slices

Smart Slices are stored centrally and are available to users from the Smart View Panel.

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Financial Management

An entire report is associated with an Excel workbook, a Word document, or a PowerPoint presentation. One report is associated with an Excel worksheet, a Word page, or a PowerPoint slide. For PowerPoint presentations, Oracle recommends one report type per slide.



You can create reports from entire Smart Slices or from subsets of data in a Smart Slice. Reports can then be displayed on an Excel spreadsheet, Word document, or PowerPoint slide. You can display as many reports from as many data sources as space will permit on one sheet.

To create a report from a Smart Slice:

- 1. From the Smart View ribbon, select Panel.
- 2. From the Smart View Panel, select a Smart Slice.
- 3. In the Action Panel, do one of the following.
 - To work with the Smart Slice as is, click **Insert Smart Slice into report**. The Smart Slice is displayed in Document Contents in the lower portion of the Smart View Panel.
 - To create a subset of the Smart Slice for local storage, click Modify Smart Slice and insert into report and use the Smart Slice Designer as described in Creating Smart Slices.

Note:

If you use **Modify Smart Slice** to create a Smart Slice, you must select the newly-created Smart Slice from the Smart View Panel tree list before performing ad hoc analysis.

- 4. Click 🔶 to refresh the **Document Contents** tree.
- 5. Select the Smart Slice in **Document Contents**, right-click and select **Insert New Reporting Object/Control**.
- 6. From the **Insert New Reporting Object/Control** dialog box, select one of these report types to place on the grid:
 - Function Grid a dynamic grid format

Function grids can be used with Word, PowerPoint, and Excel. When you refresh a function grid, data cells are refreshed; members are not. To refresh both data and members, you must reinsert the function grid into the sheet. For this reason, function grids are most useful for reports in which members remain reasonably static. For reports whose members may change more often, tables and charts are better report types. Although you can have multiple reports on a worksheet, you can have only one function grid.

You can use Excel formulas, for example SUM, with function grids. To retain such formulas as part of the function grid, you must leave one empty row between the grid and the cell containing the formula and include the empty row in the range of cells selected for the formula definition. This permits retention of the formula when refreshing the data results in a different number of rows in the grid.

To format a function grid, use Excel formatting capabilities.

Office Table

Office tables can be used with Word and PowerPoint. Office tables display results in native Microsoft Office table format. When you refresh an Office table, both members and data are refreshed.



Office tables look and feel like part of the Word or PowerPoint document, but the members and data in the table cells are connected to the Oracle Smart View for Office provider. With Office tables, you can work with the Word or PowerPoint table formatting and styles that you are accustomed to. Insert a POV object into the report and you can change the POV of the Office table. Refresh the Office table after changing formatting or POV and the new POV is reflected in the results and custom formatting is retained.

You cannot zoom in or out in an Office table object, and you cannot perform other ad hoc operations or use free form.

Table

Tables can be used with PowerPoint and Excel. Table reports display results in a grid format that floats on the document and can be moved and re-sized. When you refresh a table, both members and data are refreshed. Tables are useful for displaying large grids in a smaller space; their scroll bars enable you to quickly access rows and columns.

You can zoom in and out in a table report, but you cannot perform other ad hoc operations or use free form.

Chart

Charts can be used with PowerPoint and Excel. In PowerPoint, contents of charts and tables are visible only in presentation mode. Chart reports display results in a chart format that floats on the document and can be moved and re-sized. When you refresh a chart, both members and data are refreshed.

7. Optional: To move or re-size a table or chart, in Document Contents, click the down

arrow next to , and from the menu, select **Toggle Design Mode**.

You can now move objects within the sheet, slide, or page.

- 8. To insert a report control, select the Smart Slice in **Document Contents**, right-click and select **Insert New Reporting Object/Control**.
- 9. From the **Insert New Reporting Object/Control** dialog box, select one of these report control types:
 - POV a report can contain only one POV
 - Slider a report can contain multiple sliders. See Sliders.

A report can contain a POV or sliders, but not both.

- 10. Refresh.
- **11. Optional:** To create a separate report for any or all of the members of one dimension in the report and cascade these reports separately across the worksheets of the workbook, see Cascading Reports and Ad Hoc Grids.

Note:

In reports that contain a chart and a table, cascading may cause the chart and table to overlap the next time you open the workbook.



Deleting Reports or Report Objects

To delete a report:

- 1. In Document Contents, click 🔶
- 2. Select the object to delete from the link in **Document Contents**; for example, select a function grid or POV.

Selecting a report also deletes all its report objects.

3. At the bottom of the Document Contents pane, select More, then select Delete.

Sliders

Figure 1 shows a slider. The slider displays a selected set of dimension members from a query; when you drag the slider marker to a member, its data is displayed in all reports associated with the query on the sheet. Sliders can contain dimensions from more than one query in the Report Designer if the dimensions have the same boundaries.

Creating a Slider from One Query

To create a slider:

- **1.** Ensure that one or more report type is inserted in the worksheet for the query for which you want to create the slider.
- 2. From the report designer, click Query View and select Query View.
- 3. In the Report Designer, select the query on which to base the slider.
- 4. Click Insert and select Slider to open Member Selection.
- Select a dimension, members, and filters for the slider and click OK. The slider is displayed on the sheet.
- 6. **Optional:** To move or re-size the slider, click and then move or re-size.



Creating a Slider from Joined Queries

You can create a slider that contains dimensions from multiple queries if, and only if, the dimensions from the different queries have the exact same boundaries.

To create a slider using a dimension from multiple queries:

- 1. Ensure that one or more report type is inserted in the worksheet for the query for which you want to create the slider.
- 2. Click Query View and select Dimension View. Notice that the Report Designer tree view is grouped by dimensions rather than by queries. Under each dimension are the queries that contain that dimension. If the dimensions do not contain the same boundaries, multiple sliders will be created to accommodate each of them. For example, if the Market dimension in one query contains a children filter and the Market dimension from another query contains a descendents filter, two Market sliders would be created.
- 3. In the Report Designer, select the dimension on which to base the query.
- 4. Click Insert and select Slider to open Member Selection.
- 5. Select dimension members, and filters for the slider and click **OK**.

The slider is displayed on the sheet.

6. **Optional:** To move or re-size the slider, click and then move or re-size.

Smart Slices, Ad Hoc Analysis, and Forms

You can perform ad hoc analysis on a Smart Slice in Excel.

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Financial Management

Select the Smart Slice in the Smart View Panel and click **Ad Hoc Analysis** in the Action Panel. Data and POV from the Smart Slice is entered into the worksheet, and you can perform ad hoc analysis.

Note:

For Essbase, multiple-grid worksheets are not supported for Smart Slices.

To use a form, select the Smart Slice in the Smart View Panel and click **Open Form** in the Action Panel. Only forms enabled by the administrator may be used for ad hoc analysis.

If you want to locate the Smart Slice source of the data in an ad hoc grid, click real and select **Locate Worksheet Connection**. The Smart Slice is highlighted in the Smart View Panel.



Creating Smart Slices

Administrators and database administrators can create, modify, and delete Smart Slices.

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Financial Management

In Essbase, if enabled by the administrator, all users can create, modify and delete Smart Slices.

Creating Smart Slices involves Setting Smart Slice Data Boundaries and Setting Smart Slice Preferences.

Setting Smart Slice Data Boundaries

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Financial Management

To create a Smart Slice:

- 1. From the Smart View ribbon, select **Panel**.
- 2. Open the Smart View Panel and connect to a data source.
- 3. Do one of the following:
 - From the Action Panel, click **Create New Smart Slice**, then select an alias table from the list of alias tables.
 - With an ad hoc grid open, from the data source ribbon, select **Smart Slice**.

The Smart Slice Designer and a **New Smart Slice – Design** worksheet are displayed. You design the Smart Slice from the Smart Slice Designer; results are displayed on the worksheet.

On the Smart Slice Designer are **Rows**, **Columns**, **POV**, and **Attributes** sections for row, column, POV, and attribute dimensions.

- 4. From the Smart Slice Designer, use any of the following operations to create boundaries for the Smart Slice.
 - To select members for row or column boundaries, drag members from the POV to Rows or Columns as needed on the Smart Slice Designer. To remove row or column members, drag them to the POV. Changes are reflected immediately on the grid.
 - To select members for dimensions under **Rows**, **Columns**, or **Attributes**, section, click the name of the dimension to open the Member Selection dialog box.
 - To select members for the **POV** on the Smart Slice Designer, click the arrow next to the dimension name and select the ellipsis to open the **Member Selection** dialog box.
- 5. Click **Options** and set preferences as described in Setting Smart Slice Preferences.



- 6. Click Done; Member Selection is displayed.
- 7. In **Member Selection**, select a dimension member to use as the default POV and click **OK**.
- 8. In the Smart View Panel, in Enter a new name, enter a name for the Smart Slice.
- 9. Click **OK**. The Smart Slice is displayed in the tree view of the Smart View Panel under its data source.

Setting Smart Slice Preferences

The preferences that you specify are stored as part of the Smart Slice definition, and they override the global preferences set in the Options dialog box.

To specify Smart Slice preferences:

- 1. From the Smart Slice Designer, click **Options**.
- 2. For each option, enter or select the preference from the drop-down menu.

Users can select the options that are enabled here. See Smart View Options for descriptions of the options.

Note:

Replacement labels for missing data and other preferences specified in the Smart Slice **Options** dialog box in this step are not applied to function grids based on the Smart Slice (as described in Creating Reports with Smart Slices). Instead, the options specified by Oracle Smart View for Office users in the **Options** dialog box are applied to function grids.

Note:

Smart View does not support number formatting of Function Grids imported from Smart Slices.

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Financial Management, Oracle Hyperion Planning

The Query Designer is an Oracle Smart View for Office tool from which you can design the layout of a report by selecting dimensions, members, and attributes for rows, columns, and the POV from one interface. You can use the Query Designer to create a query from a blank connected worksheet, which uses the default report as a starting point, or extract a query from a saved report. The Query Designer is available only for ad hoc worksheets.

Creating Queries

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase, Planning, Financial Consolidation and Close

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase, Oracle Hyperion Financial Management, Oracle Hyperion Planning

To create a query report:

1. Open a worksheet or an existing report in Excel and connect to a data source.



Note:

Workbooks can contain Query Designer worksheets from multiple data sources. However, only one data source can be associated with each worksheet.

2. From the data source ribbon, select Query, then Query Designer.

The Query Designer and a query worksheet named "*Sheetname* - Query" (for example, Sheet1 – Query) are displayed. You design your query on this worksheet.

The following operations are disabled on the query sheet, but are re-enabled after you run the report:

- Formulas
- Asymmetric reports
- Comments
- Blank rows or columns
- Changes to alias tables
- Ad hoc actions such as zoom in and out, keep and remove only, and doubleclick

The following operations are unavailable in both query sheet and report sheet:

- Filtering of column members
- Changing data sources

If you are working with a duplicate member database, qualified member names are displayed on the query sheet, but only the member names are displayed after you run the report.

- 3. Use any of the following operations to design your query:
 - To select members for the Rows and Columns dimensions displayed on the Query Designer, click the dimension name to open the Member Selection dialog box.
 - To select members for **POV** dimensions displayed on the Query Designer, click the arrow next to the dimension name and select the ellipsis to open the Member Selection dialog box.
 - To move a dimension from the **POV** to the grid, drag and drop it from the **POV** section to the **Columns** or **Rows** section in the Query Designer.
 - To remove a dimension from the grid, drag and drop the dimension from the Columns or Rows section to the POV section in the Query Designer.
 - To add or remove an attribute dimension, select a dimension from the Attributes drop-down menu and drag and drop to the Rows or Columns section of the Query Designer.
 - Enter members directly into the grid.



Note:

When working with databases that support duplicate member names, avoid using member names containing periods. Oracle Smart View for Office detects periods (.) as delimiters in Query Designer, resulting in an unknown member error. If the dimension or member names in your query contain a period, the member will be interpreted as two members, parent and child. For example, the member:

```
abcd.wxyz
```

would be interpreted as:

```
abcd
wxyz
```

 From the Query Designer, click Apply Query. The resulting report is displayed in a new report sheet called "Sheetname - Report" (for example, Sheet1 – Report). Operations temporarily disabled in step 2 are re-enabled.

The report sheet replaces the query sheet, but you can retrieve the query sheet by repeating step 2.

5. To save the report, save as an Excel .xls or .xlsx file.

Note: In Essbase, .xls or .xlsx files can be used as a data load data source.

Note:

The Query Designer is not designed to work with Smart Slices.

Editing Queries and Rerunning Reports

Rerunning queries regenerates the report; any changes to the original report, such as zooming, comments, and formulas are lost. Formatting is also lost.

You can refresh reports, but this only refreshes the data. It does not rerun the report.

To edit a query and rerun a report:

- 1. Open the Query Designer query sheet to edit. If the query sheet is hidden, from the data source ribbon, select **Query** and then **Query Designer**.
- 2. Edit the query.
- 3. Select Query then Run the Report.



The report is updated.

Filtering Data

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase

Filtering data limits the amount of data returned to a specified top or bottom criterion. Top or bottom ranking enables you to view, for example, the top 10 products in sales for a given region.

To filter data:

- 1. In the Query Designer report worksheet, select a dimension.
- 2. From the Essbase ribbon, select **Query** and then **Data Filter**.
- 3. From Data Filter, under Count, select Top or Bottom and specify a number.
- 4. Under Set, click
- 5. From Member Selection, select a row member for ranking, and click OK to return to Data Filter.
- 6. Under Value, click
- 7. From Member Selection, select a column member to run the ranking against, and click OK to return to the Data Filter dialog box.
- 8. Click OK.

An MDX query in the form TopCount({ [Qtr3] }, 10, [Measures].[Profit]), that represents your data filtering settings is inserted into the grid. The example returns the top 10 most profitable products in quarter 3.

9. Click Apply Query to display query results.

Analyzing Time-Related Data in Query Designer

Cloud data source types: Oracle Essbase

On-premises data source types: Oracle Essbase

Filtering data limits the amount of data returned to a specified top or bottom criterion. Top or bottom ranking enables you to view, for example, the top 10 products in sales for a given region.

Using Oracle Smart View for Office, you can analyze flash metrics such as sales of cost of goods sold against time-based metrics. This enables you to look for trends, find averages for different time periods, and so forth. To do this, you use linked attributes which enable periodicity of members. Periodicity is a shared pattern among time dimension members that make them meaningful for time-based analysis (January and April share periodicity as first months of quarters, for example). Day by month, day by week, and week by year are examples of linked attributes. You can also set ranges for linked attributes and apply filters.

To analyze time-related data in Query Designer:

1. Create a query.



- 2. From the Query Designer toolbar, select **Date-Time** dimension and drag it to the grid or within the toolbar.
- 3. Click **Date-Time** in the Query Designer toolbar to open **Member Selection**, where you can select members and apply Period, Range, and other filters.
- 4. Under **Attributes** on the Query Designer toolbar, select an attribute or linked attribute in the drop-down menu, then drag it to the grid or within the toolbar. Repeat as necessary for other attributes.
- 5. To select members and apply filters to an attribute, click the attribute name on the Query Designer toolbar to open **Member Selection**.
- 6. Click on the POV toolbar.

MDX users can bypass the Query Designer interface and create and manage MDX query commands using the **Manage and Execute Queries** dialog box.

In Manage and Execute Queries, you can perform the following tasks:

- Create a query
- Modify an existing query
- Save a query
- Modify a query's connection information
- Delete a query
- Execute a query

You can execute one MDX statement per query.

To execute multiple MDX queries at once, Essbase must create an MDX script, described in the *Oracle Essbase Technical Reference*. Oracle Smart View for Office users then run the script from the **Calculation Scripts** dialog, as described in Running Essbase Calculations.



Creating and Saving an MDX Query

You can create an MDX query in the Manage and Execute Queries dialog box.

See the Oracle Essbase documentation for information on MDX syntax.

To create an MDX query:

- 1. In Excel, connect to an Essbase data source.
- 2. From the Essbase ribbon, select Manage and Execute Queries to display the Manage and Execute Queries dialog box.

3. Perform an action:



- To execute a saved MDX query, select the query from the list in the left frame and click **Execute**.
- To execute an MDX query dynamically, click **Add Query**, type the MDX query in the text box at the right, and click **Execute**.

The query you enter dynamically will not be saved.

The dialog box closes automatically and the query results appear on the sheet.

Note:

When executing an MDX query with a calculated member (WITH MEMBER...) in Excel, the calculated values appear successfully, but, if the grid is refreshed, then the column is converted to a comment column and all calculated values are lost. This occurs whether you are using the **Execute MDX** command in the **Essbase** ribbon, or the VBA function, HypMDXExecute.

Modifying Query Connection Information

You can modify the connection information associated with a given query to connect it to a different application and database.

To modify query connection information:

- **1**. In Excel, connect to an Oracle Essbase data source.
- 2. From the Essbase ribbon, select Manage and Execute Queries
- 3. In the Manage and Execute Queries dialog box, click Modify Connection.
- 4. In the Edit Connection URL page, edit the URL as required, and then click Next.

Optionally, select the Set as default connection check box, and then click Next.

5. In the Edit Connection - Application/Cube page, and navigate the tree to the new application and cube, select it, and then click Finish.

Alternatively, select the **Advanced Setup** check box and manually enter the new connection information in the **Server**, **Application**, and **Cube/Database** text boxes, and then click **Finish**.

Changing the Query List Display

Use the **Change View** button to change how queries are listed in the in the left pane of the **Manage and Execute Queries** dialog box.

The query list display can be toggled from a flat alphabetical list of all queries associated with the connection, to a tree view where queries are listed by their associated applications and database.

To change the query list display:

- 1. In Excel, connect to an Oracle Essbase data source.
- 2. From the Essbase ribbon, select Manage and Execute Queries
- 3. In the Manage and Execute Queries dialog box, click the Change View button, 🔳



The default display is a flat alphabetical list. Clicking 🔲 changes the query list to a tree view, where queries are listed by their associated applications and databases, as shown in Changing the Query List Display

4. **Optional:** Click 🔲 again to toggle the view back to an alphabetical list.

Deleting MDX Queries

You can delete MDX queries from the list in the **Manage and Execute Queries** dialog box.

To delete an MDX query:

- 1. In Excel, connect to an Oracle Essbase data source.
- 2. From the Essbase ribbon, select Manage and Execute Queries
- 3. From the list in the left frame of the **Manage and Execute Queries** dialog box, select a query to delete.
- 4. Click the Delete Query button
- 5. Click Yes at the prompt to confirm the delete request.
- 6. Click the X in the upper right corner or click Cancel to close the dialog.

You can view the underlying formula in cells that contain a formula.

Such cells can be indicated on the grid by a cell style specified in the Oracle Smart View for Office **Options** dialog box, **Cell Styles** tab.

Data source types: Planning, Planning Modules, Financial Consolidation and Close, Tax Reporting

Note:

In the Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud web interface, the **Member Formulas** property must be enabled in the form before you can view formulas in Smart View. Users with the proper permissions should open the form for editing in the web, go to the **Layout** tab, then **Dimension Properties**, and then select **Member Formula**.



To view a member formula:

- 1. Open a form.
- 2. Select the member whose formula you want to view.
- 3. From the provider ribbon, select More, and then Member Formula.

Details of the formula are displayed.

Note:

When a formula is used to reference a member on another sheet, no data is returned. For example, if the period is in the column on another sheet, and all other sheets reference that cell, no data is refreshed on the other sheets. In order to display the data that references a member on another sheet, the Excel cell format for the member formula cell should be set to "General."

Working with Business Rules

In forms and ad hoc grids, you can use business rules to calculate data in the database.

Some business rules prompt you to enter information, called a *runtime prompt*. Others, called *template-based business rules*, prompt you to enter parameter information using a guided wizard.

Launching Business Rules in Excel

Data source types: Planning, Financial Consolidation and Close, Tax Reporting

To launch a business rule in Excel:

- **1.** Open an ad hoc grid or form (single or composite).
- 2. Save any unsaved data.

Unsaved data is lost when you launch a business rule.



- 3. From the provider ribbon, select **Calculate**, and then **Business Rules**.
- 4. **Optional:** Use the check boxes under **Plan Type** and **Rule Type** to filter rules by cube and rule type.

All cubes and rule type options are selected by default. To narrow the search, clear the check boxes for cubes and rule types that you do not need to see. The list is filtered according to your selections. For example, selecting only Plan1 and all Rule Types, we would see business rules of all types that apply to only the Plan1 cube.

5. **Optional:** Use the Search field, under **Plan Type** and **Rule Type**, to search for rules by name or by part of a name.

Type your search criteria in the Search field, and then press **Enter** or click the **Search** button, , at the right of the Search field.

For example, you may search for all rules and rule sets that contain the string

expense. After pressing **Enter** or clicking , the results list shows all business rules or rule sets that contain "Expense" anywhere within the name: beginning, middle, or end.

To clear the search and restore all business rules and rule sets, click **x**.

The Search field is available in Smart View 23.200+.

- 6. From **Business Rules**, under **Plan Type**, select the cube associated with the rule you want to use.
- 7. Select a rule from the rules listed for that cube, and then click **Launch**.



Note:

- For business rules that include runtime prompts, enter the information described in Entering Runtime Prompts.
- For template-based business rules, you define rule parameters using a guided wizard.
- **Planning only:** Starting in Planning 20.03, users can add dynamic members, also known as "members on-the-fly," from Oracle Smart View for Office. To add dynamic members, manually type the new member name in the **Runtime Prompts** text box, and then click **Launch**.

If the calculation is successful, the values in the database reflect the results of the calculation.

💡 Tip:

Administrators: During form design in Planning, rules with runtime prompts directly attached to a composite form with **Run on Save** enabled are not supported in Smart View. You should always attach rules to a simple form, enable **Run on Save**, then attach the business rules from the simple to the composite form. This way, all runtime prompt values are picked up correctly from the form context and the business rules launch successfully.

- 8. Click Close.
- 9. From the Smart View ribbon, select **Refresh**.

When launched, a business rule can prompt you to enter variable information, called a *runtime prompt*. The business rule designer sets up runtime prompts.

To enter a runtime prompt:

- 1. Launch a business rule having a runtime prompt.
- 2. Enter or select the input type specified by the runtime prompt, summarized in the following table:

Ensure that the runtime prompts are valid. You cannot launch a business rule until all runtime prompt values are valid.

Executing the Calculate Form and Calculate Currencies Business Rules

Data source types: Planning

The Calculate Form business rule is created for each form to calculate subtotals. The Calculate Currencies business rule is created for forms that include multiple currencies in a row, column, or page to enable the conversion of values among available currencies.



The order in which business rules are launched is important and may affect the data. If you plan to launch both Calculate Form and the Calculate Currencies business rules, always run the conversions before subtotaling the form.

To launch the Calculate Form and Calculate Currencies business rules in Excel:

1. Open a form.

Any data that is not saved on the spreadsheet is lost when you launch the business rule.

2. From the Planning ribbon, select Calculate, and then Rules on Form.

The business rules associated with the form are displayed in the Business Rules dialog box.

- 3. Complete one or both of the following actions:
 - To convert currencies, select Calculate Currencies
 - To calculate subtotals, select Calculate Form
- 4. Click Launch.

If the calculation is successful, the values in the database reflect the results of the calculation.

Forms with Groovy rules associated with them can be opened in Oracle Smart View for Office for further exploration. You can select any number of contiguous or non-contiguous cells on the form, right-click to access theSmart View context menu, and then select the Groovy rule to run on the selected cells.

Note:

- As a prerequisite, the form must have Groovy rules attached in order receive the information of cells selected in Smart View. To associate Groovy rules with a form, create the Groovy rule, and in the form definition, in the Business Rules tab, add a Groovy business rule to Selected Business Rules.
- This feature requires Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud 22.10
 or later.

When running Groovy business rules from the right-click context menu in a form, the selected cells are available in the Groovy rule using the isSelected() method on the grid cells. The information about the selected cells is included when the Groovy rule is invoked as part of the right-click menu. This enhancement also helps Groovy rule designers to access and use the information of selected cells in the Groovy logic.



Note: The ability to select cells and use their information for processing Groovy rules is available forms opened in Smart View. This ability is not available when Groovy business rules are launched and run from the Business Rules dialog opened from the Smart View ribbon. Any Groovy rule attached to the form can utilize information from the selected cells.

To run a Groovy rule in a Smart View form:

- **1.** Open a form with an associated Groovy rule.
- 2. Select the cells on which to run the Groovy rule.
- 3. Right-click the cells and, in the context menu, select **Smart View**, and then select the Groovy rule to run.

After the rule is processed successfully, note the updated values in the selected cells.

It can include text, values, and operators that define how data aggregates.

To add supporting details that calculates values in a form or ad hoc grid:

1. Open a form, and then select the cells.

You can select one cell or a range of contiguous cells in a row or column. The selection cannot include a combination of rows and columns. Select cells that are in the local currency so that you can write to them.

2. From the provider ribbon or provider ad hoc ribbon, select **Cell Actions** and then **Supporting Details**.

The Supporting Details dialog reflects your cell selection.

3. Enter a description over the initial "untitled" text.

The text and its associated operator must be unique among children of the same parent. By default, you can enter up to 1,500 characters.

4. Use the buttons to create or change the indented hierarchy to reflect the desired structure and calculations.

For example, click **Add Child** to add a line item directly below the selected item.

5. Set the mathematical relationships among the line items by selecting an operator for each of them.

Select from these operators:

Operator	Function
+	Add
-	Subtract
*	Multiple
/	Divide
~	Ignore

6. Enter data to set or calculate.

Enter numbers using the same scaling that was set up for the form.

7. Click Submit.

Values are dynamically calculated and aggregated before the data is submitted. Data on the form is also submitted.

Working with the Supporting Details Hierarchy

The supporting details hierarchy should reflect the type of information that supports the cell values and the mathematical operators that create the relationships.

To create or change the supporting details hierarchy:

- **1**. In a form, select the cells with supporting detail.
- 2. From the provider ribbon or provider ad hoc ribbon, select Supporting Details.
- 3. Create or change the rows in the hierarchy that provide the detail for the data values by putting the cursor on an item and clicking the options in this table:

Option	Result
Add Child	Adds an item one level below the selected cell. You can add an unlimited number of children, but consider its potential performance impact.
Add Sibling	Adds an item at the same level as the selected cell. You can add an unlimited number of siblings, but consider its potential performance impact.
Delete	Removes the selected item
Delete All	Simultaneously removes all supporting details
Promote	Moves the selected item to the next-higher level
Demote	Moves the selected item to the next-lower level
Move Up	Moves the selected item to before its sibling predecessor
Move Down	Moves the selected item to after its sibling successor
Duplicate Row	Adds a row below the selected item, duplicating its structure (text, operator, and values)
Fill	For rows, copies the data from the current cell to the cells to its right
Refresh	Gets the latest stored database values, restoring the previously saved values, and possibly overwriting changes you just made.

4. Click Submit.

The submit operation stores the detail text, values, and aggregate values.

In Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud applications, when you delete supporting details for a cell, you affect the associated value in the relational database. You specify how to handle the stored database value. You can set it to #Missing or leave it as it was before the supporting details was deleted. This feature is useful if you want to use supporting details as a scratch pad or calculator.

To synchronize supporting details with the database:

- 1. Open a form.
- 2. In the form, click the cell that has the supporting details you want to remove.
- 3. From the provider ribbon or provider Ad Hoc ribbon, select Supporting Details.
- 4. In the Supporting Details window, delete the information, and then click OK.
- 5. Select an option from the displayed message to specify how to handle the aggregate value of the deleted supporting detail stored in the cube:
 - To delete the value from the cube, click Yes, set the value(s) to #Missing.
 - To leave the data value in the cube as is, click No, leave the value(s) as is.

Spreading Data for Time Periods

Data source types: Planning, Planning Modules, Financial Consolidation and Close, Tax Reporting

In a form, the spreading rules for time periods are set in the application as part of the as part of the dimension property settings. When you work with a form in Excel, and depending on how the form was set up by the administrator, data values can be spread, or distributed, in several ways:

- Spread the value of a summary time period to its base time periods or to the first parent or first child of the parent time period
- Spread values among children and parents proportionally, based on existing distribution
- Spread values based on the weekly distribution of a quarter, which could be 4-4-5, 5-4-4, 4-5-4, or None (as set up by the budget administrator)
- Temporarily lock the values of certain cells while spreading data over time periods (see Spreading Data with Cell Locking)
- Spread values for different time periods using a different spreading rule for each separate time period on the same row or column dimension. For example, FY2013 can have formula fill, and FY2014 can have flow.

Notes

- You cannot spread data in a summary time period that includes members with mixed currency types.
- Excel formulas in child cells are ignored during spreading.

To spread data for time periods:

- 1. Open a form.
- 2. Select a cell and enter a new value.

The value is distributed according to the rules described in "Adjusting and Spreading Data" in the *Oracle Hyperion Planning User's Guide*

3. Click **Submit** to save the new values.

When spreading data over time periods, you can temporarily lock the values of one or more cells to preserve their values when other values are recalculated. You can spread data across time periods based on various calculations and visually review the changes before committing them to the database. For examples of spreading with cell locking, see the *Oracle Hyperion Planning User's Guide*.

To temporarily lock values:

- 1. Open a form.
- 2. In the form, select the cell or group of cells that you want to lock.
- 3. From the provider ribbon, select Lock.

A color change indicates that a cell is locked. You can now spread or manipulate data in the other cells however you want, without affecting the locked cells.

4. To unlock a cell, refresh the grid.

Data source types: Planning, Planning Modules, Financial Consolidation and Close, Tax Reporting

If your administrator has enabled Grid Spread, you can specify an amount or percentage to increase or decrease values across multiple dimensions on the grid, based on the existing values in the target cells. When calculating the spread data, read-only and locked cells and cells having supporting detail are ignored. Data integrity is ensured because values can be spread only to cells to which you have access.

To spread values using Grid Spread:

- 1. Put the cursor in the Subtotal or Total source cell whose value you want to spread to target cells.
- 2. From the provider ribbon or provider ad hoc ribbon, select **Adjust**, and then **Grid Spread**.
- 3. From the drop-down menu, select one of these options:
 - Value to increase or decrease values by a specified amount
 - **Percentage** to increase or decrease values by a percentage
- 4. Select **Increase By** or **Decrease By** and enter a value or percentage.



5. In **Spread Value**, enter the actual spread value that you want.

For example, if the **Current Value** is 100 and you want the spread value to be 125, enter 125 directly in **Spread Value** and do nothing with the **Increase By**/**Decrease By** options or text box in step 4.

Alternatively, you can enter 25 in **Increase By**, and 125 will be displayed in **Spread Value**.

Note:

Entering a value in **Spread Value** has no effect on the **Increase By**/ **Decrease By** text box. But when you enter a value in **Increase By**/ **Decrease By**, the spread value is reflected in the **Spread Value** text box.

- 6. Select a spreading pattern:
 - **Proportional Spread** to spread the value proportionally, based on the existing values in the target cells (the default)
 - Evenly Split to spread the value evenly among the target cells
 - **Fill** to replace the value in all target cells

Your administrator can add other spreading patterns.

- 7. Click **Spread**. The specified value or percentage is spread across the target cells, replacing former values with new ones.
- 8. To save the new values, click Save.

Spreading Values Using Mass Allocation

Data source types: Planning, Planning Modules, Financial Consolidation and Close, Tax Reporting

Using mass allocation, you can spread data to all descendents of a source cell and across all dimensions. Spreading by mass allocation spreads data to cells not displayed on the grid and does not require that you have access to the target cells.

Mass allocation is available only for forms, which must be enabled for mass allocation by the administrator. You must be provisioned with the Mass Allocate role to use mass allocation.

Note:

Mass allocation cannot be undone.

To spread values by mass allocation:



- 1. Put the cursor in the Total or Subtotal cell whose value you want to spread.
- 2. From the Planning ribbon, select Adjust, and then Mass Allocate.
- 3. Enter a new value in **Spread Value** to replace the current value, or from the drop-down menu, select one of the following options:
 - Value to increase or decrease values by a specified amount
 - Percentage to increase or decrease values by a percentage
- 4. Select Increase By or Decrease By and enter a value or percentage.
- 5. In Spread Value, enter the actual spread value that you want.

For example, if the **Current Value** is 100 and you want the spread value to be 125, enter 125 directly in **Spread Value** and do nothing with the **Increase By/Decrease By** options or text box in step 4.

Alternatively, you can enter 25 in **Increase By**, and 125 will be displayed in **Spread Value**.

Note:

Entering a value in **Spread Value** has no effect on the **Increase By/Decrease By** text box. But when you enter a value in **Increase By/Decrease By**, the spread value is reflected in the **Spread Value** text box.

- 6. Select the **Spread Type** for allocating the specified value or percentage across the target cells:
 - Proportional Spread to spread the value proportionally, based on the existing values in the target cells (the default)
 - Evenly Split to spread the value evenly among the target cells
 - Fill to replace the value in all target cells
 - Relational Spread to spread into the selected cells based on values that exist in a different source location. Selecting this option displays the currently selected members for each dimension in the Selected column.

Your administrator can add other spreading patterns.

7. Click **Spread**. The new values are automatically saved.

Performing Calculations Without Having to Submit Your Changes (Calc on the Fly)

You can perform quick calculations on the fly, without having to save or submit the changes to see the results.

Data source types: Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Planning, Planning Modules, Tax Reporting

You can perform calc on the fly using member formulas during ad hoc analysis and while working on Forms 2.0 in the web application of your business process as well as in Oracle Smart View for Office. You can enter values or change existing values in the data cells and see the cells with formulas refresh immediately with the calculated values, without actually saving or submitting the changes. You do not need to run any business rules or perform calculation functions to refresh the values in the grids.

With calc on the fly enabled, you can view calculations instantaneously, save calculation time, and make multiple changes to the form or grid, without reloading it every time. When you have completed all your changes and are satisfied with the calculations, you can then submit the changed values to the database. Or you can close without submitting your updated values.

Member formulas are based on Essbase calculation functions. In ad hoc grids, when you insert member formulas, they are fetched from the server, converted into Excelbased formulas, and inserted in the grid in Smart View. In Forms 2.0, the formulas are inserted automatically when the **Enable Calc on the Fly** option is enabled for the form. You can view the Essbase formulas and their Excel-converted format as tooltips in both ad hoc grids and Forms 2.0 by clicking the cells with formulas.

4. Enter a value or modify an existing value in the data cells that contribute to the formula.

Note:

Entering or modifying values manually in cells containing formula is not supported in Smart View. If you do so, the formula gets overwritten with your entered value and you may lose the formula. This is also why formula back spreading does not work in Smart View. As the formula gets deleted on typing in a cell containing formula, it does not update the values of the cells contributing to the formula.

5. Tab out of the modified cells to see the values in the cells with formula refresh immediately, without saving or submitting. The calculations also roll up to parent dimensions of members, if any, and their values are also updated.

The modified cells become dirty, that is they are indicated with a color change. You can click **Refresh** to return the dirty cells to their original values from the database.

- 6. Continue to perform calc on the fly and see the calculated values refresh in the cells instantaneously.
- 7. Once satisfied with the calculations, submit the data by clicking **Submit Data** in the provider ad hoc ribbon.

Alternatively, you can close the grid without submitting to discard your changes.

Performing Calc on the Fly - Example

Let's take an example to understand how to perform calc on the fly using member formulas on an ad hoc grid.

For this example, let's take a Planning form showing salary calculations for the three months of Q1 and perform ad hoc analysis. The Jan column has data values and you want to fill in the same for Feb and Mar to see the total salary calculations for Q1.

As soon as you tab out of these cells, the calculated value appears in the **Total Salary** cell for Feb. The calculations also roll up to the parent dimensions and you can see the updated totals in the **Q1** column.

Viewing Calc on the Fly Formulas

You can view the member formulas by clicking a data cell containing formulas.

The formula appears in a tooltip on hover. You can also view it in Excel's formula bar at the top of the sheet by clicking a data cell.

Viewing Formulas in Ad Hoc Grids

In ad hoc grids, you need to first insert the member formulas and then view them in the grid.

Before inserting the member formulas, the grid cells do not show any formulas in Excel's formula bar or in the tooltip.

Formula Details

The tooltip displays the formula in two formats:

• **Member formula format:** Displays the member names and mathematical operators involved in the formula. For example,

member (Total Salary): Salary + Overtime + Bonus



 Excel formula format: Displays the function name and Excel cell names involved in the formula. For example,

=EssSum(C4, C5, C6)

In ad hoc grids, the cells containing member formulas are highlighted with a green triangle indicator, but in Forms 2.0, there is no such indicator. In Excel's formula bar, you can click the formula and the cells involved in the formula are highlighted in the grid for easy identification.

Unsupported Functions and Formulas for Calc on the Fly

Certain functions and member formulas are not supported for performing calc on the fly.

The following are not supported for calc on the fly:

 Members having assignments to themselves or other members are not allowed in member formulas. Only single value formulas are allowed. Multi-statement formulas are not allowed. For example: Allowed:

if(sales > 100) 10;
units * 1.01;
else
```

```

Not Allowed:

sales = 100 + units *rates;
If (units > 10)

```

- Recursive formulas and circular references, where a formula refers to its own cell directly or indirectly, are not allowed.
- The following list of Essbase calculation functions are not supported for calc on the fly:
 - @TODATE
 - @ISRANGENONEMPTY
 - @MDANCESTVAL
 - @MDPARENTVAL
 - @RETURN
 - @SANCESTVAL
 - @SHARE"
 - @SPARENTVAL
 - @XREF
 - @XWRITE
- MDX formulas are not supported.
- Member formulas that use a Smart List expression are not supported.

Guidelines and Considerations

Consider the following guidelines while performing calc on the fly on ad hoc grids and Forms 2.0.

- On inserting member formulas, the cells containing the formulas appear read only and their cell styling color also changes accordingly. Further, if you click **Refresh**, the same cells turn dirty displaying the assigned cell style color. To get a clean refresh without cell style color changes, click **Options** on the Smart View ribbon and under the **Member Options** tab, clear the **Preserve Formulas and Comments in Ad Hoc Operations** check box.
- As a best practice, Oracle recommends that you insert member formula only once the ad hoc grid layout is set or finalized. If you perform other ad hoc operations such as Zoom In, Zoom Out, Keep Only, and Remove Only, the formula context becomes invalid and it is removed from the grid. If a formula is missing after performing ad hoc operations, you can manually enter the formula again where required.



- After inserting formulas, if you make any changes to the alias table by refreshing or by clicking Change Alias and changing the alias from Default to None, or vice versa, the formulas are no longer shown in the tooltip when you click cells with formula.
- Careful consideration should be given to combining the use of cell-level security and member formulas. If cell-level security is enabled, the inserted member formulas can give different results in the web application and in Oracle Smart View for Office. To perform calculations, access is required to all cells. So, the cells restricted by Deny Read rule when cell-level security is enabled may give inconsistent results. The #No Access label is shown for the restricted cells. If any formula contains reference to such access restricted cells, the results display either #Missing or an error.
- The operation of inserting member formulas cannot be undone using the Undo option on the Smart View ribbon. If you click Undo after inserting formulas, the #No Access label appears in cells containing member formulas and the formulas are no longer shown in the tooltip when you click such cells. Instead, to refresh the grid and remove the inserted member formulas, you can use the Refresh option on the Smart View ribbon instead. Also, clear the Preserve Formulas and Comments in Ad Hoc Operations check box to get a clean refresh. This check box is present in the Member Options tab under Options.
- If you remove member formulas from an ad hoc grid, you cannot reinsert them back using the **Redo** option on the Smart View ribbon. This is because member formulas are not preserved during the **Undo** or **Redo** operations. To insert member formulas, you can open the ad hoc grid again and click **Insert Member Formula**.
- When the Time Balance property is set to Flow with the Skip option set to Zeros or Missing and Zeroes, the results are not coming as expected. In a grid with January, February, and March columns, the first row has 0, 0, and 0 values, and the second row has 0, #Missing, and #Missing values respectively. In the fourth column of Q1, member formulas are inserted such that in the first row Skip is set to Zero and in the second row Skip is set to Missing and Zeroes. The expected result is #Missing for both rows, but the actual result appears as zero.
- Non-unique or duplicate aliases present in a grid and referenced in formulas can cause duplicate alias error while performing ad hoc in Smart Forms. This happens when you insert member formulas in an ad hoc grid which has duplicate aliases, save it as a Smart Form, and open the Smart Form again in ad hoc mode. On clicking **Refresh**, Smart View shows an error message "Found duplicate aliases or member name conflicting with alias under parent Account. One or more of these aliases or member names need to be modified to resolve the ambiguity".
- For data with #Missing and zero values, @MAX function calculation may give
 inconsistent results in web application and in Smart View. This is due to the difference in
 the way Oracle Essbase and Excel handle these values. In Essbase, a comparison
 between zero and #Missing might not always be the same, so using @MAXS function is
 recommended. For more information, see the Notes for @MAX function in *Calculation
 and Query Reference for Oracle Essbase*. @MAX behaves like @MAXS (SKIPNONE),
 so when only #Missing and negative values are present in data, #Missing value is
 considered to be greater than negative value. #Missing is considered as zero while
 comparing with non-blank values. Smart View uses the #Missing label to denote missing
 data values in the database, which is different from a zero data value. Excel treats a nonblank label as a string, and strings are treated differently from empty cells and zeros. Due
 to this difference between Excel and Essbase, the comparison of #Missing and zero data
 values remains indeterminate.
- When you sort a grid in ascending or descending order, the structure of the grid is changed. This makes the member formulas and functions present in the grid invalid.



Now, if you enter or modify values in the cells referenced in a formula or a function, the calculations are not refreshed immediately in the cells containing the formula or function. You need to save the grid to see the calculated or modified values.

- If the cells referenced in a formula contain text strings or dates, then the results obtained from calc on the fly calculations may be different from those calculated in Essbase. This difference happens because Planning stores a numeric index at the cell location for non-numeric data (like text, date, or Smart List) that Essbase uses for calculation, whereas calc on the fly uses the actual displayed value of text, date, or Smart List for calculation and treats non-numeric data as missing.
- Any non-numeric values like text, date, and Smart List options present in cells are treated as missing for the purpose of calculation in Excel. So, if such cells are referenced in functions and formulas, then the result is returned as #missing. This happens because while Essbase can interpret such cells and calculate results correctly, the same ability is not available for calc on the fly calculations.
- If a cell has a formula due to a member formula or outline math, the non-level 0 cell will be writable, because an entered value can be back spread to the writable source cells while performing calc on the fly calculations in the web application. Note that back spreading of formulas is not supported in Smart View.
- For member formulas to display for a cell for calc on the fly, the members contributing to the formula must exist within the grid. Otherwise, the formula does not display in the tooltip.
- If a formula's evaluation always results in a constant value (for example, multiplying by zero or #missing), then the formula is not generated.
- For Forms 2.0, calc on the fly is supported only for BSO and Hybrid BSO cubes. For Smart View, the application setting, **Forms Version**, must be set to Forms 2.0.
- Ensure that design-wise, forms using calc on the fly use only a reasonable and relevant number of members on the grid to ensure quick turnaround time from the ensuing calculations.

Accessing Ancestor Members in Ad Hoc Grids

In ad hoc grids and **Member Selection**, Smart View users can access ancestor members, including shared members, to which they otherwise would not have access, when the Service Administrator configures the application setting, **Default Ancestor Access**.

Data source types: Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Planning, Planning Modules, Tax Reporting

Starting in 24.03, Service Administrators use the **Default Ancestor Access** option to automate access assignment. Depending on the configuration, EPM Cloud users on the web and in Oracle Smart View for Office can zoom out to ancestors and see the hierarchy in a tree view, whereas previously, they wouldn't have had access to the members at the parent level.

Additionally, enabling **Default Ancestor Access** facilitates the sharing of Excel workbooks between users having different levels of access to members. When access is configured, and users click **Refresh** in Smart View, cells to which they have access will come back with actual data values (or #NoAccess) and the hierarchy structures are maintained.



The available Default Ancestor Access options are:

- None
- Read
- Write
- Display

The results of setting **Default Ancestor Access** to the above options are described in more detail in the sections that follow. In the ad hoc grid examples are from ad hoc on the web, but the principles demonstrated also apply to Smart View

Service Administrators: See Setting the Default Ancestor Access Option in the Application.

None

This is the default. Users see all their shared members as siblings in, for example, ad hoc grids or the **Member Selector**, rather than in hierarchies, when they do not have read or write access to those ancestors. There is no change from the previous behavior (24.02 and earlier).

Consider the following example, where we have States in the Entity dimension using mostly shared members, and a user with security defined.

The user has access to New Jersey, but does not have access to the parent of New Jersey and Florida so those members are listed at the top of the tree instead under their parent member. You can see the same situation for Arizona, California, and Nevada throughout.



Access to parent members is preventing users from viewing the entire tree structure and can make data entry difficult.

In the Member Selection dialog in Smart View, you see the same structure:

By setting the **Default Ancestor Access** option to **Read**, users can view the hierarchies to which they have access, including members and shared members, and view data on the grid, even in the cells of ancestors to which they would not otherwise have access. That is, if the user has access to a member, then all ancestors to which they do not have access will have **Read** access instead. The user is able to view data for cells to which they do not have access, but cannot enter data in those cells.

In the following example, with access set to **Read**, users can now see the entire tree and all the hierarchies: Entity, Alt Entity, and Alt Entity2, and so on. Before, with access set to **None**, only Alt Entity2 was viewable.


Figure 21-11 Web ad hoc grid showing the full hierarchy structure to which the user has access



The Member Selection dialog in Smart View also reflects the change. For example:







Write

With the **Default Ancestor Access** option set to **Write**, users can view the hierarchies to which they have access, including members, shared members, and data. Additionally, they can save data to the cells of ancestors to which they have access. That is, if the user has access to a member, then all ancestors to which they do not have access will have **Write** access instead.

When granted **Write** access, users would see the same hierarchy structures in both the web and Smart View, and in the **Member Selection** dialog, as shown in Figure 3 and Figure 4. Additionally, they can save data in cells to which they normally do not have access.

Display

When **Display** is selected in **Default Ancestor Access**, users can view the hierarchies to which they have access, including members and shared members. They can view data in cells to which they have access. In ancestor cells to which they do not have access, then #NoAccess is displayed in the cell, but the ancestor member name is still displayed (for example, it is not filtered off the grid as it would be if the user had **None** access).

With **Display** access, users are still able to see the hierarchy tree structure, but would see #NoAccess in cells to which they do not have access. For example:

Notice the same hierarchies are still present (just as when **Read** or **Write** was selected). The hierarchy according to the user's access is presented: East, West, USA, Total Entity, Alt Entity, Alt Entity 2, Post Load, and Entity. Note this is not the entire hierarchy, but all the ancestors in which the user has access to at least one member. The parent members, such as East, were brought in as #NoAccess; whereas West, to which the user did have access, remains readable. The same applies to Alt Entity2, which was present before (when set **Default Ancestor Access** was set to **None**) and is present now with a value of 300. Alt Entity1, which the user did not have access to before, is present so the hierarchy is formed, but the user cannot see the data (the cell contains #NoAccess).

And the same display applies in Smart View. Starting with the initial ad hoc grid:


Figure 21-14 Initial Smart View ad hoc grid with California as the only row member

Setting the Default Ancestor Access Option in the Application

Service administrators: Use the **Default Ancestor Access** option to specify default user access to the ancestor members of members with access other than **None**, including shared members. The **Default Ancestor Access** is listed under **System Settings** in **Application Settings** for supported business processes.

The access option specified in the **Default Ancestor Access** setting enhances existing member security to provide a choice of default access to ancestor members.

This enables users to view the members that they have access to in context of the subhierarchies that they are part of in, for example, ad hoc grids or the Member Selector.



Note:

Users will not see subhierarchies unless they have access to at least one descendant member.

The available Default Ancestor Access options are:

- **None**—By default, users are not able to see the ancestor members of members that they have access to unless they are explicitly granted access to them. When this option is selected, the system works the same way it did prior to the 24.03 update.
- Read—By default, users are granted Read Only access to the ancestor members of members that they have access to unless they are explicitly granted Write or Display access, which would override this default.
- Write—By default, users are granted Write access to the ancestor members of members that they have access to unless they are explicitly granted Read or Display access, which would override this default.
- Display—By default, users are granted Display Only access to the ancestor members of members that they have access to unless they are explicitly granted Read or Write access, which would override this default.
 Note that members with Display Only access will be displayed, but instead of data values

note that members with Display Only access will be displayed, but instead of data values in the cells associated with those members, users will see #NoAccess.

Note:

- Default Ancestor Access applies to ancestors after shared member security is evaluated. This allows it to work correctly both whether the Include Shared Members in Cube Refresh option is enabled or disabled.
- Service administrators can set the default access for ancestors to None, Read, Write, or Display access in the application. They can also grant Read, Write, or Display access to one or more ancestors in, for example, the Dimension Editor. In these cases, the explicit security assignment made in the Dimension Editor takes precedence, unless access in the Dimension Editor is set to None, in which case the Default Ancestor Access setting takes precedence.

- 5. **Optional:** From the view mode button, select one of the following:
 - Flat View to display planning units as a list.
 - **Tree View** to display planning units as a hierarchy (available only to administrators).

From the Tree View, you can select **Start** to start a planning unit and **Exclude** to exclude a planning unit from the process.

- My Planning Units to display only the planning units that you own.
- 6. Select the planning unit or units whose status you want to change. If the list is too long to locate the planning unit easily, you can search or apply filters to the list as described in Finding Planning Units.



7. To view details for the selected planning unit, click **Planning Unit Details**.

The **Approval Status** tab displays a history of the process status, owner, actions taken, and the date and times the status changed.

The **Annotations** tab displays any comments that were entered for the planning unit. See Planning Unit Annotations.

8. To change the planning unit status, click Change Status.

Note:

If you change the status of a parent entity, all of its children change, too, unless they were excluded during the First Pass state or were approved.

- From Approvals Change Entity's Status, select an action and the next owner for the planning unit.
- **10. Optional**: Enter comments under **Enter Annotation**.
- 11. Click Submit.
- **12. Optional:** To validate the changed planning unit, click ¹². You can validate only one planning unit at a time.

In Oracle Smart View for Office, you can do the following the Job Console:

- Get a better understanding of the ongoing activities. By receiving substantial information about ongoing jobs upfront, you save time and efforts required to open the details of each individual job.
- Easily identify where a job is blocked or running slower than usual. This helps you understand incompatibilities within jobs, take quick actions, and improve job processes.

For jobs with no child jobs, the status appears in the format of Job Status: [Sub_Status]. For example, Processing: Merging Data

For parent-child job relationships, the substatus appears in the following format:

The parent job displays the ongoing child job. For example:

Processing: [Executing Child Job 1 Of 1: %CHILD_JOB_NAME%]

• Each child job displays the specific operation being performed as part of its execution. For example:

Processing: [Step 3 Of 5: Fetching source data]

• If a cube is busy with the current job, a Waiting indicator is appended to the status. For example:

Processing: [Step 5 Of 5: Clearing and pushing data to target[Waiting].]

After a job is completed successfully, the substatus is cleared. However, if the job encounters any errors, then the job status and substatus where the error occurred continues to display, instead of getting cleared. For example, Error: [Step 2 Of 5: Fetching target data].

- 2. To filter the list of jobs in the **Job Console**, from the filter criteria area at the top of the dialog, use any of the following job criteria:
 - **Type**—From the drop-down menu, select a job type. For example, some job types are:
 - Clear Cell Details
 - Copy Data
 - Refresh Database
 - Rules
 - Smart Push

This is a partial list of job types. Your administrator configures the job types available to you. Administrators can view all job types.

- **Status**—From the drop-down menu, select a job status. For example, some job statuses are:
 - Completed
 - Completed with Errors
 - Error
 - Processing

This is a partial list of job statuses. Your administrator configures the job statuses available to you. Administrators can view all job statuses.

- Job Name—Type a job name.
- User Name—Type a user name.
- Start Date and End Date—Click and enter a start date and end date range using the calendar control.
- 3. Click Go.

The Job Console displays the jobs matching your selection criteria.

Note:

If you have configured the **Job Console** window to autorefresh, then the jobs matching your selection criteria will display after the specified interval. Job Console autorefresh applies to Oracle Smart View for Office 20.200+. See Configuring Job Console Autorefresh for more information.



4. **Optional:** To get more detailed information on job execution, select the job and click **Show Details.**

To see details for all jobs in the list, click Select All, and then click Show Details.

5. **Optional:** To delete a job, select the job and click **Delete**.

To delete all jobs in the list, click **Select All**, and then click **Delete**.

Note:

Deleting a job only deletes it from the list in the **Job Console**. It does not cancel a job.

Configuring Job Console Autorefresh

Starting in Oracle Smart View for Office 20.200, you can configure the Job Console window to autorefresh at the interval you specify in the Windows Registry setting, JobConsoleAutoRefreshInterval.

You can still refresh the Job Console window as often as required using the Go button. However, you can also add the JobConsoleAutoRefreshInterval setting to the Registry and observe the window updating automatically, without clicking Go.

Add the JobConsoleAutoRefreshInterval setting as a new DWORD in the HKEY_CURRENT_USER Registry folder here:

```
Computer\HKEY_CURRENT_USER\Software\Hyperion
Solutions\HyperionSmartView\Preferences
```

Specify the time interval you require. The minimum is 15 seconds (where Base is set to Decimal, and Value Data is set to 15000).

After adding the setting, leave the Job Console window open in Smart View and note that the window refreshes at the interval specified.

Anyone with permission to modify their computer's Registry can set configure this setting. See Monitoring Job Status for more information on using the Job Console.

Dashboards

Dashboards give you an overview to key information and let you change and save data.

Data source types: Planning, Planning Modules, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Tax Reporting

You can open Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud dashboards in Oracle Smart View for Office.

To open a dashboard:

- **1**. Connect to an EPM Cloud data source that contains dashboards.
- 2. From the Connections tree list, double-click a dashboard (indicated by iii).

The dashboard opens in a new Excel workbook with each dashboard object displayed in a separate worksheet.



Note:

• Smart View supports grid and chart type dashboard objects. Chart objects are displayed in grid format. All other dashboard types will be ignored.

For example, a dashboard consists of these components: one grid, one chart, one note, and one image. Open this dashboard in Smart View and notice that the workbook has only two sheets, one for the grid, and one for the chart that is displayed as a grid. The note and image components are ignored.

• Smart View supports a master form for the dashboard.

Opening Composite Forms

You can open Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud composite forms in Oracle Smart View for Office.

Data source types: Planning, Planning Modules, Financial Consolidation and Close, Tax Reporting

Note:

Starting in the 21.05 update, EPM Cloud no longer officially supports composite forms. New features added in EPM Cloud from 21.05 and later will not be supported in composite forms. As has been announced in the months before 21.05, you are required to use EPM Cloud dashboards instead. Your existing composite forms will continue to work with supported features up to the 21.04 update.

To open a composite form:

- 1. Connect to an EPM Cloud data source that contains composite forms.
- 2. From the Connections tree list, double-click a composite form (indicated by 1).

The composite form opens in a new Excel workbook with each subform displayed in a separate worksheet.

Note:

Smart View supports master composite forms.



Copying Versions

Service Administrators can copy data from one bottom-up or target version of a selected scenario to another bottom-up or target version within the same scenario.

Data source types: Planning, Planning Modules

- When you copy to a target version, all selected members are copied.
- To protect data in approved planning units, copying a version does not copy to approved planning units.

Note:

To successfully copy data, when specifying the copy data criteria, you must select at least one member for the Scenario, Account, Entity, Period, and Version dimensions.

To copy a version:

- 1. Perform an action to access the **Copy Version** dialog box.
 - From a Oracle Hyperion Planning form, in the Planning ribbon, select **Copy Version**.
 - From an ad hoc grid, right-click the application name.
- 2. From Scenario, select the scenario to copy.
- 3. From Copy From, select the source version.
- 4. From **Copy To**, select the destination version.
- 5. Click **Go** to display the available entities (planning units) for the selected source version.
- 6. Use the arrow keys to select entities from **Available Entities.** You can copy entities with a Process Status of Not Started or First Pass.
- 7. Optional: To copy associated information, select any of these options:



- Copy Account Annotations. Only annotations for selected entities are copied. If you are copying to a bottom-up version, only level 0 entities (and their annotations) are copied.
- Copy Cell text and Document links
- Copy Supporting Details
- 8. Click Copy Data.

Note:

Wait for the Copy Version completion message before loading another web page.

9. Click Cancel to close the Copy Version dialog box.

Searching for a Page in EPM Cloud Forms

If an administrator sets up multiple page dimensions for a form, select the page with the required data from the page drop-down menu.

To search for a page in an Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud form:

- 1. Click in the page dimension that you want to search to highlight it.
- 2. From the drop-down menu, select the page name containing the data with which you want to work.

Saving Native Excel Formatting to EPM Cloud

Oracle Smart View for Office provides a way for users to save native Excel formatting back to Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud business process as part of a form or ad hoc grid.



Saved formatting is applied in both the business process browser interface and when the form is rendered within Excel. You can then choose how to display the formatting in Smart View. This functionality is in addition to the existing Smart View cell styles functionality.

Viewing Formatting in Smart View

Once a form is rendered within Excel, Oracle Smart View for Office provides the options to view the formatting on a sheet. These options are accessed from the **Apply** button within the **Formatting** group on the Planning Ad Hoc ribbon.

🔷 Tip:

The **Apply** options are *viewing* options only and allow you to display the cell styles and native Excel formatting that were previously saved on a form.

To toggle between formatting view options on a Oracle Hyperion Planning form:

1. Open a Planning form and click the **Apply** button within the **Formatting** group on the Planning ribbon (see Figure 1).



The Apply options are displayed. The initial state before any option is selected is that no option is selected. Once an option is selected, the last option selection will be preserved the next time the form is opened.

- 2. Select an option:
 - None—Applies no styles (Excel formatting or Smart View cell styles) to the sheet. Though cell styles or custom styles may exist on the sheet, neither are shown when selecting this option. They are preserved, however, if you want to display them later using the Cell styles, Custom styles, or Custom and cell styles options.
 - Cell styles—Applies only Smart View cell styles to the sheet, as described in the "Cell Styles" topic.
 - Custom styles—Applies only custom user-defined native Excel formatting to the sheet.
 - Custom and cell styles—Applies both Excel formatting and Smart View cell styles to the sheet. Note that when you select Custom and cell styles, cell styles take precedent over custom Excel formatting.

The option selection is immediately applied to the form.

3. To clear the selection made in the previous step, click the **Clear** button within the **Formatting** group.

To clear the formatting associated with a form or ad hoc grid, select **Clear** from the **Formatting** group on the Planning ribbon.

Selecting the **Clear** option removes any Excel formatting associated with the form or grid, both within Excel and within the web application. Note that you can still work with cell styles functionality since cell styles are not dependent on any custom formatting that is saved.

Guidelines for Working with Native Excel Formatting and Forms in EPM Cloud

Data source types: Planning, Planning Modules, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Tax Reporting

- When designing a grid, care should be taken to avoid conflicts between custom Excel formatting and Oracle Smart View for Office cell styles.
- For some ad hoc analysis operations, not all Excel formatting may be preserved. You may need to reapply formatting after performing certain operations.
- When a saved ad hoc grid is opened, Smart View tries to preserve the formatting that was saved on the Planning server. For further ad hoc operations, existing formatting options apply; for example, **Use Excel formatting** or cell styles.
- To preserve custom Excel formatting on ad hoc operations, select the Use Excel Formatting and the Move formatting on operations options on the Formatting page of the Options dialog box.
- Formatting can affect performance, especially during ad hoc operations when the **Move formatting on operations** option is enabled.
- Saving formatting is not recommended on large forms (for example, forms of 20,000 or more cells).
- There are differences between grids rendered in Smart View and those rendered in the browser in the Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud business process. When a saved grid is rendered in EPM Cloud, some formatting may not appear exactly as it does in Smart View. The business process will attempt to approximate the Smart View formatting.
- The administrator may have defined certain formatting on a form. End users can overwrite this formatting and save it on the form. It can then be merged with the administrator's formatting based on the option selected for this form by the administrator in the EPM Cloud business process. Refer to the EPM Cloud documentation for more information.
- Save formatting functionality is not supported on composite forms.
- Ad hoc analysis started from a saved grid will inherit the formatting options saved as part of the grid.

To use Smart View Cell Styles or the Use Excel Formatting option for an ad hoc grid generated from a saved grid, complete the following steps:

- 1. Open the saved grid as a form.
- 2. In the Planning ribbon, Formatting group, select Apply, and then None.
- 3. Click **Save** to save the form back to the EPM Cloud business process.
- 4. Now use the saved form to perform ad hoc analysis.
- When user variables or substitution variables are on the POV (not on rows or columns), formatting is retained after changing the formatting of any user or substitution variable and refreshing the form.
- Excel formatting and custom styles are intended for use with static grids. Changes to the grid from the following operations can result in invalid formatting:
 - POV



- Suppression options
- Merged cells
- Enabling or clearing the Repeat Member Labels options
- Adding members to the form definition
- Using user variables or substitution variables on rows or columns, and then changing any user or substitution variable.

After saving the formatting, the form will only retain the formatting from the latest row and column combination.

About Multiple Grids on a Worksheet

Data source types: Planning, Planning Modules, Financial Consolidation and Close, Tax Reporting

When connected to supported Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud data sources, you can create multiple grids on one worksheet. These grids can be connected to the same data source or to different EPM Cloud data sources. For example, one grid can be connected to Planning and another can be connected to Tax Reporting. They can be sourced from cubes or from forms. You can retrieve data in these grids and shift them on the worksheet.

Note:

Administrators: You enable multiple-grid ad hoc for Oracle Smart View for Office users by setting the Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior option to Standard in the service application settings. See the administration documentation for your service for more information.

Guidelines and Limitations for Multiple-Grid Worksheets

Note the following guidelines and limitations in worksheets that support multiple grids:

- In order to create ad hoc grids from forms, you must have at least the User role. Check the role requirements for your individual cloud service.
- You can submit data for only one grid at a time.

If you try to submit data for more than one grid at a time—that is, if you have selected cell ranges in more than one grid—the first range returned by Excel will be used to determine the selected grid and the submit will be performed only on that grid.

- If the member option, Preserve Formulas and Comments in ad hoc operations (except pivot and undo) is selected, you can preserve formulas on the sheet using the Undo option on the right-click Smart View context menu from within the grid. This option is only supported after a refresh has been performed once formulas are added to the sheet, and for only one undo action. The Undo option on the Smart View ribbon is not enabled for multiple-grid sheets. See Preserving Excel Formulas in Ad Hoc Grids.
- Do not use Microsoft Excel's **Name Manager** or **Name Box** to rename named ranges. Instead, use one of the following methods to rename named ranges:
 - Use the Rename Range command in the Document Contents pane of the Smart View Panel. See Renaming Ranges on EPM Cloud Multiple-Grid Worksheets
 - Use the VBA function, HypModifyRangeGridName, described in the Oracle Smart View for Office Developer's Guide.
- On multiple-connection, multiple grid worksheets, ensure that there is enough space between grids to accommodate pivot and zoom operations on the individual grids, especially if working with large grids.

A loss of metadata may occur on sheets with three or more database connections and where grids are placed too close together.

- While working on multiple-grid worksheets, if a member name and its alias do not match, an error message appears on refreshing the grid stating the row number where the mismatched details are present. In some cases, this row number may not reflect the exact Excel row number where the mismatch occurs. This happens because grids can be placed anywhere on multiple-grid worksheets, thus making the row numbers relative.
- To ensure that you are refreshing the desired range, use the **Document Contents** pane to first select the range, and then click the **Refresh** link in the pane. After



refresh, select the range again from **Document Contents** to highlight the updated range.

- Smart View does not support mixing Admin Extension grids and ad hoc analysis grids on a single sheet. When mixing the two grid types on a single sheet, the menu items on the ribbon reflect the last opened grid, regardless of the grid selected in the sheet.
- These items on the Smart View ribbon are disabled:
 - Undo
 - Redo

Instead, to access the **Undo** and **Redo** commands when working with a multiple-grid sheet, ensure that your cursor is in the affected grid. (Use the **Document Contents** pane to ensure that you have selected the correct grid.) Then, right-click and select **Smart View** from the context menu, and then select **Undo** or **Redo**, as required.

Creating Multiple-Grid Worksheets with EPM Cloud Sources

Data source types: Planning, Planning Modules, Financial Consolidation and Close, Tax Reporting

To create a multiple-grid worksheet:

- 1. In Excel, connect to an Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud data source.
- 2. From any location in the worksheet, select a range of cells.

You must select a range rather than only one cell.

- 3. From the Smart View Panel, perform an action:
 - Right-click a cube, and select **Connect**. Right click the cube again, and select **Ad** hoc analysis.
 - Right-click a form, and select **Ad hoc analysis**.

You cannot use composite forms or dashboards as sources for ad hoc grids.



4. Select **Yes** at the prompt asking to change the worksheet to support multiple grids.

Note:

If you started with an ordinary single-grid worksheet, and want to add other grids to the sheet, see Converting EPM Cloud Single-Grid Worksheets to Multiple-Grid Worksheets.

- 5. To create another grid on the worksheet:
 - a. Select a different range of cells.
 - b. From the Smart View Panel, right click a cube or a form, and then select Ad hoc analysis.
- 6. Repeat step 5 as you require to add grids to the worksheet.

Converting EPM Cloud Single-Grid Worksheets to Multiple-Grid Worksheets

Data source types: Planning, Planning Modules, Financial Consolidation and Close, Tax Reporting


To convert an existing Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud single-grid ad hoc worksheet to a worksheet that supports multiple grids:

1. From any location in the worksheet, outside of the existing grid, select a range of cells.

You must select a range rather than only one cell.

2. From the Smart View Panel, right-click a cube or a form, and then select Ad hoc analysis.

The sheet already contained a grid, so the following dialog is displayed:



Available options are:

Clear sheet contents and POV



- **Reuse sheet contents only** to reuse sheet contents only. In this case, the sheet content is converted to free-form and the existing POV will be lost.
- Reuse sheet contents and POV to reuse sheet content and the POV only if the POV of the new ad hoc connection or Smart Slice is consistent with the existing content.
- Use sheet for multiple grid ad hoc to convert the sheet to one that supports multiple range-based grids, retaining any existing ad hoc grid on the sheet.
- 3. In the dialog, select Use sheet for multiple grid ad hoc.

The second grid is added to the worksheet. The sheet now supports multiple grids.

4. **Optional:** Repeat step 1 and step 2 to add more grids to the sheet.

Renaming Ranges on EPM Cloud Multiple-Grid Worksheets

Data source types: Planning, Planning Modules, Financial Consolidation and Close, Tax Reporting

When you place ranges on a multiple-grid worksheet, Excel assigns each range a name by default. The strings used in the name ranges may not be particularly user friendly. For example, a range based on the Vision Plan1 cube might look like this:

Vision_Plan1_88CA3264_EDFE_4E99_86B9_FEEEBF95DB42_1

A more user-friendly name would be helpful for all users of the workbook, but changing the name using the Excel Name Manager could cause a loss of metadata in Oracle Smart View for Office.

Use the **Rename Range** command in the Smart View Document Contents pane to change the name to a more descriptive or user-friendly name.

Note:

To change range names in multiple-grid worksheets, you *must* use the **Rename Range** command in the Document Contents pane.

To rename ranges on a multiple-grid worksheet:


1. If not already displayed, open the Document Contents pane.



Changing Connections in EPM Cloud Multiple-Grid Worksheets

Data source types: Planning, Planning Modules, Financial Consolidation and Close, Tax Reporting

From the Document Contents pane, you can change connections for individual grids within a multiple-grid worksheet. This is useful when sharing a workbook between departments that point to different servers or when moving from a test to a production environment.

You can change the connection properties for all entities in a workbook that share the same connection information (for example, all worksheets or grids that point to the same application and cube on a particular service). Or you can change the connection information sheet by sheet. To do this, see Modifying Connections within an Office Document.

Use this topic to change connections properties on multiple-grid worksheets grid by grid.





Alternatively, right-click a connection name or sheet name and select **Modify Connection**.

The **Edit Connection - URL** page of the wizard is displayed.

- 4. In the **URL** drop-down list, select an existing connection or enter a new connection URL, using private connection syntax.
- 5. Click Next and in Edit Connection Application/Cube, expand Servers, and navigate to the application and database to which you want to connect, depending upon the provider requirements.

Alternatively, select the **Advanced Setup** check box and manually enter the information for **Server** (your service URL), **Application**, and **Cube/Database**, as the provider requires.

- 9. To save the modified connection information, save the workbook.

The modified connection information is saved when you save the workbook.

POV Behavior on EPM Cloud Multiple-Grid Worksheets

Data source types: Planning, Planning Modules, Financial Consolidation and Close, Tax Reporting

The **POV** button is enabled for multiple-grid worksheets that contain only one grid, making it possible for you to toggle the button to show or hide the POV toolbar. The **POV** button remains disabled on multiple-grid worksheets that contain more than one grid.

On multiple-grid worksheets that contain one grid, the POV dimensions are displayed both in the grid and in the toolbar. On regular ad hoc worksheets, POV dimensions are displayed in the grid only if the POV toolbar is hidden.

Setting User Preferences

You can set user preferences for an application.

Data source types: Planning, Planning Modules, Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Tax Reporting

To set user preferences for an application:

- **1**. From the tree list in the Smart View Panel, select an application.
- Right-click, and then select User Preferences.
- 3. In the Preferences dialog, specify options for the following



- Application Settings: Manage email options, specify alias settings, set options for approvals, and specify out of office settings.
 - Select the Use Default check box to use default application settings for all options in a section.
 - Select a check box on the right to use the default application setting for an option.
 - Select a check box on the left to override the default application settings for an option.
 - Enter the required email address, specify if the application owner needs to be copied, and enable notifications for workflow, task list, and job console.
 - For Alias Table, select an alias table from the drop-down list on the left to override the default application settings, and then select the check box on the left.

Note:

Changes to the alias table require you to restart Oracle Smart View for Office and reconnect to take effect.

- To set up the Out of Office Assistant, click Out of Office Assistant and select the I am Currently Out of Office check box. Select an action and next owner, and enter annotations, if needed, and click Submit.
- **Display Settings:** Set number formatting, page options, and other options.
 - Select the Use Default check box to use default application settings for all options in a section.
 - Select a check box on the right to use the default application setting for an option.
 - Select a check box on the left to override the default application settings for an option.
 - For formatting numbers, you can set the formatting for thousands separator, decimal separator, negative sign, and negative color.
 - In page options, you can define settings to remember selected page members, allow a search if the number of pages exceeds a number you specify, and set member indentation.
 - In other options, you can display consolidation operator, set a warning if the data form is largers than the number of specified cells, display a specified number of members on each dimensions page, display a specified number of records on each assign access page, and set a date format.
- **User Variables:** Variables set up by the administrator to help you navigate large forms and grids.
 - To change the selected member for a user variable, click to launch the Member Selection dialog.
 - Smart View 21.100+: You can apply an alias table to the members in the

Member Selection dialog. Click *****, select **Alias Table**, and then choose an alias table from the list in the popup window. Selecting a table then closes the

window. Your alias table selection is now applied to the members in **Member Selection** dialog. Select a member for the user variable, and then click **OK** to close the dialog.

- Changing the alias table in Member Selection affects only the view in the dialog when setting user variables. For more information on using Member Selection, see Selecting Members from the Member Selector.
- 4. After setting the user preferences, click **OK**.

Note:

- User preferences for locale, date format, and decimal and numeric format set on forms from within the web application are not honored on forms in Smart View.
- You may specify decimal and numeric format for forms in Smart View in the Options dialog, Formatting tab by enabling the Use Thousands Separator option, and setting the Scale and Decimal Places options. For more information, see Formatting Options.

Smart View Behavior Options in EPM Cloud

Your administrator can set options in the web interface that affect Oracle Smart View for Office behavior.

Data source types: Enterprise Profitability and Cost Management, Financial Consolidation and Close, FreeForm, Planning, Planning Modules, Tax Reporting

The options that affect Smart View behavior are:

- Suppression Mode
- Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior

Suppression Mode

The **Suppression Mode** application setting works with the suppression options for **No Data/ Missing** and **Zero** in Oracle Smart View for Office. In the web application, your administrator can use the **Suppression Mode** setting to change suppression behavior.

In the Smart View **Options** dialog, **Data Options** tab, you select the **No Data/Missing** and **Zero** options for **Suppress Rows**, **Suppress Columns**, or both. The settings you make in Smart View then work with the setting in your web application.

The Suppression Mode options in the web application and their effect inSmart View are:

Suppress Missing values only—In the web application, the administrator enables this
option to suppress rows, or columns, or both that contain No Data/Missing.

For example, in Smart View, if the **No Data/Missing** option for rows is selected, and a row contains only Missing data, then the row is suppressed; it is *not* displayed. If both the **No Data/Missing** and **Zero** suppression options are selected in Smart View for rows, and a row contains both zeroes and Missing data, then the row is displayed; it is *not* suppressed.

 Suppress Missing also Suppresses Zero—In the web application, the administrator enables this option to suppress rows, or columns, or both that contain all No Data/ Missing or all Zeros, or a combination of both.

In Smart View, you must enable the **No Data/Missing** and **Zero** options for **Suppress Rows**, **Suppress Columns**, or both to see the result in an ad hoc grid.

For example, in Smart View, if both the **No Data/Missing** and **Zero** suppression options are selected for columns, and a column contains both zeroes and Missing labels, then the column is suppressed; it is *not* displayed. Columns that contain only zeroes, and columns that contain only Missing labels are also suppressed; they are *not* displayed.

See Data Options for general information on the suppression options available in Smart View.

Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior

In 21.08+, all new applications and all recreated applications use only the **Standard** setting for the **Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior** option. In these cases, the **Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior** option is not selectable.

Note:

Existing and migrated applications will not experience any change in behavior, and **Native** will remain as the default **Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior** setting, with **Standard** being an option.

The **Native** mode **Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior** setting will eventually be phased out (timeline is yet to be determined). If you are using the Native mode option, Oracle recommends that you plan on switching your **Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior** application setting to **Standard** mode.



In pre-21.08 applications and migrated web applications, your administrator can choose to enable enhanced ad hoc features and behaviors using the application setting, **Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior**. These are the options

- **Native**—Does not enable enhanced ad hoc features.
- Standard—Enables enhanced ad hoc features.

Standard-mode applications give you these ad hoc features and behaviors:

 In-grid POV—POV members are placed on the POV row (usually the first row) of the grid instead of in the POV toolbar.

See Selecting Members Using the Cell-Based POV.

• **Submit Data**—Using the default **Submit Data** button in the Smart View ribbon, all cells in a grid are submitted, including Smart List values, Text values, and all data cells that have been explicitly modified (made dirty). Once the submit operation is complete, the entire grid will be refreshed.

If the grid is not in a refreshed state, then Oracle Smart View for Office will attempt to perform a submit data without refresh operation.

See Submitting Data Without Refreshing.

• Free-form support—Supports empty columns and rows anywhere in a grid and changing the alias table. Additionally, supports member auto-refresh where deleted members are returned to the grid upon refresh.

See Free-Form Mode.

• Saving ad hoc grids—The **Save Ad Hoc Grid** command is enabled and you can save ad hoc grids; however, the **Submit Formatting** option is not yet available.

See Saving Ad Hoc Grids and Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior Setting and Saved Ad Hoc Grids.

 Multiple-grid ad hoc—Supports multiple ad hoc grids on the same Excel worksheet. With multiple-grid ad hoc, you can submit data from any grid on the sheet. Grids based on aggregate storage cubes and block storage cubes are supported on the same sheet. Each grid is independent; for example, if required, you can change the alias table for only one grid on the sheet.

See Working with Multiple-Grid Worksheets in EPM Cloud.

 Additional Zoom In options—Supports these additional Zoom In options: Sibling Level, Same Level, and Same Generation.

See Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior Setting and Additional Zoom In Options.

• Multiple-cell select for ad hoc operations—Supports multiple-cell selection for these ad hoc operations: **Zoom In**, **Zoom Out**, **Keep Only**, and **Remove Only**.

See Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior Setting and Multiple-cell Select for Ad Hoc Operations.

• Suppress repeated members in an ad hoc grid.

See Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior Setting and Suppressing Repeated Members.

• Display both member names and their aliases in an ad hoc grid.

See Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior Setting and Member Name and Alias Display.

When the **Ad Hoc Behavior** option is set to **Standard**, the following features and functionality are not supported:



- Create Smart Forms
- Open a native mode grid in standard mode; open a standard mode grid in native mode (see Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior Setting and Saved Ad Hoc Grids)
- HSACTIVE is supported on multiple-grid sheets only when using a private connection; HSACTIVE on a multiple-grid sheet using a shared connection is not supported
- Zoom In on Formulas
- Preserve Formula is disabled in multiple-grid sheets

Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior Setting and Saved Ad Hoc Grids

The **Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior** option setting for your application affects which saved ad hoc grids users can open and work with.

When administrators switch the **Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior** option setting between **Native** and **Standard**, ad hoc grids built and saved in one mode can be opened with limitations noted in the following table.

Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior Mode Created and Saved In	Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior Mode Opened and Refreshed In	Supported
Standard	Standard	Yes
Standard	Native	No
Native	Standard	Yes
Native	Native	Yes

For example:

- When the Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior option is set to Standard, users can open and refresh saved ad hoc grids that were created while the service was set to Standard or Native.
- When the Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior option is set to Native, users can only open and refresh saved ad hoc grids that were created while the service was set to Native.

Users attempting to open and refresh a grid that was created while the **Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior** option was set to **Standard** will see an error message. To open and refresh an ad hoc grid that was created while the **Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior** option was set to **Native**, ensure that the **Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior** option is set to **Native**.



Administrators: Set the **Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior** option in the application configuration options page for your service. See the administration documentation for your service for more information.

Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior Setting and Non-Admin Access to Valid Members

In ad hoc grids in Standard mode, when a non-admin user does not have an access to a valid member, then this member will be handled as a comment, and no data is displayed upon refresh. The non-admin user should not be able to distinguish between members to which he or she does not have access and comments.

Consider the following scenarios with multiple dimensions on a row, where C1 is a comment or a member to which a non-admin user does not have access:

 C1 is placed on the innermost row dimension location. M1 and M2 are actual valid members that the non-admin user has access to. M1 and M2 are placed on the same row as C1. After refresh, the valid members will be removed; for example

Row dimensions:

M1	M2	C1
M1		CI

After refresh

Blank Blank C1

 C1 is *not* placed on the innermost dimension location. Instead, a valid member, M3. is placed on the innermost location in this row. The comment, C1, will be removed on refresh and replaced with the previous top valid member on that dimension; for example:

Row dimensions:

M1	М2	MЗ
M1	C1	M4
After refresh	l	
M1	M2	М3
M1	M2	M4

This approach helps to avoid a mix of valid members and comments on the same row, which could cause confusion to the user.

Note the following:

- If a row consists completely of blank cells and comments, it will not be changed on refresh.
- The very first row or column is a special case as it controls grid boundaries. Mixing and matching members and comments on that row or column can result in a message about an invalid grid. This is intentional.

Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior Setting and Member Selection

In Smart View, when connected to a Standard mode application (20.09+), the dimension or member from which you invoke **Member Selection** is shown as the selected dimension in the dialog. In Standard mode, there is no need to refresh the grid before selecting a different dimension or member on the grid, and invoking **Member Selection**. The selected dimension will be shown in **Member Selection** by default.



Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior Setting and Row/Column Suppression Options

In Standard mode, certain row and column suppression options in the Options dialog in Smart View are not supported, although they appear as selectable in the dialog.

- Row Suppression Options not supported in Standard mode:
 - No Access
 - Invalid
 - Underscore Character
- Column Suppression Options not supported in Standard mode:
 - No Data/Missing
 - Zero
 - No Access

Note:

Selecting the **No Access** suppression option for rows or columns results in this error message upon refresh:

No Access suppression option is not supported.

Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior Setting and Additional Zoom In Options

In Standard mode, these additional commands are available from the drop-down menu on the **Zoom In** button in the provider ad hoc ribbon:

- **Sibling Level**—Select to retrieve data for the siblings of the selected member or members. For example, in the Vision sample database, a zoom in operation on Jan retrieves Jan, Feb, and Mar.
- **Same Level**—Select to retrieve data for all members at the same level as the selected member or members. For example, in the Vision sample database, a zoom in on Q1 retrieves Q2, Q3, and Q4.
- **Same Generation**—Select to retrieve data for all members of the same generation as the selected member or members. For example, in the Vision sample database, a zoom in on Q1 retrieves Q2, Q3, and Q4.

Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior Setting and Multiple-cell Select for Ad Hoc Operations

In Standard mode, you can select multiple row or column member cells and then perform any of the following actions:

- **Zoom In**, including any of the zoom options, such as Bottom Level or Same Generation.
- **Zoom Out**. Zooming out collapses the view to the next upper level.
- Keep Only and Remove Only. Note that the integrity and validity of the grid must be maintained. If your selections cause an issue with the grid, Smart View display a warning message informing you of the issue, and no change is made to the grid.



Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior Setting and Suppressing Repeated Members

Grids can contain members that are repeated on multiple rows. To simplify the view and improve readability for users, these repeated members can be suppressed in ad hoc grids when connected to Standard-mode applications.

Prior to 22.08, suppressing repeated members was only supported when connected to Native mode applications.

To suppress repeated members in ad hoc grids, open an ad hoc grid with repeated members, select the **Repeated Members** check box in the **Suppress Rows** section of the **Options** dialog, **Data Options** tab. Then refresh the sheet and note that the repeated members are no longer seen in the ad hoc grid.

Note:

When repeated members are suppressed in an ad hoc grid, any formatting changes done for data cells corresponding to the repeated members cannot be preserved using the **Preserve Format** option and are lost on refreshing the grid.

Smart View Ad Hoc Behavior Setting and Member Name and Alias Display

Starting in 22.08, you can use the **Member Name Display** option, **Member Name and Alias**, to display both the member names and their aliases in separate columns on row dimensions in ad hoc grids when connected to a Standard-mode application.

With **Member Name and Alias** selected, you can create ad hoc grids that display in your worksheet both the database member name, which is often a stock number or product code, and the member's alias name, which can be more descriptive than the member name.

Additionally, the side-by-side display of member names and aliases is a common feature in Essbase ad hoc, which helps in migrating worksheets maintained in Essbase into the FreeForm business process in EPM Cloud.

To display both member names and their aliases in ad hoc grids, open an ad hoc grid, select the **Member Name Display** option, **Member Name and Alias**, in the **General** section of the **Options** dialog, **Member Options** tab. Then refresh the sheet and note that the member names and their aliases are displayed on the sheet.

Note:

When the **Member Name and Alias** option is selected, an error is displayed if duplicate aliases appear in a row or column heading cell, whether they are hand-typed or the result of an ad hoc operation such as Zoom In or Keep Only.

Working with Narrative Reporting Data in Smart View

You can use Oracle Smart View for Office to copy data from Oracle Enterprise Performance Management System and Oracle Business Intelligence on-premises and cloud data sources,.

About Narrative Reporting

With Oracle Smart View for Office and the Narrative Reporting extension, you use familiar Microsoft Office tools to access and work with data in Narrative Reporting.

You and your colleagues work in a collaborative environment with static PDF files or with Word, PowerPoint, or Excel files containing refreshable data copied or embedded from Smart View. The Narrative Reporting workflow, consisting of clearly defined assignments and tasks, organizes input from many contributors in one document. Some tasks are performed in the Narrative Reporting web interface, and others are completed in Smart View.

With Narrative Reporting:

- Use the web interface or Smart View to create a *report package* structure consisting of *doclets* of various types. In Smart View, create report packages in two ways
 - From a single Word or PDF document, and add more doclets to it later.
 - From a set of documents consisting of Word documents, PowerPoint presentation slides, Excel workbooks, and PDF files.
- Use the web interface or Smart View to add *regular doclets* to a Word-, PowerPoint-, or PDF-based report package.
- Use the web interface to add *linked regular doclets*, doclets that are linked to an Office document stored in the Narrative Reporting library, to a Word-, PowerPoint-, or PDF-based report package.
- Use the web interface or Smart View to add Excel-based *reference doclets*, containing embeddable content, to a Word-, PowerPoint-, or PDF-based report package.
- Use the web interface to add *supplemental doclets*, such as Word documents, PowerPoint slides, Excel workbooks, and other file types, such as PDF, HTML, and TXT, to the report package.
- Use the web interface or Smart View to add a Word table of contents to a Word- or PDF-based report package.
- Use the web interface to assign user access and responsibilities, including timelines and due dates, for the authoring, review, and approval of each doclet, reference doclet, and supplemental doclet in the report package.

In Smart View, you also have the option of assigning author responsibilities when creating a report package structure.

• Use Smart View to author Office-based doclet content directly in Microsoft Office. Doclet content is authored in Word or PowerPoint. Embeddable content in reference doclets is authored in Excel. Supplemental doclet content is authored in the appropriate Office application.

You can work with doclets, reference doclets, and supplemental doclets in Smart View while connected to Narrative Reporting, or you can download doclets of any Office type and work with them locally.



Note that Office-based supplemental doclets and Excel-based reference doclets follow standard doclet workflow tasks, such as checkout, upload, and checkin.

- Download PDF doclets from the web or Smart View.
- Leverage Smart View's ability to access various data sources and include individual data points, formatted reports, variables, or embedded content within the doclet.

You can retrieve data from Narrative Reporting data sources and other Oracle Enterprise Performance Management System on-premises and cloud data sources.

- Collaboratively review and comment on assigned review instances either on the web interface or in Smart View.
- Sign off on the entire report package either on the web interface or in Smart View.
- Finalize the report package in the web interface.

When you work with the doclets, reference doclets, Office-based supplemental doclets, and reference files in an Narrative Reporting report package, you can use Smart View to copy and paste or embed data from Narrative Reporting data sources and other EPM System data sources, including on-premises and cloud data sources.

For example, you can incorporate data from Oracle Essbase and Planning in the same doclet. A doclet in a report package in Word or PowerPoint may contain a profit and loss statement that was created from an Essbase source along with an income statement report created from an Planning source. The data points for the areas that you copy or embed are retained in Word or PowerPoint, so you can refresh the doclet to keep the data up-to-date.

To download and run the Oracle Smart View for Office installer:


- 1. Start Narrative Reporting in a web browser, and log in with your user name and password.
- 2. In the upper-right corner of the Narrative Reporting web interface, select the arrow next to your user name to display the user menu.



3. From the user menu, select **Downloads**.

4. In Downloads, under Smart View, click Download From Oracle Technology Network.



- 5. On the Smart View information page on Oracle Technology Network, click **Download Latest Version**.
- 6. On the Smart View download page, click **Accept License Agreement**, and then click **Download Now**.

If the Oracle sign-in page is displayed, then sign in with your Oracle user name (usually your email address) and password.



- Follow the steps for your browser to download the ZIP file, and save it to a folder on your computer; for example, you can save it in the Downloads folder or in a different folder of your choice.
- 8. Navigate to the folder that you used in step 7, and then double-click SmartView.exe to start the installation wizard.

If you are upgrading an installation of Smart View, then the installer defaults to the folder where you previously installed Smart View.

The tab for the Smart View ribbon is displayed the next time you open Microsoft Excel, PowerPoint, or Word.

Creating Connections to Narrative Reporting

After you install Oracle Smart View for Office, as described in Downloading and Running the Smart View Installer, you can create connections to Narrative Reporting.

Connections require information about your service URL. Your Smart View administrator should provide you with the information that you need to create the connection.

For the connection to Narrative Reporting, use the quick connection method in Smart View.

Note:

Use the procedure in this topic to *create* connections.

Once connections are created, use the procedure in Connecting to Narrative Reporting in Smart View for connecting on a routine basis.

To create a private connection to Narrative Reporting using the quick connection method:

- 1. Open Microsoft Excel, Word, or PowerPoint, and select the Smart View ribbon.
- 2. From the Smart View ribbon, click Panel.
- 3. From the Smart View Panel, select Private Connections.

Alternatively, from the Smart View Panel, click the arrow next to the Switch to button,

, and then select **Private Connections** from the drop-down list.



4. Still in the Smart View Panel, in the text box shown in Figure 1, enter the service URL for the Narrative Reporting.





The Narrative Reporting Home panel will display if you have already installed the Narrative Reporting extension, and are creating other connections to Narrative Reporting. For example, an administrator may be creating connections to a test environment and to a production environment.

- If the Extension Alerts dialog is displayed, then click the Go to Extension Dialog button. The Extension Alerts dialog informs you of the latest Narrative Reporting extension available for installation. To complete the extension update procedure, see Working with Extension Alerts.
- If the Extension Alerts dialog is *not* displayed, continue with Installing the Narrative Reporting Extension

Installing the Narrative Reporting Extension

To install the Narrative Reporting extension from Smart View:

- 1. From the Smart View ribbon, select **Options**, and then **Extensions**.
- 2. Click the Check for Updates, New Installs, and Uninstalls link.
- 3. In Select Location for Extension Updates, select the connections to check for extension updates, and then click Get Updates.

Smart View checks for all extensions that your administrator has made available to you.

To check for available extensions in all your connections, check **Select All**, and then click **Get Updates**.

The dialog box expands to display a message window providing you with the progress and status of the extension query.

Note:



The Narrative Reporting Home panel is displayed. Narrative Reporting Home allows you to quickly access your pending tasks and other work in which you are involved. From the Narrative Reporting Home, you can access:

- Incomplete Tasks—Incomplete tasks assigned to you.
- Active Report Packages—These are the active report packages for which you have outstanding tasks and responsibilities.
- **Recent Items**—Items you have recently accessed.
- **Library**—The library of items in Narrative Reporting, including report packages and reporting applications.
- **New Report Package**—Shortcut to the **New Report Package** dialog, where you define a report package structure.

Figure 2 shows an example of Narrative Reporting Home.






Figure 22-3 Narrative Reporting Home








Figure 22-5 Narrative Reporting Home Displaying Incomplete Tasks





About Administering Report Packages in Smart View

With report packages in Narrative Reporting, you can structure the content of your report, assign responsibilities to content creators and reviewers, and manage their collaboration and workflow to produce a unified document.

Report packages are described in detail in Learning About Report Packages, available in the Narrative Reporting library on the Oracle Help Center.

In Oracle Smart View for Office, report package owners can complete these report package administration tasks:

 Create report package structures based on either the structure of a folder containing subfolders and files or based on the heading structure of a single document.

See Creating Report Package Structures from Files in a Folder and Creating Report Package Structures from a File.

 Add doclets, with or without author assignments, and add sections to report packages.

See Adding Doclets to Report Package Structures and Adding Sections to Report Package Structures.

• Edit the name and description for report packages, doclets, and sections.

Editing Report Package, Doclet, and Section Properties.

Additionally, report package owners and doclet authors can refresh report packages, including content in regular doclets and reference doclets. See Refreshing Report Packages.

About Creating Report Package Structures in Smart View

You can easily create a Word-, PowerPoint-, or PDF-based report package structure using Oracle Smart View for Office.

With the **New Report Package** command, available in Narrative Reporting Home, from the New Report Package command in the Action Panel of Narrative Reporting Library, or from the right-click context menu on user folders in the Library, you can use a folder structure or a file as the source of the new report package.

A subset of report package design and creation activities can be performed in Smart View. For example, you use the Narrative Reporting web interface to rearrange doclets in the report package, define development phases, and assign users to those phases. But with Smart View, you can quickly accomplish the task of defining the structure of a report package by adding doclets (regular, supplemental, and reference) and sections in one step.



Smart View provides two methods for creating report packages:

From a folder

Create a folder on a local or network drive. Under this folder, place subfolders and files for the report package. The content and structure of the folder, including subfolders and content of subfolders, becomes the doclets and sections of the report package structure. See Creating Report Package Structures from Files in a Folder.

From a file

Select a .docx or .pdf file as the basis of your report package structure. The headings in the file become doclets at the root level of the report package. See Creating Report Package Structures from a File.

With either method, you have the option to specify name, description, and the type for each doclet (regular, supplemental, or reference), and assign author responsibilities, before importing the files to create the report package.

After import, the basic structure and content of your report package is defined. You can further refine the structure from Smart View by adding more doclets or sections to the report package and, optionally, assigning author responsibilities to them. Then continue with the Narrative Reporting web interface to complete the report package definition.

Guidelines for Creating Report Package Structures in Smart View

- You must have the Report Admin role to see the New Report Package command.
- When creating a report package structure from a folder:
 - Word-, PowerPoint-, and PDF-based report packages are supported.
 - You must supply a style sample document. This can be a file that you plan to add to the report package structure as a doclet, or it can be a file you specially created to be your style sample file. But you need to select a style sample document when creating the report package structure.
 - Files within the folder structure cannot be 0 (zero) KB. A 0 KB file can result when creating a Word or PowerPoint file from Windows Explorer using the right-click menu. Remove any such files from your folder structure.
- When creating a report package structure from a file:
 - You can only create Word-based report packages.
 - Only .docx and .pdf files are supported as the source of the report package.
 - Even if the file selected is a .pdf, the resulting doclets will all be of Word type (.docx). No sections will be created in the resulting report package, and all the generated doclets will appear at the root level.
 - No style sample document is required. Smart View generates a style sample document based on the content of the Word document or PDF file.
- The following conditions will result in an error:



- If any required fields are missing input in the New Report Package dialog
- Report package type and doclet type mismatch; for example, if you try to define a PowerPoint file as a regular doclet in a Word-based report package.
- For report package structures based on a folder structure:
 - * If any folders in the structure are empty. Remove any empty folders from your folder structure.
 - If any files within the folder structure are 0 (zero) KB. A 0 KB file can result when creating a new Word or PowerPoint file from Windows Explorer using the right-click menu. Make sure the files are valid Office documents of non-zero file size.
- For report package structures based on a file, if the file is empty, contains invalid content, or is password protected.
- A report package with the given name already exists in the system; names must be unique.
- The report package creator does not have permission to the specified library folder.

Creating Report Package Structures from Files in a Folder

Use Smart View to create an Narrative Reporting report package structure from files organized in a folder.

Note:

Before you begin, launch Oracle Smart View for Office and log in to Narrative Reporting.

To create a report package structure from files in a folder:

1. In Narrative Reporting Home, select **New Report Package** to launch the **New Report Package** dialog.

Alternatively, in Narrative Reporting Home, click Library, and navigate to the folder where you will save the report package, then right-click the folder and select **New Report Package**.

2. To create a new report package structure from a folder and its contents, click the radio button next to this icon:



- 3. Enter a **Report Package Name** and optional **Report Package Description**.
- 4. Select a Report Package Type: Word, PowerPoint, or PDF.
- 5. For Location to save in Library, click Select, then navigate to the Library folder in which to save the report package, and then click Select in the Report Package Save Location dialog.



- 6. For **Report Package Style Sample**, click **Select File**, then navigate to the Word or PowerPoint style sample file and select the file, and then click **Open**.
- 7. In **Select folder to import**, navigate to the folder that contains the files you want to use as the basis of the report package structure, then select the folder, and then click **OK**.

In the bottom portion of the dialog, the folder you selected, and its subfolders, is displayed in the left pane; the doclets and sections, which will be created from the files and subfolders, are displayed in the right pane, as shown in Figure 1.

The example in Figure 1 shows the **New Report Package** dialog before clicking the **Import** button. In the example, we're using the files in the Report Package files folder to create a report package structure that will be stored in the Monthly folder in the Library.

8. At the bottom portion of the dialog, in the right pane, to make any necessary changes to the doclet type, click the arrow in the cells under **Type**, and select a doclet type.

Use the folder structure in the left pane to drill down into folders, if present, to display more doclets and sections, and then make your changes in the **Type** column.

For example, after evaluation by Narrative Reporting, a Word document was designated a Regular doclet , but you want to change the designation to Supplemental.



Note:

If you change the report package type at this point, Narrative Reporting reevaluates the type of each doclet per the new report package type. You can then make any changes you require as described in this step.

9. Optional: At the bottom portion of the dialog, in the right pane, click in the cells under **Name** and **Description** to change doclet and section names, and to add descriptions to the doclets and sections.


Use the folder structure in the left pane to drill down into folders, if present, to display more doclets and sections, and then make your changes in the **Name** and **Description** column.

Alternatively, you can change doclet and section names, and add descriptions to the doclets and sections later in Smart View; see Editing Report Package, Doclet, and Section Properties.

10. Verify that the information you entered in the **New Report Package** dialog is correct, and then click **Import**.

When the import is completed, you are returned to Narrative Reporting Home, where you can click the link provided to open the report package in Smart View.

Creating Report Package Structures from a File

Use Smart View to create an Narrative Reporting report package structure from a Word or PDF file.



Note: Before you begin, launch Oracle Smart View for Office and log in to Narrative Reporting.

To create a report package structure from a Word or PDF file:

- 1. In Narrative Reporting Home, select **New Report Package** to launch the **New Report Package** dialog.
- 2. To create a new report package structure from a PDF file or Word document, click the radio button next to this icon:



- 3. Enter a Report Package Name and optional Report Package Description.
- 4. In Report Package Type, Word is the default and only option available.
- 5. For Location to save in Library, click Select, then navigate to the Library folder in which to save the report package and select it, and then click Select in the Report Package Save Location dialog.
- 6. For **Document to split and import into a report package**, click **Select File**, then navigate to the file and select it, and then click **Open**.

Use the filter control at the bottom right of the **Open** dialog to filter by document type: Word (.docx) or PDF (.pdf).

The example in Figure 1 shows the **New Report Package** dialog with the Vision.pdf file selected for splitting into individual Word files. In the example, the report package structure we're creating will be stored in the Quarterly folder in the Library.

7. Click Generate Doclets.

A message is displayed informing you that the operation can take some time to complete. To continue, click **Yes** in the message box.

A second message is displayed informing you that the file will be converted into optimized, editable documents, and that the documents may not look exactly like the original file, but they can be edited later. To continue, click **OK** in the message.

Once the file generation process is complete, in the bottom of portion of the dialog, the temporary folder where the files are being stored is displayed in the left pane; the files that were created in the right pane, as shown in Figure 2.

Also, a default style sample is provided based on the file that was just split.

8. At the bottom portion of the dialog, in the right pane, to make any necessary changes to the doclet type, click the arrow in the cells under **Type**, and select a doclet type.

For example, after evaluation by Narrative Reporting, a Word document was designated a Regular doclet , but you want to change the designation to Supplemental.

9. **Optional:** At the bottom portion of the dialog, in the right pane, click in the cells under **Name** and **Description** to change doclet names and add descriptions to the doclets.



Adding Doclets to Report Package Structures

You can add doclets to report package structures in the Report Center in Oracle Smart View for Office. In Word-, PowerPoint-, and PDF-based report packages, you can add doclets, supplemental doclets, and reference doclets.

For Word documents, you can add an entire Word file. Or, you can add a selected portion of text in an open Word document. The selected portion becomes the new doclet.

To add a doclet to a report package structure:

1. Open the Office application that corresponds to the Office document type that you will be working with.

For example,

- To add a Word document as a regular doclet in a report package, then open Word.
- To add an Excel workbook as a regular doclet in a PDF-based report package, then open Excel.
- To add a table of contents, or TOC-type doclet, to a PDF- or Word-based report package, then open Word.
- To add an Excel workbook as a supplemental doclet in a report package, then open Excel.
- 2. Connect to Narrative Reporting and open a report package, as described in Connecting to Narrative Reporting in Smart View.

The report package may already contain doclets of any type, or may be empty.

3. Open the Office document to add to the report package structure.

You may open a saved Office document, or you may be working on a new Office document that has not yet been saved.



Note:

You can only add documents of the Office Open XML format type .docx, .pptx, and .xlsx.

- 4. Optional for Word doclets only: To create a doclet from a portion of text within a Word document, select that text.
- 5. In the Report Center panel, perform an action:
 - Select the doclet in the report package structure before which the new doclet will be inserted.

The doclet will be inserted before the doclet that you select.

• Select the section folder into which the new doclet will be added.

The doclet will be added as the last file in the section folder.

- Navigate into a section folder and select the doclet before which the new doclet will be inserted.
- If there are no doclets yet in the report package, click **root** in the Report Center panel.

If there are doclets in the report package, and you click **root**, then the doclet will be added as the last doclet in the report package.

- 6. In the Action Panel, click the **Add Doclet** link and in **Add Doclet to Report Package**, complete the following:
 - **Name**—Required. You can accept the file name as the doclet name or enter a new name. This is the name that will appear in the report package. Doclet names are limited to 80 characters.
 - **Type**—Required. Select a doclet type from the available options. The options available depend on the report package type. For example, in a Word-based report package, if you are adding a Word doclet, the available types are Regular and Supplemental; for an Excel doclet in a PDF-based report package, the available types are Regular, Supplemental and Reference.
 - Table of Content Doclet—Optional. Applies to Word documents in Word- and PDFbased report packages only. Select this check box if you plan to use the currentlyopened Word document as a table of contents for the report package.
 - **Description**—Optional. Enter a doclet description.
 - **Suppress Doclet**—Select to suppress a doclet's contents within the report package. The suppressed doclet content will not be included in the report package's output.

Enable this option when a particular doclet within your report package is not required for the current reporting period. This allows you to keep the doclet definition and structure for future executions of the report package when its contents may be required. After adding the doclet, you can view the option status in the **Properties** dialog of the doclet (see Inspecting Doclets). You can later change the option status in the web; see Editing Properties in *Creating and Managing Report Packages for Narrative Reporting*.

• **Exclude from Author Phase**—The state of the option (enabled or disabled) depends on whether an author phase has been defined for the report package.

These are the possible actions:



If the check box is disabled, then an author phase is *not* defined for the report package. No action is required.

If the check box is enabled, then an author phase *is* defined for the report package. Take an action:

- Select this check box to exclude the doclet from the author phase, and then continue to step 8.
- Clear the check box to assign authors to this doclet. Clearing the check box should automatically take you to the **Authors** tab of the dialog. Continue to the next step to add authors to this doclet.

Note that only worksheets and chart sheets are valid choices for inclusion in a report package. Hidden sheets, macro sheets, and dialog sheets are not valid choices for sheet selection. A message notifies you if a workbook contains only these sheets.

- 7. To add authors to this doclet:
 - a. In the Authors tab, click Assign Authors to launch the Select Users dialog box.
 - **b.** Select authors in the left pane of the dialog, and click the right arrow to move them to right pane.

Optional: To search for users, type a user name in the search field and click $\overset{ wo}{\sim}$

You can also click the arrow on \mathbf{P}^{\star} and use the filter options to narrow the search.

If you click **Yes** at the prompt, then to edit the doclet, check it out.

Adding Sections to Report Package Structures

You can add sections to Word-, PowerPoint-, and PDF-based report package structures in the Report Center in Oracle Smart View for Office.

To add a section to a report package structure:

- 1. Open Office, connect to Narrative Reporting, and open a report package, as described in Connecting to Narrative Reporting in Smart View.
- 2. In the Report Center, perform an action:
 - Select the doclet or section in the report package structure before which the new section will be inserted.

The section will be inserted before the doclet or section that you select.

- Navigate into a section folder and select the doclet before which the new section will be inserted.
- If there are no doclets or sections yet in the report package structure, click root in the Report Center panel.

If there are doclets or sections in the report package structure, and you click **root**, then the section will be added as the last artifact in the report package.

- 3. In the Action Panel, click the Add Section link and in Add Section To Report Package, complete the following:
 - Name—Required. Enter a section name. This is the section name that will appear in the report package.

Editing Report Package, Doclet, and Section Properties

You can edit the **Name** and **Description** properties for report packages, doclets, and sections in Oracle Smart View for Office.

To edit properties for report packages, doclets, and sections:

- 1. Open Office and connect to Narrative Reporting, as described in Connecting to Narrative Reporting in Smart View.
- 2. To edit report package properties:
 - a. From Narrative Reporting Home, select **Library**, and then navigate to the report package in the Library panel and select it, but do not open it.
 - b. In the Action Panel, select the **Properties** link.
 - c. In Report Package Properties, double-click or press F2 in the Report Package Name and Description fields, and then type your changes.
- 3. To edit doclet or section properties:
 - a. From Narrative Reporting Home, select **Library**, then navigate to the report package in the Library panel, and then open it.
 - b. Navigate to the doclet or section and then select it.
 - c. In the Action Panel, select the Properties link.
 - d. In **Properties**, double-click or press F2 in the **Name** and **Description** fields, and then type your changes.
- 4. Click Save.

About the Author Phase Process

Report packages are made up of subcomponents called doclets. There are three doclet types: doclets, reference doclets, and supplemental doclets. A report package owner assigns authors and approvers for each doclet of all types in a report package. The authors and approvers provide and approve content for the doclets.

The author phase follows this process:

- 1. The report package owner initiates the author phase in the Narrative Reporting web interface.
- 2. Notification messages are sent to authors to begin their work.
- 3. In Oracle Smart View for Office, authors open and then check out Office-based doclets of any type. They provide content, add content to reference files, embed available content from reference doclets, Reports, and reference files, and then check doclets back in.

Authors use the web interface to check out and check in PDF doclets and supplemental doclets of non-Office type. From Smart View, authors download PDF doclets and non-Office supplemental doclets.

See About Doclets and Variables for more information.

- 4. When authors have finished their work, they submit doclets of all types for approval, if required.
- 5. If doclet approval is specified, notification messages are sent to approvers to review and either approve or reject doclets.
- 6. The report package owner marks the author phase complete.

As an author, in Smart View or in the Narrative Reporting web interface, you can work with:

Doclets in Word, PowerPoint, Excel, or PDF format

Office doclets can be regular doclets or linked regular doclets.

- · Reference doclets in Excel, from which you embed content in Word doclets
- Charts and tables created in the Reports web interface, from which you embed content in Word doclets
- Excel doclets in PDF-based report packages
- Excel-based reference files, which contain content that you may want to embed in a Word doclet
- Office-based supplemental doclets with the appropriate Office application
- PDF doclets and non-Office-based supplemental doclets, such as PDF or TXT files, which you download and open with the appropriate application (using the web interface to check out, upload, and check in)

The topics in this section discuss authoring and working with doclets, reference doclets, supplemental doclets, and reference files in Smart View.



About Doclets and Variables

Report packages are comprised of subcomponents called *doclets*, *reference doclets*, *reference files*, and *supplemental doclets*. Additionally, *variables* can be sourced from reference doclets and reference files.

Doclets

Doclets (sometimes referred to as regular doclets) contain the content you require for the report that you're creating with an Narrative Reporting report package. A report package can consist of one or more doclets. Word-based report packages contain Word-based doclets; PowerPoint-based report packages contain PowerPoint-based doclets. PDF-based report packages contain Word- and Excelbased doclets, along with PDF files; however, only the Word and Excel doclets can be authored.

Word and PowerPoint documents stored in folders in the Narrative Reporting library can be added to report packages as *linked* regular doclets. A linked regular doclet maintains a persistent link to the source library document. When the library document is updated, Narrative Reporting automatically updates all doclets linked to the library document. Narrative Reporting continues to update the doclet file until the doclet link is deactivated.

Doclets participate fully in report package workflow, including all author phases, review phases, sign off, and report publishing.

Reference doclets

Reference doclets can be used as containers to store content such as named ranges from an Excel file, or charts and graphs created from Reports, which are consumed by one or more doclets in a report package.

Excel-based reference doclets are Excel files that serve as supporting files with content such as Oracle Smart View for Office grids or forms, or static Excel content, that you can register and then embed directly into Word-based doclets. You specify the embeddable content using Excel's Name Manager, then register the named ranges in Smart View.

Reports-based reference doclets consist of tables and charts created and registered as available content in the Narrative Reporting web interface.

You can then embed content from either type of reference doclet directly into Word-based doclets. Using the embedding process, the layout and format of the content is maintained in the target doclet just as in the source reference doclet.

Both Excel- and Reports-based reference doclets can be included in Word-based report packages. Embedded content is merged in the combined report and can be commented on during the review phase.

In Smart View, Excel-based reference doclets support the content management and workflow features of the author phase as follows:

- Reference doclets can be checked out, modified, uploaded, checked in, submitted for approval, and approved or rejected.
- Word-based doclets containing embedded content can be checked out, modified, uploaded, checked in, submitted for approval, and approved or rejected.
- Embedded content can be synced with updates made to named ranges in the reference doclet.



Embedded content can be refreshed.

The workflow for Reports-based reference doclets is maintained in the Narrative Reporting web interface; however, these content management and workflow features of the author phase are supported in Smart View as follows:

- Word-based doclets containing embedded content can be checked out, modified, uploaded, checked in, submitted for approval, and approved or rejected.
- Embedded content can be synced with updates made to named ranges in the reference doclet.
- Embedded content can be refreshed.

Note that reference doclets themselves are *not* available for commenting in the review or sign off phase; however, in a doclet, you can comment on the embedded content that was sourced from reference doclets, and the embedded content is part of the final published report.

Reference files

Reference files are Excel workbooks that contain report content that you can embed into a Word doclet. The reference file is not listed as part of the report package in the same way that doclets, reference doclets, and supplement doclets are. Instead, when you embed content from a reference file into a Word doclet, that reference file becomes part of the properties of the doclet. When you check out the target Word doclet, Narrative Reporting tracks any changes you make to the reference file. You can then refresh the content you have embedded in the target Word doclet.

Note that reference files themselves are *not* available for commenting in the review or sign off phase; however, in a Word doclet, you can comment on the embedded content that was sourced from reference files, and the embedded content is part of the final published report.

Supplemental doclets

Supplemental doclets are documents which assist in the development of the overall report, such as source and supporting files. Supplemental doclets can be of Office file types, such as Excel, Word, or PowerPoint; or of non-Office file types, such as PDF, TXT, or ZIP. Content from supplemental doclets is not merged into the combined report.

Supplemental doclets of any file type can be included in both Word-based and PowerPoint-based report packages. For example, Word-based supplemental doclets can be included in Word- or PowerPoint-based report packages.

In Smart View, supplemental doclets support the content management and workflow features of the author phase as follows:

- Office-based supplemental doclets can be checked out, modified, uploaded, checked in, submitted for approval, and approved or rejected.
- For supplemental doclets of non-Office file types, Smart View gives assigned authors easy access to download and view files. However, any other interactions with the files, such as checkout, upload, and checkin, must be performed through the Narrative Reporting web interface.

Note that supplemental doclets of any file type are *not* available for commenting in the review or sign off phase, and they are *not* part of the final published report.

Variables

Report Package variables provide centralized maintenance of common text, numbers, dates, and data that are displayed in doclets throughout a report package. Variables can



also be used to reference content between doclets, such as inserting Excel data from a reference doclet into a Word doclet.

Two types of variables are available:

- Static variables use static input that is defined by the user, such as a date labels or a set value, which can be used throughout the report package. These static variables can be easily updated, and all doclet instances of the variable value reflect the change. The static variables help to centrally maintain common dates, numbers and text across the Report Package document content.
- Reference variables are created by referencing another doclet within the report package as the source, and selecting the value for the variable, such as text in a Word paragraph or an Excel cell value. If the source document is subsequently updated, those changes are automatically updated in the inserted instances of the variable in the report package. Reference variables can be used to insert Excel cell values into a paragraph in a Word doclet, or to create Excel formulas to implement cross-footing rules for increased data accuracy, or to create directional words for the report narrative, such as "an increase" or "a decrease".

Authoring Doclets in Smart View

As a doclet author, you provide report content in Oracle Smart View for Office. The authoring process follows this workflow:

- 1. Check out the doclet, reference doclet, or supplemental doclet.
- 2. Update the doclets.

Some suggested Smart View content development tasks:

- Copy and paste data points or data ranges, using Smart View Copy and Paste commands from Office-based documents and doclets into Word-based or PowerPoint-based doclets, as described in Copying Data Between Excel, Word, and PowerPoint.
- Use the Office copy and paste commands to copy Smart View data and then import Smart View metadata, as follows:
 - Use the PowerPoint copy and paste commands to copy a slide or presentation into a PowerPoint-based doclet or supplemental doclet, then import the metadata from the original slide or presentation into the doclet, as described in Importing Metadata into Copied Worksheets
 - Use the Word copy and paste commands to copy Smart View artifacts from Word documents, then import the metadata from the original document into the doclet, as described in Importing Metadata into Copied Word Documents.
 - Use the Excel copy and paste commands to copy Smart View artifacts from Excel worksheets, and import the metadata from the original worksheet into a reference doclet, as described in Importing Metadata into Copied Worksheets
- In Excel regular doclets in PDF-based report packages, edit sheet content. Additionally, you can specify the sheets to include in the final report package. See Working with Excel Doclets in PDF-based Report Packages.



- In Excel-based reference doclets, make embeddable content available to doclet authors by specifying named ranges and registering them as a available content with Narrative Reporting, as described in Adding Available Content to Excel-based Reference Doclets.
- Embed content from Excel- or Reports-based reference doclets into doclets in Wordbased report packages, as described in Embedding Content in a Doclet.
- Create static or reference variables, and insert them into doclets, as described in Working with Variables
- Refresh all Smart View data in individual doclets, reference doclets, and Office-based supplemental doclets using the **Refresh** command on the Smart View ribbon or a provider ribbon, as described in Refreshing from a Ribbon.
- Refresh specific reports in doclets, reference doclets, and Office-based supplemental doclets individually as you require, as described in Refreshing Individual Reports from Document Contents.
- Change the POV of a report in a doclet, reference doclet, or Office-based supplemental doclet, as described in POV Manager.

See Example: Working with Narrative Reporting Data in Smart View for a demonstration on working with Smart View in a Word-based doclet.

- **3.** Upload the doclet, reference doclet, or applicable supplemental doclet back to the report package.
- 4. **Optional:** Select to override doclet style sample attributes or slide masters.
- 5. Check in the doclet, reference doclet, or applicable supplemental doclet.
- 6. Submit the doclet, reference doclet, or applicable supplemental doclet.

Checking Out Doclets

This topic applies to Office-based doclets of all types, including reference and supplemental. Unless otherwise noted, the term *doclets* refers to all Office-based doclet types.

Only doclets, reference doclets, and Office-based supplemental doclets can be checked out, signified by the following icons in the Report Center.

- indicates a doclet
- indicates a reference doclet
- indicates a supplemental doclet



When you check out a doclet, reference doclet, or Office-based supplemental doclet, it is locked so that nobody else can modify it.

Tip:

To safeguard all of your report content, Oracle strongly recommends that you perform a checkout prior to opening a doclet and making any content modifications. This will ensure that any modifications made by you or other users are not inadvertently overwritten.

Note:

In Oracle Smart View for Office, you can only download PDF doclets and non-Office-based supplemental doclets. To check out PDF doclets and non-Office supplemental doclets, use the Narrative Reporting web interface.

Before you begin this procedure, you should have already launched an Office application, connected to Narrative Reporting, and opened a report package, as described in Connecting to Narrative Reporting in Smart View.

To check out a doclet, reference doclet, or supplemental doclet:

1. In the Report Center, select the doclet to check out.

Note the following when selecting doclets:


- · Clicking the doclet name opens the doclet, but does not check it out.
- Clicking to the right of the doclet name allows you to select the doclet, but not open it.
- If you are using the keyboard to navigate the Report Center, use **Ctrl-Tab** to navigate to the first doclet icon in the Report Center list, then **Tab** to the doclet title, and then use the up and down arrow keys to navigate to the doclet to select. Use **Ctrl-Tab** to move to the Action Panel menu items, then use the up and down arrow keys to navigate to an Action Panel option, and then press the spacebar to select an option.

When a doclet is selected using keyboard navigation, the selected doclet name has a dotted-line box around it:



2. In the Action Panel, select **Open and Check Out**.





Selecting this option opens the doclet and checks it out in one operation.

Alternatively, double-click the doclet name to open, then continue with step 3.

Note:

When navigating within the doclet panel, the Action Panel menu items listed are relative to—and can change depending on—the item highlighted in the panel. If you are using the keyboard to navigate the doclet panel, note that even though you may have tabbed to a doclet panel item, it is not highlighted, or selected, until you press the space bar. Pressing the space bar highlights the item with a square border meaning that the item is now selected and in focus. Then, the Action Panel menu items will refresh and display relative to the item you've selected.

The Narrative Reporting ribbon is displayed in the Office application when you open:

- A doclet or linked regular doclet
- A reference doclet
- An Office-based supplemental doclet

Figure 1 shows the Narrative Reporting ribbon for the author phase, in the initial state, before the doclet is checked out.

Note:

The availability of buttons in the Narrative Reporting ribbon depends on the permissions that are assigned to you; the phase that you are in authoring, review, or sign off; and the operation you are performing.

Additionally, if you check out a linked regular doclet, the **Replace File** button is displayed instead of the **Upload** button.


3. In the Narrative Reporting ribbon, click **Check Out**.

Note:

- If an Office-based doclet of any type is already checked out by another user, then the **Check Out** button is disabled.
- If you have been are viewing an opened doclet for a while prior to checking it out, and the doclet was updated by another user or had embedded content or variables refreshed while you were viewing the doclet, when you perform your checkout, a message notifies you that a more recent version of the doclet exists. Select an option:
 - Yes Default. Clicking Yes closes your working copy of the doclet, then downloads the latest version of the doclet from Narrative Reporting, checks it out, and opens it. You will lose your unsaved changes.
 - No Ignores the warning and checks out the local version that you have been working on; however, you run the risk of overwriting another user's updates.

The selected doclet is now locked for your use. You can work with it directly in Smart View while connected to Narrative Reporting.


In the doclet responsibilities list in the Smart View Panel, a lock icon and the user name are displayed for the doclet or supplemental doclet that is checked out.





In the Narrative Reporting ribbon, the **Check Out** button is replaced with the **Cancel Checkout** button, and the **Embed** button is added.

Figure 2 shows the Narrative Reporting ribbon for the author phase, after the doclet is checked out.

Next steps for working with the checked-out doclets in Narrative Reporting:

- You can undo, or cancel, the checkout if you want to remove your lock on the doclet. Undoing the checkout allows other users to check out and update the doclet. See Undoing Checkouts.
- If you must close Office before you are finished with your authoring changes, you do not need to check in the doclet, but you must upload it to retain the changes in progress. See Uploading and Working with Page Attributes and Slide Masters.
- If you want to perform a health check and refresh a doclet of any Office type (described in Performing a Health Check on Microsoft Office Documents), perform the health check first, and then save the temporary file with the correct doclet name. Next, upload and check in the saved doclet (see Checking In Doclets. Then check out the doclet, perform the refresh, and then upload the doclet and check it in.

Undoing Checkouts

This topic applies to Office-based doclets of all types—regular, reference, and supplemental. Unless otherwise noted, the term *doclets* refers to all Office-based doclet types.

In Narrative Reporting, you can undo a checkout to remove the lock and allow other users to check out and modify the doclet. Changes that you made after checking out the doclet , even if you uploaded it, are discarded when you cancel the checkout. To keep your changes, select **Check In** instead.

To undo a checkout:

- 1. If the Office-based doclet is not already open, in the Smart View Panel, navigate to the doclet and double-click it.
- 2. In the Narrative Reporting ribbon, click **Cancel Checkout**.





Uploading and Working with Page Attributes and Slide Masters

- Doclets in Word-based Report Packages
- Doclets in PowerPoint-based Report Packages
- Office-based Supplemental Doclets in Report Packages

Note:

When connected to an Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud OCI (Gen 2) environment where virus scanning is enabled, if a virus is detected in a doclet of any type that you are attempting to upload, then the doclet is not uploaded.

Doclets in Word-based Report Packages

This topic applies to Word doclets in a Word-based report package.

For Microsoft Word-based report packages, you are asked to specify style sample attributes to override during the doclet upload process.

When a Word-based report package is created in Narrative Reporting, a style sample document is uploaded. It contains the page attributes that the report package owner wants in the final report. These attributes include the page header and footer, orientation and size, margins, numbering, and alignment.

When you upload a doclet, the system checks the doclet against the style sample document to compare the attributes. An alert is displayed next to the attributes that differ from the style sample.

By default, the system overrides the doclet attributes with the style sample attributes when the doclet is uploaded. For example, if the style sample orientation is portrait mode and the doclet is in landscape mode, then the doclet's orientation will be changed to portrait mode to match the style sample.



Figure 1 shows the **Upload File** dialog box with an alert next to the **Orientation** attribute. To keep the doclet in landscape mode, overriding the style sample, you would select the **Orientation** check box. When you select an attribute, the system uses the attribute from the doclet rather than the attribute from the style sample.

To upload a Word doclet, and review and select style attributes to override:

1. If the doclet is not already open, in the Smart View Panel, navigate to the doclet and double-click the doclet name.

To upload changes, you must have the doclet checked out.

2. In the Narrative Reporting ribbon, click Upload.



The **Upload File** dialog is displayed (see Figure 1).

Style attributes in the doclet that differ from the style sample for the report package are noted with an exclamation point.

Note:

To view the **Upload File** dialog, where you can review any style sample attribute alerts and choose attributes to override, you must click the **Upload** button. Do not select the **Upload and Check In** action on the **Check In** button.

3. In the **Upload File** dialog box (see Figure 1), select the check box next to the style attributes that you want to override, and then click **OK**.

Style attributes in the doclet that differ from the style sample for the report package are noted with an exclamation point.

You can select only those attributes noted with an exclamation point.

4. Proceed to Checking In Doclets.

Alternatively, you can continue working on the checked-out doclet and repeat the upload procedure in this topic as many times as you require, and then proceed to Checking In Doclets.

Doclets in PowerPoint-based Report Packages

This topic applies to PowerPoint doclets in a PowerPoint-based a report package.

For Microsoft PowerPoint-based report packages, when a report package is created, a style sample is uploaded that contains the slide masters and slide layouts that the report package owner wants in the final report. These slide masters determine the overall look and format of the presentation. When you upload a doclet, the system scans the doclet and highlights the slide masters in use. An alert icon indicates slide masters that are not in the style sample document.



Note:

The doclet slides must be sized the same as the report package style sample slides in order to upload the doclet. For example, if your doclet slides are sized for On-Screen Show (4:3) and the report package style sample slides are sized for On-Screen Show (16:9), you must resize your doclet slides before you can upload the doclet.

To upload a PowerPoint doclet and select a slide master:

1. If the doclet is not already open and checked out, in the Smart View Panel, navigate to the doclet, double-click the doclet name to open it.

To upload changes, you must have the doclet checked out.

2. In the Narrative Reporting ribbon, click **Upload**.



The Upload File dialog is displayed.

Note:

To view the **Upload File** dialog, where you can review any style sample slide master alerts and choose attributes to override, you must click the **Upload** button. Do not select the **Upload and Check In** action on the **Check In** button.

- 3. If the doclet uses the same slide master as the style sample document, click **OK** in the **Upload File** dialog box, then proceed to step 5; otherwise, proceed to step 4.
- 4. If the doclet contains a slide master that is not in the style sample document, perform one of the following actions:
 - To replace the doclet slide master with the report package slide master, click the name of the doclet slide master, and then select the report package slide master to replace it with.

The system maps the doclet slide layouts to the report package slide master to maintain a uniform look for the presentation.

• To preserve the doclet slide master, click **OK** to upload the doclet.

If you preserve the doclet slide master, the system adds it to the merged presentation to ensure that the slides will render correctly. However, that slide master is available for use by the current doclet only. The doclet slide master is not available to other doclets. If you want the doclet slide master to be used by other doclets, the report package owner must add it to the report package style sample document.

5. Proceed to Checking In Doclets.

Alternatively, you can continue working on the checked-out doclet and repeat the upload procedure in this topic as many times as you require, and then proceed to Checking In Doclets.

Note:

When you upload a doclet to the report package, the system resets all slides to their default layouts. If you have modified any slides from the default slide master layout, those modifications are reset back to the default. For example, if you have changed the size of a text box on a slide to make room for an image, the text box is reset to its original size when you upload the doclet. However, you can add additional layouts to the doclet slide master, and those new layouts are persisted within the doclet. Therefore, if you want to preserve the modified text box size, you must add that layout to the doclet slide master.

As an example, you are working with a doclet with a slide layout called Title and Content that contains a text box that spans the entire slide. You want to resize the text box to cover half of the slide so that you can add an accompanying image. If you were to resize the text box, add the image, and upload the doclet, the system would reset the slide back to the Title and Content default layout, and the text would overlap the image. Instead, add a new slide layout (called, for example, Title, Text, and Image) with the resized text box. When you upload the doclet, the new slide master is copied over and persisted for that doclet.

Office-based Supplemental Doclets in Report Packages

This topic applies to Office-based supplemental doclets.

You upload Office-based supplemental doclets for checking in. However, in the upload process, you do not have to overwrite styles or slide masters. You simply upload.

Other supplemental doclet file types, such as ZIPs or PDFs, are not checked out in Oracle Smart View for Office; they are only opened or downloaded. Therefore, they do not need to be uploaded.

To upload an Office-based supplemental doclets:

1. If the doclet is not already open, in the Smart View Panel, navigate to the doclet and double-click the doclet name.

To upload changes, you must have the doclet checked out.

2. In the Narrative Reporting ribbon, click Upload.



Alternatively, to upload and check in the doclet, in the Narrative Reporting ribbon, select **Check In**, and then **Upload and Check In**.

Whether you select the Upload command or the Upload and Check In command, the Upload File dialog is displayed.

3. Proceed to Checking In Doclets.



Alternatively, you can continue working on the checked-out supplemental doclet, repeat the upload procedure in this topic as many times as you require, and then proceed to Checking In Doclets.

Checking In Doclets

This topic applies to Office-based doclets of all types, including reference and supplemental. Unless otherwise noted, the term *doclets* refers to all Office-based doclet types.

Note:

- If you're working with a linked regular doclet, see Removing the Link in a Linked Regular Doclet.
- To check in PDF doclets and non-Office supplemental doclets, use the Narrative Reporting web interface.

After you have finished modifying an Office-based doclet, you must check it back in so that your changes are incorporated into the report package and other users can view your changes.



To check in a doclet, reference doclet, or Office-based supplemental doclet:

- 1. If not already open, in the Smart View Panel, navigate to the doclet, then double-click it to open it, and then check it out.
- 2. After making any modifications to the doclet, in the Narrative Reporting ribbon, perform an action:
 - If you have already performed an upload by clicking the Upload button, as described in Uploading and Working with Page Attributes and Slide Masters, select the Check In button, and then select Check In.



• If you haven't yet uploaded the doclet, select **Check In**, and then **Upload and Check In**.



When you select this option, any existing page attribute override selections will be maintained.

After performing either checkin operation, in the Smart View Panel, the lock icon is removed from the doclet in the doclet responsibilities list, indicating that it is no longer checked out.

Note:

- If you want to discard the changes that you made and revert back to the original version of the doclet, click Cancel Checkout instead (see Undoing Checkouts).
- Doclet versioning is optimized to minimize the impact of multiple automated check-ins. When multiple automated check-ins are performed on the doclet due to variable or embedded content changes, the system will update the doclet contents but will not generate a new version.

Submitting Doclets


This topic applies to Office-based doclets of all types, including reference and supplemental. Unless otherwise noted, the term *doclets* refers to all Office-based doclet types.

After finishing their work, authors submit Office-based doclets to the report package owner or, if approval is required, to the doclet approver.

To submit a doclet, reference doclet, or Office-based supplemental doclet:

- 1. If not already open, in the Smart View Panel, navigate to the doclet and doubleclick it to open it.
- 2. In the Narrative Reporting ribbon, click Submit.





If approval is required, the current responsibility for the doclet is updated with the doclet approvers. If no approval is required, the current responsibility field is empty.

ORACLE

Note:

If the doclet is not already checked in, then the **Submit** operation also checks it in for you.

After you submit a doclet, you can no longer check it out, although you can still open and inspect it from Oracle Smart View for Office or the Narrative Reporting web interface.

Note that once a doclet is submitted, the report package owner can check it out for further updates.

About Linked Regular Doclets

Linked regular doclets enable you to easily share common library documents across multiple report packages.

Documents stored in folders in the Narrative Reporting library can be added to report packages as *linked* regular doclets. A linked regular doclet maintains a persistent link to the library document. When the library document is updated, Narrative Reporting automatically updates all doclets linked to the library document. Narrative Reporting continues to update the doclet file until the doclet link is deactivated.

Linked regular doclets are an easy way to ensure the consistency of common content across report packages.

Note:

- Linked doclets are applicable to regular doclets only.
- Linked regular doclets are not supported for reference doclets and supplemental doclets.
- Embedded content and variables are not supported in linked doclets.
- Workflow activities, such as Submit, Approve, Reject, and Recall, apply to linked regular doclets. These tasks can be completed in Oracle Smart View for Office.
- The link is deactivated when the doclet is marked complete.

The type of document you can specify as a linked regular doclet depends on the report package type, as shown in Table 1.



Report Package Type	Document Type Supported for Linking
Word	Word
PowerPoint	PowerPoint
PDF	PDF, Word, PowerPoint, Excel, Reports

In Smart View, you can:

- View the content of a linked regular doclet in a report package by selecting the doclet and clicking **Open**.
- View the properties of a linked regular doclet by selecting the doclet in the Report Center either selecting **Properties** in the Action Panel or by clicking the **Inspect** button in the Narrative Reporting ribbon.
- Perform these author phase workflow tasks on a linked regular doclet: **Submit**, **Approve**, **Recall**, **Reject**.
- Replace the linked regular doclet, and thus remove the link, by checking out the linked regular doclet and clicking the **Replace File** button in the Narrative Reporting ribbon. Narrative Reporting warns you that the replacing the file will break the link. After confirming the **Replace File** operation, and checking in the unlinked doclet, the doclet becomes like any other regular doclet in the report package, and can be further authored, uploaded, checked in, submitted, approved, recalled, and rejected.

Any changes made to the unlinked doclet are reflected only in the doclet in the current report package, and not in the library document that was linked to previously.

Note that in Narrative Reporting web, the doclet link can also be removed or deactivated when the doclet is marked complete, the author phase is complete, or the report package is marked final.

To remove the link in a linked regular doclet, see Removing the Link in a Linked Regular Doclet.

Note:

After removing a doclet link or due to a broken link, if you need to reestablish the link to the library document (relink), you must perform the linking procedure in Narrative Reporting web. This procedure is not supported in Smart View. See Working with Linked Regular Doclets in *Authoring and Approving Doclets for Narrative Reporting* for more information.

Removing the Link in a Linked Regular Doclet

To make modifications to the contents of a linked regular doclet, the updates need to be made in the source library document file. Or, you can remove the link to the library file, thus replacing the linked doclet in the report package with a regular doclet.



Use the **Replace File** button in the Narrative Reporting ribbon to remove the link in a linked regular doclet.

Once the link is removed, the linked regular doclet becomes a regular doclet in your report package, with all the usual workflow tasks associated with a regular doclet. Assigned authors can now make further updates to the doclet, such as modifying the doclet content, inserting variables, and inserting embedded content.

To remove the link in a linked regular doclet:

1. Open a report package, select a linked regular doclet, and, in the Narrative Reporting ribbon click **Open**, and then click **Check Out**.

Alternatively, select the doclet in the report package, and then select **Open and Check Out** in the Action Panel.

In Oracle Smart View for Office, you can view the linked doclet file by selecting the doclet in the Report Center and clicking **Open**. However, to remove the link in the linked regular doclet, you must check it out.

Checking out the linked regular doclet enables the **Replace File** button in the Narrative Reporting ribbon.

2. In the Narrative Reporting ribbon, click **Replace File**.



Narrative Reporting displays a message notifying you that the doclet file is linked and replacing the file will break the link.

Once a linked regular doclet is replaced, the doclet becomes a regular doclet. The regular doclet can be authored as you would any other regular doclet. You can perform further authoring tasks on the doclet, such as embedding content or inserting variables, and the doclet can be submitted or approved.

3. Click **Check In** to check in the check in the replaced file.

Alternatively, instead of clicking the **Replace** button as described in the previous step, click the drop-down arrow on the **Check In** button and select **Replace File and Check In** to complete the replace and check-in with one operation.

4. Assigned authors can continue with authoring tasks on the replaced doclet.

For example, authors can modify the doclet, embed content, insert variables, upload and check in the doclet; and proceed with the submitting, approving, recalling, or rejecting the doclet, as required.

Working with Embedded Content from Reference Doclets

Embedded content from a reference doclet allows commonly-used report content to be defined and then embedded in one or more doclets within your report package.

About Embedded Content From Reference Doclets

What is embedded content? Embedded content starts with common report content created by reference doclet authors and contained in a reference doclet. This common content becomes available content to doclet authors. Using Oracle Smart View for Office or the web, doclet authors embed content into doclets that are part of the published report in Word- or PowerPoint-based report packages.

As a reference doclet author, you create report content, and then define it as available content. In Excel-based reference doclets, you use Excel's named range functionality. In Reports-based reference doclets, you use the web interface. After upload and checkin, the content is ready for doclet authors to consume.

As a doclet author, you might think of a reference doclet as a data source of embedded content. A report package can contain multiple reference doclets. You can embed the available content from multiple reference doclets in multiple doclets in a report package.

Whenever a reference doclet author checks in a reference doclet, Smart View or the web interface, the system automatically refreshes any doclet that has embedded content.

Whenever a doclet author checks in a doclet that has embedded content, the system automatically refreshes the embedded content in the doclet.

As the underlying data source of the report is updated, you can view the changes the next time you open or refresh the reference doclets and doclets containing embedded content.

Note:

For reference doclet authors: Reference doclets are part of a report package, and they are maintained within the report package. Reference doclets have the same support as any other doclet in a report package such as workflow, security, and versioning.

The basic process flow for working with reference doclets and embedded content is as follows:



1. The report package owner adds Excel- and Reports-based reference doclets to the report package.

The reference doclets can already contain report content and, in the case of Excel-based reference doclets, named ranges. Reference doclet authors and doclet authors can also add named ranges later, during the authoring process.

2. In Smart View or from the web interface, Excel-based reference doclet authors create report content and define named ranges for data and other content, such as tables, graphs, and charts, to include in a report package. They can validate fonts used in the reference doclet to ensure that formatting is retained when content is embedded in doclets.

In the web interface, Reports-based reference doclet authors can add tables, charts, notes, and text boxes in the report as available content.

Multiple available content objects can be created within a single reference doclet. For example, you can create more than one named range in a reference doclet.

- 3. Reference doclet authors upload and check in reference doclets, thus making the report content available to doclet authors.
- 4. Doclet authors embed content from the reference doclets in their assigned doclets.

In Smart View, you begin the process with Defining Named Ranges in Excel-based Reference Doclets.

For procedures completed in Narrative Reporting web, see Understanding Embedded Content - Doclet Authors in Authoring and Approving Doclets for Narrative Reporting.

Adding Reference Doclets to a Report Package

This task is completed by report package owners using the Narrative Reporting web interface.

To begin working with embedded content, the report package owner adds Excel- or Reportsbased reference doclets to a report package. Reference doclets are the containers to which reference doclet authors add report content and make it available to doclet authors for embedding.



Note:

- You must have report package owner privileges to add reference doclets to a report package.
- The reference doclets you add can already contain report content and named ranges, or you can add them later, during the authoring process.

To add reference doclets to a report package:

1. In Oracle Smart View for Office, follow the procedure described in Adding Reference Doclets to a Report Package.

Alternatively, to use Narrative Reporting web, see Adding Excel Content to a Reference Doclet.

2. In Smart View, open the report package and verify that the reference doclet is included.

Reference doclet authors are now ready to begin working with the Excel-based reference doclets, as described in Defining Named Ranges in Excel-based Reference Doclets.

To begin embedding content from reference doclets in a doclet, go to Embedding Content in a Doclet.

Creating Available Content Using the Available Content Button in Reference Doclets

You can create available content quickly and easily using the **Available Content** button in the Narrative Reporting ribbon in Oracle Smart View for Office.

Using the **Available Content** button , the underlying named named range is automatically created for you based on the range you select in Excel. You have only to apply a name and optional description to the new content.

Note:

- This feature requires the 24.02+ version of the Narrative Reporting extension
- You can also create available content using Excel named ranges that you define, as described in Creating Available Content from Excel Named Ranges in Reference Doclets.

To add available content using the Available Content button:

1. Open the report package, and then open the reference doclet.

Do not check out the reference doclet. The **Available Content** button is enabled only when the reference doclet is checked in.



The reference doclet should open in Excel. If you opened the report package in Word or PowerPoint, Excel is launched when opening the reference doclet.

2. In the Excel reference doclet, select a range.

The range can be a table or a graphic, such as a chart. If you select a chart, be sure to select a blank row above and below the chart.

3. Click the Available Content button:



This launches the **Define New Available Content** dialog.

 In the Define New Available Content dialog, provide a name and optional description for the new available content.

The range you selected is entered by default in the **Excel Range** text box. Or, you can type a valid range.

5. Click OK.

The new content is available for embedding in your Word or PowerPoint doclet.

6. Optional: To disable the Automatically Resize Table Contents option in the newly created available content, see Updating Excel-based Reference Doclet Content and Properties.

The **Automatically Resize Table Contents** option is not displayed to you when creating available content using **Available Content** button. This option applies to content created from an Excel table or grid, not a chart. To disable this option, you must edit the available content and clear the option.



Creating Available Content from Excel Named Ranges in Reference Doclets

Defining Named Ranges in Excel-based Reference Doclets

This topic applies only to Excel-based reference doclets.

The reference doclet author creates report content and then defines named ranges around that content in the reference doclet. In general, range names can be created using the New Name dialog box, accessed either from the Name Manager or the Define Name items on the Formula ribbon of Excel. Find out more about range names in the Microsoft documentation.

You can define named ranges before adding a reference doclet to a report package.

Alternatively, you can define named ranges during the author phase, as described in this topic.

Note:

Prior to beginning this procedure, ensure that the author phase has been initiated.

To define named ranges for Excel-based reference doclets:

- **1.** Open the report package.
- 2. Open, and then check out the reference doclet.

The reference doclet should open in Excel. If you opened the report package in Word or PowerPoint, Excel is launched when opening the reference doclet.

- 3. Create the report content.
- 4. Add range names to selected report content.

You can add range names to any or all report content in the reference doclet. You decide which content you want to make available to authors of the report package.

A named range is valid when the named range:

- Exists within an Excel workbook.
- Is not a hidden name.
- Refers to a range of cells in a worksheet which is not hidden.
- Is not referring to a formula or constant.
- Does not have a dynamically calculated reference, for example the reference must point to an absolute range of cells, rather than relying on a reference formula or another named range to dynamically determine the range.
- Does not contain any errors, for example a "#REF!" error.



Remember, named ranges become available content in the report package.

5. **Optional:** To enable the "Repeat as header row" option within embedded Microsoft Word tables, edit the Excel Named Range to add the following syntax within the comment field:

```
NR_Headings=#
```

For example, if there are three rows within the named range which represent the table header rows, then specify:

NR Headings=3

If the named range should span multiple pages when embedded in a Word doclet, then the indicated number of rows will be repeated as column headers on each page that the table spans in the doclet.

- 6. **Optional:** As you add named ranges and edit content in reference doclets, complete the steps in Validating Fonts in Reference Doclets to ensure that fonts you are using in the reference doclet are also available in the Narrative Reporting service.
- 7. When you finish adding report content and named ranges to the report, and validating fonts, upload, and then check in the reference doclet.

The reference doclet must at least be uploaded in order to continue with the next step.

8. Continue with Adding Available Content to Excel-based Reference Doclets.

Adding Available Content to Excel-based Reference Doclets

This topic applies only to Excel-based reference doclets.

Reference doclet authors or approvers can add available content to a reference doclet. Available content is based on the named ranges specified in the reference doclets (as described in Defining Named Ranges in Excel-based Reference Doclets).

In Oracle Smart View for Office, you use the **Properties** dialog box to detect the named ranges and specify them as available content. When the reference doclet is checked in to the report package, an automated refresh is performed that updates any changes that were made in the reference doclet and to any doclets that have embedded content that points to the reference doclet.

Note:

- Prior to beginning this procedure, ensure that the author phase has been initiated.
- Doclet authors cannot add available content definitions.

To add available content to a reference doclet in Smart View:

1. Open the report package, and then open and check out the reference doclet.

The reference doclet should open in Excel. If you opened the report package in Word or PowerPoint, Excel is launched when opening the reference doclet.

2. Click **Inspect** in the Narrative Reporting ribbon ribbon to launch the **Properties** dialog box.





Alternatively, with the reference doclet selected in the report package list, click the **View Properties** link to access the **Properties** dialog box.

3. Select the Available Content tab.

 - Automatically Resize Table Contents—Selected by default. Applies to Excel ranges.

Word tables have a default option, Automatically Resize Table Content, which adjusts the column widths and row heights for optimal rendering. This resizing may introduce



discrepancies between the embedded table in a Word doclet and the source table or grid.

Clear the **Automatically Resize Table Contents** check box to minimize the variations between the embedded Word table and the source reference table or grid.

7. Click OK to go back to the Available Content tab of the Properties dialog box.

The content you just added is now available for embedding into doclets.

10. Continue with Embedding Content in a Doclet.

Optionally, to maintain or delete content in the reference doclet, continue with Updating Excel-based Reference Doclet Content and Properties or Deleting Available Content from Excel-based Reference Doclets.

Validating Fonts in Reference Doclets

The Font Validation command, available on the Narrative Reporting ribbon, provides a quick and easy way to confirm that the tables within your Excel reference doclets will render properly when inserted into a doclet as embedded content.



All fonts used in tables within your reference doclets must be installed to your Narrative Reporting service. If a font is not available within the service, the system uses a substitute font. This substitution can introduce significant visual differences when the content is either viewed online or inserted into another doclet.

With the Font Validation command, you are informed if any of the fonts used in the Excel reference doclet are not available in Narrative Reporting. You can then notify your service administrator to install the missing font files. A message also notifies you if all font files are in sync.

To validate fonts in a reference doclet:

1. From the report package, open a reference doclet.

You may check out the doclet, but it's not required to validate fonts.

2. Click the Validate Fonts icon:



If there is a discrepancy between the fonts used in the doclets and the fonts available in the service, the following dialog is displayed, listing the missing fonts:

3. Take note of the missing fonts, and click OK.



4. Request that your service administrator installs the missing fonts in your service.

Note:

In some cases, the fonts listed are not used in the reference doclet. These are usually the default Excel fonts; for example, Arial, Calibri, and Calibri Light. If you know you are not using those fonts, you can use your discretion about notifying your service administrator to install them.

Embedding Content in a Doclet

Now that Excel- and Reports-based reference doclets are added to a report package, report content has been created and named ranges defined, and available content has been identified, this content can be embedded. You can embed content in Word or PowerPoint doclets. For example, among the available content in the report package, there may be a chart, grid, Note, or Text box that an author wants to add to a doclet.

Note:

Before you begin, ensure that the doclet author phase is initiated.

To embed content in a doclet:

1. Open the doclet and check it out.

We'll call the doclet our "target" doclet.

2. Place the cursor at the point in the target doclet where the embedded content should be inserted.

In Figure 1, the solid green arrow shows the insertion point for the embedded content in a Word doclet.


Figure 22-21 Example Target Word Doclet with Cursor at Insertion Point

In a PowerPoint slide, depending on the slide format, you may be embedding a table or graph onto a slide containing no other text or graphics. In that case, you can simply click anywhere in the slide. If your embedded content must be inserted at a certain point in a slide within text, then position the cursor at the insertion point, as shown in Figure 2







3. From the target doclet, click the **Embed** button in the Narrative Reporting ribbon.

4. In Embed Contents, select the available content to embed.

Optionally, click the **Show Preview** button to view a preview of the selected available content, as described in Previewing Available Content

The selected available content is inserted, or embedded, into the doclet.



Note:

In PowerPoint, you can relocate and resize the embedded content on the slide. Once resized, the revised height of the image on the slide is retained on refresh, and the refreshed image will have the same aspect ratio as the source object.

An example of embedded content in a Word doclet is shown in Figure 4. This figure assumes that in the Home ribbon in Word, the **Show/Hide** button in the **Paragraph** group is enabled.

Note any extra blank paragraph markers before and outside of the embedded content. You can delete any extra markers to give the doclet a more polished look, if required.

- 6. **Optional:** Select an embedded content on the doclet to view its available content name, as described in Viewing Available Content Name in Doclets.
- 7. Repeat the steps above for all content you want to embed in the currently opened and checked-out target doclet.

Note:

Embedded content must not overlay or overlap other instances of embedded content.

8. When your work is completed in the current doclet, upload it, and then check it in.



9. To refresh embedded content, see Refreshing Embedded Content in a Doclet.

Note:

- If you place embedded content at the beginning of a Word doclet (the first line and first space of the Word document), you cannot embed content before the already-embedded content. You may embed content immediately after the already-embedded content, but not before it. To work around this:
 - Delete the embedded content and then re-embed the content in the correct order. To delete the embedded content, add a blank line after the embedded content, then select the blank line along with the embedded content, then right-click and select **Remove Content Control** from the context menu. Next, select the blank line and embedded content again, and then press **Delete**.
 - Place a blank line at the beginning of the Word document to ensure that, if necessary, you can insert embedded content before the first instance of embedded content.
- If you embed content consisting of a multiple line grid at the beginning of a Word doclet (the first line and first space of the Word document), you cannot delete only the embedded content. Note that you can delete a single line grid that was embedded at the beginning of a Word doclet.

To work around this, add a blank line after the embedded content, then select the blank line along with the embedded content, then right-click and select **Remove Content Control** from the context menu. Next, select the blank line and embedded content again, and then press **Delete**.

Updating Excel-based Reference Doclet Content and Properties

This topic applies only to Excel-based reference doclets.

As the author or approver of Excel-based reference doclets, you can update and modify the available content in reference doclets during the author phase.

For example, you can refresh data or reformat content. Or, you may find that the available content that you defined needs to be remapped to different report content within the reference doclet. This may occur if the doclet source was updated, or if a named range was renamed or deleted, or if the wrong content was selected previously.



- Prior to beginning this procedure, ensure that the author phase has been initiated.
- To update Reports-based content, use the Narrative Reporting web interface.

To update reference doclet content:

1. Open the report package.



2. Open, and then check out the reference doclet.

The reference doclet should open in Excel. If you opened the report package in Word or PowerPoint, Excel is launched when opening the reference doclet.

- **3. Optional:** Perform Oracle Smart View for Office tasks, such as refresh the data points or change the POV in a report.
- 4. **Optional:** Perform Excel tasks, such as reformat a grid or chart.
- 5. **Optional:** Change the name, optional description, or table column resize option of available content:
 - a. In the Narrative Reporting ribbon ribbon, click Inspect.
 - b. In the Properties dialog box, select the Embedded Contents tab.
 - c. Under Available Content, click the link for the content properties you want to change.

Deleting Available Content from Excel-based Reference Doclets

This topic applies only to Excel-based reference doclets.

In the reference doclet, you can remove content from the list of available content, without deleting the range on which it was based. This way, if you need to add the content back at later, you can do so.

Be aware that if the available content is in use as embedded content in any doclets in the report package, deleting it from the reference doclet will cause broken links in those doclets.

To delete available content from a Reports-based reference doclet, use the Narrative Reporting web interface.

Note:

Before you begin, ensure that the doclet author phase is initiated.

To delete available content from the reference doclet:



- **1.** Check out the reference doclet.
- 2. In the Narrative Reporting ribbon ribbon, click **Inspect** to launch the **Properties** dialog box.
- 3. In **Properties**, select the **Available Contents** tab.

In the example below, there are three ranges listed as available content. We'll remove one of them Yearly_Revenue.

Previewing Available Content

Before inserting embedded content into a doclet, authors can preview available content from Excel- and Reports-based reference doclets and reference files using the **Show Preview** button in the **Embed Contents** dialog.

To preview available content:

- 1. Open a doclet and check it out.
- 2. From the Narrative Reporting ribbon, click the **Embed** button:





3. In the **Embed Contents** dialog, select an item from the list of available content and click the **Show Preview** button.

From the example shown in the previous step, after selecting Income Statement Waterfall and clicking **Show Preview**, an image of the Income Statement Waterfall chart is displayed in the preview pane in the lower half of the dialog:





Note:

The **Embed Contents** dialog is not resizable. Use the scroll bars to view parts of the image that are not immediately visible.

4. Optional: Select other available content titles in the list to instantly view a preview.

In the following example, we selected Consol_BalSht. A preview image of the Consol_BalSht table is displayed:

You can select one available content at a time to preview.

- 5. **Optional:** To close the preview pane of the dialog at any time, click the **Hide Preview** button.
- 6. Once you locate the available content to embed into the doclet, click the **Embed** button at the top of the dialog.

This action inserts the selected available content in the document or slide, and then closes the dialog.

Note:

- You must first check out a doclet in order to see the Embed button on the Narrative Reporting ribbon. Click the Embed button to launch the Embed Contents dialog.
- The **Embed Contents** dialog displays best when your system's **Display settings**, under **Scale and layout**, is set to 100%.

Refreshing Embedded Content in a Doclet

As a doclet authors, you can refresh the embedded content in your doclets to keep them in sync with the content in the reference doclets and the underlying data source. For example, source data can be updated or content can be reformatted.

To refresh embedded content in a doclet:

- 1. Open, and then check out the doclet that contains the embedded content.
- 2. Perform an action:
 - To refresh embedded content only, without uploading in the same operation:

In the Narrative Reporting ribbon, select the arrow in the Refresh icon, and then Refresh Embedded Content.

You do not have to select the embedded content to refresh it. The Refresh Embedded Content command will refresh all embedded content in the checked-out doclet.

When you've finished the refresh, and made any other changes to the doclet, click Upload.

To refresh and upload the doclet immediately:

In the Narrative Reporting ribbon, click Upload.

The upload action automatically refreshes any embedded content in the target doclet.



PowerPoint: If you have resized embedded content, the revised height of the image on the slide is retained on refresh, and the refreshed image will have the same aspect ratio as the source object.

3. Check in the doclet.



Note:

When closing a doclet, particularly if the embedded content consists of an image, you may encounter a message informing you that there is content left in your clipboard, and confirming that you want to close the doclet. You may select Yes in this message; however, if you want to keep the content of the Office clipboard, ensure that you have pasted the content into another Office document before proceeding.

Viewing Available Content Name in Doclets

When you are embedding available content in your Word or PowerPoint doclet using Smart View, the available content name, or title, is available to display. This allows you to quickly identify the available content when working in a doclet.

The available content name is displayed when you select an embedded content in a doclet. For example, in Word, the name is displayed above the embedded content:

In PowerPoint, to view an embedded content name, select the embedded content, right-click and, depending on your Office version, select **View Alt Text** or **Edit Alt Text**. The title of the embedded content appears in the **Alt Text** panel.

When available content is embedded using the Narrative Reporting extension 23.10+, you can view the name whenever you select an embedded content within a doclet.

If you have content that was embedded in a Word or PowerPoint doclet using a Narrative Reporting extension version earlier than 23.10, or embedded using the Narrative Reporting web interface, the available content name is not included so the names are not displayed in the doclet. Complete the following procedure to display the embedded content names.

To display the titles of existing embedded content in a doclet:



- 1. Open a doclet containing existing embedded content and check it out.
- 2. In the Narrative Reporting ribbon, click the drop-down menu on the **Refresh** button, and select **Refresh Embedded Content**.
- 3. Upload the doclet and check it in.
- 4. When the refresh, upload, and checkin is complete, select any embedded content in the doclet to view its name.
- 5. **Optional:** Perform a checkout to continue working on the doclet.

Note:

You must open and check out a doclet in Smart View, perform a **Refresh Embedded Content**, then upload and check in the doclet to ensure that the available content name displays correctly in these situations:

- When content is embedded in a Word or PowerPoint doclet from Narrative Reporting web
- After changing the name of an available content from Narrative Reporting web or from Smart View

Removing Embedded Content from a Doclet

As a doclet author, you can remove embedded content from doclets using the Cut command in Word or PowerPoint, or the Delete key on your key board.

To remove embedded content from a doclet:

1. Open the doclet that contains the embedded content, and check it out.

This is the target doclet, not the reference doclet or any other doclet. The target doclet was discussed in Embedding Content in a Doclet.

- 2. To remove embedded content from a PowerPoint doclet:
 - a. In the target doclet, click on the embedded content to highlight it, and then press the **Delete** key.
 - **b.** Edit the slide to make any adjustments to surrounding text, if required.
- 3. To remove embedded content from a Word doclet:
 - a. add a blank carriage return either before or after the embedded content.

You will need an extra bit of plain text, such as an empty paragraph marker, when selecting the embedded content to delete.

b. Select the embedded content, along with the blank paragraph marker you created in the previous step.

Select the embedded content and the blank paragraph marker, in the same way that, using Word, you would select a table along with a line of text above or below it.

In the following image, the embedded content and the paragraph marker below it are selected. An extra blank paragraph marker at the bottom of the image is not selected.

- 5. When your work is completed in the current doclet, upload it, and then check it in.

Working with Embedded Content from Reference Files

Embedded content from a reference file allows report content to be sourced from and defined in your own local or network Excel files, *outside* of the report package, and then embedded in one or more doclets within your report package.

About Embedding Content from Reference Files

A doclet author can create their own stylized report content in Microsoft Office Excel, such as grids and charts, and insert that content into doclets using reference files. The Excel report content is automatically updated in the associated doclet whenever the Excel file is modified. You identify embeddable content in the reference file using Excel's named ranges functionality. The named range can then be embedded in a doclet. The reference file is attached and saved to a doclet and is associated only with that doclet.

Reference files are similar to reference doclets in that you can define embeddable content in them. The difference is that a reference file is available to and associated with a single doclet only whereas a reference doclet is available to all doclet authors with access to the reference doclet. A single doclet can be associated with multiple reference files.

To summarize this feature in Narrative Reporting, a doclet author can:

- Develop stylized reports within a Microsoft Office Excel workbook, using Oracle Smart View for Office or other data access methods
- Define named ranges in the workbook; the named ranges become embeddable content candidates
- Integrate named ranges within doclets
- Easily update the reference file in Excel, which automatically updates the Microsoft Office Excel report content in the doclet with which it is associated
- Incorporate multiple ranges from the same or different reference files in a doclet

Creating Available Content Using the Available Content Button in Reference Files

You can create available content from a reference file quickly and easily using the **Available Content** button in the Narrative Reporting ribbon in Oracle Smart View for Office.

Using the **Available Content** button , the underlying named named range is automatically created for you based on the range you select in Excel. You have only to apply a name and optional description to the new content.



Note:

- This feature requires the 24.02+ version of the Narrative Reporting extension
- You can also create available content using Excel named ranges that you define, as described in Creating and Embedding Available Content from Excel Named Ranges in Reference Files.

To add available content using the **Available Content** button:

- **1**. Before you begin:
 - You must have at least one named range in the Excel file you plan to use as a reference file. The range can be as simple as a single cell. It does not have to be any range that you plan to use as available content. See Defining Named Ranges in Reference Files for information on defining named ranges.
 - If you have not already done so, register the Excel file with the doclet, as described in Registering Reference Files with a Doclet, omitting step 6. You do not need to perform this step if you use the procedure in this topic to create available content.
- 2. Open the report package, and then open the doclet to which the reference file is registered.

Do not check out the doclet. The **Available Content** button is enabled only when the doclet is checked in.

The reference doclet should open in Excel. If you opened the report package in Word or PowerPoint, Excel is launched when opening the reference doclet.

3. Click **Inspect** in the Narrative Reporting ribbon to open the **Properties** dialog box.



You can also select the doclet in the report package panel, and then click **Properties** to open the **Properties** dialog box.


- 4. In **Properties**, select the **Embedded Content** tab, _____, and then click on **Available Sources**.
- 5. Under Available Sources, click on the reference file name to launch the Excel file.

In the following example, clicking on **Inventory Trend.xlsx** launches the Excel file named Inventory Trend.xlsx.

In the Narrative Reporting ribbon, notice that only two buttons are displayed: **Upload**, which should be disabled because doclet from which you launched the reference file should not be checked out; and the **Available Content** button, which is enabled.



If the **Available Content** button is not enabled, ensure that the doclet to which the reference file is registered is checked in, and then close Excel and repeat the previous steps.

6. Once the Excel reference file is launched, and the **Available Content** button is enabled, then, in the Excel reference file, select a range.

The range can be a table or a graphic, such as a chart. If you select a chart, be sure to select a blank row above and below the chart.

7. Click the Available Content button.

This launches the Define New Available Content dialog:

8. In the **Define New Available Content** dialog, provide a name and optional description for the new available content.

The range you selected is entered by default in the **Excel Range** text box. Or, you can type a valid range.

9. Click OK.

The new content is available for embedding in your Word or PowerPoint doclet.

10. Optional: To disable the **Automatically Resize Table Contents** option in the newly created available content, see Updating Excel-based Reference Doclet Content and Properties.

The **Automatically Resize Table Contents** option is not displayed to you when creating available content using **Available Content** button. This option applies to content created from an Excel table or grid, not a chart. To disable this option, you must edit the available content and clear the option.

Defining Named Ranges in Reference Files

The reference file is an Excel file that can be located in a folder on a local drive or network drive, outside of the report package.

The doclet author creates Excel report content and then defines named ranges around that content. In general, range names can be created using the New Name dialog box, accessed



either from the Name Manager or the Define Name items on the Formula ribbon of Excel. Find out more about range names in the Microsoft documentation.

This Excel file is a potential reference file.

Define named ranges in your reference file before you begin working with them in a doclet.

To define named ranges for reference files:

- 1. In Excel, create the report content.
- 2. Add range names to selected report content.

You can add range names to any or all report content in the reference file. You decide which content you want to make available.

A named range is valid when the named range:

- Exists within an Excel workbook.
- Is not a hidden name.
- Refers to a range of cells in a worksheet which is not hidden.
- Is not referring to a formula or constant.
- Does not have a dynamically calculated reference, for example the reference must point to an absolute range of cells, rather than relying on a reference formula or another named range to dynamically determine the range.
- Does not contain any errors, for example a "#REF!" error.

Remember, named ranges from your reference file become candidates for embedded content to you as the doclet author.

3. **Optional:** To enable the "Repeat as header row" option within embedded Microsoft Word tables, edit the Excel Named Range to add the following syntax within the comment field:

NR Headings=#

For example, if there are three rows within the named range which represent the table header rows, then specify:

NR_Headings=3

If the named range should span multiple pages when embedded in a Word doclet, then the indicated number of rows will be repeated as column headers on each page that the table spans in the doclet.

4. Save the Excel file.

Registering Reference Files with a Doclet

There is a two-part process for registering a reference file with a checked-out doclet, and then, separately, embedding the available content as needed throughout a doclet.

The procedure in this topic covers registering content from a reference file with a checked-out doclet. See Embedding Reference File Content in a Doclet for instructions on embedding content from the registered reference file.



Note:

Before you begin, you should have established ranges in the target reference file using Excel's Name Manager feature, as described in Defining Named Ranges in Reference Files. The Excel file should be closed when performing the procedure in this topic.

You can also register available content and then embed the content in one procedure. For more information, see Adding and Embedding Available Content from Reference Files.

To register a reference file with a doclet:

- 1. If you have not already done so, open the report package, and then open and check out the doclet to which you want to register a reference file.
- 2. Click Inspect in the Narrative Reporting ribbon to open the Properties dialog box.



You can also select the doclet in the report package panel, and then click **Properties** to open the **Properties** dialog box.

- 3. In Properties , click the Embedded Content tab, and then click the Available Sources link.
- 4. On the Available Sources tab of the Embedded Contents dialog, click , and then in the Add Reference File dialog, click Choose File.
- 5. Navigate to the Excel file to register as a reference file, select it, and click **Open** to return to the **Add Reference File** dialog.

Under **Source Objects**, the named ranges in the Excel file are listed. These ranges can be selected as available content, which can later be embedded. For example, in Figure 1, the Excel file that was selected, Current Data.xlsx, contains five named ranges; therefore, these named ranges can be selected as available content and later, they can be embedded in the doclet.

Remember, the ranges listed above were specified as named ranges earlier in Defining Named Ranges in Reference Files.

6. Click the range names (not the check box) that you want to make available for embedding in the doclet.

The check mark that appears next to the range name you click shows that the range is now registered with the doclet. For example, in Figure 2, we selected the range named "Actual" to register with the doclet.

You can choose any number of ranges listed under **Source Objects**, but in this scenario, we are selecting only one.





7. Click **OK** to close the **Add Reference File** dialog box.

You are returned to the **Embedded Contents** tab of the **Properties** dialog. The reference file is now registered with the doclet, as shown in Figure 3.

Note that you can choose to embed content in the doclet at this point, from this dialog box. But this procedure is looking at registering content only. See Embedding Reference File Content in a Doclet for instructions on embedding available content from the registered reference file.

- 8. **Optional:** Repeat the steps starting from step 3 for any other reference files you want to register with the current doclet.
- 9. When finished registering Excel files as reference files with the current doclet, click the X in the upper-right corner of the **Properties** dialog to close it.
- **10.** Upload the doclet and check it in.
- **11. Optional:** Repeat this entire procedure to register reference files with other doclets in the report package.

Continue with Embedding Reference File Content in a Doclet.

Embedding Reference File Content in a Doclet

In Registering Reference Files with a Doclet, you registered named ranges as available content from an Excel file that was outside of the report package, making that Excel file a reference file. The reference file can be located on a network drive or a local drive.

Now we will embed content from the reference file into a doclet. The process is the same whether you are embedding content into a Word or a PowerPoint doclet.

To embed content from a reference file into a doclet:

1. Open the report package and, if you have already not done so, open and check out the doclet to which you previously registered a reference file.

Note:

You must embed reference file content in the doclet to which you registered the content. You cannot embed the content into other doclets.

- 2. In the doclet, place your cursor at the point in the text where you want to embed the available content from the reference file.
- 3. In the Narrative Reporting ribbon, click the **Embed** button to launch the **Embed Contents** dialog.
- 4. In **Embed Contents**, select the available content to embed.

Optionally, click the **Show Preview** button to view a preview of the selected available content, as described in Previewing Available Content.

In Figure 1, the available content, "Actual," is selected.

5. Click **Embed** to embed the available content into the doclet.

Note:

In PowerPoint, you can relocate and resize the embedded content on the slide. Once resized, the revised height of the image on the slide is retained on refresh, and the refreshed image will have the same aspect ratio as the source object.

- 6. **Optional:** Select the embedded content on the doclet to view its available content name, as described in Viewing Available Content Name in Doclets.
- 7. **Optional:** Repeat this procedure starting with step 3 to embed any other available content displayed in the **Embed Contents** dialog into the current doclet.
- 8. When finished, upload the doclet and check it in.

Adding and Embedding Available Content from Reference Files

Once you have defined named ranges in your Excel reference file, you can specify ranges as available content, and then instantly embed that content in your doclet using the procedure in this topic (bypassing the two-part procedure described in Registering Reference Files with a Doclet and Embedding Reference File Content in a Doclet).

In this topic, we are going to add available content from the Excel file we used in Registering Reference Files with a Doclet. In that scenario, we added one named range as available content. However, in that Excel file, there were four other named ranges that could be added as available content. In this procedure, we'll add named ranges from that Excel reference file as available content and then embed them.

The process described in this topic is the same whether you are embedding content into a Word or a PowerPoint doclet.

To add content from a reference file to a doclet and then embed it:

1. Open the report package, and then open and check out the doclet.



Note: Be sure to position your cursor at the point where you want to insert the embedded content that you will be working with in this procedure.

2. In the Narrative Reporting ribbon, click the **Embed** button to launch the **Embed Contents** dialog box.

Figure 1 shows one available content, "Actual," sourced from the reference file, Current Data.xlsx.

Optionally, click the **Show Preview** button to view a preview of the selected available content, as described in Previewing Available Content.

- 3. Click 🛨 to launch the Embed New Content dialog.
- 4. In **Embed New Content**, click the drop-down menu in the **Source** field and select an option, as shown in Figure 2.
 - Local File—After selecting Local File, click Choose File, browse to the location of the Excel file that you plan to use as a reference file, and then select the file.
 - A reference file—If you want to add more available content from a previously registered reference file in the list, select the file from the **Source** drop-down menu.

With either selection, the list of ranges that can be selected for available content is displayed under **Source Objects**.

For the example in this topic, we'll select the Current Data.xlsx file that was using previously in Registering Reference Files with a Doclet and Embedding Reference File Content in a Doclet, and now lists four ranges under **Source Objects** that can be added as available content, as shown in Figure 2 in the next step.

5. In the **Embed New Content** dialog, click the source object name (not the check box) that you want to embed in the doclet.



In Figure 3, the source object named "All" is clicked and the check box is selected.

- 7. **Optional:** Select an embedded content on the doclet to view its available content name, as described in Viewing Available Content Name in Doclets.
- 8. **Optional:** Repeat this procedure, starting at step 2 for each additional available content from a refererence file that you want to embed.
- 9. When finished, upload the doclet and check it in.

Managing Named Ranges for Reference Files

As a doclet author, you can rename a named range in a reference file or delete a reference file. For example, as a doclet author, you can delete a reference file that is no longer in use.

To manage named ranges in a reference file:

- 1. Open the report package and, if you have already not done so, open and check out the doclet that contains the reference file you would like to modify.
- 2. Click Inspect in the Narrative Reporting ribbon to open the Properties dialog box.
- 3. In Properties , click the Embedded Content tab, Available Files link.
- 4. To change the display name, optional description, and table column resize setting of named ranges in the reference file:
 - a. Click ▼ next to the reference file with the named ranges you want to work with, and select Manage Report Content.
 - Doptional: In the Manage Report Content dialog, click on the reference file name link to expand it, and make any necessary changes to the Display Name and Description fields; and enable or clear the Automatically Resize Table Contents check box, as you require, and then click OK.

Disable the resizing option on the **Automatically Resize Table Contents** option to minimize the variations between the embedded Word table and the source reference table or grid.

In the following example, the content named "Raw Materials" can be renamed, the optional description can be modified, and the **Automatically Resize Table Contents** check box may be cleared.

- 5. To delete a reference file:
 - a. Click $\mathbf{\nabla}$ next to the reference file to delete, and select **Delete**.
 - b. At the prompt, click **Yes** to confirm the delete action.

Deleting the reference file means that any embedded content from that reference file remains in the doclet, but the links between the embedded content and the reference file is now broken. Any further changes you make to the reference file will not be reflected in the embedded content in the doclet. For this reason, use care when deleting reference files.

- 6. When you are finished with managing named ranges and or deleting reference files from a doclet, close the **Properties** dialog box, **Embedded Content** tab.
- 7. Upload and check in the doclet.

Updating Available Content in a Reference File

As the reference file author, you may want to update existing content in a reference file.

For example, you may need to refresh a profitability report table with new data. Any updates made in the reference file are automatically refreshed in the doclet that embeds the report content when the reference file is uploaded back to the doclet.

To update content in a reference file:

- 1. Select and check out the doclet that contains the reference file you would like to modify.
- 2. Click **Inspect** in the Narrative Reporting ribbon to open the **Properties** dialog box.
- 3. In Properties , click the Embedded Content tab, Sources link.
- Click ▼ next to the reference file with the content you want to work with, and select Download.

The file is downloaded by default to your **Downloads** folder.



Alternatively, on the **Available Sources** tab, click on the file name link. This downloads the file to the **Downloads** folder and opens the file in Excel.

You can close the Properties dialog in the doclet for now.

5. If not already open, open the file in Excel, make the updates and changes you require, and then save the file.

Note that after saving the file, you may click the **Upload** button in the Narrative Reporting ribbon. Once the file is uploaded, close Excel and then proceed to step 10.

Alternatively, to upload files using the Properties dialog, proceed to the next step.

- 6. Return to the report package doclet you opened in the first step and, in the Narrative Reporting ribbon, click **Inspect**.
- In the Properties dialog, Embedded Contents tab, select Available Files, then click next to the reference file containing the content you just modified, and select Upload.
- 8. In the **Upload** dialog box, click **Choose File** and navigate to the location of the modified Excel reference file and select it, then click **Open**.
- 9. Click **OK** to close the **Upload** dialog, then close the **Properties** dialog. You may also close Excel.
- To refresh the embedded content from the recently uploaded reference file, in the Narrative Reporting ribbon, select **Refresh**, and then **Refresh Embedded Content**.
- **11.** Upload and check in the doclet.

Remapping Content within Reference Files

As a reference file author, you may find that the available content that you defined needs to be remapped to different report content within the file source. This may occur if the reference file was updated or a named range was renamed or deleted.

You can remap the available content to other available content within the reference file.

Note:

Prior to beginning this procedure, ensure that the author phase has been initiated.

To remap available content within a reference file:

1. If you have not already done so, open the report package, and then open and check out the doclet that contains the reference file to update.

The impacted doclet is the doclet that is associated with a reference file in which you want to remap available content.

The doclet should open in Word or PowerPoint. If you opened the report package in Excel, Word or PowerPoint is launched when opening the impacted doclet.

2. Click **Inspect** in the Narrative Reporting ribbon to launch the **Properties** dialog box.






Alternatively, with the doclet selected in the report package list, click the **View Properties** link to access the **Properties** dialog box.

- 3. Select to display the **Embedded Content** tab of the **Properties** dialog.
- 4. In the **Embedded Content** tab, click the **Available Sources** link.

Note that you can view the available content in use by clicking on the arrow next to "Available Source Objects."

6. In the **Remap** dialog, click on the associated **Select** link for the reference file with content to remap.

A list of available content that is not already mapped is displayed. In the following illustration, the list contains one item, OpExp.

- 8. Repeat step 5 through step 8 for each available content item that you want to remap.
- 9. When you're finished remapping content, click **OK** to close the **Remap** dialog, and then exit the **Properties** dialog.

Working with Variables

In a report package, variables provide centralized maintenance of common text, numbers and dates that are displayed in doclets throughout a report package. Variables can also be used to reference content between doclets, such as inserting Excel data from a reference doclet into a Word paragraph or PowerPoint text box.

About Variables

Report package variables may be created using either Narrative Reporting on the web, or the Narrative Reporting extension for Oracle Smart View for Office. However, you can only define reference variable values in Smart View.

Once created, use Smart View to insert the variables into a doclet (in headers, tables, cells, or paragraphs).

Two types of variables are available:



• **Static** variables use static input that is defined by the user, such as date labels or a set value, which can be used throughout the report package. These static variables can be easily updated, and all doclet instances of the variable value reflect the change. The static variables help to centrally maintain common dates, numbers and text across the Report Package document content.

In the list of variables in the Smart View Panel, this icon, (X) represents static variables.

• **Reference** variables are created by referencing another doclet or reference file within the report package as the source, and selecting the value for the variable, such as text in a Word paragraph or an Excel cell value. Reference variables cannot be sourced from any PowerPoint content. If the source document is subsequently updated, those changes are automatically updated in the inserted instances of the variable in the report package. Reference variables can be used to insert Excel cell values into a Word or PowerPoint paragraph, or to create Excel formulas to implement cross-footing rules for increased data accuracy, or to create directional words for the report narrative, such as "an increase" or "a decrease".

In the list of variables in the Smart View Panel, this icon, (#) represents reference variables.

Variables can be created by any report package owner or doclet author.

To view a list of all variables defined for a report package, first, open a report package. From the Report Package panel, change the drop-down from **Report Center** to **Variables**:

The list of available variables appears. You can view details such as variable type, the number of times the variable is used in the report package (the blue circle containing a number), and the source for reference variables, as shown in Figure 1.

From the Variables panel, you can:

- Create a variable
- Edit a variable
- Select a variable to insert into a doclet
- Filter to view only static or reference variables
- Filter to view only those variables already in use in the report package


For report packages containing more than 50 variables, use these controls at the top of the panel to locate variables:

Use the left and right arrows to navigate through the pages



• Use the page number drop-down list to jump to a specific page





After the variable has been created, the variable is managed as follows:

- The report package owner can delete and edit all variables in the report package.
- A doclet author can only delete and edit variables that they created.




- For reference variables, any user with Write access to the source location of the variable value can update that variable value.
- Author users have Read access to variables that they did not create, so they can see a list of all variables and insert them into doclets to which they have Author access.

Creating Static Variables

A static variable is a string of text, such as a label or paragraph, which can be inserted into a report package doclet.

As an example, if you create a static variable for the current month called "CurrentMonth", you might enter the text, "August 2016". When you roll over to the report for the next month, it is a simple matter to update the text in the CurrentMonth variable to "September 2016," and the change is propagated to all instances of that variable throughout the report package.

The static variable can also be created and defined in the Narrative Reporting web interface; however, it must be inserted into the doclet using Oracle Smart View for Office.



To create a static variable:

1. Open a report package, and in the drop-down list in the Report Package panel, select **Variables**



2. In the Report Package panel, click **Create New Variable**, **+**, and then select **Static Variable** from the drop-down list.

- 3. Define the variable as follows:
 - a. Enter a Name for the variable.

The name must be unique across variables within the report package, and should be descriptive of the variable to make it easier to find.

- **b.** Optional: Enter a Description for the variable.
- c. In the Value field, enter the text for the static variable.
 - Static variables can have a maximum size of 255 characters.
 - The text string can be a label or paragraph, and the entire string will be displayed as entered in the report package.

In the following example, the user created a static variable with the Name of "CurrentMonth", a Description of "The current month and year for the report", and a Value of "August 2016". This variable can be inserted in multiple locations showing the date of the current month in different usages, as shown below:

This variable can be inserted in multiple locations showing the date of the current month in different usages; for example:

- Insert the static variable into the text displayed in an internal Operating Expenses doclet that reads "For the month of <<CurrentMonth>>".
- Insert the static variable into a paragraph in footnote of any of the doclets that reads: "During <CurrentMonth>>,"

The next month, to update all instances of the Current Month date in the report package, modify the variable value to use the new month; for example, September 2016. This option ensures that the change is implemented uniformly, and no incorrect dates for the value remain.

4. Click the **OK** button,

To cancel creating the variable, click the Cancel button, X



5. Insert the variable into a doclet, following the procedure in Inserting Variables in a Doclet.

Creating Reference Variables

Reference variables enable you to reference a source in another document (doclet or reference file) within the report package, such as a single Excel cell or selected Word text, and use them as reference variable value sources in your report package doclet. You can then insert the reference variable into one or more doclets. When the reference variable source value is updated, all inserted instances of the variable are automatically updated.

Note:

- Images and shapes are not supported as reference variable values.
- Reference variable values cannot be blank. The Excel cell must contain a value when defining or updating a reference variable.
- Reference variable values cannot be sourced from other reference variables.
- Reference variable values cannot be sourced from embedded content, where a range from an Excel reference doclet is embedded in Word or PowerPoint.
- Reference variables cannot be sourced from any PowerPoint content.
- Reference variable values sourced in Word can have a maximum size of 2,000 characters. Reference variable values sourced in Word cannot be inserted into Excel if the number of characters is greater than 255.
- Reference variable values must be single line only. In an Excel spreadsheet, select only one cell. In Word, select text from only one line or one table cell.
- Reference variable values sourced from Excel can have a maximum size of 255 characters.
- Reference variable values sourced from Excel include all of the number formatted text within the cell (for example, 123,456). If inserted into another Excel worksheet, the variable value will be inserted as text and not a numeric value.

For example, use Excel formulas in Oracle Smart View for Office to generate reference variable values:

 Use an IF function to return a string of "increase" or "decrease," or "above" or "below", if a data value increases or decreases between the current and prior period. Insert the Excel-based directional word variable or results into a Word paragraph.

```
=IF(B8<0, "below", "above")
```

 Use an IF function, or simple subtraction, to compare the occurrence of a data value (such as "Revenues" or "Summary Income Statement") that is displayed multiple times throughout a report package.



```
='Summary Income Statement'!B4
```

Use Excel formulas to calculate the variance or variance percent of changing data values from period to period, and insert that variance into a Word paragraph.

='Summary Income Statement'!B4-'Summary Income Statement'!C4

If the value source is updated, each instance of the variable will reflect the current information when the variable is updated in Smart View.

The name and description of the reference variable can also be created in the Narrative Reporting web interface; however, you must add the variable source and value in Smart View, and the variable must be inserted into the doclet using Smart View.

Note:

Before you begin, ensure that you have opened a report package, and opened and checked out a doclet.

To create a reference variable:

1. Open a report package, and then open and check out a Word doclet, a Word doclet that contains a reference file, or an Excel reference doclet.

You can just open a report package to create a reference variable, without checking out a doclet, and define the reference variable name and description; but the doclet needs to be checked out to define a source value from the doclet as the reference variable value.

2. In the doclet or reference file, select the Excel cell or Word text or table cell to reference in your new reference variable.

For example, in the following grid, cell **B13** is selected. The value in cell, including the data source POV, is the value for our new reference variable.

3. In the drop-down list in the Report Package panel, select Variables.



4. In the Report Package panel, click the **Create New Variable** button, **+**, and then select **Reference Variable** from the drop-down list.

The report package panel displays **Create Reference Variable**, where you enter the variable name and value, and an optional description. As you can see, the value is already pre-populated with the value we selected in step 2

- 5. Define the reference variable as follows:
 - a. Enter a Name for the reference variable.

The name must be unique across all variables within the report package, and should be descriptive of the variable to make it easier to find.

- **b. Optional:** Enter a **Description** for the reference variable.
- c. Click \Rightarrow to use the value of the currently selected cell as the reference value.

Optionally, you can select another cell on the sheet, verify that the value is changed in the Value field, and click \Rightarrow

- 6. Click the **OK** button, **W**, to add the variable to the report package.
- 7. Upload and check in the doclet or reference file for the variable value to be added to the system.



Note:

If the doclet or reference file is not checked in, the value will continue to be displayed in the variables panel as Not Committed for the current doclet and other doclets in Smart View. In the Narrative Reporting web interface, the value is displayed as #Missing.

Inserting Variables in a Doclet

After static and reference variables are created and checked in, they are ready for authors to use in Word or PowerPoint doclets in headers, tables, cells, or paragraphs, or in Excel doclet cells.

Note:

- Oracle recommends limiting the number of variables inserted into an individual doclet to 250 or less. If a doclet contains more than 250 variables, then you may encounter extended processing time while checking in a doclet or, in some cases, the doclet check-in may fail.
- When working with Oracle Smart View for Office and the Narrative Reporting extension on the 32-bit version of Office 365, an intermittent issue occurs when inserting a variable into a PowerPoint doclet from the Variables panel. See Working with Variables in Smart View for PowerPoint to work around this issue.

To insert a variable into a doclet:

- 1. Open a report package, and then open and check out a doclet.
- 2. In the drop-down list in the Report Package panel, select Variables.



Once you select **Variables**, the list of available variables are displayed in the Smart View Panel.Figure 1 shows a short list of variables. See Figure 1 for another example list of variables in a report package.






Figure 22-35 Example List of Variables Available for a Report Package

- 3. In the doclet, select the point where you want to insert the variable.
- 4. From the list of variables, select the variable to insert.

When you select a variable in the list, three menu options for the variable are displayed, as shown in Figure 1.

5. Click 🕈 to insert the variable at the selected point in the doclet.

The example in Figure 2 shows a portion of a Word doclet with the variable insertion point highlighted in yellow. The Insert Variable button, , is circled and the button tooltip text is displayed.

- 6. When finished inserting variables into the current doclet, upload and check in the doclet.
- 7. Repeat the steps in this procedure for each doclet that requires that you insert static and reference variables.

Working with Variables in Smart View for PowerPoint

When working with Oracle Smart View for Office and the Narrative Reporting extension on the 32-bit version of Office 365, an intermittent issue occurs when inserting a variable into a PowerPoint doclet from the Variables panel. At times, the variable is not inserted correctly and only a blank space is inserted. Other times, the variable inserts correctly.

Workaround: Variables will insert without issues if you turn off Windows Clipboard history. Follow these steps to turn off the "Clipboard history" setting.

- 1. From the Windows Start button, select Settings.
- 2. Search for "Clipboard" and select Clipboard settings.
- 3. In the Clipboard settings page, set the Clipboard history option to Off.
- 4. Start PowerPoint and connect to Narrative Reporting.
- 5. Open a PowerPoint report package, and then open and check out a PowerPoint doclet.
- 6. Insert variables in the PowerPoint doclet.

Working with Variables in Smart View for PowerPoint

When working with Oracle Smart View for Office and the Narrative Reporting extension on the 32-bit version of Office 365, an intermittent issue occurs when inserting a variable into a PowerPoint doclet from the Variables panel. At times, the variable is not inserted correctly and only a blank space is inserted. Other times, the variable inserts correctly.

Workaround: Variables will insert without issues if you turn off Windows Clipboard history. Follow these steps to turn off the "Clipboard history" setting.

- 1. From the Windows Start button, select Settings.
- 2. Search for "Clipboard" and select Clipboard settings.
- 3. In the Clipboard settings page, set the Clipboard history option to Off.
- 4. Start PowerPoint and connect to Narrative Reporting.
- 5. Open a PowerPoint report package, and then open and check out a PowerPoint doclet.
- 6. Insert variables in the PowerPoint doclet.

Searching for Variables

Use the search in the Variables panel to locate variables to insert, modify, highlight, or delete



To search for variables:

- **1.** Open the report package.
- 2. In the drop-down list in the Report Package panel, select **Variables**.



The list of variables available in the report package is displayed in the panel.

The magnifying glass icon, \bigcirc signifies the variable search text box.

- 3. Optional: To search from a filtered list of variables, click any of the filter links: Static, Reference, or In Use (see Filtering Variables).
- 4. Enter search criteria in the variables search text box, and then click ${\color{black} {\diamondsuit}}$.

The search results are listed.

In the following example, a search for variables that contain Plan in their name yielded the following results.

Note:

Wildcards symbols, such as asterisks, are not required and should not be used unless they are part of the variable name.

5. To clear the search results list and restore the full list of variables, click \times in the variables search text box, or click the **All** filter link.

Alternatively, click the **Static**, **Reference**, or **In Use** filter link to return to a filtered list of variables.

Locating the Source of Reference Variable Values

You can easily locate a reference variable value's source within your doclets using the **View Source** action available from the **Sourced** tab in the Variables panel in Oracle Smart View for Office.

From the **Sourced** tab in the Variables panel, you can view all reference variables sourced from the current doclet.

Then, also from the **Sourced** tab, use the **View Source** action on the \mathbf{v} drop-down menu for a selected variable to locate a reference variable value's source in a



reference doclet or reference file. In Word- or Excel-based doclets, you can also locate a reference variable value's source if the variable is sourced from the doclet.

Before you begin, review the items in Guidelines for Locating Variable Source Values.

Note:

For the following procedure, let's assume you're starting at the report package level, before you have opened any doclets. Note, however, that you can also begin this procedure from any opened doclet.

To locate the source of a reference variable value:

- 1. Open a report package, and in the drop-down list in the Report Package panel, select **Variables**.
- 2. In the Variables panel, All tab, check the list for the variable that you want to source, and note source doclet name.


For example, using the Vision sample application in Narrative Reporting, for the reference variable, NetRevenue_Value, the source doclet is an Excel file, Vision Statements, which is a reference doclet.



3. Perform an action:

- For a variable sourced in a reference doclet, open the reference doclet.
- For a variable sourced from a reference file, open the doclet to which the reference file is registered, and then download the reference file and open it.
- For a variable sourced from a Word- or Excel-based doclet, open the doclet.
- 4. If you plan to make any changes, check out the doclet you have just opened.
- To view all variables sourced from the currently opened reference doclet or reference file, in the Variables panel, select the **Sourced** tab.
 You would also select the **Sourced** tab if the source is a Word- or Excel-based doclet.
- 6. In the **Sourced** tab, locate the variable for which you want to view the source, click the **More Actions** button, **v** and, from the drop-down menu, select **View Source**.





For Excel reference doclets or files, Smart View immediately takes you to the location of the cell that is the source of the variable, regardless of the sheet you're on in the workbook.

In Word- or Excel- based doclets, Smart View takes immediately takes you to the text source of the refrence variable (Word), or the cell that is the source of the variable.

In the following example of the NetRevenue_Value reference variable, Smart View takes us to cell B6 on the Rules tab of the Vision Statements reference doclet. Excel's formula bar shows us that this variable is referencing cell B4 in the Summary Income Statement tab of the Vision Statements workbook.

7. Repeat this procedure starting with step 2 for each reference variable for which you want to view its value source.

Guidelines for Locating Variable Source Values

- Variables cannot be sourced from PowerPoint. Therefore, the View Source action is not available in PowerPoint-based doclets.
- Use the same procedure outlined above when working with reference files or Word- or Excel-based doclets with these considerations:
 - When working with reference files, first open the Word- or Excel-based doclet to which the reference file is registered, and then download the reference file.
 - If no variables are sourced from the Word- or Excel-based doclet, then the View
 Source action is disabled. Use the variable highlight action to locate variables used (not sourced) in the doclet, if needed.
- This feature requires the 23.12+ update of Narrative Reporting web and the Narrative Reporting extension for Smart View.

Editing Variables

Once created, you can easily edit static and reference variables in Oracle Smart View for Office.

To edit variables:

- **1.** Open a report package.
 - If you plan to edit a static variable, you do not need to check out any doclets.




- If you plan to edit a reference variable, open and check out the Word or Excel reference doclet or reference file from which the reference variable is sourced.
- 2. In the drop-down list in the Report Package panel, select Variables.




The list of variables available in the report package is displayed in the panel.

3. Select a variable and click the Edit button, 🖉 .



The **Edit** button, \checkmark , displays whenever you hover over a variable from the list. In the following illustration, the CurrentMonth variable, a static variable, is selected for editing.





After you click \checkmark , the **Name**, **Description**, and **Value** fields are displayed. Here is an example of a static variable that is ready to edit:

- 4. Perform an action:
 - To modify a static variable, type over the existing entries in the Name, Description, or Value fields as required, and then click series.

The static variable is updated as soon as you click \Im .

- To modify a reference variable:
 - **a.** Ensure that you have opened and checked out the reference doclet or reference file from which the reference variable is sourced.
 - b. Type over the existing entries in the Name and Description fields, as required.
 - c. To change the Value field, select the text in a Word doclet or the appropriate cell in the Excel reference doclet, and then click \Rightarrow .

When editing a reference variable, remember these guidelines:

- Images and shapes are not supported as reference variable values.
- Reference variable values cannot be sourced from other reference variables.
- Reference variable values cannot be sourced from embedded content, where a range from an Excel reference doclet is embedded in Word or PowerPoint.
- Reference variable values can contain only 255 characters.
- Reference variable values must be single line only. In an Excel spreadsheet, select only one cell. In Word, select text from only one line or one table cell.
- Reference variables cannot be sourced from any PowerPoint content.
- d. After you have finished editing the reference variables for the checked-out doclet or reference file, upload the source document and check it in.

Once the doclets or reference files are checked in, the variables with their updated values are available to other report package authors.

5. Repeat the preceding steps for all variables that require editing.

Filtering Variables

For easier viewing, you can filter the list of a variables in a report package. The default filter is All, meaning all variables, static and reference, are displayed in the variables list.

Filtering categories are:

• All



- Static
- Reference
- In Use

To filter variables:

1. Open a report package, and then open a doclet.

You do not need to check out a doclet in order to filter variables.

2. In the drop-down list in the Report Package panel, select Variables.

- All—Displays all variable types, static and reference.
- Static—Displays only static variables.
- Reference—Displays only reference variables
- **In Use**—Displays only those variables that are in use in the currently-opened doclet.

To help to locate the variables in use in the current doclet, you may choose the highlight option on individual variables, as described in Highlighting Variables in Doclets

Highlighting Variables in Doclets

You can quickly view the instances of a variable in a doclet using the Highlight command for the selected variable.

To highlight a variable in a doclet:

1. Open a report package, and then open a doclet.

You do not need to check out a doclet in order to highlight variables.

2. In the drop-down list in the Report Package panel, select Variables.







- 3. Select a variable from the list in the Smart View Panel.
- 4. Click the **Options** button, **v** and, from the drop-down menu, select **Highlight**.



In Figure 1, the CurrentMonth variable, a static variable, is selected in the Smart View Panel. After selecting **Highlight**, the CurrentMonth variable is highlighted in the doclet at the left.





5. To unhighlight the selected variable, click the **Options** button, **▼** and, from the dropdown menu, select **Unhighlight**.

Inspecting Variables

You can inspect for variables at the doclet level, or you can inspect individual variables selected from the variables list.

To inspect for variables:

- **1.** To inspect for variables in a doclet:
 - a. Open a report package, select a doclet, and, optionally, open it.

You can inspect for variables without opening the doclet.

b. In the report package panel, click **View Properties** to open the **Properties** dialog box.

If you opened a doclet, you can also click **Inspect** in Narrative Reporting ribbon to open the **Properties** dialog box.

c. In the **Properties** dialog box, select the **Variables** tab,

The **Variables** tab shows you the variables available in a doclet. The blue circle next to a variable contains the number of times that variable is in use in the doclet. For example, here is the variables tab from a doclet in a report package:

- d. Click the X in the top right corner to close the **Properties** dialog box.
- 2. To view the properties of an individual variable:
 - a. Open a report package, and then open a doclet.

You do not need to check out a doclet in order to highlight variables.

b. In the drop-down list in the Report Package panel, select Variables.

- c. Select a variable from the list in the Smart View Panel.
- d. Click the **Options** button, **v** and, from the drop-down menu, select **Inspect**.

The **Properties** dialog box for the selected variable is displayed.

The Properties tab shows you basic information about the variable, including whether it is a static or reference variable. It also shows you the number of times the variable is used in the report package. Following are the example properties of a static and a reference variable.

- e. Select the **History** tab, 🕒 to view who made changes to the variable, and what changes were made.
- f. Click the X in the top right corner to close the **Properties** dialog box.

Unlinking Reference Variables

Unlinking applies to reference variables only. When you unlink a reference variable, Narrative Reporting removes the association between the reference variable value and the source value in the doclet, and sets the value to #Missing.

To unlink a variable:

- **1.** Open a report package, and then open and check out a doclet.
- 2. In the drop-down list in the Report Package panel, select Variables.

3. In the Smart View Panel, select the reference variable to unlink from the list and click the **Edit Variable** button,

The **Edit Variable** button, *X*, displays whenever you select a variable from the list.

4. In the variable editing area, click the **Unlink** button, ³²⁴.

A warning message is displayed to advise that the selected variable will be permanently removed from the doclet.

Though the variable values in the selected doclet are no longer managed by Narrative Reporting, the #Missing text remains in the doclet. If required, manually remove the #Missing text from the doclet.

- 5. Repeat the preceding steps for any other variables that you want to unlink.
- 6. When finished, upload check in the doclet.

Deleting Variables

You can delete variables from the report package.

To delete a variable from a report package:

- **1.** Open the report package from which you want to delete a variable.
- 2. In the drop-down list in the Report Package panel, select Variables.

3. Ensure that the variable is no longer used in the report package.

🔷 Tip:

To quickly check whether a variable is in use in a doclet, select a doclet in the Report Package panel. In the Action Panel, select **Properties**, and then select

the **Variables** tab, . The variables that are used in the selected doclet are listed. If required, you must search for each instance of the variable text in the doclets and manually delete it, and make any necessary edits in the doclet.

4. Click the **Options** button, **v** and, from the drop-down menu, select **Delete**.

5. Click **Yes** in the warning message to permanently delete the variable.



If you did not remove the variable from the doclet text, as described in step 3, the variable is removed from the listing on the variables list, but the variable text is not automatically removed from the doclets. You must search for each instance of the variable text in the doclets and manually delete it, and make any necessary edits in the doclet.

Note:

To reinstate a variable, you must re-create it, and then add the variable as required to the appropriate doclets.

Working with Excel Doclets in PDF-based Report Packages

In PDF-based report packages, you can specify Excel workbooks as regular doclets. Authors and administrators can edit the content in Excel doclets and select sheets that will become part of the final report package.

To work with Excel doclets in PDF-based report packages:

- 1. In the PDF-based report package, open and check out the Excel doclet to work with.
- 2. In the Narrative Reporting ribbon, click Select Sheets:



3. In the **Select Sheets** dialog, use the check boxes to select the sheets to include in the final report package.

Alternatively, you can select the **All sheets selected** check box.

In Figure 1, the **Select Sheets** dialog shows six worksheets available in the Excel doclet; however, only one, "World Wide," is selected for inclusion in the report package.

- Edit the sheets in the doclet as you require.
 For example, you can perform ad hoc analysis or apply formatting.
- When finished editing the Excel doclet, upload and check it in.

About Server-Initiated Refresh

With server-initiated refresh, you can easily refresh the Oracle Smart View for Office data queries in all of the Excel-based doclets and reference doclets within a report package using the Refresh options in the Narrative Reporting web application.

In Smart View, you specify which Excel doclets and reference doclets to refresh. You can choose all sheets within a workbook or select only the sheets you require. From the Narrative Reporting web application, you select to refresh data from all defined data sources or selected data sources.



Only one Narrative Reporting data source is allowed per report package. You can also source refreshable data queries from these Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud data sources:

- Planning
- Planning Modules
- Financial Consolidation and Close
- Tax Reporting

Service Administrators set up data sources in the **Data Sources** folder in Narrative Reporting.

Creating and Editing Data Source Connections

In Narrative Reporting web, administrators define data sources for all data queries in all of the Excel-based doclets and reference doclets that will be used with server-initiated refresh.

Oracle Smart View for Office locates the URLs used for each data query on each sheet that users have selected for server refresh, and maps the URLs to the corresponding data sources defined in the **Data Sources** folder in Narrative Reporting. If the data source is not defined in Narrative Reporting web, then the content in Smart View will be ignored (not refreshed)

To create a data source connection in Narrative Reporting:

1. From the Data Sources folder in the Library, click +, and select Data Source.



- 2. In **Data Source Name**, enter a descriptive identifier for the data source, such as a combination of the source product, server, and application or database.
- 3. In **Type**, select the type of data source.

Currently, only the "Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud" source is supported, which includes these business processes:

- Planning
- Financial Consolidation and Close
- Tax Reporting
- 4. In **Server Name**, enter the only data source server name, including the HTTPS protocol. For example, for Planning, if the data source URL is:

https://<servername>/HyperionPlanning

Then the server name is:

<servername>

- 5. In Identity Domain, enter the identity domain of the data source environment.
- 6. Enter the administrator user ID and password.

Note:

You must log in to Narrative Reporting with the administrator credentials for the data source that you want to create a connection to. For example, if your Planning Modules administrator is **PlanAdmin**, you must log in to Narrative Reporting with the **PlanAdmin** credentials to create a data source connection to the Planning Modules data source. Enter User ID and Password credentials used for native authentication at the source. Single Sign-on with Identity Assertion technologies is not supported.

7. Click Test Connection.

8. After a successful connection, you can browse and select the application and cube by selecting **v** for application name and cube name.

After selecting a cube, click on to preview the dimension list.

9. **Optional:** To edit a data source connection, select the connection and then select **Edit** from the **Actions** menu. When you edit a connection, you can change the connection name, server, application and cube name.



Note:


- You do not need to specify the data source server protocol (for example, https://) in the Server Name field.
- Changing the connection name does not affect any report objects that use the connection.
- Changing the server, application, or application or cube names causes any report objects that use the connection to point to the new destination.
- For security purposes, you must re-enter the administrator credentials when editing a data source.

Selecting Sheets for Server-Initiated Refresh

In Oracle Smart View for Office, you select sheets to be recalculated and refreshed during server-initiated refresh. You can include sheets from Excel doclets and Excel reference doclets.

To select sheets to include in server-initiated refresh:

- 1. If you haven't already done so, open your report package.
- 2. Open and check out the Excel doclet or Excel reference doclet that contains sheets that you want to include in server-initiated refresh.



3. Click **Inspect** in the Narrative Reporting ribbon to launch the **Properties** dialog box.



4. In the **Properties** dialog, select the **Opt In** tab.

By default, no sheets in the workbook are selected.

Note:

The **Opt In** tab is visible only if your administrator has enabled server-initiated refresh in your service.

- 5. Perform an action to select sheets in the workbook for inclusion in server-initiated refresh of the doclet:
 - Select Include All Sheets
 - Select only the specific sheets you require

Note:

The Excel doclet or reference doclet workbook must not exceed 3 megabytes in size. If the workbook exceeds 3 megabytes in size, all check boxes in the **Opt In** tab are disabled.

In the example below, two sheets that contain unsupported grid layouts are not selected for refresh:

- 6. In the **Properties** dialog, click **Save**.
- 7. Upload and check in the doclet by selecting **Check In**, and then **Upload and Check In**.



The sheets you selected are now available for refresh the next time you access the report package in the Narrative Reporting web interface.

- 8. Repeat this procedure for any other applicable Excel doclets or Excel reference doclets in your report package.
- **9.** To perform the server-initiated refresh on the selected doclets and sheets, go to the Narrative Reporting web interface.

Use the **Refresh** options on the **Actions** menu to choose whether to refresh all selected doclets, or choose to refresh doclets from a selected data source. See Initiating Refresh from Narrative Reporting Web for more information.

Initiating Refresh from Narrative Reporting Web

To refresh Excel-based doclets and reference doclets from the Narrative Reporting web interface:

1. Open the report package in the Narrative Reporting web interface.



Note: For instructions on accessing report packages in the Library, see Using the Library.

2. From the top right Actions menu, select **Refresh**, and then select **All** or select a data source from the drop-down list.

You can also refresh individual Excel-based doclets and reference doclet in Narrative Reporting.

Select an Excel-based doclet or reference doclet, click the arrow for the doclet, then select **Refresh**, and then select **All** or select a data source from the drop-down list.

Enabling Server-Initiated Refresh

Server-initiated refresh is enabled in the Narrative Reporting web application by default.

Requirements

To use the server-initiated refresh feature, currently supported versions of the following components are required:

- Oracle Smart View for Office
- Narrative Reporting extension for Smart View
- Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud

Once enabled, the server-initiated refresh options appear in the Narrative Reporting web interface. In Smart View, once connected to the enabled service, the **Opt In** tab is available in the **Properties** dialog, where you specify sheets to refresh.

Data Sources

Administrators set up data sources in the **Data Sources** folder in Narrative Reporting. See Creating and Editing Data Source Connections.



Workbook Size Limit

The Excel doclet or reference doclet workbook must not exceed 3 megabytes in size. If the workbook exceeds 3 megabytes in size, all check boxes in the **Opt In** tab of **Properties** dialog are disabled.

Workbook Layout

When a workbook is refreshed, the service will process the worksheets in a sequential order. The initial pass will perform a data refresh on all selected worksheets within the workbook—Sheet1, Sheet2, Sheet3 (working left to right). A secondary pass will perform a recalculation on the selected sheets.

Grid Design Considerations and Guidelines

In order for server side refresh to work properly, certain considerations need to be designed in to your workbook. You may need to redesign or rebuild to fit these considerations.

Keep in mind the following considerations and guidelines when designing your grids:

- · Lay out worksheet elements as follows:
 - Data query (ad hoc grid or form) is at the top of the sheet.
 - Formulas, functions, and comment cells are placed below the data query area, unless member or data cells that are part of the query reference a formula or function.
- The server-initiated refresh only recalculates and refreshes sheets containing Smart View content from the supported EPM Cloud sources.

From the Narrative Reporting web, you will not be able to select on-premises data sources for refresh, even if you selected an on-premises sheet in Smart View. On-premises data source content and non-Smart View content will be skipped.

- Report package variables may be inserted into the query POV directly or through a formula that references a cell location in the same sheet or in a different sheet within the workbook.
- HsGetValue functions, function grids, and dynamic data points must be created using Smart View 11.1.2.5.900 or later and refreshed once to save the connection information. Otherwise, the server-initiated refresh will not be able to evaluate the functions, function grids, or data points and a #No Connection message will be returned.

If you're not using Smart View version 11.1.2.5.900 or later, then HsGetValue functions, function grids, and dynamic data points should not be included on selected sheet.

• If you plan to use HsGetValue functions with cell references that point to a connection name with server-initiated refresh, see Example with Cell Reference to Data Source Connection in HsGetValue.

Grid Design Limitations

Keep in mind the following limitations when designing your grids:

• Do not include external formula references on sheets selected for refresh.



For example, do not include references to formulas in other network or local locations.

- VBA functions are not executed.
- User-defined macros are not executed.
- When a refresh is initiated, cell styles defined in the workbook are preserved.

During server-initiated refresh, only the latest data values are refreshed. Existing Smart View cell styles are preserved, and no cell styles modifications are made during the server-initiated refresh.

Supported and Unsupported Grid Types

This section contains descriptions and illustrations of supported and unsupported grid types. Consider the supported grid types when designing grids in your reference doclets.

Basic Ad Hoc Grid

In the example below, the sheet contains only a basic ad hoc grid. There are no formulas, functions, pasted data points, referenced cells, or other Smart View or Excel elements on the sheet.

Workbook Use Case Scenarios

In this section, we'll show you example use case scenarios based on a reference doclet workbook. The workbook contains five sheets, with each sheet containing a data query from a different data source. Data sources are both cloud and on-premises. The scenarios show you the outcome of different combinations of sheet selection when performing a refresh from the Narrative Reporting web application.

The example workbook in the following use case scenarios contains the following sheets:

Sheet 1: Planning data query



- Sheet 2: Narrative Reporting data query
- Sheet 3: Oracle Hyperion Financial Management data query (on-premises data source)
- Sheet 4: No data query
- Sheet 5: Planning data query

Scenario 1—No sheets are selected for server-initiated refresh and recalculation

Upon inspection of the workbook, there should not be any data sources shown as refreshable as nothing has been selected.

From the server side, this is a non-refreshable doclet.

Scenario 2—Only Sheet 1 is selected

Upon inspection of the workbook, the only refreshable data source is Planning.

From the server side, only Planning is shown as a refreshable data source.

Upon refresh, only Sheet 1 will be refreshed and recalculated. Sheet 5, which is also an Planning sheet, would not be refreshed or recalculated.

Scenario 3—Sheets 1 and 2 are selected

Upon inspection of the workbook, the refreshable data sources are Planning and Narrative Reporting.

From the server side, both Planning and Narrative Reporting are shown as refreshable data sources.

Upon refresh, only Sheets 1 and 2 are refreshed and recalculated. Sheet 5 which is also an Planning sheet, is not refreshed or recalculated.

Scenario 4—Sheets 1, 2, and 3 are selected

Upon inspection of the workbook, the refreshable data sources are Planning and Narrative Reporting.

From the server side, both Planning and Narrative Reporting are as refreshable data sources.

Upon refresh, Sheets 1 and 2 are refreshed and recalculated. Sheet 3 is recalculated but the Financial Management query is not impacted. Sheet 5, which is also an Planning sheet, was not selected so it is not refreshed or recalculated.

Scenario 5—Sheet 1, 2, 3, and 4 are selected

Upon inspection of the workbook, the refreshable data sources are Planning and Narrative Reporting.

From the server side, both Planning and Narrative Reporting are shown as a refreshable data sources.

Upon refresh, Sheets 1 and 2 are refreshed and recalculated. Sheet 3 will be recalculated but the Financial Management query is not impacted. Sheet 4 is recalculated. Sheet 5, which is also an Planning sheet, is not refreshed or recalculated.

Scenario 6—All sheets selected

ORACLE

Upon inspection of the workbook, the refreshable data sources are Planning and Narrative Reporting.

From the server side, both Planning and Narrative Reporting are shown as refreshable data sources.

Upon refresh, Sheets 1, 2, and 5 are refreshed and recalculated. Sheet 3 is recalculated but the Financial Management query is not impacted. Sheet 4 is recalculated.

Scenario 7 - Sheets 3 and/or 4 are selected

Upon inspection of the workbook, there should not be any refreshable data sources returned to the server as the selected sheets do not contain any refreshable data sources.

From the server side, this is a non-refreshable doclet.

Inserting Links and Cross-References to Pages in Doclets

Use Microsoft Word bookmarks to link to and cross-reference page numbers in your doclet. You can cross-reference bookmarks as page numbers in a table of contents doclet, whether you inserted the cross-references manually or inserted a manual table of contents and edited the cross-references. If the page number containing the bookmark changes, then the page number cross-references also change.

This topic describes inserting the bookmarks and then the cross-references. The procedures can also be used to edit a manual table contents.

Inserting Bookmarks

Before you add a cross-reference or a link, you must insert a bookmark at the location that you want to link to.

To insert a bookmark:

1. In a Word document, place your cursor at the location of the bookmark.



- 2. In the Insert ribbon, select Bookmark
- 3. In Bookmark Name, enter EPRCS_ and a bookmark identifier. For example, EPRCS_Fin_Review.



Working with an Automatic Table of Contents

When you insert a Microsoft Word table of contents into a doclet, you can choose either a manual, automatic, or custom type. For manual types, you can create page number links by using links and cross-references or by inserting a manual table of contents (see Inserting Links and Cross-References to Pages in Doclets). For automatic or custom types, the table of contents is updated whenever the doclet is merged into the report package. For example, preview the report package or the section that contains the table of contents to view the dynamically updated table of contents.





Approving or Rejecting Doclets

This topic applies to Office-based doclets of all types—regular, reference, and supplemental. Unless otherwise noted, the term *doclets* refers to all Office-based doclet types.

As approver, you review and approve doclets after the author submits them. You also have access to the same functionality as the author, including:

- Check Out
- Upload
- Check In
- Inspect

Approving Doclets

This topic applies to Office-based doclets of all types—regular, reference, and supplemental. Unless otherwise noted, the term *doclets* refers to all Office-based doclet types.

As approver, if you are satisfied that the doclet is correct, you approve it to complete it. If multiple approvals are required, you, as approver, submit the doclet for further approvals. After approval, authors can no longer check out the doclet, although they can still download and inspect it.



To approve a doclet, reference doclet, or Office-based supplemental doclet:

1. If not already open, in the Smart View Panel, navigate to the doclet and doubleclick it to open it.



2. In the Narrative Reporting ribbon, click Approve.



In the Smart View Panel, the approved doclet appears in the doclet responsibilities list with a green check mark:



If a doclet requires multiple levels of approval, the approved artifact appears in the doclet responsibilities list with the rubber stamp icon:



When a doclet is approved by all approvers, its status is updated to **Approved** in the Narrative Reporting web interface; the green check mark is displayed with the doclet in Oracle Smart View for Office.

Rejecting Doclets

This topic applies to Office-based doclets of all types, including reference and supplemental. Unless otherwise noted, the term *doclets* refers to all Office-based doclet types.

If a doclet is not ready for approval, you can either edit it yourself (check out the doclet, modify it, and check in the corrected version), or you can reject it to send it back to the author to edit.

To reject a doclet, reference doclet, or supplemental doclet:

- **1.** If not already open, in the Smart View Panel, navigate to the doclet and doubleclick it to open it.
- 2. In the Narrative Reporting ribbon, click **Reject**.





When a doclet is rejected, its status is updated to **Rejected**, and the responsibility reverts to the author, and notification is sent to the author. If there are multiple approver levels, notification is sent to all approvers within the approval path.

The author must update the content and resubmit it for approval.

In the Smart View Panel, the rejected doclet appears in the doclet responsibilities list with a red X:



Recalling Doclets

If enabled in the report package, Authors and Approvers may use the **Recall Doclet** button in the Narrative Reporting ribbon to restart the Doclet workflow, allowing them to make modifications to the Doclet content as needed. This action will be available to the Authors and Approvers when the doclet has been marked complete or when the doclet is at a higher level within the approval path; for example, after the doclet has been submitted.

If the **Recall Doclet** setting is not enabled in the report package, the Recall Doclet button does not appear on the Narrative Reporting ribbon. Once an author submitted or an approver approved a doclet, they can no longer update the doclet's contents if additional modifications are needed. The Report Package Owner is required to either reject or restart the Doclet workflow.

Recalling a doclet restarts the authoring process for only the selected doclet. Authors may continue their modifications, and can submit the updated doclet for approval if an approval phase is required.

To recall a doclet:

- **1.** Open the doclet to recall.
- 2. In the Narrative Reporting ribbon, click the **Recall Doclet** button.



Recall

After you click Recall Doclet, the Submit button is again enabled.

3. Continue with authoring process for the doclet; for example, check out the doclet, make modifications, upload, check in, and submit for approval, if required.

Inspecting Doclets

This topic applies to Office-based and non-Office-based doclets of all types, including reference and supplemental, and of all supported file formats.



The Inspect button launches the **Properties** dialog box.

From the **Properties** dialog box, you can also download previous versions of a doclet, reference doclet-, or Office-based supplemental doclet.



3. In the **Properties** dialog box, view the information the **Properties** tab (the default tab).

The **Properties** tab displays basic information about the doclet, such as the file name, doclet type, link status, suppression status, and the user who created the doclet.

5. Click the Version tab, 11, to download previous versions of Office-based doclets.

As new versions of doclets are checked in, the previous versions are stored so that you can download and view them to see what changed.

Note:

Doclet versioning is optimized to minimize the impact of multiple automated check-ins. When multiple automated check-ins are performed on the doclet due to variable or embedded content changes, the system will update the doclet contents but will not generate a new version.

To download a previous version of a doclet, click the link next to the version that you want to view.



You may download any type of doclet; however, only Office-based doclets may have previous versions.

6. Click the **History** tab, \bigcirc , to view audit information about the doclet , such as the user who last updated it (if applicable).




7. Click the **Actors** tab, ⁴⁴, to view the actors associated with the doclet.

The **Responsibility** node shows the user who has currently checked out the doclet. The **Authors** node shows the authors assigned to the doclet. The **Approvers** node shows the assigned approvers.



In the following illustration, the doclet is currently checked out by Adam P. Axelrod. There are two assigned authors, and there are no assigned approvers.



Reverting to a Prior Version of a Doclet

When authoring a doclet in a report package and your updates or the outcome is incorrect after previewing the doclet, you can revert back to a prior doclet version.

You can revert doclets, reference doclets, and supplemental doclets to previous versions.

To revert a doclet to a prior version:

- **1.** Open the report package.
- 2. Open, and then check out the doclet.

The doclet is opened in the appropriate Office application.

3. Click Inspect in the Narrative Reporting ribbon to launch the Properties dialog box.



Alternatively, with the doclet selected in the report package list, select the **View Properties** link in the Action Panel.

- 4. In the **Properties** dialog, click the **Version** tab,
- 5. In the Version tab, click 📓 for the version of the doclet you want to make current.

In the following example, we want to make version 2 the current version, so we'll click \mathbf{I}^{left} on the line for version 2.

A new work-in-progress version of the doclet is created based on the selected doclet file.

6. In the warning prompt, click **Yes** to confirm.

The report content in the new version is based on the prior version. However, any embedded content or variables contained in the prior version are refreshed to their current values.

Note:

If you accessed the **Properties** dialog by selecting the **View Properties** link in the Action Panel, then you must close and reopen the doclet in order to see the reverted version.

- 7. Review the doclet to verify it is the correct content.
- 8. Upload and check the doclet back in to the report package to commit the changes to the report.

Perform reviews by entering comments and providing your feedback in a review instance in Oracle Smart View for Office.

About the Review Phase Process

The review phase enables report stakeholders to review and provide feedback on the content in the report package. Reviewers provide commentary on their assigned areas of the report package. This could be the entire report package or a subset consisting of sections or specific doclets. Reviewers can provide their feedback by using Oracle Smart View for Office to enter, review, and respond to comments.

Note:

In Smart View, you can only perform reviews on Microsoft Word- and PowerPointbased report packages. To perform a review on a PDF-based report package, use Narrative Reporting web.

The review phase process:

- **1.** The report package owner creates the review instance, and then starts the review cycle in the Narrative Reporting web interface.
- 2. Notification messages are sent to reviewers to begin their work. If the review is iterative, reviewers are notified to begin their work at the start of each iteration.
- 3. Reviewers view a document called a review instance in Smart View. A review instance includes only the reviewer's assigned content.

Review instances do not include supplemental doclets of any file type.

Note:

Though reviewers see only their assigned content, all comments are made and retained against the single review instance.

- 4. Reviewers highlight content and post comments in plain text or in rich text format, which can include links and attachments.
- 5. Reviewers collaborate by adding to other comments in comment threads.
- 6. Reviewers mark their reviews complete, indicating to the report package owner that they are finished with their review. If the reviewer wants to add additional comments after marking the review complete, the reviewer can "Reopen for comments," indicating to the report package owner that they are not done with their review.

A report package may have multiple review cycles defined for it. All review cycles follow the same process.

Collaborative Review Process

As reviewers, you collaborate by viewing and adding to other reviewers' comments, creating comment threads. For example, a previous reviewer may have asked a question that you know the answer to. You can add to their comment to provide the answer.



Iterative Review Process

Reviews can be iterative, which means that a report package owner can schedule multiple review cycles depending on the type of review required.

For example, for a multiple draft review process, the review process may include:

- Multiple review cycles; with three drafts.
- Review assignments that vary by draft; for example:
 - First draft for manager level
 - Second draft for executive level
 - Third draft for CEOs, CFOs, and so on
- Review assignments that vary by area where you can assign users to review:
 - Entire report
 - Sections
 - Doclets

Key points to remember about the iterative review process:

- A new review instance incorporates content modifications.
- Comments persist across review cycles, so reviewers can see previous comments and how they were addressed.
- The review phase is complete when all review cycles are closed.

Working with Review Instances in Smart View

You perform reviews by entering comments and providing your feedback in a review instance in Oracle Smart View for Office. The review instance shows you a draft version of the areas of the report package that you have been assigned to review (see Figure 1). The review instance may consist of the entire report or a subset of the report content. Review instances do not include reference doclets or supplemental doclets of any file type.

Before you begin the review procedures, you should have launched Microsoft Word or PowerPoint, connected to Narrative Reporting, and opened a report package, as described in Connecting to Narrative Reporting in Smart View.

Selecting a Review Instance

When a report package is ready for review, an Narrative Reporting web interface message notifies reviewers that they can begin their work.

For example:

RReview is required for Sample Report Package - MS Word - Review Cycle 2

In this example, "Review Cycle 2" signifies that you will select "Review 02" in the Content Selector in Oracle Smart View for Office.

To select a review instance in Smart View:



1. In the Smart View Panel, verify that the required review instance is selected in the **Content Selector**.

When you first open a report package, the active review instance is shown in the **Content Selector** by default. However, even if you intend to open the active review instance that is showing in the **Content Selector**, you must still manually select it.




Figure 22-47 Example of Review Instances in the Content Selector

Posting a New Comment

To post a new comment:

1. Perform an action:



• **Comments on Text in Word:** To post comments on text in a Word-based report package, in the review instance, select the text to comment on, and in the Narrative Reporting ribbon, click **Add New Comment**.



 Comments on Text in PowerPoint: To post comments on text in a PowerPointbased report package, place your cursor in the slide you want to comment on, and in the Narrative Reporting ribbon, click Add New Comment.

A pin is placed in the top left corner of the slide. Click the pin and drag it to position it on or near the text to comment on. Then, double-click the pin to open the **EPRCS Comments** text box.

Note:

If text was selected before clicking **Add New Comment**, the pin will be placed at the top left corner of the selection.

• **Comments on Graphics in Word:** To post comments on graphics in a Word-based report package, in the review instance, select the graphic to comment on, and in the Narrative Reporting ribbon, click **Add New Comment**.

A pin is placed in the top left corner of the page that contains the graphic. Click the pin, and drag and drop it on the desired location within the graphic. Then double-click the pin to open the **EPRCS Comments** text box.

Select only the graphic. Do not select any paragraph markers, text, or empty spaces around the graphic.

 Comments on Graphics in PowerPoint: To post comments on graphics in a PowerPoint-based report package, in the review instance, select the graphic to comment on, and in the Narrative Reporting ribbon, click Add New Comment.

A pin is placed in the top left corner of the graphic. Click the pin, and drag and drop it on the desired location within the graphic. Then double-click the pin to open the **EPRCS Comments** text box.

Select only the graphic. Do not select any paragraph markers, text, or empty spaces around the graphic.

• **Comments on Embedded Content in Word:** To post comments on embedded content in Word, select a data or text cell *within* a single instance of embedded content, and in the Narrative Reporting ribbon, click **Add New Comment**.

For example, select data or text within an individual cell in an embedded content object. You may select a range of cells, but the pin is placed only on the first cell in the range (the upper left cell of the range).

To select an entire embedded content object for commenting, select some text from the row above the embedded content, along with the entire embedded content object.



You may add comments to only one embedded content object at a time. If you must add the same comment to other embedded content objects, you must add the comment separately to each embedded content object.

 Comments in Automatic TOCs (Word only): With the Narrative Reporting extension version 17.07+, commenting on automatic TOCs is not allowed. To add comments related to an automatic TOC, place the comment as close to the TOC as you can, and then refer to it in your comment.

With pre-17.07 versions of the Narrative Reporting extension, commenting on automatic TOCs is allowed in the heading or title only. You cannot comment in the body of the automatic TOC.

• **Comments in Manual TOCs (Word only):** Commenting is allowed on both the heading and the body of manual TOCs.

Tip:

The selection area for comments cannot be empty. Select a graphic or at least one word or number when adding comments.

You cannot select an entire embedded content object *only* and then add a comment; that selection is considered an empty selection. You must select text above the embedded content, along with the embedded content, to be considered a valid selection area for comments.

2. In EPRCS Comments, enter a comment.

Figure 1 shows an example of an **EPRCS Comments** text box with text selected for commenting.






You can add URLs, text formatting, and attachments to comments. See Editing and Deleting Comments and Attaching Supporting Files and Customizing Comment Text.

3. Click Enter, *V*, to post your comment.



A comment must contain text, an attachment, or both.

Your comment is added to the list of comments in the comments pane in the Smart View Panel, and an anchor icon, R, is added to the review instance to indicate that there is a comment.

4. In the top right corner of the **EPRCS Comments** text box, click **Close**, X, to exit.

Posting a Reply to a Comment

To post a reply to a comment:

- 1. In the Smart View Panel, double-click a comment in the list to launch the **EPRCS Comments** text box.
- 2. In the EPRCS Comments text box, click the Reply button, 🛩 , and enter your reply.



Note: You can add text formatting and attachments to comment replies. See Attaching Supporting Files and Customizing Comment Text for more information.

- 3. Click the **Enter** button, \checkmark , to post your reply.
- 4. Click Close, X, to exit the EPRCS Comments text box.

Filtering and Sorting Comments

You can filter comments in the comment management panel. For example, you can show or hide comments, display open or closed comments, or display or hide a user's comments.

To filter and sort comments:

1. In the Narrative Reporting ribbon, click the **Refresh Comments** button to see new comments and replies.



2. **Optional:** Click the **Hide Anchor** or **Show Anchor** button to hide or display the comment anchors in the review instance.

Hide Anchor displays by default the first time you open a review instance, meaning that anchors are currently showing.



After clicking **Hide Anchor**, the button toggles to **Show Anchor**.



Anchors display throughout the review instance and mark the location where comments are entered. Anchors are signified by a pushpin icon. In Figure 1, an anchor is circled in a portion of the review instance.

- 3. Click Filter Comments, Comments, and choose a display option:
 - Open Comments
 - Closed Comments
 - All Comments
 - My Comments

You can choose to display **Open Comments** and **Closed Comments** at the same time.

4. View the results of your selections in the comments list in the Smart View Panel.

Alternatively, you can choose filter and sort options by using the drop-down lists in the comments pane. The heading at the left is for sorting comments; the heading at the right is for filtering.

The following example shows comments sorted by time in descending order and, because the Open, Closed and All filters are selected, all comments are displayed:

Editing and Deleting Comments

You can edit a thread entry when it is the last entry in the thread that you posted.

You can delete a comment that you posted. You can also delete a comment thread entry that you posted when it is the last entry in the thread.


To edit or delete a comment:

1. From the comment list in the Smart View Panel, click a comment that you started.



- 2. To edit a comment:
 - a. Click the drop-down list arrow as shown in Figure 1, and then select **Modify**.

b. Edit the comment text.

Note: You can add URLs, text formatting, and attachments to comments. See Attaching Supporting Files and Customizing Comment Text.

- c. Click Enter, 🗹, to update the comment.
- d. Click Close, \times , to exit the EPRCS Comments text box.
- 3. To delete a comment, select either the comment or the last entry in a comment thread, then click the drop-down list arrow shown in Figure 1 for the comment or the thread entry, and then select **Delete**.

Note:

You can only delete the last entry in a thread. Deleting the last entry does not delete the entire comment thread.

4. To cancel modifications, click the **Cancel** or **Close** button, X in the **EPRCS Comments** text box.

Attaching Supporting Files and Customizing Comment Text

You can select a local file from your computer to attach to your comment. For example, you might want to associate a supporting document with one of your comments. Or, you may want to customize the text of a comment using the rich text editor. For example, you may want to make text bold or apply a different font color. You can also add a URL to a comment.

To attach files to a comment, customize comment text, or add a link to a web page:



1. In the Smart View Panel, in the comment list, double-click a comment that you started to launch the **EPRCS Comments** text box.

The comment you select must be the only or last comment in a thread.

- 2. To attach a file to your comment:
 - a. Click the Manage Attachments button, @.
 - b. In Manage Attachments, click ³, then navigate to the file to attach and select it, and then click **Open**.
 - c. In the **Title** column, add a descriptive title for the file, and then press **Enter**; for example:

d. Click **Save**, 🗒, to save the attachment and title text.

The statement "Comment has attachments" is added to the **EPRCS Comments** text box.

Note:

The **Manage Attachments** button, *is* enabled in all comments in a thread so that all users included in the review instance may view attachments associated with all comments.

- e. Repeat step 1 through step 2.d for all the files that you want to attach to the comment.
- 3. To apply custom formatting to comment text:
 - a. In the **EPRCS Comments** text box, select the last comment in the thread, then click the drop-down list arrow shown in Figure 1, and then select **Modify**.
 - b. Select the comment text to format.
 - c. Click the **Show Formatting Bar** button, **2**, to add text formatting to the comment.

Formatting options:

Font style, size, and color



- Bold, italics, and underlining
- Align text to the left or right, or center it
- d. Click Enter, 🕺, to retain your changes.
- 4. To add a URL in a comment:
 - a. In the EPRCS Comments text box, , enter the URL; for example, enter:

http://www.oracle.com

For URLs to be recognized, you must precede them with a valid URL protocol identifier, such as:

- http://
- https://

For example:

http://www.oracle.com

Oracle recommends testing URLs in a browser to ensure that they work before adding them to comments.

- b. Click Enter, 🗹.
- 5. Click Close, X, to exit the EPRCS Comments text box.

Addressing and Closing Review Comments

When a comment is added to a review instance, the comment status is "Open." When the questions or concerns raised in a comment have been addressed, users can change the comment status to "Closed."

Addressing Comments

Some comments may be addressed with a simple reply to the comment. Other comments may require revisions to the original doclet. Any user, except for a viewer, can respond to or address comments. After you mark your review complete, it prevents you from adding new comments. However, you can still reply to existing comments. Following are examples of the actions that users can take in response to comments:

• Answer a question and then close the comment.

For example, if a review asked if a figure in a doclet represented an up-to-date number, a user with that knowledge can reply to the comment and mark it closed.

• Edit the doclet content and then close the comment.

For example, if a reviewer suggests an edit, another user can check out and edit the doclet, and then reply to the comment that the edit was made, and then close the comment.

• Send the doclet back to the doclet author for additional revisions.

For example, if a reviewer suggests that a doclet is using old data and needs to be updated with the latest figures, the report package owner can send the doclet back to the author. When a doclet is restarted, a notification is sent to the doclet author



indicating that the doclet has been reopened, and the doclet status is changed to "Started." Note that the doclet due dates for authors and approvers may be changed by the report package owner. At this point, the doclet follows the same workflow as in the author phase (see Authoring Doclets in Smart View); it is edited and approved by the authors and approvers that were assigned in the author phase.

Closing Comments

To close a comment:

- **1.** Double-click the comment in the comment list in the Review Center.
- 2. In the EPRCS Comments dialog box, click Reply, 4, and enter the reply text.
- 3. Click the Mark Closed button, a to close the comment.

A reply is added, noting that the comment is closed.

To reopen the comment to add additional comments, click **Reopen Comment**,

Comparing Review Instances

In Oracle Smart View for Office, you can compare two review instances to see what changes occurred between review cycles, depending on the review cycles to which you have access. For example, you can compare between a selected version and the prior version, or you can compare between a selected version and any other earlier version.

This allows you, as a reviewer, to be more efficient by focusing your review only on the content that has been updated, rather than reviewing all your assigned content with each review cycle.

To compare review instances:

1. Open a report package.

You should have access to two or more review cycle instances in order to use the review instance compare feature.

2. In the **Content Selector**, select a review instance on which to base the compare.

The review instances listed depend on the review instances to which you have been assigned.

In the following example, there are four review instances listed. We'll select Review 04. Once you make a selection, the review instance opens in Word.



3. In the Narrative Reporting ribbon, click the arrow on the **Compare** button to view **Compare changes since**, then select a review instance from the drop-down list.

Depending on the review instance selection you make in the Content Selector, you will see a corresponding list of earlier review instance versions on the **Compare** drop-down list. If only one review instance exists, then there will be no earlier versions to compare to.

In the following example, we'll select Review 03. This means that we're going to look at the changes that occurred in Review 04 since Review 03.



Smart View downloads the two review instances and generates a detailed comparison document using Microsoft Word's comparison feature. You can use the Previous and Next button in Word's Review ribbon to navigate through the compare document.

The compare document is for viewing only. You do not need to use the Accept Changes functionality in order to keep any changes.

You can go back to the current review instance to add any necessary comments, and open and check out any doclets that you want to change.

4. When finished reviewing the changes, close the compare document.

Marking Reviews Complete

If you are satisfied with your review and you would like to notify the report package owner, mark your review complete.

After you mark your review complete, it prevents you from adding additional comments.

To mark your review complete:

1. Click Mark Review Complete in the Narrative Reporting ribbon.



Note: The button toggles to **Reopen for Comments**.

2. Optional: To add more review comments to the report package, click the **Reopen for** Comments button.



Working with Distributions

Distributions enable report package owners to send report content to stakeholders at any point in the report package development.

About Distributions

Distributions enable a report package owner to send report content to stakeholders at any point in the report package development. As a recipient, depending on the options that the report package owner selects, you can view, download in native format, or download as PDF all of the report content that the report package owner assigns to you.

When a report package owner executes a distribution, notifications are sent to the recipients' email and the Messages tab on the Narrative Reporting web interface. The notifications contain links to access the distributed content from Narrative Reporting. You can click the links in the email to view or download the distribution from the web interface.



Or, you can launch Oracle Smart View for Office, open the report package, navigate to the Distributions panel, and view or download the distribution in PDF format from Office.


Report package owners can refer to *Narrative Reporting Reviewing, Signing, and Receiving Report Packages* for information on setting up distributions.

Viewing Distributions

When a report package owner executes a distribution, notifications are sent to the recipients' email and the Messages tab on the web. The notifications contain links to access the distributed content. You can also log in to Oracle Smart View for Office and, depending on the options selected by the report package owner, download or open the PDF version of the distribution for viewing.

To view distributions:

- 1. Connect to Narrative Reporting and open a report package, as described in Connecting to Narrative Reporting in Smart View.
- 2. In the Report Package panel, select **Distributions** from the drop-down list.



3. From the list of distributions in the Report Package panel, select a distribution.

Performing Sign Offs

Signers review the finalized content of a report. They can either sign off on or reject the report.

About the Sign Off Phase

The goal of the sign off phase is to gather final approvals from your key stakeholders. Stakeholders review finalized content and either sign off on or reject the report package. All prior authoring and review phases must be complete, and all doclets must be checked in and completed as well. The sign off phase enables you to lock your report package and ensures that approved content is not modified. This is beneficial for reports that rely on content to be locked down and to prevent changes.

The sign off phase follows this process:

- **1.** The report package owner creates the sign off instance, and then starts the sign off phase.
- 2. Notifications are sent to signers to begin their work.



3. Signers review finalized content in the form of a sign off instance, and can either sign off on or reject the report package.

Note: After all the signers provide their approvals, the report package is marked final.

Signing Off On or Rejecting a Report Package

The signers review the final report and can either sign off on or reject the report package. Additionally, signers can attach a note with details on their action.


Before you begin the procedures in this topic, you should have launched Microsoft Word or PowerPoint, connected to Narrative Reporting, and opened a report package, as described in Connecting to Narrative Reporting in Smart View.

To sign off on or reject a report package:

1. In the Smart View Panel, **Content Selector** drop-down list, ensure that **Sign Off** is selected.



Selecting **Sign Off** launches the sign off instance document, which you review to sign off on the report package.

- **2.** Do one of the following:
 - If you are satisfied with your review of the sign off instance document, click **Sign Off** in the Narrative Reporting ribbon.





When you sign off on the sign off instance document, the report package process is complete, and the report is ready for publication.

• If you are not satisfied with the sign off instance document, click **Reject Sign Off** in the Narrative Reporting ribbon.



The report package owner can take corrective actions to address issues.

 Optional: Whether you are signing off or rejecting the report package in the sign off instance document, add a comment in Add Note, and then click Sign Off or Reject Sign Off.

After all signers approve the report, the report package status becomes "Final."

Refreshing Report Packages

You can refresh the contents of a report package by using the Refresh Report Package command in the Library pane of the Smart View Panel.

When you select **Refresh Report Package**, Oracle Smart View for Office takes the following actions for each doclet (regular and reference doclets) in the report package:

- Download
- Checkout
- Refresh of all data points, embedded content, and variables; this includes all data points or data sheets within Excel reference and supplemental doclets for all defined Smart View Panel sources
- Upload
- Checkin

Note:

When you perform a **Refresh Report Package**, you must have access to all the doclets, including those that contain Smart View queries. Furthermore, in order to refresh those queries, you may be prompted for login credentials to all the data sources that those queries are accessing.

To refresh a report package:

1. Ensure that you are in the Library pane of the Smart View Panel.

From Narrative Reporting Home, click Library, then expand the **EPRCS** node, then the **Library** node, then expand the **Report Packages** folder, and then select a report package.



2. With the report package selected, from the Action Panel, click **Refresh Report Package**.

The **Refresh Report Package** prompt is displayed letting you know that the process can be time consuming.



3. Click **Yes** at the prompt.

Smart View begins the process of opening and checking out doclets; refreshing data points, data sheets in Excel reference doclets, embedded content, and variables; and then closing the doclets.

Focus will move between Office applications.

If the refresh is successful for all doclets, Smart View returns you to the Office application from which you began the process.



Publishing Report Packages, Sections, and Doclets

You can publish report packages, specific sections, and individual doclets directly from Smart View, in addition to publishing them from the Narrative Reporting web application.

You can publish the reports either in the PDF format or in the report's native format (for example, Word or PowerPoint). The published report can be saved in your local area or in the Narrative Reporting Library. You can also overwrite an already published report while publishing and saving its new version.

When you publish a report package, section, or doclet, a single merged file is created for all the report contents selected. However, any supporting documents such as reference doclets and supplemental doclets present in the report package or section are not published.

To publish report package, section, or doclet:

1. Ensure that you are in the Library pane of the Smart View Panel.

From Narrative Reporting Home, click Library, then expand the **Narrative Reporting** node, then the **Library** node, then expand the **Report Packages** folder, and then select a report package.

2. To publish the selected report package, click **Publish Report** from the Action Panel.

Alternatively, to publish a specific section or doclet from the selected report package, click **Open Report Package**, select the required section or doclet, and click **Publish**.

Note:

The **Publish** action appears in the Action Panel only if the section or doclet has publishable content.

3. In the **Publish** dialog, select either **Native** or **PDF** option in **File Type** field.

Note:

If you are publishing a PDF report package, then the **PDF** option is selected by default.

- 4. In **Save To** field, select either **Local** or **Library** option, and click **Browse** to select the location where the report should be saved.
- Optional: If an older version of the report exists in the location, and if you want to overwrite it with the current version being published, then select the Overwrite Existing File check box.
- 6. Click **OK** to publish the report package, section, or doclet.

If published in the Native format to the Library, the published report appears in the selected folder under Library/Documents in the Smart View Panel.



Saving Office Documents to EPM Cloud in Narrative Reporting in Smart View

In Oracle Smart View for Office, you can save Microsoft Office documents to the Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud Library. Documents you save in the EPM Cloud Library can be made accessible to other users. You can also download saved files from the library.

Working with Reports in Smart View

Reports is a cloud-based reporting solution for creating Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud financial and managerial reports. It enables users to insert charts and grids utilizing EPM Cloud sources such as Planning, and other sources such as Oracle Essbase as well as ERP Cloud Financials, into a report.

Working with Narrative Reporting Data in Smart View

You can use Oracle Smart View for Office to copy data from Oracle Enterprise Performance Management System and Oracle Business Intelligence on-premises and cloud data sources,.

This includes Narrative Reporting data sources, and paste the data into doclets in a report package.

For example, you can incorporate data from Oracle Essbase and Narrative Reporting in the same doclet or different doclets within a report package. A doclet in a report package in Word or PowerPoint may contain a profit and loss statement report that was created from an Essbase source along with an income statement report created from an Narrative Reporting source. The data points for the areas that you copy are retained in Word or PowerPoint, so you can refresh the doclet to keep the data up to date.

The scenario in Example: Working with Narrative Reporting Data in Smart View demonstrates using ad hoc analysis in Excel to create a report, and then copying the data points from that report and pasting them into a doclet in Word.

Example: Working with Narrative Reporting Data in Smart View

The topics in this section provide a brief look at the following features of Narrative Reporting:

- Performing ad hoc queries and retrieving data from Narrative Reporting data sources.
- Copying and pasting Narrative Reporting data into doclets. You can copy and paste data in the form of grids or data points.



Performing Ad Hoc Analysis with Narrative Reporting Data

Narrative Reporting comes with a sample application that consists of a model containing seven dimensions. You create the sample application with a click of a button in the Narrative Reporting web interface.

When connected to the sample model in Oracle Smart View for Office, you can perform ad hoc queries that allow you to create data reports containing the information that you want to see. You can copy and paste data from the reports into doclets in Narrative Reporting report packages. You can copy and paste grids or individual data points into doclets.

The scenario in this topic shows you how to create an ad hoc grid and paste individual data points and an entire grid into a doclet, in preparation for the doclet being included in a report package in Narrative Reporting.

To create an ad hoc grid from an Narrative Reporting data source:

- 1. If you have not already done so, launch Excel, and set up a data source connection as described in Creating Connections to Narrative Reporting.
- 2. In Excel, connect to the Narrative Reporting data source.

3. In the Smart View Panel, expand **Reporting Applications**, then **Sample Application**, and then right-click **Sample Model** and select **Ad hoc analysis**.

The initial dimensions and data are placed on the sheet. The Accounts dimension and Fiscal Calendar dimension are the active dimensions.

Note:

The dimensions, Entities, Total Segments, Currencies, Years, and Scenarios are in the POV and are not in the body of the grid. They can be used to change the data perspective of the grid; however, we are not showing that functionality in this scenario.

19. In the Narrative Reporting ribbon, click the **POV** button.



Clicking the POV button causes the POV members move to the POV toolbar, which **floats** on the grid, as shown in Figure 1.

The POV toolbar can be moved around on the grid or docked by dragging the POV toolbar to the top, bottom, left, or right of the Excel window. You can prevent the POV toolbar from docking by holding the **Ctrl** key as you drag the toolbar.

Now let's apply formatting to the numbers in the grid. Number formatting will carry over when we copy the grid and paste it into Word.

20. Press and hold down the **Ctrl** key, and then select the dollar amounts in the first and last rows of the report, cells B3, C3, D3, B13, C13, and D13.

21. With cells B3, C3, D3, B13, C13, and D13 selected, in the Excel Home ribbon, in the **Number** group, click the **Accounting Number Format** button, **\$**.

If you are working in a non-American English environment, choose the default currency symbol for your locale.

22. In the Excel Home ribbon, make the following changes to the currency and variance percentage figures:



- a. Select only the figures in columns B, C, and D, and then, in the **Number** group, click the **Comma Style** button, **2**.
- **b.** Select only the figures in column E, Variance %, and then, in the **Number** group, click the **Decrease Decimal** button, 300, until only one decimal place remains.

You should now have a report similar to the one shown in Figure 2.

23. Save the report and continue with Copying and Pasting Narrative Reporting Data into Doclets.

We'll show you how to copy and paste the dynamic data points from this report in to a doclet in an Narrative Reporting report package. This is a typical task that a doclet author performs during the authoring phase of the report package lifecycle.

Copying and Pasting Narrative Reporting Data into Doclets

For this demonstration, we'll work with an example Word-based report package called Department Reports. We'll use the data that we created in Performing Ad Hoc Analysis with Narrative Reporting Data to create refreshable data points in a doclet called "Operating Expenses." The doclet will contain text interspersed with data points, and the full grid.

Note:

The procedure in this topic could also be performed in a PowerPoint-based report package.


To copy and paste Narrative Reporting data into doclets:

1. In Word, connect to the Narrative Reporting data source, and then open a report package, as described in Connecting to Narrative Reporting in Smart View.



2. In the Smart View Panel, select the doclet to check out.

4. In the Narrative Reporting ribbon, click **Check Out**.



You can now author in the doclet. The example doclet in Figure 2 has placeholders within the paragraph for pasting data points. You can paste the entire grid below the table caption.

- **5.** To copy and paste a data point:
 - a. Open and connect to the ad hoc grid that you created in Performing Ad Hoc Analysis with Narrative Reporting Data.
 - b. Select the Actual total operating expenses figure in cell B13, and then click from the Smart View ribbon.



You must be connected to the ad hoc grid, and you must use the **Copy** and **Paste** buttons on the Smart View ribbon so that the data you copy and paste remains dynamic between Office applications.

c. In Word, position the cursor in the paragraph at the required location, and then, in the Smart View ribbon, click **Paste**.

The paste operation results in a placeholder, "#NEED_REFRESH".



In this scenario, a second data point for plan operating expenses is pasted into the paragraph.

- 6. To copy and paste a range:
 - a. Go to the ad hoc grid that you created in Performing Ad Hoc Analysis with Narrative Reporting Data.
 - Select the entire grid, including all members, and then click ; in the example in Figure 3, you would select cells A2 through E13.

Remember that in Performing Ad Hoc Analysis with Narrative Reporting Data, we moved the POV dimensions from row 1 to the POV toolbar. That's why the grid that we're copying from begins on row 2.

- a. Select the entire table and from the Layout ribbon in Word, select AutoFit, and then AutoFit Contents.
- **b.** Center and bold the headings.
- c. Right-align all the data values in the Actual, Plan, and Variance columns.
- d. Center the percentages in the Variance % column.
- e. Bold the totals in the Operating Expenses row.
- f. Clear the borders from the entire table.
- **g.** Add a single underline under the column headings and under the Actual, Plan, Variance, and Variance % columns in the "Depreciation and Amort" row.
- **h.** Add double underlines under the Actual, Plan, Variance, and Variance % columns in the "Operating Expenses" row.

After you've applied the Word formatting, the table should resemble the table in Figure 5.

The lock icon is removed from the doclet in the doclet responsibilities list, indicating that the doclet is no longer checked out.

This completes the example scenario. In summary, we showed you how to accomplish these tasks:

- Create an ad hoc report while connected to an Narrative Reporting data source.
- Format the figure and percentage data in Excel.
- Open a report package and check out a doclet for authoring.
- Copy and paste data points and ranges from the ad hoc grid in Excel to the doclet, creating a Word table.
- Format the table using Word formatting.
- Upload the doclet and check it in.

In a production environment, the next steps that you take depend on the requirements of the report package. You may need to submit the doclet for approval. You might need to author other doclets. Later, you may be asked to review portions or all of the report package. You can do all of these tasks in Oracle Smart View for Office.

For procedures to load transactions into Reconciliation Compliance, see Importing Transactions Directly From Excel Using the Smart View Extension for Reconciliation Compliance.

For more information on Account Reconciliation, see the documentation on the Oracle Help Center.

Setting Up Account Reconciliation in Smart View

You can set up Account Reconciliation in Oracle Smart View for Office.

The topics in this section discuss setting up Account Reconciliation in Smart View. This is the workflow:

- Download and run the Smart View installer
- Set up a connection to Account Reconciliation
- Install the Account Reconciliation extension



Downloading and Running the Smart View Installer

To download and run the Oracle Smart View for Office installer:

- 1. Start Account Reconciliation in a web browser, and log in with your user name and password.
- In the upper-right corner of the Account Reconciliation web interface, select the arrow next to your user name to display the user menu, and then select Downloads.
- 3. In Downloads, under Smart View, click Download From Oracle Technology Network.
- On the Smart View information page on Oracle Technology Network, click Downloads.
- 5. In the Hyperion Performance Management and BI Downloads page, select the Oracle Smart View for Office link.
- 6. In the Oracle Smart View for Office page, click Download Now.
- 7. In the Oracle Licence Agreement popup window, select the I reviewed and accept the Oracle License Agreement check box, and then click the Download button for the current Smart View release.

Note:

If the Oracle sign-in page is displayed, then sign in with your Oracle user name (usually your email address) and password.

- 8. Follow the steps for your browser to download the ZIP file, and save it to a folder on your computer; for example, the **Downloads** folder.
- Navigate to the folder that you used in the previous step, and then double-click SmartView.exe or right-click SmartView.exe and select Run as administrator to start the installation wizard.

Note:

Whenever possible, Oracle recommends using the **Run as** administrator command when installing Smart View.

10. Select a destination folder for Smart View, and then click **OK**; for new installations, Smart View is installed by default in:

C:/Oracle/SmartView

Note:

If you are upgrading an installation of Smart View, then the installer defaults to the folder where you previously installed Smart View.

11. When installation is complete, click **OK**.



The tab for the Smart View ribbon is displayed the next time you open Microsoft Excel, PowerPoint, or Word. Continue the setup process with Creating Connections to Account Reconciliation.

Creating Connections to Account Reconciliation

After you install Oracle Smart View for Office, as described in Downloading and Running the Smart View Installer, you can create connections to Account Reconciliation.

Connections require information about your service URL. Your Smart View administrator should provide you with the information that you need to create the connection.

For the connection to Account Reconciliation, use the quick connection method in Smart View.

Note:

Use the procedure in this topic to create connections. Once connections are created, use the procedure Connecting to Account Reconciliation in Smart View for connecting on a routine basis.

To create a private connection to Account Reconciliation using the quick connection method:

- 1. Open Microsoft Excel, Word, or PowerPoint, and select the Smart View ribbon.
- 2. From the Smart View ribbon, click Panel.
- 3. From the Smart View Panel, select **Private Connections**.

Alternatively, from the Smart View Panel, click the arrow next to the Switch to button,

and then select **Private Connections** from the drop-down list.

 - If the **Extension Alerts** dialog is *not* displayed, continue with Installing the Account Reconciliation Extension.

Installing the Account Reconciliation Extension

This topic covers installing the Account Reconciliation extension from within Oracle Smart View for Office.

Before you begin this procedure, complete the steps in Creating Connections to Account Reconciliation.



To install the Account Reconciliation extension from Smart View:

1. From the Smart View ribbon, select **Options**, and then **Extensions**.

Note:

If the **Extension Alerts** dialog was displayed when you completed the steps in Creating Connections to Account Reconciliation, then you should already be in the **Extensions** tab of the **Options** dialog.

- 2. Click the Check for Updates, New Installs, and Uninstalls link.
- In Select Location for Extension Updates, select the check box that corresponds to your Account Reconciliation connection, and then click Get Updates.

The dialog box expands to display a message window providing you with the progress and status of the extension query.



- 4. Click Close in the Select Location for Extension Updates dialog to return to the Extensions tab of the Options dialog.
- In the list of extensions in the Extensions tab, locate Reconciliation Compliance and click the Install link, Install, to launch the installer.
- 6. In the popup dialog asking "Apply this extension update?", click **Yes**, and then click **OK** to close the **Options** dialog, **Extensions** tab.

To connect to Account Reconciliation:


- 1. Launch Excel, select the Smart View ribbon, and then click **Panel**.
- 2. In the Smart View Panel, select **Private Connections**.

, and then select **Private Connections** from the drop-down list.

3. In the text box shown in Figure 1, click the arrow to display the drop-down menu and select your connection.

- 4. In the Smart View Panel, expand the **ARCS** node, then Reconciliation **Compliance**, then **SmartView**, and then click **Connect** in the Action Panel.
- 5. In the Login window, enter your User Name and Password, and then click Sign In.

Importing Transactions Directly From Excel Using the Smart View Extension for Reconciliation Compliance

This topic describes how to initialize and import transactions into Reconciliation Compliance using the Smart View Account Reconciliation extension.

You can use Excel to load transactions into Reconciliation Compliance by using the Oracle Smart View for Office Account Reconciliation extension. The direct integration requires the base installation of Smart View plus the Smart View extension for Reconciliation Compliance.

You can either **Add** to your existing transactions, or use **Replace All** to replace your existing transactions with this new import file.

For instructions on how to install Smart View and how to download the Smart View extension for Reconciliation Compliance, see Setting Up Account Reconciliation in Smart View.

To load transactions, you use the **Initialize** and then **Import** options on the Smart View Reconciliation Compliance ribbon to import the data. **Initialize** prepares the header row (always Row 1) in the spreadsheet for the import based on Transaction Type and selection of formats. **Import** performs the actual import of the transactions.

You can load any of the following Transaction Types across one or many reconciliations in one import: Balance Explanations, Adjustment to Source System, Adjustment to Subsystem, and Variance Explanations.

For the procedure to initialize, see Initializing the Import

For the procedure to import the transactions, see Importing the Transactions

Note:

Transactions loaded through Smart View will exhibit exactly the same behavior as **Import Pre-mapped Transactions**. See .Import Pre-Mapped Transactions

Initializing the Import

The **Initialize** option prepares the header row for the import based on specification of **Transaction Type** and selecting one or more formats. You can also include **Amortization** headers as well as **Action Plan** headers.



If you are loading transactions using the same header row from a previous load, you do not have to use the Initialize option again. You can go directly to the **Import** option.

 Once the Smartview installation steps are complete, open Excel, and establish the private connection. Note that you see the Smart View menu option as well as Reconciliation Compliance on the Smart View ribbon.

The **Smart View** import requires the Amount or Date fields to be formatted in Excel as Amount or Date format. They cannot be Text or other format.

Note:

Excel commonly converts Amortization Period names to dates, which will cause errors on import. To prevent this, format the column as Text (Initialize does this automatically) or prefix the Period name with a single quote (ex: 'January 2021)

Importing the Transactions

Once your header row layout is ready, you can load your transactions into Reconciliation Compliance via Smart View.

- 1. Make sure your Excel header row is ready and you are connected to the Account Reconciliation instance.
- 2. Create transactions for import in the sheet that has your header row configured.

- 3. In Smart View's Reconciliation Compliance ribbon, click Import.
- 4. The **Import Transactions** dialog displays. You can change the **Transaction Type** if you wish.
- 5. Select the period from the drop down of **Open** and **Closed** periods.

You can load transactions for a period whether or not reconciliations are created for that period. Once the reconciliations are created, the transactions are displayed on the Reconciliation. If the reconciliation is deleted, the transactions that were loaded using **Smart View** still remain in the database.

6. Select the import mode of either Add or Replace All. Then click OK. Add adds the transactions to your existing transactions. Replace All replaces your existing transactions with this new transaction import file. When processing is complete, you see a Results dialog. Note that it warns you that any attributes with Read Only access are ignored. You can also download the file, if you wish.



Once you set up the header row, if you want to perform another import of transactions, you can go directly to **Import** without initializing again.



Editing and Refreshing Documents

The Smart View ribbon provides several edit and refresh options.

In Office, you can edit and refresh documents that were previously imported from Oracle Hyperion Enterprise Performance Management Workspace sources and Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud services.

- Edit—change filters, POVs, or parameters of embedded EPM Workspace and EPM Cloud documents.
- Refresh—refresh the selected job with the latest EPM Workspace and EPM Cloud data. Only the job selected in Office is updated; not the entire Office document.
- Refresh All— update all jobs in the Office document.

General Edit and Refresh Behavior

• When you refresh an imported document in which pages have been deleted, only the remaining pages are refreshed. The deleted pages are not reinstated.



- If editing or refreshing results in fewer pages in an imported document, the removed pages display as blanks pages in Office.
- If editing or refreshing results in more pages in an imported document, those pages are appended to the document in Office.
- Formatting headings and comments are retained when you refresh in Word and PowerPoint but not when you refresh in Excel.

Maintaining Cell References During Document Refresh

In Excel, a customized worksheet that references imported document cells or ranges is updated when you execute a Refresh All on the imported documents. For example, imported worksheet A and B are referenced in customized worksheet C. When you execute Refresh All on worksheet A and B, worksheet C is refreshed with updated data from worksheets A and B.

Refreshing Reporting and Analysis Documents

Refreshing updates the report with the latest data.

Note:

In this topic, references to Oracle Hyperion Financial Reporting apply to both the on-premises and Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud versions of Financial Reporting.

Refresh Behaviors in Production Reporting and Interactive Reporting

- In Word, if a report is selected, the entire report is refreshed. If no report is selected, the first report found in the document is refreshed. The first report is not necessarily the report at the beginning of the document.
- In PowerPoint, if no report is selected, the first report found in the slide is updated.

When refreshing job outputs in Oracle Hyperion SQR Production Reporting, new outputs in Oracle Hyperion Enterprise Performance Management Workspace are updated.

Refresh Behaviors in Financial Reporting and Web Analysis

- You must select a page in the report to refresh. In Word and PowerPoint, if you do not select any pages when refreshing, a message is displaying stating that no pages are updated.
- If you select Refresh, all pages of the report are refreshed. If you select Refresh All, then all reports in the document are refreshed.
- An "Invalid Pointer" error results during login when the data source connection has timed out and you attempt to refresh a previously-saved report that contains a function grid. To workaround this, close the workbook and Excel. Then, restart Excel, open the workbook, and perform the refresh.



Refreshing Reporting and Analysis Documents Against Essbase or Financial Management Connections

Note:

This applies to Financial Reporting and Oracle Hyperion Web Analysis reports imported into query-ready HTML.

Refreshing against Oracle Essbase or Oracle Hyperion Financial Management connections updates the report with the latest data from the provider and enables you to perform ad hoc analysis on the Oracle Hyperion Reporting and Analysis document, such as retrieving, zooming, or pivoting data.

Perform a **Refresh** on an imported report before you begin working on it in queryready mode to ensure that the report and the POV are in sync.

Refresh for a report imported in query-ready HTML applies to the current page and not all pages.

You can display *fully-formatted* HTML in Excel. *Query-ready* HTML enables you to connect to Oracle Hyperion Financial Management or Oracle Essbase data sources and run queries.

Perform a **Refresh** on an imported report before you begin working on it in queryready mode to ensure that the report and the POV are in sync.

When you import Oracle Hyperion Reporting and Analysis documents as query-ready HTML, the selected pages of the current data object are converted to HTML, and Oracle Smart View for Office-specific formatting is removed. Thus, Smart View can requery the data source independent of the Web application.



When you import Reporting and Analysis documents as fully formatted HTML, the selected pages of the current data object are converted to HTML, and Smart View formatting definitions and calculated members are retained. Thus, Smart View cannot directly query the data source, but Smart View content can be leveraged by Microsoft Office applications.

💡 Tip:

After importing an image in Word or PowerPoint, use the Office Format Picture option to format it; for example, to crop and resize. The Format Picture settings are preserved, even after you refresh the image.





- 5. In Select a Document, expand the repository, select a Web Analysis document, and click OK.
- 6. If database credentials are not saved with the Web Analysis document, then the Specify Database Credentials page is displayed where you are required to enter valid log on credentials to data sources used in the report. If a report has only one data source and you skip entering credentials, the report is not imported. If you have data objects with different data sources in one report and only want to import one of the data objects, you can enter the credentials for the data objects you want to import and skip credential for the data object you do not wish to import. Enter the user name and password or select Skip to skip entering credentials to any of the data sources, and click Next.



Tip:

Select **Save Credentials** to save credentials with a Web Analysis document. It enables you to refresh an imported document later. Currently, you cannot refresh imported documents without saving credentials.


- 7. In **Preview**, when selecting objects to import for Microsoft Excel, Word, and PowerPoint:
 - Select individual data objects, by clicking the check box located in the top left corner of each report object *or* select all data objects by clicking the All Objects check box.
 - Select Split Objects across worksheets to create a new worksheet for each report object or deselect Split Objects across worksheets to placed all report objects in the same worksheet.
 - Select a page to import from the drop-down list located in the top of each selected to import data objects or select All Pages to import all pages of all selected to import data objects.
 - Select Split Pages across Worksheets to create a new worksheet for each import page or deselect Split Pages across Worksheets to place all imported pages of each data object in the same worksheet.
- 8. In Preview, when selecting object to import for Microsoft Word and PowerPoint, select **Import Screen** to import a screen print of the entire report.
- 9. For Microsoft Excel, In Import Document As, select an option:
 - **Fully Formatted** (imports reports in fully-formatted HTML). You can connect to Oracle Enterprise Performance Management System at any time and refresh the imported document for current data.
 - **Query-Ready** (imports reports in query-ready HTML). You can connect to Oracle Hyperion Financial Management or Oracle Essbase data source to get data directly and perform ad hoc analysis, such as retrieving, zooming, and pivoting data.
- **10.** Click **Finish**. The document is imported. You can then connect to EPM System at any time and refresh the imported document with current data.



Configuring Job Console Autorefresh

Starting in Oracle Smart View for Office 20.200, you can configure the Job Console window to autorefresh at the interval you specify in the Windows Registry setting, JobConsoleAutoRefreshInterval.

You can still refresh the Job Console window as often as required using the Go button. However, you can also add the JobConsoleAutoRefreshInterval setting to the Registry and observe the window updating automatically, without clicking Go.

Add the JobConsoleAutoRefreshInterval setting as a new DWORD in the HKEY_CURRENT_USER Registry folder here:

Specify the time interval you require. The minimum is 15 seconds (where Base is set to Decimal, and Value Data is set to 15000).

Copying Versions

You can copy data from one bottom-up or target version of a selected scenario to another bottom-up or target version within the same scenario.

Data source types: Oracle Hyperion Planning

For example, you can create a Best Case version and copy some or all the data in that version to a Worst Case version to quickly create a starting point for the new version.

You can copy between bottom-up and target versions.

- When you copy to a bottom-up version, only the selected level 0 members are copied.
- When you copy to a target version, all selected members are copied.
- To protect data in approved planning units, copying a version does not copy to approved planning units.

Note:

To successfully copy data, when specifying the copy data criteria, you must select at least one member for the Scenario, Account, Entity, Period, and Version dimensions.

To copy a version:

- 1. From the Planning ribbon or Planning Ad Hoc ribbon, select **Copy Version**.
- 2. From **Scenario**, select the scenario to copy.
- 3. From **Copy From**, select the source version.
- 4. From **Copy To**, select the destination version.
- Click Go to display the available entities (planning units) for the selected source version.
- Use the arrow keys to select entities from Available Entities. You can copy entities with a Process Status of Not Started or First Pass.
- 7. **Optional:** To copy associated information, select any of these options:



- Copy Account Annotations. Only annotations for selected entities are copied. If you
 are copying to a bottom-up version, only level 0 entities (and their annotations) are
 copied.
- Copy Cell text and Document links
- Copy Supporting Details
- 8. Click Copy Data.

Wait for the Copy Version completion message before loading another web page.

Launching Business Rules in Excel

Data source types: Oracle Hyperion Planning

To launch a business rule in Excel to recalculate data in Oracle Essbase:

- 1. Open an Oracle Hyperion Planning ad hoc grid or form (single or composite).
- 2. Save any unsaved data.

Unsaved data is lost when you launch a business rule.

- 3. From the Planning ribbon, select **Calculate**, and then **Business Rules**.
- 4. **Optional:** Filter rules by cube and rule type.

All cubes and rule type options are selected by default. To narrow the search, clear the check boxes for cubes and rule types that you do not need to see. The list is filtered according to your selections. For example, selecting only Plan1 and all Rule Types, we would see business rules of all types that apply to only the Plan1 cube.

5. Optional: Use the Search field, under **Plan Type** and **Rule Type**, to search for rules by name or by part of a name.

Type your search criteria in the Search field, and then press Enter or click the

Search button, , at the right of the Search field.

For example, you may search for all rules and rule sets that contain the string

expense. After pressing **Enter** or clicking , the results list shows all business rules or rule sets that contain "Expense" anywhere within the name: beginning, middle, or end.

- 6. From **Business Rules**, under **Plan Type**, select the plan type associated with the rule you want to use.
- 7. Select a rule from the rules listed for that plan type, and then click **Launch**.

If the business rule includes runtime prompts, enter the information described in Entering Runtime Prompts.

Note:

Starting in release 11.2.5, users can add dynamic members, also known as "members on-the-fly," from Oracle Smart View for Office. To add dynamic members, manually type the new member name in the **Runtime Prompts** text box, and then click **Launch**.

If the calculation is successful, the values in the database reflect the results of the calculation.

Tip:

Oracle Hyperion Planning administrators: During form design in Oracle Hyperion Planning, rules with runtime prompts directly attached to a composite form with **Run on Save** enabled are not supported in Smart View. You should always attach rules to a simple form, enable **Run on Save**, then attach the business rules from the simple to the composite form. This way, all runtime prompt values are picked up correctly from the form context and the business rules launch successfully.

- 8. Click Close.
- 9. From the Smart View ribbon, select Refresh.

When launched, a business rule can prompt you to enter variable information, called a *runtime prompt*. The business rule designer sets up runtime prompts.

To enter a runtime prompt:

- **1.** Launch a business rule having a runtime prompt.
- 2. Enter or select the input type specified by the runtime prompt, summarized in the following table:

The Calculate Form business rule is created for each form to calculate subtotals. The Calculate Currencies business rule is created for forms that include multiple currencies in a row, column, or page to enable the conversion of values among available currencies.

The order in which business rules are launched is important and may affect the data. If you plan to launch both Calculate Form and the Calculate Currencies business rules, always run the conversions before subtotaling the form.

To launch the Calculate Form and Calculate Currencies business rules in Excel:

1. Open a form.

Any data that is not saved on the spreadsheet is lost when you launch the business rule.

2. From the Planning ribbon, select **Calculate**, and then **Rules on Form**.

The business rules associated with the form are displayed in the Business Rules dialog box.

- 3. Complete one or both of the following actions:
 - To convert currencies, select Calculate Currencies
 - To calculate subtotals, select Calculate Form
- 4. Click Launch.

If the calculation is successful, the values in the database reflect the results of the calculation.

Spreading Data for Time Periods

Data source types: Oracle Hyperion Planning



In a form, the spreading rules for time periods are set in Oracle Hyperion Planning as part of the as part of the dimension property settings. When you work with a form in Excel, and depending on how the form was set up by the administrator, data values can be spread, or distributed, in several ways:

- Spread the value of a summary time period to its base time periods or to the first parent or first child of the parent time period
- Spread values among children and parents proportionally, based on existing distribution
- Spread values based on the weekly distribution of a quarter, which could be 4-4-5, 5-4-4, 4-5-4, or None (as set up by the budget administrator)
- Temporarily lock the values of certain cells while spreading data over time periods (see Spreading Data with Cell Locking)
- Spread values for different time periods using a different spreading rule for each separate time period on the same row or column dimension. For example, FY2013 can have formula fill, and FY2014 can have flow.

This type of spreading requires Oracle Hyperion Planning Release 11.1.2.3.500 or later.

Notes

- You cannot spread data in a summary time period that includes members with mixed currency types.
- Excel formulas in child cells are ignored during spreading.

To spread data for time periods:

- **1.** Open a form.
- 2. Select a cell and enter a new value.

The value is distributed according to the rules described in "Adjusting and Spreading Data" in the *Oracle Hyperion Planning User's Guide*

3. Click Save.

When spreading data over time periods, you can temporarily lock the values of one or more cells to preserve their values when other values are recalculated. You can spread data across time periods based on various calculations and visually review the changes before committing them to the database. For examples of spreading with cell locking, see the *Oracle Hyperion Planning User's Guide*.

To temporarily lock values:

1. Open a form.



- 2. In the form, select the cell or group of cells that you want to lock.
- 3. From the Planning ribbon, select Lock.

A color change indicates that a cell is locked. You can now spread or manipulate data in the other cells however you want, without affecting the locked cells.

4. To unlock a cell, refresh the grid.

If your administrator has enabled Grid Spread, you can specify an amount or percentage to increase or decrease values across multiple dimensions on the grid, based on the existing values in the target cells. When calculating the spread data, read-only and locked cells and cells having supporting detail are ignored. Data integrity is ensured because values can be spread only to cells to which you have access.

To spread values using Grid Spread:

- 1. Put the cursor in the Subtotal or Total source cell whose value you want to spread to target cells.
- 2. From the Planning ribbon or Planning Ad Hoc ribbon, select **Adjust**, and then **Grid Spread.**
- 3. From the drop-down menu, select one of these options:
 - Value to increase or decrease values by a specified amount
 - Percentage to increase or decrease values by a percentage
- 4. Select Increase By or Decrease By and enter a value or percentage.
- 5. In Spread Value, enter the actual spread value that you want.

For example, if the **Current Value** is 100 and you want the spread value to be 125, enter 125 directly in **Spread Value** and do nothing with the **Increase By/Decrease By** options or text box in step 4.

Alternatively, you can enter 25 in **Increase By**, and 125 will be displayed in **Spread Value**.

Note:

Entering a value in **Spread Value** has no effect on the **Increase By/Decrease By** text box. But when you enter a value in **Increase By/Decrease By**, the spread value is reflected in the **Spread Value** text box.

- 6. Select a spreading pattern:
 - Proportional Spread to spread the value proportionally, based on the existing values in the target cells (the default)



- Evenly Split to spread the value evenly among the target cells
- Fill to replace the value in all target cells

Your administrator can add other spreading patterns.

- 7. Click **Spread**. The specified value or percentage is spread across the target cells, replacing former values with new ones.
- 8. To save the new values, click **Save**.

Spreading Values Using Mass Allocation

Data source types: Oracle Hyperion Planning

Using mass allocation, you can spread data to all descendents of a source cell and across all dimensions. Spreading by mass allocation spreads data to cells not displayed on the grid and does not require that you have access to the target cells.

Mass allocation is available only for forms, which must be enabled for mass allocation by the administrator. You must be provisioned with the Mass Allocate role to use mass allocation.

Note:

Mass allocation cannot be undone.

To spread values by mass allocation:

- 1. Put the cursor in the Total or Subtotal cell whose value you want to spread.
- 2. From the Planning ribbon or Planning Ad Hoc ribbonOracle Hyperion Planning, select **Adjust**, and then **Mass Allocate**.
- 3. Enter a new value in Spread Value to replace the current value, or from the dropdown menu, select one of the following options:
 - · Value to increase or decrease values by a specified amount
 - **Percentage** to increase or decrease values by a percentage
- 4. Select Increase By or Decrease By and enter a value or percentage.
- 5. In **Spread Value**, enter the actual spread value that you want.

For example, if the **Current Value** is 100 and you want the spread value to be 125, enter 125 directly in **Spread Value** and do nothing with the **Increase By**/**Decrease By** options or text box in step 4.

Alternatively, you can enter 25 in **Increase By**, and 125 will be displayed in **Spread Value**.



Note:

Entering a value in **Spread Value** has no effect on the **Increase By/Decrease By** text box. But when you enter a value in **Increase By/Decrease By**, the spread value is reflected in the **Spread Value** text box.

- 6. Select the Spread Type for allocating the specified value or percentage across the target cells:
 - **Proportional Spread** to spread the value proportionally, based on the existing values in the target cells (the default)
 - Evenly Split to spread the value evenly among the target cells
 - Fill to replace the value in all target cells
 - Relational Spread to spread into the selected cells based on values that exist in a different source location. Selecting this option displays the currently selected members for each dimension in the Selected column.

Your administrator can add other spreading patterns.

7. Click Spread. The new values are automatically saved in Oracle Essbase.

Member Formula

You can view the underlying formula in cells that contain a formula.

Such cells can be indicated on the grid by a cell style specified in the Oracle Smart View for Office **Options** dialog box, **Cell Styles** tab.

Data source types: Oracle Hyperion Planning

Note:

In the Oracle Hyperion Planning web interface, the **Member Formulas** property must be enabled in the form before you can view formulas in Smart View. Users with the proper permissions should open the form in Oracle Hyperion Planning, go to the **Layout** tab, then **Dimension Properties**, and then select **Member Formulas**.

To view a member formula:

- 1. Open a form.
- 2. Select the member whose formula you want to view.
- From the Planning ribbon, select More, and then Member Formula. Details of the formula are displayed.



Note:

When a formula is used to reference a member on another sheet, no data is returned. For example, if the period is in the column on another sheet, and all other sheets reference that cell, no data is refreshed on the other sheets. In order to display the data that references a member on another sheet, the Excel cell format for the member formula cell should be set to "General."

Supporting Detail

Supporting detail serves as a built-in calculator for developing data that is not in the member outline.

It can include text, values, and operators that define how data aggregates.

To add supporting detail that calculates values in a form or ad hoc grid:

1. Open a form or ad hoc grid, and then select the cells.

You can select one cell or a range of contiguous cells in a row or column. The section cannot include a combination of rows and columns. Select cells that are in the local currency so that you can write to them.

2. From the Planning ribbon or Planning Ad Hoc ribbon, select **Cell Actions** and then **Supporting Detail**.

The **Supporting Detail** window reflects your cell selection.

3. Enter a description over the initial "untitled" text.



The text and its associated operator must be unique among children of the same parent. By default, you can enter up to 1,500 characters.

4. Use the buttons to create or change the indented hierarchy to reflect the desired structure and calculations.

For example, click **Add Child** to add a line item directly below the selected item.

5. Set the mathematical relationships among the line items by selecting an operator for each of them.

Select from these operators:

Operator	Function
+	Add
-	Subtract
*	Multiply
/	Divide
~	Ignore

6. Enter data to set or calculate.

Enter numbers using the same scaling that was set up for the form.

7. Click Submit.

Values are dynamically calculated and aggregated before the data is submitted. Data on the form is also submitted.

The supporting detail hierarchy should reflect the type of information that supports the cell values and the mathematical operators that create the relationships.

To create or change the supporting detail hierarchy:

- **1.** In a form, select the cells with supporting detail.
- 2. From the Planning ribbon or Planning Ad Hoc ribbon, select Supporting Detail.
- 3. Create or change the rows in the hierarchy that provide the detail for the data values by putting the cursor on an item and clicking the options in this table:

Table 26-2 Supporting Detail Options

Option	Result
Add Child	Adds an item one level below the selected cell.
	You can add an unlimited number of children,
	but consider its potential performance impact.



Option	Result
Add Sibling	Adds an item at the same level as the selected cell. You can add an unlimited number of siblings, but consider its potential performance impact.
Delete	Removes the selected item
Delete All	Simultaneously removes all supporting detail
Promote	Moves the selected item to the next-higher level
Demote	Moves the selected item to the next-lower level
Move Up	Moves the selected item to before its sibling predecessor
Move Down	Moves the selected item to after its sibling successor
Duplicate Row	Adds a row below the selected item, duplicating its structure (text, operator, and values)
Fill	For rows, copies the data from the current cell to the cells to its right
Refresh	Gets the latest stored database values, restoring the previously saved values, and possibly overwriting changes you just made.

4. Click Submit.

The submit operation stores the detail text, values, and aggregate values.

Data source types: Oracle Hyperion Planning

In Oracle Hyperion Planning applications, when you delete supporting detail for a cell, you affect the associated value in the relational database. You specify how to handle the stored Oracle Essbase value. You can set it to #Missing or leave it as it was before the supporting detail was deleted. This feature is useful if you want to use supporting detail as a scratch pad or calculator.

To synchronize supporting detail with Essbase:

- 1. Open a form.
- 2. In the form, click the cell that has the supporting detail you want to remove.
- 3. From the Planning ribbon or Planning Ad Hoc ribbon, select Supporting Detail.
- 4. In the Supporting Detail window, delete the information, and then click OK.
- 5. Select an option from the displayed message to specify how to handle the aggregate value of the deleted supporting detail stored in Essbase:
 - To delete the value from Essbase, click Yes, set the value(s) to #Missing.
 - To leave the data value in Essbase as is, click **No, leave the value(s) as is.**

Setting User Preferences

Set preferences for application settings, display settings, and user variables.

Data source types: Oracle Hyperion Planning

To set user preferences for an Oracle Hyperion Planning application:

- **1.** From the tree list in the Smart View Panel, select an application.
- 2. Right-click, and then select **User Preferences**.
- 3. From **Preferences**, specify options for the following
 - Application Settings—Manage email options, specify alias settings, set options for approvals, and specify out of office settings.



Note:

Changes to the alias table require you to disconnect from the provider, and reconnect to take effect.

- **Display Settings**—Set number formatting, remember selected page members, allow a search if the number of pages exceeds a number you specify, set member indentation, use consolidation operators, perform partial grid fetch, specify number of members on each Dimensions Page, display specified record on each Assign Access Page, set date formatting.
- **User Variables**—Variables set up by the administrator to help you navigate large forms and grids.

To change the selected member for a user variable, click to launch the Member Selection dialog.

Oracle Smart View for Office 21.100+: You can apply an alias table to the

members in the **Member Selection** dialog. Click **E**, select **Alias Table**, and then choose an alias table from the list in the popup window. Selecting a table then closes the window. Your alias table selection is now applied to the members in Member Selection dialog. Select a member for the user variable, and then close the dialog.

Changing the alias table in **Member Selection** affects only the view in the dialog when setting user variables.

For more information on using **Member Selection**, see Selecting Members from the Member Selector.

Note:

- User preferences for locale, date format, and decimal/numeric format set on forms from within the web application are not honored on forms in Smart View.
- Oracle Hyperion Planning on-premises: You cannot set preferences in offline mode.

Saving Native Excel Formatting to Oracle Hyperion Planning


Oracle Smart View for Office provides a way for users to save native Excel formatting back to Oracle Hyperion Planning as part of a form or ad hoc grid.

Data source types: Oracle Hyperion Planning

Saved formatting is applied in both the Oracle Hyperion Planning browser interface and when the form is rendered within Excel. You can then choose how to display the formatting in Smart View. This functionality is in addition to the existing Smart View cell styles functionality (described in Cell Styles).

These formatting options are available in the **Formatting** group of the Planning ribbon, shown in Figure 1.

Once a form is rendered within Excel, Oracle Smart View for Office provides the options to view the formatting on a sheet. These options are accessed from the **Apply** button within the **Formatting** group on the Planning Ad Hoc ribbon.

Tip:

The **Apply** options are *viewing* options only and allow you to display the cell styles and native Excel formatting that were previously saved on a form.

To toggle between formatting view options on an Oracle Hyperion Planning form:

1. Open an Oracle Hyperion Planning form and click the **Apply** button within the **Formatting** group on the Planning Ad Hoc ribbon (see Figure 1).

The Apply options are displayed. The initial state before any option is selected is that no option is selected. Once an option is selected, the last option selection will be preserved the next time the form is opened.






Figure 26-2 Apply Options

- 2. Select an option:
 - None—Applies no styles (Excel formatting or Smart View cell styles) to the sheet. Though cell styles or custom styles may exist on the sheet, neither are shown when selecting this option. They are preserved, however, if you want to display them later using the Cell styles, Custom styles, or Custom and cell styles options.
 - **Cell styles**—Applies only Smart View cell styles to the sheet, as described in the "Cell Styles" topic.
 - **Custom styles**—Applies only custom user-defined native Excel formatting to the sheet.
 - Custom and cell styles—Applies both Excel formatting and Smart View cell styles to the sheet. Note that when you select Custom and cell styles, cell styles take precedent over custom Excel formatting.

To clear the formatting associated with a form or ad hoc grid, select **Clear** from the **Formatting** group on the Planning ribbon.

Selecting the **Clear** option removes any Excel formatting associated with the form or grid on the Oracle Hyperion Planning server. Note that you can still work with cell styles functionality since cell styles are not dependent on any custom formatting that is saved.

- When designing a grid, care should be taken to avoid conflicts between custom Excel formatting and Oracle Smart View for Office cell styles.
- For some ad hoc analysis operations, not all Excel formatting may be preserved. You may need to reapply formatting after performing certain operations.
- When a saved ad hoc grid is opened, Smart View tries to preserve the formatting that was saved to Oracle Hyperion Planning. For further ad hoc operations,



existing formatting options apply; for example, **Use Excel formatting** or cell styles.

- To preserve custom Excel formatting on ad hoc operations, select the Use Excel Formatting and the Move formatting on operations options on the Formatting page of the Options dialog box.
- Formatting can affect performance, especially during ad hoc operations when the **Move** formatting on operations option is enabled.
- Saving formatting is not recommended on large forms (for example, forms of 20,000 or more cells).
- There are differences between grids rendered in Smart View and those rendered in the browser in Oracle Hyperion Planning. When a saved grid is rendered in Oracle Hyperion Planning, some formatting may not appear exactly as it does in Smart View. Oracle Hyperion Planning will attempt to approximate the Smart View formatting.
- The Oracle Hyperion Planning administrator may have defined certain formatting on a form. Oracle Hyperion Planning end users can overwrite this formatting and save it on the form. It can then be merged with the administrator's formatting based on the option selected for this form in Oracle Hyperion Planning by the administrator. Refer to the Oracle Hyperion Planning documentation for more information.
- Save formatting functionality is not supported on composite forms.
- Ad hoc analysis started from a saved Oracle Hyperion Planning grid will inherit the formatting options saved as part of the grid.

To use Smart View Cell Styles or the Use Excel Formatting option for an ad hoc grid generated from a saved grid, complete the following steps:

- 1. Open the saved Oracle Hyperion Planning grid as a form.
- 2. In the Planning ribbon, Formatting group, select Apply, and then None.
- 3. Click Save to save the form back to Oracle Hyperion Planning.
- 4. Now use the saved form to perform ad hoc analysis.
- Excel formatting and custom styles are intended for use with static grids. Changes to the grid from the following operations can result in invalid formatting:
 - POV
 - Suppression options
 - Merged cells
 - Enabling or clearing the Repeat Member Labels options
 - Adding members to the form definition

Supported Native Excel Formatting summarizes the native Excel formatting supported by forms in Smart View, and whether the formatting is supported when the form is viewed in the Oracle Hyperion Planning web application.

Working Offline

If the Oracle Hyperion Planning offline component is installed and configured for your system, you can take forms offline and perform the same operations as you do when connected to an Oracle Hyperion Planning server.

The changes that you make to offline forms can be synchronized back to the server.

Offline functionality is supported for Oracle Hyperion Planning on-premises only. It is not supported for Planning in Oracle Enterprise Performance Management Cloud.

You can include both online and offline forms in the same Excel workbook.



To take forms offline:

- **1.** In Excel, connect to the Oracle Hyperion Planning data source that contains the forms you want to take offline.
- 2. From the Planning ribbon, select **More**, and then **Take Offline**.

The **Take Offline Wizard** is displayed; all forms that you can take offline are listed.

- 3. Expand the Available Forms/Folders and select folders and forms to take offline.
- 4. Click Next.
- 5. Double-click a dimension. You can select only one dimension.

If you selected multiple forms, the dimensions displayed are merged from the dimensions available for the selected forms.

- 7. Click OK.
- 8. Repeat step 5 through step 7 to select members or system variables for each dimension in the list.
- 9. Click Next.
- **10.** Supply a unique name and a description for the offline connection.
- **11.** Click **Finish** to download the selected forms and members.
- 12. Click OK, and then click Done.

Online connections specify *Planning* in the Provider column; offline connections specify *Offline Planning*.

- 3. Right-click and select **Connect**.
- 4. Right-click and select Open Form.

Note:

If you have a form open while you are directly connected to the Oracle Hyperion Planning server, and then take the form offline in the same session, you must reopen the form from the offline connection to work with it offline.

- 5. In the offline form, add or change data.
- 6. From the Planning ribbon, select **Submit Data**.

The changed data is saved locally. You can exit Excel without losing the changed data.

When you synchronize to the server, all data changed within a forms taken offline since the beginning of the session is saved to the server. You can sync data from all forms at once or from selected forms and members.

To save changed data to the Oracle Hyperion Planning server for **all** forms and members taken offline:

- 1. From the Planning ribbon, select Forms, and then Sync Back To Server.
- 2. Log in to the Oracle Hyperion Planning server.
- 3. Click Sync Back All.
- 4. Click OK.



To save changed data to the Oracle Hyperion Planning server for selected forms and members taken offline:

- 1. From the Planning ribbon, select Forms, and then Sync Back To Server.
- 2. Logon to the Oracle Hyperion Planning server.
- 3. Click Next.
- 4. Double-click a dimension.
- 5. From the Member Selection page, select members and system variables.
- 6. Click OK.
- Repeat step 4 through 6 to select members or system variables for each dimension in the list.
- 8. Select Finish to save data.
- 9. Click OK, and then Done.

💙 Tip:

After you reconnect to the server, check that the work that you completed offline is correct in the database. If you lose a row or column of data when you refresh a form, contact the administrator.

Refreshing the Offline Form Definition and Data

Data source types: Oracle Hyperion Planning

To refresh an offline form definition:

- Updates data on the offline forms with current values from the online forms.
- Adds or deletes members or forms from the ones available during an offline session.

To update offline data and the offline form definition:

- 1. From the Smart View ribbon, select **Panel**.
- 2. From the Smart View Panel, select the connection associated with the current offline session.
- 3. From the Planning ribbon, select More, and then Offline.



Note:

If you are using an offline connection and the Refresh Offline Definition option is not available, contact the Oracle Hyperion Planning administrator. This option is not available if you are using an online connection.

4. Enter the user name and password for the online data source.

Because you want to refresh the offline data from the Oracle Hyperion Planning server, you must log on to the server.

- 5. Do one of the following:
 - Click Refresh All to update all members and forms taken offline with current online values and definitions. Refresh All maintains the current offline form definition. Skip to step 10.
 - Click **Next** to select forms, members, and system variables to update. This selection may change the form definition; only members and forms that you select remain part of the definition. Members and forms not selected are no longer available offline. Continue to step 6.
- 6. Double-click a dimension.
- 7. From the Member Selection page, select members and system variables.

The list contains members and system variables of the selected dimension.

Use the arrow keys to move members and system variables to or from the **Selected Members** list.

- 8. Click OK.
- 9. Repeat step 6 through step 8 to select members or system variables for each dimension in the list.
- **10.** Click **Finish** to start the refresh.
- **11.** Click **OK**, and then click **Done** after the refresh is complete.

Smart View and Oracle Journals for Financial Management

About Oracle Journals for Financial Management

During a financial period, you may need to adjust data after it is entered or loaded into baselevel entities.

Data source types: Oracle Hyperion Financial Management

Oracle Journals for Financial Management provide an audit trail of changes made in the application and indicate which users made adjustments and which accounts, entities, and time periods are affected.

With Oracle Journals, you can:

- · Create double-sided journal entries by using debits and credits
- · Balance entries, or permit single-sided, out-of-balance entries
- Create recurring journals that are repeated for a number of future periods
- Create auto-reversing journals that generate reversing entries in the next time period
- Use the journal approval process to provide accountability

After creating a journal, you submit it to your supervisor for approval before posting it to the database.

In Oracle Smart View for Office, Oracle Journals for Financial Management is an extension that supports a subset of the Journals functionality found in the Financial Management web interface. Before you can use Oracle Journals, you must install and enable the extension. After connecting to a Financial Management data source, right-click a Financial Management application to view two journal commands in the Action Panel:

- **Manage Journals**—Launches the **Manage Journals** dialog box. When you select a journal to work with, the Oracle Journals ribbon is displayed.
- Create Journal—Launches the Create Journal dialog box.

When you select a journal to work with or create a journal, the Oracle Journals ribbon is displayed. Ribbon actions are available to you on a context basis; for example, if the journal is available for editing, the **Edit** button is enabled.

With the Oracle Journals for Financial Management extension in Smart View, you can perform these journal tasks:

- Open a journal and view its properties, such as Status, Type, Balance Type, Group, and Class
- Create a new blank journal or create a journal using a standard or recurring template
- Create a journal from data grids or data forms opened in Excel using the right-click option in the grid or form, or the **Create Journal** command in the ribbon



- Create an ad hoc query from within a journal.
- Edit and save journals
- Submit, Unsubmit, Approve, Reject, Post, Unpost, and Delete journals
- Open an Entity Detail Report from data grids or data forms, and from an Entity Detail report, click on a journal to drill down for further details

Additionally, in Smart View, you can analyze posted journals to see the adjustments and totals in an ad hoc grid. You can analyze selected rows, or analyze the entire journal.

Get started by installing the Oracle Journals for Financial Management extension, following the instructions in Installing the Oracle Journals Extension.

Note:

The Oracle Journals for Financial Management extension works with Smart View version 11.1.2.5.500 and later, and with Financial Management 11.1.2.4.100 and later.

The Oracle Journals for Financial Management functionality introduced in Smart View 11.1.2.5.700 requires the following:

- Financial Management 11.1.2.4.204 with the 11.1.2.4.204 PSE 25575478
- Smart View 11.1.2.5.700+
- Oracle Journals for Financial Management extension 11.1.2.5.700+ (included with Smart View 11.1.2.5.700+)

Installing the Oracle Journals Extension

You can install the Oracle Journals extension for Oracle Smart View for Office end users and for Smart View administrators.

For Smart View End Users

There is more than one method for installing the Oracle Journals extension; your Smart View administrator will inform you which method you should use.

If you are installing the extension directly from your own Smart View installation folder, see Installing from the Smart View Installation Folder.

If you are installing the extension automatically or optionally, see Installing Extensions.

For Smart View Administrators

Your users can install the Oracle Journals extension directly from the extensions folder of their Smart View installation.

Or, you can control how your Smart View end users install the Oracle Journals extension via the **Extensions** page of the Smart View **Options** dialog box. See "Administering Extension Installations and Updates" in the *Oracle Smart View for*



Office Installation and Configuration Guide for more information on setting up automatic or manual installations.

If you choose to set up automatic or manual installations, you should install Smart View in a test environment first, then refer to the <code>UpdateList.xml</code> file, found in the <code>extensions</code> folder of your Smart View installation. Use the entry in this file as a guideline for the Oracle Journals entry you will add to the <code>UpdateList.xml</code> file, as described in "Configuring Manual Extension Updates" in the Oracle Smart View for Office Installation and Configuration Guide.

Installing from the Smart View Installation Folder

Before you install the Oracle Journals extension, you must install Oracle Smart View for Office.

You do not have to close Office (Excel, Word, or PowerPoint) to install the Oracle Journals extension using this method.

To install the Oracle Journals for Financial Management directly from your Smart View installation:

1. Navigate to the folder where you installed Smart View and open the extensions folder.

For example, navigate to:

C:\Oracle\SmartView\extensions

- 2. Double-click SVFMJournalInstaller.svext.
- If an Office product is running, follow the prompts to restart Office; for example, if Excel is open, restart Excel.

If no Office products were open, then start Excel.

Journal Roles

The journal tasks that you can perform depend on the role assigned to you by the administrator. If a journal task is not available to you, it is disabled.

To open a journal, you must have Read access to one or more of the cells referenced in the line items. If you do not have Read access to the cells, journal reports display NOACCESS status for these cells.

To edit a journal, you must have All access to the class for the journal. To post a journal, you must have All access to the classes of every dimension in the detail lines that use classes.

These default roles pertain to journals:

- Journals Administrator (unrestricted journals access)
- Manage Templates
- Create Journals
- Create Unbalanced Journals
- Generate Recurring
- Read Journals
- Approve Journals

Creating Journals

Use journals to enter adjustments to account balances and maintain an audit trail of changes to data.

You create journals by entering a journal label and description, balance type, point of view, and adjustment amounts. You can also enter a class for the journals, and a journal group that you can use to filter and sort journals. After you create a journal, its status is Working.

You can drag the Entity, ICP, and all Custom dimensions between the journal grid and the POV. If all dimensions in the journal detail lines are the same, the dimension is moved to the POV header information. If they are not the same, they remain in the journal details. The Account dimension remains on the detail line, and all other dimensions remain in the header. If you are creating a journal for a single entity, you can use the entity dimension from the POV header without dragging it to the journal rows.

When you enter journal data, you can scan the journal and verify that the entries are valid. You can then make any necessary changes before posting the journal. See Scanning Journals.



Before you begin this procedure, in the Smart View Panel, ensure that you are connected to a Oracle Hyperion Financial Management data source.

To create a journal:

- 1. Perform an action:
 - In the Smart View Panel, right-click a Financial Management application, and then select **Create Journal**.

Alternatively, in the Smart View Panel, select a Financial Management application , and then select **Create Journal** from the Action Panel, shown in Figure 1.

• From an ad hoc grid or form, select a cell or range of cells on which to base the journal, and in the HFM Ad Hoc ribbon or HFM ribbon, click **Create**



Alternatively, right-click a cell or cell range on which to base the journal and select **Smart View**, then **Journals**, and then **Create Journal**.



See Guidelines for Creating Journals from Ad Hoc Grids or Data Forms for additional information on creating journals using this method.

The journal is created and you can now proceed directly to Editing Journal Properties.

Note:

Do not click **Refresh** or **Save** if you want to make further changes to the POV. Once you click **Refresh** or **Save**, the POV is locked for this journal.

2. In **Create Journal**, to change the Point of View, click the arrow in the text box next to a dimension name and select a member.

The dimensions that display in the POV across the top of the **Create Journal** dialog box (Figure 2) are always the Scenario, Year, Period and Value dimensions.



When creating a journal, ensure that the values in Scenario, Year, Period, and Value are the ones to which you want to enter adjustments.

- 3. From Template, select an option:
 - To create a new blank journal, select Blank Journal.

Note that when you select **Blank Journal**, the options in the **Filters** area are not available.

Proceed to step 5.

• To use a standard journal template, select **Standard Templates**, then select a template from the list.

Standard templates contain accounts and entities for adjustments that you enter frequently.

Optional: To filter the list of standard templates, go to step 4. Otherwise, proceed to step 5.

• To use a recurring journal template, select **Recurring Templates**, then select a template from the list.

You can use a recurring template to create journals automatically. When you generate a journal from a recurring template, you receive a confirmation message that the journal has been generated. The status of the journal is Approved.

Optional: To filter the list of recurring templates, go to step 4. Otherwise, proceed to step 5.

Note:

The journal template type you select determines the **Type** property for the journal you are creating and is a one-time selection. Once a journal is created, you can view the **Type** property for the journal, but it cannot be edited.

- 4. **Optional:** To filter the standard or recurring templates list, set filters for one or more of the following criteria, and then click **Apply Filters**, **W**:
 - Entity—Click the Search button, in the Member Selection dialog box, select the members to filter on.

Or, type the member names, in their qualified format, directly into the text box, separated by a semicolon (;). For example, for <code>EastSales</code>, type <code>EastRegion.EastSales</code>.

- Group—Enter journal group names, separated by a semicolon (;). The percent sign (%) may be used as a wildcard character. The journal group that you assign must exist in the application.
- Label—Enter a journal label. The label can contain a maximum of 20 characters. The percent sign (%) may be used as a wildcard character. These characters are not allowed: . + */ # {};, @
- **Description**—Enter a description. The percent sign (%) may be used as a wildcard character.
- Balance Types—Select a type: All, Balanced, Unbalanced, or Balanced by Entity. Selecting All automatically selects all balance types.



To clear filters and view the entire template list, click **Reset Filters**, 16.

5. Click Create Journal.

The journal is displayed, but the basic properties of the journal are yet to be defined. Continue with the procedure in Editing Journal Properties.

An example journal is shown in Figure 3, using a standard, balanced template, The POV for this journal is Scenario=Actual, Year=2008, Period=January, and Value=<Entity Curr Adjs>.

Editing Journal Properties

Use this procedure to define the properties of new journals and edit properties of existing journals.

To edit a journal:

- 1. Perform an action:
 - To edit the properties of the journal you just created, as described in Creating Journals (assumes the journal is still open), click Edit in the Oracle Journals ribbon.
 - To edit an existing journal, open the journal (see Opening Journals), and then click **Edit** in the Oracle Journals ribbon.

The Journal Properties dialog box is displayed (Figure 1).

- 2. Edit the journal properties:
 - Label—Enter a journal label.

The label can contain a maximum of 20 characters. These characters are not allowed:

. + - */ # {} ; , @

The ampersand character (&) is allowed, but will not display properly in **Manage Journals**. For example, if a single ampersand in used in a journal name, then no ampersand is displayed in the name in **Manage Journals**; if two consecutive ampersands are used, then a single ampersand is displayed in the name in **Manage Journals**. Once the journal is opened in Oracle Smart View for Office, the name displays correctly. The name also displays correctly in the Oracle Hyperion Financial Management web interface.

- **Description**—Enter an optional journal description.
- Balance Type—Select a type:
 - Balanced
 - Unbalanced
 - Balanced by Entity
- **Type**—Non-editable. **Type** is the journal type, which was set when you created the journal (see Creating Journals). Once the journal type is set during the journal creation process, it cannot be changed.
- **Group**—Select a group for the journal.



Use the **Group** property to help to classify journals by type. Examples of journal groups are Allocation or Overhead.

- **Class**—Select a class or use the Default class.
- 3. Status—Non editable. The Status field changes when you perform an action in the **Deployment** group. Status types are:
 - Working
 - Submitted
 - Approved
 - Rejected
 - Posted
- 4. When you have finished updating the journal properties, click **OK**.
- 5. In the Oracle Journals ribbon, click the **Save** button to save the changes to the journal properties.



Guidelines for Creating Journals from Ad Hoc Grids or Data Forms

Refer to this section when creating journals from ad hoc grids or forms, as described in Creating Journals. When you are finished reviewing this topic, you can continue with the steps in Editing Journal Properties.

You may start the journal creation process by selecting one or more cells in an ad hoc grid or data form. Note that:

- The journal will be displayed with the selected members in the cell intersections as the line items.
- The selected cells should have valid members in the Value dimension.
- Before saving the journal, make any necessary changes to the POV in the POV toolbar. Once you save or refresh the journal, you can no longer make any changes to the POV.

Working with Value Members

- If you select one or more value members from <Entity Currency>, <Entity Curr Adjs>, or <Entity Curr Total>, the new journal will use <Entity Curr Adjs> as the Value member.
- If the selection has one or more members from <Parent Currency>, <Parent Curr Adjs>, or <Parent Curr Total>, the new journal will use Parent Curr Adjs> as the Value member.
- If you select one or more members [Parent], [Parent Adjs] or [Parent Total], the new journal will use [Parent Adjs] as the Value member.



- [Contribution Adjs], will be used if the selection has one or more of the following members: [Proportion], [Elimination], [Contribution], [Contribution Adjs], [Contribution Total].
- If the selected members contain <Currency>, <Currency>_Adjs, or <Currency>_Total, and the selection has only one Entity member, the following checks are performed:
 - If the Entity default currency is the selected Currency, <Entity Curr Adjs> is used as the Value member.
 - If the default currency is not the selected Currency, and the Entity has a single parent, and if the parent's currency is the selected Currency, use <Parent Curr Adjs> as the Value member.
 - If neither of the above conditions are met, an <Entity Currency> and <Parent Curr Adjs> will be available for the selection.
- If the selection does not contain any of the valid members noted above, an error message is displayed.
- If the selection contains members from different valid groups—for example, <Entity Curr Adjs> and <Parent Curr Adjs>—you will be given selection options.

Scenario, Period, and Year Members

If the selection contains multiple Scenario, Period, or Year members, you will have the option to select one of these. Otherwise, the selected value will be used as the POV.

Opening Journals

Before opening a journal, in the Smart View Panel, ensure that you are connected to a Oracle Hyperion Financial Management data source.

To open a journal

1. In the Smart View Panel, right-click a Financial Management application, and then select **Manage Journals**.

Alternatively, in the Smart View Panel, select a Financial Management application , and then select **Manage Journals** from the Action Panel, shown in Figure 1.






Figure 27-5 Manage Journal Command in the Smart View Action Panel

- 2. **Optional:** To filter the list of journals, set filters for one or more of the following criteria, and then click Apply Filters,
 - Entity—Click the Search button, in the Member Selection dialog box, select the members to filter on.

Or, type the member names, in their qualified format, directly into the text box, separated by a semicolon (;). For example, for <code>EastSales</code>, type <code>EastRegion.EastSales</code>.

- Group—Enter journal group names, separated by a semicolon (;). The percent sign (%) may be used as a wildcard character. The journal group that you assign must exist in the application.
- Label—Enter a journal label. The percent sign (%) may be used as a wildcard character. The label can contain a maximum of 20 characters. These characters are not allowed: . + */ # {};, @
- **Description**—Enter a description. The percent sign (%) may be used as a wildcard character.
- Journal Types—Select a type: All, Auto-reversing, Regular, or Auto-reversal.

Note:

An auto reversal journal is a system generated journal. When you create an auto reversing journal, then, the next month, a system-generated journal is created with the journal type, "Auto reversal." A newly-created journal will not be of the Auto-reversal type.

- Balance Types—Select a type: All, Balanced, Unbalanced, or Balanced by Entity. Selecting All automatically selects all balance types.
- Status—Select a status: All, Working, Submitted, Approved, Rejected, or Posted.

To clear filters and view the entire list of journals, click **Reset Filters**, 15.

3. Select a journal in the list and click Edit, 🧭.

Alternatively, double-click a journal in the list to open it.

From here, you can proceed to other journal tasks, such as Scanning Journals or Editing Journals.

Scanning Journals

After you enter journal data, you can scan the journal to verify that all entries are valid.

The scan process enables you to identify errors and make any necessary changes before you post the journal.

Before you begin this procedure, in the Smart View Panel, ensure that you are connected to a Oracle Hyperion Financial Management data source.

To scan journals:

1. Create or open a journal.



See Creating Journals or Opening Journals.

2. In the Oracle Journals ribbon, click Scan, 🐱 Scan.

If the journal contains errors, a message window is displayed noting the error. If all of the entries are valid, no message is displayed.

- 3. **Optional:** To scan another journal, repeat step 1 and step 2.
- 4. When finished, click Close.

Viewing Journal Status

The journal status indicates the current state of the journal. The status of a journal changes when you create, submit, approve, reject, or post the journal.

To view journal status:

1. In the Smart View Panel, right-click a Oracle Hyperion Financial Management application, and then select **Manage Journals**.

Alternatively, in the Smart View Panel, select a Financial Management application , and then select **Manage Journals** from the Action Panel, shown in Figure 1.

2. In the Manage Journals dialog box, view the Status column for the journal.

Status	Description
Working	Journal is created. It has been saved, but it can be incomplete. For example, it might need to have a label or single entity assigned.
Submitted	Journal is submitted for approval.
Approved	Journal is approved for posting.
Rejected	Journal is rejected or unposted.
Posted	Journal adjustments are posted to the database.

3. When finished, click **Close**.

Modifying List Display in Manage Journals Window

In the **Manage Journals** dialog box, the journals list displays the label, status, entity, short description, and group of all of the journals in the system.

You can sort the list of journals. You can select which columns to display, and sort the list alphabetically in ascending or descending order by any single displayed column. If the Entity or Parent column is selected for display, and if any journals have multiple values in the Entity or Parent column, then for each individual value, a separate journal row is displayed.

Before you begin this procedure, in the Smart View Panel, ensure that you are connected to a Oracle Hyperion Financial Management data source.

To select journal columns to display on the list:



1. In the Smart View Panel, right-click a Financial Management application, and then select **Manage Journals**.

Alternatively, in the Smart View Panel, select a Financial Management application, and then select **Manage Journals** from the Action Panel, shown in Figure 1.

2. Select View, then Columns, and then select a column to display or hide from the dropdown list; alternatively, to display all the columns in the list, select Show All.

Figure 1 shows the column drop-down list.

- 3. Optional: If you did not select Show All in step 2, then repeat step 2 for each additional column that you want to add to the display.
- 4. **Optional:** To change the column sort order from ascending to descending, click the column header.
- 5. When finished, click Close.

Editing Journals

You can edit a journal that you previously created.

For example, you can change the description of a journal, add adjustments, or change the balance type.



You can edit only Working, Submitted, and Rejected journals. You cannot edit Approved or Posted journals. You must have All access to the class for a journal to edit the journal. See Journal Roles.

Before you begin this procedure, in the Smart View Panel, ensure that you are connected to a Oracle Hyperion Financial Management data source.

To edit journals:

1. Open a journal with the status of Working, Submitted, or Rejected.

See Opening Journals.

- 2. To edit journal properties, in the Oracle Journals ribbon, click **Edit**, and then complete the procedure in Editing Journal Properties.
- 3. To change the POV of the journal detail:
 - a. Double-click a member cell within the grid.
 - b. Select a member in the Member Selection dialog box, and click OK.
 - c. Repeat step 3.a and step 3.b for each POV change you want to make.
 - d. Click Refresh, 🖓 Refresh

For more information on member selection, see Selecting Dimension Members for Journal Detail.

4. To update a journal entry, under the **Debit** or **Credit** column in the grid, type directly into the cell that you want to change.

The figures in the Total and Variance rows are updated automatically.

 To perform ad hoc analysis with the selected journal, in the Oracle Journals ribbon, select Analyze, Analyze.

For more information, see Ad Hoc Analysis.

6. To scan the journal and verify that the entries are valid, click Scan.

See Scanning Journals.

Selecting Dimension Members for Journal Detail

Journal detail contains a set of dimension members that you define to specify the data accessed for a specific journal.

Each journal saves the journal detail with dimension information you select, which is displayed automatically the next time that you open the journal.

The point of view displays the members for the Scenario, Year, Period, and Value dimensions. To select members for journal detail, you can select a row and click **Member Selection** in the Oracle Journals ribbon. The system displays the point of view from which you can select the member for each dimension. To create journals for parent adjustments, you select the Parent Adjs member for the Value dimension. For each line of journal detail, you must specify a Parent member if the Value dimension is Parent Currency Adj, Parent Adj, or Contribution Adj. In addition, you must specify an entity, account, intercompany partner, and Custom dimension.

You can select the journal detail when the journal status is Working, Submitted, or Rejected. You cannot make changes to the journal detail when the journal status is Approved or Posted.



Before you begin this procedure, in the Smart View Panel, ensure that you are connected to a Oracle Hyperion Financial Management data source.

To select dimensions for journal detail:

1. Create or open a journal.


The Create Journal or Manage Journals window is displayed.

See Creating Journals or Opening Journals.

2. To change the point of view, at the top of **Create Journal** or **Manage Journals**, click the arrow in the drop-down text box for a dimension and select a member.

Repeat this step to change the point of view for the Scenario, Year, Period, and Value dimensions, as you require.

For example, you could change point of view in the Period dimension from June to July:



3. Click Create or Close.

Copying and Pasting Journal Cells

You can copy and paste the information in the journals grid from one cell to another to create journal entries.

To copy or paste journal rows:

1. Create or open a journal.

The Create Journal or Manage Journals window is displayed.

See Creating Journals or Opening Journals.

- 2. Perform an action:
 - Select a row in the journals grid.
 - Select a cell.
- **3.** In Excel's Home ribbon, click the **Copy** button.

Alternatively, right-click and select Copy.



- 4. Select the row or cell to which to paste the values.
- 5. From Excel's Home ribbon, click the **Paste** button.

Alternatively, right-click and select **Paste**.

6. In the Oracle Journals ribbon, click the **Save** button to save the changes to the journal properties.



Submitting Journals

After creating journals and entering journal data, you must submit them to your supervisor for approval before posting them to the database.

You can submit a journal when you create it, or submit it later by selecting it from the list of available journals.

You can submit journals one at a time or in batches. After you submit a journal, the status changes to Submitted. A reviewer then approves or rejects the journal, and if it is approved, you can post it.

Before you begin this procedure, in the Smart View Panel, ensure that you are connected to a Oracle Hyperion Financial Management data source.

To submit journals:

1. In the Smart View Panel, right-click a Financial Management application, and then select Manage Journals.

The Manage Journals window is displayed.

- 2. Set the point of view as described in Selecting Dimension Members for Journal Detail.
- 3. Before proceeding, click Refresh, 🐏, to update the list of journals with those that correspond to the selected POV.

Refreshing the journals list helps you to avoid errors that may arise when the selected POV and the listed journals are not in sync.

- 4. Perform a task:
 - To submit unopened journals:
 - In the Manage Journals window, press and hold the Ctrl key, then select journals with the status, "Working."

Alternatively, select a single journal with the status, "Working."

- Click Submit, 🗳.
- When you're finished submitting journals, in the Manage Journals window, click Close.



- To submit an opened journal:
 - a. Open a journal, as described in Opening Journals.
 - b. In the Oracle Journals ribbon, click Bubmit

Unsubmitting Journals

You can unsubmit a journal that you previously submitted. When you unsubmit a journal, the status reverts from Submitted to Working.

Before you begin this procedure, in the Smart View Panel, ensure that you are connected to a Oracle Hyperion Financial Management data source.

To unsubmit journals:

1. In the Smart View Panel, right-click a Financial Management application, and then select Manage Journals.

The Manage Journals window is displayed.

- 2. Set the point of view as described in Selecting Dimension Members for Journal Detail.
- 3. Before proceeding, click Refresh, 🗠, to update the list of journals with those that correspond to the selected POV.

Refreshing the journals list helps you to avoid errors that may arise when the selected POV and the listed journals are not in sync.

- 4. Perform a task:
 - To unsubmit unopened journals:
 - a. In the **Manage Journals** window, press and hold the **Ctrl** key, and then select journals with the status, "Submitted."

Alternatively, select a single journal with the status, "Submitted."

- b. Click Unsubmit, 🔽.
- c. When you're finished unsubmitting journals, in the Manage Journals window, click Close.
- To unsubmit an opened journal:
 - a. Open a journal, as described in Opening Journals.
 - b. In the Oracle Journals ribbon, click Unsubmit

Approving Journals

After you submit a journal, you can approve it for posting.

You can approve a journal from the Oracle Journals ribbon after you create and submit it, or you can approve it later by selecting it from the journals list.

You can approve journals one at a time or in batches. After you approve a journal, the status changes to Approved and the journal cannot be edited.

Before you begin this procedure, in the Smart View Panel, ensure that you are connected to a Oracle Hyperion Financial Management data source.



To approve journals:

1. In the Smart View Panel, right-click a Financial Management application, and then select **Manage Journals**.

The Manage Journals window is displayed.

- 2. Set the point of view as described in Selecting Dimension Members for Journal Detail.
- 3. Before proceeding, click Refresh, 🐏, to update the list of journals with those that correspond to the selected POV.

Refreshing the journals list helps you to avoid errors that may arise when the selected POV and the listed journals are not in sync.

- 4. Perform a task:
 - To approve one or more unopened journals:
 - a. In the **Manage Journals** window, press and hold the **Ctrl** key, and then select journals with the status, "Submitted.".

Alternatively, select a single journal with the status, "Submitted."

- **b.** Click **Approve**, <u>La</u>.
- c. When you're finished approving journals, in the **Manage Journals** window, click **Close**.
- To approve an opened journal:
 - a. Open a journal, as described in Opening Journals.
 - b. In the Oracle Journals ribbon, click

Rejecting Journals

After a journal is submitted for approval, or approved, you can reject it.

You can reject journals one at a time or in batches. After you reject a journal, the status changes to Rejected.

To reject journals:

1. In the Smart View Panel, right-click a Oracle Hyperion Financial Management application, and then select **Manage Journals**.

The Manage Journals window is displayed.

- 2. Set the point of view as described in Selecting Dimension Members for Journal Detail.
- 3. Before proceeding, click 🖤 to update the list of journals with those that correspond to the selected POV.

Refreshing the journals list helps you to avoid errors that may arise when the selected POV and the listed journals are not in sync.

- 4. Perform a task:
 - To reject one or more unopened journals:



a. In the **Manage Journals** window, press and hold the **Ctrl** key, and then select journals with the status, "Submitted" or "Approved."

Alternatively, select a single journal with the status, "Submitted" or "Approved."

- b. Click Reject, 💩.
- c. When you're finished rejecting journals, in the **Manage Journals** window, click **Close**.
- To reject an opened journal:
 - a. Open a journal with the status "Submitted" or "Approved," as described in Opening Journals.
 - b. In the Oracle Journals ribbon, click local Reject.

Posting Journals

You can post a journal after it is approved, after it is submitted, or after it is submitted and approved.

You can also post it later by selecting it from the list of available journals.

The scenario view to which a journal is posted depends on the setting for the Scenario attribute "ZeroViewForAdj." If this attribute is set to Periodic, the journal is posted to the Periodic value. If this attribute is set to YTD, the journal is posted to the YTD value.

You can post journals one at a time or in batches. You must have the journal period open before you can post, and you must have All access to the classes of every entity for the detail lines.

Your ability to post a journal also depends on the process level of the data in the journal. For example, if you have a process management role of Reviewer 2 and the data that the journal affects is at Process Level 6, you cannot post the journal. For more information, see "Process Levels" in the "Using Process Management" chapter of the *Oracle Hyperion Financial Management User's Guide*.

When you post adjustments from a journal, the adjustment values are stored in the specified adjustment member. These four Value dimension members are valid for posting journals: Entity Currency Adjustments, Parent Currency Adjustments, Parent Adjustments, and Contribution Adjustments.

You can post a journal to a specific parent and child combination (node) by using one of these Value dimensions:

- Parent Adjs—Applied to the node before consolidation.
- Contribution Adjs—Applied to the contribution when determining the contribution total.

Note:

Node adjustments are posted in the currency of the parent.

If more than one journal is posted to the Entity Currency Adjs member for the same account, the results are cumulative. The total from the current journal is added to or subtracted to from the existing total in Entity Currency Adjs.



When you post a journal, the system recalculates the account balances so that the database reflects the adjustments. The journal status changes to Posted, and you can view the adjustment in a data grid.

Note: Do not delete or rename a posted journal, as this will result in unresolved data for the adjustment values that the journal had created.

To post journals:

1. In the Smart View Panel, right-click a Oracle Hyperion Financial Management application, and then select **Manage Journals**.

The Manage Journals window is displayed.

- 2. Set the point of view as described in Selecting Dimension Members for Journal Detail.
- 3. Before proceeding, click Refresh, 🗠, to update the list of journals with those that correspond to the selected POV.

Refreshing the journals list helps you to avoid errors that may arise when the selected POV and the listed journals are not in sync.

- 4. Perform a task:
 - To post one or more unopened journals:
 - a. In the **Manage Journals** window, press and hold the **Ctrl** key, and then select journals with the status, "Approved."

Alternatively, select a single journal with the status, "Approved."

- b. Click Post, **P**.
- c. When you're finished posting journals, in the Manage Journals window, click Close.
- To post an opened journal:
 - a. Open a journal with the status, "Approved", as described in Opening Journals.
 - b. In the Oracle Journals ribbon, click Post

Unposting Journals

You can unpost a journal after it is posted.

For example, suppose you post several journals with adjustments to an entity, and you receive new data for that entity. You can unpost the journals, load the new data, and post the journals again.

When you unpost a journal, the journal status changes to Rejected. When you unpost an auto-reversal journal, the journal status changes back to Approved.

To unpost journals:



1. In the Smart View Panel, right-click a Oracle Hyperion Financial Management application, and then select **Manage Journals**.

The Manage Journals window is displayed.

- 2. Set the point of view as described in Selecting Dimension Members for Journal Detail.
- 3. Before proceeding, click Refresh, 🐏, to update the list of journals with those that correspond to the selected POV.

Refreshing the journals list helps you to avoid errors that may arise when the selected POV and the listed journals are not in sync.

- 4. Perform a task:
 - To unpost one or more unopened journals:
 - a. In the **Manage Journals** window, press and hold the **Ctrl** key, and then select journals with the status, "Posted."

Alternatively, select a single journal with the status, "Posted."

- **b.** Click **Unpost**, **P**.
- c. When you're finished unposting journals, in the **Manage Journals** window, click **Close**.
- To unpost an opened journal:
 - a. Open a journal with the status "Posted," as described in Opening Journals.
 - b. In the Oracle Journals ribbon, click ^{Unpost}.

Journal Validation

When you submit, approve, or post a journal, the system validates the journal.

The system checks for these conditions:

- The period must be a base period for the scenario's base frequency.
- When you post or unpost a journal, the period must be opened.
- The Value dimension must be an adjustment dimension.
- The journal must have the appropriate status for the action to be performed.
- Line items must exist for the journal.
- The entity and the parent must be valid dimensions. For regular journals, the entity must allow adjustments. If you are posting a journal to Parent Currency Adjs, you must enter a valid parent. The entity must be a child of the specified parent for the journal entity.
- If you are posting a journal to a node, the parent must allow adjustments for child entities. The entity must be a child of the specified parent.
- Node journals must have valid parent-entity combinations. The system also checks for the Organization by Period application setting when you attempt to post node journals. The entity must be active for the parent for the period in which you are posting.
- The account must be valid. It must be an Asset, Liability, Revenue, Expense, Balance, Flow, or Balance Recurring account. The account must be a base account and cannot be designated as calculated in metadata. It cannot be calculated through a roll-up process; the account cannot have children.



- All other dimensions must be valid. The ICP dimension cannot be ICP Top, ICP Entities, or blank, but you can select ICP None. If an ICP is specified, the account must be set up as an ICP account.
- The Custom dimensions cannot be designated as calculated in metadata and cannot be calculated through a roll-up process; the Custom dimensions cannot have children.
- For a balanced journal, the total debits must equal the total credits. For a balanced- by-entity regular journal, the total debits must equal the total credits for each entity. For a balanced-by-entity node journal, the total debits must equal the total credits for each node and the parent and children entities must have the same currency. If the Value dimension is Entity Currency, the parent entities in the journal can have different currencies, but they must have the same currency as their children entities.
- All dimension intersections must be valid.
- The subcube of dimensions containing the line item cell cannot be locked.
- The cell cannot be designated as a NoInput cell in rules.

Analyzing Journals

After posting journals, you can use ad hoc analysis in Oracle Smart View for Office to check the adjustments and totals.

You can analyze one or more rows, or the entire journal. You can analyze journals of any status: Working, Posted, Submitted, Approved, or Rejected.

When forming the ad hoc grid, the Value dimensions will always be in the column and all other dimensions will be in the row. The row dimensions will appear in the following order:

- Entity
- Account
- ICP
- Customs

If your selection has the same members for a dimension, that dimension will appear in the grid POV.

Before you begin this procedure, in the Smart View Panel, ensure that you are connected to a Oracle Hyperion Financial Management data source.

To analyze journals:

1. Create or open a journal.

See Creating Journals or Opening Journals.

- 2. Set the point of view as described in Selecting Dimension Members for Journal Detail.
- 3. In the journal grid, select one or more dimension, member, or data cells, and click Analyze, Analyze.

Observe that the journal has been converted to an ad hoc grid, where you can perform further ad hoc analysis.



Deleting Journals

You can delete unposted journals that you no longer need.

You cannot delete Approved or Posted journals, because that would result in unresolved data for the adjustment values that the journal had created.

Note:
Before you begin this procedure, in the Smart View Panel, ensure that you are connected to a Oracle Hyperion Financial Management data source.
To delete journals:
1 In the Smart View Panel, right-click a Financial Management application, and then select

1. In the Smart View Panel, right-click a Financial Management application, and then selec Manage Journals.

The Manage Journals window is displayed.

2. Optional: Filter journals by status.

To filter by status, select one or more of the following options, and then click **Apply Filters**.

- Working
- Submitted
- Rejected

You cannot delete Approved or Posted journals

Select a journal and click Delete, X

Alternatively, use the Shift or Ctrl keys to select multiple journals and click Delete, X.

- 4. At the confirmation prompt, click Yes.
- 5. Repeat step 2 to step 4 for each journal that you want to delete.
- 6. Click Close to exit the Manage Journals window.

Entity Detail Reports

Entity Detail Reports provide a full audit detail of the entire consolidation path for a specific data cell of a specified entity.

The report starts with the source amount entered in the Entity Currency Value dimension and shows all of its related details in each Value dimension, including the journal entries generated in the journal posting process and the audit transaction details generated as part of the consolidation process. If the account contains line item detail, the report also shows the related line item details entered for the account.

This report provides the capability of viewing transactions, showing the detail of the amounts generated from each step of the consolidation process, including currency translations and



intercompany eliminations. It also displays the transaction records for derived data from prior periods.

Starting the Entity Detail Report

You access the Entity Detail Report from an ad hoc grid or data form.

Before you begin, connect to a Oracle Hyperion Financial Management application and open an ad hoc grid or form.

To start the Entity Detail Report:

- **1.** From a Financial Management ad hoc grid or form, select the cell for which to view entity transaction detail.
- 2. Right-click and select Smart View, then Journals, and then Entity Details.

Alternatively, in the HFM or HFM Ad Hoc ribbon, click Entity Details

The **Entity Details** dialog box is displayed.

Report Point of View

The Entity Detail report uses the point of view from the data grid that you are using. The Point of View information used for the report includes the Scenario, Year, Period, Entity, View, Account, ICP, and Custom dimensions. The Value dimension information is ignored, and all Value members are displayed on the report.

You can only select one account when you run the report. If the account selected is a parent account, the system does not display line item details, journal details, or audit transaction details for the account. The system does not enumerate the details for the base members of the parent account. The support of base members applies only to the custom dimensions. For example, if the Intercompany Partner, Custom1 is a Parent member, all entries that are posted to all base members of the Parent member are displayed.

Selecting Rows for the Report

You can select the rows to display on the report. You can change these selections at any time.

The rows can display Entity Currency, Entity Curr Adjs, Entity Curr Total, Parent Currency, Parent Curr Adjs, Parent Curr Total, Parent Adjs, Parent Total, Proportion, Elimination, Contribution, Contribution Adjs, and Contribution Total.

The columns display the amount, Custom accounts, ICP, debits, credits, ID, or remarks.

You can suppress the display of some transaction details or dimensions by deselecting the applicable options. For example, if you want the report to show only the journal details, you can deselect all other row display options, leaving only the journals option selected. If you want to also suppress the Custom columns because they are not used for the account, you can deselect these options from the column display.

The Value column contains all of the Value members. If the currency of the parent member is the same as the currency of the entity, the system skips the display of the Parent Currency related Value members because it is duplicate information. The



Amount column contains the amount from the data subcube. The amounts for each transaction detail are stored in the Debit or Credit column, depending on the sign of the data cell.

The Remarks column contains additional information about the amount. Depending on the Value dimension, you can have several possible remark comments such as whether the amount is Input, Calculated, or Derived, or uses the Nature parameter for auditing transactions. It can also contain information about prior records. One of the main purposes of the Entity Detail Transaction Report is to show all of the transaction records that made up the amount stored in the database. Prior LID, Journals, and Transactions remarks indicate that the amount stored in the database could be from line item details, journal adjustments, consolidation eliminations, as well as derived data from prior periods.

To select report rows:

- 1. Start an Entity Details Report, as described in Starting the Entity Detail Report.
- 2. In the Entity Details dialog box, select View, then Rows, and then select rows to display, or select Show All.

The row types that you can choose to display are:

- Base Details—See Displaying Base Details
- Line Item Details—See Displaying Line Item Detail
- Journals—See Linking to Journal Detail
- Destination Transactions—See Displaying Source and Destination Transactions
- Source Transactions—See Displaying Source and Destination Transactions

Displaying Base Details

In the Entity Detail Report, the option to display base details applies only to a data cell that is a parent member cell. If the option to display base details is not selected, the aggregated amount for the parent cell is displayed as one entry in the report. If you select to display base details, all the information from the base records of the parent cell is displayed.

For example, suppose AllCustom1 is a parent member of the Custom 1 dimension. The base members include Opening, Appropriation, Variances, Increases, Decreases, and Closing. When you select to display base details in the report, the system generates the report with all



applicable base records for AllCustom1. If you do not select to display base details, the only the amount for the selected parent cell is displayed; for example, the parent cell AllCustom1 is displayed without any base details.

Displaying Line Item Detail

In the Entity Detail Report, the option to display line item detail is only applicable for the scenario and account defined to use line item detail. Line item detail information is available only for the Entity Currency Value dimension.

Linking to Journal Detail

When the Entity Detail Report contains the journal detail for any of the adjustment Value members, the debit or credit amount is displayed with the journal ID. You can click the journal ID link in the ID column to display the Journals Detail page containing all of the information for that journal entry.

To link to journal detail:

- 1. Start an Entity Details Report, as described in Starting the Entity Detail Report.
- 2. Click on a Journal ID in the ID column of the report.

A new worksheet opens containing the journal detail for the Journal ID you selected.

Displaying Source and Destination Transactions

From the Entity Detail report, you can view the audit transaction detail information generated from the consolidation process. To view the transaction detail, you can display Destination Transactions. If you also want to view the Source transactions that generated the amount, you can also display Source Transactions.

You can view these transactions only if you have set up your consolidation rules file to store these transactions. You must use the HS.CON function with the Nature parameter in the rules file. If the HS.CON function is not used or if the Nature parameter is not specified in the function, the system will not generate any audit transaction detail during the consolidation process. See the Oracle Hyperion Financial Management Administrator's Guide.

Exporting the Entity Details Report to Excel

After selecting the rows to display in the **Entity Details** dialog box, you can export the report content to a sheet in an Excel workbook.

To export the Entity Details report to Excel:

- 1. Define an Entity Details Report, as described in Starting the Entity Detail Report and Selecting Rows for the Report.
- 2. In the Entity Details dialog box, click 🚟.

The report is opened in a new Excel workbook.

Note that the exported content is for display purpose only. You cannot connect to Oracle Smart View for Office from the exported sheet; however, you may save or print the workbook.



Viewing Journal Reports

You can view journal reports to check the status of journals and to review journal adjustments.

Journal reports are created in the Oracle Hyperion Financial Management web application. You can view them in Oracle Smart View for Office

To use journal reports, Financial Management 11.1.2.4.204 with the 11.1.2.4.204 PSE 25575478 is required. Additionally, you must install Smart View 11.1.2.5.700 and the Oracle Journals extension that is included with the 11.1.2.5.700 release.

Before you begin this procedure, in the Smart View Panel, ensure that you are connected to a Financial Management data source.

To view journal reports:

1. In the Smart View Panel, right-click a Financial Management application, and then select **Journal Reports**.

Alternatively, in the Smart View Panel, select a Financial Management application , and then select **Journal Reports** from the Action Panel.

2. In the Journal Reports dialog, select a journal to view and click Open.

With Oracle Smart View for Office, users can connect to Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition and utilize the content created in dashboards and analyses.

In addition to working with this content, Smart View users can create content in the form of simple views with the View Designer, using Oracle BI EE as the data source. The views created can then be published to the Oracle BI Presentation Catalog, where they can be edited further.

Smart View offers Oracle BI EE users a cohesive and consistent experience across all Oracle BI EE content providers.



Features and Components of Oracle BI EE in Smart View

When connected to an Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition data source in Oracle Smart View for Office, you can perform several actions.

- Connect to Oracle BI EE.
- Navigate through the Oracle BI Presentation Catalog.
- Connect to multiple instances of Oracle BI EE and switch between connections.
- Import pre-created views from the Oracle BI Presentation Catalog into Microsoft Excel, PowerPoint, and Word. For example, you can:
 - Insert views—Oracle BI EE tables, pivot tables, and graphs—into Excel as refreshable, editable objects.
 - Insert views from different connections into the same Office document.
 - Apply Excel formatting to Oracle BI EE data; formats are retained when you refresh.
- Copy Oracle BI EE dashboard content and paste it into Smart View client documents. The data, metadata, and view layout are copied.
- Create simple views in Excel using Oracle BI EE as the source for metadata and data.
- Interact with content imported into Smart View documents, such as drill and prompt selections.
- Manage the imported content in Smart View, including content from multiple connections; for example, refresh, mask, copy and paste, and document contents.
- Mask data from Oracle BI EE objects in Excel so that users must log in to view the data. Masked objects can be viewed upon refresh.

Key components are:

- Ribbon—The Oracle BI EE ribbon contains Oracle BI EE commands for designing and publishing views in Smart View, inserting, and copying and pasting views from Oracle BI EE, editing prompts, masking data, editing, and setting preferences.
- Catalog—The catalog is an expandable tree list of the Oracle BI EE dashboards, analyses, and views that are available to you for insertion into Excel. Each analysis expands to display all views available from that analysis. Only views that are supported and defined in Oracle BI EE, and for which you have permission, are displayed. You can refresh the catalog to display the latest list of available analyses and views.

For Smart View End Users

To install the Oracle BI EE extension:

1. Install Oracle Smart View for Office as instructed by your Smart View administrator.

Note:

In some cases, your administrator may install Smart View automatically for you.

2. After Smart View is installed, and *before* you start Microsoft Excel, Word, or PowerPoint, ensure that you are logged in to your computer with your own user name.

Note:

You must be logged in with your own user name, not an administrator's or anyone else's user name, in order to be able to install and use the Oracle BI EE extension correctly.

3. Start Microsoft Excel, Word, or PowerPoint.

Note:

To install the Oracle BI EE extension, you can start Excel, Word, or PowerPoint; the Oracle BI EE extension installation is not launched from Outlook.

See Installing Extensions for details.

4. To verify that the extension is installed, from Excel, Word, or PowerPoint, select the Smart View ribbon, then **Options**, and then **Extensions**.

For Smart View Administrators

After Oracle Smart View for Office installation, you must ensure that the intended end user is logged in to Windows before Office is launched.

Or, you can control how your Smart View end users install the Oracle BI EE extension via the **Extensions** page of the Smart View **Options** dialog box. See "Administering Extension Installations and Updates" in the *Oracle Smart View for Office Installation and Configuration Guide* for more information on setting up automatic or manual installations.

If you choose to set up automatic or manual installations, you should install Smart View in a test environment first, then refer to the <code>UpdateList.xml</code> file, found in the <code>extensions</code> folder of your Smart View installation. Use the entry in this file as a guideline for the Oracle BI EE entry you will add to the <code>UpdateList.xml</code> file, as described in "Configuring Manual Extension Updates" in the Oracle Smart View for Office Installation and Configuration Guide.



Working with Windows System Locales in Oracle BI EE

On each Oracle Smart View for Office client machine, Windows system locales must match that of Smart View in order for any data (numbers, dates, currencies, percentages) to be interpreted correctly.

The following are the applicable Windows system locales:

- Smart View language option
- Microsoft Office language
- Windows Regional Settings
- Windows operating system

When working with Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition data sources, in cases of mismatched Windows system locales, data may display incorrectly, or formatting may be ignored and plain data rendered instead.

An example of a Windows system locale mismatch is the Windows operating system, Regional Settings, and Office language in English, and Smart View in Russian.

When locale mismatches occur, the Smart View log indicates a warning such as the following: "Encountered mismatched locale. Chart will use unformatted data values."

Connecting to Multiple Oracle BI EE Data Sources

You connect to Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition data sources using private connections.

See Creating Private Connections for more information on private connections.

To connect using shared connections, the shared connection information must be stored in a file, as described in Accessing Shared Connections from an XML File in the Oracle Smart View for Office Installation and Configuration Guide.

Additionally, Oracle Smart View for Office supports multiple Oracle BI EE private connections on one Office worksheet, slide, or document.

For example, in one worksheet, you may insert two graphs from two different Oracle BI Presentation Catalogs and refresh the sheet. Each graph will be updated with the latest data from the two different servers.

When connected to multiple Oracle BI EE servers:

- Users can switch between those connections in the Smart View Panel and browse the respective catalogs.
- Users can insert views from the different connections into the same Office document.
- If View Designer is launched from the Smart View ribbon and no Oracle BI EE view is selected, then View Designer will be connected to the Oracle BI EE server that was last used.
- If Paste is invoked from the Smart View ribbon to paste content from Oracle BI EE, the paste action will use the last Oracle BI EE connection that was used.



- When refreshing a document containing views from different connections, the views will be refreshed against the servers from which they were inserted.
- There can be only one Excel pivot table view per Excel worksheet. Additionally, Excel pivot table views are always inserted onto a new worksheet. This is the expected behavior, whether you are working with a single data source connection or with multiple connections.

To connect to multiple Oracle BI EE private connections:

1. From Smart View Home or from the menu displayed when you click the arrow next to

. click Private Connections

2. In the **Private Connections** panel, select a connection from the drop-down menu and, in Connect to Data Source, enter your user name and password for the data source.

Assume you have inserted a view from the Oracle BI EE catalog. Continue with step 3

- 3. Move the cursor to a different part of the worksheet, slide, or document.
- 4. In the **Private Connections** panel, select a different connection from the drop-down menu.
- 5. In **Connect to Data Source**, enter your user name and password for the second data source.

You can now insert a view from the newly-connected data source into the Office document

6. Repeat step 3 through step 5 for any other data sources to which you want to connect.

Oracle BI Presentation Catalog

The Oracle BI Presentation Catalog, also referred to as the catalog or catalog tree, is displayed in the Smart View Panel.

The catalog tree displays a root node called "Catalog Root" and, by default, two folders called "My Folders" and "Shared Folders".

Figure 28-1 Oracle BI Presentation Catalog, or Catalog Tree



Items that you save to My Folders appear only to you when you expand the folder. Items that other users save to My Folders appear only to them.



Items that you save to Shared Folders can be viewed by all users who have logged on with BI Consumer privileges. If you have BI Consumer privileges, you can also view the items that other users have saved in Shared Folders.

To view the properties of any folder to which you have access, including the name of the folder creator and the creation date, right-click the folder in the catalog tree and select **View Folder Properties**.

The folders in the catalog tree contain a list of analyses, both from Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition and Oracle Smart View for Office, as well as any subfolders created. Expand an analysis node (for example, "Area chart2" under **My Folders**) and the list of views that are stored there is displayed (for example, "Compound View 1" and "Table 1"), as shown in Figure 2.

To view the properties of an analysis, including the name of the analysis creator, the creation date, and modification date, right-click the analysis in the catalog tree and select **View Analysis Properties**.

You can choose to edit any analysis in Oracle BI EE. If the view was created in Smart View, you can also choose to edit the view in Smart View.

To edit an analysis in Oracle BI EE, right-click the analysis in the catalog tree and select **Edit Analysis in Answers**.

Selecting this option launches the default browser and opens the analysis editing wizard in Oracle BI EE. If you are not already logged onto Oracle BI EE, a login dialog



box is displayed where you can enter your credentials. You must have BI Consumer privileges to edit a view in Oracle BI EE.

To edit an analysis in Smart View, right-click the analysis in the catalog tree and select **Launch in View Designer**.

In this case, the view must have been created in Smart View. See Launching the View Designer for other methods for accessing views for editing.

From the catalog tree, you can also insert table views, pivot table views, graph views, titles, and compound views into Smart View. See Working with Oracle BI EE Analyses, Views, and Dashboards.

Supported Oracle BI EE View and Object Types

You can insert the following views into Oracle Smart View for Office clients (Excel, PowerPoint, and Word) from the catalog or by copying and pasting.

Note:

Drill operations are not supported on Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition views inserted in Smart View. (Drill operations are referred to as Zoom In and Zoom Out in Smart View.)



Table Views

Table views display data is in table format, either in a format similar to the display in **Oracle BI EE** (also referred to as native format), or as an Excel table.

Using the **Insert** option, you can insert table views into all Smart View clients in native format. This format offers no sorting or filtering. Cells with the same data are merged into a single cell.

In Excel, using the **Insert as Excel Table** command, you can insert a table views as an Excel table. With this format, you can perform further analysis operations, such as sorting and filtering.

Notes:

- In Excel, you can insert multiple tables on a worksheet, but you cannot insert a table on top of an existing table. You can, however, do the following:
 - * To replace a table, select any cell within the table and click the Delete button on the Oracle BI EE ribbon. Then insert the table into the worksheet.
 - * To insert additional tables onto the worksheet, select a cell outside any table views or other view objects, and then insert the table.
- Excel may not recognize some custom formats in table views and Excel table views, resulting in an error when the view is inserted into Excel.

• Pivot Table Views

Pivot table views display data in the grouped format defined in Oracle BI EE, which is also referred to as native format. Features such as page item lists and group sectioning are maintained. Data can also be displayed in Excel pivot table format.

Using the **Insert** option, you can insert pivot table views into all Smart View clients in native format. As with inserting a table view, this format offers no sorting or filtering; cells with the same data are merged into a single cell.

In Excel, using the **Insert as Excel Pivot** option, you can also insert a pivot table view as an Excel pivot table. With this format, you may perform further analysis operations, such as pivoting, aggregating, drilling, sorting, and filtering.

Notes:

- When working with Excel pivot table views, only views with measure columns of numerical data type are supported.
- There can be only one Excel pivot table view per Excel worksheet.
 Additionally, Excel pivot table views are always inserted onto a new worksheet. This is the expected behavior, whether you are working with a single data source connection or with multiple connections.
- Excel may not recognize some custom formats in Pivot table views, resulting in an error when the view is inserted into Excel.
- Smart View does not have the "Graph Pivoted Results" functionality of Oracle BI EE. In order to view a graph of the same row, column and page dimensions of a particular pivot table, you must create a separate chart view in Oracle BI EE, and then insert that chart view in Smart View.

Graph Views

Graph views display data by mapping the graph defined in Oracle BI EE graph to a graph type supported by Microsoft Office charts.



Using the **Insert as Image** option, you can insert graphs directly into Smart View clients as a static image. The image cannot be edited or refreshed.

Using the **Insert** option in all Smart View clients, you can edit and refresh graphs. Smart View attempts to match the graph style from Oracle BI EE as closely as possible, including graph properties such as visual effect (2D, 3D), canvas size, chart title, subtitle, axis titles, legend and legend position, axis scale, data format (numeric, date, currency format), and title and label formatting.

If a matching Office chart type is not available, you can insert the graph view as an image. See Supported Oracle BI EE Chart and Object Types and Unsupported Oracle BI EE Chart and Object Types.

Gauge Views and Funnel Graph Views

In Oracle BI EE, gauge views and funnel graph views are separate object types from graph views.

Using the **Insert as Image** option, you can insert gauge and funnel views directly into Smart View clients as a static image. You cannot edit or refresh the image.

Title Views

Title views display the title of a report, along with other information that is part of the Oracle BI EE.

Title views are typically composed of title text, subtitle text, the analysis name, the date and time inserted, an optional logo, and an optional URL (for example, a help link). Title views are inserted into Smart View clients as a collection of text boxes and images grouped together as a single Office object.

Compound Views

Compound views display data as an assembly of different views.

You can insert compound views into all Smart View clients. Smart View inserts all supported views that make up the compound view. Each type of view—table, pivot table, graph, gauge, funnel, filter, and title—is inserted into Smart View clients in its own default format.

In Word, all views are inserted next to and below each other filling pages in the active Word document.

In Excel or PowerPoint, users are prompted to choose between inserting all the views on one sheet or slide, or inserting each view on a separate sheet or slide.

Inserting Tables and Pivot Tables

The maximum number of rows and columns that you can insert depends on the version of Excel you are using. See Microsoft Excel documentation for worksheet size limits.

To insert a table or pivot table:

- 1. Place the cursor at the point in the Excel worksheet, PowerPoint slide, or Word page where you want the table or pivot table to begin.
- 2. In the catalog tree, right-click a table or pivot table.
- 3. Select one of the following:
 - Insert—The selected table view or pivot table view is inserted in the format defined in Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition. See Figure 1 and Figure 2,



If prompts are defined for the table or pivot table in Oracle BI EE, the **Prompt Selector** dialog box is displayed where you make selections on the data to display (otherwise, the table or pivot table is inserted directly). After the initial insert, you may edit the prompts by clicking the **Edit Prompts** icon in the Oracle BI EE ribbon. See Working with Prompts for more information.

If page prompts are defined for the table or pivot table (view prompts in Oracle BI EE), you may edit them by clicking the **Edit Page Prompts** icon in the Oracle BI EE ribbon. See Working with Page Prompts.

In Oracle Smart View for Office clients, the table is displayed in the form a grid.

• **Insert as Excel Table** (table views only)—The selected table view is inserted as an Excel table. Columns in the page prompt edge and section edge, if present, are moved to the top of the table as drop-down headings. Select this option when you want to use Excel operations to filter, define formulas, sort, and perform other Excel tasks.

When a table view is inserted as an Excel table, prompts that are defined in Oracle BI EE are not available.

The selected table is inserted on the worksheet. See Figure 3.

Insert as Excel Pivot (pivot table views only)—The selected pivot table view is
inserted as an Excel pivot table. Columns in the page edge and section edge, if
present, are mapped to the report filters area, and columns in the measures edge are



moved to the values area. Select this option when you want to perform further analysis, such as aggregating, pivoting, drilling, sorting, and filtering.

The selected table or pivot table is inserted on the worksheet. See Figure 4.

Notes:

- When a pivot table view is inserted as an Excel Pivot table, prompts that are defined in Oracle BI EE are not available.
- When working with Excel pivot table views, only views with measure columns of numerical data type are supported.
- There can be only one Excel pivot table view per Excel worksheet.
 Additionally, Excel pivot table views are always inserted onto a new worksheet. This is the expected behavior, whether you are working with a single data source connection or with multiple connections.

You can edit tables and pivot tables as described in Editing Views Created in Oracle BI EE.

Note:

When pivot tables that contain embedded pivot charts are inserted into Smart View, the embedded pivot charts are not imported. You can either use Excel to create a pivot chart based on an inserted Excel pivot table or use Oracle Business Intelligence Answers to create a new chart view and insert that view using Smart View.

- To create a pivot chart based on the inserted native Excel pivot table, complete these steps:
 - **1.** In Smart View, click in the Excel pivot table and select the Excel **Options** ribbon.
 - 2. From the **Tools** group, click the **PivotChart** button.
 - 3. In Insert Chart, select a chart style and then click OK.
- To create and insert a separate chart view:
 - **1.** In BI Answers, create a new, separate chart view object.
 - 2. In the Office application, use Smart View to insert the newly-created chart view.

Inserting Graphs

When inserting graphs, Oracle Smart View for Office attempts to map the Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition graph into a chart type supported by Microsoft Office 2007 and later. Further, Smart View attempts to match visual effects, such as 2D or 3D, and other graph properties such as canvas size, axis scale, data format, and formatting in terms of font styles and colors.

When a matching chart type is not available, the graph view can only be inserted as image.

See Supported Oracle BI EE Chart and Object Types and Unsupported Oracle BI EE Chart and Object Types.

To insert a graph:

- 1. From the catalog, right-click a graph view.
- 2. Select an option:
 - Insert—The selected graph is inserted as an Excel chart, which can be edited, masked, and refreshed.

If prompts are defined for the graph in Oracle BI EE, the **Prompt Selector** dialog box is displayed where you make selections on the data to display (otherwise, the graph is inserted directly). After the initial insert, you may edit the prompts by clicking the **Edit Prompts** icon in the Oracle BI EE ribbon. See Working with Prompts.

If page prompts are defined for the graph (view prompts in Oracle BI EE), you may edit them by clicking the **Edit Page Prompts** icon in the Oracle BI EE ribbon. See Working with Prompts for more information.

If no prompts are defined for this analysis, then the graph is inserted directly. See Figure 1.






Figure 28-7 A Pie Chart View Inserted as an Excel Chart


You can edit graphs inserted this way as described in Editing Views Created in Oracle BI EE.

• **Insert as Image**—The selected graph is inserted as an image of the graph, which cannot be edited or customized.

When a graph is inserted directly as an image, prompts, page prompts, and sections that are defined in Oracle BI EE are not available.

Note that gauge and funnel objects can only be inserted using the **Insert as Image** command.

Once inserted, whether as an Excel chart or as an image, both types of graphs shown can be resized by stretching them.

Unsupported Oracle BI EE Chart and Object Types

The following view types are not supported:

- Performance Tiles
- Trellis views
- Map views
- Filters views—You can only view properties for filter views, using the **View Analysis Properties** command in the catalog tree.
- Selection Steps
- Column Selector
- View Selector
- Legend
- Narrative
- Ticker
- Static Text
- Logical SQL
- Create Segment
- Create Target List
- Static text, ticker, or HTML views
- Scorecards
- KPIs or KPI watchlists



Inserting Compound Views

To insert a compound view:

- 1. From the catalog, select the compound view to insert.
- 2. Right-click and select Insert All Views.
- 3. When prompted, choose an option:
 - **One object per sheet/slide** to insert each object in the compound view on a separate sheet in Excel, or a separate slide in PowerPoint.
 - All objects on one sheet/slide to display all objects on one Excel sheet or PowerPoint slide.

In Excel, objects are inserted on a new sheet or sheets, even if there are unused sheets in the workbook.

In Word, objects are placed adjacent to and below other objects on a sheet until the sheet is filled, and then continues filling as many sheets as required to hold all the objects.

The default display is selected for the table, pivot table, and graph view types; that is, the **Insert** action will be used automatically.

A message notifies you of unsupported view types in the compound view. Unsupported view types are not inserted.

Notes:

- You can do a Refresh and edit prompt and page prompts for selected views. Unselected views from the compound view remain unchanged. See Refreshing Views, Working with Prompts, and Working with Page Prompts.
- In Word and PowerPoint, there can be some overlapping of tables and charts when inserting a compound view or when a compound view is either inserted from the catalog or copied and pasted. This is especially true when any of the objects in the compound view are particularly large.
- When inserting multiple objects from a compound view into PowerPoint and selecting the "one object per slide" option, an Excel instance is opened for each object and then minimized in the Windows Taskbar. However, when the insert operation is complete, the Excel instances are not automatically closed. This can clutter the Taskbar when inserting a large number of objects. To minimize the number of Excel instances shown in the Taskbar, click the Office button (in the upper left corner of Excel), select Excel Options, and then select the Advanced tab. In Display options, clear the Show all windows in the Taskbar check box.

Inserting Dashboards

Dashboards are displayed in the catalog tree as folders. A dashboard folder can be expanded to show dashboard pages; a dashboard page can be expanded to show the list of analyses included in that page. You can insert dashboard pages into Excel, PowerPoint, and Word.

To insert dashboard pages into Office applications:

1. From the catalog, right-click a dashboard page and select Insert All Views.



- 2. When prompted, choose an option:
 - One object per sheet/slide to insert each object in the dashboard on a separate sheet in Excel, or a separate slide in PowerPoint.
 - All objects on one sheet/slide to display all objects on one Excel sheet or PowerPoint slide.

In Word, objects are placed adjacent to and below other objects on a sheet until the sheet is filled, and then continues filling as many sheets as required to hold all the objects.

Default display is selected for the table, pivot table, and graph view types; that is, the **Insert** action is used automatically.

A message notifies of unsupported view types in the dashboard. Unsupported view types are not inserted.

Note:

You may perform Refresh and edit prompt and page prompts for selected views. Unselected views from the dashboard remain unchanged. See Refreshing Views, Working with Prompts, and Working with Page Prompts.

Working with Prompts

Prompts enable users to specify criteria that determines the content of the view that they are inserting. Oracle Smart View for Office supports both prompts and page prompts. See also Working with Page Prompts for information on page prompts.

Prompts in Smart View are the equivalent of prompts in Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition. Smart View only supports column prompts.

Prompts are defined at the analysis level in Oracle BI EE. Users are prompted to enter values for these prompts each time a view is inserted in Smart View.

If prompts are defined on an analysis in Oracle BI EE, then when you insert a table, pivot table, or graph view from the analysis into Smart View, you are prompted to select the data to be displayed for that view. When inserting a compound view from an analysis that has prompts defined, you are prompted to enter values only one time for all the views in that compound view.

For example, a prompt on Year is designated for an analysis, and the years 2010, 2011, and 2012 are available to choose from. When you insert a table, pivot table, or graph, you are prompted to select which year's data to display: 2010, 2011, or 2012. Or, you can choose to insert the compound view, and the prompt selection you make is applied to all the views inserted. After insertion, you can edit the prompts on each individual view to select another year's data to display.

Views can only be edited individually. The edit operation will prompt you for the values to be selected for each view that is being edited.

You may edit prompts in views that were inserted, or copied and pasted.



Note:

Prompts defined on hierarchical columns in Oracle BI EE are not supported in Smart View.

To edit prompts:

- **1.** From the worksheet, select a view:
 - Graph views—Select the graph.
 - Table and pivot table views—Select a cell in the table.
- 2. From the Oracle BI EE ribbon, select the **Edit Prompts** button to display your original selections.

If the report definition has changed on the server, your selections are reset, and you must select all prompts and columns again.

3. In the **Prompt Selector**, modify the prompt selections.

Depending on how the prompt was set up in Oracle BI EE, you may be selecting data directly from a drop-down list on the **Prompt Selector**. You may also be picking values from the **Value Selector** dialog box.

Note:

In the Prompt Selector, there is a limit of 256 items that can be displayed in drop-down list controls or option lists. To display a higher number of items, increase the value of the setting in **Prompts/ MaxDropDownValues** in instance.config in Oracle Business Intelligence Answers.

The following is an example of a **Value Selector**, where the years 2008, 2009, and 2010 were selected for display.

After you click **OK** in the **Value Selector**, the selections populate the first prompt in the example **Prompt Selector** (Figure 3). A second prompt in the example **Prompt Selector** requires that you directly enter an amount; in this example, the amount to display is Billed Quantity greater than \$5,000.

The completed **Prompt Selector** dialog then looks like Figure 3.

In some cases, the data to choose from can be exceedingly long. To accommodate loading large amounts of data in the **Value Selector**, Smart View presents values in



groups. Scroll and make selections from the first group shown, then click **More** to view and make selections from the next group. Continue clicking **More** until you have viewed and made selections from the entire data list. Figure 4 shows an example.

4. Click **OK** to close the **Prompt Selector**.

After you make selections and click **OK**, the view is immediately refreshed and reflects your selections.

5. Repeat this procedure to edit the prompts to change the output displayed.

Note:

- Selection lists specified for prompts in BI Answers (radio button lists and check box lists) are converted to list controls in Smart View.
- If a prompt is defined on double columns, and the prompt operator selected is * Prompt User, the following operators do not work at runtime:
 - is less than
 - is less than or equal to
 - is greater than
 - is greater than or equal to
 - is like
 - is not like

To avoid this, do not use the *** Prompt User** operator. Instead, define the operator explicitly at design time, using one of the operators listed above. The operators will then work.

• A date prompt that was created with user input set to text and the default value set to SQL that shows the current date results in the current_date SQL being shown in the prompt and not the actual current date.

Working with Page Prompts

Page prompts enable users to specify criteria that determines the content of the view that has been inserted. Oracle Smart View for Office supports both page prompts and prompts. See also Working with Prompts.

Page Prompts in Smart View are the equivalent of view prompts in Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition. View prompts are specified on individual views within an analysis. Smart View supports table prompts, graph prompts, and gauge prompts in Oracle BI EE; these types of prompts are called page prompts in Smart View.

Page prompts may vary on individual views within an analysis. An individual table view within an analysis may have a page prompt set on Year, and a pivot table view within the same analysis may have a page prompt set on Line of Business.

When you first insert a view that contains page prompts, a view state is selected by default. For example, if a prompt on Year is specified on a particular view within an analysis, and the years 2010, 2011, and 2012 are available to choose from, you are not prompted for these at the time of insertion. Instead, a default state of the view is inserted. For example, 2010 data may automatically be inserted, as the first year in the list of years available. You can then edit the page prompts to select another year's data to display for this view.

You may edit page prompts in views that have been inserted, or copied and pasted.

To edit page prompts:

- 1. From the worksheet, select a view:
 - Graph views—Select the graph.
 - Table and pivot table views—Select any cell in the table.



2. From the Oracle BI EE ribbon, select the **Edit Page Prompts** button to display the default page prompt selections for a particular view.

If the report definition has changed on the server, your selections are reset, and you must select all page prompts again.

3. In the **Page Selector**, modify the page prompt selections by selecting from the drop-down lists.

Figure 2 shows a **Page Selector** dialog box, where users select a Year and a Line of Business. In the example, selections were made to display 2010 for the year, and Electronics for the Line of Business.

4. Click OK to close the Page Selector.

After you make selections and click **OK**, the view is immediately refreshed and reflects your selections.

5. Repeat this procedure to edit the page prompts to change the output displayed.

Specifying Preferences for Refreshing Views

You can specify preferences for refreshing each view. The refresh preferences that you set for each view within a worksheet, slide, or page are saved along with the Office document (Excel workbook, PowerPoint slide presentation, or Word document).

To specify preferences for refreshing a view:



- **1.** Ensure that one or more Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition views are inserted into Oracle Smart View for Office.
- 2. In **Document Contents**, click \rightarrow to refresh the content of the pane.

All views that were inserted into the active Office application are displayed in **Document Contents** in a tree format.

- 3. Select a view in **Document Contents**, and then select **Properties**.
- 4. In Properties, select an option from Refresh Preferences:
 - Refresh Data—Refreshes only the data points in the selected view or analysis.

Any changes made to formatting in the sheet, slide, or page are retained.

 Replace View—Replaces the entire view, including any formatting changes set in Oracle BI EE.

If you select this option, your prompt and graph selections and custom formatting are lost upon refresh if the view definition has changed.

Note:

If you checked or cleared the **Use unified scale** option in Oracle Business Intelligence Answers, you must use the **Replace View** option when refreshing in Smart View.

- Do not refresh—Refreshing is not allowed.
- 5. Click **OK** to save the **Refresh Preference** selection.

Continue with Refreshing Views.

Note:

Oracle BI EE title views are not included in refresh actions, so all customizations to a title view are retained when you refresh the worksheet or workbook.

Note:

Pie charts are not refreshed after adding or removing a filter in BI Answers if the filter added is on a dimension that defines the number of pies that display. If there is a change in a filter column that is also defined as a number-of-pies dimension, change the refresh option on the chart view to **Replace View**, and then perform another refresh. This ensures a correct refresh, updating the number of pies and the chart titles that correctly reflect the new data.



Refreshing Views

You can refresh the data from Oracle Business Intelligence in your inserted views. You have the option of refreshing selected views or refreshing all views, depending on the Office document type, as follows.

Excel

- Individual views
- Individual worksheets
- Entire workbook

PowerPoint

- Individual views
- Individual slides
- Entire presentation

Word

- Individual views
- Entire document

You can refresh views from the Document Contents pane, the Oracle BI EE ribbon, or the Smart View ribbon.

The refresh action is limited according to the Refresh Preference set for a selected view. See Specifying Preferences for Refreshing Views for information.

Note that when you refresh, title views are not included in refresh actions, so all customizations to a title view are retained when you refresh the Office document.

When there are multiple objects on an Office document, if you attempt to refresh the document without having already connected, then you will be prompted for your login credentials once for all objects. If you choose to cancel instead, the **Connect to Data Source** dialog box will appear for each object on the sheet, and you must click **Cancel** for each object. For example, if there are six objects on the sheet, the dialog box will appear six times, once for each object.

To refresh Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition views from the **Document Contents** pane:

- 1. In **Document Contents**, ensure that **Oracle BI EE Document Hierarchy** is displayed in the drop-down list box.
- 2. In **Document Contents**, click \rightarrow to refresh the contents of the tree.

From **Document Contents**, you can refresh individual views in all Office applications, individual worksheets, and individual slides.

- 3. Perform an action:
 - To refresh a selected view in an Excel sheet, PowerPoint slide, or Word document, select the view object from the tree in **Document Contents**, and then select the **Refresh View** action from the right-click menu or click the **Refresh View** link at the bottom of the pane.



Repeat for each view that you want to refresh.

 To refresh all Oracle BI EE views on a selected Excel worksheet or PowerPoint slide, select the sheet or slide from the tree in **Document Contents**, and then select the **Refresh** action from the right-click menu or click the **Refresh** link at the bottom of the pane.

Repeat for each sheet or slide that you want to refresh.

To refresh all Oracle BI EE views on a worksheet or slide, or an entire Word document, using the ribbons:

- **1.** Perform an action:
 - Select the worksheet or slide to make it active.
 - Place your cursor in the Word document to select it.
- 2. Click **Refresh** in the Oracle BI EE ribbon or the Smart View ribbon.

To refresh all Oracle BI EE views in an Excel workbook, PowerPoint presentation, or Word document:

- 1. Place your cursor anywhere in the workbook, presentation or document to select it.
- 2. Perform an action:
 - To refresh all Oracle BI EE views in an Excel workbook, click the down arrow in **Refresh** in theSmart View ribbon and select **Refresh all Worksheets**. Figure 1 shows the Refresh icon with the arrow:

Alternatively, click the down arrow in **Refresh** in the Oracle BI EE ribbon and select **Refresh Workbook Data**.

 To refresh all Oracle BI EE views in a PowerPoint presentation, click the down arrow in Refresh in the Smart View ribbon and select Refresh All Slides.

Alternatively, click the down arrow in Refresh in the Oracle BI EE ribbon and select **Refresh Presentation Data**.

 To refresh all views in a Word document, click Refresh in the Oracle BI EE ribbon or the Smart View ribbon. The Refresh icon in Word does not contain a down arrow, as shown in Figure 2.

Masking Data in Views

You can mask data in the Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition views that you insert in Office documents and in views you create using the View Designer. You have the option of masking data in:

- Selected views
- All views on sheet or a slide
- All views in an Office document

Using the Mask Data functionality in Oracle Smart View for Office, you can perform these actions:

- Select a single Smart View object in an Excel sheet or PowerPoint slide and mask data only in that object
- Mask data in the active Excel worksheet or PowerPoint slide
- Mask data in the active workbook, presentation, or Word document

You can invoke Mask Data from these locations:

- Document Contents in the Smart View Panel
- Oracle BI EE ribbon

Masking Data for an Individual View

To mask data in an individual view in an Excel worksheet or PowerPoint slide:

 In Excel or PowerPoint, click in **Document Contents** to refresh the contents of the tree.

Note:

Data in Word documents can only be masked in their entirety; you cannot mask data in individual views in Word.

- 2. Locate the view with data that you want to mask in **Document Contents**, and then select it.
- 3. Click the Mask Data link in Document Contents.

In a table object, cells are replaced with the text, "Need refresh"; in a graph, the area becomes blank and a small lock image is displayed.

4. Save the current workbook or presentation.

The masked state of the view remains intact after saving.



5. To display the data in the masked view, click in **Document Contents**, select the view in the tree, and then click the **Refresh View** link.

Masking Data on a Sheet or Slide

To mask data on an Excel worksheet or PowerPoint slide:

- 1. Choose a method to select a sheet or slide:
 - Place the cursor directly in a sheet or slide
 - In Document Contents, click
 , locate the sheet or slide in the tree, and then select it.
- 2. Choose a method to mask data for all objects on the selected sheet or slide:
 - In the Oracle BI EE ribbon, click the Mask Data button.

• In **Document Contents**, click the **Mask Data** link.

Data on the sheet or slide is masked.

Note:

Data in Word documents can only be masked in their entirety; you cannot mask data on individual pages in Word.

3. Save the current workbook or presentation.

The masked state of the sheet or slide remains intact after saving.

4. To display the data in the masked sheet or slide, click → in **Document Contents**, select the sheet or slide in the tree, and then click the **Refresh** link.

Alternatively, place the cursor in the sheet or slide to refresh, and then click Refresh

Masking Data in an Entire Office Document

To mask data in an entire Office document:

1. From the Oracle BI EE ribbon in the opened Office document, perform an action:





Excel: Click the down arrow in Mask and select Mask Workbook Data.



PowerPoint: Click the down arrow in Mask and select Mask Presentation
Data.



• Word: Click 🄜

Note:

Word documents can only be masked in their entirety; you cannot mask individual pages in Word.

2. Save the current Office document.

The masked state of the workbook, presentation, or document remains intact after saving.

3. To display the masked data, click → in **Document Contents**, select the sheet, slide, or document in the tree, and then click the **Refresh** link.

Alternatively, place the cursor in the sheet, slide, or document to be refreshed, and



Viewing Properties of an Oracle BI EE Object

You can view various properties of a selected object.

To view the properties of an Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition object:

1. Select an Oracle BI EE object.

Select an actual view object and not a sheet or slide.

2. Click the Properties link at the bottom of the Document Contents pane.



Copying and Pasting Oracle BI EE Objects Between Office Applications

You can copy Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition objects within and between Office applications as follows:

- Graphs can be copied within and between any Office application.
- Tables and pivot tables can be copied within and between Word and PowerPoint.
- Tables and pivot tables cannot be copied within Excel, from Excel to another Office application, or from another Office application to Excel.
- Tables and pivot tables can only be copied and pasted by sections.

Copying and Pasting a Graph View

To copy and paste a graph view:

1. In Excel, Word, or PowerPoint, select the graph view to copy.

You can use Document Contents to locate the view, but then select the graph directly in the sheet, slide, or page.

- 2. From the Oracle BI EE ribbon, click
- Access the Office application and position the cursor where you want to paste the graph view.

For example, if you are pasting within an Office application (or if you are copying from Excel and want to paste into PowerPoint, open PowerPoint), position the cursor at the point within the Office document where you want to paste the object.

Paste Click Δ

Repeat for all graphs that you want to copy and paste. 5.

Copying and Pasting a Table or Pivot Table View

To copy and paste a table view or pivot table view:

1. In Word or PowerPoint, select the table view or pivot table view to copy.

You can use Document Contents to locate the view, but then select the table or pivot table directly in the slide or page.

- 2. From the Oracle BI EE ribbon, click
- 3. Access the Office application and position the cursor where you want to paste the table or pivot table view.

For example, if you are pasting within an Office application (or if you are copying from Word and want to paste into PowerPoint, open PowerPoint), position the cursor at the point within the Office document where you want to paste the object.



Repeat for all tables or pivot tables that you want to copy and paste. 5.



Editing an Analysis in Oracle BI EE

If the available analysis view does not display the data required, or the data is not displayed as desired, you can edit the view in Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition.

Note: To edit a view in Oracle BI EE, you must have the required Oracle BI EE permissions.

To edit a view in Oracle BI EE:

- 1. From the Catalog, right-click the view, and then select Edit Analysis in Answers.
- 2. In the login screen, enter your credentials for Oracle BI EE.

The selected view is displayed in Oracle BI EE.

- 3. In Oracle BI EE, edit and save the view.
- 4. Return to the Office application.
- 5. From the **Oracle BI EE** ribbon, click **Refresh**, and verify that your changes are reflected in the view.

Copying and Pasting Views From Oracle BI EE to Office

You can copy and paste views from Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition to Oracle Smart View for Office.

When you refresh pasted views, the data is refreshed, but the analysis definition is not, even if its definition has been modified in Oracle BI EE.

Note:

When copying and pasting views from Oracle BI EE to Smart View, some formatting may not be imported to Office.

To copy and paste a view:

- 1. Ensure that you are logged into Oracle BI EE.
- 2. From Oracle BI EE or Interactive Dashboards, launch the analysis that you want to copy.
- 3. Click the **Copy** link at the bottom of the analysis (displayed only if the analysis is enabled for copying).
- 4. Open an Office application, such as Excel, and connect to the appropriate Oracle BI EE data source.



5. From the Oracle BI EE ribbon, click Paste

What Can and Cannot Be Edited

Note the following when editing views that were created in Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition:

- Table views and graph views that are inserted or pasted as Microsoft objects using the **Insert** command can be edited in Excel, PowerPoint, or Word.
- Table views that are inserted or pasted as lists, and graphs views that are inserted as images cannot be edited in Excel.
- Views that are inserted or pasted as images cannot be edited in PowerPoint.

Editing Pivot Tables Inserted into PowerPoint

Consider the following items when editing pivot table views that were created in Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition.

Small Pivot Tables

For small pivot tables in PowerPoint, to change column width and row height, use the mouse to drag column and row borders to the desired height and width.

Large Pivot Tables

To adjust column width and row height in large pivot tables, especially where rows and columns are outside of the slide area, use PowerPoint's table editing tools in as follows:

- 1. Select the pivot table.
- 2. Select the Layout ribbon in PowerPoint.
- 3. Select a row or column in the pivot table.
- 4. Adjust height and width by changing the height and width values in the Cell Size group.

Other Guidelines

Note the following guidelines when editing views that were created in Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition:

 Oracle Smart View for Office does not support duplication of charts or tables through the PowerPoint "Duplicate Slide" command.

In PowerPoint, after duplicating a slide containing a chart, any attempt to update the prompts of either chart result in the prompts for only the original chart being updated. The chart on the duplicate slide is never updated.



For a pivot table inserted into a PowerPoint slide then duplicated, if you change the prompt for either pivot table, only the pivot table original slide is updated, whether you changed the prompt in the original slide or the duplicate.

- Some modifications made to graphs using Microsoft Office formatting tools—such as changes to colors—may not persist when prompts are changed and the graph is refreshed. Smart View does not keep track of such formatting changes; this is done by Microsoft Office. When a graph series is removed, the format of the series is removed by Office as well. Changing prompts can cause the series count and order to change, which means the formatting will also change. This is expected behavior.
- Time zone preferences set in Oracle BI EE account preferences are not exposed in Smart View.
- The precision of digits that Smart View can display in Excel is limited to the precision of digits allowed by Excel.

For example, the following is an 18-digit number formatted with two decimal places:

123456789123456789.12

Because of Excel's 15-digit precision limitation, the digits after the 15th digit are changed to zeroes in Excel and the number would be displayed as follows:

123456789123456000.00

Working with Views Using the View Designer

Using the View Designer in Oracle Smart View for Office, you can create ad hoc views based on an Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition subject area.

Views created in Smart View can be saved to the catalog and edited in either Smart View or Oracle BI EE.

View Designer is available in Microsoft Excel, Word, and PowerPoint.

Launching the View Designer

Depending on whether you are creating a view or editing a view, you can launch the View Designer using the methods described in this topic.

To launch the View Designer:

- **1.** Perform an action:
 - To create a new view:
 - Right-click the Catalog Root node in the catalog tree, and then select Create New View.
 - Select the Catalog Root node in the catalog tree, and then select Create New View at the bottom of the Smart View Panel.
 - From the Oracle BI EE ribbon, click the View Designer icon.

You must already be connected to a view in the catalog tree to enable the Oracle BI EE ribbon.

- To edit a view (the view must have been created and inserted from View Designer):
 - From the catalog tree, select a view to edit that was created in View Designer and saved to the Oracle BI Presentation Catalog from Oracle Smart View for Office, and then select the Load view in View Designer link at the bottom of the Smart View Panel.
 - Select an existing view on a worksheet in the current or in a saved Office document and click the View Designer icon (see Figure 1).
 - To edit an Excel Pivot Table, click anywhere in the current or in a saved worksheet, even outside the boundaries of the Excel Pivot Table, and click the View Designer icon (see Figure 1).

Note:

You can only edit views that were created and inserted from the View Designer in Smart View. To edit views created in Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition, you must use Oracle BI EE.

The **Design Layout** tab of the View Designer is displayed. Figure 2 shows the Design Layout tab of the View Designer with selections made in the Page, Section, Row, Column, and Measures edges.

2. Continue the view design process by following the procedure in Defining the View Type and Display Style.

Defining the View Type and Display Style

When you are creating a view, you define the view type and display style. This is done only once, during the view creation process. Once the view is created, you cannot edit these two settings.

To define the view type and display style:

- 1. If you have not already done so, invoke the View Designer (see Launching the View Designer).
- 2. In View Type, select the type of view that you are creating:
 - Table
 - Pivot Table (the default)
 - Line Graph
 - Bar Graph
 - Column Graph
 - Area Graph
 - Pie Chart
 - Scatter Chart
 - Stacked Column Graph

The selection that you make affects the options available in **Display Style** along with the fields in the layout area.



Note: You cannot change this selection when editing the view either in Oracle Smart View for Office or Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition.

3. In Display Style, select a View Type and Display Style option from Table 1.

Display style determines how the view is inserted into Excel.

Note:

You cannot change this selection when editing the view either in Smart View or Oracle BI EE.

4. Continue the view design process by following the procedure in Defining the View Layout.

Defining the View Layout

Define the view layout during the view creation process. You can also edit the view layout of views created in View Designer.

To define or edit the view layout:

- 1. If you have not already done so, invoke the View Designer (see Launching the View Designer).
- 2. If you are creating a new view, complete the steps in Defining the View Type and Display Style.

If you are editing a view, continue with step 3.

3. In the left pane of the View Designer, expand a subject area and the folders to view the columns that you want to work with.



4. Drag columns from the expanded subject area tree and drop them in the layout area.

The edges in the layout area vary depending on the selections that you made in the **View Type**, as described in Table 1.

- 5. **Optional:** Perform any of these tasks, as applicable, on the columns you have dragged to edges in the View Designer:
 - To move a column between edges, drag the column from one edge and drop it on another; for example, drag a column from the **Row** edge and drop it on the **Column** edge.
 - To reposition the column within the edge, click on a column name and select the **Up** or **Down** arrow.
 - To add a subtotal to a column or row in an edge, right-click a column and select **Subtotal**.

Note:

The **Subtotal** option is ignored when applied to the bottom column in an edge, even though the option is selectable in the drop-down menu.



• To add columns to filter criteria for this view, click on a column and select Add to Filter.

The columns that you select are added to the **Filter Expression** area of the **Define Filters** tab, where you can further define them. See Defining the Filter Expression for Views in View Designer for more information.

- To remove a column from an edge, click on the column and select **Remove**.
- 6. **Optional:** If you are working with a table or pivot table view, regardless of the display style:
 - Pivot Table view: In the Row and Column edges, select or clear the Row Grand Total and Column Grand Total check boxes as you require.
 - Table view: In the Row edge, select or clear the Row Grand Total check box.
- 7. **Optional:** If you are working with a pivot table view that has the pivot table display style, you can perform these actions with the **Measure Label** element:
 - Reorder the Measure Label element within the Column edge.
 - Move the Measure Label to any other edge except the Measure edge.

Notes about the Measure Label element:

- The Measure Label element represents the labels for all the Measures columns in the Measures edge. In the View Designer, the Measure Label element appears by default in the **Column** edge.
- Measure Label is only available when both the View Type and Display Type is Pivot Table.
- Experiment with moving the Measure Label element to another edge or reordering it within the Column edge. The result may be a more readable pivot table layout.
- Measure Label cannot be removed from the View Designer.
- Measure Label cannot be placed in the Measures edge.
- 8. To define filters, click the **Filters** tab and continue with Defining the Filter Expression for Views in View Designer.

If you do not plan to define filters, click **OK**:

- If you are creating a new view, the view is inserted into Excel.
- If you are editing a view, the old view is removed and the updated view is inserted.

Defining the Filter Expression for Views in View Designer

Columns that you added for filtering in Defining the View Layout are automatically added to the Filter Expression area of the Define Filters tab in View Designer.

Whether you are creating a new view or editing an existing view, you can add more filter columns, and further define and refine filters on all columns.

To define or edit the filter expression for a view created in View Designer:

1. Complete the steps in Defining the View Layout, selecting the Define Filters tab.

The columns that you added for filtering should be displayed on the **Define Filters** tab.

- 2. Optional: Add more columns to the Filter Expression area of the Define Filters tab.
- 3. Select a column in Filter Expression.



4. Select a corresponding filter operator from the drop-down list next to the column name.

The operator list from which you can choose is populated based on the type of column that you selected.

Guidelines for choosing an operator are described in Filter Operators.

5. Specify a filter value in the last column by clicking and making a selection in the Value Selector.

For example, here is a set of filters based on the Sample Sales database:

Filter Expre	ssion			
	D1 Office	isin	•	Blue Bell Office;Copper Office
AND	D2 Department	is not in	•	Operations Dept
AND	1- Revenue	is less than	•	100000

The filters that you define are summarized in the **Filter Summary** pane. For example, for the filters defined in this step, the summary looks like this:

Fiter Summary D1 Office is in Blue Bell Office; Copper Office AND D2 Department is not in Operations Dept AND 1- Revenue is less than 100000

In some cases, the data to choose from can be exceedingly long. To accommodate loading large amounts of data in the Value Selector, Oracle Smart View for Office presents values in groups. Scroll and make selections from the first group shown, then click **More** to view and make selections from the next group. Continue clicking **More** until you have viewed and made selections from the entire data list. Figure 1 shows an example.

- 6. **Optional:** If required, click the logical operator button in **Filter Expression** and make a selection to change the operator:
 - AND
 - OR

The default logical operator is AND.

Changing the logical operator on one line of the filter expression automatically changes the operator for all lines in the expression so that the operator is the same for all lines.

7. **Optional:** To remove a line from the filter expression, right-click the column button in the line, and then select **Remove**, as shown in Figure 2.

Filter Operators

Use the guidelines in Table 1 when choosing an operator and specifying the required values. The operator list from which you can choose is populated based on the function that you are performing (for example, creating a filter or creating a dashboard prompt) and the type of column that you selected.



Operator	Usage Guidelines
is equal to / is in	Valid for a column that contains text, numbers, or dates. Specify a single value or multiple values. Results include only records where the data in the column matches the value in the filter.
is not equal to / is not in	Valid for a column that contains text, numbers, or dates. Specify a single value or multiple values. Results include only records where the data in the column does not match the value in the filter.
is less than	Valid for a column that contains numbers or dates. Specify a single value. Results include only records where the data in the column is less than the value in the filter.
is greater than	Valid for a column that contains numbers or dates. Specify a single value. Results include only records where the data in the column is greater than the value in the filter.
is less than or equal to	Valid for a column that contains numbers or dates. Specify a single value or multiple values. Results include only records where the data in the column is less than or the same as the value in the filter.
is greater than or equal to	Valid for a column that contains numbers or dates. Specify a single value or multiple values. Results include only records where the data in the column is greater than or the same as the value in the filter.
is between	Valid for a column that contains numbers or dates. Specify two values. Result include only records where the data in the column is between the two values in the filter.
is null	Valid for a column that contains text, numbers, or dates. Do not specify a value. The operator tests only for the absence of data in the column. Results include only records where there is no data in the column.
	Sometimes it might be useful to know whether any data is present, and using the is null operator is a way to test for that condition. For example, suppose your business has a worldwide address book and you want to extract the United States addresses only. You could do this by checking for the presence or absence of data in the "State" field. This field should be unpopulated (null) for non-United States addresses and populated (not null) for United States addresses. You can obtain a list of United States addresses without the need to check the column for a specific value.

Publishing Views

The ad hoc view definition that you create in View Designer can be published to the Oracle BI Presentation Catalog in Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition after you have inserted it in Oracle Smart View for Office. When you publish an ad hoc view, a new analysis in Oracle BI EE is created with the default views of compound view and title view, along with the applicable user-created view.

When publishing a view that you were editing, you have the option of overwriting the view in the Oracle BI Presentation Catalog, or specifying a new name for the view and publishing the edited version, keeping two versions of the view in Oracle BI EE.

To publish a view to the Oracle BI Presentation Catalog:

- 1. Position the cursor within the view that you just created or edited in View Designer.
- 2. In the Oracle BI EE ribbon, click the **Publish View** icon (Figure 1).



Figure 28-22 Publish View Icon



3. In **Save Report**, click ¹ next to **Catalog Root**, and then navigate to the location in the Oracle BI Presentation Catalog where you will save the view.

4. In Analysis Name, provide a name.

If you are publishing an edited view, you have the option of overwriting the view you edited by providing the same name, or providing a new name and keeping the original version of the view intact.

5. Click Save.

The default naming convention is applied to the components of the view that is saved; for example, Table 1, Pivot Table 1, Chart 1, and so on.

Example 28-1 Notes

- If you are publishing a view that was created and then edited in Smart View, you may overwrite it.
- An error message is displayed if you attempt to overwrite an existing view in the Oracle BI Presentation Catalog if the view was created in Oracle BI EE.
- To view the changes made in Oracle BI EE, you must re-insert the view.
- Once published, you may make changes to the view as follows:
 - If the view was created in Oracle BI EE, then use the Oracle BI EE.
 - If the view was created in Smart View, you may edit it either in Smart View or Oracle BI EE.
- You may refresh the data in views created in View Designer.

Ad hoc views created in View Designer remain as a snapshot and will not be kept in sync with the analysis published to the catalog.

• Changes made to the view in Oracle BI EE will not be reflected into the ad hoc view that you rendered in Excel. You must reinsert the view from the catalog tree into a new sheet in Smart View in order to view the changes that were made in Oracle BI EE.

About Editing Views Created in View Designer

Use the View Designer in Oracle Smart View for Office to edit the views you created or edited in View Designer.

Do not use the View Designer in Smart View in these cases:

- To edit the views you created in Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition
- To edit views you created in Smart View and then edited in Oracle BI EE

The process flow for editing views involves the following tasks:

- Reviewing the information in Guidelines for Editing Views Created in View Designer
- Accessing the View to Edit
- Determining Where a View was Created
- Editing Views Created in View Designer

Guidelines for Editing Views Created in View Designer

- Only views created and inserted from the View Designer in Oracle Smart View for Office can be edited using the View Designer.
- Views created in Smart View may also be edited in Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition. However, views created in Smart View and then further edited in Oracle BI EE cannot afterward be edited in View Designer.

Note:

To edit views created in Oracle BI EE, use the Oracle BI EE application (see Editing an Analysis in Oracle BI EE).

When you use View Designer to edit a table view or pivot table view, Smart View
performs a replace operation, effectively replacing the view on the sheet with the
newly-edited view; that is, the table on the sheet is deleted and a new table is
inserted. If the new table has more rows or columns than the previous table, any
content or formulas that you may have added to the sheet prior to editing the view
in View Designer may be removed and you will need to add them again.

Accessing the View to Edit

Note:

This procedure applies to views that were created in View Designer.

To access views to edit:

1. Access a view in one of following ways:



- **During the design session**—For example, after you created the view in View Designer and clicked OK to insert the view, select the view in the Office document and click the View Designer icon to relaunch the View Designer for editing.
- **From a view in a saved Office document**—Select the view in the Office document and click the View Designer icon to relaunch the View Designer for editing.
- From a published view in the Presentation Catalog—Use the Load view in View Designer command to load the view from the catalog tree into the View Designer in Oracle Smart View for Office. When you select a view, the Load view in View Designer command is available in the Action Panel or from the right-click menu.

Remember, to select a view to edit from the catalog tree, *do not* try to insert it first into the Office document. Be sure to use the **Load view in View Designer** command when you want to edit.

2. Continue with the processes described in Determining Where a View was Created to determine if you should edit the view in View Designer.

Note:

Do not use View Designer in Smart View to edit views that were created in Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition. Views may not load in cases where the View Designer does not support the formatting and design features that were used to create the view in Oracle BI EE. For this reason, use the View Designer to edit only those views that were created and inserted using the View Designer in Smart View.

Determining Where a View was Created

You need to know if a view was created in the View Designer in Oracle Smart View for Office if you want to edit it in Smart View.

If you are unsure whether a view on a sheet was created in Smart View or Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition, you can verify the origin of the view in the Document Contents pane.

To determine the origin of a view:

- 1. Open the Office document containing the view.
- 2. Locate the view in the Document Contents pane, then right-click the view name, and then select **Properties**.
- 3. Check that the value in the View Source field is AdHocDesigner.

The possible values are:

- AdHocDesigner—View originates from the View Designer in Smart View
- Catalog—View originates from the Oracle BI Presentation Catalog
- CopyFromAnswers—View was copied from Oracle BI EE and pasted into the Smart View Office document

The views marked **AdHocDesigner** are the only views that should be edited in View Designer.



Note that, in some cases, views created in Oracle BI EE may be loaded in to the View Designer in Smart View. Keep in mind that when you attempt to work in View Designer with views from Oracle BI EE, you are doing so at your own risk; editing these views in View Designer is not supported. Oracle only supports using the View Designer to edit those views that were created and edited using the View Designer in Smart View.

4. If the View Source property is AdHocDesigner, the view can be edited in View Designer.

If the **View Source** is **Catalog** or **CopyFromAnswers**, edit the view in Oracle BI EE.

Editing Views that were Created in View Designer

Note:

This topic is about editing views that were created in the View Designer in Oracle Smart View for Office. If you are working with views that were created in Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition, see Editing Views Created in Oracle BI EE.

When working with views created in the View Designer in Smart View, you can edit the views using either of the following methods:

 Load the view for editing into View Designer in Smart View, as described in Launching the View Designer or About Editing Views Created in View Designer.

You can edit the layout of the view (for example, add or remove columns) or modify the filters. See the following topics for information on editing views in Smart View:

- Defining the View Layout
- Defining the Filter Expression for Views in View Designer
- Open the analysis in Oracle BI EE. See the documentation in Oracle BI EE for assistance. Then insert the updated view into Smart View.

Note:

Once a view is created in View Designer and then edited in Oracle BI EE, Oracle recommends that you only edit it thereafter in Oracle BI EE. You should not use Smart View to edit the view. See What Can and Cannot Be Edited for guidelines.

Refreshing Data in a View Created in View Designer

You may refresh views created in View Designer in the same way you refresh views that were inserted into an Office application from the catalog tree.

See Specifying Preferences for Refreshing Views and Refreshing Views for information.



Troubleshooting Connecting to the Oracle BI EE Server

You can troubleshoot the connection to the Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition server:

When troubleshooting, note the following behaviors:

- When attempting to connect from Oracle Smart View for Office to Oracle BI EE while the Oracle BI EE server is down, an error message is displayed. However, after clicking OK in the error message, the Connect to Data Source dialog box is erroneously displayed. Click Cancel to close the dialog box.
- When trying to insert a view after a connection timeout has occurred, the **Connect to Data Source** dialog box is displayed. If you click **Cancel**, the dialog box is relaunched. Click **Cancel** and the error message is displayed.
- Clicking **OK** in the View Designer after the session is timed out returns an object reference error.

In addition to working with this content, Smart View users can create content in the form of simple views with the View Designer, using Oracle Analytics Cloud as the data source. The views created can then be published to the Oracle BI Presentation Catalog, where they can be edited further.

Smart View offers Oracle Analytics Cloud users a cohesive and consistent experience across all Oracle Analytics Cloud content providers.



Note:

To use the Oracle Analytics Cloud-related features in Smart View, you must have Oracle Analytics Cloud 17.3.2 or later.

Features and Components of Oracle Analytics Cloud in Smart View

When connected to an Oracle Analytics Cloud data source in Oracle Smart View for Office, you can perform several actions.

- Connect to Oracle Analytics Cloud.
- Navigate through the Oracle BI Presentation Catalog.
- Connect to multiple instances of Oracle Analytics Cloud and switch between connections.
- Import pre-created views from the Oracle BI Presentation Catalog into Microsoft Excel, PowerPoint, and Word. For example, you can:
 - Insert views—Oracle Analytics Cloud tables, pivot tables, and graphs—into Excel as refreshable, editable objects.
 - Insert views from different connections into the same Office document.
 - Apply Excel formatting to Oracle Analytics Cloud data; formats are retained when you refresh.
- Copy Oracle Analytics Cloud Dashboard content and paste it into Smart View client documents. The data, metadata, and view layout are copied.
- Create simple views in Excel using Oracle Analytics Cloud as the source for metadata and data.
- Interact with content imported into Smart View documents, such as drill and prompt selections.
- Manage the imported content in Smart View, including content from multiple connections; for example, refresh, mask, copy and paste, and document contents.
- Mask data from Oracle Analytics Cloud objects in Excel so that users must log in to view the data. Masked objects can be viewed upon refresh.
- Program using Visual Basic. See the Oracle Smart View for Office Developer's *Guide* for more information.

Key components are:

- Ribbon—The Oracle Analytics Cloud ribbon contains Oracle Analytics Cloud commands for designing and publishing views in Smart View, inserting, and copying and pasting views from Oracle Analytics Cloud, editing prompts, masking data, editing, and setting preferences.
- Catalog—The catalog is an expandable tree list of the Oracle Analytics Cloud dashboards, analyses, and views that are available to you for insertion into Excel. Each analysis expands to display all views available from that analysis. Only views that are supported and defined in Oracle Analytics Cloud, and for which you have



permission, are displayed. You can refresh the catalog to display the latest list of available analyses and views.

Installing the Oracle Analytics Cloud Extension

How the Oracle Analytics Cloud extension is installed depends on whether you are an end user or an administrator.

For Smart View End Users

To install the extension for Oracle Analytics Cloud:

1. Install Oracle Smart View for Office as instructed by your Smart View administrator.

Note:

In some cases, your administrator may install Smart View automatically for you.

2. After Smart View is installed, and *before* you start Microsoft Excel, Word, or PowerPoint, ensure that you are logged in to your computer with your own user name.

Note:

You must be logged in with your own user name, not an administrator's or anyone else's user name, in order to be able to correctly install and use the extension for Oracle Analytics Cloud.

3. Start Microsoft Excel, Word, or PowerPoint.

Note:

To install the Oracle BI EE extension, you can start Excel, Word, or PowerPoint; the Oracle BI EE extension installation is not launched from Outlook.

See Installing Extensions for details.

4. To verify that the extension for Oracle Analytics Cloud is installed, from Excel, Word, or PowerPoint, select the Smart View ribbon, then **Options**, and then **Extensions**, and confirm that the extension named "Oracle BI EE" is listed.

If the extension is not listed, contact your Smart View administrator.



For Smart View Administrators

After Oracle Smart View for Office installation, the Oracle Analytics Cloud extension is installed automatically the first time an Office application is launched. You must ensure that the intended end user is logged in to Windows before Office is launched.

Or, you can control how your Smart View end users install the Oracle Analytics Cloud extension via the **Extensions** page of the Smart View **Options** dialog box. See "Administering Extension Installations and Updates" in the *Oracle Smart View for Office Installation and Configuration Guide* for more information on setting up automatic or manual installations.

If you choose to set up automatic or manual installations, you should install Smart View in a test environment first, then refer to the UpdateList.xml file, found in the extensions folder of your Smart View installation. Use the entry in this file as a guideline for the Oracle Analytics Cloud entry you will add to the UpdateList.xml file, as described in "Configuring Manual Extension Updates" in the Oracle Smart View for Office Installation and Configuration Guide.

Working with Windows System Locales in Oracle Analytics Cloud

On each Oracle Smart View for Office client machine, Windows system locales must match that of Smart View in order for any data (numbers, dates, currencies, percentages) to be interpreted correctly.

The following are the applicable Windows system locales:

- Smart View language option
- Microsoft Office language
- Windows Regional Settings
- Windows operating system

When working with Oracle Analytics Cloud data sources, in cases of mismatched Windows system locales, data may display incorrectly, or formatting may be ignored and plain data rendered instead.

An example of a Windows system locale mismatch is the Windows operating system, Regional Settings, and Office language in English, and Smart View in Russian.

When locale mismatches occur, the Smart View log indicates a warning such as the following: "Encountered mismatched locale. Chart will use unformatted data values."

Connecting to Multiple Oracle Analytics Cloud Data Sources

You connect to Oracle Analytics Cloud data sources using private connections.

See Creating Private Connections.

To connect using shared connections, the shared connection information must be stored in a file, as described in Accessing Shared Connections from an XML File in the Oracle Smart View for Office Installation and Configuration Guide.



Additionally, Oracle Smart View for Office supports multiple Oracle Analytics Cloud private connections on one Office worksheet, slide, or document.

For example, in one worksheet, you may insert two graphs from two different Oracle BI Presentation Catalogs and refresh the sheet. Each graph will be updated with the latest data from the two different servers.

When connected to multiple Oracle Analytics Cloud servers:

- Users can switch between those connections in the Smart View Panel and browse the respective catalogs.
- Users can insert views from the different connections into the same Office document.
- If View Designer is launched from the Smart View ribbon and no Oracle Analytics Cloud view is selected, then View Designer will be connected to the Oracle Analytics Cloud server that was last used.
- If Paste is invoked from the Smart View ribbon to paste content from Oracle Analytics Cloud, the paste action will use the Oracle Analytics Cloud connection that was last used.
- When refreshing a document containing views from different connections, the views will be refreshed against the servers from which they were inserted.
- There can be only one Excel pivot table view per Excel worksheet. Additionally, Excel pivot table views are always inserted onto a new worksheet. This is the expected behavior, whether you are working with a single data source connection or with multiple connections.

To connect to multiple Oracle Analytics Cloud private connections:

1. From **Smart View Home** or from the menu displayed when you click the arrow next to

, click Private Connections

2. In the **Private Connections** panel, select a connection from the drop-down menu and, in **Connect to Data Source**, enter your user name and password for the data source.

Assume you have inserted a view from the Oracle Analytics Cloud catalog. Continue with step 3.

- 3. Move the cursor to a different part of the worksheet, slide, or document.
- 4. In the **Private Connections** panel, select a different connection from the drop-down menu.
- 5. In **Connect to Data Source**, enter your user name and password for the second data source.

You can now insert a view from the newly-connected data source into the Office document

6. Repeat step 3 through step 5 for any other data sources to which you want to connect.

Oracle BI Presentation Catalog

The Oracle BI Presentation Catalog, also referred to as the catalog or catalog tree, is displayed in the Smart View Panel.

The catalog tree displays a root node called "Catalog Root" and, by default, two folders called "My Folders" and "Shared Folders".





Figure 29-1 Oracle BI Presentation Catalog, or Catalog Tree

Items that you save to My Folders appear only to you when you expand the folder. Items that other users save to My Folders appear only to them.

Items that you save to Shared Folders can be viewed by all users who have logged on with BI Consumer privileges. If you have BI Consumer privileges, you can also view the items that other users have saved in Shared Folders.

To view the properties of any folder to which you have access, including the name of the folder creator and the creation date, right-click the folder in the catalog tree and select **View Folder Properties**.

The folders in the catalog tree contain a list of analyses, both from Oracle Analytics Cloud and Oracle Smart View for Office, as well as any subfolders created. Expand an analysis node (for example, "Area chart2" under **My Folders**) and the list of views that are stored there is displayed (for example, "Compound View 1" and "Table 1").






Figure 29-2 Catalog Tree Showing Views Under an Analysis Node

To view the properties of an analysis, including the name of the analysis creator, the creation date, and modification date, right-click the analysis in the catalog tree and select **View Analysis Properties**.

You can choose to edit any analysis in Oracle Analytics Cloud. If a view in the analysis was created in Smart View, you can also choose to edit the view in Smart View.

To edit an analysis in Oracle Analytics Cloud, right-click the analysis in the catalog tree and select **Edit Analysis in Answers**.

Selecting this option launches the default browser and opens the analysis editing wizard in Oracle Analytics Cloud. If you are not already logged onto Oracle Analytics Cloud, a login dialog box is displayed where you can enter your credentials. You must have BI Consumer privileges to edit an analysis in Oracle Analytics Cloud.

To edit a view in Smart View, right-click the view in the catalog tree and select **Load view in View Designer**.

In this case, the view must have been created in Smart View. See Launching the View Designer for other methods for accessing views for editing.

From the catalog tree, you can also insert table views, pivot table views, graph views, titles, and compound views into Smart View. See Working with Oracle Analytics Cloud Analyses, Views, and Dashboards.

Supported Oracle Analytics Cloud View and Object Types

You can insert the following views into Oracle Smart View for Office clients (Excel, PowerPoint, and Word) from the catalog or by copying and pasting.

Note:

Drill operations are not supported on Oracle Analytics Cloud views inserted in Smart View. (Drill operations are referred to as Zoom In and Zoom Out in Smart View.)

Table Views

Table views display data in table format, either in a format similar to the display in Oracle Analytics Cloud (also referred to as native format), or as an Excel table.

Using the **Insert** option, you can insert table views into all Smart View clients in native format. This format offers no sorting or filtering. Cells with the same data are merged into a single cell.



In Excel, using the **Insert as Excel Table** command, you can insert a table view as an Excel table. With this format, you can perform further analysis operations, such as sorting and filtering.

Notes:

- In Excel, you can insert multiple tables on a worksheet, but you cannot insert a table on top of an existing table. You can, however, do the following:
 - * To replace a table, select any cell within the table and click the Delete button on the Oracle BI EE ribbon. Then insert the table into the worksheet.
 - * To insert additional tables onto the worksheet, select a cell outside any table views or other view objects, and then insert the table.
- Excel may not recognize some custom formats in table views and Excel table views may not be recognized by Excel, resulting in an error when the view is inserted into Excel.

• Pivot Table Views

Pivot table views display data in the grouped format defined in Oracle Analytics Cloud, which is also referred to as native format. Features such as page item lists and group sectioning are maintained. Data can also be displayed in Excel pivot table format.

Using the **Insert** option, you can insert pivot table views into all Smart View clients in native format. As with inserting a table view, this format offers no sorting or filtering; cells with the same data are merged into a single cell.

In Excel, using the **Insert as Excel Pivot** option, you can also insert a pivot table view as an Excel pivot table. With this format, you may perform further analysis operations, such as pivoting, aggregating, drilling, sorting, and filtering.

Notes:

- When working with Excel pivot table views, only views with measure columns of numerical data type are supported.
- There can be only one Excel pivot table view per Excel worksheet. Additionally, Excel pivot table views are always inserted onto a new worksheet. This is the expected behavior, whether you are working with a single data source connection or with multiple connections.
- Excel may not recognize some custom formats in Pivot table views, resulting in an error when the view is inserted into Excel.
- Smart View does not have the "Graph Pivoted Results" functionality of Oracle Analytics Cloud. In order to view a graph of the same row, column and page dimensions of a particular pivot table, you must create a separate chart view in Oracle Analytics Cloud, and then insert that chart view in Smart View.

• Graph Views

Graph views display data by mapping the graph defined in Oracle Analytics Cloud to a graph type supported by Microsoft Office charts.

Using the **Insert as Image** option, you can insert graphs directly into Smart View clients as a static image. The image cannot be edited or refreshed.

Using the **Insert** option in all Smart View clients, you can edit and refresh graphs. Smart View attempts to match the graph style from Oracle Analytics Cloud as closely as possible, including graph properties such as visual effect (2D, 3D), canvas size, chart title, subtitle, axis titles, legend and legend position, axis scale, data format (numeric, date, currency format), and title and label formatting.



If a matching Office chart type is not available, you can insert the graph view as an image. See Supported Oracle Analytics Cloud Chart and Object Types and Unsupported Oracle Analytics Cloud Chart and Object Types.

Gauge Views and Funnel Graph Views

In Oracle Analytics Cloud, gauge views and funnel graph views are separate object types from graph views.

Using the **Insert as Image** option, you can insert gauge and funnel views directly into Smart View clients as a static image. You cannot edit or refresh the image.

Title Views

Title views display the title of a report, along with other information that is part of the Oracle Analytics Cloud title view.

Title views typically include title text, subtitle text, the analysis name, the date and time inserted, an optional logo, and an optional URL (for example, a help link). Title views are inserted into Smart View clients as a collection of text boxes and images grouped together as a single Office object.

Compound Views

Compound views display data as an assembly of different views.

You can insert compound views into all Smart View clients. Smart View inserts all supported views that make up the compound view. Each type of view—table, pivot table, graph, gauge, funnel, filter, and title—is inserted into Smart View clients in its own default format.

In Word, all views are inserted next to and below each other filling pages in the active Word document.

In Excel or PowerPoint, users are prompted to choose between inserting all the views on one sheet or slide, or inserting each view on a separate sheet or slide.

Inserting Tables and Pivot Tables

The maximum number of rows and columns that you can insert depends on the version of Excel you are using. See Microsoft Excel documentation for worksheet size limits.

To insert a table or pivot table:

- 1. Place the cursor at the point in the Excel worksheet, PowerPoint slide, or Word page where you want the table or pivot table to begin.
- 2. In the catalog tree in the Smart View Panel, right-click a table or pivot table.
- 3. Select one of the following:
 - **Insert**—The selected table view or pivot table view is inserted in the format defined in Oracle Analytics Cloud. See Figure 1 and Figure 2

If prompts are defined for the table or pivot table in Oracle Analytics Cloud, the **Prompt Selector** dialog box is displayed where you make selections on the data to display (otherwise, the table or pivot table is inserted directly). After the initial insert, you may edit the prompts by clicking the **Edit Prompts** icon in the Oracle Analytics Cloud ribbon. See Working with Prompts for more information.



If page prompts are defined for the table or pivot table (view prompts in Oracle Analytics Cloud), you may edit them by clicking the **Edit Page Prompts** icon in the Oracle Analytics Cloud ribbon. See .Working with Page Prompts.

 Insert as Excel Table (table views only)—The selected table view is inserted as an Excel table. Columns in the page prompt edge and section edge, if present, are moved to the top of the table as drop-down headings. Select this option when you want to use Excel operations to filter, define formulas, sort, and perform other Excel tasks.

When a table view is inserted as an Excel table, prompts that are defined in Oracle Analytics Cloud are not available.

The selected table is inserted on the worksheet.

• **Insert as Excel Pivot** (pivot table views only)—The selected pivot table view is inserted as an Excel pivot table. Columns in the page edge and section edge, if present, are mapped to the report filters area, and columns in the measures edge are moved to the values area. Select this option when you



want to perform further analysis, such as aggregating, pivoting, drilling, sorting, and filtering.

The selected table or pivot table is inserted on the worksheet. See Figure 4.

Notes:

- When a pivot table view is inserted as an Excel Pivot table, prompts that are defined in Oracle Analytics Cloud are not available.
- When working with Excel pivot table views, only views with measure columns of numerical data type are supported.
- There can be only one Excel pivot table view per Excel worksheet. Additionally, Excel pivot table views are always inserted onto a new worksheet. This is the expected behavior, whether you are working with a single data source connection or with multiple connections.

Inserting Graphs

When inserting graphs, Oracle Smart View for Office attempts to map the Oracle Analytics Cloud graph into a chart type supported by Microsoft Office 2007 and later. Further, Smart View attempts to match visual effects, such as 2D or 3D, and other graph properties such as canvas size, axis scale, data format, and formatting in terms of font styles and colors.

When a matching chart type is not available, the graph view can only be inserted as image.

See Supported Oracle Analytics Cloud Chart and Object Types and Unsupported Oracle Analytics Cloud Chart and Object Types.

To insert a graph:

- 1. From the catalog, right-click a graph view.
- 2. Select an option:
 - **Insert**—The selected graph is inserted as an Excel chart, which can be edited, masked, and refreshed.

If prompts are defined for the graph in Oracle Analytics Cloud, the **Prompt Selector** dialog box is displayed where you make selections on the data to display (otherwise,



the graph is inserted directly). After the initial insert, you may edit the prompts by clicking the **Edit Prompts** icon in the Oracle Analytics Cloud ribbon. See Working with Prompts.

If page prompts are defined for the graph (view prompts in Oracle Analytics Cloud), you may edit them by clicking the **Edit Page Prompts** icon in the Oracle Analytics Cloud ribbon. See Working with Prompts for more information.

If no prompts are defined for this analysis, then the graph is inserted directly. See Figure 1.




Figure 29-7 A Pie Chart View Inserted as an Excel Chart

You can edit graphs inserted this way as described in Editing Views Created in Oracle Analytics Cloud.

• **Insert as Image**—The selected graph is inserted as an image of the graph, which cannot be edited or customized.

When a graph is inserted directly as an image, prompts, page prompts, and sections that are defined in Oracle Analytics Cloud are not available.

Note that gauge and funnel objects can only be inserted using the **Insert as Image** command.






Figure 29-8 A Pie Chart View Inserted as an Image

Inserting Compound Views

To insert a compound view:

- 1. From the catalog, select the compound view to insert.
- 2. Right-click and select Insert All Views.
- 3. When prompted, choose an option:
 - **One object per sheet/slide** to insert each object in the compound view on a separate sheet in Excel, or a separate slide in PowerPoint.
 - All objects on one sheet/slide to display all objects on one Excel sheet or PowerPoint slide.

In Excel, objects are inserted on a new sheet or sheets, even if there are unused sheets in the workbook.

In Word, objects are placed adjacent to and below other objects on a sheet until the sheet is filled, and then continues filling as many sheets as required to hold all the objects.

The default display is selected for the table, pivot table, and graph view types; that is, the **Insert** action will be used automatically.

A message notifies you of unsupported view types in the compound view. Unsupported view types are not inserted.

Note:

You may perform Refresh and edit prompt and page prompts for selected views. Unselected views from the compound view remain unchanged. See Refreshing Views, Working with Prompts, and Working with Page Prompts.



Inserting Dashboards

Dashboards are displayed in the catalog tree as folders. A dashboard folder can be expanded to show dashboard pages; a dashboard page can be expanded to show the list of analyses included in that page. You can insert dashboard pages into Excel, PowerPoint, and Word.

To insert dashboard pages into Office applications:

- 1. From the catalog, right-click a dashboard page and select Insert All Views.
- 2. When prompted, choose an option:
 - **One object per sheet/slide** to insert each object in the dashboard on a separate sheet in Excel, or a separate slide in PowerPoint.
 - All objects on one sheet/slide to display all objects on one Excel sheet or PowerPoint slide.

In Word, objects are placed adjacent to and below other objects on a sheet until the sheet is filled, and then continues filling as many sheets as required to hold all the objects.

Default display is selected for the table, pivot table, and graph view types; that is, the **Insert** action is used automatically.

A message notifies of unsupported view types in the dashboard. Unsupported view types are not inserted.

Note:

You may perform Refresh and edit prompt and page prompts for selected views. Unselected views from the dashboard remain unchanged. See Refreshing Views, Working with Prompts, and Working with Page Prompts.

Working with Prompts

Prompts enable users to specify criteria that determines the content of the view that they are inserting. Oracle Smart View for Office supports both prompts and page prompts. See Working with Page Prompts for information on page prompts.

Prompts in Smart View are the equivalent of prompts in Oracle Analytics Cloud. Smart View only supports column prompts.

Prompts are defined at the analysis level in Oracle Analytics Cloud. Users are prompted to enter values for these prompts each time a view is inserted in Smart View.

If prompts are defined on an analysis in Oracle Analytics Cloud, then when you insert a table, pivot table, or graph view from the analysis into Smart View, you are prompted to select the data to be displayed for that view. When inserting a compound view from an analysis that has prompts defined, you are prompted to enter values only one time for all the views in that compound view.

For example, a prompt on Year is designated for an analysis, and the years 2010, 2011, and 2012 are available to choose from. When you insert a table, pivot table, or graph, you are



prompted to select which year's data to display: 2010, 2011, or 2012. Or, you can choose to insert the compound view, and the prompt selection you make is applied to all the views inserted. After insertion, you can edit the prompts on each individual view to select another year's data to display.

Views can only be edited individually. The edit operation will prompt you for the values to be selected for each view that is being edited.

You may edit prompts in views that were inserted, or copied and pasted.

	Note: Prompts defined on hierarchical columns in Oracle Analytics Cloud are not supported in Smart View.

- 1. From the worksheet, select a view:
 - Graph views—Select the graph.
 - Table and pivot table views—Select a cell in the table.
- 2. From the Oracle Analytics Cloud ribbon, select the **Edit Prompts** button to display your original selections.

3. In the **Prompt Selector**, modify the prompt selections.

Depending on how the prompt was set up in Oracle Analytics Cloud, you may be selecting data directly from a drop-down list on the **Prompt Selector**. You may also be picking values from the **Value Selector** dialog box.

Figure 2 is an example of a **Value Selector**, where the years 2008, 2009, and 2010 were selected for display.

A second prompt in the example **Prompt Selector** requires that you directly enter an amount; in this example, the amount to display is Billed Quantity greater than \$5,000.

In some cases, the data to choose from can be exceedingly long. To accommodate loading large amounts of data in the **Value Selector**, Smart View presents values in



groups. Scroll and make selections from the first group shown, then click **More** to view and make selections from the next group. Continue clicking **More** until you have viewed and made selections from the entire data list. Figure 4 shows an example.

Working with Page Prompts

Page prompts enable users to specify criteria that determines the content of the view that has been inserted. Oracle Smart View for Office supports both page prompts and prompts. See also Working with Prompts.

Page Prompts in Smart View are the equivalent of view prompts in Oracle Analytics Cloud. View prompts are specified on individual views within an analysis. Smart View supports table prompts, graph prompts, and gauge prompts in Oracle Analytics Cloud; these types of prompts are called page prompts in Smart View.

Page prompts may vary on individual views within an analysis. An individual table view within an analysis may have a page prompt set on Year, and a pivot table view within the same analysis may have a page prompt set on Line of Business.

When you first insert a view that contains page prompts, a view state is selected by default. For example, if a prompt on Year is specified on a particular view within an analysis, and the years 2010, 2011, and 2012 are available to choose from, you are not prompted for these at the time of insertion. Instead, a default state of the view is inserted. For example, 2010 data may automatically be inserted, as the first year in the list of years available. You can then edit the page prompts to select another year's data to display for this view.

You may edit page prompts in views that have been inserted, or copied and pasted.

To edit page prompts:



- **1.** From the worksheet, select a view:
 - Graph views—Select the graph.
 - Table and pivot table views—Select any cell in the table.
- 2. From the Oracle Analytics Cloud ribbon, select the **Edit Page Prompts** button to display the default page prompt selections for a particular view.

If the report definition has changed on the server, your selections are reset, and you must select all page prompts again.

3. In the **Page Selector**, modify the page prompt selections by selecting from the dropdown lists.

Working with Page Prompts shows a **Page Selector** dialog box, where users select a Year and a Line of Business. In the example, selections were made to display 2010 for the year, and Electronics for the Line of Business.

After you make selections and click **OK**, the view is immediately refreshed and reflects your selections.

5. Repeat this procedure to edit the page prompts to change the output displayed.



Specifying Preferences for Refreshing Views

You can specify preferences for refreshing each view. The refresh preferences that you set for each view within a worksheet, slide, or page are saved along with the Office document (Excel workbook, PowerPoint slide presentation, or Word document).

To specify preferences for refreshing a view:

- 1. Ensure that one or more Oracle Analytics Cloud views are inserted into Oracle Smart View for Office.
- 2. In **Document Contents**, click \rightarrow to refresh the content of the pane.

All views that were inserted into the active Office application are displayed in **Document Contents** in a tree format.

- 3. Select a view in **Document Contents**, and then select **Properties**.
- 4. In Properties, select an option from Refresh Preferences:
 - Refresh Data—Refreshes only the data points in the selected view or analysis.

Any changes made to formatting in the sheet, slide, or page are retained.

• **Replace View**—Replaces the entire view, including any formatting changes set in Oracle Analytics Cloud.

If you select this option, your prompt and graph selections and custom formatting are lost upon refresh if the view definition has changed.

Note:

Oracle Business Intelligence Enterprise Edition title views are not included in refresh actions, so all customizations to a title view are retained when you refresh the worksheet or workbook.

- Do not refresh—Refreshing is not allowed.
- 5. Click **OK** to save the **Refresh Preference** selection.

Continue with Refreshing Views.

Refreshing Views

You can refresh the data from Oracle Analytics Cloud in your inserted views. You have the option of refreshing selected views or refreshing all views, depending on the Office document type, as follows.

Excel

- Individual views
- Individual worksheets
- Entire workbook



PowerPoint

- Individual views
- Individual slides
- Entire presentation

Word

- Individual views
- Entire document

You can refresh views from the Document Contents pane, the Oracle BI EE ribbon, or the Smart View ribbon.

The refresh action is limited according to the Refresh Preference set for a selected view. See Specifying Preferences for Refreshing Views for information.

Note that when you refresh, title views are not included in refresh actions, so all customizations to a title view are retained when you refresh the Office document.

When there are multiple objects on an Office document, if you attempt to refresh the document without having already connected, then you will be prompted for your login credentials once for all objects. If you choose to cancel instead, the **Connect to Data Source** dialog box will appear for each object on the sheet, and you must click **Cancel** for each object. For example, if there are six objects on the sheet, the dialog box will appear six times, once for each object.

To refresh Oracle Analytics Cloud views from the **Document Contents** pane:

- 1. In **Document Contents**, ensure that **Oracle Analytics Cloud Document Hierarchy** is displayed in the drop-down list box.
- 2. In **Document Contents**, click \rightarrow to refresh the contents of the tree.

From **Document Contents**, you can refresh individual views in all Office applications, individual worksheets, and individual slides.

- 3. Perform an action:
 - To refresh a selected view in an Excel sheet, PowerPoint slide, or Word document, select the view object from the tree in **Document Contents**, and then select the **Refresh View** action from the right-click menu or click the **Refresh View** link at the bottom of the pane.

Repeat for each view that you want to refresh.

 To refresh all Oracle Analytics Cloud views on a selected Excel worksheet or PowerPoint slide, select the sheet or slide from the tree in **Document Contents**, and then select the **Refresh** action from the right-click menu or click the **Refresh** link at the bottom of the pane.

Repeat for each sheet or slide that you want to refresh.

To refresh all Oracle Analytics Cloud views on a worksheet or slide, or an entire Word document, using the ribbons:

- 1. Perform an action:
 - Select the worksheet or slide to make it active.



- Place your cursor in the Word document to select it.
- 2. Click **Refresh** in the Oracle BI EE ribbon or the Smart View ribbon.

To refresh all Oracle Analytics Cloud views in an Excel workbook, PowerPoint presentation, or Word document:

- 1. Place your cursor anywhere in the workbook, presentation or document to select it.
- 2. Perform an action:
 - To refresh all Oracle Analytics Cloud views in an Excel workbook, click the down arrow in **Refresh** in the Smart View ribbon and select **Refresh all** Worksheets. Figure 1 shows the Refresh icon with the arrow:

Figure 29-15 Refresh Icon with Down Arrow in Excel and PowerPoint




Alternatively, click the down arrow in **Refresh** in the Oracle BI EE ribbon and select **Refresh Workbook Data**.

 To refresh all Oracle Analytics Cloud views in a PowerPoint presentation, click the down arrow in **Refresh** in the Smart View ribbon and select **Refresh All** Slides.

Alternatively, click the down arrow in Refresh in the Oracle BI EE ribbon and select **Refresh Presentation Data**.

• To refresh all views in a Word document, click **Refresh** in the Oracle BI EE ribbon or the Smart View ribbon. The Refresh icon in Word does not contain a down arrow, as shown in Figure 2.



Masking Data in Views

You can mask data in the Oracle Analytics Cloud views that you insert in Office documents and in views you create using the View Designer. You have the option of masking data in:



- Selected views
- All views on sheet or a slide
- All views in an Office document

Using the Mask Data functionality in Oracle Smart View for Office, you can perform these actions:

- Select a single Smart View object in an Excel sheet or PowerPoint slide and mask data only in that object
- Mask data in the active Excel worksheet or PowerPoint slide
- Mask data in the active workbook, presentation, or Word document

You can invoke Mask Data from these locations:

- Document Contents in the Smart View Panel
- Oracle Analytics Cloud ribbon

Masking Data for an Individual View

To mask data in an individual view in an Excel worksheet or PowerPoint slide:

1. In Excel or PowerPoint, click in **Document Contents** to refresh the contents of the tree.

Note:

Data in Word documents can only be masked in their entirety; you cannot mask data in individual views in Word.

- 2. Locate the view with data that you want to mask in **Document Contents**, and then select it.
- 3. Click the Mask Data link in Document Contents.

In a table object, cells are replaced with the text, "Need refresh"; in a graph, the area becomes blank and a small lock image is displayed.

4. Save the current workbook or presentation.

The masked state of the view remains intact after saving.

5. To display the data in the masked view, click → in **Document Contents**, select the view in the tree, and then click the **Refresh View** link.

Masking Data on a Sheet or Slide

To mask data on an Excel worksheet or PowerPoint slide:

- 1. Choose a method to select a sheet or slide:
 - Place the cursor directly in a sheet or slide
 - In **Document Contents**, click , locate the sheet or slide in the tree, and then select it.
- 2. Choose a method to mask data for all objects on the selected sheet or slide:



• In the Oracle Analytics Cloud ribbon, click the Mask Data button.

• In **Document Contents**, click the **Mask Data** link.

Data on the sheet or slide is masked.



Data in Word documents can only be masked in their entirety; you cannot mask data on individual pages in Word.

3. Save the current workbook or presentation.

The masked state of the sheet or slide remains intact after saving.

4. To display the data in the masked sheet or slide, click → in **Document Contents**, select the sheet or slide in the tree, and then click the **Refresh** link.

Alternatively, place the cursor in the sheet or slide to refresh, and then click



Masking Data in an Entire Office Document

To mask data in an entire Office document:

1. From the Oracle Analytics Cloud ribbon in the opened Office document, perform an action:



• Excel: Click the down arrow in Mask and select Mask Workbook Data.



PowerPoint: Click the down arrow in Mask and select Mask Presentation
Data.





Note:

Word documents can only be masked in their entirety; you cannot mask individual pages in Word.

2. Save the current Office document.

The masked state of the workbook, presentation, or document remains intact after saving.

3. To display the masked data, click → in **Document Contents**, select the sheet, slide, or document in the tree, and then click the **Refresh** link.

Alternatively, place the cursor in the sheet, slide, or document to be refreshed, and then



click Refresh

Viewing Properties of an Oracle Analytics Cloud Object

You can view various properties of a selected object.

To view the properties of an Oracle Analytics Cloud object:

1. Select an Oracle Analytics Cloud view.

Select an actual view object and not a sheet or slide.

2. Click the Properties link at the bottom of the Document Contents pane.

Copying and Pasting Oracle Analytics Cloud Objects Between Office Applications

You can copy Oracle Analytics Cloud objects within and between Office applications as follows:

- Graphs can be copied within and between any Office application.
- Tables and pivot tables can be copied within and between Word and PowerPoint.
- Tables and pivot tables cannot be copied within Excel, from Excel to another Office application, or from another Office application to Excel.
- Tables and pivot tables can only be copied and pasted by sections.

Copying and Pasting a Graph View

To copy and paste a graph view:



1. In Excel, Word, or PowerPoint, select the graph view to copy.

You can use Document Contents to locate the view, but then select the graph directly in the sheet, slide, or page.

- 2. From the Oracle Analytics Cloud ribbon, click
- 3. Access the Office application and position the cursor where you want to paste the graph view.

For example, if you are pasting within an Office application (or if you are copying from Excel and want to paste into PowerPoint, open PowerPoint), position the cursor at the point within the Office document where you want to paste the object.

- 4. Click Paste
- 5. Repeat for all graphs that you want to copy and paste.

Copying and Pasting a Table or Pivot Table View

To copy and paste a table view or pivot table view:

1. In Word or PowerPoint, select the table view or pivot table view to copy.

You can use Document Contents to locate the view, but then select the table or pivot table directly in the slide or page.

- 2. From the Oracle Analytics Cloud ribbon, click
- 3. Access the Office application and position the cursor where you want to paste the table or pivot table view.

For example, if you are pasting within an Office application (or if you are copying from Word and want to paste into PowerPoint, open PowerPoint), position the cursor at the point within the Office document where you want to paste the object.

- 4. Click Paste
- 5. Repeat for all tables or pivot tables that you want to copy and paste.

Editing an Analysis in Oracle Analytics Cloud

If the available view does not display the data required, or the data is not displayed as desired, you can edit the view in Oracle Analytics Cloud.

Note:

To edit a view in Oracle Analytics Cloud, you must have the required permissions.

To edit a view in Oracle Analytics Cloud:

- 1. From the Catalog, right-click the view, and then select Edit Analysis in Answers.
- 2. In the login screen, enter your credentials for Oracle Analytics Cloud.



The selected view is displayed in Oracle Analytics Cloud.

- 3. In Oracle Analytics Cloud, edit and save the view.
- 4. Return to the Office application.
- 5. From the **Oracle Analytics Cloud** ribbon, click **Refresh**, and verify that your changes are reflected in the view.

Copying and Pasting Views From Oracle Analytics Cloud to Office

You can copy and paste views from Oracle Analytics Cloud to Oracle Smart View for Office.

When you refresh pasted views, the data is refreshed, but the view definition is not, even if its definition has been modified in Oracle Analytics Cloud.

Note:

When copying and pasting views from Oracle Analytics Cloud to Smart View, some formatting may not be imported to Office.

To copy and paste a view:

- 1. Ensure that you are logged into Oracle Analytics Cloud.
- 2. From Oracle Analytics Cloud or Interactive Dashboards, launch the analysis that you want to copy.
- 3. Click the **Copy** link at the bottom of the analysis (displayed only if the analysis is enabled for copying).
- 4. Open an Office application, such as Excel, and connect to the appropriate Oracle Analytics Cloud data source.
- 5. From the Oracle Analytics Cloud ribbon, click

What Can and Cannot Be Edited

Note the following when editing views that were created in Oracle Analytics Cloud:

- Table views and graph views that are inserted or pasted as Microsoft objects using the **Insert** command can be edited in Excel, PowerPoint, or Word.
- Table views that are inserted or pasted as lists, and graphs views that are inserted as images cannot be edited in Excel.
- Views that are inserted or pasted as images cannot be edited in PowerPoint.



Editing Pivot Tables Inserted into PowerPoint

Consider the following items when editing pivot table views that were created in Oracle Analytics Cloud.

Small Pivot Tables

For small pivot tables in PowerPoint, to change column width and row height, use the mouse to drag column and row borders to the desired height and width.

Large Pivot Tables

To adjust column width and row height in large pivot tables, especially where rows and columns are outside of the slide area, use PowerPoint's table editing tools in as follows:

- **1**. Select the pivot table.
- 2. Select the Layout ribbon in PowerPoint.
- 3. Select a row or column in the pivot table.
- 4. Adjust height and width by changing the height and width values in the **Cell Size** group.

Other Guidelines

Note the following guidelines when editing views that were created in Oracle Analytics Cloud:

• Oracle Smart View for Office does not support duplication of charts or tables through the PowerPoint "Duplicate Slide" command.

In PowerPoint, after duplicating a slide containing a chart, any attempt to update the prompts of either chart result in the prompts for only the original chart being updated. The chart on the duplicate slide is never updated.

For a pivot table inserted into a PowerPoint slide then duplicated, if you change the prompt for either pivot table, only the pivot table original slide is updated, whether you changed the prompt in the original slide or the duplicate.

 Some modifications made to graphs using Microsoft Office formatting tools—such as changes to colors—may not persist when prompts are changed and the graph is refreshed. Smart View does not keep track of such formatting changes; this is done by Microsoft Office. When a graph series is removed, the format of the series is removed by Office as well. Changing prompts can cause the series count and order to change, which means the formatting will also change. This is expected behavior.

Working with Views Using the View Designer

Using the View Designer in Oracle Smart View for Office, you can create ad hoc views based on an Oracle Analytics Cloud subject area.

Views created in Smart View can be saved to the Oracle BI Presentation CatalogOracle Business Intelligence and edited in either Smart View or Oracle Analytics Cloud.



View Designer is available in Microsoft Excel, Word, and PowerPoint.

Launching the View Designer

Depending on whether you are creating a view or editing a view, you can launch the View Designer using the methods described in this topic.

To launch the View Designer:

- **1.** Perform an action:
 - To create a new view:
 - Right-click the Catalog Root node in the catalog tree, and then select Create New View.
 - Select the Catalog Root node in the catalog tree, and then select Create New View at the bottom of the Smart View Panel.
 - From the Oracle BI EE ribbon ribbon, click the View Designer icon.

You must already be connected to a view in the catalog tree to enable the **Oracle Analytics Cloud** ribbon.

- To edit a view (the view must have been created and inserted from View Designer):
 - From the catalog tree, select a view to edit that was created in View Designer and saved to the Oracle BI Presentation Catalog from Oracle Smart View for Office, and then select the Load view in View Designer link at the bottom of the Smart View Panel.
 - Select an existing view on a worksheet in the current or in a saved Office document and click the View Designer icon (see Figure 1).
 - To edit an Excel Pivot Table, click anywhere in the current or in a saved worksheet, even outside the boundaries of the Excel Pivot Table, and click the View Designer icon (see Figure 1).

Note:

You can only edit views that were created and inserted from the View Designer in Smart View. To edit views created in Oracle Analytics Cloud, you must use Oracle Analytics Cloud.

The **Design Layout** tab of the View Designer is displayed. Figure 2 shows the Design Layout tab of the View Designer with selections made in the Page, Section, Row, Column, and Measures edges.

2. Continue the view design process by following the procedure in Defining the View Type and Display Style.

Defining the View Type and Display Style

When you are creating a view, you define the view type and display style. This is done only once, during the view creation process. Once the view is created, you cannot edit these two settings.

To define the view type and display style:

- 1. If you have not already done so, invoke the View Designer (see Launching the View Designer).
- 2. In View Type, select the type of view that you are creating:
 - Table
 - Pivot Table (the default)
 - Line Graph
 - Bar Graph
 - Column Graph
 - Area Graph
 - Pie Chart
 - Scatter Chart
 - Stacked Column Graph

The selection that you make affects the options available in **Display Style** along with the fields in the layout area.



Note: You cannot change this selection when editing the view either in Oracle Smart View for Office or Oracle Analytics Cloud.

3. In Display Style, select a View Type and Display Style option from Table 1.

Display style determines how the view is inserted into Excel.

Note:

You cannot change this selection when editing the view either in Smart View or Oracle Analytics Cloud.

Defining the View Layout

Define the view layout during the view creation process. You can also edit the view layout of views created in View Designer.

To define or edit the view layout:

- 1. If you have not already done so, invoke the View Designer (see Launching the View Designer).
- 2. If you are creating a new view, complete the steps in Defining the View Type and Display Style.

If you are editing a view, continue with step 3.

3. In the left pane of the View Designer, expand a subject area and the folders to view the columns that you want to work with.



4. Drag columns from the expanded subject area tree and drop them in the layout area.

The edges in the layout area vary depending on the selections that you made in the **View Type**, as described in Table 1.

- 5. **Optional:** Perform any of these tasks, as applicable, on the columns you have dragged to edges in the View Designer:
 - To move a column between edges, drag the column from one edge and drop it on another; for example, drag a column from the **Row** edge and drop it on the **Column** edge.
 - To reposition the column within the edge, click on a column name and select the **Up** or **Down** arrow.
 - To add a subtotal to a column or row in an edge, right-click a column and select **Subtotal**.

Note:

The **Subtotal** option is ignored when applied to the bottom column in an edge, even though the option is selectable in the drop-down menu.

 To add columns to filter criteria for this view, click on a column and select Add to Filter.

The columns that you select are added to the **Filter Expression** area of the **Define Filters** tab, where you can further define them. See Defining the Filter Expression for Views in View Designer for more information.

• To remove a column from an edge, click on the column and select **Remove**.



- 6. **Optional:** If you are working with a table or pivot table view, regardless of the display style:
 - **Pivot Table view:** In the **Row** and **Column** edges, select or clear the **Row Grand Total** and **Column Grand Total** check boxes as you require.
 - **Table view:** In the **Row** edge, select or clear the **Row Grand Total** check box.
- 7. **Optional:** If you are working with a pivot table view that has the pivot table display style, you can perform these actions with the **Measure Label** element:
 - Reorder the Measure Label element within the Column edge.
 - Move the **Measure Label** to any other edge *except* the **Measure** edge.

Notes about the **Measure Label** element:

- The Measure Label element represents the labels for all the Measures columns in the Measures edge. In the View Designer, the Measure Label element appears by default in the **Column** edge.
- Measure Label is only available when both the View Type and Display Type is Pivot Table.
- Experiment with moving the Measure Label element to another edge or reordering it within the Column edge. The result may be a more readable pivot table layout.
- Measure Label cannot be removed from the View Designer.
- Measure Label cannot be placed in the Measures edge.
- 8. To define filters, click the **Filters** tab and continue with Defining the Filter Expression for Views in View Designer.

If you do not plan to define filters, click OK:

- If you are creating a new view, the view is inserted into Excel.
- If you are editing a view, the old view is removed and the updated view is inserted.

Defining the Filter Expression for Views in View Designer

Columns that you added for filtering in Defining the View Layout are automatically added to the Filter Expression area of the Define Filters tab in View Designer.

Whether you are creating a new view or editing an existing view, you can add more filter columns, and further define and refine filters on all columns.

To define or edit the filter expression for a view created in View Designer:

1. Complete the steps in Defining the View Layout, selecting the Define Filters tab.

The columns that you added for filtering should be displayed on the **Define Filters** tab.

- 2. Optional: Add more columns to the Filter Expression area of the Define Filters tab.
- 3. Select a column in Filter Expression.
- 4. Select a corresponding filter operator from the drop-down list next to the column name.

The operator list from which you can choose is populated based on the type of column that you selected.

Guidelines for choosing an operator are described in Filter Operators.



5. Specify a filter value in the last column by clicking and making a selection in the Value Selector.

For example, here is a set of filters based on the Sample Sales database:

The filters that you define are summarized in the **Filter Summary** pane. For example, for the filters defined in this step, the summary looks like this:



In some cases, the data to choose from can be exceedingly long. To accommodate loading large amounts of data in the Value Selector, Oracle Smart View for Office presents values in groups. Scroll and make selections from the first group shown, then click **More** to view and make selections from the next group. Continue clicking **More** until you have viewed and made selections from the entire data list. Figure 1 shows an example.

6. **Optional:** If required, click the logical operator button in **Filter Expression** and make a selection to change the operator:



- AND
- OR

The default logical operator is AND.

Changing the logical operator on one line of the filter expression automatically changes the operator for all lines in the expression so that the operator is the same for all lines.

7. **Optional:** To remove a line from the filter expression, right-click the column button in the line, and then select **Remove**, as shown in Figure 2.

8. When you are finished defining filters, click **OK** to insert the view into Excel.

Filter Operators

Use the guidelines in Table 1 when choosing an operator and specifying the required values. The operator list from which you can choose is populated based on the function that you are performing (for example, creating a filter or creating a dashboard prompt) and the type of column that you selected.

Operator	Usage Guidelines
is equal to / is in	Valid for a column that contains text, numbers, or dates. Specify a single value or multiple values. Results include only records where the data in the column matches the value in the filter.
is not equal to / is not in	Valid for a column that contains text, numbers, or dates. Specify a single value or multiple values. Results include only records where the data in the column does not match the value in the filter.
is less than	Valid for a column that contains numbers or dates. Specify a single value. Results include only records where the data in the column is less than the value in the filter.
is greater than	Valid for a column that contains numbers or dates. Specify a single value. Results include only records where the data in the column is greater than the value in the filter.
is less than or equal to	Valid for a column that contains numbers or dates. Specify a single value or multiple values. Results include only records where the data in the column is less than or the same as the value in the filter.

Publishing Views

The ad hoc view definition that you create in View Designer can be published to the Oracle BI Presentation Catalog in Oracle Analytics Cloud after you have inserted it in Oracle Smart View for Office. When you publish an ad hoc view, a new analysis in Oracle Analytics Cloud is created with the default views of compound view and title view, along with the applicable user-created view.

When publishing a view that you were editing, you have the option of overwriting the view in the Oracle BI Presentation Catalog, or specifying a new name for the view and publishing the edited version, keeping two versions of the view in Oracle Analytics Cloud.

To publish a view to the Oracle BI Presentation Catalog:

- 1. Position the cursor within the view that you just created or edited in View Designer.
- 2. In the Oracle Analytics Cloud ribbon, click the **Publish View** icon (Publishing Views).





- 3. In **Save Report**, click in the **Catalog Root**, and then navigate to the location in the Oracle BI Presentation Catalog where you will save the view.
- 4. In Analysis Name, provide a name.

If you are publishing an edited view, you have the option of overwriting the view you edited by providing the same name, or providing a new name and keeping the original version of the view intact.

5. Click Save.

The default naming convention is applied to the components of the view that is saved; for example, Table 1, Pivot Table 1, Chart 1, and so on.

Example 29-1 Notes

- If you are publishing a view that was created and then edited in Smart View, you
 may overwrite it.
- An error message is displayed if you attempt to overwrite an existing view in the Oracle BI Presentation Catalog if the view was created in Oracle Analytics Cloud.
- To view the changes made in Oracle Analytics Cloud, you must re-insert the view.
- Once published, you may make changes to the view as follows:
 - If the view was created in Oracle Analytics Cloud, then use Oracle Analytics Cloud.
 - If the view was created in Smart View, you may edit it either in Smart View or Oracle Analytics Cloud.



• You may refresh the data in views created in View Designer.

Ad hoc views created in View Designer remain as a snapshot and will not be kept in sync with the analysis published to the catalog.

• Changes made to the view in Oracle Analytics Cloud will not be reflected into the ad hoc view that you rendered in Excel. You must reinsert the view from the catalog tree into a new sheet in Smart View in order to view the changes that were made in Oracle Analytics Cloud.

Use the View Designer in Oracle Smart View for Office to edit the views you created or edited in View Designer.

Do not use the View Designer in Smart View in these cases:

- To edit the views you created in Oracle Analytics Cloud
- To edit views you created in Smart View and then edited in Oracle Analytics Cloud

The process flow for editing views involves the following tasks:

- Reviewing the information in Guidelines for Editing Views Created in View Designer
- Accessing the View to Edit
- Determining Where a View was Created
- Editing Views Created in View Designer

Guidelines for Editing Views Created in View Designer

- Only views created and inserted from the View Designer in Oracle Smart View for Office can be edited using the View Designer.
- Views created in Smart View may also be edited in Oracle Analytics Cloud. However, views created in Smart View and then further edited in Oracle Analytics Cloud cannot afterward be edited in View Designer.

Note:

To edit views created in Oracle Analytics Cloud, use the Oracle Analytics Cloud application (see Editing an Analysis in Oracle Analytics Cloud).



• When you use View Designer to edit a table view or pivot table view, Smart View performs a replace operation, effectively replacing the view on the sheet with the newly-edited view; that is, the table on the sheet is deleted and a new table is inserted. If the new table has more rows or columns than the previous table, any content or formulas that you may have added to the sheet prior to editing the view in View Designer may be removed and you will need to add them again.

Accessing the View to Edit

	Note: This procedure applies to views that were created in View Designer.
-	To access views to edit:
-	1. Access a view in one of following ways:
	. During the design session. For example, ofter you created the view in Vie

- **During the design session**—For example, after you created the view in View Designer and clicked OK to insert the view, select the view in the Office document and click the View Designer icon to relaunch the View Designer for editing.
- From a view in a saved Office document—Select the view in the Office document and click the View Designer icon to relaunch the View Designer for editing.
- From a published view in the Presentation Catalog—Use the Load view in View Designer command to load the view from the catalog tree into the View Designer in Oracle Smart View for Office. When you select a view, the Load view in View Designer command is available in the Action Panel or from the right-click menu.

Remember, to select a view to edit from the catalog tree, *do not* try to insert it first into the Office document. Be sure to use the **Load view in View Designer** command when you want to edit.

2. Continue with the processes described in Determining Where a View was Created to determine if you should edit the view in View Designer.

Note:

Do not use View Designer in Smart View to edit views that were created in Oracle Analytics Cloud. Views may not load in cases where the View Designer does not support the formatting and design features that were used to create the view in Oracle Analytics Cloud. For this reason, use the View Designer to edit only those views that were created and inserted using the View Designer in Smart View.

Determining Where a View was Created

You need to know if a view was created in the View Designer in Oracle Smart View for Office if you want to edit it in Smart View.



If you are unsure whether a view on a sheet was created in Smart View or Oracle Analytics Cloud, you can verify the origin of the view in the Document Contents pane.

To determine the origin of a view:

- **1**. Open the Office document containing the view.
- 2. Locate the view in the Document Contents pane, then right-click the view name, and then select **Properties**.
- 3. Check that the value in the View Source field is AdHocDesigner.

The possible values are:

- AdHocDesigner—View originates from the View Designer in Smart View
- Catalog—View originates from the Oracle BI Presentation Catalog in Oracle
 Analytics Cloud
- CopyFromAnswers—View was copied from Oracle Analytics Cloud and pasted into the Smart View Office document

The views marked **AdHocDesigner** are the only views that should be edited in View Designer.

Note that, in some cases, views created in Oracle Analytics Cloud may be loaded in to the View Designer in Smart View. Keep in mind that when you attempt to work in View Designer with views from Oracle Analytics Cloud, you are doing so at your own risk; editing these views in View Designer is not supported. Oracle only supports using the View Designer to edit those views that were created and edited using the View Designer in Smart View.

4. If the **View Source** property is **AdHocDesigner**, the view can be edited in View Designer.

If the **View Source** is **Catalog** or **CopyFromAnswers**, edit the view in Oracle Analytics Cloud.

Installing Smart View

To create a private connection using the quick connection method:

- 1. In Excel, select the Smart View ribbon, and then click Panel.
- 2. On the Smart View Panel, click the arrow on the **Switch to** button **(1997)**, and then select **Private Connections** from the list.
- Still in the Smart View Panel, in the text box, enter the URL for the data source to which you want to connect.

About Audit Trail


Data source type: Oracle Essbase Cloud

An audit trail tracks user activity on an Essbase cube.

In Oracle Smart View for Office, data entry or input can be tracked when connected to Essbase. For example, when Audit Trail is activated, then updating and submitting data in all writable cells in an ad hoc grid would be tracked and displayed as a list items of in the audit trail.

Smart View logs audit trail activity in a pane within the Smart View Panel. After connecting to a cube, you access the Audit Trail pane by selecting **Audit Trail** from the Action Panel.

For each user activity tracked, the following information is stored:

- User ID
- Date/Time
- Type of Operation
- Comments/Linked Reporting Objects (LRO)
- New Value
- Old Value
- POV Members



Only Date/Time, New Value, LRO, and POV are displayed in the Audit Trail pane. Selecting an log entry within Audit Trail provides additional information at the bottom of the pane. And you can export the details of the entry to view all available information for that entry.

You can also refresh the list of log entries in the Audit Trail pane, and launch a selected entry on a separate sheet to view the POV for that entry.

Launching Audit Trail

You launch the Audit Trail pane from the Action Panel in the Smart View Panel.

To launch the Audit Trail pane:

1. Sign on to your Oracle Essbase data source using a private connection, and connect to the cube.



Export Audit Trail Content to a Sheet

To export audit trail content to a worksheet:

- 2. At the bottom of the Audit Trail pane, click Export to Sheet,

All entries, along with the additional detail that is not displayed in the **Audit Trail**, are exported to a new worksheet. Details include:

The entries on the sheet can be sorted and filtered. Some columns may need to be widened in order to view the headings and entries.

To start an ad hoc grid from an entry in the audit trail list:

- 2. Select an entry in the Audit Trail pane and, at the bottom of the pane, click Ad Hoc on

Displaying the Diagnostics Group in the Smart View Ribbon

You can choose to display or hide the Diagnostics options in the Smart View ribbon.


When you first install Oracle Smart View for Office and open it, the **Diagnostics** options are not displayed.

To display the **Diagnostics** group of options:

- **1.** Open the Office application where you are experiencing the issue.
- 2. From the Smart View ribbon, select **Options**, and then select the **Advanced** tab.
- 3. In Advanced, select Show Diagnostics Group on Smart View Ribbon, and then click OK to close the Options dialog box.

The **Diagnostics** group is automatically displayed in the Smart View ribbon (see Figure 1). You do not need to the restart the Office application.

4. Repeat this procedure in each Office application where you are experiencing the issue.



5. Optional: When finished using the Diagnostics tools, to hide the Diagnostics group in the Smart View ribbon, clear the Show Diagnostics Ribbon Tab check box in the Advanced tab of the Options dialog box.

Customizing Diagnostics Features

You can customize certain features of the Diagnostics tools.

The procedure in this topic walks you through each of the options available in the **Diagnostic Options** dialog box.



Note: All steps in the following procedure are optional.

To customize the **Diagnostics** tools:


 In the Diagnostics group in the Smart View ribbon, select Diagnostics Options. The Diagnostics Options is displayed, as shown in Figure 1.

2. To hide data values in the Office document, select Mask Data (selected by default).

Ensure that this option is selected if data values in your output should be hidden for confidentiality purposes.



To direct the diagnostics output files to a folder other than the default, in Route diagnostics output to, click and navigate to the folder location to store the files.

You can also enter the folder location manually.

The default folder location is:

C:\Users\<user.domain>\AppData\Roaming\Oracle\SmartView\Diagnostics

- 5. To allow automatic screenshots for each warning or error message that is displayed, select an option:
 - Errors
 - Warnings

If you do not want automatic screenshots, select Never (the default).

- 6. Select the following options as you require:
 - Memory data
 - Detailed network data
 - API calls diagnostics
 - Reporting diagnostics—Selected by default
 - Detailed grid related diagnostics—Selected by default
 - Metadata diagnostics—Selected by default

As noted above, certain items are selected by default. In many cases, these are all that is needed for diagnosing your issue.

You may select the remaining items if you feel those are the problem area or if you are advised by Oracle Support to do so. You may also deselect items that you feel are not relevant to your issue.

Note:

When diagnostics is enabled and the **Memory data** option is selected, Oracle Smart View for Office performance will be slower, in some cases up to two times slower than normal.

You should select this option only if you are running into memory issues. For example, on 32-bit machines, if Smart View terminates abnormally or takes an excessive amount of time to load large spreadsheets, then you should select **Memory data** when collecting diagnostics.

7. Click **Save** to save your option selections.

Using the Smart View Diagnostics Tools

Use the Oracle Smart View for Office Diagnostic tools to collect data about your issue in the form of log files and screenshots.

The data you collect is stored in a session folder (either in the default diagnostics folder location or a location you designate in Customizing Diagnostics Features). When you are finished collecting diagnostic data, you use the diagnostic tools to zip up the files. Then you transmit the ZIP file to Oracle Support for analysis.

The procedure in this topic explains how to collect the diagnostic data, zip it up, and send it to Oracle Support.



To use the Smart View Diagnostics tools:

1. Click Start Diagnostics

When you click Start Diagnostics, a message is displayed regarding restarting Microsoft Office. You are not required to restart Office; however, Oracle recommends that you do so. Restarting Office enables the diagnostics tools to collect more information, including the steps that led to the issue you may be experiencing.

Note:		
After you	Diagnostics , the	button toggles to

- 2. If you restarted Office, perform the steps in Smart View that led to the issue you are diagnosing.
- 3. Click Take Screenshot to take screenshots that you feel will be helpful in documenting your issue.

Note:

The screenshot includes the entire screen, not just the application. Be sure to minimize any confidential information that you may have on your screen so that it is not included in the screenshot.

4. Click Click folder for the current session.

You can perform multiple saves of the document, if necessary. Oracle recommends that you save the document at different points during the work you are doing in order to best demonstrate and show your issue. Each time you save, Smart View adds a suffix to the file name, (0), (1), (2), etc.; no documents are overwritten.

The documents are stored in the current diagnostics session folder; the default location is:

C:\Users\username.domain\AppData\Roaming\Oracle\SmartView\Diagnostics

5. When you are finished gathering the diagnostics you require to adequately document

your issue for Oracle Support, click Create Archive and in the **Create Archive** dialog box, specify a folder to store the archive and a file name, or use the default folder location and file name.

The files are stored in your system's My Documents folder as follows:

My Documents \Documents



The file is named in the following format:

SmartView_Diagnostics_ddmmyyyy.zip

6. Attach the zip file in your Service Request (SR) for the issue on Oracle Support.

Cleaning Up the Diagnostics Folder

Once you have transmitted your diagnostics zip file to Oracle Support, you can clear the files in the diagnostics folder.

Note:

Clearing the diagnostics folder while Diagnostics is running clears all folders except for the current session folders for currently-opened Microsoft Office applications. Clearing the diagnostics folder when Diagnostics is not running clears all diagnostics folders, including all the latest session folders.

Clearing All Diagnostics Folders Except the Current Session Folders

To clear all diagnostics folders except the current session folders:

1. Verify that Diagnostics is running.

2. Click Clear Diagnostics Folder

This action clears all diagnostics folders except those created for the currentlyrunning Office applications.

Clearing All Diagnostic Folders, Including the Latest Session Folders

To clear all diagnostics folders, including the latest session folders:

- If you have not already done so, in the **Diagnostics** group in the Smart View ribbon, click Stop Diagnostics.
- 2. Close any opened Office applications, including the one in which you are experiencing an issue.
- 3. Open any Office application and click Clear Diagnostics Folder.

This action clears all diagnostics folders including the latest session folders for Office applications.

Performing a Health Check On Your System

You can perform a "health check" on your system to optimize performance.

With the Health Check, you can also get information about your machine, such as certain registry settings, Microsoft Office version, Oracle Smart View for Office version, and the extensions you have installed.



Note:

The Health Check feature is only available when using Smart View with Excel.

To perform a health check:

1. From the Smart View ribbon in Excel, click the arrow next to **Help**, and then select **Health Check**.

The Health Check dialog is displayed.

- 2. View the following system information; you cannot edit this information:
 - Version Information—Operating System, Excel Version, Smart View Version, Internet Explorer Version, WebView2 Runtime Version, .NET Framework Versions

Note:

- If Microsoft Edge WebView2 Runtime is installed, then a version number is displayed in WebView2 Runtime Version. See the WebView2 Runtime option in the Smart View Options group in the next step to enable or disable WebView2.
- If WebView2 Runtime is not installed, then WebView2 Runtime Version displays None and the WebView2 Runtime option is not displayed in the Smart View Options group.
- Hardware Information—RAM Memory, Processor, Smart View Installed Drive Space
- Excel Add-ins—Depends on the Excel add-ins that are installed
- COM Add-ins—Depends on the COM add-ins that are installed
- 3. Update the following information as you require; if you change any settings, click **Update Settings** to apply the changes.

Optionally, click **Recommended Settings** to set all options to those most optimal to Smart View.

These are the editable settings:

Registry Information

HTTP session timeouts can occur when working with large queries that take a long time to run, or when you are experiencing slower internet connections. To reduce timeout occurrences, you can set timeout values. (If you change any of the timeout values, you must restart all Microsoft Office applications in order for the new value to be applied.)

- KeepAlive Timeout—The default value is 900 seconds. To change the value, click in the Fix/Update/Info column, enter a new value, and then click Update Settings.
- Receive Timeout—The default value is 900 seconds. To change the value, click in the Fix/Update/Info column, enter a new value, and then click Update Settings.



- ServerInfo Timeout—The default value is 900 seconds. To change the value, click in the Fix/Update/Info column, enter a new value, and then click Update Settings.
- Current Resolution—Read only. The current resolution of the system display.
- USER Process Handle Quota—Read only. The number of process handles. Process handles regulate Oracle Smart View for Office's access to system resources.
- Enable Per Process System DPI—Windows 10 Display Settings only.
 For drag-and-drop to work correctly if you use Office applications at a scaling level different than 100%, select Enable. The default value is Disabled.

If you're using a high DPI display as your primary monitor and a regular DPI display as your extended monitor, drag and drop may not work on the extended regular DPI display monitor. This is due to mouse drivers giving incorrect coordinates for mouse actions, resulting in faulty drag-and-drop behavior.

 Browser Emulation Mode—Adds the required registry key to all Office applications (Excel, Word, PowerPoint, Outlook) so that certain browserbased screens in Smart View and Smart View extensions render properly.

Select the option that corresponds to your browser version:

- * 12001—Microsoft Edge compatibility
- * **11001**—Internet Explorer 11 compatibility
- * **10001**—Internet Explorer 10 compatibility
- * Disable

This option is enabled by default and shows the value, **Default**.

Smart View Options

- Undo Buffer—The number of Undo and Redo actions permitted on an operation. The default value is 9. To change the value, click in the Fix/Update/Info column, enter a new value, and then click Update Settings. You can enter a value between 1 and 100. (See Using Undo and Redo).
- Improve Metadata Storage—This option pertains to interoperability between different versions of Smart View. It allows for more efficient storage of internal data structures.

The default value is **Checked**. If all users in your organization are on Smart View 9.3.1.6 or higher, then this option should always be checked.

When this option is **Unchecked**, two copies of metadata are maintained for compatibility purposes, which may result in slower overall performance. Uncheck this option in the following situations:

- You send an Excel workbook to users on Smart View releases earlier than 9.3.1.6, or to users on Microsoft Office 2002 and earlier, regardless of the Smart View release.
- * You open a workbook sent from users on Smart View releases earlier than 9.3.1.6, or from users on Microsoft Office 2002 and earlier, regardless of the Smart View release.

Note:

If you change this option to **Unchecked**, the value in the **Fix/Update/ Help Link** column changes to **Fix**. If you are having issues with your system and want to optimize performance, you should "fix" this setting by changing the value back to **Checked**.

- Compatibility—Manage the compatibility of forms and regular ad hoc grids between Smart View for Office and Smart View for Office (Mac and Browser). The default value is Disabled.
 - * To enable compatibility, click in the **Fix/Update/Help Link** column, select **Enable**, and then click **Update Settings**.
 - * To disable compatibility, click in the **Fix/Update/Help Link** column, select **Disable**, and then click **Update Settings**.

For more information, see Working Compatibly on Forms and Ad Hoc Grids Between Smart View and Smart View (Mac and Browser).

- WebView2 Runtime—Select an option to enable Smart View to use the installed version of Microsoft Edge WebView2 Runtime:
 - * Enable for UI—When enabled, WebView2 is used by Smart View to assist with some authentication scenarios at login. During runtime, Smart View detects the presence of WebView2 Runtime installed on the machine and launches the WebView2-based dialog to host the login page. Webview2 also works in conjunction with the Microsoft Edge browser to display the wizard when importing reports from Oracle Hyperion Financial Reporting (cloud and on-premises).
 - * Enable for All—Works with the authentication scenarios described in Enable for UI, and also enables WebView2 for networking. This option is recommended for use in diagnosing connection issues.
 - * **Disable**—Default. Select to disable WebView2.

Whether enabled or disabled, the installed WebView2 Runtime version is displayed in **WebView2 Runtime Version** in the **Version Information** group; if WebView2 Runtime is not installed, then **WebView2 Runtime Version** displays **None** (see the previous step).

The default is **Disabled**.

For WebView2 requirements, see Microsoft Edge WebView2 Support in the Oracle Smart View for Office Readme.

Graphic Setting

The following two options improve the user experience by helping to reduce flickering in Microsoft Office:

 Disable Windows Transitions on Addin Task Panes—The default value is Enabled To disable this option, click in the Fix/Update/Help Link column, select Disable, and then click Update Settings.

Note: If you change this option to **Disabled**, the value in the **Fix/Update/Help Link** column changes to **Fix**. If you are having issues with your system and want to optimize performance, you should "fix" this setting by changing the value back to **Enabled**. Disable Animations—This setting disables Office animations. The default value is "Enabled." To disable this option, click in the Fix/Update/Help Link column, select Disable, and then click Update Settings.

Note: If you change this option to **Disabled**, the value in the value in the **Fix/Update/Help Link** column changes to **Fix**. If you are having issues with your system and want to optimize performance, you should "fix" this setting by changing the value back to **Enabled**.

- 4. Click **Update Settings** to save the changes you've made.
- 5. Optional: If you change any of the information in the Health Check dialog box, and want to get back to the default values, click Recommended Settings.

When you select **Recommended Settings**, a dialog is displayed showing you the settings that will be changed. Click **Yes** in the dialog. Then, click **Update Settings** to save the changes.

Note:

Once you click **Recommended Settings**, the button is disabled. If you then make further changes to the settings in the **Health Check** dialog, the button remains disabled. To use the **Recommended Settings** button again, you must close and then reopen the **Health Check** dialog.

- 6. **Optional:** Click **Export to Excel** to export the Health Check information to a new Excel spreadsheet.
- 7. Click Close to close the Health Check dialog box.
- 8. Restart Excel and log in.

You access the Health Check dialog in the General group in the Smart View ribbon.

Health Check Items for Microsoft Office

When you launch the **Health Check** dialog, a copy of the selected Excel workbook, Word document, or PowerPoint presentation opens, and the dialog lists the following items:

- Workbook Health Check for Microsoft Excel
 - Named Ranges
 - Shapes
 - Styles
 - Links
 - Hyperlinks
 - Sheets
- Document Health Check for Microsoft Word
 - Tables
 - Inline Shapes
 - Shapes
 - Styles
 - Query Objects

Note:

To improve performance, click **Fix** to remove duplicate queries for data points pasted into Word.

- Hidden Query Objects
- Comment Objects
- Variables
- Bookmarks
- Content Controls
- Presentation Health Check for Microsoft PowerPoint
 - Shapes
 - Tags
 - Slides

You can preview each item and delete or fix the items accordingly. Any changes are made in the copy of the Microsoft Excel, Word, or PowerPoint document. Performing a **Save** will save your changes in the copy. To save the file with the original file name, you must close the original file, and then perform a **Save As**.

Narrative Reporting: If you want to perform a health check *and* refresh a doclet of any Office type (described in Performing a Health Check on Microsoft Office Documents), perform the health check first, and then save the temporary file with the correct doclet name. Next, upload



and check in the saved doclet (see Checking In Doclets. Then check out the doclet, perform the refresh, and then upload the doclet and check it in.

 - Excel: Click the arrow next to **More**, and then select **Workbook Health Check**.
 - Word: Click **Document Health Check** in the **General** group.
 - PowerPoint: Click Presentation Health Check in the General group.

The **Health Check** dialog is displayed, and a copy of the active Excel workbook, Word document, or PowerPoint presentation opens.

Note:

In the **Health Check** dialog, the first item is selected by default and displays information about limitations provided by Microsoft Office or Smart View.

- 2. In the Health Check dialog, select an item, and perform a task:
 - **Preview**—Lists the names or IDs of the selected item.
 - **Fix**—Based on the selected item, fixes the issue.
 - **Fix All**—Deletes applicable non-Smart View-related items and fixes Smart View objects.
 - **Delete**—Deletes the applicable non-Smart View-related objects of the selected item.
- 3. Click **Close** to exit the dialog
- 4. To save the file copy you have been working in, click **Save**.

A **Save** will save your changes in the file copy. To save with the original file name, you must close the original file, and then perform a **Save As**.

These are Excel workbooks that contain one or more worksheets with a Crystal Ball EPM model and one or more other worksheets, each of which may be connected to any of the supported data sources. They are stored in a centralized Oracle Hyperion Enterprise Performance Management Workspace repository and can be accessed and managed through the Smart View Panel.

To work with data in a Crystal Ball EPM workbook:

- 1. From the Smart View ribbon, select Panel.
- 2. In the Smart View Panel, click and select Simulation Workbook.



- 3. Click and if requested, log in to the Crystal Ball EPM repository. A tree list containing the workbooks for which you have permission is displayed.
- 4. Double-click a workbook to open.
- 5. Perform Crystal Ball EPM operations as described in the Crystal Ball EPM product documentation.

Oracle recommends keeping the Crystal Ball EPM model on a worksheet separate from data source worksheets.

6. Click Submit Data if needed.

The repository options apply across all sessions running on the server.

- Folder: the name of the repository folder to contain the workbook file

Smart View and Spreadsheet Add-in

Avoid mouse control conflicts when both Oracle Smart View for Office and Oracle Essbase Spreadsheet Add-in are installed on the same computer.

When both Smart View and Spreadsheet Add-in are installed on the same computer, mouse actions are interpreted as Spreadsheet Add-in commands. If you want Smart View to control mouse commands instead, you can instruct Spreadsheet Add-in to respond to commands only in Oracle Essbase connections that were established through Spreadsheet Add-in.

To enable Smart View to control mouse commands:

- **1.** Open Excel.
- 2. Select Essbase, then **Options**, and then **Global**.
- 3. Select Limit to Connected Sheets.
- 4. Click OK.

Smart View will control mouse commands unless the connection to Essbase is established through Spreadsheet Add-in and not Smart View.

Note:

You can connect to data sources from Smart View and Spreadsheet Add-in in the same workbook but not on the same worksheet.

About Migrating Functions

Functions in Oracle Hyperion Financial Management and Oracle Hyperion Enterprise[®] can be converted to current Oracle Smart View for Office syntax with the migration utility.

Note:

The Smart View function migration utility is not supported on 64-bit Office. Microsoft is expected to address this issue. Until then, use the 32-bit version of Office.

Converting Workbooks

You can convert workbooks that contain Oracle Hyperion Financial Management or Oracle Hyperion Enterprise[®] functions by using the migration utility.

Data source types: Financial Management, Hyperion Enterprise

You can convert workbooks that contain Financial Management Retrieve Data functions or Hyperion Enterprise HP Retrieve and VBA Retrieve functions. For example, you can convert Financial Management functions such as HFMVal, HFMLnk, HFMLab, HFMDes, and HFMCur and Hyperion Enterprise functions such as HPVal, HPLnk, HPCur, HPHea, HPCde, and HPFul.



The utility might not be able to convert all of your functions. Some functions might require manual adjustment.

For functions that use cell references, the following functions are converted:

- If every parameter in the function is a cell reference. For example: =HFMVal(\$B\$1&\$C\$1&\$B\$2&\$C\$3&\$B\$5&\$C\$5&\$B\$6&\$C\$6).
- If the dimension parameters are specified in the function, the members are cell references, but the period separator is hard coded in the function. For example: =HFMVal("S#"&D2&".Y#"&D3&".VW#"&D5&".')

The following functions that use cell references are **not** converted:

- If the dimension parameters are specified in the function and the members and period separator are cell references. For example: =HFMVal("S#"&E2&"Y#"&E3&"VW#"&E5), where E2=Actual, E3=2004, E5="<Scenario View>."
- If the dimension parameters are specified in the function, the members are cell references, but the period separator is in a separate cell, the function is not converted. For example: =HFMVal("S#"&F2&C1&"Y#"&F3&C1&"VW#&F5&C1), where C1=. (period separator).
- If the application specified in the function is a cell reference.
- If any cell in a workbook contains more than 1024 characters, the workbook does not convert properly. To reduce the size of data in cell, reference multiple functions, or remove dimensions that can be set in the background POV.

Before you run the migration utility, ensure that the path is correct (the default path is MIDDLEWARE_HOME\EPMSystem11R1\common\empstatic\wsspace\). During migration, Excel inserts the original path of the add-in file to functions. This can make the functions too long and cause errors. Excel limits Oracle Smart View for Office functions to a maximum of 256 characters.

Converting One Workbook

Use the procedure in this topic to convert a workbook that contains Oracle Hyperion Financial Management or Oracle Hyperion Enterprise[®] functions.

Data source types: Financial Management, Hyperion Enterprise

To convert a workbook:

1. From the Smart View ribbon, select More, then Migrate Active Workbook (Financial Management) or Migrate Active Workbook (Hyperion Enterprise).

If your functions contain application references, you must map the application to the corresponding connection.

2. Click **Convert**, then **OK**.

Migration results are displayed, including a list of any functions that failed to convert. You can manually adjust those functions.

- 3. To save the conversion results, click **Save Result**, select a location to store the results file, and then click **Save**.
- 4. Click Close.



Converting Multiple Workbooks

Use the procedure in this topic to convert workbooks that contain Oracle Hyperion Financial Management or Oracle Hyperion Enterprise[®] functions.

Data source types: Financial Management, Hyperion Enterprise

To convert multiple workbooks:

- 1. From the Smart View ribbon, select More, then Migrate Batch (Financial Management) or Migrate Batch (Hyperion Enterprise).
- 2. In the Migration Wizard, click **Add** and select the workbooks that you want to convert.
- **3.** Click **Next**. If your functions contain application references, you must map the application to the connection.

Migration results are displayed, including a list of any functions that failed to convert. You can manually adjust those functions.

4. In Financial Management, click **Save Result**, then select a location for the results file, and then click **Save**.

In Hyperion Enterprise, converted workbooks are automatically saved in the location of the original workbooks.

5. Click Done.

Migrating Connections for Functions

In Oracle Hyperion Financial Management, you can select a connection or connection reference for functions that do not contain an application reference when you migrate to Oracle Smart View for Office.

Data source types: Financial Management

To migrate connections for functions:

- 1. From the Smart View ribbon, select More, then Migrate Active Connections (HFM).
- 2. From Function Migration Application reference, select an option:
 - Do not update functions with a connection reference.
 - Add connection name to existing functions, then select a connection name from the Connection Name list. This updates all functions with the specified connection name.
 - Update functions with reference to connection list within selected worksheet, then in Cell Reference, enter the cell to reference, for example, A2. This updates all functions with a cell reference in the current worksheet.
 - Update functions with reference to connection list on a new worksheet, then enter the Worksheet name, and Cell Reference. This updates all functions with a cell reference to a different worksheet in the workbook.



Tip:

You can create a drop-down list in any cell to be used as a reference within functions to refer to a connection name. From the Smart View ribbon, select **More**, then **Insert Connection List** to display a list of connections from which to choose in the current cell.

3. Click OK.
