## Jira Adapter Capabilities

The Jira Adapter enables you to create an integration with a Jira application. You can configure the Jira Adapter as a trigger or invoke connection in an integration in Oracle Integration.

The Jira Adapter provides the following benefits:

- Provides trigger (source) connection support for performing the following types of events against the selected project and issue type:
  - Comment Created
  - Comment Updated
  - Issue Created
  - Issue Updated
- Provides invoke (target) connection support for performing actions such as Create or Update, Query, and Delete on the following objects:
  - Issue attachments
  - Issue comments
  - Issues
  - Projects
  - Users
- Supports Jira webhooks.

- Supports declaratively defining and executing a Jira Query Language (JQL) query.
- Supports Jira APIs protected using Basic Authentication or Authorization Code Credentials.

The Jira Adapter is one of many predefined adapters included with Oracle Integration. You can configure the Jira Adapter as a trigger or invoke connection in an integration in Oracle Integration.

## Jira Adapter Restrictions

Note the following Jira Adapter restrictions.

- The Jira Adapter only supports Jira Cloud. Jira Server is not supported.
- The Jira Webhooks JQL configuration (for trigger connections) has the following restrictions:
  - Only one webhook listener URL is allowed, per connected application per tenant. Therefore, if you want to configure multiple Jira inbound integrations, you must create multiple connections.
  - The webhook expiration period is 30 days from the time the webhook was created. See Webhook expiration. If the Jira Adapter webhook integration does not process any notifications for more than 30 days, reactivate the integration.
  - Before you migrate (import/export) a Jira trigger integration (IAR) file from one
    Oracle Integration instance to another instance, you must deactivate the Jira
    trigger integration in the Oracle Integration instance. Select the **Delete Event Subscription** checkbox in the dialog that appears when you click the
    deactivate icon to deactivate the integration.
  - There are other restrictions. See Supported JQL Queries.

# Workflow to Create and Add a Jira Adapter Connection to an Integration

You follow a very simple workflow to create a connection with an adapter and include the connection in an integration in Oracle Integration.

## Create a Jira Adapter Connection

A connection is based on an adapter. You define connections to the specific cloud applications that you want to integrate. The following topics describe how to define connections.

## Prerequisites for Creating a Connection

You must satisfy the following prerequisites to create a connection with the Jira Adapter:

- Purchase a Jira Subscription
- Prerequisites to Use the Basic Authentication Security Policy
- Prerequisites to Use the Authorization Code Credentials Security Policy

## Purchase a Jira Subscription

When you subscribe to Jira, you receive a Jira instance URL, username, and password. This information is required for creating a Jira Adapter connection in Oracle Integration.

### Prerequisites to Use the Basic Authentication Security Policy

If you want to use the Basic Authentication security policy with your Jira Adapter connection, you must perform the following prerequisites.

#### Create an API Token

1. Log in to your Atlassian account using the URL:

https://id.atlassian.com

- Click Account Settings.
- Click Security.
- 4. Under API token, click Create and manage API tokens.
- 5. Click Create API token.
- 6. Enter a label and click **Create**. The API token is generated.

Copy the value. You'll need to enter this value in the Password field when you
configure security for your Jira Adapter connection in Oracle Integration. See
Configure Connection Security.

# Prerequisites to Use the Authorization Code Credentials Security Policy

If you want to use the Authorization Code Credentials security policy with your Jira Adapter connection, you must perform the following prerequisites.

- Create an App and Obtain the Client ID and Client Secret
- Configure the OAuth 2.0 Authorization Code and Assign the Scopes
- Minimum Scopes for Creating a Connection

#### Create an App and Obtain the Client ID and Client Secret

1. Log in to your Atlassian account using the following URL:

```
https://id.atlassian.com
```

- 2. Click your profile icon and select Developer console.
- 3. On the My apps page, click **Create**, and select **OAuth 2.0 integration**.
- Enter a name for your app, select the I agree checkbox, and click Create. A new app is displayed in the My apps list.
- Select your app.
- 6. In the left menu, click **Settings**. The client ID and client secret are displayed in the **Authentication details** section.
- Copy the values for your client ID and client secret. You'll need to enter these
  values on the Connections page when you configure security for your Jira Adapter
  connection. See Configure Connection Security.

#### Configure the OAuth 2.0 Authorization Code and Assign the Scopes

- 1. Open the app that you created in Jira.
- 2. In the left menu, click Authorization.
- 3. In the Callback URL field, enter the callback URL.
- 4. In the left menu, click **Permissions**.
- 5. Click **Add** next to the API you want to assign to your app.

#### **Minimum Scopes for Creating a Connection**

These are the minimum scopes required to configure a Jira Adapter connection in an integration. Ensure that the scopes you want to provide are configured in the Jira application.

### Create a Connection

Before you can build an integration, you have to create the connections to the applications with which you want to share data.

To create a connection in Oracle Integration:

- In the left navigation pane, click Home > Integrations > Connections.
- Click Create.



You can also create a connection in the integration canvas of:

- An orchestrated integration (See Define Inbound Triggers and Outbound Invokes.)
- A basic routing integration (See Add a Trigger (Source) Connection.)
- In the Create Connection Select Adapter dialog, select the adapter to use for this
  connection. To find the adapter, scroll through the list, or enter a partial or full name in the
  Search field and click

Q

#### Search.

- 4. In the Create Connection dialog, enter the information that describes this connection.
  - a. Enter a meaningful name to help others find your connection when they begin to create their own integrations. The name you enter is automatically added in capital letters to the **Identifier** field. If you modify the identifier name, don't include blank spaces (for example, SALES OPPORTUNITY).
  - **b.** Enter optional keywords (tags). You can search on the connection keywords on the Connections page.
  - c. Select the role (direction) in which to use this connection (trigger, invoke, or both). Only the roles supported by the adapter are displayed for selection. When you select a role, only the connection properties and security policies appropriate to that role are displayed on the Connections page. If you select an adapter that supports both invoke and trigger, but select only one of those roles, you'll get an error when you try to drag the adapter into the section you didn't select. For example, let's say you configure a connection for the Oracle Service Cloud (RightNow) Adapter as only an invoke. Dragging the adapter to a trigger section in the integration produces an error.
  - **d.** Enter an optional description of the connection.
- Click Create.

Your connection is created. You're now ready to configure the connection details, such as connection properties, security policies, connection login credentials, and (for certain connections) agent group.



## **Configure Connection Properties**

Enter connection information so your application can process requests.

- 1. Go to the Connection Properties section.
- 2. In the **Hostname** field, enter the Jira instance hostname.

## **Configure Connection Security**

Configure security for your Jira Adapter connection.

- 1. Go to the **Security** section.
- 2. From the **Security Policy** list, select the security policy to use:
  - Basic Authentication
  - Authorization Code Credentials
- 3. If you selected Basic Authentication:
  - **a.** In the **Username** field, enter the username.
  - b. In the Password field, enter the API token. An API token is used (instead of your account password) as a password whenever you programmatically authenticate with basic authentication. See Create an API Token.



The Basic Authentication security policy can be used for invoke connections only.

- 4. If you selected Authorization Code Credentials:
  - a. In the **Client Id** field, enter the client ID that you obtained when creating an app. See Create an App and Obtain the Client ID and Client Secret.
  - b. In the Client Secret field, enter the client secret key that you obtained when creating an app. See Create an App and Obtain the Client ID and Client Secret.
  - c. In the Scope field, enter read:jira-work manage:jira-webhook for your Jira Adapter trigger connection, and enter read:jira-work read:jira-user write:jira-work for your Jira Adapter invoke connection. These are the minimum older scopes required to configure a connection. However, you can enter new Jira scopes. See Minimum Scopes for Creating a Connection.

You can also enter other space-separated scopes that you need to configure. Ensure that the scopes you want to provide are configured in the Jira application. See Configure the OAuth 2.0 Authorization Code and Assign the Scopes.



#### Note:

- The Authorization Code Credentials security policy can be used for trigger and invoke connections.
- The **Scope** field is not marked with an asterisk (\*). This incorrectly implies that this field is not mandatory. This field is mandatory.
- d. Click **Provide Consent**. You are redirected to the Jira login page.
- **e.** Log in to the Jira account with your credentials. Once you successfully log in, the following message appears:

Access Allowed! Please switch back to connection page to proceed with testing and saving connection configuration.

#### Test the Connection

Test your connection to ensure that it's configured successfully.

- 1. In the page title bar, click Test.
- 2. Wait for a message about the results of the connection test.
  - If the test was successful, then the connection is configured properly.
  - If the test failed, then edit the configuration details you entered. Check for typos, verify URLs and credentials, and download the diagnostic logs for additional details. Continue to test until the connection is successful.
- When complete, click Save.

## Upload an SSL Certificate

Certificates are used to validate outbound SSL connections. If you make an SSL connection in which the root certificate does not exist in Oracle Integration, an exception is thrown. In that case, you must upload the appropriate certificate. A certificate enables Oracle Integration to connect with external services. If the external endpoint requires a specific certificate, request the certificate and then upload it into Oracle Integration.

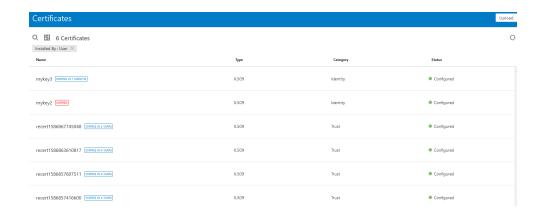
To upload an SSL certificate:

In the left navigation pane, click Home > Settings > Certificates.
 All certificates currently uploaded to the trust store are displayed in the Certificates dialog. The



link enables you to filter by name, certificate expiration date, status, type, category, and installation method (user-installed or system-installed). Certificates installed by the system cannot be deleted.





- Click **Upload** at the top of the page.The Upload Certificate dialog box is displayed.
- 3. Enter an alias name and optional description.
- 4. In the **Type** field, select the certificate type. Each certificate type enables Oracle Integration to connect with external services.
  - X.509 (SSL transport)
  - SAML (Authentication & Authorization)
  - PGP (Encryption & Decryption)

#### X.509 (SSL transport)

- 1. Select a certificate category.
  - **a.** Trust: Use this option to upload a trust certificate.
    - Click Browse, then select the trust file (for example, .cer or .crt) to upload.
  - Identity: Use this option to upload a certificate for two-way SSL communication.
    - i. Click **Browse**, then select the keystore file (.jks) to upload.
    - ii. Enter the comma-separated list of passwords corresponding to key aliases.



When an identity certificate file (JKS) contains more than one private key, all the private keys must have the same password. If the private keys are protected with different passwords, the private keys cannot be extracted from the keystore.

- iii. Enter the password of the keystore being imported.
- c. Click Upload.

#### **SAML (Authentication & Authorization)**

 Note that Message Protection is automatically selected as the only available certificate category and cannot be deselected. Use this option to upload a keystore



certificate with SAML token support. Create, read, update, and delete (CRUD) operations are supported with this type of certificate.

- 2. Click Browse, then select the certificate file (.cer or .crt) to upload.
- 3. Click Upload.

#### **PGP (Encryption & Decryption)**

- Select a certificate category. Pretty Good Privacy (PGP) provides cryptographic privacy and authentication for communication. PGP is used for signing, encrypting, and decrypting files. You can select the private key to use for encryption or decryption when configuring the stage file action.
  - **a. Private**: Uses a private key of the target location to decrypt the file.
    - i. Click **Browse**, then select the PGP file to upload.
    - ii. Enter the PGP private key password.
  - **b. Public**: Uses a public key of the target location to encrypt the file.
    - i. Click Browse, then select the PGP file to upload.
    - ii. In the ASCII-Armor Encryption Format field, select Yes or No. Yes shows the format of the encrypted message in ASCII armor. ASCII armor is a binary-to-textual encoding converter. ASCII armor formats encrypted messaging in ASCII. This enables messages to be sent in a standard messaging format. This selection impacts the visibility of message content. No causes the message to be sent in binary format.
    - iii. From the **Cipher Algorithm** list, select the algorithm to use. Symmetric-key algorithms for cryptography use the same cryptographic keys for both encryption of plain text and decryption of cipher text.
  - c. Click Upload.

## Refresh Integration Metadata

You can manually refresh the currently-cached metadata available to adapters that have implemented metadata caching. Metadata changes typically relate to customizations of integrations, such as adding custom objects and attributes to integrations. There may also be cases in which integrations have been patched, which results in additional custom objects and attributes being added. This option is similar to clearing the cache in your browser. Without a manual refresh, a staleness check is only performed when you drag a connection into an integration. This is typically sufficient, but in some cases you may know that a refresh is required. For these cases, the **Refresh Metadata** menu option is provided.

To refresh integration metadata:



The **Refresh Metadata** menu option is only available with adapters that have implemented metadata caching.

- 1. In the left navigation pane, click **Home** > **Integrations** > **Connections**.
- 2. Go to the row of the connection to refresh.



3. Select Refresh Metadata from the menu.

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# Add the Jira Adapter Connection to an Integration

When you drag the Jira Adapter into the trigger or invoke area of an integration, the Adapter Endpoint Configuration Wizard is invoked. This wizard guides you through configuration of the Jira Adapter endpoint properties.

The following sections describe the wizard pages that guide you through configuration of the Jira Adapter as a trigger or invoke in an integration.

## **Basic Info Page**

You can enter a name and description on the Basic Info page of each adapter in your integration.

Element	Description  Provide a meaningful name so that others can understand the responsibilities of this connection. You can include English alphabetic characters, numbers, underscores, and hyphens in the name. You can't include the following characters:	
What do you want to call your endpoint?		
	No blank spaces (for example, My Inbound Connection)	
	<ul> <li>No special characters (for example, #;83&amp; or righ(t) now4)</li> <li>except underscores and hyphens</li> </ul>	
	No multibyte characters	
What does this endpoint do?	Enter an optional description of the connection's responsibilities. For example:

## **Trigger Operations Page**

Select the project and event you want to perform in the Jira application.

Element	Description
Select project	Select a project that you created in the Jira application. The projects you create in the Jira application are displayed for selection.
Select issue type	Select an issue type such as Task, Bug, Story, Epic, Sub-task, Custom_Issue_Type, and so on. The issue types that are displayed for selection are based on your project selection.
Select Event	Select an event such as <b>Issue Created</b> , <b>Issue Updated</b> , <b>Comment Created</b> , and <b>Comment Updated</b> .
Webhook JQL	You can enter a query or paste a query from the Jira application as per your requirement. In the query, the project and issue type field values are added based on your selection. You can select another value if required. However, don't delete these values. You can add your query next to these values.
	Enter a valid JQL query in the text box. For example:
	project=Team And issueType=Task
Validate	Click to validate the query against the Jira application. The query response is displayed for a successful query and the request fields are displayed accordingly in the request schema. If the query is invalid, you receive a response for the errors in the query.

# Invoke Action Page

Select the type of action to perform.

Element	De	Description	
Select action type	•	<b>Query</b> : Retrieves information from the Jira application corresponding to the selected object and operation.	
	•	<b>Create or update</b> : Creates new records or updates the existing records in the Jira application.	
	•	<b>Delete</b> : Deletes records from the Jira application.	



## **Invoke Operations Page**

Enter the details based on the action you selected on the Action page.

- Query
- · Create or update
- Delete

#### Note:

- The Jira Adapter does not currently support the Get Issue, Transition Issue,

If you selected <b>Query</b> on the Action page to get records based on a selected object and operation or want to enter a Jira Query Language (JQL) request from/to the Jira application, the following options are displayed.	<ul> <li>Retrieve: Retrieves records based on a selected object and operation from the Jira application.</li> <li>Jira Query Language (JQL): Enables you to define a JQL-based query to send a request for querying and retrieving the information, which is queried from the Jira application.</li> </ul>

The following fields are displayed if you select **Retrieve**.

Select object	Select an object within the selected action.
Filter by object name	Type the initial letters of the object name to filter the display of names in the list.
Select operation	Select an operation name, such as <b>Get Attachment</b> , <b>Search Projects</b> , and so on.
Filter by operation name	Type the initial letters of the operation name to filter the display of names in the list.

The following options are displayed when you select Jira Query Language (JQL).

Element	Description
Select project	Select a project that you created in the Jira application. The projects you create in the Jira application are displayed for selection.



Element	Description
Select issue type	Select an issue type such as <b>Task</b> , <b>Bug</b> , <b>Story</b> , <b>Epic</b> , <b>Sub-task</b> , <b>Custom Issue Type</b> , and so on. The issue types that are displayed for selection are based on your project selection.
Edit query	Select this check box to enter a valid JQL query in the text box. For example:
	<pre>project=Demo And issueType=Sub-task OR priority=Low</pre>
	You can enter a query or paste a query from the Jira application as per your requirement. In the query, the project and issue type field values are added based on your selection. You can select another value if required. However, don't delete these values. You can add your query next to these values.
	The query can also include custom fields and parameters.
Binding parameters	Displays any binding parameter, if included, in the specified query. For example:
	'priority'
	is a parameter in the following query:

Select project (displayed if you select the Issues object and the Create Issue operation)	Select a project that you created in the Jira application. The projects you create in the Jira application are displayed for selection.
Select issue type (displayed if you select the Issues object and the Create Issue operation)	Select an issue type such as <b>Task</b> , <b>Bug</b> , <b>Story</b> , <b>Epic, Custom Issue Type</b> , and so on.
Select object	Select an object within the selected action.
Filter by object name	Type the initial letters of the object name to filter the display of names in the list.
Select operation	Select an operation name, such as <b>Create Issue</b> , <b>Update Comment</b> , and so on.
Filter by operation name	Type the initial letters of the operation name to filter the display of names in the list.

#### Delete

Element	Description
Select object	Select an object within the selected action.
Filter by object name	Type the initial letters of the object name to filter the display of names in the list.
Select operation	Select an operation name, such as <b>Remove Attachment</b> , <b>Remove User</b> , and so on.
Filter by operation name	Type the initial letters of the operation name to filter the display of names in the list.

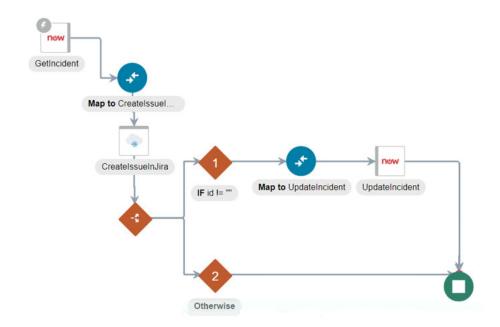
## Synchronize ServiceNow Incidents With Jira Issues

You can synchronize ServiceNow incidents with Jira issues. The integration is invoked when the incident is created in ServiceNow and the details of the incident are added as an issue in Jira. This implementation pattern provides an overview of the steps.

- 1. Create an app-driven orchestrated integration.
- 2. Drag a ServiceNow Adapter into the integration as a trigger connection.
- Configure the ServiceNow endpoint:
  - a. On the Basic info page, provide an endpoint name, and click **Next**.
  - b. On the Applications page, select the **Incident** module, and click **Next**.
  - c. On the Fields page, select the required fields from Available Fields, and click Next.
  - d. On the Conditions page, select Created, and click Next.
  - e. On the Summary page, review your selections, and click **Done**.
- Drag a Jira Adapter into the integration canvas.
- 5. Configure the Jira endpoint:
  - a. On the Basic Info page, provide an endpoint name, and click **Next**.
  - b. On the Action page, select Create or update, and click Next.

- **c.** On the Operations page, select the **Issues** object, project, issue type, and then select the **Create Issue** operation. Click **Next**.
- d. Review your selections on the Summary page, and click **Done**.
- 6. In the mapper, perform the required mappings to create an issue in Jira.
- 7. Drag a switch action and specify the condition if the issue is created in Jira.

- **8.** Drag a second ServiceNow Adapter into the integration canvas and configure it with the **Create, Update Or Delete Information** action.
  - a. On the Basic info page, provide an endpoint name, and click **Next**.
  - On the Action page, select Create, Update or Delete Information, and click Next.
  - c. On the Operations page, select the Update an existing record in the selected Module or Table, identified by the mandatory sys\_id field operation and select the Incident module. Click Next.
  - d. On the Summary page, review your selections, and click **Done**.
- Update the Additional comments field as a response in ServiceNow (that is, Successful when the issue gets created in Jira). The completed integration looks as follows.



- 10. Activate the integration.
  - a. At the end of the row for the integration, click the **Switch to Activate** icon.
  - b. If needed, check the Enable Tracing check box. The Include Payload check box is displayed.
  - c. If needed, check the Include Payload check box.
  - d. Click **Submit Now**. The integration is deployed.



## Use the Pagination Concept in an Integration

When you must fetch a large number of results in Jira, you can use the Jira Adapter's pagination feature. Pagination helps you segregate the total number of results. You can specify the number of results per page according to your requirement while triggering an integration and receive sorted results.

This use case describes how to use pagination to sort results while fetching product results. Similarly, you can use pagination for the Issue attachments object, Issue comments object, and Users object. To perform this operation, you create an integration for the Jira Adapter in Oracle Integration using pagination with the orchestrator.

- Create a scheduled orchestrated integration.
- 2. Drag an assign action to the workspace.
- 3. Provide a unique name for this action, and click Create.
- Assign the following two variables to your integration. Specify the values to variables as follows.

```
$startAt="0"

$Max ="2"
$Flag="false"
```

- 5. Click Validate, and then click Close.
- 6. Drag a while action below the assign action.
- 7. Provide a unique name for this action, and click **Create**.
- 8. Set the condition for the specified variables as follows.

```
$Flag !="true"
```

- 9. Click Validate, then click Close.
- 10. Drag a Jira Adapter inside the while action.
- 11. Specify the following details in the Adapter Endpoint Configuration Wizard.
  - a. On the Basic Info page, provide an endpoint name, and click **Next**.
  - b. On the Actions page, select **Query**, and click **Next**.
  - c. On the Operations page, select the **Projects** as an object, and select **Search Projects** as an operation.
  - d. On the Summary page, review your selections, and click **Done**.
- 12. In the mapper, map \$Max to maxResults and \$startAt to startAt.
- **13.** Drag an FTP Adapter connection and configure the FTP endpoint to write the response to a file.
  - a. On the Basic Info page, provide a name, and click Next.
  - b. On the Operations page, select Write File from the Select Operation list.
  - c. Select Binary in the Select a Transfer Mode field.



- d. Specify the output directory, file name pattern, and download directory, and click **Next**.
- e. On the Scheme page, select **No** in the **Do you want to specify the structure** for the contents of the file field, and click **Next**.
- f. Review your selections on the Summary page, and click **Done**.
- **14.** Perform the required mapping.
- **15.** Drag a switch action and specify the following IF condition:

```
contains( nextPage, "startAt") = "true"
```

**16.** Drag an assign action to update the specified variables as follows:

```
startAt + $Max
```

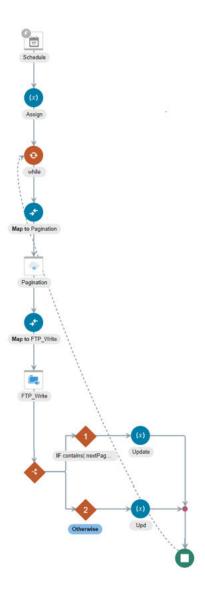
**17.** Drag an assign action into the **Otherwise** branch of the switch action to update the specified variables as follows:

```
$Flag="true"
```

**18.** When complete, save and activate the integration.

The completed integration looks as follows.





**19.** After successful activation, you can submit the integration and monitor the runtime in Oracle Integration. The integration keeps running until it completes all cycles of fetching project results, respectively, to each page in the FTP location.

## Retrieve Issue Details Using the Jira Query Language (JQL)

The Jira Adapter enables you to define a Jira Query Language (JQL)-based query to send a request to query and retrieve issue details from the Jira application. This use case describes how to use the Jira Adapter to send a JQL query and write the response to a target file location.

In this use case, an FTP Adapter is used to write the data that you receive from Jira to a file. However, you can also use other applications.

- 1. Create a scheduled orchestrated integration.
- 2. Drag and drop an assign action into the integration canvas and create three variables:
  - \$startAt="0"



- \$Max="2"
- \$Flag="false"
- 3. Drag a while action and specify the condition as follows:

```
$Flag!="true"
```

- 4. Drag a Jira Adapter inside the while action and configure it with the JQL operation.
  - a. On the Basic info page, provide an endpoint name, and click **Next**.
  - b. On the Action page, select **Query**, and click **Next**.
  - c. On the Operations page, select Jira Query Language (JQL).
  - d. Select a project, an issue type, and enter or paste a query.
  - e. If required, add a binding parameter in the query, click **Refresh**, and enter a value for the parameter in the text box.
  - f. Click **Test Query** to validate the query, then click **Next**.
  - g. On the Summary page, review your selections, and click **Done**.
- In the mapper, map the \$maxResults variable to maxResults and the \$startAt variable to startAt.
- 6. Drag an FTP Adapter and configure it to write the data that you receive from Jira.
  - a. On the Basic info page, provide an endpoint name.
  - b. On the Operations page, select **Write File** from the **Select Operation** list.
  - c. Select Binary from the Select a Transfer Mode list.
  - d. Provide the output directory and file name pattern.
  - e. On the Schema page, select No.
  - f. On the Summary page, review your selections, and click **Done**.
- 7. Perform the required mapping.
- 8. Drag a switch action and specify the following IF condition.

```
issues != ""
```

9. Drag an assign action to update the specified \$startAt variable as follows:

```
startAt + $Max
```

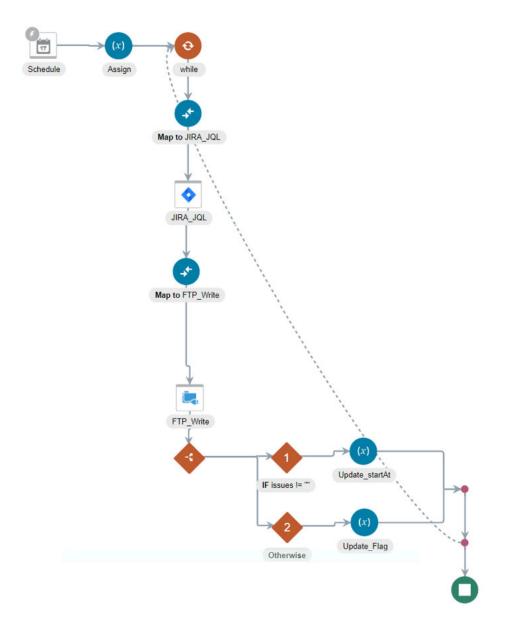
10. Drag an assign action into the Otherwise branch of the switch action to update the specified variable as follows:

```
$Flag="true"
```

11. When complete, save and activate the integration.

The completed integration looks as follows.





**12.** After successful activation, you can submit the integration and monitor the runtime behavior in Oracle Integration. The integration keeps running until it completes all cycles of fetching results, respectively, to each page in the FTP location.

Further in your orchestration, you can add adapters and actions as per your business requirement.

## Error When Testing a JQL Query

The following error occurs when you test a Jira Query Language (JQL) query on the Operations page of the Adapter Endpoint Configuration Wizard and there is any null value present in the JQL result.

(issuelinks) Array element is empty. Please add more than one element in this array and then do the json sampling. Check the error stack and fix the cause of the error.

Contact oracle support if error is not fixable.

**Solution**: Replace all the null values (that is, [] ) with double quotation marks ("") in the JQL result.
