A super capacitor (located on the motherboard) provides power to light the server node fault LEDs for up to 15 minutes after the server node is removed from a powered-on system chassis. After approximately 15 minutes, the capacitor discharges enough so that it cannot light the fault LEDs.

• Fault Remind Power Good LED.

This green LED lights each time the Fault Remind button is pressed, if the capacitor has enough of a charge to light the fault LEDs. This LED is located next to the Fault Remind button.

Memory DIMM Fault LEDs

If a drive has failed, it should power off automatically and light its blue ready-toremove indicator after 5 minutes.

b. If the drive being replaced doesn't already have its blue ready-to-remove indicator lit, type the following command from the host to unmount and turn off power to the drive:

odaadmcli power disk off pd xx

Where pd xx is the name of the disk to be replaced as described in step 1.

Before proceeding to the next step confirm that the blue ready-to-remove indicator on the drive is lit.

3. Push the latch release button on the front of the drive to open the drive latch [1], grasp the latch, and pull the drive out of the drive slot [2] as shown in the following figure.



4. Align the replacement drive with the drive slot.

The drive is physically addressed according to the slot in which it is installed. It is important to install a replacement drive in the same slot as the drive that was removed.

5. With the drive latch in the open position, slide the drive into the slot until the drive is fully seated [1] and then close the drive latch to lock the drive in place [2] as shown in the following figure.





6. Power on and remount the replacement drive. Type the following command from the host:

odaadmcli power disk on pd_xx

Where pd xx is the name of the disk being replaced as described in step 1.

It can take a few minutes for the power-on operation to complete. Once complete, the drive's green OK indicator will light.

7. To check the status of the replacement disk, type the following command from the host:

odaadmcli show disk

For additional information, refer to the Oracle Database Appliance *Deployment* and User's Guide.

Adding NVMe Expansion Storage

Add NVMe storage in an Oracle Database Appliance X6 series system.

 The Oracle Database Appliance X6-2S/X6-2M supports two expansion slots for NVMe drives. These are slots labeled NVMe2 and NVMe3 as seen from the front of the system (callouts 1 and 2 in the following illustration). When adding NVMe storage, you must populate both of these slots. For information about supported optional storage drives, refer to the Owner's Guide.



If you have the default configuration of only two NVMe drives (seen as pd_00 and pd_01 from the host), you can expand storage by adding two (2) NVMe drives.

• The **Oracle Database Appliance X6-2L** supports three expansion slots for NVMe drives. These are slots labeled NVMe2, NVMe5, and NVMe8 as seen from the


front of the system (callouts 1, 2 and 3 in the following illustration). When adding NVMe storage, you must populate all three of these slots.



If you have the default configuration of NVMe drives (seen as $pd_00, pd_01, pd_03, pd_04, pd_06$ and pd_07 from the host), you can expand storage by adding three (3) NVMe drives.

- The drive power-up and storage expansion odaadmcli commands listed here should only be run after all new disk drives have been physically installed. Once you expand storage, you cannot revert to a previous storage configuration (for example, the default factory storage configuration).
- The odaadmcli commands listed here must be run as the root user.
- **1.** Remove the drive filler panel of an unpopulated slot by using your finger to pry open the panel release latch and pulling the filler out of the drive slot.

Note:

Replace filler panels with drives one at a time to ensure proper system cooling.

2. Open the latch of the new drive by pressing the release button on the drive.

Caution:

Do not over-rotate the latch outwards when opening. Doing so can damage it.

- **3.** Insert the new drive by sliding the drive into the slot until the drive is fully seated. Then close the drive latch to lock the drive in place.
- 4. Repeat steps 1 3 for each new drive.



- For the Oracle Database Appliance X6-2S/X6-2M, the name for these drives to the host will be pd_02 and pd_03, matching the numbering of their respective drive slots.
- For the Oracle Database Appliance X6-2L, the name for these drives to the host will be pd_02, pd_05 and pd_08, matching the numbering of their respective drive slots.
- 5. Power on the new drives by entering the appropriate commands from the host.
 - For the Oracle Database Appliance X6-2S/X6-2M, type:

```
#odaadmcli power disk on pd_02
#odaadmcli power disk on pd 03
```

For the Oracle Database Appliance X6-2L, type:

```
# odaadmcli power disk on pd_02
# odaadmcli power disk on pd_05
# odaadmcli power disk on pd_08
```

It can take a few minutes for the power-on operation to complete. Once complete, the green OK indicators will light for the newly installed drives.

Note:

Do not attempt to power on and expand storage on one new disk and then power on and expand storage on the next new disk. Before you can expand storage, all the new disks must be powered on with their green OK indicators lit.

Expand the system storage to include the new drives. Type the following command from the host:

odaadmcli expand storage

The system will then detect and use the new storage.

For additional information, refer to the Oracle Database Appliance *Deployment* and User's Guide.

If you are servicing storage shelf hot plug components, see Oracle Database Appliance Storage Shelf Hot-Pluggable Components.

Note:

After a physical insertion or removal action of a storage component (such as a disk or SAS cable), you should wait before performing the next action to allow the system software to fully process the event. This could take up to 3 minutes to complete.

This section describes replacing hot-pluggable components for the Oracle Database Appliance storage shelf. Only certain versions of Oracle Database Appliance support a storage shelf. If you have Oracle Database Appliance Version 1, go to Oracle Database Appliance Version 1 Hot-Pluggable Components.



In certain storage expansion scenarios (explained in the following procedures), adding optional storage might require that the appliance be powered off.

A storage shelf, or expansion storage shelf, are only supported with the following Oracle Database Appliance products:

- Oracle Database Appliance X6-2-HA/X7-2-HA/X8-2-HA support the DE3-24C shelf.
- Oracle Database Appliance X5-2 supports the DE2-24C shelf.
- Oracle Database Appliance X3-2/X4-2 support the DE2-24P shelf.

Hot-pluggable components are those that can be removed and installed while the system is running. These are designated as Customer Replaceable Units (CRUs).

Caution:

Data loss. Do not remove power from both power supplies of the storage shelf or storage expansion shelf (if equipped) while any databases are running. If you must power off the storage shelf or expansion storage shelf, stop the database first.

Note:

After a physical insertion or removal action of a storage component (such as a disk or SAS cable), you should wait before performing the next action to allow the system software to fully process the event. This could take up to 3 minutes to complete.

Under most circumstances, Oracle Database Appliance storage shelf components can all be replaced while the storage shelf is powered-on and running. Any exceptions will be described in the following procedures.

- Adding Optional Oracle Database Appliance X6-2-HA Storage Shelf Drives (CRU) Add disk storage in an Oracle Database Appliance X6-2-HA storage shelf.
- Replace a Storage Shelf HDD or SSD (CRU) Replace a storage disk in an Oracle Database Appliance storage shelf.
- Replace a Storage Shelf Power Supply (CRU)
 Replace a power supply in an Oracle Database Appliance storage shelf.
- Replace a Storage Shelf I/O Module (CRU)
 Replace an IO module in an Oracle Database Appliance storage shelf.

Adding Optional Oracle Database Appliance X8-2-HA Storage Shelf Drives (CRU)

Add disk storage in an Oracle Database Appliance X8-2-HA storage shelf.

The **Oracle Database Appliance X8-2-HA storage shelf** partially-populated base configuration supports storage expansion with either 7.68 TB SSDs (available in six-packs) or 14 TB HDDs (available in an eighteen-pack). Depending on your initial base storage shelf configuration, there can be up to eighteen expansion slots. These slots are labeled 6-23 as seen from the front of the system (callouts 6 through 23 in the following illustration).



• If your system has **Oracle Database Appliance X8-2-HA software release 18.7, 19.4 or 19.5,** all storage must be added BEFORE you initially power-on the system and install system software. Once the system is provisioned and running you cannot add storage.

If your system is running Oracle Database Appliance release 18.8, 19.6 or later version:

- For a high performance shelf, you can add up to eighteen 7.68 TB SSDs (available in six-packs). You can add storage with the system running and use the appliance CLI software commands to expand the storage configuration.
- For a high capacity shelf, you can add eighteen 14 TB HDDs (available in an eighteen-pack). You must power off the appliance, add storage, then re-image and redeploy the appliance software. This is required to reconfigure the appliance from the default high performance mode to high capacity mode.
- Expanding the base configuration storage shelf with 7.68 TB SSDs for high performance. The base configuration has slots 0-5 with 7.68 TB drives for DATA/RECO. Expansion SSDs are available in six-packs and are populated in shelf storage slots from the bottom up to also be used for DATA/RECO, as follows:
 - The first six expansion drives go into slots 6-11.



- The second six expansion drives go into slots 12-17.
- The third six expansion drives go into slots 18-23.

The following illustration shows the expanded drive configuration for 7.68 TB SSDs.

- The odaadmcli commands listed here must be run as the root user.
- **1.** Do one of the following:
 - If you are adding 7.68 TB SSDs to the storage shelf, leave the appliance powered on and proceed to the next step.
 - If you are adding 14 TB HDDs to the storage shelf, power off the appliance and proceed to the next step.
- 2. To install the new drives into the storage shelf, do the following:



a. Remove one of the empty slot drive filler panels by pressing its release button [1] and removing it from the drive slot [2] as shown in the following figure.

Replace filler panels with drives one at a time to ensure proper storage shelf chassis cooling.

- If you added 14 TB HDDs to the storage shelf, power on the appliance, then re-image and redeploy the appliance software as described in the *Deployment* and User's Guide.
- 4. If you are also adding a storage expansion shelf (can only be added to a system with an identically and fully populated storage shelf), you can do so after successfully completing the previous step.

Refer to the Oracle Database Appliance *Owner's Guide* for information on installing a storage expansion shelf into a rack.

Refer to the Oracle Database Appliance *Deployment and User's Guide* for information on cabling and storage expansion commands for a storage expansion shelf.



Adding Optional Oracle Database Appliance X7-2-HA Storage Shelf Drives (CRU)

Add disk storage in an Oracle Database Appliance X7-2-HA storage shelf.

The **Oracle Database Appliance X7-2-HA storage shelf** partially-populated base configuration supports 15 expansion slots for either 7.68 TB SAS SSDs (available in five-packs) or 14 TB SAS HDDs (available in a fifteen-pack). These expansion slots are labeled 5-19 as seen from the front of the system (callouts 5 through 19 in the following illustration).



- Expanding the base configuration storage shelf with 7.68 TB SSDs for high performance. The base configuration has slots 20-23 populated with 800GB drives for REDO and slots 0-4 with 3.2 TB drives for DATA/RECO. Note that 3.2 TB SSDs are no longer available. Storage expansions options are:
 - If you are running Oracle Database Appliance software release 18.7, you must power off the system to remove any existing 3.2 TB SSDs and replace them with 7.68 TB SSDs. You cannot have both types of drives in the storage shelf. After the new storage is added you must perform clean-up, redeploy the appliance software, and restore the database from a backup after adding the new storage.
 - If you are running Oracle Database Appliance software release 18.8, 19.6 or later version, your 7.68 TB SSDs can be added with the system running without replacing the existing 3.2 TB SSDs. Note that the 7.68 TB SSDs will be formatted as 3.2 TB SSDs after being added to the system to match the existing 3.2 TB drives.

Expansion drives are available in five-packs and are populated in shelf storage slots from the bottom up, as follows:

- The first five expansion drives go into slots 5-9.
- The second five expansion drives go into slots 10-14.
- The third five expansion drives go into slots 15-19.

When you expand storage, you must first install all of your expansion disks (5, 10 or 15). Once you expand storage to support additional disks, you cannot revert to the base configuration (no drives in slots 5-19).

In order to support 14 TB HDDs in the system you must be running Oracle Database Appliance software release 18.7, 18.8, 19.6 or later version. In addition:
 - The storage shelf must be powered off and the five 3.2 TB SSDs already in the base configuration must be moved to slots 15 -19 and the new storage installed.
 - After the new storage is added, perform clean-up, redeploy the appliance software, and restore the database from a backup.

Once you expand storage to support additional disks, you cannot revert to the base configuration (no drives in slots 5-19).

 - If your appliance is running **Oracle Database Appliance release 18.7** and you are adding 7.68 TB SDDs to the storage shelf and replacing existing 3.2 TB SSDs, power off the appliance and proceed to the next step.

Add disk storage in an Oracle Database Appliance X6-2-HA storage shelf.

The **Oracle Database Appliance X6-2-HA storage shelf** partially-populated base configuration supports ten expansion slots for 7.68 TB SAS SSD drives. These are slots labeled 10-19 as seen from the front of the system (callouts 10 through 19 in the following illustration). When adding to the storage shelf, you must populate all of these slots at the same time.



• If your system is running **Oracle Database Appliance software release 18.7, 18.8, 19.6 or later version**, 7.68 TB SAS SSDs can be used for storage expansion (1.6 TB SSDs are no longer available). However, this means that you must also replace any existing 1.6 TB SSDs with 7.68 TB SSDs, perform clean-up, redeploy the appliance software, and restore the database from a backup. You cannot have both types of drives in the storage shelf.

If you expand storage, you must first add all of the disks and then expand storage on all the new disks at the same time. Once you expand storage to support disks in slots 10-19, you cannot revert to the base configuration (no drives in slots 10-19).

For the DE2-24C, slide the release latch as indicated by the debossed arrow to release the drive lever.





• For the DE2-24P, slide the release latch as indicated by the debossed arrow to release the drive lever and then, rotate the lever open and, grasping the drive body, slide the drive out of the storage shelf as shown in the following figure.



- 3. Install the replacement drive:
 - For the DE2-24C and DE3-24C, open the drive lever on the replacement drive. Slide the new drive into the drive slot [1] until it engages with the backplane connector and then close the lever to fully seat the drive and lock it into place [2] as shown in the following figure.

Check that the drive is locked in place and flush with the other drives.





• For the DE2-24P, open the drive lever on the replacement drive. Slide the drive into the drive slot until it engages with the backplane connector and then close the lever to fully seat the drive and lock it into place as shown in the following figure.

Check that the drive is locked in place and flush with the other drives.



4. Once installed, the system should automatically detect and use the replacement drive. Ensure that the green OK indicator for the replacement drive lights to show that the drive is ready.

This can take a few minutes to complete.



Replace a Storage Shelf Power Supply (CRU)

Replace a power supply in an Oracle Database Appliance storage shelf.

The storage shelf and the storage expansion shelf each have two power supplies. Indicators (LEDs) on the power supplies indicate their operation state.

The power supplies are redundant and one can be replaced while the appliance is running.

If any of the indicators are amber, or if the power supply status indicator does not light, replace the power supply.

- **1**. Ensure the power supply on/off switch is in the "O" off position.
- 2. Disconnect the power cord tie strap from the power cord, and unplug the power cord from the power supply.
- 3. Remove the power supply unit using the procedure for your storage shelf model:
 - For the DE3-24C, grasp the power supply handle, push the release button [1], and slide the power supply out of the chassis [2] as shown in the following figure.





• For the DE2-24C or DE2-24P, push the ejector release button [1], grasp the power supply ejector handle and rotate it to the open position [2] as shown in the following figure. Slide the power supply out of the chassis.





- **4.** Install the replacement power supply unit using the procedure for your storage shelf model:
 - For the DE3-24C, slide the replacement power supply module into the chassis. When fully installed, you should hear a click of the release lever returning to the locked position.
 - For a DE2-24C or DE2-24P, open the ejector handle arm on the replacement power supply. Slide the replacement power supply module into the chassis. Push the lever fully closed until you hear or feel a click.
- 5. Plug the power cord into the new power supply and attach the power cord tie strap to the power cord.
- 6. Place the power supply on/off switch to the "I" on position.

The Power/OK status LED should be a steady green, and all other indicators should be off.

Replace a Storage Shelf I/O Module (CRU)

Replace an IO module in an Oracle Database Appliance storage shelf.

Storage Shelf SAS I/O modules are fully redundant and can be replaced while the appliance is running.

Note:

After a physical insertion or removal action of a storage component (such as a disk or SAS cable), you should wait before performing the next action to allow the system software to fully process the event. This could take up to 3 minutes to complete.

- 1. Disconnect the cables from the I/O module (the various models are shown below). Be sure to mark the cables so you can return them to their proper connectors.

• For the DE2-24C or DE2-24P, using your thumb and forefinger, squeeze the release button [1] toward the locking lever hole to release the lever [2]. Grasp the lever and remove the I/O module from the chassis.



- 3. Open the lever in the new I/O module if it is not already open.
- 4. Slide the new I/O module into the disk shelf and close the locking lever.

Caution:

Equipment damage. Be careful not to damage the connector pins at the back of the I/O module.

- 5. Reconnect the cables.
- 6. Verify that the new I/O module is working correctly.
 - After approximately 60 seconds, the power LED should be solid green and the Fault/ Locate LED should be off.



• For each port that has a cable connected, all four activity LEDs should be solid green.

For replaced components that do not have an embedded FRU serial number, or do not automatically clear their fault state after the component has been repaired and the server is returned to service, you can use Oracle ILOM command line interface to manually clear the fault state. Use the following syntax:

set /path_to_target clear_fault_action=true

Where *path_to_target* is the path to the component (such as a DIMM) that had the fault.

In addition, the Fault Management shell can also be used. Use of the Fault Management shell is reserved for Oracle Service. For more information on component fault management:

- 1. To shut down a server node using the Power button, perform one of the following:
 - Graceful shutdown: Press and release the recessed Power button on the lower left-hand corner of the server node's front panel (see [1] the following figure). This causes Advanced Configuration and Power Interface (ACPI) to perform an orderly shutdown of the system.
 - Emergency shutdown: Press and hold the recessed Power button on the lower left-hand corner of the server node's front panel for at least five seconds until the main power is off and the server node enters standby power mode (see [1] the following figure).

Caution:

Data loss. To avoid data loss and file system corruption, always use a graceful shutdown unless it is an emergency.



When the server node is shut down, the Power/OK LED (see [2] the following figure) on the server node's front panel flashes, indicating that the server node is in standby power mode.



- 2. To shut down a server node using the Oracle ILOM, perform one of the following:
 - Using the Oracle ILOM web interface:
 - a. Open a browser and enter the server node's service processor IP address in the browser's address field.
 - **b.** At the log in page, type a user name (the account must have Reset and Host Control (r) privileges) and password, and click the Log In button.
 - c. Go to Remote Power Control and do one of the following:
 - Select **Graceful Shutdown and Power Off** from the Select Action list box and then click Save and OK.

The server node shuts down gracefully.

 Select Immediate Power Off from the Select Action list box and then click Save and OK.

The server node shuts down immediately.

- Using the Oracle ILOM CLI:
 - a. Log in to Oracle ILOM using an ssh client. Type:

\$ssh username@sp_ip_address

Where *username* is a user account name with Reset and Host Control (r) privileges and *sp_ip_address* is the IP address of the server node service processor.



- b. When prompted, enter the user account password.
- c. Enter the command to shut down the server node:
 - For a graceful shutdown, type:

```
-> stop /SYS
```

The server node shuts down gracefully.

For an emergency shutdown, type:

-> stop -f /SYS

The server node shuts down immediately.

Power Off the System

Each processor in Oracle Database Appliance Version 1 has six DIMM slots numbered D0 through D5. D0 is the closest to the processor and D5 is the farthest.

Each slot should contain a 1333 MHz or 1600 MHz DDR3, 8GB dual rank DIMM. No other configurations are supported.

The server node supports a maximum memory speed of 1333 MHz, even if it is configured with 1600 MHz DIMMs.

If the system contains a mixture of 1333 MHz and 1600 MHz DIMMs, then P0 and P1 should be configured the same, so that both sides are symmetrical. For example, if you install only two 1600 MHz DIMMs, they should go into P0, D0 and P1, D0.

The following figure shows the physical layout of the DIMMs and CPUs. When viewing the server node from the front, CPU0 (P0) is on the right.



Each processor socket supports three independent memory channels labeled channel A, B, and C, where channel A is closest to the processor socket. Each channel supports two DIMM slots, is controlled by an independent memory controller, and operates independent of the other channels.

c. Remove the server node top cover.

This can happen if the Fault Remind button is pressed for a long time with fault LEDs lit or if the server node has been out of the chassis for more then 15 minutes.

The server node supports a maximum memory speed of 1333 MHz, even if 1600 MHz DIMMs are installed.

- 3. Ensure that the ejector tabs are in the open position.

Align the notch in the DIMM with the key in the connector. The notch ensures that the DIMM is oriented correctly as shown in the following figure.





5. Push the DIMM into the connector until the ejector tabs lock the DIMM in place.

If the DIMM does not easily seat into the connector, verify that the notch in the DIMM is aligned with the key in the connector as shown above. If the notch is not aligned, damage to the DIMM might occur.

Advanced ECC corrects up to 4 bits in error on nibble boundaries, as long as they are all in the same DRAM. If a DRAM fails, the DIMM continues to function.

To clear a fault once the faulty DIMM has been replaced, type the following in the Oracle ILOM CLI:

```
-> set clear fault action=true
```

The fault LED is located next to the CPU as shown in the following figure.



- If CPU fault LED is off: CPU is operating properly.
- If CPU fault LED is on (amber): CPU is faulty and should be replaced.

Viewing the server node from the front, CPU0 (P0) is on the right side of the server node.

d. Using a Phillips screwdriver, turn one captive screw on the heatsink counterclockwise two full turns, then turn the other screw two full turns, and keep alternating between the two screws until they are removed [2] as shown in the following figure.





- e. Twist the heatsink slightly to break the grease seal, then lift it off and place it upside down on a flat surface to prevent the thermal grease from contaminating other components.
- f. Using the wipes supplied with the replacement CPU, carefully clean the thermal grease from both the bottom of the heatsink and the top of the CPU.

- **g.** Disengage the CPU release lever by pushing down and moving it to the side away from the CPU, and then rotating the lever upward [3] as shown in the previous figure.

- i. Use your index finger to carefully lift up the edge of the CPU or protective cap that is farthest from the socket alignment slots [4] as shown in the previous figure, then firmly grasp both sides of the CPU or protective cap with your thumb and index finger on your other hand [4], and carefully lift the CPU or protective cap up and out of the socket [5] as shown in the previous figure.

- c. Lower the pressure frame to the closed position, ensuring that the pressure frame sits flat around the periphery of the CPU [4-1] as shown in the previous figure. Then engage the release lever by rotating it downward and slipping it under the catch [4-2].
- d. Ensure that there is no debris on the top of the CPU die.
- e. Use the syringe (supplied with the new or replacement CPU) to apply approximately 0.1 ml of thermal grease to the center of the top of the CPU. Do not distribute the grease.
- f. Orient the heatsink so that the DIMM SIDE label on the top of the heatsink is facing the memory modules (DIMMs) and the two captive Phillips screws align with the mounting studs.

Each heatsink is labeled to indicate which side of the heatsink faces the memory modules (DIMMs) when the heatsink is properly oriented.

- **g.** Tighten the two Phillips screws alternately two full turns at a time until the screws are fully seated [5] as shown in the previous figure.

If you powered off a single server node without shutting down the appliance, perform this step only for that server node. If you shut down the appliance completely, then perform this step for both server nodes.

• Using the server node's Power button: Momentarily press and release the recessed Power button on the front panel [1] as shown in the following figure.



On the server node, the green Power/OK LED (see [2] in the previous figure) blinks while the server node is booting, and remains steady on when the server node is operational.

- Using the Oracle ILOM web interface:
 - a. Open a browser and enter the server node's service processor IP address in the browser's address field.
 - **b.** At the log in page, type a user name (the account must have Reset and Host Control (r) privileges) and password, and click the Log In button.
 - c. Go to Remote Power Control and select **Power On** from the Select Action list box and then click Save and OK.

- c. Enter the command to power on the server node:

-> start /SYS

Each Oracle Database Appliance Version 1 power-on-self-test (POST) diagnostic is a low-level test designed to detect faults in a specific hardware component. If the POST diagnostic discloses an F1 or F2 error, it typically reports the following information about the error:

- Type of error detected
- When or where the error occurred

The following table lists some of the F1 and F2 error messages that could appear during the POST diagnostics along with instructions for how to possibly resolve the error reported.

- 1. The first megabyte of DRAM is tested by the BIOS before the BIOS code is copied from ROM to DRAM.
- 2. After existing out of DRAM, the BIOS performs a simple memory test (where a write/read of every location with the pattern 55aa55aa is performed).



Note:

The simple memory test is performed only if Quick Boot is not enabled from the Boot Settings Configuration screen. Enabling Quick Boot causes the BIOS to skip the memory test.

3. The BIOS polls the memory controllers for both correctable and non-correctable memory errors and logs those errors into the SP.
