Getting Started with Unified Inventory Management

You use Oracle Communications Unified Inventory Management (UIM) to model and manage your inventory. You can track resources, manage processes, and control service and resource life cycles.

Resources, such as physical devices, logical devices, telephone numbers, and network addresses, are represented in UIM as inventory entities. Because resources differ from each other, the various UIM entity types have specific features and capabilities. Resource entities can be related to each other in a number of ways, including parent-child relationships, dependencies, and enablement.

Business processes that organize or classify resources, such as business interactions or inventory groups, are also represented as entity types. These entity types can be related to resource entities and to each other in a variety of ways.

Entity types are defined by specifications that are created in Oracle Communications Service Catalog and Design - Design Studio. You import these specifications into UIM and then create and use them to create inventory entities. For example, a modeler can create a specification for a particular type of network interface card. In UIM, you can create entities based on that specification to represent cards that exist in your inventory.

UIM includes tools that enable you to create, search for, and configure entities. It also includes tools that you use to manage the application. See *UIM Concepts* for a more complete overview of the application concepts.

Understanding UIM Terminology

You should read *UIM Concepts* for full explanations of the concepts and background needed to work in UIM. The following list includes definitions of a few key UIM terms:

- Design Studio is the Oracle Communications service creation environment. Modelers and developers use it to define the way data is stored in UIM. Design Studio is a separately licensed product that you install independently of UIM. See *UIM Concepts* and the Design Studio Help for more information.
- Entities are the items in your UIM inventory. They can represent physical or logical resources, such as equipment and telephone numbers. They can also represent business processes or organizational tools such as business interactions or resource reservations.

Entities are usually based on specifications that you select when you create the entities. There are many different types of entities, but the ways you work with them are very similar. See "Working with Inventory Entities" for more information.

- Specifications are definitions or blueprints used to create and display inventory entities in UIM. There are different types of specifications for different types of entities, such as telephone numbers, networks, physical devices, and inventory groups. For example for physical devices, you could have specifications for various kinds of PE routers, ISP routers, DCN routers, and so on. Specifications are defined in Design Studio. In UIM, you work with them mainly in the context of creating entities. You can also search for, view, and manage specification definitions in UIM. See "Working with Entity Specifications" for more information.
- Configurations are a particular kind of entity that enable you to plan, create, and maintain versions of how a parent entity is realized or how it consumes resources. For example, a Service entity can have a service configuration that stores the specific details that are likely to change. You can create new configuration versions as the service evolves. Configurations are not available for all entity types. See "Working with Entity Configurations" for more information.
- Characteristics are user-defined data elements that define the information stored in
 entities. For example, a Physical Device entity may include a characteristic for the device
 serial number. In UIM, characteristics are displayed as fields, such as text fields, lists,
 check boxes, and so on. These characteristics are displayed in addition to the default data
 elements that appear for all entities of a particular type. You define characteristics in
 Design Studio and include them in entity specifications. In UIM, you interact with
 characteristics mainly when you enter information into fields or when you search for
 entities based on characteristic values. See "Working with Characteristics" for more
 information.
- Rulesets are chunks of Java code that are run at a specified time in UIM. For example, when you validate a service configuration, a ruleset performs the validation. Some rulesets are included by default, but custom rulesets can be used to extend UIM. See UIM Concepts and UIM Developer's Guide for detailed information. In UIM, you can view and manage rulesets. See "Working with Rulesets" for more information.
- Cartridges are the way that entity specifications, characteristic specifications, rulesets, and
 other data are deployed into UIM from Design Studio. Cartridges are built in Design Studio
 as JAR files and then installed into UIM. You can create your own custom cartridges to
 extend UIM. You can also obtain cartridge packs from Oracle that supply specifications
 and other data for particular technology domains.

Working with the UIM User Interface

UIM has a web-based interface with simple navigation and interface controls. The main window is divided into two regions and has a menu in the upper right corner. The region to the left contains the navigation section, which you use to open pages of various kinds. The region to the right is populated with the pages that you open.



To navigate in the UIM user interface, use only UIM user interface menu items, buttons, icons, and actions. Do not use your browser buttons, such as the **Back** and **Forward** buttons, to move between screens or to refresh the application. Browser actions may result in error messages.

About the Navigation Section and Landing Page

You use the navigation section to move around the application. You click links in the navigation section to open pages, which appear on the right side of the main window. In addition to the navigation section, you can use the links on the landing page to open the desired page. In most cases, the pages that you open from the navigation section enable you to search for entities. In other cases, clicking a link opens a page for completing a task, such as importing inventory. See "About Pages" for more information.

You use the Home icon on the upper-left corner of the user interface to come back to the landing page from any page.

The contents of the navigation section are divided into four groups that you can expand or collapse:

- The **Tasks** group is divided into two sub-groups:
 - The My Tasks sub-group contains links that enable you to view information about activities assigned to you or to your work group.
 - The All Tasks sub-group contains links that enable you to search for projects, engineering work orders, and business interactions.
- The Network Functions Virtualization (NFV) Orchestration group contains links to support the orchestration functionality. See NFV Orchestration Implementation Guide for information on this topic.
- The Services group contains links to service entities.
- The Inventory group is divided into two sub-groups:
 - The Resources sub-group contains links that enable you to search for resource entities, such as connectivities, logical devices, telephone numbers, IP addresses, networks, and more.
 - The Infrastructure sub-group contains links to property locations, custom objects, inventory groups, parties, and places.
- The **Administration** group contains for administrative functions such as rebuilding topology and running rule sets. It also contains links that enable you to search rulesets, sequence specifications, characteristics, and entity specifications.
- The Operational Analysis group contains the Outage Impacts and Path Analysis.

About Pages

When you click a link in the navigation section, the right side of the main window is populated with a page. Pages are also displayed as the result of navigation from other pages. Pages enable you to complete tasks, such as searching for entities.

For example, if you click the **Logical Device** link in the **Inventory - Resources** group, you see a page that enables you to search for logical devices. See "Searching" for more information. From the results of the logical device search, you can open a Summary page for a particular

logical device, where you can view, enter, and change information. See "Working in Entity Summary Pages" for more information.

The contents of pages are often displayed in tables. You can change the way that information is displayed in a number of ways. See "Working with Tables" for more information.

Pages are often divided into sections that contain specific kinds of information. Sections are areas within pages that are separated by title bars. For example, a Logical Device Summary page includes Logical Device Information, Logical Device Hierarchy, and Parent Logical Device sections, among others. "Collapsing and Expanding Sections in a Page".

Collapsing and Expanding Sections in a Page

You can save space in a page by collapsing a section. You can expand the section when you need to see its contents.

To collapse and expand sections:

• Click the triangle icon in the upper left corner of the section's title bar to collapse it. Click the icon again to expand the section.

Searching

UIM includes search features that enable you to find information based on a variety of criteria. For example, you can find all telephone numbers in a particular service area or all logical devices associated with a VPN service.

Search sections for the various entity types include a set of default fields appropriate to the entity. For example, the default fields that appear in the Search section for an Equipment entity are different from those that appear for a Product entity.

When search results are displayed, you can follow links to get information about specific entities or take actions on one or more of the results.

Searching for Entities

UIM enables you to search for entities based on combinations of criteria. For example, you can search for all Equipment entities that are based on a particular specification and are in the Pending Install inventory status. With Connectivity entities, you can search by number of channels and capacity.

You can add and remove fields from the default list of search criteria in the Search section. When you add fields, you can include one or more of the characteristics that have been defined for all specifications of an entity type. For some entities, including services, pipes, and business interactions, you can also add fields related to external systems that cooperate with UIM.



When searching for Telephone Number, Place, Custom Network Address, and Custom Object entities, including a specification in the search criteria causes additional information to be displayed in the search results. For example, if you include a specification in a telephone number search, the results include a column for the connection type.

You can use wildcards and other symbols in searches. UIM supports the following wildcard characters:

- A percentage sign (%) represents a match of zero or more characters.
- An underscore () represents a match of any single character.



Wildcard characters can be escaped with a backslash (\). To insert a backslash in the query, insert two backslashes (\\).

Note the following special search considerations:

- If you are searching for a telephone number associated with a service, results are returned only when the telephone number and the service are included in the same inventory group.
- Text field characteristics that are flagged as password fields cannot be used as search criteria.
- You can search for places by type, specifying any combination of site, location, address, or address range.
- If you search for an entity without any criteria for specification field, the system throws a warning that the search will take a long time. This is a customizable feature that can be enabled/disabled. See "UIM System Administrator's Guide" for more information.

Equipment, Pipe, and Inventory Group searches include some features not available for other entities. See "Searching for Equipment, Pipe, Logical Device, and Inventory Group Entities".

IP Address entity searches are slightly different from other entity searches. See "Searching for IP Address Entities".

Telephone Number searches enables you to also search for Telephone Number Blocks. See "Searching for Telephone Number Blocks".

To search for entities:

- 1. In the navigation section, click the link for the type of entity you want to search for.
 - The search page for the entity appears. The Search section displays fields for the entity's default data elements. The fields depend on the kind of entity you are searching for.
- (Optional) To change the default search criteria:
 - a. Click **Add Fields** and the desired entity type (if applicable).
 - The Add Fields dialog box appears.
 - Use the directional arrow buttons to move data elements between the Available Fields column to the Selected Fields column.
 - c. Click OK.

The selected fields appear in the Search section.



- 3. Enter search criteria in the desired fields. Some fields require that you enter text; others allow you to select from lists.
- 4. Click Search.

Searching for Equipment, Pipe, Logical Device, and Inventory Group Entities

Equipment, Pipe, Logical Device, and Inventory Group entity searches includes some features not available for other entities. You can search for entities based on their relationships. For Equipment entities, you can search based on relationships with Physical Device, Logical Device, and Place entities. For Pipe entities, you can search based on relationships with terminating places, as well as Network, and Logical Device entities. For Inventory Group and Logical Device entities, you can search by Place.

In addition, the way you add fields to the search criteria is different from the method used for other entities.

To search for Equipment, Pipe, Logical Device, and Inventory Group entities:

- 1. In the navigation section, click the link for the type of entity you want to search for.
 - The search page for the entity appears. The Search section displays fields for the entity's default data elements. Below the search fields are several collapsed sections for the relationships that can be included in the search.
- 2. (Optional) To change the default search criteria:
 - a. Click Add Fields.
 - A list of entity types appears. The list includes the entity type you are searching for (Equipment or Pipe) and the entities with which it can have relationships.
 - **b.** Select the entity type for which you want to add search criteria.
 - The Add Fields dialog box for the selected entity type appears.
 - Use the directional arrow buttons to move data elements between the Available Fields column to the Selected Fields column.
 - d. Click OK.

The selected fields appear in the appropriate area of the Search section.

- e. Repeat this step to add search criteria for additional entity types.
- 3. Enter search criteria in the desired fields. Some fields require that you enter text; others allow you to select from lists. To enter search criteria for related entity types, open the collapsed section for that entity type.
- 4. Click Search.

Searching for IP Address Entities

IP Address entity searches are slightly different than other entity searches because the Search page contains tabs that enable you to search for more than one entity type. Specifically, there are tabs that enable you to search for IPv4 Network, IPv4 Subnet, and IPv4 Address entities, or for IPv6 Network, IPv6 Subnet, and IPv6 Address entities.

To search for IP Address entities:



The following steps describe searching for IPv4 address entities. Searching for IPv6 address entities is done in the same manner.

 In the Inventory - Resources group of the navigation section, click the IP Address - IPv4 link.

The search page for the IPv4 Network entity appears. The Search section displays fields for the entity's default data elements.

2. (Optional) Click the **IPv4 Subnet** tab to search for IPv4 Subnet entities.

The search page for the IPv4 Subnet entity appears. The Search section displays fields for the entity's default data elements.

3. (Optional) Click the **IPv4 Address** tab to search for IPv4 Address entities.

The search page for the IPv4 Address entity appears. The Search section displays fields for the entity's default data elements.

- 4. (Optional) To change the default search criteria:
 - a. Click Add Fields.

The Add Fields dialog box appears.

- Use the directional arrow buttons to move data elements between the Available Fields column to the Selected Fields column.
- c. Click OK.

The selected fields appear in the Search section.

- **5.** Enter search criteria in the desired fields. Some fields require that you enter text; others allow you to select from lists.
- 6. Click Search.

Searching for Telephone Number Blocks

UIM enables you to search for telephone number entities in blocks of sequential numbers.



The telephone number block search does not retrieve the reserved telephone numbers.

To search for telephone number blocks:

- In the Inventory Resources group of the navigation section, click Telephone Numbers.
 The Telephone Number landing page appears.
- Hover the mouse cursor over the Search TN Blocks icon and click Search TN Blocks.
 The Telephone Numbers Block Search page appears.
- 3. Enter the search criteria in the desired fields. Some fields require that you enter text; others allow you to select from lists.
- **4.** (Optional) In the **Range From** field, enter the number you want to search.
- (Optional) In the Range To field, enter the ending number of a range of numbers.
- **6.** In the **Block Size** field, enter the telephone number block size.

This is a mandatory field and accepts values equal to or greater than 1.

7. Click Search TN Blocks.

The telephone number blocks that meet your search criteria are displayed in the Blocks Results section.

Working With Saved Searches

UIM automatically saves the results of your last search and stores the results in the Search Results section of a Search page. If you navigate away from the Search page, and then return to it later, the Search Results section displays the results of your last search as **Saved Last Search** in the **Saved Search** menu. However, after you run a new search in a different Search page, the earlier search results in the previous Search page are no longer available and you can view the search results only in the latest Search page.

You can also manually save searches that you perform frequently. This feature is especially useful for complex searches where reentering the criteria is time-consuming.

Saving a Search

To save a search:

- 1. In a Search page, enter the search criteria you want to save.
- 2. Click the **Save** button.

The Create Saved Search dialog box appears.

- 3. In the Name field, enter a name for the search.
- 4. (Optional) Select the Set As Default check box to make this search the default.
- (Optional) Select the Run Automatically check box to configure this search to run automatically when you open this Search page.
- 6. Click OK.

The new search appears in the **Saved Search** menu. If you designated it as the default search, it appears at the top of the menu.

To modify a saved search:

- 1. In a Search page, select a search from the **Saved Search** menu.
 - The search fields are populated with the criteria from the saved search.
- From the Saved Search menu, select Personalize.

The Personalize Saved Search dialog box appears.

- 3. In the **Name** field, enter a name for the search.
- Select the Set As Default check box to make this search the default.
- Select the Run Automatically check box to configure this search to run automatically when you open this Search page.
- 6. Click OK.

Your changes are saved. The new name appears in the **Saved Search** menu. If you designated it as the default search, it appears at the top of the menu.

When the results of a search are displayed, you can select entities and perform actions on them. The actions you can take depend on the entity type.

To perform actions on search results:

- 1. In a Search Results section, select the entity rows on which you want to perform an action.
- Click Actions, then select the action you want to take.

A page or dialog box related to the action appears.

3. Complete the action.

Duplicating Entities

You can duplicate certain types of entities that are returned in search results. The entities you can duplicate are resources that commonly exist in large numbers in an inventory: equipment, logical devices, physical devices, and pipes.

A duplicate has the same identifying information as the original, except for the ID. Other attributes of the original entity, such as associations, configurations, membership in inventory groups, and so on, are not duplicated.

When you duplicate an entity, UIM generates a new ID for the duplicate entity. The way the ID is generated depends on the entity specification:

- If the specification is configured for auto-generation of IDs, the duplicate has an ID that follows the same pattern as new entities based on that specification.
- If the specification is configured for manual entry of IDs, the duplicate ID is based on the ID
 of the original followed by sequential numbers. For example, if the original ID is KNA77
 and you create five duplicates, they will have the IDs KNA77-1 through KNA77-5.

Logical devices can also be cloned. When you clone a logical device, the entity itself is copied along with the physical devices and Equipment entities in its hierarchy or associated with it.

To duplicate an entity:

- 1. Search for an entity.
 - See "Searching for Entities" for information.
- 2. In the Search Results section, select an entity.
- 3. Click the **Duplicate** button in the Search Results section toolbar.

The duplicates are created and displayed in the list of search results.

Deleting Entities

You can delete entities that are returned in search results.



You cannot delete entities that are in use in the inventory. For example, you cannot delete an entity that has been allocated as a resource in a configuration item or associated with a network node.

To delete entities:

Search for an entity.

- 2. Select one or more entities in the Search Results section.
- 3. Click Delete.

The entities are deleted and removed from the list of search results. An error message is displayed if you try to delete entities that are in use.

Duplicating Entities

Search Page

You use an entity Search page to search for existing entities and to create new entities. The Search page includes two sections.

Search Section

You use the Search section to define the search criteria to use when searching for existing entities. The entity type and specification definition determines the fields that appear in the Search section. Each specific entity Search section contains a default selection of fields plus any additional fields defined by the specification.

The following commands are common among all entity Search sections.

Command	Description
Search	Click to search for results that meet the specified search criteria, which appear in the Search Results section.
Reset	Click to reset search criteria.



Command	Description
Save	Click to save the current search criteria as a saved search and to optionally make the saved search the default. See "Working With Saved Searches" for more information.
Add Fields	Click to add additional fields to the Search section.

Search Results Section

You use the Search Results section to review, edit, and organize search results, and to create new entities. The entity type and specification definition determine the columns that appear in a Search Results section.

The search results are displayed in a table that includes standard tools for arranging content. See "Working with Tables" for more information.

The following table lists commands that exist in various Search Results sections. This list varies from entity to entity.

Command	Description
Actions	Click to see an additional list of commands for that entity type.
View	Click to alter the display of the results.
Create	Click to create a new entity. See "Creating Entities" for more information.
Clone	Click to create a new entity based on the selected entity and provide new field values. This is on limited entities.
Duplicate	Click to create a new entity based on the selected entity. The identifier is generated automatically.
Create Range	Click to create a set of new entities. You can specify a quantity and the identifiers are generated automatically. See "Creating Entities" for more information.
Edit	Click to edit the selected entity in the entity Information page.
Bulk Edit	Click to edit the characteristics of one or more selected entities. You must specify the specification in the search to enable this option and also be in the current or live business interaction context. This option is on limited entities.
Delete	Click to delete the selected entity and confirm yes in the confirmation dialog box.
Export	Click to export the results to a spreadsheet file.
Detach	Click to expand the results to a detached page display.
Select All	Click to select all entities.
Topology	Click to navigate to the UTIA application that opens the topology diagram of the selected entity.
	Note: This option is available only for property locations.

About Pages

Add Fields

Add Fields

You use the add fields page to add fields or attributes to the current page for searching and also for an edit of one or more entities. Use the single arrow to move one field from a column to the other or the double arrow to move all the fields. If both columns are empty, then this option is not available.

You can also use this page to remove fields from the current page.

Field	Description
Available Fields	This lists the fields or attributes that are available to add to the display.
Selected Fields	This lists the fields or attributes that are in the display or available for edit.

Viewing Recent Items

The **Recent Items** list, located in upper-left corner of the user interface, includes links to the ten most recent pages that you have viewed The links are ordered sequentially based on the order in which you viewed the pages.

The **Recent Items** menu displays a list of links to the pages (including the individual sections and subtabs within those pages) that you opened within the application. This enables you to quickly open the page that you want to view.

For example, if you are currently on the **Groups and Infrastructure** tab of the Summary page of a logical device with an ID of 14 and name LD_TWO, and then if you navigate away to various different pages, you can return to the **Groups and Infrastructure** tab of the logical device (with an ID of 14) by selecting **Logical Device Summary - 14 - LD_TWO - Groups and Infrastructure** from the **Recent Items** menu.

Select Clear all Recent Items to remove all links to previously viewed pages.

Back and Forward buttons are located beside the Recent Items menu, which enable you to go back or forward one page at a time, respectively. The Back and Forward buttons help you navigate based on the information in the Recent Items menu. If you select Clear all Recent Items from the Recent Items menu, all links to previously viewed pages are removed, and therefore you cannot use the Back and Forward buttons to navigate to a previous page or a forward page.

Navigating to the Landing Page from a Page

The Home icon on the upper-left corner of the user interface navigates you to the landing page from any page. See "Navigating to a Page from the Favorites Menu" for more information on the landing page.



Working with Favorites

The **Favorites** menu enables you to quickly go to pages that you use frequently. You can designate any page as a favorite and you can organize favorites into folders for easy access.

Navigating to a Page from the Favorites Menu

The **Favorites** menu lists all the pages that you have designated as favorites, optionally sorted into folders.

To navigate to a page from the **Favorites** menu:

- 1. From the **Favorites** menu, select a page or a folder.
 - If you selected a page, it appears in the main window. If you selected a folder, it expands to reveal the pages or other folders it contains.
- Continue to select until you reach the page you want to open.

Adding Pages to the Favorites Menu

You can add pages to the **Favorites** menu so that you can return to them quickly. For example, if you are working on setting up a business interaction, you can add the business interaction to the **Favorites** list so that you can return to it quickly.

To add a page to the **Favorites** list:

- 1. While a page is displayed, select **Add to Favorites** from the **Favorites** menu.
 - The Add to Favorites dialog box appears.
- (Optional) Edit the default name.
- 3. (Optional) Do one of the following:
 - · Select a folder in which to store the favorite.
 - Click **New**, enter a name for a new folder in the dialog box that appears.
- Click OK.

Managing Favorites

The Manage Favorites dialog box enables you to add folders and to remove folders and pages.

To add a folder to the **Favorites** menu:

- From the Favorites menu, select Manage Favorites.
 - The Manage Favorites dialog box appears.
- 2. Click the Add (plus-sign) icon.



The Create Folder dialog box appears.

3. Enter a name for the folder and click **OK**.

To remove a folder or page from the **Favorites** menu:

From the Favorites menu, select Manage Favorites.

The Manage Favorites dialog box appears.

- 2. Select a folder or page.
- 3. Click the Delete (cross) icon.
- 4. Click **OK** if a confirmation dialog box appears.

Arranging Favorites

You can arrange the folders and pages listed in the **Favorites** menu so that they are displayed in the most useful order.

To arrange favorites:

1. From the Favorites menu, select Manage Favorites.

The Manage Favorites dialog box appears.

- 2. Select a folder or page, then drag it to a new location.
- Click OK.

The **Favorites** menu reflects your changes.

Working with Personalization

The **Personalization** menu enables you to set any page that you frequently access as the default landing page. The **Personalization** menu also enables you to personalize the entity Summary pages to show or hide various subtabs and sections within different tabs.

You set the landing page and personalize the entity Summary pages in the Set Preferences window, which you open by selecting **Set Preferences** from the **Personalization** menu.

Setting the Landing Page

You can set any page that you frequently access as the default landing page. This page will be displayed first every time you log in to UIM.



The default landing page setting is user-specific, which means that any change that you make is applied only to the current logged-in user.

To set the landing page:



1. From the **Personalization** menu, select **Set Preferences**.

The Set Preferences window is displayed.

- 2. From the **Landing Page** list, select the entity page that you want set as the landing page.
- Click Save.



To set the UIM Home Page as the default landing page, in the Set Preferences window, click **Reset to Default**.

Personalizing Entity Summary Pages

You can personalize the entity Summary pages to show or hide various subtabs and sections within different tabs so that only the subtabs/sections you want are displayed.



The Summary page preferences are user-specific, which means that any changes that you make are applied only to the current logged-in user.

You can also personalize entity summary pages by setting the value of the **ui.**entityNamesummary.portletName.deactivate property in the UIM_Homelconfig/ system-config.properties file. This property setting applies to all the UIM users. See UIM System Administrator's Guide for more information.

To personalize the Summary page of an entity:

1. From the **Personalization** menu, select **Set Preferences**.

The Set Preferences window is displayed.

- 2. From the **Entity Type** list, select an entity. The page displays the subtabs/sections that appear within different tabs in the Summary page of that entity.
- Select the check boxes beside the subtabs/sections that you want hidden from the Summary page of the entity.
- Click Save.



To clear all the preferences for the entity Summary pages, in the Set Preferences window, click **Reset to Default**.

Working with Inventory Entities

Oracle Communications Unified Inventory Management (UIM) stores items in your inventory as various kinds of entities. Some, such as physical devices or telephone numbers, represent physical or logical resources. Other entities are used for organization or to represent business processes.

Many tasks and procedures are common to most or all entity types, including both resources and other entities. The procedures you use to create, configure, manage, and search are fundamentally the same for most entities. The features and tasks that are specific to particular entity types are covered in the Help topics for those entity types.

Creating Entities

You use the same basic procedure to create all entity types. The specific information you supply varies depending on the entity type and on the specification used to define the entity.

You can create entities in bulk by uploading a spreadsheet with all the list of entities you want to create and uploading it into UIM. See "Creating Entities and Performing Entity-Specific Tasks in Bulk" for more information.

To create entities:

1. In the navigation section, click the entity link.

For example, if you are creating a Logical Device entity, click the **Logical Device** link in the **Inventory - Resources** group.

The entity Search page appears.

In the Search Results section, click Create.

The entity New page appears.

Entity New pages include required fields that are marked with asterisks.

3. In the **Specification** list, select the specification you want to use for this entity.

- 4. If the ID field does not contain the text AUTOGENERATE, enter a unique ID for the entity.
 - By default, most entity IDs are generated automatically. Whether the ID is generated automatically or entered manually, it cannot be changed after the entity is created.
- 5. (Optional) In the Name and Description fields, enter a name and a description for the new entity. Entering a name and description is optional, but systematic naming strategies are useful in managing your inventory.
- 6. Enter information into all fields marked with asterisks.
- 7. (Optional) Enter information into non-required fields.
- (Optional) To create an additional entity based on the same specification, click Save and Add Another.
- 9. Click Save and Continue.

The Summary page for the entity you created appears. If you created multiple entities, you see the Summary page for the last entity you created. See "Working in Entity Summary Pages" for more information.

Working in Entity Summary Pages

An entity Summary page appears when you open an entity from the Search Results section. A Summary page enables you to view entity information and complete tasks.

About Summary Pages

Summary pages contain information about an entity. The Summary pages of entities are either arranged into tabs or provide information in a single view.

The Summary pages of the following entities are arranged into tabs, each of which is used for a different purpose.

- Logical Device
- Device Interface
- Logical Device Account
- Physical Device
- Physical Port
- Pipe
- Custom Network Address
- Equipment



- Telephone Number
- Party
- Place
- Network
- Inventory Group
- Custom Object

Typically, the Summary page of these entities contains the following tabs, which are common to most entity types:

- **General Information:** Displays basic information about the entity and the entity hierarchy. This tab is displayed by default when you open an entity Summary page.
- **Configurations:** Displays any entity configurations created for the entity. This tab is available only when the specification on which the entity is based includes a reference to the entity configuration specification.
- Associated Resources: Displays information about the parent entity, network nodes, and custom involvements.

Depending on the entity type, an entity Summary page displays additional or fewer subtabs in the **Associated Resources** tab. In case of a few specific entities, the **Associated Resources** tab displays information in subtabs, rather than in sections.

This tab contains the following subtabs/sections:

- Parent Entity (where Entity is the entity type; for example, Parent Logical Device,
 Parent Physical Device, and so on): Displays any associations with the parent entity.
- IP Resources: Displays IP resources assigned to the entity.
- Network Nodes: Displays any network nodes with which an entity is associated.
- Grants Media Streams: Displays any media streams with which the entity is associated.
- Custom involvements: Displays any custom associations defined for the entity with other entities that are not otherwise associated.
- Consumers: This tab contains the following sections:
 - Assignments: Displays information about the entities that are assigned to an entity.
 - References: Displays information about the entity references.
 - Business Interactions: Displays any business interactions with which the entity is associated.
- **Groups and Infrastructure:** This tab contains the following sections:
 - Inventory Groups: Displays any inventory groups to which the entity is associated.
 - Roles: Displays any roles that are associated with the entity.
 - Places: Displays any places that are associated with the entity.

The Summary pages of the rest of the entities (other than the ones listed above) display information in a single view and are divided into sections that contain different kinds of information.

The sections that you see depend on the entity type. These sections enable you to define the entity's composition, relationships, dependencies, and other attributes.



Many of the sections in a Summary page include links that enable you to update the information displayed in that section. See "Viewing and Updating Entity Information" for more information.

Summary pages also include **Actions**, **Related Pages**, and business interaction menus that you use to perform various tasks specific to the entity type.

Viewing and Updating Entity Information

You can view and update an entity's basic information from its Summary page. The Summary page displays much of the information entered during entity creation. Some data elements, such as the ID, cannot be changed after the entity is created.

To view and update entity information:

- Do one of the following:
 - For entities whose Summary page displays information in a single view:
 - Open the Summary page for an entity and click Edit.
 - For entities that have their Summary page arranged into tabs:
 - Open the Summary page for an entity, on the General Information tab, click Edit.

Alternatively, search for an entity, select it in the search results, and click the **Edit** link in the toolbar.

The Information page for the entity appears.

Update the entity information.

You can update most fields, but you cannot change the entity's ID. Required fields are marked with an asterisk.

Click Save and Close.

You return to the entity's Summary page, which displays the updated information

Working with Tables

Much of the information in pages is displayed in tables. These tables all have the same basic functionality, although not all features are available in all tables. You can choose which columns are displayed and the order in which they appear. You can also filter and sort table contents so that only the most relevant information is displayed.

All tables include a View menu with commands that control appearance and content. Tables also have toolbars that contain icons for specific actions. The selection of icons varies from table to table. Some of the icons correspond to commands in the View menu. Others

Showing and Hiding Columns

By default, tables display all the columns that are available to them. You can change the default arrangement of columns so that only the columns you want are displayed. Your changes persist only for the current session.

To show or hide table columns:

1. In the View menu of a table, select Columns.

The **Columns** menu appears. This menu includes the **Show All** option, a list of the first 10 columns in the table, and the **Show More Columns** option.

- 2. Do one of the following:
 - Select Show All to display all the available columns. The columns are displayed immediately.
 - Select or deselect a column name to show or hide that column. The changes appear immediately.
 - Select Show More Columns to open a dialog box in which you can work with all available columns.

The Show More Columns dialog box appears.

a. Select columns in the Hidden Columns or Visible Columns list and click the Move or Remove button to transfer columns from one list to the other.

Click the Move All or Remove All button to transfer all columns.



- Optional) Select columns in the Visible Columns list and click the up or down arrows to the right of the list to change the column order.
- c. Click OK.

The table displays the column arrangement you specified.

Reordering Table Columns

You can specify the order of columns that appear in a table. Your changes persist only for the current session.

To reorder table columns:

- 1. In the View menu of a table, select Reorder Columns.
 - The Reorder Columns dialog box appears, containing a list of the visible columns in the table.
- 2. Select columns in the **Visible Columns** list and click the arrow buttons to the right of the list to change the column order.
- 3. Click OK.

The table displays the column order you specified.

Filtering Table Contents Using Query by Example

In some tables, you can filter contents by using Query by Example (QBE).

When you enter criteria in the QBE fields above columns, the table is filtered to show only rows that match all the criteria. For example, if you enter **In Progress** in the **Status** QBE field and **Customer** in the **Specification** QBE field, the table is filtered to show only rows that include the entities created with a specification that begins with the string Customer and that have a status of In Progress.

Criteria that you enter in a QBE field apply only to the column below the field.

To filter table contents:

- In the View menu of a table, select Query By Example.
 - Text fields appear above the columns that are enabled for QBE.
- 2. Enter a filter criterion above a columns, then press the **Enter** key.
 - The table contents redisplays to show only rows that include the criterion you entered.
- 3. Repeat to apply additional criteria.

Sorting Tables

You can sort the contents of tables into ascending or descending order based on values in certain columns. For example, you could sort the places associated to a logical device into alphabetical order.

To sort table contents:

- 1. In the View menu of a table, select **Sort**, then select **Advanced**.
 - The Advanced Sort dialog box appears.
- In the Sort By list, select a column. Note that not all columns are available for sorting.
- 3. Click Ascending or Descending.



4. Click OK.

UIM sorts the table contents based on your selections.

Scrolling Automatically in Tables

You can scroll automatically to the beginning or end of a table.

To scroll automatically in a table:

In the View of a table, select Scroll to First or Scroll to Last.

The table scrolls to the first or last entry in the table.

Detaching Tables

You can detach tables from the page in which they are located. A detached table appears in a separate window. Detaching a table is particularly helpful when the table is long or complex. The separate window provides additional space.

The detached window includes the same menus and toolbar icons that were available for the table in the original page.

To detach a table:

In the View of a table, select Detach.

The table appears in a new window separate from the original page.

2. Close the window to return to the original page.

Entity Summary Page

You use entity Summary pages to define the content for entities.

Two menus appear at the top of the page. See the following for a description of the commands:

- Related Pages Menu
- Actions Menu

Information in Summary pages is often displayed in tables. See "Working with Tables" for instructions about using tables.

The following table lists command options that are common among multiple entity Summary pages. See the Help for a specific entity Summary page for more information about the fields and sections that are unique to that entity.

Command	Description
Edit	Click to change the values for fields that appear in the Information section.
Topology	Click to view the entity in a topology diagram that appears in the UTIA application. See "Working with the Inventory Topology" for more information.



Command	Description
Business Interaction context indicator	This indicator is visible only for entities that support business interactions. Click and do one of the following:
	 Select Current if you want all subsequent actions to be effective immediately. Actions you take after selecting Current are applied directly to the inventory, without being included in a business interaction. Current is the default option and initially appears as the field label.
	 Select from a list of the five most recently used business interactions.
	 Select Search to select a business interaction that is not among the five most recently used. See "Searching for Entities" for more information.
	Your selection sets the business interaction context and appears in the menu in the upper-left of the page. See "Working with Business Interactions" for more information.

Related Pages Menu

Use this menu, which appears on entity Summary pages, to perform operations on pages that are related to the entity. The commands that appear in the Related Pages menu are determined by the entity Summary page from which you access the menu.

Command	Description
Conditions	Select to define conditions for blocking resources from being used or assigned for a period of time or to define messages to be displayed when resources are assigned.

Reservation	Select to view, edit, or delete existing reservations or to create new reservations. Resources can be reserved by an entity or process to prevent them from being assigned to another entity or process.
	See "Creating a Reservation from a Summary Page" for more information.
Map View	Select to review the network nodes and edges visually and in relation to each other based on latitude and longitude. Network nodes must be associated with a place that includes a latitude and longitude or associated to a place that is associated with an address that has a latitude and longitude. See <i>UIM Developer's Guide</i> for information about setting up UIM for geocoding. See "Using the Map View" for more information about working in the Map View page.
Map Profile	Select to access the Map Profile page, which enables you to create custom map views. The map profile controls how a map displays when it opens for each network. You must select a map profile before you can review a network in the Map View page. There are additional implementations required to use map functionality. See <i>UIM System Administrator's Guide</i> for information about setting up UIM to use with maps. See "Working with Map Profiles" for information about setting up map profiles.

Manual Configure	Select to manually enable a pipe. This option is available for unversioned pipes with no configuration versions) only. See "Manually Enabling an Unversioned Pipe" for more information. You enable versioned pipes per configuration. See "Manually Enabling a Versioned Pipe" for more information.	
Graphic View	Select to view a visualization of the enablement of a pipe or pipe configuration. See "Viewing a Pipe Enablement Visualization" for more information.	
Path Analysis	Select to run a path analysis on the pipe. You can use path analysis to automatically enable a trail between two entities that you specify. See "Running a Path Analysis" for more information.

Actions Menu

Use this menu, which appears on entity Summary pages, to perform actions specific to the entity displayed in the entity Summary page.

The commands that appear in the **Actions** menu are determined by the entity Summary page from which you access the menu. Not all commands apply to every entity. These commands are listed in alphabetical order.

Command	Description
Activate	Select to make an entity available to support services or other resources. The inventory status is changed to Installed.
Approve Configuration	Select to change the status of service configurations in a business interaction from In Progress to Designed status. Service configurations already in Designed status are not affected.
	The status of the business interaction itself is not affected by this operation.
Associate Business Interaction	Select to associate a business interaction to a configuration version. The configuration summary must be set in the context of the desired business interaction or this action is disabled. You can use this when you want a configuration version associated to a business interaction, for instance for multiple pending configuration functionality support. This action overrides the start date of the configuration with the effective date and time of the business interaction.

When you select this option, the status changes to Suspended. You can resume or disconnect a suspended service. You can also suspend a service that is in Pending Disconnect status.
Validate	Select to validate an entity or configuration. See "Validating Entities and Entity Configurations" for more information.

Managing Entity Life Cycles

Many types of entities have a life cycle that you can manage. A life-cycle-managed entity has a set of statuses and transitions through which it moves over time. An entity's status is displayed in the Search Result section, Summary pages, and in page sections that display information about an entity.



An entity's inventory status is different from its assignment status. The inventory status reflects the entity's life cycle and the assignment status reflects whether it has been assigned as a resource.

The current inventory status of an entity governs which actions you can take and which statuses it can move to. For example, a service in Pending status can move only to In Service or Canceled status. See *UIM Concepts* for more information. See "Changing Entity Statuses" for information about changing an entity's status.

When you change the status of a parent entity, the status of any child entity in its hierarchy is also changed. For example, if you deactivate a logical device, all logical devices in the hierarchy are also deactivated.

All entities that can be included in business interactions are life-cycle managed. An entity's status and transitions can be different in the context of a business interaction than they are in current inventory. See "Working with Business Interactions" for more information.

Life cycles of configurations that are included in engineering work orders can be controlled by the life cycle of the work order. See "Controlling Configuration Version Life Cycles from Engineering Work Orders".



Changing Entity Statuses

A life-cycle-managed entity moves through a series of transitions that change its status. The transitions can occur automatically when rulesets are triggered or as the result of a manual action in UIM.

To change entity statuses:

- 1. Open the Summary page for an entity.
 - See "Opening Entity Summary Pages" for more information.
- 2. From the Actions menu, select the command for the transition you want to make.

The available commands reflect transitions that are valid for the entity in its current status. After you select a command, the Summary page refreshes and the entity's status is updated.

Working with Entity Hierarchies

Many entities include hierarchies of child entities. The hierarchy can be any number of levels deep, so a child entity can also be a parent. An entity can have any number of children, but only one parent. In addition to child entities of the same type, some hierarchies can include additional kinds of entities. For example, a logical device hierarchy can include not only other logical devices, but also device interfaces.

In some cases, the entities that you can add to a hierarchy are constrained by relationships between entity specifications. For example, if a Logical Device specification includes specification relationships to one or more other Logical Device specifications, then only logical devices based on the related specifications can be added to the hierarchy.

An entity with a hierarchy includes a Hierarchy section in its Summary page. This section displays a collapsible tree view of child entities descending from the entity you are viewing. You use this section to add and remove child entities. Child entities appear in a Hierarchy section as clickable links, which enable you to navigate to the child entity Summary page.

Summary pages for some types of entities also include a Parent section that displays a link to the parent entity. If the entity does not currently have a parent, you can add one. You can also remove a parent entity relationship.

Adding Child Entities

You can add as many child entities to an entity as you require. You can create a nested hierarchy of entities by adding child entities that themselves already have children or by adding the children directly. You can add child entities to any entity that appears in the hierarchy.

You cannot add child entities that would create circular relationships. For example, you cannot add the same entity to more than one place in the same hierarchy. UIM displays an error message if you attempt to add an entity that is not valid in that location.

To add a child entity:

- Open the Summary page for an entity to which you want to add a child entity.
 See "Opening Entity Summary Pages" for more information.
- In the Hierarchy section, expand the hierarchy to the level of the immediate parent of the child you want to add.
- 3. Right-click the parent of the new child entity, then select **Add Child**. (In some cases, the command is customized to the reflect the entity type.)

The Search page appears.

- 4. Do one of the following:
 - Search for an existing child entity. See "Searching for Entities" for more information.
 - Create a new child entity. See "Creating Entities" for more information.
- 5. In the Search Results section, select the entity you want to be the child.
- 6. Click OK.

The Hierarchy section in the Summary page is updated to include the entity you added. Click the entity name to view the child entity in the child entity Summary page.

Removing Child Entities

You can remove a child entity in the Hierarchy section of an entity's Summary page. This is equivalent of going to the child entity's Summary page and removing the child's parent.

You can remove child entities from any entity displayed in the Hierarchy section.

To remove a child entity:

- Open the Summary page for an entity from which you want to remove a child entity.
 See "Opening Entity Summary Pages" for more information.
- 2. In the Hierarchy section, expand the hierarchy to the level of the child you want to remove.
- Right-click the child entity that you want to remove, then select Remove.The entity is removed from the hierarchy.

Adding Parent Entities

You can define for an entity a single parent entity. Adding a parent entity establishes the same relationship as if you had added the current entity as a child from the parent entity's Summary page.

You can select as parent entities only active entities. Also, you cannot add an entity that would create a circular relationship. For example, you cannot add an entity as a parent that is already a child in the same hierarchy. UIM displays an error message if you attempt to add a parent entity in an invalid location.

Not all entities support hierarchies. Summary pages contain Parent sections only when the entity supports hierarchies.

To add a parent entity:

- Open the Summary page for an entity to which you want to add a parent entity.
 See "Opening Entity Summary Pages" for more information.
- 2. In the Parent section, click Associate.
- 3. Do one of the following:
 - Search for an existing parent entity. See "Searching for Entities" for more information.
 - Create a new parent entity. See "Creating Entities" for more information.
- 4. In the Search Results section, select the entity you want to be the parent.
- 5. Click OK.

The Parent section in the Summary page refreshes to include the entity.

If you want to disassociate an entity from its parent, you can delete it from the Parent section of the entity's Summary page. This is equivalent to deleting the entity from the hierarchy in the parent entity's Summary page.

To delete a parent entity:

- Open the Summary page for an entity from which you want to delete a parent entity.
 See "Opening Entity Summary Pages" for more information.
- 2. In the Parent section, select an entity to delete.
- 3. Click Delete.

The parent entity is removed from the Parent section, and the **Associate** button is enabled.

Working with Entity Configurations

You can define configurations for some types of entities. Configurations enable you to record facts about the entity that change over time and maintain a history of successive versions. For example, when you add a new VPN site to an MPLS VPN service, you can create a new version of the service configuration to reflect the change.

The following types of entities can have configurations:

- Flow Interfaces
- Logical devices
- Logical device accounts
- Networks
- Pipes
- Places (of type Site only)
- Services

You can add new versions to a configuration as the entity evolves over time. Typically, before you can add a new version, the previous version must have gone through its entire approval cycle and be in Completed status. (You can also cancel a version in In Progress status and then create a new version.) See "Managing Entity Life Cycles" and for more information.

When you create a new version of a configuration, it is initially the same as the previous version, except for the ID, name, and version number. You can make any changes required for the new version.

Configurations are separate entities that are defined by specifications. The specification of the base entity determines which specifications can be used for its configurations. When you add a configuration, you can choose from among the configuration specifications that allowed by the base entity specification.

Configurations include two features not available in other entities:

- Configuration items define the content of the configuration. They are arranged
 hierarchically and display according to the order set up in configuration specification. Some
 items are included by default in the configuration. Others you must add manually.
- Specification options define which types of entities can be assigned to or referenced by configuration items. A configuration item with a specification option includes a list of the specification types that are valid for that item. You choose the appropriate specification for the item, then you assign or reference an entity of that type.

Multiple Pending Configurations

You can have more than one pending configuration for some services. You can have multiple pending configurations, if the functionality is enabled, with pending configurations spread over a period of time for non-network services. So, you can add a new configuration version before the previous version is in Completed status. For multiple pending configurations, you must associate each configuration to a Business Interaction. The multiple pending functionality is enabled depending on a system property for the UIM installation. See "Working with Multiple Pending Configurations" for more information.

Working in Configuration Summary Pages

Entity configurations are displayed in Configuration Summary pages. Configuration Summary pages are similar to entity pages, with two major differences:

- The Actions menu contains different commands.
- Configuration Summary pages include a Configuration Items section. See "Working with Configuration Items".

Pipe Configuration Summary pages are different from others. See "Working with Pipe Configurations" for more information.

Configuration Summary Actions Menu

The **Actions** menu in Configuration Summary pages enables you control manage various aspects of configurations, including life cycle, validation, and auto-assignment of resources. These commands are in alphabetical order.

Command	Description
Approve	Select to approve a configuration version. See "Managing Configuration Version Life Cycles" for more information.
Associate Business Interaction	Select to associate a business interaction to a configuration version. The configuration summary must be set in the context of the desired business interaction or this action is disabled. You can use this when you want a configuration version associated to a business interaction, for instance for multiple pending configuration functionality support. This action overrides the start date of the configuration with the effective date and time of the business interaction. See "Working with Multiple Pending Configurations"
	for more information.
Auto-Configure	When enabled by a ruleset, select to automatically assign resources. See "Assigning Resources Automatically" for more information.
Cancel	Select to cancel a configuration version. See "Managing Configuration Version Life Cycles" and "Canceling a Configuration Version with Multiple Pending" for more information.



Command	Description
Complete	Select to complete a configuration version. See "Managing Configuration Version Life Cycles" and "Completing a Configuration Version with Multiple Pending" for more information.
Create New Version	Select to create a new configuration version. Available only when the previous version is complete. See "Adding Additional Configuration Versions" for more information.
Disassociate Business Interaction	Select to remove a business interaction from a configuration version.
	See "Working with Multiple Pending Configurations" for more information.
Issue	Select to issue a configuration version. See "Managing Configuration Version Life Cycles" for more information.
Validate	Select to validate the configuration. See "Validating Entities and Entity Configurations" for more information.

Adding the First Version of a Configuration to an Entity

The following procedure describes how to add a new configuration for an entity with no previously defined configurations. See "Adding Additional Configuration Versions" if you are adding a new version for an existing configuration.

To add the first version of a configuration:

- 1. Open the Summary page of the entity for which you are creating a configuration.
 - See "Opening Entity Summary Pages" for more information.
- 2. In the Configurations section, click **Create**. The **Create** button is active if one of the following is true:
 - The configuration entity has no existing configurations.
 - The previous configuration version has a status of Completed.
 - Multiple pending configuration functionality is enabled and the entity is a non-network service.

The Configuration Information - New Version page appears.

- 3. (Optional) Change the automatically generated ID and name.
 - The default ID and name are based on the ID and name of the base entity with the version number of the configuration added.
- (Optional) In the Start Date field, enter or select the date at which the configuration becomes valid.

The field displays the current date by default.

5. Click Save and Close.

The Configuration Summary page appears.

6. Specify configuration characteristics and specify configuration item details.

You add additional configuration versions different ways depending on if you need multiple pending configuration functionality. In all cases, after the first version of a configuration has been completed, you can add versions when the configuration details change.

If multiple pending configuration functionality is enabled, then you can also add additional configuration versions for non-network service entities before the previous version reaches Completed status.

You can create new configuration versions and change their configuration item details in the following ways:

- From the Summary or Configuration page when the previous configuration is in Completed status, see "Adding Additional Configuration Versions without Multiple Pending".
- From the Service summary page when multiple pending configuration functionality is enabled (for a non-network service), see "Adding Additional Configuration Versions for Services with Multiple Pending".

Follow these steps if you do not need multiple pending configuration versions.

To add a configuration version:

- 1. Do one of the following:
 - Open the Summary page of the base entity.
 - Open the Configuration page of the previous version of the configuration.
- In the Configurations section of the Summary page, click Create or from the Actions drop down, select Create New Version.

The Configuration Information - New Version page appears.

3. (Optional) Change the name and automatically generated ID.

The ID and name are incremented from the previous version.

4. (Optional) In the **Start Date** field, enter or select the date at which the configuration becomes valid. If the configuration version is in the context of a Business Interaction, the Start Date field will take the same value as the Effective Date on the Business Interaction.

The field displays the current date by default.

Click Save and Close.

The Configuration page appears, displaying the values from the previous version.

6. Change configuration characteristics and specify configuration item details as required.
See "Viewing, Entering, and Changing Characteristics" and "Working with Configuration Items" for more information.

Adding Additional Configuration Versions for Services with Multiple Pending

When multiple pending configurations are enabled, you can add versions for changing the configuration details when:

- · You want multiple open or pending configuration versions for a non-network service, and
- There are no configuration versions, or the preceding configuration is still in progress.
- If previous configuration pending version exists, each is also associated to a Business Interaction.
- You want multiple open or pending configuration versions on the same day but with different timestamp values.

To add a configuration version:

- Select Business Interactions and do the following:
 - a. In the Business Interaction search page, select Create.
 - b. Select the desired specification (for example, Service Order).
 - c. Enter the name as it is required.
 - d. In the Effective Date field, provide the value of the due date and time or start date and time of the configuration version. This is the date and time when the configuration version becomes valid.



If you select a **Workflow Template**, the system displays current date and time in **Effective Date** and changes the field as non-editable.

- e. Click Save and Continue.
- Open the Summary page of the Service entity.
- **3.** Expand the Configurations section of the Service entity.
- 4. In the Configurations section, click **Create**.

If multiple pending configurations is disabled, the **Create** button is active only if the previous version is in Completed or Canceled status. After you click **Create**, the Configuration Information - New Version page appears.

The Configuration page appears, displaying the values from the previous version.

5. (Optional) Change the name and automatically generated ID.

The ID and name are incremented from the previous version.

5. The Start Date field defaults to the Effective Date and time of the associated Business Interaction. You can change the Start Date and time from the Configuration Information -New Version page.



Note:

You can create multiple pending configurations on the same day but with different timestamp values.

Click Save and Close.

The Service Summary is displayed with the new configuration version.

- 8. Select the new configuration version.
- Change configuration characteristics and specify configuration item details as required.
 See "Viewing, Entering, and Changing Characteristics" and "Working with Configuration Items" for more information.

Working with Multiple Pending Configurations

For certain types of services, UIM supports multiple pending configurations where more than one configuration may be in progress at a given time. Multiple pending configuration functionality is only available for non-network services. You determine if a service is a network service by the **Network Oriented Service Type** attribute setting on the service entity. For network services only one configuration can be in progress at a time.

Multiple pending configuration functionality is enabled with a system property in the **system-config.properties** file. The default is for the functionality to be enabled. See *UIM System Administrator's Guide* for information on this property.

You can create an in-progress configuration before or after any existing in-progress configuration when:

- The multiple pending functionality is enabled in the system property file.
- Each configuration version is associated to its own Business Interaction.
- The entity for the configuration is a Service entity and it is a non-network service.

The effective date on the Business Interaction determines the start date and time value for the configuration. You can create configurations before or after a configuration that is in progress, however the start date must always be on or after the current date.

Each pending configuration version must have a different start date and time; no two pending configuration versions can have the same start date and time.

Often, when you change a configuration, it affects other pending configurations to reflect your change. The configuration items include their identifier in the name so you can see the cascading effects in future configurations.

Adding to or Removing Resources from a Pending Configuration Version

With multiple pending configuration functionality, you can add and remove resources across multiple configuration versions that are in progress. For example, you can create a new configuration version and add a new telephone number. Then, you can add another future-dated configuration, and remove a telephone number. This results in two configuration versions being in progress.

See "Adding Additional Configuration Versions" for information on how to add more than one pending configuration.

Changing the Date for a Pending Configuration Version

With multiple pending configuration functionality, you can have more than one pending configuration version for a non-network service. If it is not associated to a Business Interaction, you must first select or create a Business Interaction and associate it to the service configuration version. To change the date of a pending configuration when the configuration version is associated to a Business Interaction:

- Open the Configurations section of the non-network Service entity.
- 2. Select the configuration version for the date change.

The Service Configuration Version page appears.

3. Click the **Associated To Business Interaction** field value to display the associated Business Interaction entity.

The Business Interaction Summary page appears.

4. Click the Edit button.

The Business Interaction Information page appears for edit.

- 5. Change the date value of the **Effective Date** field.
- Click Save and Close.

The date is changed for the Business Interaction and also for the configuration's **Start Date** field. To view the configuration, select its ID value in the Business Interaction Items list.

Canceling a Configuration Version with Multiple Pending

You can cancel a pending configuration version by canceling the associated Business Interaction when multiple configurations versions are pending for a non-network Service.

You can also cancel a pending configuration version that is in between two in-progress configuration versions, provided that no resource assignment changes are made in the configuration version that immediately succeeds the configuration version that you are canceling.

Note:

If a service has multiple pending configurations, you cannot cancel the first service configuration version, regardless of the status of the resource assignments. However, if a service has only one service configuration, then you can cancel that service configuration version.

You cannot cancel a service configuration version on a service that is not in Pending Disconnect status if there are resource assignment changes in the future-dated service configuration version. However, you can cancel a service configuration version on a service that is in Pending Disconnect status, even if resource assignments are updated and are in Pending Unassign status in the future-dated disconnect service configuration version.

To cancel a pending configuration when the configuration is associated to a Business Interaction:

- Open the Configurations section of the non-network Service entity.
- Select the configuration version that you want to cancel.

The Service Configuration Version page appears.

Click the Associated To Business Interaction field to display the associated Business Interaction entity.

The Business Interaction Summary page appears.

4. Click the Actions menu, and click Cancel option.

The Business Interaction and the associated service configuration version are canceled.

Completing a Configuration Version with Multiple Pending

You can complete a pending configuration version by completing the associated Business Interaction when multiple configurations versions are pending for a non-network Service.

If a non-network Service entity contains multiple pending configuration versions, you must first complete the initial version of the pending configuration before completing the immediate succeeding version. For example, if a non-network Service entity contains five configuration versions, you must first complete configuration version 1, and then complete configuration version 2, and so on.

To complete a pending configuration when the configuration is associated to a Business Interaction:

- 1. Open the Configurations section of the non-network Service entity.
- Select the configuration version that you want to complete.

The Service Configuration Version page appears.

Click the Associated To Business Interaction field to display the associated Business Interaction entity.

The Business Interaction Summary page appears.

4. Click the Actions menu, and click Complete option.

The Business Interaction and the associated service configuration version are completed.

Disconnecting a Service with Multiple Pending Configurations

To disconnect a service with multiple pending configurations, you must have the latest service configuration version associated to a Business Interaction. To disconnect a service with one or more pending configurations (when the configurations are associated to Business Interactions):

- Open the Service entity that you want to disconnect.
- Click the Actions menu, and click Disconnect option.

A new configuration version is created and the service transitions to Pending Disconnect status. The default for the start date of the new configuration version is the date of the latest pending configuration version plus one calendar day.

Configuration versions have a life cycle that you can manage either manually or by using rulesets.



The configuration version status is different from the status of its parent entity.

	Pending Cancel	Canceled
Cancel	In Progress	Canceled
	Designed	Canceled
	Issued	Pending Cancel

To change configuration version statuses:

- 1. Open the Summary page for a configuration.
 - See "Opening Configurations" for more information.
- 2. From the **Actions** menu, select the command for the transition you want to make.

The available commands reflect transitions that are valid for the configuration in its current status. After you select a command, the Configuration Summary page refreshes and the configuration version's status is updated.

Opening Configurations

Entities that support configurations have a Configurations section in their Summary pages. This section displays the existing configurations and statuses. Versions that have been completed cannot be modified. You must create a new version to introduce any changes to the configuration.

To open a configuration:

- 1. Open the Summary page for an entity.
- 2. In the Configurations section, click the version number link of the configuration you want to open.

The Configuration page appears. The hierarchy in the Configuration Items section is collapsed but includes the default selection of configuration items.

Configurations often contain complex hierarchies of configuration items displayed in a collapsible tree view. You can expand and collapse individual lines in the tree view by clicking the triangles next to them. You can also expand and collapse the entire or hierarchy or portions of it.

To expand or collapse the hierarchy as a whole:

- Do one of the following:
 - In the View menu in the Configuration Items section of a Configuration Summary page, select Expand All or Collapse All.
 - Select the highest-level row in the hierarchy, then right-click and select Expand All or Collapse All.

The hierarchy expands to display all configuration items.

To expand or collapse a section of the hierarchy:

- In the Configuration Items section of a Configuration Summary page, select a row in the hierarchy.
- 2. In the View menu, select Expand All Below or Collapse All Below.

The hierarchy below the select row expands to display all configuration items.

To define the hierarchy and order of configuration items, refer to the configuration specification definition. For instructions on how to define configuration specifications in Design Studio, see the Design Studio Help.

Working with Configuration Items

Configuration items define a hierarchy of information about how a configuration is implemented. Configuration items can be used to assign resources to a configuration or to refer to entities that have significance to the configuration. For example, a place configuration for a VPN site can include configuration items for resources that are consumed, such as PE VRF resources and CE service locations. Similarly, a cable TV subscription service configuration could include a configuration item for a reference to an access controller. In this case, the resource is not consumed, it is referenced.

Configuration items can also be used to collect information rather than assign resources. For example, a configuration item in a VPN service configuration could have a characteristic that defines the topology of a VPN service as meshed, hub-and-spoke, or hybrid.

Configuration items can contain other configuration items, so information can be nested to reflect how resources are organized. For example, a configuration item for PE VRF resources can include other configuration items such as route distinguishers, route targets, and protocols.



The selection, arrangement, order, and content of configuration items is defined in the specification for the configuration. The specification defines which configuration items are required, minimum and maximum quantities, the characteristics applied to items, and specification options that enable you to assign or reference resources to configuration items.

If a configuration specification defines a non-zero minimum quantity for a configuration item, that minimum quantity is created automatically when you create the configuration.

The configuration name includes two portions:

- The name set up in Design Studio.
- The system generated identifier for the configuration item.

Then, you can uniquely identify a configuration item when changes are cascaded forward. These changes can occur from multiple pending configurations. See "Working with Multiple Pending Configurations" for information on this functionality.

Adding Configuration Items

When you add a configuration to an entity, the configuration automatically includes the required configuration items in the required quantities. You can add additional configuration items that are defined in the configuration's specification, up to the maximum quantity.

When you add a configuration item that includes specification options, you must assign to the item an entity based on one of the specifications. In some cases where rulesets have been defined, entities are assigned automatically. See "Assigning Entities to Configuration Items" for more information.

To add configuration items:

- Open the Configuration page for the configuration to which you want to add configuration items.
 - See "Opening Configurations" for more information.
- 2. In the Configuration Items section, expand the hierarchy until you reach the folder level that is immediately above the configuration item you want to add.
- 3. Right-click the folder and select Add Config Item.
 - The Choose Configuration Items to be Added dialog box appears, displaying a table of configuration items that are valid in this location in the hierarchy.
- 4. In the Quantity column, specify quantities for each item you want to add.



You can add quantities only up to the maximum defined for an item. Items that have reached their maximum quantity cannot be added.

Click Add Items.

The Configuration Items hierarchy refreshes to show the new items.

When a configuration item is defined for assignment, you use it to select entity to be consumed. You select a specification and then select an entity based on that specification.

UIM can be configured to assign resources automatically. See "Assigning Resources Automatically".

To assign entities to configuration items:

- Open the Configuration page for the configuration to which you want to assign resources.
 See "Opening Configurations" for more information.
- 2. In the Configuration Items section, expand the hierarchy until you reach the configuration item to which you want to assign an entity.
- In the Specification column, select the specification of the resource you want to assign. If only one specification is valid, it is automatically displayed.
- In the Actions column, click Assign.

The Assign to Configuration page appears.

- **5.** Do one of the following:
 - Search for an existing entity to assign. See "Searching for Entities" for more information.
 - Create a new entity to assign. See "Creating Entities" for more information.
 - In the Search Results section, select an entity then click OK

The entity you assigned appears as a link in the configuration item. You can click the link to go to the Summary page for the entity.

If a configuration item is defined for entity reference rather than assignment, you use it to refer to an entity that has significance to the configuration. You select a specification, then select an entity based on that specification to be referenced by the configuration.

To reference entities from configuration items:

- Open the Configuration page for the configuration in which you want to reference an entity.
 See "Opening Configurations" for more information.
- 2. In the Configuration Items section, expand the hierarchy until you reach the configuration item to which you want to reference an entity.
- 3. In the Specification column, select the specification of the entity you want to reference. If only one specification is valid, it is automatically displayed.
- 4. In the Actions column, click **Reference**.

The Reference Entity to Configuration page appears.

- 5. Do one of the following:
 - Search for an existing entity to reference. See "Searching for Entities" for more information.
 - Create a new entity to reference. See "Creating Entities" for more information.
 - In the Search Results section, select an entity and click OK

The entity you referenced appears as a link in the configuration item. You can click the link to go to the Summary page for the entity.

UIM can be customized to automatically assign resources based on default values. When you automatically assign resources, appropriate configuration items are created and resources automatically assigned to them.

Automatic assignment is enabled by rulesets. See *UIM Concepts* and *UIM Developer's Guide* for more information about rulesets. Automatic assignment can take place at the level of individual configuration items or at the level of an entire configuration. Automatic assignment for individual items occurs when you add the item to a configuration (or when it is added as a default item).



To automatically assign resources to a configuration:

1. Open the Configuration page in which you want to automatically assign resources.

From the Related Pages menu, select Auto Configure.

UIM automatically assigns resources and redisplays the Configuration page. You can see the newly assigned items by expanding the hierarchy in the Configuration Items section.

Configuration items can have characteristics that store information about the item. These characteristics are defined in the specification for the configuration. For example, a configuration item for a protocol could include characteristics that define how the protocol is implemented. Characteristics can also be assigned to the configuration itself, at the top level of the configuration item hierarchy.

Characteristics can take several forms:

- Text fields
- Check boxes
- Lists
- Calendar fields

You view, enter, and change values for specific configuration items and for the configuration as a whole.

To view, enter, or change characteristics:

 Open the Configuration page for the entity for which you want to change, view, or enter characteristics.

See "Opening Configurations" for more information.

- 2. In the Configuration Items section, expand the hierarchy until you reach the item that has the characteristics you want.
- Do one of the following:
 - Edit characteristics for the entire configuration.
 - a. Expand a configuration item.

An item called Characteristics appears.

b. Right-click Characteristics and select Maintain Characteristics.

The Configuration Item Characteristics dialog box appears, displaying all of the item's characteristics and their values.

- c. Edit the configuration as necessary and click Save and Close.
- Edit characteristics for a single configuration item:
 - a. Expand a configuration item.

An item called Characteristics appears.

b. Expand the Characteristics item.

Separate items for all the item's characteristics appear. The value of each characteristic is shown.

Right-click a characteristic and select Edit Characteristic.

The Configuration Item Characteristics dialog box appears, displaying the characteristic value.

Edit the configuration as necessary and click Save and Close.

To view tags on configuration items:

- 1. Open the Configuration page for the entity for which you want to view tags.
 - See "Opening Configurations" for more information.

You can change the entity that is assigned to or referenced a configuration item. You can change resources that were assigned automatically as well as those that were assigned manually.

To change a resource assigned to or referenced from a configuration item:

 Open the Configuration page for the configuration that contains the entity assignment or reference that you want to change.

You can remove configuration items. You cannot remove a configuration item if doing so violates the minimum quantity of the item defined for the configuration.

To remove a configuration item:



 Open the Configuration page for the configuration that includes the item you want to remove.

- 2. In the Configuration Items section, expand the hierarchy until you reach the configuration item you want to remove.
- 3. Right-click the configuration item and select **Remove Item**.

The configuration item is removed. An error message appears if you try to remove an item that is required by the item's minimum quantity or if you are attempting to remove an item that has an assignment or a reference.

Configuration New Page

You use an entity Configuration- New page to create new versions of the entity.

Field	Description
Specification	Select a specification to define the new configuration.
	Configurations are separate entities that are defined by specifications. The specification of the base entity determines which specifications can be used for its configurations. When you add a configuration, only valid specifications appear as options in this field.
Previous Configuration	Displays the number of the configurations created prior to this version. If you are creating the first configuration version, this value is 0 . This field is read only.
Version	Displays the version number of the configuration. This field is read only.
ID	(Optional) Edit the automatically generated ID, if necessary. The ID is based on the ID of the base entity and the version number of the configuration.
Name	(Optional) Edit the automatically generated name, if necessary. The name is based on the ID of the base entity and the version number of the configuration.
Start Date	Enter or select the date at which the configuration becomes valid. The field displays the current date by default.

Validating Entities and Entity Configurations

You can validate some types of entities and configurations. By default, these validations check basic integrity, but the rulesets governing them can be customized. For example, a validation ruleset might ensure that a Service configuration includes resources in the correct quantities. See *UIM Concepts* and *UIM Developer's Guide* for more information about rulesets.

To validate an entity or entity configuration:

- Open the Summary page for an entity.
 See "Opening Entity Summary Pages" for more information.
- In the Configuration section, click the version number link of the configuration you want to validate.
 - The Configuration page appears.
- 3. From the Actions menu, select Validate.

UIM validates the entity or configuration and displays any resulting error messages in the upper part of the page. If no problems are found, no messages are displayed.

Working with Visualizations and Diagrams

A number of entities utilize visualizations or diagrams, each for a different purpose. The interface for each, however, is similar.

- Service entities include a diagram of the service topology that appears in the UTIA application. See "Working with the Inventory Topology".
- Network entities include a topological view in which you can configure the network. See "Designing a Network in the Network Topological View".
- Equipment entities include a visualization feature in which you can configure the equipment's hierarchy of child entities. See "About Equipment Visualizations".
- The UTIA application displays the topology diagram of your entire inventory. See "Working with the Inventory Topology".
- Pipe and Connectivity entities include visualizations that depict their design and enablement. See "Viewing a Pipe Enablement Visualization" and "Working with the Connectivity Design Visualization".

About Visualization and Diagram Pages

Each diagram or visualization page has a different purpose and works in a somewhat different way. The basic arrangement of the page is similar for all, however:



- A large page or canvas displays the diagram or visualization. The contents of the canvas depend on the page. You can move elements in the canvas. For example, you can adjust the positions of nodes in a network diagram. Automatic layout tools are also available in some cases. See "Changing the Layout" for more information.
- A toolbar above the canvas enables you to control the view by zooming, panning, and so
 on.
- An overview section appears to the right of the canvas. This section enables you to move around in the diagram or visualization when zoomed in. See "Using the Overview Section" for more information.
- An information section appears below the overview, displaying information and links for the element selected in the canvas. See "Getting Information About Elements" for more information.

Changing the Layout

You can control the layout of elements in diagrams. (You can also move child entities in an Equipment visualization, but the reasons and methods for doing so are different. See "Moving Equipment within an Equipment Hierarchy"). For example, you may want to move the position of nodes in a network diagram to better illustrate their relationships.

There are two ways to change the layout:

- By selecting elements, then dragging them to new positions. After dragging elements, make sure to save their positions. If you move a network node, its edges automatically shift to reflect the node's new position.
- By clicking automatic layout buttons in the toolbar. Various different layout options are
 available. When you click a layout button, elements are arranged automatically into a
 particular kind of layout. The options you can use are described in the Help topics for the
 Network, Inventory Topology, and Service Topology pages.

Using the Overview Section

The Overview section to the right of the canvas shows a small-scale view of the entire diagram or visualization. You can use the Overview section to orient yourself and to move the view when zoomed in.

To use the Overview section:

- Use the Zoom or Zoom In button to zoom in on a portion of a diagram.
 - The overview displays a rectangle around the portion of the diagram that you have zoomed in on. If you zoom out, the rectangle becomes larger until it disappears when the entire diagram is displayed in the main view.
- Drag the rectangle in the overview to another location in the diagram.

The main view of the diagram moves at its current zoom level to the new location.

Getting Information About Elements

You can get information about elements that you select in a diagram or visualization. When an element represents a resource in your inventory, the information section to the right of the canvas displays the name and ID of the selected element as links. You can click the links to go to the corresponding Summary page.

In some cases, you can also open an entity Summary page by right-clicking an element and selecting **Summary Page**.

To get information about elements:

1. In the toolbar, click the Select button.

The cursor changes to a pointer.

2. Click an element in the diagram or visualization.

The entity name and ID appear in the information section to the right of the diagram.

(Optional) Open the Summary page of an entity by clicking a link in the information section.The Summary page appears.

Resources can be reserved by an entity or process to prevent them from being used by another entity or process. Any consumable resource entity (except for Pipe entities) can be reserved as long as it:

- Is not shareable. If the entity's specification is defined such that the entity can be assigned to multiple entities, the entity cannot be reserved.
- Has not been assigned. The Resource Assignment status must be Unassigned.
- Is not already reserved. Search results for entity types that can be reserved include a
 Reservation Type column that displays Shortterm or Longterm when a resource is
 reserved.
- Does not have a Blocked condition that prevents the assignment. Search results include a Condition Type column that shows the conditions applied to an entity. See "Working with Conditions" for more information about conditions.

You can create and search for reservations from the navigation section. Reservations do not have Summary pages, however.



You reserve resources by associating them to a reservation. Each reservation has a single ID no matter how many entities are associated to it. You can add resources to a new reservation that you create in the process of adding the resources. See "Creating New Reservations" for more information. You can also add resources to an existing reservation. See "Updating Reservations" for more information.



You can remove a resource from a reservation only from the resource's Summary page. See "Removing Resources from Reservations" for more information.

By default, UIM does not check reservations when resources are assigned. As a result, a reserved resource can be assigned to any entity or process.

If UIM is configured to check reservations, it requires that reservations be redeemed before a reserved resource can be assigned. See "Redeeming Reservations" for more information. See UIM Concepts and UIM Developer's Guide for information about enabling reservation checking.

Creating New Reservations

You can create new reservations and add resources to them in the following ways:

- From the navigation section. See "Creating Reservations from the Navigation Section".
- From the Summary page of a resource that you want to reserve. See "Creating a Reservation from a Summary Page".
- From the Search Results section of a search for resource entities. See "Creating Reservations from a Search Results Page".

When you create a new reservation, you specify its type as either **Shortterm** or **Longterm**. The type defines the duration of the reservation's validity, unless you supply a specific expiry date. By default, **Shortterm** is defined as 10 minutes and **Longterm** as 30 days. These definitions can be changed by modifying rulesets and can be set to different lengths for different types of entities. See *UIM Developer's Guide* for more information.

A list of entity types appears.

Redeeming Reservations

The process of allocating a resource that has been reserved is called redeeming the reservation.

If resource reservation checking is enabled, UIM prompts you during resource redemption for the **Reserved For** and **Reserved for Type** values that were entered at the time the resource was reserved. If you enter the correct values, the reserved resource is assigned and removed from the reservation. If you enter incorrect values, UIM displays an error message and the resource remains reserved.

If resource reservation checking is not enabled, a reserved resource is assigned without any check.



Resource redemption is not supported for pipe configurations.

To redeem a reservation:

- Select a reserved resource for assignment to a configuration item.
 - The Redeem Reservation dialog box appears.
- From the Reserved for Type list, select the type that was entered when the reservation was created.
- In the Reserved For field, enter the text that was entered at the time the reservation was entered.
- 4. Click OK.

The resource is assigned.

Working with Conditions

You use conditions to limit the availability of resources for a particular reason and period of time. You can also use conditions or to cause messages to be displayed when resources are assigned. For example, you can apply a condition to block a particular telephone number from being assigned.

There are three types of condition: Blocked, Warning, and Informational. By default, only the Blocked condition has an effect on the availability of a resource. A Blocked condition prevents a resource from being assigned. For example, if an Equipment entity has a Blocked condition, it cannot be assigned to a service.

UIM can be customized with rulesets to define behavior associated with Warning and Information conditions. See *UIM Developer's Guide* for more information about rulesets.

UIM enables you to define custom involvements between entities that are not otherwise associated. Involvements can optionally be based on specifications that you use to define the different kinds of associations in your inventory. For example, you can create specifications that define involvements between physical connectors and the ports they support.

UIM provides a default specification for a special kind of custom involvement called a preconfiguration. A preconfiguration enables you to set up an association among entities that makes later operations more efficient. For example, you can create a preconfiguration involvement that associates a cell phone handset to a telephone number, which is in turn



associated with a SIM card. This arrangement is not yet a service, but the use of involvements makes it possible to set up the service quickly when a subscriber purchases the phone.

The following kinds of entities can have custom involvements:

- Custom network address
- Custom object
- Device interface
- Equipment
- Equipment holder
- IPv4 address
- IPv4 subnet
- IPv6 address
- IPv6 subnet
- Logical device

- Property location
- Telephone number

If the involvement is relevant to all of the entity's roles, do not make a selection. If the entity has no defined roles, the list is empty.

In the To Role Entity list, select the role of the other entity that is relevant to the involvement.

If the involvement is relevant to all of the entity's roles, do not make a selection. If the entity has no defined roles, the list is empty.

- 11. Enter information for all required fields, and optionally enter information for optional fields.
- Click Save and Close.

Working with Roles

In Oracle Communications Unified Inventory Management (UIM), you use roles to define the functions that certain types of entities perform in your inventory. For example, a Place entity could be assigned the role of Warehouse or Data Center. Roles can have characteristics to store details. An entity can have multiple roles simultaneously, and its roles can change over time.

Entities that are role-enabled have a Roles section in their Summary pages. The following entity types can be assigned roles:

- Custom object
- Device interface
- Equipment
- Flow interfaces
- Logical device
- Network
- Network edge
- Network node
- Party
- Physical device
- Physical port
- Pipe
- Place

Role specifications determine the entity types to which roles can be assigned. For example, the Warehouse role could be restricted to Place entities. You can open a Role specification to see its valid entity types. See "Working with Entity Specifications" for more information.

Role specification can be assigned to one of the following role types:

- Technology: This role defines the technology that an entity operates under or supports.
 For example, devices and connections that support a Frame Relay WAN could be assigned a Frame Relay role.
- **Function**: This role defines the function that an entity plays. For example, a router can function as a CE device or a PE device.
- **Topology**: This role defines the topology type for an entity. For example, you might want to associate a Network entity with a topology role.
- Target. This role identifies the entity as a target for activation systems. See "About Network Targets" for more information.

Roles can also be used to qualify the relationships of other entities with each other. For example, when you create a custom involvement between two entities, you can choose which of the entities' roles are included in the involvement. See "Working with Custom Involvements" for more information.

Roles do not have Summary pages. You work with them only in the context of the entities to which they are assigned.

About Network Targets

A network target is a resource on which services or other resources must be activated. For example, in a GSM network, a voice mail service must be activated on a voice mail server. In this scenario, the voice mail server is the target for the voice mail account.

In UIM, you use the **Target** role type to identify Logical Device or Party entities as network targets. This capability enables UIM to pass information about network targets to activation systems. When you assign a Target role to a Logical Device or Party entity, it becomes a target for other certain entities associated with it. See *UIM Concepts* for more information about which entities can use logical devices and parties as network targets.

You can see information about network targets in two places in UIM:

- In Logical Device and Party Summary pages. The Roles section includes a list of all roles assigned to the entity. The Type column in the list displays Target for network target roles.
- In the Configuration Items section of Configuration pages. When a configuration includes a
 resource that has a network target, the Network Target column displays the ID of the
 target. For example, if a service configuration includes a configuration item for a voice mail
 account (a Logical Device Account entity), the Configuration Items hierarchy displays the
 ID of the voice mail server (Logical Device entity) associated with the account.

Assigning a Role in an Entity Summary Page

You assign roles in an entity's Summary page. The roles available depend on the type of entity.

To assign a role to an entity:

- Open the Summary page of the entity.
- 2. In the Roles section, click Associate.
 - The Inventory Role New dialog box appears.
- From the Specification list, select the specification of the role you want to assign to the entity.
 - If the role you selected includes characteristics in its specification, they appear in the page.
- (Optional) If the role includes characteristics, enter information as required.
- (Optional) To assign additional roles to the entity, click Save and Add Another.
- 6. Click Save and Close.

The entity Summary page includes the roles you added.

Working with Resource Management Entities

Oracle Communications Unified Inventory Management (UIM) provides several different kinds of entities that you can use to organize and manage resource entities:

- Inventory groups enable you to organize resources for a particular purpose, such as allocation by geography. An Inventory Group specifications can include an optional inventory group type that defines it as a *resource pool* limited to particular resources. See "Working with Inventory Groups" for more information.
- Network address domains a context for the uniqueness of network addresses such as IP addresses. flow identifiers, and telephone numbers. See "Working with Network Address Domains" for more information.

Working with Inventory Groups

You use inventory groups to organize entities for a particular purpose. For example, telephone numbers can be grouped into blocks that correspond to particular geographic areas. These inventory groups could be used with rulesets to determine which telephone number to assign to a new phone service.

Inventory groups are defined by specifications. For example, you could have specifications for telephone number pools or DSLAM serving areas. See *UIM Concepts* and the Design Studio Help for more information about specifications.

In Design Studio, Inventory Group specifications can optionally be associated with Inventory Group Type specifications. An inventory group type determines which entities can be included in inventory groups of that type. Inventory groups with inventory group types are called *resource pools*. For example, the VLAN ID Resource Pool specification defines a resource pool for managing VLAN IDs.

Inventory groups share many of the same features as other entities. They can include hierarchies of other inventory groups. For example, an inventory group for a service area could be broken into groups for smaller areas. You can also associate places with inventory groups.

Inventory groups can limit the types of entities they can include. If the specification of an inventory group includes related child specifications, only entities based on those child specifications can be added to the group.

In Design Studio, you can optionally associate Inventory Group specifications with Inventory Group Type specifications. Inventory group types define specific entities or groups of entities that can or must be included in the inventory group. Inventory groups with inventory group type associations are called resource pools. They are used to manage the assignment of resources in UIM.

Two Inventory Group Type specifications are include in the **ora_uim_base_specifications** cartridge:

- IP Resource Pool
- Flow Identifier Resource Pool

You can add entities to inventory groups in the following ways:

- From the Summary page of the inventory group. See "Adding Entities to Inventory Groups from the Inventory Group Summary Page".
- From the Summary page of the entity you are adding to the inventory group. See "Adding an Entity to an Inventory Group from the Entity Summary Page".

General Information Tab

Use the **General Information** tab to view basic information about the inventory group and to view and maintain the inventory group hierarchy.

Inventory Group Information	Displays basic information about the entity, most of which was defined when you created the entity. Click Edit to change this information. Some data elements, such as the ID, cannot be changed after the entity is created. See "Creating Entities" and "Inventory Group - New Page" for more information.
Inventory Group Hierarchy	Displays a tree view of the inventory group and any child inventory groups. Inventory groups can include hierarchies of other inventory groups. For example, an inventory group for a service area could be broken into groups for smaller areas. Options available in the View menu enable you to control how the inventory groups appear in the Hierarchy section. See "Working with Entity Hierarchies" for more information.

Associated Resources Tab

Use the **Associated Resources** tab to add or remove items to the inventory group and to view information about the parent inventory group.

Working with Network Address Domains

Network domains provide a context for the uniqueness of network addresses. For example, in the public domain, an IP address must be unique among all IP address on the Internet. That same address can also exist in one or more private routing domains.

Similarly, network address domains provide a uniqueness context for VLAN IDs. Flow identifiers must be unique within their network address domain.

In UIM, you can use network address domains with the following entities:

- Flow identifiers
- IPv4 addresses
- IPv6 addresses
- IP subnets
- Telephone numbers

Working with Business Interactions

Business interactions represent arrangements, such as capital projects and maintenance requests, that require actions on entities in the inventory. Examples of these actions include adding entities, assigning resources, changing entity hierarchies, and so on.

A single business interaction can involve any number of items in your inventory. See "Understanding Business Interaction Content" and "Defining the Content of a Business Interaction".

The following types of entities can be included in a business interaction:

- Connectivity
- Custom network address
- Custom object
- Device interface
- Equipment
- Equipment holder
- Flow Identifier
- Logical device
- Logical device account
- Media stream
- Network
- Network node
- Network edge
- Physical connector
- Physical device
- Physical port
- Pipe
- Pipe termination point
- Service configurations



Telephone number

All the actions taken in the context of a business interaction are made effective in the inventory when the business interaction is completed. See "Completing a Business Interaction" and "Canceling a Business Interaction".

Business interactions share many of the same features as other entity types. You create them the same way you create other entity types. Business interactions can also include a hierarchy of other business interactions. For example, a capital improvement project could be divided into smaller engineering projects, each of which is divided into work orders. You can search for Business Interactions by searching the associated Activities from the Activity Search section.

Note:

You do not have to use business interactions to make changes to the inventory. You can also make changes to the current inventory, outside the context of a business interaction. Such changes are immediately effective.

Understanding Business Interaction Content

The content of a business interaction is a set of items corresponding to the actions taken on entities while you are in the context of that business interaction. For example, if you add an entity while in the context of a business interaction, then the creation of that entity is an item in the business interaction and will become effective at the same time as the other items in the interaction.

Changes you make while in a business interaction context are not visible in the current inventory until the business interaction is completed. Similarly, changes you make in one business interaction are not visible in another business interaction context, even if the other business interaction is a child of the first.

When you associate a configuration version or a Connectivity design version with a business interaction, entities created in that business interaction context are available for reference or assignment to that version before the business interaction is completed. For example, you can create a logical device in the context of a business interaction and then assign the logical device to a Connectivity design version that is associated with the same business interaction.

Actions taken in a business interaction context on entities that are not business-interactionenabled, such as parties, places, or services, are not included in the interaction. These kinds of changes are applied directly to inventory, and are effective at the time you make them.

The inventory status of an entity can be different in different business interaction contexts. For example, you can deactivate the entity in a business interaction while it remains active in the current inventory. The current inventory status is updated to reflect the business interaction when you complete the interaction.

Note:

Some actions are prevented or restricted while operating in a business interaction context. Actions involving mapping of devices, device interfaces, ports, and connectors are not always possible in a business interaction context. See *UIM Concepts* for more information.

You can optionally associate a workflow template with a business interaction. A workflow template defines an ordered, managed set of activities. The workflow must be completed before you can complete the business interaction.

When you associate a workflow with a business interaction, the Business Interaction Summary page adds two tabs: the **Activity Details** tab and the **Gantt Chart** tab. You use these tabs to manage the workflow and its activities.

When you select a workflow from the **Workflow Template** list, the following occurs:

The **Name** field is autopopulated with a name in the format:

templateName user sequenceNumber

where:

templateName is the name of the workflow template.

user is the name of the UIM user.

sequenceNumber indicates the nth workflow that the user is associating with the business interaction. For example, a sequence number of 3 indicates that this is the third workflow that the user is associating with the business interaction.

For example, BIWORKFLOWTEMP_inv_3



You can edit the autopopulated name in the **Name** field.

- The **Effective Date** field is autopopulated with the effective date of the last activity in the workflow. This field is read-only.
- 8. (Optional) Enter information into non-required fields.
- 9. (Optional) To create an additional business interaction, click Save and Add Another.
- 10. Click Save and Continue.

The **Activity Details** tab appears, displaying a list of all the activities in the workflow in chronological order. See "Managing Activities" for more information.

You can use any or all of the following ways to define the content of a business interaction:

- You can define content by setting the business interaction context and then making inventory changes as usual in UIM. The changes you make while in a business interaction context are included in that business interaction. See "Setting the Business Interaction Context". You can define content by filtering specifications while searching for business interactions. See "Filtering Specifications while Searching Business Interactions". You can also define content by adding existing entities using the Canvas Diagram page of a business interaction and then perform actions and them, or by adding new entities using the Canvas Diagram page of a business interaction. See "Working with the Canvas Diagram Page of a Business Interaction".
- You can define content for a business interaction by creating or modifying entities from a
 Business Interaction Summary page. In this case, the changes are included in the
 interaction without your having to set the context explicitly. See "Creating New Inventory
 Entities from the Business Interaction Summary Page" and "Modifying Entities from the
 Business Interaction Summary Page".
- You can associate a workflow with the business interaction. Activities in the workflow can include the creation of resources, which become items in the parent business interaction.

The items in a business interaction are displayed in the Business Interactions Items section on its Summary page. For each item, the entity type, name, ID, action (Add, Delete, or Change), and status are displayed. You can remove items from the list and transfer items between business interactions. See "Deleting Items from Business Interactions" and "Transferring Items Between Business Interactions".

Setting the Business Interaction Context

The business interaction context is set by the application when you create a business interaction or access the business interaction Summary page for an existing business interaction.

All actions you take in a business interaction context become effective in the inventory when the business interaction is completed. See "Completing a Business Interaction" for more information. If you set a business interaction context in the Search Results section, any actions you take on groups of entities from that page are included in the interaction.

If the business interaction includes a workflow, the context indicator includes activities. If you are working in an activity, its name is appended to the business interaction name in the indicator. You can also select from all the in-progress activities in business interaction.

To set the business interaction context:

- 1. In a Summary or Search page, click the context indicator in the upper-left of the page.

 The many initially displays **Current**, the page of a business interaction, or the page of
 - The menu initially displays **Current**, the name of a business interaction, or the name of a business interaction and activity.
- 2. Do one of the following:
 - Select Current if you want all subsequent actions to take place in current inventory.
 Actions you take after selecting Current are applied directly to the inventory, without being included in a business interaction.
 - Select a business interaction from the list of the five most recently used business interactions.
 - Select Search to select a business interaction that is not among the five most recently used. See "Searching for Entities" for more information.

Your selection sets the business interaction context and appears in the menu in the upper-left of the page.

- 3. If you set the context to a business interaction with a workflow and want to set the context to an activity, click the context indicator again.
- 4. Select **Activities**, and then select an activity.

Filtering Specifications while Searching Business Interactions

While searching for Business Interactions, you can filter the specifications grouped under different clusters by choosing cluster values. However, you can only search for business interactions using clusters when you have assigned a cluster while creating a business interaction. You can customize clusters by selecting specifications you want to group. You can add the Cluster field to the search page if not already present by using Add Fields.



A specification can be grouped into multiple clusters if necessary.

Changing the Canvas Diagram Layout and View

You can change the layout of the canvas diagram as:

- Force Directed Layout: This layout displays all one-to-one connections between the nodes. This is the default layout.
- Circular Layout: This layout displays the nodes of the canvas diagram in a circle.
- Grid Layout: This layout displays the nodes of the canvas diagram in a grid. This layout has the pipe or connection crossings.

You can change the canvas diagram view as:

- Collapsed Network View: This view displays all the parent network nodes and independent nodes in the canvas diagram. The child nodes of a network node are not displayed in this view. This view provides an overview of the canvas diagram.
- Expanded Network View: This view displays all the nodes, including the child network nodes, in the canvas diagram. This view provides a detailed view of all nodes and their corresponding pipes or connections.

You manage the business interaction life cycle with menu commands. In some cases, you can make lifecycle changes for an entire business interaction life cycle with one command. Some commands apply only to business interactions created by web services.

For multiple pending configurations of non-network service entities, the life cycle is managed from the business interaction.

Approving a Service Configuration in a Business Interaction

Business interactions created by web services can contain service configurations. Their lifecycle transitions are normally run by web services, but you can also perform these operations manually.

The **Approve Configuration** command in the Business Interaction Summary page **Actions** menu changes service configurations in the business interaction from In Progress to Designed status. Service configurations already in Designed status are not affected.

The status of the business interaction itself is not affected by **Approve Configuration** command. Only the statuses of the service configuration and its items are affected.

To approve a service configuration in a business interaction:

- 1. Open the Summary page of the business interaction whose service configurations you want to approve.
- From the Actions menu, select Approve Configuration.

The statuses of service configurations in the business interaction change from In Progress to Designed.

Issuing a Service Configuration in a Business Interaction

Business interactions created by web services can contain service configurations. Their lifecycle transitions are normally run by web services, but you can also perform these operations manually.

The **Issue Configuration** command in the Business Interaction Summary page **Actions** menu changes service configurations in the business interaction from Designed to Issued status. Service configurations already in Issued status are not affected.

The status of the business interaction itself is not affected by **Issue Configuration** command. Only the statuses of the service configuration and its items are affected.

To issue a service configuration in a business interaction:

- Open the Summary page of the business interaction whose service configurations you want to issue.
- From the Actions menu, select Issue Configuration.

The statuses of service configurations in the business interaction change from Designed to Issued.

Completing a Business Interaction

You can complete a business interaction when all changes included in it have been made and are ready to be processed. The changes become effective when the business interaction is

completed. Any service configurations included in the business interaction are completed when the business interaction is completed.

You cannot complete a parent business interaction when it has one or more open child business interactions (not in Canceled or Complete status) or if it includes service configurations in In Progress or Designed status. You can, however, complete the entire hierarchy in a single operation. If you use the **Complete Hierarchy** menu command, UIM completes all business interactions in a parent business interaction's hierarchy, starting from the lowest level.



You cannot reopen a business interaction after you have completed it.

To complete a business interaction:

- 1. Open the Summary page of the business interaction you want to complete.
- 2. From the Actions menu, select Complete or Complete Hierarchy.

The business interaction is completed. If you selected **Complete Hierarchy**, all business interactions in the hierarchy are completed. The **Actions** menu now contains no commands.

Canceling a Business Interaction

Canceling a business interaction makes it permanently unavailable. You cannot reactivate it. Any incomplete service configuration versions included in the business interaction are also cancelled.

You cannot cancel a business interaction when it has one or more active child business interactions (not canceled or incomplete) or if it includes any completed service configurations. You can, however, cancel the entire hierarchy in a single operation. If you use the **Cancel Hierarchy** menu command, UIM cancels all business interactions in a parent business interaction's hierarchy, starting from the lowest level.

To cancel a business interaction:

- 1. Open the Summary page of the business interaction you want to cancel.
- From the Actions menu, select Cancel or Cancel Hierarchy.

The business interaction is canceled. If you selected **Cancel Hierarchy**, all business interactions in the hierarchy are canceled. The **Actions** menu now contains no commands.

Viewing XML Data for Business Interactions with External Systems

Business interactions can be created as the result of web service requests from external systems. For these business interactions, you can view the XML data passed into UIM by the web service. If the business interaction includes data that was sent from UIM to an external system, the output data is also visible in the transaction log.

The Summary pages of business interactions created by web services include a Transactions Log section. This section lists all of the XML inputs and outputs for that business interaction. The XML inputs and outputs are listed in descending order by date. Each row includes a hyperlinked sequence number, a timestamp, and a description.

Clicking a link opens a dialog box in which the XML data is displayed.

To view XML data:

- 1. Open the Summary page of a business interaction that was created by a web service.
- In the Transactions Log section, click the hyperlinked sequence number of an XML input or output.

The XML data is displayed, replacing the Business Interaction Summary page.

Click the Back button in the upper-right corner of the XML page to return to the Business Interaction Summary page.

You use engineering work orders to plan and implement resource infrastructure changes and have your changes all take effect at the same time.

Engineering work orders are closely related to business interactions and share almost identical functionality. Unless otherwise noted in the UIM documentation or Help, you should follow the same procedures when working with engineering work orders that you do when working with business interactions.

For example, you use the same context indicator to set an engineering work order context that you use to set a business interaction context. You also add items to engineering work orders the same way that you add items to a business interaction.

Like business interactions, you associate workflow templates with engineering work orders. See "Creating an Engineering Work Order".

Controlling Configuration Version Life Cycles from Engineering Work Orders

Configuration version life cycles are controlled by engineering work orders or by the configuration versions themselves. For example, if you include a Service entity with a configuration in an engineering work order, you can determine whether the life cycle of the work order controls the status transitions of the Service configurations.

You control this behavior with the **Controls Configuration Lifecycle** check box in Engineering Work Order pages. You can enable or disable this check box at any time, even if the engineering work order already includes items.

- When Controls Configuration Lifecycle is selected, completing the engineering work order means that all included inventory items are set to Installed status and all related entity configurations are completed.
- When Controls Configuration Lifecycle is not selected, completing the engineering work order means that all inventory items are set to Installed status, but all related entity configurations remain in In Progress status.



The **Controls Configuration Lifecycle** setting is ignored for Pipe and Connectivity entities in Pending Disconnect status. Their design versions are always completed when an engineering work order to which they belong is completed.

To control configuration version life cycles from engineering work orders:

 In an Engineering Work Order - New or Engineering Work Order - Information page, select Controls Configuration Lifecycle.

The setting applies to all configurations currently in the engineering work order and to configurations added subsequently.

You can create an engineering work order from the Engineering Work Order - New page.

To create an engineering work order:

- 1. In the Tasks All Tasks group of the navigation section, click Engineering Work Orders.
- 2. In the Search Results section, click **Create**.

The Engineering Work Order - New page appears.

- 3. In the **Name** field, enter a name for the engineering work order.
- In the Desired Due Date field, enter the date and time by which the engineering work order should be competed.
- In the Effective Date field, enter the date and time by which the engineering work order becomes active.



If you select a **Workflow Template**, the system displays current date and time in **Effective Date** and changes the field as non-editable.

6. (Optional) From the **Workflow Template** list, select a workflow.

You can optionally associate a workflow template with an engineering work order. A workflow template defines an ordered, managed set of activities. The workflow must be completed before you can complete the engineering work order.

When you associate a workflow with an engineering work order, the Engineering Work Order Summary page adds two tabs: the **Activity Details** tab and the **Gantt Chart** tab. You use these tabs to manage the workflow and its activities.

When you select a workflow from the Workflow Template list, the following occurs:

The Name field is auto-populated with a name in the format:

templateName_user_sequenceNumber

where:

templateName is the name of the workflow template.

user is the name of the UIM user.

sequenceNumber indicates the nth workflow that the user is associating with the engineering work order. For example, a sequence number of 3 indicates that this is the third workflow that the user is associating with the engineering work order.

For example, EWOWORKFLOWTEMP inv 3

You can edit the autopopulated name in the Name field.

- The Desired Due Date field is auto-populated with the effective date of the last activity in the workflow. This field is editable.
- The Effective Date field is auto-populated with the effective date of the last activity in the workflow. This field is read-only.
- 7. (Optional) Enter information into non-required fields.
- (Optional) To create an additional engineering work order, click Save and Add Another.
- 9. Click Save and Continue.

The **Activity Details** tab appears, displaying a list of all the activities in the workflow in chronological order. See "Managing Activities" for more information.

Deleting an Engineering Work Order

You can request a delete of an Engineering Work Order from the search page. You can only delete an Engineering Work Order that is cancelled. A delete of an Engineering Work Order requires you to have an additional security role of **ProjectManager**. Editing Project Information

After you create a project, you can edit some of the basic identifying information you supplied when you created it.

To edit project information:

The Name, Description, and Due Date fields become editable.

- 3. Make changes to the editable fields.
- 4. Click Save or Save and Close.

Your changes are saved. If you clicked **Save and Close**, the fields are no longer editable.

Completing a Project

You can complete a project to indicate that you have finished working with it. You can complete a project even if it has maintenance activities in Ready or Finished status.



After you complete a project, it cannot be made active again. Its activities are no longer available to be processed.

To complete a project, do one of the following:

- In a Project Search Results table, select a project and then select Complete from the Actions menu.
- In a Project Details page, select Complete from the Actions menu.

Associating Business Interactions and Engineering Work Orders with Projects

You can associate business interactions and engineering work orders with projects so that you can manage them collectively. For example, if you have a complex network infrastructure project, it might be useful to divide it into several engineering work orders that you include in a project.

To associate a business interaction or engineering work order with a project:

 The Business Interaction Search page appears.

The dialog box closes and the business interaction appears in the Business Interactions section.

You can submit maintenance activities to UIM individually or in groups. When you submit an activity, UIM processes it in the background. A progress bar indicates its percentage of completion. Activities must be in Ready or Failed status when you submit them.

To submit maintenance activities:



- In the Project Activities tab of a Project Details page, select one or more activities in Ready or Failed status.
- From the Actions menu, select Submit.

UIM begins to process the activities. Their status changes to In Progress and the progress bar indicates their completion percentage. The **Change Items** tab is updated to include a list of entities changed during the processing of the activities. When UIM finishes processing, the status of the activities change to Completed.

You can perform the following maintenance operations:

Performing a Groom Activity

After you have added a groom activity to a project, you specify the source and target entities and the source and target channels, riders, and locations provided by the corresponding entities. The source is the connectivity or pipe you are grooming and the target is the connectivity or pipe where the riders will be reassigned.

The source and target entities can be within the connectivity or pipe (intra-facility grooming) or different (inter-facility grooming).

You can perform the groom activity on the following entities:



- Connectivities
- Pipes



The Groom Activity does not work for the pipes having signal structure.

After configuring the grooming activity, you can preview the changes, then submit the activity for processing.

To perform the groom activity:

- 1. In the **Activities** tab of a Project Summary page, select a grooming activity.
 - The Groom area displays Source, Target, and Activity Items sections for this activity.
- 2. In the Source section:
 - a. Click the Connectivity or Pipe icon.
 - The corresponding Search dialog box appears.
 - **b.** Search for the entity that you want to groom.
 - c. Select one or more source entities in the search results, then click **OK**.
 - The entity Search dialog box closes and the selected entities appear in the Source section visualization.
- In the Target section:
 - a. Click the Connectivity or Pipe icon.
 - The corresponding entity Search dialog box appears.
 - **b.** Search for target entity to which groomed riders will be reassigned.
 - c. Select one or more target entities in the search results, then click **OK**.
 - The entity Search dialog box closes and the selected entities appear in the Target section visualization.
- **4.** In the Source section, expand the entity record, and select one or more channels, locations, or riders.
- In the Target area, expand the record, and select one or more parent circuits you are grooming to.
- 6. Repeat steps 4 through 7 for additional channels or riders you want to include in the grooming activity.
- Click the Add to Groom button.
 - UIM validates your selections and the changes you specified are listed in the **Change Items** tab of the Groom area.
- Go to Project Activities and select Submit from the Activities list.

- After the successful submission of the activity, open Impacted Items tab under the Groom section.
- 10. Verify the groom activity.



 (Optional) Click View Design to view the assignment changes from the corresponding summary page.

The Rehome area displays Source, Target, and Change Items sections for this activity.

The entity Search dialog box appears.

- **b.** Search for the entity that you want to rehome.
- c. In the search results, select one or more entities, then click **OK**.

The entity Search dialog box closes and the selected entities appear in the Source section visualization.

- 3. In the Target section:
 - a. Click the Logical Device, Physical Device, or Equipment icon.

The entity Search dialog box appears.

- **b.** Search for the entities to which you want to rehome.
- c. In the search results, select one or more entities, then click **OK**.

The entity Search dialog box closes and the selected entities appear in the Target section visualization.

- 4. In the Source area, expand the entity record, and select a device interface or physical port you want to rehome.
- 5. In the Target area, expand the entity record, and select the device interface or physical port to which you want to rehome.
- **6.** Repeat steps 4 through 7 for every connectivity you want to rehome.
- Click the Add to Rehome button.

UIM validates your selections and the changes you specified in the dialog boxes are listed in the **Change Items** tab of the Rehome area.

8. Go to Project Activities section and select Submit from the Activities list.

After you have added an activity for inserting a network node to a project, you select the network that contains the network nodes and edges you want to work with. You then select the network edge into which you want to insert the node and the device that you want the node to represent. The edge into which you insert the node must represent a bearer facility and not a rider.

To insert a network node:

- 5. Select the network edge into which you want to insert a node, then click **Next**.
 - The Select Device area appears, displaying Logical Device Search and Search Results sections.
- 6. Search for a logical device to be represented by the node you insert.
- 7. From the results of the search, select a logical device.
- 8. Click Next.

The Select Interfaces area appears, displaying Connectivity Device Interfaces and Device Interfaces sections.

The Target area shows the two connectivities that will result from the insertion of the node. - 9. In the Target area of the Connectivity Device Interfaces section, select the first new connectivity.

 - UIM assigns the interface and refreshes the Target area. A green check mark appears next to the icon for the Z interface of the first connectivity.
- 11. In Device Interfaces section, select the device interface to assign to the A interface of the second connectivity, then click the **Assign** button.

UIM assigns the interface and refreshes the Target area. A green check mark appears next to the icon for the A interface of the second connectivity.

12. Click Next.

You use the Project Summary page to define the content for a Project entity.



The following sections and tabs are specific to the Project Summary page. See "Entity Summary Page" for information about Summary page fields that are common among all entities.

Section or Tab	Description
General Information	Displays basic information about the project, most of which was defined when the entity was created. Click Edit to change the project name, description, or due date.



Section or Tab	Description
Project Activities	Use this tab to add and manage activities. Existing activities are listed in a table. See "Working with Maintenance Activities" for more information.
Groom	Use this section to configure grooming activities. The Groom section includes the Source section in which you select the source connectivity or pipe and the Target section in which you select the target connectivity or pipe.
	The Add to Groom button becomes available after you have made the source and target selections. Clicking this button adds the changes to the Change Items section, in which you can view the configuration of the activity. See "Performing a Groom Activity" for more information.
Rehome	Use this section to configure rehoming activities. The Rehome section includes the Source section in which you select a source logical device, physical device, or equipment and the Target section in which you select a target logical device, physical device, or equipment.
	The Add to Rehome button becomes available after you have made the source and target selections. Clicking this button adds the changes to the Change Items section, in which you can view the configuration of the activity. See "Performing a Rehome Activity" for more information.
Insert Node	Use this section to configure insert node activities. The Insert Node section includes the Source section in which you select the network that includes the network edge into which you want to insert a node. The Source section includes a network visualization that you use to make your selection. See "Visualization Area" for more information.
	The Insert Node button becomes available after you have made the source selection. Clicking this button opens the Insert Node dialog box in which you complete the configuration of the activity. See "Inserting Network Nodes" for more information.
Remove Node	Use this section to configure remove node activities. The Remove Node section includes the Source section in which you select the network that includes the network edge from which you want to remove a node. The Source section includes a network visualization that you use to make your selection. See "Visualization Area" for more information.
	The Remove Node button becomes available after you have made the source selection. Clicking this button opens the Remove Node dialog box in which you complete the configuration of the activity. See "Removing Network Nodes" for more information.
Change Items	This tab lists actions that are direct results of the activity. For example, if you selected two channels to rehome, the table in this section lists two Rehome actions. The affected entity is shown along with other information such as the source and target interfaces.
	This section is populated only after the activity has been fully configured.
Impact Items	This tab lists actions that are indirect results of the activity. For example, a grooming activity may result in the creation of gaps. The section lists the actions and includes links to the affected entities.
	Actions that cannot be completed by UIM are in In Progress status. You can follow the entity links in the table to complete the actions.
	This section is populated during the processing of the activity.



Visualization Area

Groom, Rehome, Insert Node, and Remove Node sections include one or two visualization areas in which you select entities. Most of the toolbar buttons are the same for all sections, but some are specific to certain sections.

The visualization area also includes an Overview section that displays a small-scale view that you can use for navigation. A Details section shows information about the element currently selected in the visualization.

Toolbar Button	Description
Select	Click this button, and then select an entity in the visualization.
	After you select an entity, you can perform actions on the entity. For example, you can associate resources with nodes in a network visualization.
	When you select an entity, information about it is displayed in the Information section.
Zoom	Click this button, and then drag out an area in the visualization to zoom into.
Pan	Click to pan within the visualization. When you click the Pan button, the cursor changes to a hand and enables you to drag the visualization. Panning is useful when the visualization is zoomed in and only part of the network is visible.
Show All	Click to refresh the visualization to the zoom level required to show all elements in the network.
Zoom In	Click to zoom into the current center point of the visualization.
Zoom Out	Click to zoom out from the current center point of the visualization.
Add Connectivity	(Groom activities only) Click to add a connectivity to the visualization.
Add Device	(Rehome activities only) Click to add a logical device to the visualization.
Add Network	(Insert Node and Remove Node activities only) Click to add a network to the visualization.
Save	Click to save the current positions in the visualization. If you do not save the current positions, changes you make to the layout or position of elements are lost when you navigate away from the page.
	Note: Saving positions affects only the appearance and arrangement of the visualizations, not the content of the related entities.
Clear	Click to clear the contents of the visualization.
Spring Embedder Layout	Click to arrange elements with no edge crossings or very few edge crossings. This layout is useful for depicting small- and medium-sized networks.
Random Layout	Click to arrange the elements randomly, with random- length edges.



Toolbar Button	Description
Uniform Length Edges Layout	Click to arrange elements to create edges of approximately equal length while minimizing edge crossings. The initial position of nodes affects the layout. This layout is useful for visualizing WANs.
	Networks with a star topology are automatically displayed in this layout.
Tree Layout	Click to arrange elements orthogonally in levels depending on their relationships.
Circular Layout	Click to arrange elements in a circle.
	Networks with a ring topology are automatically displayed in this layout.
Topological Mesh Layout	Click to arrange elements so that mesh relationships are visible.
	This layout is valid only in networks whose topologies include loops, such as mesh topologies. You see an error message if you try to apply it another topology.
	Networks with a mesh topology are automatically displayed in this layout.

Generating Bills of Materials

You can generate a Bill of Materials (BOM) for engineering work orders, business interactions, and projects. The BOM is based on the resource and activity specifications included in the associated workflow template, including any modifications made in UIM. (For projects, the BOM reflects the combined BOMs of the engineering work orders and business interactions in the project.)

You can generate the following types of BOM:

- Activity: Lists all activities in the workflow.
- Quote: Lists and provides the cost for all activities and resources in the workflow whose specifications have been tagged as billable in Design Studio.
- Resource: Lists all resources associated with activities in the workflow.
- Engineering: Combines the content of the Activity and Resource types.

To generate a BOM:

- Navigate to one of the following:
 - The Summary page of an engineering work order or business interaction that has a workflow template.
 - The Summary page of a Project that includes engineering work orders or business interactions that have workflow templates.
- 2. From the **Actions** menu, select **Bill of Materials**, and then select the type.
 - UIM processes data and then displays the Bill of Materials dialog box.
- Click the Close button to close the dialog box.

Managing Workflows and Assigned Activities

Engineering work orders and business interactions can include workflow templates that define an ordered series of activities to complete. You can use projects to group related engineering work orders and business interactions so that you can manage them as a whole.

UIM provides tools that enable you to manage workflows and the activities they include. You manage workflows in the same way whether they are part of an engineering work order or a business interaction.

Two groups of UIM users work with workflows and activities:

- Project managers work with workflows as a whole by monitoring progress, assigning users
 to activities, tracking the schedule, and so on. Project managers work mainly from the
 Activity Details and Gantt Chart tabs of engineering work orders and business
 interactions that include workflow templates. For information about managing workflows
 and their activities as a project manager, see Managing Workflows.
- Assigned users work with activities that are assigned to them or to their workgroup. For
 information about working with activities assigned to you or to your workgroup, see
 "Working with Assigned Activities".

Project managers and assigned users can perform some of the same tasks, such as starting, updating, and completing activities. They usually perform these tasks in different pages, however.

Managing Workflows

You can manage workflows as a whole by monitoring progress, assigning users to activities, tracking the schedule, and so on. Project managers work mainly from the **Activity Details** and **Gantt Chart** tabs of engineering work orders and business interactions that include workflow templates.

Viewing the Workflow as an Activity List

You can view a workflow associated with an engineering work order or business interaction as an ordered list of activities. From this list, you can manage the workflow by starting, updating, and completing activities, among other actions.

Many of the actions you can take on an activity in the list can also be done from the Activity Summary page.

To view a workflow as an activity list:

 In the Summary page of a business interaction or engineering work order that has an associated workflow template, click the **Activity Details** tab.

You can view the overall progress of a workflow as a Gantt chart. Each activity is shown as a separate line, with the length of the bar representing its duration. Activities that have been identified as critical are shown in red. Completed activities are in bold.

You can change the way the Gantt chart displays the workflow. You can also change the dependencies of activities in the workflow.

To monitor progress in a Gantt chart:

 In the Summary page of an engineering work order or business interaction that has an associated workflow template, click the Gantt Chart tab.

Modifying Dependencies Between Activities

You can use the **Gantt Chart** tab to modify the dependencies among activities in the workflow. For example, if a workflow creates sequential activities A, B, C, and D, you can make activity D directly dependent on activity A. This means that work on activity D can begin at the same time as activity B. All other dependencies are updated accordingly and the Gantt chart redisplays to reflect the changes.

UIM prevents you from creating circular dependencies.

To modify dependencies between activities:

- In the Gantt Chart tab of an Engineering Work Order or Business Interaction page, select an activity.
- Click the Modify Dependencies icon in the toolbar.

The Modify Dependencies dialog box appears. The activities on which the selected activity depends appear in the Current Dependencies section. All other activities in the workflow appear in the Activities section.

To add a new dependency, select an activity in the Activities section, and then click the down arrow button.

The activity moves to the Current Dependencies section.

To remove a dependency, select an activity in the Current Dependencies section, and then click the up arrow button.

The activity moves to the Activities section.

- 5. (Optional) Preview the changes to the Gantt chart:
 - a. Click the Preview button.

The Modify Dependencies dialog box displays a preview of the Gantt chart reflecting your modifications.

b. Do one of the following:

Click **Back** to return to the normal Modify Dependencies dialog box.

Click **Apply** to accept the modifications and close the dialog box.

Click **Cancel** to close the dialog box and discard the modifications.

If you accept the modifications, the Gantt chart redisplays to reflect them.

Activity Details Tab

The **Activity Details** tab displays the Activities list. The Activities list displays all the activities in the workflow in chronological order, with columns that show specific items of information.

Column	Description
Activity Name	The name of the activity, formatted as a link to its Activity Summary page.
Proposed Start Date	The originally scheduled start date and time.
Proposed End Date	The originally scheduled end date and time.
Actual Start Date	The date and time at which the activity was started. Blank if the activity is in Pending or Ready status.



Column	Description
Actual End Date	The date and time at which the activity was completed. Blank for all statuses except Completed.
Status	The activity's status (Pending, Ready, In Progress, or Completed).
Duration	The scheduled duration of the activity in days.
Assigned User	The user assigned to the activity. You can assign a user from this list or from the Activity Summary page.
Percent Complete	The percentage complete based on the Percent Complete field in the Activity Summary page.

Gantt Chart Tab

The **Gantt Chart** tab displays the workflow as a table with an associated Gantt chart. The table is collapsible. When collapsed, it shows information for the workflow as a whole. When expanded, each activity is listed in a separate row with corresponding information displayed. The calendar portion of the chart includes bars that reflect the duration of each activity (or of the workflow as a whole).

Column	Description
Activity Name	The name of the engineering work order, business interaction, or activity.
	Names of activities are indented.
Resource Name	The user assigned to the activity.
Start Date	The activity start date.
End Date	The activity end date.
Calendar	The calendar area displays the Gantt chart itself. The heading shows the dates. The corresponding activity information is displayed below the dates. You can change the date range to show a shorter or longer period of time. See Setting the Gantt Chart Time Period.

You assign activities to the users who will complete them. After you assign a user to an activity, only that user and the project manager can modify the activity.

The specification can include a list of user groups to which assigned users must belong. You set up user groups in WebLogic Server Administration Console. - Select a user from the Select User list.

The selected user is assigned to the activities.

Inserting Activities into Workflows

You can insert activities into a workflow to reflect work that was not included in the original template or to divide the work processes into different chunks. When you insert an activity, you can select from all the Task specifications for all the activities deployed to UIM.

The activity you insert can depend on the previous activity in the flow or parallel to it.

To insert an activity into a workflow:

- In the Activity Details tab of an Engineering Work Order or Business Interaction page, select the activity after which you want to insert a new activity.
- 2. Click the Create Activity icon in the toolbar.

The Insert Activity dialog box appears.

- In the Specification field, select a Task specification.
- In the Name field, enter a name for the activity.
- 5. In the **Duration** field, enter the duration of the activity in days.
- 6. Select the **Parallel** check box if you want the activity to be worked on at the same time as the activity that precedes it in the workflow.
- Click Save.

The dialog box closes and the activity is inserted.

You can associate resources with activities in the Activity Workspace area of an Activity Summary page. Most resources you associate with activities become items in the business interaction or engineering work order to which the activity's workflow belongs. When a resource



is not business-interaction-enabled, associating it to an activity does not result in a business interaction item. See "Understanding Business Interaction Content" for more information about business interaction items.

If the Task specification on which the activity is based includes an association with a resource specification, you can create that resource from the **Actions** menu.

To associate a resource with an activity:

- Open an Activity Summary page.
- In the Activity Workspace section, do one of the following:

To associate a resource based on a related specification:

a. In the Actions menu, select the name of a specification that has been related to the Task specification on which the activity is based.

A New page for the relevant entity type appears, with the specification already entered.

b. Create the new entity normally, and then return to the Activity Summary page.

The Activity Workspace section includes the new entity. The entity is also added as an item to the parent business interaction or engineering work order.

To associate a resource not based on a related specification:

a. Click the **Associate** button, and then select an entity type.

A New page for the entity type appears.

b. Create the new entity normally, and then return to the Activity Summary page.

The Activity Workspace section includes the new entity. The entity is also added as an item to the parent business interaction or engineering work order.

You can search for telephone number blocks from within activities in the Activity Workspace area of an Activity Summary page.

To search for telephone number blocks from within an activity:

The Telephone Number Blocks page appears.

- Enter the search criteria in the desired fields. Some fields require that you enter text; others allow you to select from lists.
- 4. In the Block Size field, enter the telephone number block size. This is a mandatory field.
- 5. Click Search TN Blocks.

Project managers keep track of the progress of activities in engineering work orders and business interactions for which they are responsible. To keep this information up to date, you record your progress on an activity as you work on it.

You can update the progress of an in-progress activity and change its duration. Changing the duration of an activity affects the dates for other activities dependent on it.

To update activity progress from the Activity Summary page:

- In the Activity Information section of an Activity Summary page, click the Edit button.
- 2. In the **Percent Complete** field, adjust the slider to the appropriate value.
- 3. Click Save.

After an activity has been completed, you can reopen it for additional work. After you reopen the activity, its status is reset to Ready and you must start it again to make changes.

You can reopen a completed activity from the **Activity Details** tab or from the **Activity Summary** page. Reopening activities requires that you have a project manager role and privileges.

Working with Checklists

Checklists can be associated with activities to provide specific steps that must be completed. If a checklist is associated with an activity, it is created when you start the activity.

As you work, you mark checklist items as complete. You do not have to complete the items in order, but they must all be complete before you complete the activity.

The Activity Summary pages of activities with associated checklists include a Checklist section. Activities with checklist include a checklist icon in the Activities list.

You can add items to checklist. For example, if the specification for the checklist does not include steps that are necessary for this particular activity, you can add them.

- 2. Click in the Item Name column of the new row and enter a name for the item.
- 3. (Optional) Click in the Comment column of the new row to enter additional information.

Entity bulk operations enable you to create multiple entities and perform various operations on multiple entities at a time, based on the data you provide as input in various tabs in a spreadsheet file. You can create entities and perform entity-specific tasks in bulk using the Automated Bulk Import section in the Activity Summary page.

You can create the following entities by specifying the required information in the spreadsheet file:

- Property location
- Network entity code
- Logical device
- Physical device
- Equipment
- Connectivity



Network

You can perform the following actions by specifying entity-specific information in the spreadsheet file:

- Associate logical devices, physical devices, and equipment
- Add a shelf in a rack
- Add a card to a slot in a shelf
- Map a physical device to a logical device
- Map a physical device to equipment, and map a physical device to a logical device at the same time
- Map a device interface to a port
- Add connectivities to a network
- Add network nodes
- Add network edges

You can use the *UIM_Homelconfig/inventoryimport.properties* file to define column headers in spreadsheets for importing entities.

In the respective tab of the downloaded spreadsheet, always fill the **Action** column as **Create**.

You can add any number of characteristics to the elements you want to create by adding new characteristic columns in the corresponding spreadsheet tabs.



d. Save and close the spreadsheet.

Click Process.

UIM processes the input data you provided in various tabs in the spreadsheet file.

Working with Services and Service Configurations

Service entities and their service configurations represent how resources in your inventory are used to deliver products to customers.

- Service entities store the basic information that is unlikely to change, such as the service name and description.
- Service configurations capture the details about the resources used by the service. As the facts about a service change over time, new versions of the service configuration can be created.

Service entities share many of the same features as other entities. You can control the service life cycle, associate parties and places, and validate the service's content. See "Managing Entity Life Cycles", "Adding the First Version of a Configuration to an Entity", "Associating Places to Entities", and "Validating Entities and Entity Configurations" for more information. You can also assign conditions to services and reserve them.

UIM includes specialized functionality for network-oriented services that support packet connectivity. For example, UIM supports Carrier Ethernet services. See About Network-Oriented Services for more information.

About Service Configurations

You can create configurations for Service entities. Using configurations enables you to create new versions as a service evolves over time.

Service configurations have the same features and functionality as other configurations. You can assign or reference resources and maintain characteristics. If auto-assignment rulesets have been defined for the service, you can automatically assign or reference required resources.

In some cases, service configurations can be created automatically. You can configure UIM so that when there is only a single Service Configuration specification associated with a Service specification, a configuration version is created automatically when you create a service. See *UIM Concepts* and *UIM System Administration Guide* for more information.

Unlike other types of configurations, service configurations include a topology diagram. Also, unlike other types of configurations, non-network services can have multiple pending configurations. See *UIM Concepts* for more information.

You can view the topology of a service or a service configuration using the UTIA application. See "Working with the Inventory Topology" for more information.



Network-oriented services do not use the service topology feature. Because network-oriented services are always associate with a service network, you view the topology of the network instead. See "About Network-Oriented Services" for more information.

If you view the topology of the service, it reflects the current configuration. If you view the topology of a specific configuration, it reflects the content of that configuration.

The topology is displayed graphically, with icons representing resources assigned to configuration items. The following resources are shown in the Topology page by default:

- Custom object
- Equipment
- · Logical device
- Network
- Physical device
- Place (site or location only)

Physical ports and connectors in the service are represented by an icon for the equipment or physical device in which they are located. Device interfaces are represented by an icon for their parent logical devices. Pipes are represented by lines that connect resources.



In most cases, the topology diagram shows only resources that are included in the current service or service configuration. If one of the resources is the termination point of a pipe, however, the other termination point is also shown even if it is not part of the service or service configuration.

The topology diagram includes a canvas area where the diagram is displayed. The page has a number of tools that enable you to control the topological display, including a toolbar, an overview section, and an information section. See "Working with the Inventory Topology" for more information.

About Network-Oriented Services

UIM supports network-oriented services that include multipoint and point-to-point connectivity. For example, the Carrier Ethernet cartridge includes specifications for E-Line, E-LAN, and E-Tree services. Each of these Service specifications is accompanied by a matching Service Configuration specification.



Network service configurations have a different life cycle from those of other service configurations. They do not have to be complete before the creation of a new configuration.

Multipoint and rooted multipoint service arrangements, such as E-Tree services, comprise a parent or *network service* along with two or more member services. There is a separate member service for each service location. A *service network*, which specifies the devices and connectivities that fulfill the service, provides a unified view of the arrangement. This service network is automatically created when you create the service.

Point-to-point service arrangements do not require separate network and member services. A single service, such as an E-Line service, represents the entire arrangement. The service configuration includes items for service locations and other required resources.



See Configuring Network-Oriented Services for information about how you assign and reference the resources required for network-oriented services.

Configuring Network-Oriented Services

You specify the resources required for a network service by assigning and referencing them as configuration items in the service configuration. See "Working with Entity Configurations" for information about working with configurations in general.

UIM automates some configuration operations for network-oriented services under certain circumstances. This automation relies on the definition of specifications as Network Services and Member Services in Design Studio.

- When you create an entity based on a Service specification that has been defined as a network service, UIM automatically creates a service network and assigns it to the Service configuration.
- When you assign a member service to the service configuration, UIM automatically
 populates the service network configuration and topology with data from the member
 service. This information, including the service location and the PVN, is gathered from the
 Service connectivity. If no connectivity has been assigned, then the data is not added to
 the network configuration and topology. When the connectivity is assigned, however, the
 data is added automatically.
- The service network assigned to the network service is updated automatically as you make configuration changes. For example, if you make a change to a member service assigned to the network service, that change is automatically reflected in the service network.

You use the Service - New page to create new services.

Working with Parties

Party entities represent the people and organizations that interact with your inventory. For example, you could have Party entities for individuals such as contacts, employees, subscribers, and decision makers. You could also have Party entities for vendors, resellers, service providers, and customers.

You can associate parties to different types of entities, including products, services, network nodes, places, and pipe termination points. The method you use to make the associations varies by to entity type.

An association with a party is often qualified with a role. You can select the roles that are valid for a party in its Summary page. Additionally, you can associate places with parties (for example, to specify the location of a business or location), and parties can be included in inventory groups.

Associating Parties to Entities

You can associate parties to entities to identify related individuals or organizations. If the parties have roles assigned to them, you can specify the role that is relevant to the association.

To associate a party to an entity:

- Open the Summary page for an entity.
- 2. Click the **Groups and Infrastructure** tab.
- 3. In the Parties section/subtab, click Associate.

The Associate Party dialog box appears.

- Search for or create a Party entity.
- In the Search Results section, select the party that you want to associate with the entity.
- 6. Click OK.

The Parties section/subtab in the Summary page refreshes to include the entity.

(Optional) In the Party Role list, select a role.

The list is empty if no roles are assigned to the party. For Service entities, you can create a new role if necessary.

You can select the roles that can be used to qualify an entity's association with a particular Party entity. For example, if you have a Party entity for a company, you could limit its possible roles to Supplier, Customer, and Partner.



Role specifications define the entity types to which the role can be applied. The list of roles from which you select includes only the roles that can be applied to Party entities.

To select roles for a party:

- Open the Summary page of the Party entity for which you want to select roles.
- Click the Groups and Infrastructure tab.
- In the Roles section, click Associate.

The Party Role Information dialog box appears.

- 4. From the **Specification** list, select the specification of the role you want to include.
 - If characteristics have been added to the specification for the role you selected, additional fields appear in the page.
- 5. If any additional fields appear, enter the required information.
- 6. (Optional) To add additional roles, click Save and Add Another
- Click Save and Close.

The role appears in the Roles section for the party.

Associated Resources Tab

You use the **Associated Resources** tab to view any network nodes with which a Party entity is associated. The association occurs when you select a Party entity to be represented by a node or element in a network.

The same entity can be represented by nodes in different networks. For each network association, you can see the network name, network description, node name, and node description. Click the ID to view the Network Summary page.

Groups and Infrastructure Tab

You use the **Groups and Infrastructure** tab to view information about the places, inventory groups, and roles associated with the party.

Section	Description
Places	Displays any places that are associated with the party. The association can imply that the party is located at the place or that there is some kind of relationship between the entities.
	The fields that appear in the Places section are common among multiple entities. See "Entity Summary Page" for more information. See "Associating Places to Entities" for information about creating new place associations.
Inventory Groups	Displays any inventory groups to which the party is associated. You use inventory groups to organize entities for a particular purpose.

Roles	Displays any roles that are associated with the Party entity.

Working with Equipment and Devices

In Oracle Communications Unified Inventory Management (UIM), you use three different groups of entity types to represent logical and physical equipment and devices in your inventory:

- Equipment entities represent physical units of hardware. Their hierarchies can include other Equipment entities as well as equipment holders, physical ports, and physical connectors.
- Physical Device entities group physical resources. Physical devices can provide physical ports and connectors. Their hierarchies can contain other physical devices as well as equipment.
- Logical Device, Device Interface, and Logical Device Account entities represent logical inventory in the network. Logical devices and logical device accounts can have configurations. Logical devices can include device interfaces.

These different types of entities can have associations that represent their relationships in the network. You can associate a physical device to a logical device. This association enables the more granular mapping of ports and connectors provided by the physical device (including equipment and physical devices in its hierarchy) to the device interfaces of the associated logical device. Equipment in a physical device hierarchy is indirectly associated to a logical device associated with the parent physical device.

Working with Equipment

Equipment entities represent physical units of hardware such as cards, racks, and shelves. Equipment can provide slots (represented by Equipment Holder entities) that hold cards. Cards can occupy a single slot or multiple slots depending on how they are defined.

Equipment entities can include a hierarchy of other equipment, equipment holders (slots), physical ports, and physical connectors.

Equipment entities share many of the same features as other entities. They are topology-enabled, so you can search for them in the topology diagram using the UTIA application. See "Working with the Inventory Topology" for more information. You can include them in inventory groups, custom involvements, reservations, and business interactions. You can also apply conditions to them, associate them with places, and manage their life cycles.

Because you might require many entities of the same type of equipment, you can create multiple Equipment entities simultaneously.

Creating an Equipment Range

In a single operation, you can create a range of Equipment entities based on the same Equipment specification. For example, you could simultaneously create a number of interface cards based on the same specification.

When you create a range of Equipment entities that automatically generate IDs, you specify only the quantity of entities to create. If the Equipment specification requires manual entry of IDs, you must specify both a starting ID and a quantity.

To create a range of Equipment entities:

- In the Inventory Resources group of the navigation section, click Equipment.
 - The Equipment Search page appears.
- 2. In the Search Results section, click **Create Range**.
 - The Equipment Range New page appears.
- 3. In the **Specification** list, select the Equipment specification you want to use for the entities you create.
 - The page refreshes to reflect the characteristics in the selected specification.
- 4. In the Starting ID field, enter the first ID to use for the entities. This is required only if the Equipment specification does not include ID autogeneration.
 - The ID must be numeric so that it can be incremented.
- 5. In the **Quantity** field, enter the number of entities to create.
- 6. Click Save and Close.

The Equipment page reappears, listing the newly created entities in a search results table.

About Equipment Hierarchies

Like other entity types, Equipment entities can include a hierarchy. The way you work with an equipment hierarchy is different from the way you work with other types of hierarchies, however.

You use the Equipment View page to view and manage the hierarchy. This page includes a tree view and a visualization of the equipment. See "Equipment View Page" for information about this page.

An equipment hierarchy can include:



- Other equipment, such as a shelf in a rack
- Equipment holders (or slots) that contain cards, such as interface cards
- Physical ports, which are the places where communication begins or ends
- Physical connectors, which are used to physically connect hardware for signal or power transmission
- Parent equipment to which the selected equipment is associated

Equipment holders, physical ports, and physical connectors are defined by specifications, but you cannot work with them independently. You can work with them only in the context of Equipment entities. (Physical ports and connectors can also be provided by physical devices.)

Specifications for Equipment entities can require that equipment holders, physical ports, and physical connectors be created automatically when you create the equipment. Equipment holders can be added *only* automatically during the creation of an Equipment entity, but you can add ports and connectors manually. See "Adding Physical Ports and Connectors in an Equipment Hierarchy" for instructions.

You can also manually add equipment in an equipment hierarchy; for example, by adding cards to slots or shelves to racks. See "Adding Equipment to an Equipment Hierarchy" and "Adding New Equipment to an Equipment Hierarchy" for more information.

Opening the Equipment View Page

There are two ways to open the Equipment View page. One is from the Summary page of an Equipment entity. The other is from search results. If you open the Equipment View page from search results, it can include more than one Equipment entity.

When you open the Equipment View page, a visualization of the equipment is displayed automatically in the middle column.

To open the Equipment View page from a Summary page:

- Open the Summary page of an Equipment entity.
- Click the Tree View tab.

In the Equipment View page, the tree view is in the left section. The right section can contain an equipment visualization.

To open the Equipment tree view from a search results:

- Search for Equipment entities.
 - See "Searching for Entities" for more information.
- 2. In the Search Results section, select an Equipment entity.
- 3. From the Actions menu, select Tree View.

The **Tree View** tab opens, displaying the Equipment View page. The tree view is in the left section. It contains top-level entries for the Equipment entities that you selected.

Working with Equipment Hierarchy

On the **Tree View** tab of an Equipment Summary page, the Equipment View page displays an equipment hierarchy as a collapsible table. The top-level Equipment entity is labeled with its specification name followed by its ID; child entities are labeled with their slot numbers followed by their IDs. If a slot has been assigned a value for the Native EMS Name data element, it is displayed in parentheses after the slot number.

The tree view and the visualization are synchronized. Selections you make in the tree view are reflected in the visualization. The reverse is also true. See "Selecting Entities in the Equipment View Page" for more information.

In most cases, you can perform tasks in either the tree view or the visualization (or a combination of the two). There are several tasks you can perform in only the tree view. See "Removing and Deleting Child Entities from an Equipment Hierarchy" for more information.

Selecting Entities in the Equipment View Page

To select entities in the Equipment View page:

- On the Tree View tab, in an Equipment View page, click the arrow icons next to child entities to expand the hierarchy and display the entity you want to select.
- Click an entity to select that entity.

The entity is highlighted and the entity is surrounded by a red rectangle in the visualization.

The legend at the top of the visualization shows different states of ports, slots, sub-cards, etc, with their corresponding colors used to represent them in the visualization. This can be customized according to your requirements by using the properties present in the *visualization.properties* file. For more information on using these properties, see "Customizing Visualization for Equipment View" in *UIM System Administrator's Guide*.

The name of the entity is displayed in the visualization as a label. You can refer to the information icon at the bottom of the visualization that details the information about the entity itself.

About Equipment Visualizations

You can use a visualization of an Equipment entity to see and modify its composition. The content of the visualization is defined by the specification used to create the entity and by the type of entity. For example, the visualization for a card is different from the visualization of a



rack, sub-card, holder or sub-holder. The visualization of a shelf with 8 slots is different from one with 12 slots.



If an entity is based on a specification that does not have a visualization defined, the equipment visualization feature is not available.

The visualization is displayed on a canvas that includes a number of tools that enable you to control the view. Many of these tools are common to other graphically based features in UIM. See "Working with Visualizations and Diagrams" for information about these tools.

You can view additional information about the entity selected in the visualization such as occupied slots, free slots, consumed ports, free ports and so on, in the table that appears next to the visualization.

Opening an Equipment Visualization

You can open the visualization of an equipment from the Equipment View Page.

To view the visualization of any equipment:

- 1. Select the desired equipment from the tree view on the left.
- From the Actions menu, select Open Visual.

The visualization of the desired equipment will appear.

For any card or sub-card selected on the visualization canvas, you can view its visualization by right-clicking on it and selecting the **Open Visual** from the menu that appears. This will open the visualization of only the card and sub-card.

Clearing an Equipment Visualization

You can clear the contents of an equipment visualization. When you reopen the visualization after clearing, it displays items in their last-saved positions.

To clear an equipment visualization:

UIM prevents you from adding a multi-slot card if not enough contiguous slots are available.

You can add new equipment to an equipment hierarchy. For example, you add a new card to an empty slot or a new shelf to a rack. You can use either the tree view or the visualization to add the new equipment. The following procedure demonstrates the task using the tree view.

To add new equipment to an equipment hierarchy:

 Open the Equipment View page for the Equipment entity to whose hierarchy you are adding.

The dialog box closes and the new equipment appears in both the tree view and the visualization. If you add a card that occupies multiple slots, cards appear in all the required slots. In the tree view, the first slot displays the card name; other required slots display the word **Occupied**. UIM prevents you from adding a multi-slot card if not enough contiguous slots are available.

Adding Physical Ports and Connectors in an Equipment Hierarchy

You can add physical ports and connectors to an equipment hierarchy.

- A physical port is where communication begins or ends on a physical device or unit of equipment.
- A physical connector links or connects hardware units for the transmission of signals or power.

You can add physical ports and connectors only if the Equipment specification is related to port or connector specifications. In some cases, this relationship requires a minimum number of ports or connectors. The minimum number is added automatically when you create an Equipment entity based on that specification. You can add additional ports and connectors up to the maximum prescribed by the relationship. Typically, the minimum and maximum values are the same because the number of ports and connectors provided by a particular type of equipment does not vary.

Physical ports and connectors are themselves defined by specifications, but you can work with them only in the context of an Equipment or Physical Device hierarchy. You can add only new physical ports and connectors. You cannot add existing ports and connectors because there is no way to create them independently.

You can add physical jumpers to connect ports in the same Equipment entity or in different entities that share the same location.

To add physical ports and connectors to an equipment hierarchy:

- 1. Open an Equipment View page.
 - See "Opening the Equipment View Page" for more information.
- Expand the hierarchy to display the Equipment entity to which you are adding ports or connectors.
- 3. Select the entity, then select **Create Port** or **Create Connector** from the **Actions** menu.
 - The Physical Port New dialog box or Physical Connector New dialog box appears.
- Enter a quantity.



You can add only the number of ports or connectors allowed by the relationship between the Equipment specification and the Port or Connector specification. If you attempt to create more, you will see an error message when you save and close the dialog box.

- 5. Enter any other required or optional information.
- 6. Click Save and Close.

The dialog box closes and the new ports or connectors appear in the tree view.

You can move equipment within an equipment hierarchy. For example, you can move a card from one slot to any empty slot. You can also move between different subhierarchies. If there are two racks with hierarchies in the tree view, for example, you could move a shelf from one rack to the other.

To move equipment within an equipment hierarchy:

- Open an Equipment View page.
 - See "Opening the Equipment View Page" for more information.
- 2. Expand the hierarchy to display the equipment that you want to move.
- Select the equipment, then select Move from the Actions menu.
- Select the destination, then select Move To from the Actions menu.
 The tree view and visualization display the equipment in its new location.

Copying Equipment in an Equipment Hierarchy

You can copy and paste equipment in equipment hierarchies. For example, you can copy a shelf, including any slots and cards it contains, and paste it to another location in a rack. You can also copy and paste between different subhierarchies. If there are two racks with hierarchies in the tree view, you could copy a shelf from one rack and paste it in the other.

UIM creates all the new entities required, copies the characteristics of the originals, and changes the IDs. The copy process does not copy associations such as those to places and inventory groups, however.

To copy equipment in an equipment hierarchy:

- Open an Equipment View page.
 See "Opening the Equipment View Page" for more information.
- 2. Expand the hierarchy to display the equipment that you want to copy.



- 3. Select the equipment, then select **Copy** from the **Actions** menu.
- Select the destination, then select Paste from the Actions menu.

The tree view and visualization display the copied equipment in the new location. You can edit identifying information if necessary, but you cannot change the IDs.

To remove or delete a child entity from an equipment hierarchy:

- 1. Open an Equipment View page.

The child entity, including any of its own children, is removed. If you selected **Delete**, the child entity is also deleted from the inventory.

You can associate network locations manually when you create an Equipment entity or by editing an existing entity. Associations can also be made automatically by propagation through logical device, physical device, and equipment hierarchies. You cannot manually associate a network location to an Equipment entity that has already been assigned one by propagation. See *UIM Concepts* for more information about the rules that govern these propagations.

To associate an Equipment entity to a network location:

- 1. Open the Equipment Summary page of an Equipment entity.
- 2. On the **General Information** tab, in the Equipment Information section, click **Edit**.
- 3. In the **Network Location** field, enter the first few characters of a network location, then select the location you want to associate.

The location appears in the **Network Location** field.

You can associate an Equipment entity to a Physical Device entity to indicate that the physical device includes the equipment. The physical device can in turn be associated to a logical device.

An Equipment entity can be associated with only one physical device, but a physical device can be associated with any number of Equipment entities.

To associate an Equipment entity to a physical device:



- Open the Summary page of the Equipment entity to which you want to associate a physical device.
- Click the Associated Resources tab.
- In the Physical Devices section, click Associate.

The Associate Physical Devices dialog box appears.

- 4. Search for or create a physical device.
- 5. In the Search Results section, select a Physical Device entity.
- 6. Click OK.

The dialog box closes and the Physical Devices section in the Summary page refreshes to include the entity.

General Information Tab

You use the **General Information** tab to view and edit basic information about the entity, most of which was defined when you created the entity. Click **Edit** to change this information. Some data elements, such as the ID, cannot be changed after the entity is created. See "Equipment - Information Page" for more information.

Associated Resources Tab

You use the **Associated Resources** tab to view information about the network nodes, custom involvements, and physical devices of the equipment.

Section	Description
Network Nodes	Displays any network nodes with which an Equipment entity is associated. The association occurs when you select an Equipment entity to be represented by a node in the network.
	The same Equipment entity can be represented by nodes in different networks. For each network association, you can see the network name, network description, node name, and node description.
Custom Involvements	Displays any custom associations defined for the equipment with entities that are not otherwise associated. See "Working with Custom Involvements" for more information.
Physical Devices	Displays any physical devices with which the Equipment entity is associated. See "Associating Equipment to a Physical Device Hierarchy" for more information.

Consumers Tab

You use the **Consumers** tab to view any business interactions with which the equipment is associated. See "Working with Business Interactions" for more information.

Tree View Tab

The **Tree View** tab contains the Equipment View page, which enables you to view and define an equipment hierarchy. See "Equipment View Page" for more information.

Equipment View Page

You use the Equipment View page to view and define an equipment hierarchy.

Equipment Area

The left column contains a tree view of the equipment hierarchy. You can expand the hierarchy to see, select, add, move, copy, and remove child entities. You also open the equipment visualization from the tree view. The tree view and visualization are synchronized. When you select a child entity in the tree view, that entity is also selected in the visualization. See "Working with Equipment Hierarchy" for more information.

Visualization Area

The middle column displays a canvas for the visualization of the Equipment entity and its children. You can select, add, move, copy, and remove child entities. You can also change the view. The visualization is synchronized with the tree view. When you select an item in the visualization, it is also selected in the tree view. See "About Equipment Visualizations" for more information.

Field	Description
Select	Click this button, then select an Equipment entity in the visualization area.
	After you select an entity, you can perform actions on the entity. For example, you can add child entities to the equipment hierarchy.
	When you select an entity, information about it is displayed in the Details section.
Zoom	Click this button, then drag out an area in the diagram to zoom in on that area.



Field	Description
Pan	Click to move the visualization within the canvas to display another area.
	When you click this button, the cursor changes to a hand, and enables you to drag the visualization to display a different area. Panning is useful when the visualization is enlarged so that only part of the visualization is viewable.
Show All	Click to refresh the diagram to the zoom level required to show all elements in the diagram.
Zoom In	Click to enlarge the diagram on the current center point of the diagram.
Zoom Out	Click to reduce the size of the diagram on the current center point of the diagram.
Save Shelf Positions	Click to save the current shelf positions in the visualization. If you do not save the current positions, changes you make to the layout or position of elements are lost when you navigate away from the page.
	Note: Saving positions affects only the appearance and arrangement of the visualization, not the content of the related entities.
Clear Visual	Click to clear the contents of an equipment visualization. When you reopen the visualization after clearing, it displays items in their last-saved positions

Details Area

The right column displays information about the item that is selected in the tree view and visualization. The name, ID, and specification of the selected item is shown. For cards, the ID and specification of the equipment holder is also displayed. The information is displayed as links that you can click to go to the Summary page of an entity or specification.

Working with Logical Device Entities and Logical Device Configurations

Logical Device entities and their configurations provide a functional view of resources in your inventory. Logical devices are not physical, but they can be mapped to the physical devices and the media streams that they control.

Logical device hierarchies can include other logical devices as well as device interfaces. Device interfaces define access points into the device. These interfaces can be mapped to ports and connectors on an associated physical device (or on equipment and physical devices in the hierarchy of the parent physical device).

Logical devices can also be associated with logical device accounts.

Logical device configurations represent the state of the device at a particular point in time. You can create new configuration versions to reflect changes.

Logical device entities include many of the same features as other entities. You can include them in custom involvements, reservations, business interactions, and inventory groups. You



can also assign conditions to them. In addition, you can associate places with them and manage their life cycles.

Creating a Range of Logical Devices

In a single operation, you can create a range of logical devices based on the same specification. For example, you could simultaneously create a number channel banks based on the same specification.

When you create a range of logical devices that automatically generate IDs, you specify only the quantity of entities to create. If the specification requires manual entry of IDs, you must specify both a starting ID and a quantity.

To create a range of logical devices:

- In the Inventory Resources group of the navigation section, click Logical Devices.
 The Logical Device Search page appears.
- 2. In the Search Results section, click **Create Range**.
 - The Logical Device Range New page appears.
- 3. In the **Specification** list, select the Logical Device specification you want to use for the entities you create.
 - The page refreshes to reflect the characteristics in the selected specification.
- In the Starting ID field, enter the first ID to use for the entities. This is required only if the Logical Device specification does not include ID autogeneration.
 - The ID must be numeric so that it can be incremented.
- 5. In the **Quantity** field, enter the number of entities to create.
- Click Save and Close.

The Logical Device page reappears, listing the newly created entities in a search results table.

Working with Logical Device Configurations

You can create configurations for Logical Device entities. Configurations enable you to create new versions as a device evolves over time. Logical device configurations can include configuration items to which you can assign the following types of resources:

- Custom network addresses
- Device interfaces



Allocating a device interface to a logical device configuration is not the same as adding a device interface to a logical device. Logical devices *provide* device interfaces and logical device configurations *consume* them.

Custom objects

Logical device configurations have the same features and functionality as other configurations. See "Working with Entity Configurations" for more information about using configurations.

Including Logical Devices in Logical Device Hierarchies

Logical devices often include other logical devices in their hierarchies. For example, a Logical Device entity representing a router can include logical devices that represent virtual routers.

The logical devices you can include in a logical device hierarchy are governed by specification relationships. If a logical device specification includes one or more specification relationships, then only the related specifications can be included in its hierarchy. The type of relationship (Parent or Child) must be respected in the hierarchy.

In addition to other logical devices, logical device hierarchies can include a number of different entities, such as device interfaces, cross-connects, and physical device.

To add a logical device to a logical device hierarchy:

- Open the Summary page of a Logical Device entity.
- 2. On the **General Information** tab, in the Logical Device Hierarchy section, expand the hierarchy to reveal the place where you want to add a logical device.
- 3. Select the device you want to be the parent of the logical device you are adding.
- 4. Click the Add Logical Device icon in the toolbar.
 - The Child Logical Device dialog box appears.
- Search for or create a logical device. See "Searching" for more information.
 - If the logical device specification for the parent logical device has specification relationships, then the logical devices you can search for or create are limited.
- In the Search Results section, select a logical device, then click OK.
 - The dialog box closes and the logical device appears in the hierarchy.

Cloning Logical Devices

You can clone logical devices to copy the entity along with the logical devices, physical devices, and Equipment entities in its hierarchy or with which it is associated. Cloning is different from duplication because duplication copies only the entity itself.

To clone a logical device:

- 1. Do one of the following:
 - In the Search Results section of a Logical Device Search page, select a logical device and click the **Clone** button.
 - In the Search Results section of a Physical Device Search page, select a physical device that has a logical device association and click the Clone button.
 - In a Logical Device Summary page, select Clone from the Actions menu.
 - In the Physical Device Summary page of a physical device that has a logical device association, select **Clone** from the **Actions** menu.

The Logical Device - Clone page appears. The page includes sections that display information about the existing logical device, some of which you can change for the cloned logical device.

(Optional) In the Entity Cloning Information section, enter text in the Logical Device Name and Physical Device Name fields.

These names are used for all entities of the relevant types created during the cloning.

 (Optional) In the Entity Cloning Information section, enter a prefix in the Equipment Name Prefix field.

This prefix and an underscore character is added to the names of all Equipment entities created during the cloning.

- 4. (Optional) Specify a different property location for the cloned device:
 - a. In the Location for Cloned Device section, click the Select button.

The Property Location Search page appears.

- **b.** Search for property locations.
- c. Select a property location, then click **OK**.

The Property Location Search area closes and the Location for Cloned Device section updates to reflect the new property location.

- (Optional) Select devices and interfaces to exclude from cloning:
 - In the Logical Device Hierarchy section, expand the hierarchy.
 - Each logical device and device interface has a check box that is selected by default.
 - b. De-select any logical devices or device interfaces that you do not want to include in the cloned logical device. De-selecting a parent device in the hierarchy automatically deselects its children.



- (Optional) Select mapped physical devices and equipment to exclude from cloning:
 - a. In the Logical Device Hierarchy section, select a logical device or device interface.
 - The Mapped Physical Device Hierarchy section displays the hierarchy of mapped physical devices and associated equipment for the selected logical device or device interface. Physical devices and equipment in the hierarchy are selected unless the corresponding logical device or device interface is de-selected in the Logical Device Hierarchy section.
 - b. De-select any physical devices or equipment that you do not want to include in the cloned logical device.
- Click the Clone button.

The Logical Device - Clone page closes and the Summary page for the cloned logical device appears.

Working with Device Interfaces

A logical device can provide one or more device interfaces to represent access points into the device. The relationship between the Logical Device specification and the Device Interface specification defines the types of device interfaces that can be added. Only device interfaces related to the Logical Device specification can be added to the device. The relationship also determines the minimum and maximum number of interfaces that can be added. The minimum number of device interfaces is added automatically to a logical device when it is created in UIM. You can add additional device interfaces up to the maximum number.

Device interfaces have hierarchies. A child device interface is called a sub-device interface. The highest-level device interface in a hierarchy is called a media interface.

Device interfaces specifications determine the type and number of sub-device interfaces they can have. Device interfaces cannot exist on their own, however. They must be provided by logical devices, either directly or, in the case of sub-device interfaces, indirectly through a parent device interface.

Device Interface specifications can include rate codes that define the technology and capacity of connectivity that they can terminate. See *UIM Concepts* for more information about rate codes.

A device interface can also be assigned to a logical device configuration, including a configuration of a logical device other than the one that provides it.

Adding Device Interfaces to Logical Devices

You can add device interfaces to a logical device from the device's Summary page. You can also add interfaces to a logical device from the Summary page of another logical device whose hierarchy includes the device to which you are adding the interface. Interfaces you add to a

child logical device in a parent device's Summary page automatically appear in the Summary page of the child device.



You cannot create parent/child relationships among logical devices that are associated with network locations.

You can add only new interfaces; you cannot add device interfaces that were created previously.

You can create multiple device interfaces in a single operation, provided that the maximum number of interfaces defined by the Logical Device specification is not exceeded. The device interface names increment automatically based on the values of the **Rate Code**, **Name**, **Interface Number**, and **Quantity** fields. For example, if you define the name as SL04, the interface number as 10, and the quantity as 4, UIM creates four device interfaces named DS3/SL04/10, DS3/SL04/11, DS3/SL04/12, and DS3/SL04/13.

To add a device interface to a logical device:

- Open the Summary page of the Logical Device entity whose hierarchy includes the device to which you want to add an interface.
- 2. On the **General Information** tab, in the Logical Device Hierarchy section, expand the hierarchy to reveal the device to which you want to add an interface.
 - If you are adding an interface to the parent device, you do not have to expand the hierarchy.
- Right-click a device and select Create Device Interface.
 - The Device Interface New dialog box appears.
- **4.** In the **Specification** list, select the specification for the type of interface you want to create.
 - If no specifications are listed, you cannot add an interface to the device. When you select a specification, the page refreshes to reflect the characteristics in the selected specification.
- 5. (Optional) Change the value of the **Quantity** field to create more than one interface of the same type.
- 6. Enter information into all required fields and any appropriate optional fields.
- Click Save and Close.

The dialog box closes and the new interface appears in the Logical Device Hierarchy section. If the device interface specification includes a rate code, it is displayed as part of the device interface information in the hierarchy.

If adding the interface would exceed the maximum number defined in the relationship of the Logical Device and Device Interface specifications, UIM displays an error message and the interface is not added.

Deleting Device Interfaces and Sub-Device Interfaces from Logical Devices

You can delete device interfaces and sub-device interfaces from logical devices. If deleting them would result in the device having fewer than the number of interfaces or sub-device interfaces required by the relationship between the Logical Device and Device Interface specifications, UIM displays and error message and the interfaces are not deleted.

In addition, you cannot delete a device interface that has a trail-bound cross-connect to another device interface. See *UIM Concepts* and "Adding an Interconnection" for more information about trail-bound cross-connects.

Deleting a device interface or sub-device interface also deletes any mappings from it to ports or connectors.

To delete a device interface or sub-device interface from a logical device:

- Open the Summary page of the Logical Device entity whose hierarchy includes the device that you want to delete.
- On the General Information tab, in the Logical Device Hierarchy section, expand the hierarchy to display the device interface that you want to delete.
- 3. Right-click the interface and select **Delete**.

The device interface is deleted.

The Logical Device Hierarchy section of a Logical Device Summary page includes a list of device interfaces associated with the logical device. The list includes the name of each interface, its ID, reservation status, conditions, and assignment status. The assigned rate code (if any) appears in parentheses.

You can view additional information about a device interface by opening its Summary page. The page includes a hierarchy that you can use to view, add, and delete sub-device interfaces.

You can also view information about consumers of the interface. Although the interface may technically be assigned to a configuration item or pipe termination point, the primary consumer is shown. Primary consumers are the Service, Pipe, Place, or Logical Device entities to which the configuration items or termination points belong. For each consumer of the interface, you see the name and inventory status. The name is a link to the Summary page for the entity.

To view device interface information:

- Open the Summary page of the Logical Device entity whose hierarchy includes the device interface that you want to view.
- On the General Information tab, in the Logical Device Hierarchy section, expand the hierarchy to reveal the interface about which you want information.
 - The interfaces appear as clickable links.
- Click the device interface link.



The Device Interface Summary page appears.

(Optional) In the Device Interface Hierarchy section, expand the hierarchy to view subdevice interfaces.

Adding Sub-Device Interfaces to Device Interfaces

You can add sub-device interfaces to device interfaces. Sub-device interfaces are virtual device interfaces used for connectivity. Sub-device interfaces can themselves have sub-device interfaces as children. A device interface can have sub-device interfaces only if its specification includes a relationship to one or more sub-device interface specifications.

You can add sub-device interfaces in the Summary page of the logical device that is the direct parent of the device interface or in the Summary page of any logical device that includes the device interface in its hierarchy.

You can also add sub-device interfaces from a device interface's own Summary page. See "Viewing Information About Device Interfaces" for information about opening Device Interface Summary pages.

To add a sub-device interface:

- Open the Logical Device Summary page of the logical device whose hierarchy includes the device interface to which you want to add a sub-device interface.
- On the General Information tab, in the Logical Device Hierarchy section, expand the hierarchy to reveal the device interface or sub-device interface to which you want to add a sub-device interface.
- Right-click the interface and select Create Sub Device Interface.
 - The Device Interface New dialog box appears.
- From the Specification list, select the specification for the type of sub-device interface you want to create.
 - If no specifications are listed, you cannot add a sub-device interface to the interface.
 - After you select a specification, the page refreshes to reflect the characteristics in the selected specification.
- 5. Enter information into all required fields and any appropriate optional fields.
- Click Save and Close.

The new sub-device interface appears in the Logical Device Hierarchy section.

If adding the sub-device interface would exceed the maximum number defined by the relationship of the Device Interface specifications for the parent and sub-device interface, UIM displays an error message and the sub-device interface is not added.

Working with Flow Interfaces

Flow interfaces enable you to partition media interfaces into virtual channels based on bit rate. Flow interfaces are used with flow identifiers (such as VLAN IDs) to trace the path of services through the device interfaces and connectivities in multipoint and point-to-point service arrangements.

Flow interfaces always have a device interface parent. The device interface parent must be a media interface. Flow interfaces are similar to sub-device interfaces, but can have configurations that capture their attributes.

You cannot create flow interfaces directly from the logical device or device interface hierarchy in a Summary page. Rather, you create them in the packet virtual networks. Flow interfaces are dependent entities derived from the virtual network to which they belong.

Even though you do not create flow interfaces from the logical device or device interface hierarchies, they are displayed in those hierarchies. The hierarchies include information about consumption of the flow interfaces.

Flow interfaces describe the termination type of the connectivities terminated on their parent device interfaces. There are four termination types defined in flow interface specifications:

- Access. Indicates that the purpose of an interface is to terminate connectivity that provides
 access to the Provider's network, such as an Ethernet UNI Connectivity.
- Internetwork. Indicates that the purpose of an interface is to terminate connectivity that interconnects two networks.
- Trunk. Indicates that the purpose of an interface is to terminate connectivity between service provider equipment within the same network. This designation has no direct implication on how the port or interface is configured in the Provider's network.
- Unknown. Indicates that the purpose of the interface is unknown.

Viewing Information About Flow Interface Consumption

Logical device and device interface hierarchies that include flow interfaces display information about the consumption of the flow interfaces. The **Percent Consumed** column shows the percentage of the interface capacity that is consumed.

In addition, the **Percent Consumed** columns for flow interfaces whose consumption has reached threshold values are highlighted. By default, flow interfaces with greater than 50% consumption are highlighted in yellow and flow interfaces with greater than 80% capacity are highlighted in red. An alert icon also replaces the standard icon in affected rows.

Both the threshold values and the colors are configurable. See *UIM System Administrator's Guide* for more information.

To view information about flow interface consumption:

 Open the Logical Device Summary page of a logical device whose hierarchy includes flow interfaces.



On the General Information tab, in the Logical Device Hierarchy section, expand the hierarchy to display the flow interfaces.

The **Percent Consumed** column and row highlighting indicate the consumption level of the flow interfaces.

Associating Logical Devices to Physical Devices

You can associate logical devices to physical devices. You can make an association from a logical device's own Summary page or from the Summary page of another logical device that includes it in its hierarchy. This type of association makes it possible to map device interfaces provided by the logical device to ports and connectors provided by the physical device (or by equipment or physical devices in the hierarchy of the parent physical device). Because similar logical device accounts frequently exist in large numbers on the same logical device, you can create ranges of accounts simultaneously.



You can associate a logical device account to a logical device either at the time that you create the account or later. The associations you can make depend on whether the specifications for the logical device and logical device account include specification relationships. If relationships exist, then you can make associations only based on the related specifications. If no relationships exist, then you make an association with any logical device.

In addition to working from the point of view of the logical device account, you can associate accounts from Logical Device Summary pages. See "Associating Logical Device Accounts with Logical Devices".

Logical device account entities include many of the same features as other entity types. You can include them in custom involvements, reservations, business interactions, and inventory groups. You can also assign conditions to them. In addition, you can associate places with them and manage their life cycles.

Working with Physical Devices

A physical device is a collection of physical resources that have a common function in the inventory. Physical device hierarchies can include other physical devices, equipment, physical ports, and physical connectors. For information about working with hierarchies, see "Working with Entity Hierarchies".



Physical devices are the counterparts of logical devices, so you can associate physical and logical devices. You can also map the ports and connectors in physical devices to the device interfaces in a logical device with which it is associated. See "Mapping Device Interfaces to Physical Ports and Connectors" for more information.

Physical Device entities share many of the same features as other entity types. You can include them in custom involvements, reservations, and inventory groups. You can also assign conditions to them. In addition, you can associate places with them and manage their life cycles.

Working with Ports and Connectors

A physical device can provide one or more ports or connectors. Physical ports are places where communication begins or ends on a physical device. Physical connectors are items to physically connect hardware units for signal or power transmission.

The relationships between the specification for a physical device and specifications for ports and connectors defines the types of device ports and connectors that can be added. Only ports and connectors related to the Physical Device specification can be added to the device. The relationships also define the minimum and maximum quantities that can be added.

The minimum number of ports or connectors is added automatically to a physical device when it is created. You can add additional ports or connectors up to the maximum number.

Although you can work with them only in the context of physical devices and Equipment entities, ports and connectors are themselves defined by specifications and have Summary pages. They share some of the same features as other entity types:

- You can include physical ports in custom involvements and reservations. You can also assign roles and conditions to them. In addition, you can view the networks in which a port is included.
- You can include physical connectors in custom involvements and reservations. You can also assign conditions to them.

Adding a Port or Connector to a Physical Device Hierarchy

You can add ports or connectors in the Hierarchy section of a physical device's own Summary page or from the Summary page of another physical device whose hierarchy includes it. Ports and connectors you add to a child physical device in a parent device's Summary page automatically appear in the Summary page of the child device.



You can add physical jumpers to connect ports in the same Equipment entity or in different entities that share the same location.

You can add only new ports and connectors; you cannot add previously created ports or connectors.

To add a port or connector to a physical device hierarchy:

- Open the Physical Device Summary page for a physical device whose hierarchy includes the device to which you want to add a port or connector.
- 2. On the **General Information** tab, in the Physical Device Hierarchy section, expand the hierarchy to reveal the device to which you want to add a port or connector.
 - If you are adding a port or connector to the parent device, you do not have to expand the hierarchy.
- Right-click a device and select Create Port or Create Connector.
 - The Physical Port New or Physical Connector New dialog box appears.
- In the Specification list, select the specification for the type of port or connector you want to create.
 - If no specifications are listed, you cannot add a port or connector to the device. When you select a specification, the page refreshes to reflect the characteristics in the selected specification.
- (Optional) Change the value of the Quantity field to create more than one port or connector of the same type.
- 6. Enter information into all required fields and any appropriate optional fields.
- Click Save and Close.

The new port or connector appears in the Physical Device Hierarchy section.

If adding the port or connector would exceed the maximum number defined by the relationship between the Physical Device specification and the Port specification or the Connector specification, UIM displays an error message and does not add any ports or connectors.

Viewing Information About Ports and Connectors

For physical ports, you can view a list of networks in which the port is associated. The association occurs when you select a port to be represented by a node in the network. The same port can be represented by nodes in different networks. For each network association, you can see the network name, network description, node name, and node description.

To view port or connector information:

- Open the Physical Device Summary page for a physical device whose hierarchy includes the device whose port or connector information you want to view.
- 2. On the **General Information** tab, in the Physical Device Hierarchy section, expand the hierarchy to reveal the port or connector whose information you want to view.



The ports and connectors are clickable links.

3. Click the port or connector.

The Physical Port Summary or Physical Connector Summary page appears. For physical ports only, the Networks section includes a list of the networks with which the port is associated.

Alternatively, you can view physical port information from **Resources** > **Physical Ports** on the left navigation pane from UIM landing page. You can search physical ports directly to view their specification, assignment status, and inventory status.

To view list of physical ports:

- In the Inventory Resources group of the navigation section, click Physical Ports.
 - The Physical Port search page appears.
- 2. The **Search** section displays search fields for the port's default characteristics.
 - To change the default search criteria, click on the Add Fields button.
- 3. Enter data in the search fields and click **Search**.
 - The Search Results appear in the table below.
- 4. Click on the port you want to view.
 - The Physical Port Information page will appear.

Deleting a Port or Connector from a Physical Device Hierarchy

You can delete ports and connectors from physical devices. If deleting the ports or connectors would result in the device having fewer than the number required by the relationship between the Physical Device specification and the Port or Connector specification, UIM prevents the deletion.

To delete a port or connector from a physical device hierarchy:

- Open the Physical Device Summary page for a physical device whose hierarchy includes the device from which you want to delete a port or connector.
- 2. On the **General Information** tab, in the Physical Device Hierarchy section, expand the hierarchy to reveal the port or connector to delete.
- Right-click a port or connector and select **Delete**.

The port or connector is deleted.



If the port has multiple device interfaces associated, select only the required device interface you want to select as a termination point.

Alternatively, you can also delete a port directly from the UIM landing page only if the port is unassigned.



System throws an error when you try to delete a port that has been assigned to a connectivity/entity.

To delete a port from the UIM landing page:

- In the Inventory Resources group of the navigation section, click Physical Ports.
 The Physical Port search page appears.
- 2. Click on the **Search** button to get a list of all the physical ports.
- Choose the port you want to delete and click on **Delete** icon at the top of the table.A **Delete Confirmation** window will pop-up, asking to confirm action.
- Click on Yes to delete the port.

Maintaining Equipment in Physical Device Hierarchies

There are two ways of adding and removing equipment in a Physical Device Summary page:

- In the Physical Device Hierarchy section
- In the Equipment section

In addition, an Equipment entity can be associated with a physical device from the equipment's Summary page. See "Associating Equipment to Physical Devices" for more information. The relationship is the same whether it starts from the equipment or from the physical device.

Equipment entities can be included in only one physical device hierarchy. You can include an Equipment entity in a physical device hierarchy only if it or any of its parents in an equipment hierarchy is not already included in another physical device hierarchy. For example, if a shelf Equipment entity is included in a physical device hierarchy, none of the racks that it holds can be included in another physical device hierarchy.

To associate equipment to a physical device hierarchy:

- Open the Physical Device Summary page of a physical device that you want to associate with an Equipment entity or that includes such a device in its hierarchy.
- 2. On the **General Information** tab, in the Physical Device Hierarchy section, expand the hierarchy to reveal the device that you want to associate with an Equipment entity.
- 3. Select the device and click **Associate Equipment** on the toolbar.

The Associate Equipment dialog box appears.

- 4. Search for or create an Equipment entity.
- 5. In the Search Results section, select an Equipment entity.
- 6. Click OK.

The Physical Devices Hierarchy section in the Summary page refreshes to include the entity. The Equipment section is also update to reflect the new association.

Removing an equipment association from a physical device hierarchy does not delete the Equipment entity.

To remove an equipment association from a physical device hierarchy:

- 1. Open the Physical Device Summary page of the physical device from which you want to remove an Equipment entity association.
- 2. On the **General Information** tab, expand the hierarchy in the Physical Device Hierarchy section to display the Equipment entity association that you want to remove.
- 3. Select the Equipment entity association and click **Remove Equipment** in the toolbar.

The association is removed and the link to the Equipment entity is removed from the Physical Device Hierarchy section. The Equipment section in the Summary page is also updated.

The Equipment section in the Summary page refreshes to include the entity. The Physical Device Hierarchy also refreshes to reflect the association of the Equipment entity.

- In the Equipment section, select the Equipment entity that you want to remove and click Delete.

The Equipment entity no longer appears in the Equipment section. The Physical Device Hierarchy is also updated.

You can associate physical devices to network locations to specify their geographic positions.

You can associate network locations manually when you create a physical device or by editing an existing entity. Associations can also be made automatically by propagation through logical device, physical device, and equipment hierarchies. You cannot manually associate a network location to a physical device that has already been assigned one by propagation. See *UIM Concepts* for more information about the rules that govern these propagations.

To associate a physical device to a network location:



- Open a Physical Device Summary page.
- On the General Information tab, in the Physical Device Information section, click Edit.
- In the Network Location field, enter the first few characters of a network location, then select the location you want to associate.

The location appears in the **Network Location** field.

Associating Physical Devices with Logical Devices

You can associate physical devices to logical devices from a physical device Summary page or from the Summary page of another physical device that includes it in its hierarchy. A physical device can be associated with only one logical device. In addition, child and parent physical devices cannot be associated with the same logical device. A logical device, however, can be associated with any number of physical devices.

This type of association makes possible the mapping of device interfaces provided by the logical device to ports and connectors provided by the physical device (or by equipment or physical devices in the hierarchy of the parent physical device). See "Mapping Device Interfaces to Physical Ports and Connectors" for more information.

You can also associate a physical device and a logical device from a Logical Device Summary page. The association is the same whether you start from the physical device or from the logical device.

To associate a physical device to a logical device:

- Open the Physical Device Summary page of a physical device that you want to associate
 with a logical device or that includes such a device in its hierarchy.
- 2. On the **General Information** tab, in the Physical Device Hierarchy section, expand the hierarchy to reveal the device that you want to associate with a logical device.
- 3. Select the device and then click the **Associate Logical Device** in the toolbar.

The Associate Logical Device page appears.

- Search for or create a Logical Device entity.
- 5. In the Search Results section, select a Logical Device entity.
- 6. Click OK.

The Physical Device Hierarchy section in the Summary page refreshes to include a reference to the entity.

You can remove a logical device association from a physical device. Removing the association removes any port or connector mappings enabled by it.



To remove a logical device association from a physical device:

- Open the Physical Device Summary page of a physical device from which you want to unassociate a logical device.
- 2. On the **General Information** tab, in the Physical Device Hierarchy section, select the physical device and then click **Unassociate Logical Device** in the toolbar.

The association is removed and the reference to the logical device is removed from the Physical Device Hierarchy section.

- Select a specification in the physical device search.
- Be in the current or live business interaction context.
- In the Search Results section, select one or more entities.
- Then, select the Bulk Edit option, which opens the Physical Device Bulk Edit page.

To bulk edit the characteristics of Physical Device entities:

 In the Physical Device - Bulk Edit page, click the Add Fields button to select the characteristics fields to display.

The Add Fields page appears.

Use the arrow buttons to move fields from the available fields to the selected fields column to select the fields to display and edit. You can also move fields from the selected fields column back to available fields. Click OK.



If there are no characteristics for the selected specification, the page columns appear empty. In this case, you need to add characteristics to the specification. See *UIM Concepts* for information on characteristics.

Mapping Device Interfaces to Physical Ports and Connectors

You can map device interfaces to physical ports or connectors in associated physical and logical devices. The mapping can extend to the ports and connectors of equipment that is associated to a physical device with which a logical device is associated. The mapping can be done from the Summary page of either the physical device or the logical device in the association.

You can choose to let UIM perform the mapping automatically or you can do it manually.

A device interface can be mapped to multiple ports and connectors, but a port or connector can be mapped to only one device interface.

- On the General Information tab, in the Logical Device Hierarchy or Physical Device

 Mappings button in the toolbar.

The Device Mappings page appears.

- **3.** Expand the logical device hierarchy and select the logical device that contains the interfaces you want to map.
- In the upper-right of the Physical Device Hierarchy section, select either Ports or Connectors.
- 5. Expand the physical device hierarchy and select the physical device or equipment that includes the ports or connectors you want to map.

Adding Physical Jumpers Between Device Interfaces

You can add physical jumpers that interconnect device interfaces provided by a single logical device or among device interfaces provided by different logical devices. Physical jumpers represent physical connections such as twisted pair jumpers, fiber patches, or coax patch cables. They participate in the end-to-end connectivity of pipes and channelized connectivities.

Physical jumpers can connect only media interfaces (the highest level in a device interface hierarchy). The interfaces are not required to have rate codes, but if they both do, the rate codes must match or be compatible.

In Oracle Communications Unified Inventory Management (UIM), Place and Property Location entities represent the and geographic dimensions of your inventory. Place entities describe where your inventory is located. Property Location entities represent specific locations where connectivity is hosted or where services are delivered.

Working with Places and Place Configurations

Place entities and Place configurations represent items that can be located on a map, such as states, cities, streets, postal addresses, campuses, or buildings.

You can associate other inventory entities (such as subscribers, services, equipment, service terminations, and so on) to Place entities. This association can imply that the entity is located at the place or that there is some kind of relationship between the entities. You can use roles to specify the nature of the relationship. See "Working with Roles" for more information about roles.

About Place Entities

There are four types of Place entities. The type is determined by the entity's specification.

- Locations are defined by geographic references.
- Addresses are defined by textual information.
- Address ranges represent groups of addresses that are created as a block, such as a range of street addresses.
- Sites represent places that do not have a single, precise location. Sites can have configurations. See "Working with Entity Configurations" for more information.

When you create a Place entity, you can specify its geographic coordinates. These coordinates are required if the place (or a network node associated with it) is to appear on a network map. See "Using the Map View" for more information.

You can use one of these two formats:

The universal geographic coordinate system based on latitude and longitude.

The North American V & H (vertical and horizontal) coordinate system.

See *UIM Concepts* for more information about geographic coordinates.

You can associate Place entities to other entities to define those entities' geographic locations. For example, you can associate a place with a service to specify the location where the service is delivered. See "Associating Places to Entities" for more information.

You can assign roles to Place entities. For example, you could assign the role of Headquarters to a site.

Places entities can include hierarchies of other places. For example, there could be a Location entity called State that includes a hierarchy of counties and cities. Place hierarchies can also include Property Location entities. For example, the hierarchy of a Place entity that a represents a city could include all the property locations in that city.

Places are topology-enabled, so you can search for them in the topology diagram using the UTIA application. See "Working with the Inventory Topology" for more information.

Associating Places to Entities

You can associate places to entities to locate them geographically. The location can be very precise, as with an address, or more general, as with a site.

To associate a place to an entity:

- 1. Open the Summary page of an entity.
- Click the Groups and Infrastructure tab.
- In the Places section, click Associate.

The Associate Place dialog box appears.

- 4. Search for or create a Place entity.
- In the Search Results section, select a Place entity.
- 6. Click OK.

The Places section in the Summary page refreshes to include the entity.

7. (Optional) In the Places section Role list, select a role that describes the association of the original entity and the place. For Service entities, you can create a new role if necessary.

The **Role** field is empty if no roles are valid for this association.

Working with Property Locations

Property Locations define where resources are located, where connectivity is terminated, and similar geographic aspects of your inventory. A Property Location entity represents a piece of land with defined legal boundaries. It is the lowest-level element in the natural hierarchy that identifies a location (country, state/province, municipality, property location).



Property Locations are similar to Place entities, but have different capabilities. Property Locations are used only to represent locations involved in connectivity scenarios.

You must define a Property Location as one or both of the following:

- **Network location**. A network location hosts devices that transport services. For example, a service provider Central Office is a network location. Defining a property location as a network location requires the assignment of a network location code.
- Service location. A service location is where a customer accesses a service. For
 example, an office where a customer accesses a Carrier Ethernet service is a service
 location.

Creating Property Locations

To create a property location:



- In the Inventory Infrastructure group of the navigation section, click Property Locations.
- 2. In the Search Results section, click Create.
- In the Location Type area, select Network Location, Service Location, Point of Presence, or all.
 - If you selected **Network Location**, the **Network Location Code** field at the bottom of the page becomes available.
- 4. In the Property Address area, enter or select information in the Street Address, City, and Country fields. Optionally enter information into the Apt/Room/Suite, State, Sub Area, and Postal Code fields. (The Sub Area field is available only when you select a country other than the US in the Country field.)
 - The **Property Name** field is automatically populated with a name made up of the street address, Apt/Room/Suite value, city, sub area, state, postal code, and country values.
- 5. (Optional) Overwrite this default name if desired.
 - If you overwrite the default name, UIM does not update the name when address details change. The **Property Name** value must be unique for service locations.
- 6. (Optional) If you do not intend to validate this property address, select the **Accept Property Address As Is** check box.
- 7. (Optional) Validate the property address.
 - If you choose to validate the address, the information you enter manually may be replaced. See "Validating Property Addresses" for more information.
- 8. (Optional) In the Geographic Coordinates area, enter either a latitude and longitude or a vertical and horizontal coordinate pair. When you enter coordinates in one system, the corresponding values in the other system are populated. For example, if you enter a latitude and longitude, the vertical and horizontal values are populated automatically.
- **9.** (Optional) To lock the geographic coordinates so that they cannot be changed, even during address validation, click the **Lock Coordinates** button.
- 10. If you selected Network Location as the location type, enter a uniquely identifying code in the Network Location Code field. The network location code must be three to ten characters in length and can correspond to CLLI format. See UIM Concepts for more information.
 - When you enter a code that is unique in your inventory, the **Unique Code** label and check mark icon next to the **Network Location Code** field are highlighted.
- (Optional) If you want the property name to include the network location code, select Use Network Location Code as Property Name.
- 12. (Optional) Enter values for any characteristics defined for the Property Location entity.
- 13. Click Save or Save and Close.

Validating Property Addresses

You can validate property addresses to ensure consistency and prevent duplication. UIM validates addresses by using a geocoder such as Oracle Spatial eLocation. See *UIM Concepts* and *UIM System Administrator's Guide* for more information about setting up geocoding features on UIM.

When you validate a property address, UIM presents you with one or more addresses that match the address information that has already been entered for the property. If you select one of the matches, UIM replaces the address details for the property with the information returned by the geocoder.

The **Apt/Room/Suite** field in the address is ignored during validation and is not changed if you select an address suggested by the validation process.

After a property address has been validated, a green check mark appears in the upper right corner of the page where you performed the validation. If you change the address details after validation, the property location is considered unvalidated and the check mark is removed. You can validate the address again.

To validate a property address:

- In the Create Property Location page or in the General Information tab of a Property Location page, enter all required address information.
- 2. Click the Validate Address button.

UIM opens a dialog box containing one or more matching addresses.

- 3. Do one of the following:
 - Select one of the addresses and then click OK.

UIM marks the address as validated, displays a green check mark in the Property Address area, and updates the address fields if necessary. If you later edit any of the address fields, the address reverts to unvalidated state.

Click the Accept Address As Is button.

UIM closes the dialog box, selects the **Accept Address As Is** check box in the address area, and leaves the address information in its current state.

Click the Cancel Validation button.

UIM closes the dialog box, leaving the address unchanged and the address unvalidated.

4. Click Save or Save and Close.

Adding Network Entity Codes to Network Locations

Network locations can be associated with logical devices that terminate connectivity. Such logical devices are called network devices and they have network entity codes that uniquely identify them within the network location. To add a network entity code to a network location:

- Navigate to the General Information tab of a Property Location Summary page.
- (Optional) If you want the property name to include the network location code, select Use Network Location Code as Property Name.
- 3. Click the **Network Entity Codes** tab.
- 4. Do the following for each network entity code you want to add:
 - a. Click the Add button in the toolbar.
 - b. In the first empty row in the table, enter a network entity code for a logical device at this network location.

Adding Property Locations to Inventory Groups

You add property locations to inventory groups so that you can manage them more efficiently.

To add a property location to an inventory group:

- Click the Associate button.

The Associate Inventory Group dialog box appears.

Working with Connectivity

Oracle Communications Unified Inventory Management (UIM) provides specialized functionality for representing connectivity. Connectivity entities provide built-in support for a variety of technologies and can be customized to suit your business needs.

Like other entities, you define specifications for Connectivity entities in Design Studio. You can define specifications for three types of Connectivity entities:

- Channelized Connectivity entities support technologies such as E-Carrier, T-Carrier, J-Carrier, SDH, and SONET, and WDM.
- Packet Connectivity entities support technologies such as Ethernet, Frame Relay, ATM, and MPLS.
- Service Connectivity entities represent the connectivities that deliver services to end customers. Service connectivity consumes other types of connectivity and resources, but cannot be consumed itself.

The specifications for the three different connectivity types include different default characteristics. In UIM, you see a different set of tabs in Connectivity Summary pages depending on the connectivity type. See "Connectivity Details Page" for more information.

You can also use Pipe entities to model connectivity. For example, pipes are recommended for modeling physical connectivity such as ducts and cables. See "Working with Pipes, Capacity, and Signal Structure" for information about pipes.

You can include connectivity and connectivity design versions in business interactions.

Creating Connectivity Entities

When you create Connectivity entities, you select values for the rate code, connectivity function, and technology fields. These fields interact with each other so that only valid combinations of selections are available.

Note:

Before you can create a Connectivity entity, you must deploy the ora_uim_basespecifications and ora_uim_basetechnologies cartridges to UIM. The ora_uim_basetechnologies cartridge includes rate codes, technologies, signal architectures, and other content.

When you create a connectivity, you specify its technology, which determines the specifications you can use. You also specify an identification format. The formats you can choose from depend on the technology and specification. See *UIM Concepts* for more information about connectivity identification formats.

✓ Note:

A ruleset is required for generating custom IDs for the **Custom Identification** format. You see an error message if no ruleset has been defined for this purpose and you select the **Custom Identification** format.

You must also specify the A and Z locations of the connectivity. The A and Z locations can be service locations, network locations, or network entity locations, depending on the technology and identification format of the connectivity.

To create a Connectivity entity:

- In the Inventory Resources group of the navigation section, click Connectivity.
 The Connectivity Search page appears.
- 2. Click the **Create** button in the toolbar of the Search Results section.
 - The Connectivity New page appears.
- 3. In the **Technology** field, enter the first letter of the technology for this connectivity, then select from the list that appears.
 - The **Specification** field updates to include a list of all the specifications defined for the technology you selected.
- 4. In the **Specification** field, select the specification you want to use for this connectivity.
 - The Connectivity New page updates to include the fields defined by the specification.
- 5. In the Identification Format field, select the identification format for this connectivity. Only the identification formats that are valid for the selected specification are available. The Service-Based identification format is valid only for Packet Network Access Connectivity, such as an Ethernet UNI connectivity.
- 6. Do one of the following to specify the A and Z locations of the connectivity.

If you selected the Location-Based or Custom Identification identification format:

- a. In the A Network/Entity Location field, enter the first few characters of the A-side network location or network entity code for this connectivity, then select from the list of matches that appears below the field.
- b. In the Z Network/Entity Location field, enter the first few characters of the Z-side network location or network entity code for this connectivity, then select from the list of matches that appears below the field.

If the Service-Based identification format is selected:

- a. Next to the A Service Location field, click the search icon.
- b. In the dialog box that appears, search for and select a service location, then click OK. The dialog box closes and the A Service Location field displays the service location you selected.
- c. In the Z Network/Entity Location field, enter the first few characters of the Z-side network location or network entity code for this connectivity, then select from the list of matches that appears below the field.
- 7. Select the combination of values in the Rate Code and Function fields that applies to the connectivity. A selection in one field filters the available values in the other. The value of the Technology field also influences which Rate Code values are available.
- 8. In the Quantity field, enter the number of entities you want to create.
- (Optional) In the Serial Number field, enter a serial number if you do not want to use the one that will be automatically generated by UIM when you save the new connectivity.
- **10.** (Optional) Select **Assign Contiguous Serial Number** if you are creating more than one connectivity and want the serial numbers to be in a continuous block.
- 11. Enter information for other optional and required fields defined by the specification.
- 12. Click Save.

The **New Connectivities** list appears, displaying information about the entity or entities you created.

You can edit some of the general information for a Connectivity entity. In addition, you can add a description.

To edit Connectivity general information:

- 2. Click the General Information tab.
- 3. Click the Edit button.

Editable fields become available in the page.

- 4. Edit the desired fields.
- 5. (Optional) In the **Description** field, enter a description.
- 6. Click Save or Save and Close.

The new information is saved.

Designing Connectivity

You use the **Connectivity Design** tab in the Connectivity Details page to enable and terminate connectivity.

The **Connectivity Design** tab includes a large table that shows rows for each segment in the connectivity path. The rows display icons and information about the segments. For example, the connectivity identifier and status are displayed for each channel or pipe that is assigned to a segment.

The design process begins with a connectivity gap that you resolve by assigning transport to the gap.

Connectivity designs can be versioned to reflect changes over time. Only one design version can be active at a time. You can make changes only to the active design. You cannot make changes to connectivity designs that are completed or cancelled.



Service connectivities have **Connectivity Design** tabs, but the information is readonly. Service connectivity designs are created automatically.

Filtering the Connectivity Design Table by Segment Type

You can filter the table in the **Connectivity Design** tab to hide segment types that you do not want to see. For example, you can filter the table so that jumpers and cross-connects are not shown.



To filter the connectivity design table by segment type:

- Open a Connectivity Details page.
- 2. Click the Connectivity Design tab.
- 3. If necessary, select the path.
- 4. In the table, click the icon next to the **Segment** column heading.

The Segments Filter dialog box appears.

- 5. Select the segment types you want to display.
- Click OK.

The table is reformatted to show only the segment types you selected.

Clearing the Connectivity Design

You can clear all the design work and return to displaying only the A and Z locations and the initial connectivity gap.

To clear the connectivity design:

- Open a Connectivity Details page.
- 2. Click the Connectivity Design tab.
- 3. If necessary, select the path.
- 4. Click the **Clear** icon in the left side of the design table heading row.

A confirmation dialog box appears.

5. Click OK.

The design is cleared. Only the A and Z locations remain, along with an unresolved gap between them.

Reversing a Connectivity Segment Direction

To reverse the direction of a connectivity segment:

- Open a Connectivity Details page.
- Click the Connectivity Design tab.
- If necessary, select the path.
- 4. In the table, select one or more connectivity segments.
- 5. In the toolbar, click the **Reverse** icon.

The direction of the segment or segments is reversed.

Exporting a Connectivity Design

You can export a connectivity design as a Microsoft Excel file.

To export a connectivity design:

- Open a Connectivity Details page.
- 2. Click the Connectivity Design tab.
- If necessary, select the path.



4. In the toolbar, click the **Export** icon.

A dialog box appears, prompting you to save or open the file.

5. Save or open the file.

Printing a Connectivity Design

You can print a connectivity design for review outside of UIM.

To print a connectivity design:

- Open a Connectivity Details page.
- Click the Connectivity Design tab.
- 3. If necessary, select the path.
- 4. In the toolbar, click the **Print** icon.

The connectivity design is displayed as a new web page outside of UIM.

5. Print the web page by using the browser's print capabilities.

For some technologies, a connectivity can be enabled with multiple paths. You configure each path separately. Path 1 is created automatically.

Creating Paths

Connectivities can be enabled with one or more paths. For some technologies, such as SONET, SDH, and DWDM, an unlimited number of paths is possible. You design each path separately. Path 1 is created automatically.

To create a path:

- Open a Connectivity Details page.
- Click the Connectivity Design tab.
- In the upper-left corner of the page, click the Create Another Path button (a green plus sign).

Switching Between Paths

If a connectivity has two paths, you can switch between them to see their details.

To switch between paths:

- Open a Connectivity Details page.
- 2. Click the Connectivity Design tab.
- 3. In the upper left of the page, click Path 1 or Path 2.



The page displays information about the path you selected.

Deleting Paths

If a connectivity has two paths, you can delete one of them in the **Connectivity Design** tab.

To delete a path:

- 1. Open a Connectivity Details page.
- 2. Click the Connectivity Design tab.
- In the upper left of the page, click Path 1 or Path 2 to go to the path you want to delete.
 The page displays information about the path you selected.
- 4. Click the **Delete the Selected Path** icon (a red X).

Duplicating a Path

You can duplicate a currently existing path so that you can modify the design as a secondary path.

To duplicate a path:

- 1. Open a Connectivity Details page.
- Click the Connectivity Design tab.
- 3. In the upper left of the page, click the **Duplicate the Selected Path** icon.

A second path is created and displayed. It has the same design as the first.

Managing Design Versions

When you create a Connectivity entity, the first design version is created automatically, but you must create all subsequent versions manually. Only one design version can be active at a time; you cannot create a new design version until the current one is completed or canceled. You cannot make changes to design versions that are completed or canceled.

Canceling an In-Progress Design Version

You can cancel an in-progress design version that you have not yet completed.

To cancel an in-progress design version:

The in-progress design version is displayed.

3. In the upper-right corner of the page, click **Design Versions**.

The Design Versions dialog box appears, displaying a list of current and previous versions.

Completing a Design Version

3. From the **Actions** menu, select **Complete**.

The status of the design version changes to Completed.

Viewing a Previous Design Version

To view a previous design version:

- Open a Connectivity Details page.
- Click the Connectivity Design tab.

The in-progress design version is displayed.

3. In the upper-right corner of the page, click **Design Versions**.



The Design Versions dialog box appears, displaying a list of current and previous versions.

- 4. Select the design version you want to view.
- 5. Click Apply.

The dialog box closes and the page displays the previous design version you selected.

Terminating a Connectivity

You terminate a connectivity by associating its A and Z end points with interfaces. Your termination choices vary by connectivity type:

- For all connectivity types except packet connectivity enabled by packet connectivity, you
 can terminate on a media interface as long as it has sufficient capacity.
- For packet and service connectivities, you can terminate on a flow interface. You search
 for a media interface and then create a flow interface on which to terminate the
 connectivity. The flow interface has the same capacity as the connectivity.
- For channelized connectivity, you can choose to virtually terminate on the same interface as its enabling channel.

To terminate a connectivity:

- Open a Connectivity Details page.
- 2. Click the Connectivity Design tab.
- 3. If necessary, select the path.
- Assign an interface to the A location:
 - a. In the A Location column, click the Assign Interface button.
 - **b.** Select one of the following three options, depending on the type of connectivity you are designing:

Terminate at Media Interface to search for a media interface on which to terminate the connectivity.

Terminate at Flow Interface to search for a media interface that will provide a flow interface on which to terminate the connectivity. UIM creates the flow interface with the bit rate of the connectivity being terminated. (Available only for packet and service connectivities.)

Terminate at Channel to virtually terminate the connectivity on the same interface as its enabling channel. (Available only for channelized connectivities.)

 When the search page appears, enter additional criteria if necessary, then click Search.

Search results are displayed below the search criteria.

d. Select an interface, then click **OK**.

The search area is removed and the selected interface is assigned.

5. Repeat step 4 for the Z location.

Removing a Terminating Interface

To remove a terminating interface:

- Open a Connectivity Details page.
- 2. Click the Connectivity Design tab.
- 3. If necessary, select the path.
- Click the Remove icon next to the identifier for a device interface that terminates a connectivity.

The terminating interface is removed.

Working with Gaps

Gaps represent segments of a path for which connectivity details are undefined or unknown. To complete a connectivity design, you must do one of the following:

- Resolve the gap by assigning a connectivity or pipe to it. This process is also called "assigning transport."
- Accept the gap and supply a reason for doing so.

The process of resolving gaps is called enablement. Enablement defines how a connectivity receives its capacity.

Accepting Gaps

A connectivity gap can sometimes be valid from a business perspective. For example, part of the trail may pass through a third-party network where the details are not known. In these cases, you can mark a gap as accepted. Marking a gap as accepted means that the connectivity design can be completed.

To accept a gap:

- Open a Connectivity Details page.
- 2. Click the **Connectivity Design** tab.
- 3. If necessary, select the path.

The page displays the connectivity design.



4. Click the **Gap** icon (a red circle with an exclamation point) in a row.

The Accept Gap dialog box appears.

- in the Reason field, enter a brief description.
- 6. Click OK.

The red exclamation point icon is replaced with a green check mark. The reason you entered appears in the row.

Removing a Gap Acceptance

You can remove the acceptance of a gap. This action returns the gap to unresolved status, meaning that the connectivity design cannot be completed until the gap is resolved or accepted.



You cannot remove a gap acceptance after a design has been completed. You must create a new design version to make this change.

To remove a gap acceptance:

- Open a Connectivity Details page.
- Click the Connectivity Design tab.
- If necessary, select the path.

The page displays the connectivity design.

4. Click the **Accepted Gap** icon (a green check mark) in a row.

The check mark is removed and replaced by the **Gap** icon (a red circle with an exclamation point). The gap is now unresolved.

Manually Assigning Connectivity to a Gap

You can assign a channel, connectivity, or a pipe to a segment to resolve a connectivity gap. Pipes must be terminated on network devices (logical devices associated to network locations) to be used for this purpose.

To manually assign connectivity to a gap:

- Open a Connectivity Details page.
- 2. Click the Connectivity Design tab.

The page displays information about the in-progress design version.

- 3. If necessary, click Path 2 to display the path you are working on.
- Click the Assign Connectivity button near a Gap icon.
- 5. Select **Connectivity** or **Pipe** from the menu that appears.

A Search area appears at the bottom of the page.

6. Search for a Pipe or Connectivity entity.

Search results are displayed in a tree structure below the search criteria.



- If you selected a channelized connectivity, expand the hierarchy to select the desired channel.
- 8. Click Apply.

The search area is removed and the table displays the connectivity assignment. Depending on the design, additional gaps may appear. Trail-bound cross-connects may be created as a result of the connectivity assignment. Pre-existing interface-bound cross-connects may be included.

Automatically Resolving Gaps by Using Gap Analysis

You can use gap analysis to find channels and connectivities that resolve connectivity gaps. You provide criteria about how to resolve the gap. Gap analysis locates channels and connectivities that meet the criteria.

Gap analysis is similar to path analysis, but does not find Pipe entities. See "Automatically Resolving Gaps by Using Path Analysis" for information about automatically resolving gaps by assigning pipe connectivity.

To resolve a gap by using gap analysis:

- 1. Open a Connectivity Details page.
- Click the Connectivity Design tab.
- 3. If necessary, select the path.
- 4. Click the Gap Analysis button near the Gap icon.
- 5. Select **Channel** from the menu that appears.

The Gap Analysis section appears in the page. The section is divided into three columns: one for the source, one for an optional intermediate node, and one for the target.

- 6. In the Source column:
 - a. In the **Network/Entity Location** field, enter the first few characters of a network location code or network entity code, then select from the list that appears.
 - **b.** In the **Device Identifier** field, enter the first few characters of a device identifier, then select from the list that appears.
- (Optional) In the Intermediate Node column, repeat step 6.
- 8. In the **Target** column, repeat step 6.
- 9. (Optional) Select Include Jumpers in Path if you want to include any jumpers in the path.
- From Cost Effective Routing, select a routing type that changes the values in Filter By and Algorithm fields accordingly. The available routing options are: Equal Weights (Hops) and Least Cost.
- **11.** (Optional) From **Algorithm**, select an algorithm to control the topological view of the path analysis.



The algorithm options change based on the **Cost Effective Routing** option you select

12. From Filter By, select an option to filter the path analysis.



Note:

The **Filter By** options change based on the **Cost Effective Routing** option you select.

13. From K(# of Paths), select the number of paths you want to view.

Note:

This field is enabled only if **Algorithm** is either **Top K Shortest** or **Top K Cheapest**. These two **Algorithm** values populate based on the **Cost Effective Routing** option selected.

- **14.** Select **Custom Tuning** to control the number of paths returned.
- 15. Click Analyze.

The Gap Analysis Results section appears below the Gap Analysis section. The proposed paths are categorized by the number of hops they contain.

- **16.** Click the triangle for a row to see a proposed path.
- 17. Select the button for a path, then click **Assign**.

The table displays the connectivity assignment and may also display interconnections and additional gaps.

Automatically Resolving Gaps by Using Path Analysis

You can use path analysis to find Pipe entities that resolve connectivity gaps in a Connectivity entity. Pipes must be terminated on network devices (logical devices associated to network locations) to be used for this purpose.

When you enter the criteria for the path analysis, you use the same techniques as when running a path analysis from a Pipe entity Summary page. See "Running a Path Analysis" for information about entering the criteria.

To resolve a gap by using path analysis:

- Open a Connectivity Details page.
- Click the Connectivity Design tab.
- **3.** If necessary, select the path.
- 4. Click the **Gap Analysis** button near the **Gap** icon.
- **5.** Select **Pipe** from the menu that appears.

The Path Analysis section appears in the page.

- 6. Enter path analysis criteria.
- Click Analyze.

The Gap Analysis Results section appears below the Path Analysis section in the page. The proposed paths are categorized by the number of hops they contain.

- 8. Click the triangle for a row to see a proposed path.
- Select the button for a path, then click Assign.



The table displays the connectivity assignment and may also display interconnections and additional gaps.

Deleting a Connectivity Segment

After you have assigned transport to a segment, you can delete the transport and any interconnections that have been automatically created to support it.

To delete a connectivity segment:

- Open a Connectivity Details page.
- 2. Click the Connectivity Design tab.
- 3. If necessary, select the path.
- 4. Click the button for a segment, which may incorporate more than one row.

The rows pertaining to the segment are selected.

5. Click the **Delete** button in the toolbar.

The connectivity segment is deleted.

Unassigning Transport From a Design

You can unassign a connectivity or pipe from a design path segment.

To unassign transport assignment:

- Open a Connectivity Details page.
- Click the Connectivity Design tab.
- 3. If necessary, select the path.
- 4. Click the **Unassign** icon next to the identifier for an assigned pipe or connectivity.

The transport assignment is removed.

Adding an Interconnection

You can add a trail-bound cross-connect or a jumper to resolve a gap that exists between two device interfaces in the same network location. If the gap is between root-level device interfaces (including device interfaces on different logical devices) UIM creates a jumper. If the gap is between device interfaces on the same logical device and not between root-level device interfaces, UIM creates a cross-connect.

UIM displays an error message if you try to add an interconnection that includes an interface that terminates a pipe or connectivity not included in the connectivity you are designing.

To add an interconnection:

- 1. Open a Connectivity Details page.
- Click the Connectivity Design tab.
- 3. If necessary, select the path.
- 4. Click the Create Interconnection icon in a row.

The Associate Device Interface dialog box appears, which includes search criteria. The **Network/Entity Location** field is populated with the location in which the two interfaces exist.



5. Enter additional search criteria if necessary, then click **Search**.

Search results are displayed below the search criteria.

Select an interface, then click OK.

The search area is removed and an interconnection is created.

Viewing Transport Details

You can view the details of the transport assigned to a connectivity segment.

To view transport details:

- Open a Connectivity Details page.
- 2. Click the Connectivity Design tab.
- If necessary, select the path.
- 4. Click the link for a pipe or a channel that is assigned to a segment.

The Details page or Summary page for the pipe or channel appears.

Viewing Network Details

You can open the Network Summary page for the network associated with a device interface or transport entity that is included in the connectivity path.

To view network details:

- Open a Connectivity Details page.
- Click the Connectivity Design tab.
- 3. If necessary, select the path.
- Click the network icon in a row segment.

The Network Summary page appears.

Assigning Flow Identifiers in the Connectivity Design Tab

You can assign flow identifiers while you are designing packet connectivities You can assign flow identifiers to the connectivity being designed or to individual segments in the design.

When you assign a flow identifier during connectivity design, it is assigned to the connectivity and referenced by one or both of its flow interfaces.

You can also assign flow interfaces while you are designing packet virtual networks. See "Assigning Flow Identifiers in the Network Topological View" for more information.

The selected flow identifier is assigned to the connectivity and referenced the flow interfaces at the A or Z location.

Connectivity segments enable the connectivity you are designing. When you assign a flow identifier to a connectivity segment, you are assigning it to the enabling connectivity, not to the connectivity being designed. The flow identifier is also referenced by the flow interfaces that were created when the segment was added to the design.



Flow Identifier assignment is allowed for both packet service connectivity and standalone service connectivity.

- 3. In a connectivity segment, click the **Assign Flow Identifier** icon.

The Flow Identifier Search page appears.

Search for and select a flow identifier.



The selected flow identifier is assigned to the connectivity and referenced by the flow interfaces that terminate it.

You can unassign flow identifiers from connectivities being designed and from connectivity segments. When you unassign a flow identifier, it is also de-referenced from flow interfaces.

If a connectivity has a flow identifier assigned to it and referenced by both flow interfaces, removing the flow identifier from one of the flow interfaces does not remove the assignment to the connectivity.

- 2. Click the Connectivity Design tab.
- In the toolbar, in an A or Z location of the connectivity being designed, or in a connectivity segment, click the Unassign Flow Identifier icon.

The flow identifier is unassigned and de-referenced.

The visualization uses icons to represent the various elements of the connectivity design. The icons are a combination of those used in network visualizations and those used in the **Design** subtab. See "Connectivity Design Tab" and "Network Topological View Page" for illustrations of the icons.

The **Schematic** subtab includes tools that you use to control the view. Many of these tools are common to all similar features in UIM. See "Working with Visualizations and Diagrams" for more information.

The **Schematic** subtab in the **Connectivity Design** tab contains a visualization of the connectivity design that is shown in tabular form in the **Design** subtab.

The current connectivity design is displayed visually in the tab.

(Optional) Select a previous connectivity design version in the **Design Versions** list.

The selected connectivity design version is displayed visually in the tab.

If a connectivity design includes two paths, both are shown in the connectivity design visualization. You can highlight either of the two paths to make it more visible.

Viewing Termination Details

The connectivity design visualization displays A and Z network locations as well as devices or network locations on which connectivities are terminated. Devices and network locations are shown as icons. You can expand the icons to view more detailed termination information. For example, you can expand a device to see the device interfaces on which connectivities are terminated and any interconnections between those interfaces.

You can view termination details for individual devices and locations or for all devices and locations in the visualization.

To view termination details for a single device or locations:

In Connectivity Design tab, click the Schematic subtab.



The connectivity design visualization appears.

2. Click the plus icon in a device or location icon.

The icon expands into a box shape.

- 3. Hover the mouse cursor over the device or location to view the label that shows device interface and physical port details.
- 4. Click the minus icon to collapse the box to an icon.

To view all termination details:

1. In the toolbar, click Open Subgraphs.

All termination points in the visualization expand to show their resource termination.

2. Click Close Subgraphs to collapse all the termination points.

You can view connectivity design in a map from the Map View page. The Map View page for a Connectivity uses the default settings present in topologyProcess.properties file.

- 3. Click the **Map View** tab under the Connectivity Design tab.

The Map View page appears.

Use the Map View page of a connectivity to view the trail connectivity and all its design segments in all paths.

You cannot make any changes to the connectivity from the Map View page, but you can use tools to control the map display. You can make any changes to the connectivity from the **Connectivity Design** tab.

The hierarchy of the current design connectivity appears.

4. From the **Paths** list, select the path you want to view.

The path you selected is highlighted in green. Selecting any other path toggles the highlighting.

5. Click the plus icon in a device or location icon.

The icon expands into a box shape showing all the cross connects.



To close the box, click the minus icon.

6. Select an element in the hierarchy diagram and navigate to the information section on the right of the page.

The name and ID of the entity appears.



You can view the corresponding entity summary page by clicking on the link from the information section.

7. In the upper-right corner of the page, click **Design Versions**.

The Design Versions dialog box appears, displaying a list of current and previous versions.



You can create a new version from the Design Versions dialog box by clicking **Create New Version**.

Configuring Capacity of Channelized Connectivity

You use the **Capacity** tab in the Connectivity Details page to configure the signal structure of a channelized connectivity based on the rate code applied to it. You select from the channel structures that are valid for the rate code and technology applied to the connectivity. You can configure a the entire signal structure automatically or you can configure the channels individually.

The capacity hierarchy shows the signal structure with rate codes displayed as linked nodes. You can change many aspects about the display, including the number and arrangement of nodes and levels.

Opening and Closing Levels

When you first open the capacity hierarchy, only the top-level node is displayed, even if additional levels exist. You must open levels to see the nodes they contain. You must open each successive level individually.

To open a level:

- Navigate to Capacity tab of the Connectivity Details page.
- 2. Click the small triangle on the bottom or side of a node.

The triangle expands and displays a plus sign.

Click the plus sign.

The next level in the hierarchy appears.

To close a level:

 In the Capacity tab, click the small triangle on the bottom or side of a node that connects to the lower level.

The triangle expands and displays a minus sign.

Click the minus sign.

The next lower level in the hierarchy (and any lower levels that are displayed) is no longer visible.

Viewing Hidden Nodes in a Level

A level in a hierarchy can contain many nodes, not all of which are visible at the same time. (The number of visible nodes depends on the zoom level and layout of the display.) You can move through the nodes at a level by using controls in the display.

To view hidden nodes in a level:

- 1. Navigate to **Capacity** tab of the Connectivity Details page.
- Place the cursor over the arrowhead at the end of a line that connects the nodes in a level.The arrowhead expands into a triangle icon and a triangle-and-line icon.
- Click the triangle icon to move to the next or previous group of nodes. Click the triangleand-line icon to move to the first or last group of nodes in the level.

Isolating Nodes

You can isolate a node, thereby hiding other nodes. This feature is useful when the hierarchy is complex and contains many nodes and levels.

To isolate a node:

- Navigate to Capacity tab of the Connectivity Details page.

- 3. Place the cursor over the small triangle projecting from the side of the node opposite to the line that connects it to other nodes.

The triangle expands to show an apostrophe icon.

- 4. Click the apostrophe icon.
 - All nodes disappear except for the one whose icon you clicked.
- Click the apostrophe icon again to return to the full display of nodes.

Viewing Node Information

Each node displays information about the connectivity or channel it represents. Each node has two pages that you switch between:

- The first page includes the Express Configuration link and the check box that determines whether a channel is available for consumption.
- The second page displays information about channelization and the percent of capacity that is available for consumption.



To switch node pages:

 Click the arrow button on either side of the node. Alternatively, click the square icons in the node. The squares represent the node's pages.

Changing the Capacity Hierarchy Layout

You can choose from several layouts that determine how the capacity hierarchy is arranged:

- Vertical, Top Down. Nodes are arranged vertically with the highest level at the top.
- Horizontal, Left to Right. Nodes are arranged horizontally, with the highest level at the left.
- Tree. Nodes are arranged in a vertically-oriented tree structure, with lower levels as branches from higher levels.
- Radial. Nodes are arranged radially, with the highest level at the center.
- Circle. Nodes are arranged with the highest level at the center and lower levels arranged in circles around it.

To change the capacity hierarchy layout:

- 1. Navigate to **Capacity** tab of the Connectivity Details page.
- 2. In the Capacity tab, click the Layout icon in the control section.

A column of layout icons appears below the control section.

3. Click a layout icon.

The layout icons disappear and the capacity hierarchy is rearranged.

4. Click Save or Save and Close.

Zooming In the Capacity Hierarchy

You can zoom in and out of the capacity hierarchy. This feature is particularly useful when a large, complex hierarchy is displayed. You can also set the zoom level to automatically fit the page.

To zoom in the capacity hierarchy:

- In the Capacity tab, do one of the following:
 - Slide the zoom indicator in the control section up or down to change the zoom level.
 - Click the + or button to zoom incrementally.

To set the zoom level automatically:

In the Capacity tab, click the Zoom to Fit icon in the control section.

The capacity hierarchy zooms in or out to fit in the page.

Moving In the Capacity Hierarchy Display

You can use the pan control to move through the capacity hierarchy display to view different areas. You can also recenter the display automatically.

To move in the capacity hierarchy display:

 In the Capacity tab, click an arrow in the pan control to move in the corresponding direction. You can simultaneously rotate the control to reorient the display after panning.



The control moves the viewing area, not the hierarchy itself. So clicking the left arrow means that the display appears to move to the right across the screen.

To recenter the display automatically:

In the Capacity tab, click the dot in the middle of the pan control.

The capacity hierarchy display is recentered.

Changing Channel Availability

A check mark in the first page of a node icon indicates whether the channel represented by the node is available for consumption.

- If a check mark is visible, the channel is available for consumption.
- If no check mark is visible, the channel has been multiplexed and is not available for consumption as a whole.

If you want to multiplex a channel that is currently available for consumption, you must deselect the check box. You cannot change the availability of a channel that has already been assigned.

To change channel availability:

- In the Capacity tab, expand a level to display the node for the channel you want to multiplex.
- 2. De-select the check mark in node.

The channel is no longer available for consumption.

3. From the list, select a multiplexing option and click **OK**.

The dialog box closes and UIM configures the signal structure based on your selection. Hierarchy levels above the lowest level are marked as unavailable.

Click Save or Save and Close.

Configuring Capacity Automatically

You can configure the signal structure of connectivity or channel automatically by using the Express Configuration feature. You select the lowest-level channel you want to configure. UIM determines the most efficient signal structure that includes that channel level. It creates any channels or processing signals that are required.

To configure capacity automatically:

- 1. Open a Connectivity Details page.
- Click the Capacity tab.
- If necessary, open a level to display the connectivity or channel you want to configure.
- 4. Click the **Express Configuration** link in the connectivity or channel node.

The Express Configuration dialog box appears.

- 5. From the list, select an option.
- 6. From the **Quantity** list, select an option.





For SDH technology, you can select the quantity only for VC4 node.

Click OK.

The dialog box closes and UIM configures the signal structure based on your selection. Hierarchy levels about the lowest level are marked as unavailable.

If you do not want the signal structure of a connectivity to be uniformly configured at all levels, you can configure the connectivity's capacity manually. When you manually configure capacity, you work on individual nodes and levels one at a time until the entire signal structure is complete.

- Click the Capacity tab.
- 3. Expand the hierarchy to display the connectivity or channel you want to configure.
- 4. If necessary, deselect the check mark.
- Click the Express Configuration link in the node.

The Express Configuration dialog box appears.

- 6. From the list, select an option.
- 7. From the **Quantity** list, select an option.



For SDH technology, you can select the quantity only for VC4.

8. Click OK.

The dialog box closes and UIM configures the signal structure based on your selection. Hierarchy levels about the lowest level are marked as unavailable.

9. Repeat steps 3 through 6 for each node you want to configure.

Viewing Channels in a Channelized Connectivity

You use the **Channels** tab in the Connectivity Details page to view the channel hierarchy of a channelized connectivity. The channel hierarchy is based on the signal architecture determined by the connectivity's rate code and the channel configuration you select in the **Capacity** tab. For some technologies, such as SONET, SDH, and DWDM, the channel hierarchy includes signals that organize how the connectivity is channelized.

To view channels:

- Open the Connectivity Details page of a channelized connectivity.
- 2. Click the Channels tab.

A table listing the top-level channels is displayed. For channels that have been enabled, the channel ID, inventory status, and connectivity identifier are shown.

- 3. Expand the hierarchy to view additional channels.
- (Optional) To see detailed information about an enabled channel, right-click it and select Navigate to Assigned Connectivity Details.

The Connectivity Details page for the selected channel appears. You can return to the original page by using the **Recent Items** menu.

Viewing Riders in a Packet Connectivity

You use the **Riders** tab in the Connectivity Details page to view connectivities or pipes that are enabled by or *ride* a packet connectivity.

To view riders:

- Open the Connectivity Details page of a packet connectivity.
- 2. Click the Riders tab.

A table is displayed with the connectivity at the top. If the connectivity has riders, a triangle indicates that you can expand the row.

- **3.** Expand the top-level row to see a list of riders.
- To see detailed information about a rider, right-click it and select View Assigned Connectivity Details.



The Connectivity Details or Pipe Summary page for the selected connectivity or pipe appears. You can return to the original page by using the **Recent Items** menu.

Viewing Information About Consumption of Packet Connectivity with Riders

You can view information about the consumption of capacity of packet connectivities with riders.

When you search for packet connectivities, the search results include highlighting for connectivities whose consumption has reached threshold values. By default, the **Bit Rate** column for packet connectivities with greater than 50% consumption are highlighted in yellow and packet connectivities with greater than 80% capacity are highlighted in red.

Both the threshold values and the colors are configurable. See *UIM System Administrator's Guide* for more information.

To view information about flow interface consumption:

- Open the Logical Device Summary page of a logical device whose hierarchy includes flow interfaces.
- In the Logical Device Hierarchy section, expand the hierarchy to display the flow interfaces.

The **Percent Consumed** column and row highlighting indicate the consumption level of the flow interfaces.

Working with Pipes, Capacity, and Signal Structure

In Oracle Communications Unified Inventory Management (UIM), Pipe entities are a generalized way to represent connectivity in your inventory. In most cases, you can use Connectivity entities instead of pipes. Connectivity entities provide more functionality and require less customization. See "Working with Connectivity" for more information.

The connection represented by a pipe can be physical, such as a cable, or logical, such as traffic flow. Common examples of pipes include cables, cable pairs, jumpers, cross-connects, service links, and local loops.

Every pipe requires two termination points. These termination points can be associated with resources, such as device interfaces, equipment, and ports, to indicate that the pipe is terminated on those resources. You can set the directionality of the pipe between the two termination points.

Pipes can provide other pipes, as in the case of a T3 facility pipe providing T1 channel pipes. Also, pipes can enable each other. For example, a service trail pipe that represents a customer's local telephone service can be enabled by several other pipes that represent cable pair connections between various devices from the central office to the subscriber terminal.

Pipes can be versioned by using pipe configurations. Pipe configurations enable you to update the enablement and termination point assignments as changes are made in your inventory.

Pipes provide and require capacity in the form of bandwidth. You can define the capacity provided and required explicitly or as part of a multiplexing hierarchy defined by a signal structure.

You can include pipes in business interactions, reservations, and inventory groups in the same way that you include other entities. You can also apply conditions, associate places, assign roles, and search for pipes in topology using the same techniques that you use for other entities.

Creating Pipes

When creating pipes, you can determine whether to version the pipe. This option is available only if the Pipe specification is associated with one or more Pipe Configuration specification.

Note:

If you choose to version a pipe when you create it, you cannot change it later to unversioned status after a version has been created.

You can enable versioning for unversioned pipes that are associated with one or more Pipe Configuration specification.

When you create a Pipe entity, two termination points for it are created automatically. If the Pipe specification includes a Pipe Termination Point specification, it is used to create the termination points. Otherwise, they are created without specification.

To create a Pipe entity:

- 1. In the Inventory Resources group of the navigation section, click Pipe.
 - The Pipes Search page appears.
- 2. In the Search Results section, click **Create**.
 - The Pipe Connectivity New page appears.
- 3. From the **Specification** list, select the specification you want to use for this pipe.
 - The page refreshes to include any customized fields from the specification. If the specification you selected is associated with one or more Pipe Configuration specifications, the **Versioned** check box becomes available.
- 4. In the **ID** field, enter a unique ID for the entity.
 - The ID cannot be changed later. The specification may require that the ID be automatically generated. In these cases, the field is populated with **AUTOGENERATE** and is read only.
- 5. (Optional) In the Name and Description fields, enter a name and a description.
- (Optional) From the Medium list, select the option that describes the connection medium.
- (Optional) From the Transmission Signal list, select the option that describes the type of connection.
- (Optional) Select Versioned to version this pipe entity.
- 9. (Optional) Select **Allow secondary enablement** if you want the pipe to be enabled by both a primary and a secondary path. See "Manually Enabling Pipes" and "Enabling Pipes Automatically with Path Analysis" for more information.
- 10. Enter appropriate information for all required fields.
 - Depending on the specification, there can be any number of additional fields, some of which may be required. Required fields are marked with an asterisk. See "Pipe Connectivity New Page" for more information about the fields in this page.
- 11. Click Save and Continue.

The Pipe Summary page for the pipe you created appears. The Termination Points section includes the termination points that were created automatically.



Configuring Existing Pipes for Secondary Enablement

You can configure a pipe for secondary enablement after it has been created, even if it already has one enablement.

To configure an existing pipe for secondary enablement:

- In the Pipe Information section of Pipe Summary page, click the Edit link.
 The Pipe Information page appears.
- 2. Select Allow secondary enablement.
- 3. Click Save and Close.

The Pipe Summary page refreshes. The Allow secondary enablement field is set to true.

Working with Termination Points

Every pipe requires exactly two termination points. When you create a Pipe entity, two termination points for it are created automatically. If a Pipe Termination Point specification is related to the Pipe specification, it is used to create the termination points. Pipe Termination Point specifications are typically used to add customized fields to termination points. If no specification is defined, termination points are created without a specification.

A pipe's termination points are listed in the Termination Points section of the Pipe Summary page. The IDs of the termination points are shown, along with the name of their specification (if any) and other information. The ID is displayed as a link to a Summary page for the termination point.

You can also assign resources to termination points. For example, you can assign a device interface to a termination point to indicate that one end of a pipe terminates on that interface. Resource assignments are important for pipe enablement, especially when using path analysis for automatic enablement. See "Enabling Pipes Automatically with Path Analysis" for more information. The way you work with termination point assignments depends on whether the parent pipe is versioned.

Termination points share some of the features of other entities. You can include them in inventory groups, manage their life cycles, and associate them with places.

Assigning Resources to Termination Points for Universioned Pipes

You assign resources for unversioned pipes from the Pipe Summary page. These assignments are valid until you change them.

To assign a resource to a termination point:

- Open the Summary page of the Pipe entity that contains the termination point to which you
 want to assign resources.
- 2. On the **General Information** tab, termination points are shown in the Termination Points section.
- In the Termination Points section, do one of the following:
 - Click the Terminate at Resource list icon beside the ID link for a termination point.
 - A list of resource types appears.
 - Click the ID link for a termination point.

The Termination Point Summary page appears. Current assignments are shown in the Resource Terminations section for each resource type.

In the Resource Terminations section, click Items.

A list of resource types appears.

4. Select a resource type from the list.

The entity Search page appears for the resource type.

Search for or create an entity you want to assign.

- Click OK.

In the Pipe Summary page, the **General Information** tab refreshes. The Termination Points section now displays the resource.

Assigning Resources to Termination Points for Versioned Pipes

When a pipe is versioned, the Termination Point Summary page that you open from the Pipe Summary page displays lists of assignments for each resource type grouped by version. This enables you to see the assignments that were valid in each version and note how they changed.

Resource assignments for versioned pipes are started from the Pipe Configuration page. The assignments can be updated from version to version of the configuration. The assignments in the current configuration (the one in Complete status) apply. You cannot make changes to assignments in a configuration that has been completed or canceled.

To assign a resource to a termination point in a versioned pipe:

- 1. Open the Summary page of a versioned Pipe entity.
- On the General Information tab, in the Configurations section, click the link in the Version column.

The configuration version appears in the Pipe Configuration page.

3. In the Pipe Configuration Enablement section, click the ID link for a termination point.

The termination point ID link appears above the list of enabling pipes. When you click the ID, the Termination Point Summary page for the termination point appears. Current assignments are shown in the Resource Terminations section for each resource type.

4. In the Resource Terminations section, click Items.

A list of resources appears.

5. Select the resource that you want to assign.

The entity Search page appears.

6. Search for or create an entity you want to assign.

7. In the Search Results section, select an entity whose Resource Assignment status is Unassigned and click **Associate**.

The Termination Point Summary page refreshes. The Terminations section now displays the resource with a resource assignment status of Assigned.

You can delete termination point assignments. Deleting the assignment does not delete the resource entity, but it sets the entity's resource assignment status to Unassigned.



Note:

You cannot remove assignments for configuration versions in Complete or Canceled status.

To delete termination point resource assignments:

 - For a versioned pipe, open the Pipe Configuration page and click the ID link for a termination point above the list of enabling pipes.
 - For an unversioned pipe, click an ID link in the Termination Point section of the Pipe Summary page.

The Termination Point Summary page appears.

- In the Resource Terminations section, select one or more assignments.
- Click Delete.

The Termination Point page refreshes and the assignments are deleted.

Setting Pipe Directionality

You can set the direction that signals or routes flow through a pipe. You set the directionality of a pipe by specifying which termination point is the *source* (starting point) and which is the *sink* (ending point). Signals and routes flow from source to sink.

The Pipe Termination Directionality section of a Pipe Summary page displays the directionality defined for the pipe. There can be up to two directionality settings listed:

- Signal directionality refers to the direction that signals flow on the pipe. Most pipes are bidirectional, meaning that signals flow in both directions. Other pipes are uni-directional, meaning that signals flow in one direction only. Examples of uni-directional pipes are seismograph, alarm, and control operation connections.
- Routing directionality constrains or enables functions such as path analysis. For example, you can define a pipe as uni-directional for routing purposes to constrain the route of a connection from an originating point to a specific terminating point while avoiding certain path segments.

To set pipe directionality:

- 1. Open the Summary page of the Pipe entity for which you want to set pipe directionality.
- 2. In the Pipe Termination Directionality section, click **Create**.

The Pipe Directionality Information page appears.

- 3. In the Directionality Type list, select Signal or Routing.
- 4. In the Pipe Direction list, select Uni-Directional.



Note:

Selecting **Bi-Directional** is equivalent to leaving directionality undefined.

- 5. In the **Direction Type 1** list, select **Source** if the termination point is a starting point or **Sink** if the termination point is the ending point.
- In the Direction Type 2 list, select an option different from the one you selected for Direction Type 1.
- Click Save and Close.

The Pipe Summary page refreshes and includes the new directionality setting. You can modify the directionality settings in the Pipe Termination Directionality section.

If a Pipe specification is associated with child Pipe specifications and does not have a signal structure, you can add child pipes to the parent. These child pipes are provided by a parent pipe. For example, if you have a Pipe entity for a 25-pair cable, you can add 25 cable-pair Pipe entities to it.

When you create a parent Pipe entity, child pipes are created automatically based on the minimum quantity specified by the parent Pipe specification. You can add additional child pipes up to the maximum specified in the relationship between the parent and child Pipe specifications. If more than the minimum number of child pipes have been added, you can delete pipes until the minimum is reached.

Adding Child Pipes

You can add child pipes to a Pipe entity, up to the maximum number specified by its specification. You can add only Pipe specification entities that are included in the parent Pipe specification.

If you create more than one pipe, the same identifying information, such as name, description, and so on, will be used for all. Versioning is not available for child pipes.



To add child pipes:

- 1. Open the Summary page of the Pipe entity for which you want to add child pipes.
- 2. From the **Related Pages** menu, select **Provides**.

The Pipe Provides page appears, listing any child pipes.

Click Create.

The Pipe Edit - New page appears.

4. In the **Specification** list, select a specification that is valid for child pipes of this parent pipe.

The page refreshes to include any customized fields from the specification. If the specification you selected is associated with one or more Pipe Configuration specifications, the **Versioned** check box becomes available.

5. (Optional) In the **ID** field, enter a unique ID for the child pipes.

If you do not enter an ID, UIM generates sequential IDs that are based on the parent pipe ID.

- 6. (Optional) In the Name and Description fields, enter a name and a description.
- 7. (Optional) In the **Medium** list, select the option that describes the connection medium.
- 8. (Optional) In the **Transmission Signal Type** list, select the option that describes the type of connection.
- 9. In the **Quantity** field, enter the number of pipes you want to add.

UIM displays an error if the number exceeds the maximum defined by the parent Pipe specification.

10. Enter information for all other required fields.

Depending on the specification, there can be any number of additional fields, some of which may be required. Required fields are marked with an asterisk. See "Pipe Connectivity - New Page" for more information about the fields in this page.

11. Click Save and Close.

The Pipe Provides page refreshes to include the new child pipes. If you attempted to create child pipes that are not valid for the parent pipe or tried to create more than the maximum number allowed, UIM displays an error message.

You can delete child pipes from a parent pipe. You can delete only the number of child pipes that exceeds the minimum defined by the parent Pipe specification. If a child pipe is involved in a pipe enablement, it cannot be deleted.

To delete child pipes:

- Open the Summary page of the Pipe entity from which you want to delete child pipes.
- 2. From the **Related Pages** menu, select **Provides**.

The Pipe Provides page appears, listing any child pipes.



- Select the child pipes to be deleted.
- Click Delete.

The selected pipes are deleted. If the deletion process would have reduced the number below the minimum defined by the parent Pipe specification, UIM makes no deletions and displays an error message.

Working with Pipe Configurations

Pipe configurations enable you to maintain versions that can change over time.



You can use pipe configurations only if the pipe's specification is related to a Pipe Configuration specification. In addition, you can add a configuration only if the pipe is defined as versioned. See "Creating Pipes" for information about versioning pipes.

Pipe configurations are more narrowly focused than other types of configurations: they are used only to define specification options for pipe enablement and termination point assignment. Pipe Configuration specifications can define specification options for the following:

- Transport—The configuration specification can define that particular Pipe specification entities be used for enablement. For example, a pipe configuration specification for a POTS local service trail might limit the enablement to particular entities based on the cable-pair specification.
- Intermediate node—This specifies a node that would not ordinarily be in a least number of hops path determined by path analysis.
- Termination—The configuration specification can define that resource assignments for some or all entity types be limited to entities of particular specifications. For example, a

configuration specification could define that only particular Equipment specification entities could be assigned to the originating termination point.



The resource assignment definitions in a configuration specification are limited by entity type. For example, limiting resource assignment to a particular Equipment specification limits only the assignment of Equipment entities. You can assign entities based on any specification of other entity types.

The specification options in a configuration specification are enforced when you configure enablement or resource assignment. They also apply during automatic enablement using path analysis. See "Assigning Resources to Termination Points" and "Enabling Pipes" for more information.

Enablement and resource assignment selections you make in a pipe configuration become effective when the configuration is completed. You can create a new configuration version only when the previous version has been completed or canceled. Changes in the new version become effective when the version is completed.

Pipe Configuration Information - New Version Page

You use the Pipe Configuration Information - New Version page to create new pipe configurations.



The fields that appear on this page are determined by the specification used to create the entity. The specification is created in Design Studio. The fields in the following table are common to most specifications of this type.

Enabling Pipes

A pipe can be enabled by one or more other pipes. The enabling pipes establish the connectivity represented in the enabled pipe. For example, a POTS service trail represents the connectivity from a voice switch in a central office to the subscriber terminal. This service trail is enabled by a number of different pipes, including cable pairs between the main distribution frame (MDF) to a cross-connect terminal and from the cross-connect terminal to the subscriber terminal.

Pipes can also be enabled by two connectivity paths. For example, in a SONET or SDH network, a service trail can be enable by a primary path and a secondary (or *protection*) path.

You can enable pipes in two ways:

- You can manually configure the enablement, which involves specifying the enabling cable pairs and their termination points. UIM can automatically create gap pipes to bridge gaps between pipes.
- You can have UIM automatically configure the enablement using path analysis. Path analysis calculates a least-number-of-hops path between two points that you specify.

When you enable a pipe manually or automatically, UIM ensures that the enabling pipes offer the bandwidth required. When you enable a pipe with a channel in a signal structure, UIM by default ensures that the channel has precisely the capacity required by the pipe. You can configure signal structures so that they can support not only signals of exactly matching



capacity but also signals of lesser capacity. For instance, a SONET STS1 channel with a bit rate of 51.840 Mbps can support an STS transmission facility of 51.840 Mbps capacity and also a DS3 facility at a rate of 44.736 Mbps. See *UIM Concepts* and the Design Studio Help for more information about configuring Signal Termination Point specifications for compatible signals.

Manually Enabling Pipes

The method you use to manually enable pipes depends on whether the pipe is versioned and whether it is enabled by one or two connectivity paths.

When you manually configure enablement, UIM can automatically create gap pipes to ensure that there is a continuous path from the originating termination point to the terminating termination point. A gap pipe is required when the enabling pipes you specify do not share a common termination point. For example, if CablePairA has termination points 112 and 113 with 112 set as the originating termination point and CablePairB has termination points 122 and 123 with 123 set as the terminating termination point, UIM creates a gap pipe between termination points 113 and 122.

In a POTS scenario, for example, a cable pair from the MDF terminates on a cross-connect terminal and another cable pair connects the cross-connect terminal block to the subscriber terminal. When you set up the enablement in UIM, a gap pipe would be created to represent a jumper that connects the two termination points on the cross-connect terminal. When the jumper is physically created, you can update the gap pipe entity to reflect information about the jumper.

If you change your mind after beginning to manually enable pipe, you can switch to automatic enablement (path analysis) by clicking the **Alternate Primary Paths** button. After you have already manually enabled a primary path, you can switch to path analysis for the secondary path by clicking the **Alternate Secondary Paths** button. See "Enabling Pipes Automatically with Path Analysis" for more information about automatic enablement.

About Pipe Enablement Lists

When you open the Manual Configure and Pipe Configuration pages, the enabling pipes are displayed in a list.

For each enabling pipe, the list includes columns for the sort order, parent pipe information, child pipe information, and assignment status.



The parent and child pipe and termination point information enables you to see information about all pipes involved in the enablement, including their parents. For example, a cable pair pipe is likely to be a child of another pipe, such as a 100-pair cable. When you include a cable pair in the enablement, the cable pair's name and termination points are shown in the Child TP and Child Pipe columns. The Parent TP and Pipe columns show the name and termination points of the 100-pair cable pipe.

The **Originating Termination Point** and **Terminating Termination Point** fields above the list enable you to set the originating and terminating termination points. In the Pipe Configuration page, the termination points of the pipe being enabled are displayed as links next to these fields. You can use these links to change the resource assignments of the termination points for the configuration. See "Assigning Resources to Termination Points for Versioned Pipes" for more information.

The new Pipe entity appears in the Manual Configure page.

(Optional) Edit the numbers in the Sort Order column and click the Sort to change the order in which the pipes appear.

Pipes should be listed so that the pipe with the originating termination point is first and the pipe with the terminating termination point is last.

Click the Change link next to Originating Termination Point above the list of enabling pipes.

The Termination Points for Pipes dialog box appears, listing the termination points for the first pipe in the list.

- 9. Select a termination point to be the originating termination point and click **Choose**.
 - The termination point you selected appears next to Originating Termination Point.
- Click the Change link next to Terminating Termination Point above the list of enabling pipes.



The Termination Points for Pipes dialog box appears, listing the termination points for the last pipe in the list.

11. Select a termination point to be the terminating termination point and click **Choose**.

The termination point you selected appears next to Terminating Termination Point.

12. Click Save and Update.

UIM checks to ensure that the enabling pipes offer the capacity required by the trail pipe. An error is displayed if there is insufficient capacity. If sufficient capacity exists, UIM creates the gap pipes necessary to create a continuous path from the originating termination point to the terminating termination point. The gap pipes are inserted in their correct positions in the list and the other pipes are reordered as necessary.

13. If the pipe is configured for multiple enablement, repeat steps 2 through **11** in the Secondary Path Enablement section.

Manually Enabling a Versioned Pipe

In a versioned pipe, you can create a different enablement in each configuration version. Changing the enablement is often the reason for creating a new version. After a configuration version has been completed or canceled, you cannot change its enablement. You must create a new configuration version for the updated enablement.

You use the Pipe Configuration Enablement section in the Pipe Configuration page to specify the pipes that enable the parent pipe of the configuration. In most cases, the Pipe Configuration specification will have defined the pipes that can be selected.

To manually enable a versioned pipe:

- 1. Open the Summary page of the Pipe entity that contains a version that you want to manually enable.
- 2. In the Configurations section, click the link in the **Version** column.

The configuration version appears in the Pipe Configuration page.

3. In the Primary Path Enablement section, click **Associate**.

The Add Pipes Search page appears. All returned search results will relate to the entities based on the specifications that are defined as options for the Transport configuration option. If no specifications have been defined, you can search for any pipe.

- Search for or create a Pipe entity.
- 5. In the Search Results section, select the Pipe entity.
- 6. Click OK.

The new pipe appears in the Pipe Configuration Summary page Pipe Configuration Enablement section.

(Optional) Enter appropriate numbers into the fields in the Sort Order column and click the Sort button to change the order in which the pipes appear.

Pipes should be listed so that the pipe with the originating termination point is first and the pipe with the terminating termination point is last.



Click the Change link next to Originating Termination Point above the list of enabling pipes.

The Termination Points for Pipes dialog box appears, listing the termination points for the first pipe in the list.

The termination point you selected appears next to Originating Termination Point.

UIM checks to ensure that the enabling pipes offer the capacity required by the trail pipe. An error is displayed if there is insufficient capacity. If sufficient capacity exists, UIM creates the gap pipes necessary to create a continuous path from the originating termination point to the terminating termination point. The gap pipes are inserted in their correct positions in the list and the other pipes are reordered as necessary.

13. If the pipe is configured for multiple enablement, repeat steps 2 through **11** in the Secondary Path Enablement section.

Enabling Pipes Automatically with Path Analysis

You can use path analysis to automatically enable a pipe. Path analysis finds a path based on criteria that you enter and presents you with a number of possible paths from which to choose. You can search for paths between any of the following:

- Equipment
- Logical device (including devices configured as network entities)
- Network
- Network node
- Physical device
- Place (site and location only)
- Network locations (Property Location entities that have been configured as network locations)

If the pipe you are enabling is configured for multiple enablement, you can use path analysis to find both primary and the secondary connectivity paths. If the pipes and entities associated with them are included in a network, path analysis takes the network's **Protection Type** setting into account when finding secondary paths. For example, different secondary paths may be returned for a network with USPR protections and one with BSLR/2 protection.



Similarly, path analysis considers whether the network is configured for same channel assignment. If a network is configured with this data element, path analysis does not return paths in which it is not possible to ensure that the signal remains on the same channel throughout the path. This may result in no paths being returned even when connectivity exists. See "Creating Networks" for more information.

Running a Path Analysis

You run path analysis to automatically enable a pipe. Path analysis finds a path based on criteria that you enter and presents you with possible paths from which to choose.

To enable a pipe by running path analysis:

- 1. Open the Summary page or the Pipe Configuration page of the Pipe entity for which you want to run a path analysis.
- 2. From the Related Pages menu, select Path Analysis.

The Path Analysis page appears.



If a pipe is terminated at a source and at a target, the source type, source ID, target type, and target ID are prepopulated in the Path Analysis page. You can modify the prepopulated values for the source and target to perform partial path analysis between intermediate nodes.

- 3. In the **Source Type** list, select the type of entity that represents the source.
- In the Source ID field, enter the ID of the source entity.

To locate a source ID:

a. Click Search.

The Search page appears for the source entity.

Search for an existing entity, or create a new entity.

- c. In the Search Results section, select an entity.
- d. Click OK.

The ID appears in the **Source ID** field.



Note:

If the source entity is part of a logical device, physical device, or equipment hierarchy, specify the highest-level entity in the hierarchy as the source.

5. (Optional) Specify information about an intermediate node in the **Intermediate Type** and **Intermediate ID** fields.

- In the Target ID field, enter the ID of the target entity.

To locate a target ID:

The Search page appears for the target entity.

- d. Click OK.

The ID appears in the **Target ID** field.

Note:

If the target entity is part of a logical device, physical device, or equipment hierarchy, specify the highest-level entity in the hierarchy as the source.

- (Optional) Select Include Secondary Paths if you want path analysis to find both primary and secondary paths.
- (Optional) Enter information in all required fields.

10. Click Analyze.

The Available Paths page appears, listing all the paths that exist between the source and the target. Each path consists of one or more segments, each of which is listed in its own row. The ID in the **From ID** column of the first row of the path and the ID in the **To ID** column of the last row in the path represent the source and target you entered. You can view the paths in topology. See "Viewing Paths in Topology" for more information.

11. Select the desired primary path.

If secondary paths are available, they are displayed.

- 12. (Optional) Select the desired secondary path.
- 13. Click Update.

The Pipe Enabled page appears, displaying the primary and optional secondary paths that enable the pipe.

About Intermediate Nodes for Path Analysis

You can include an intermediate node between the source and target in a path analysis. Specifying an intermediate node means that path analysis finds a path that includes that node. For example, you can find a path between a subscriber terminal and a switch that specifies a particular DSLAM as an intermediate node.

You specify the intermediate node when you set the parameters for the path analysis. See "Running a Path Analysis" for more information. You specify the intermediate node by selecting an entity type and then selecting a particular entity of that type.

The entities you can specify as an intermediate node can be limited if the pipe for which you are performing the path analysis has a pipe configuration associated with it. If the pipe configuration specification includes a relationship with one or more entity specifications for the Intermediate Node configuration item, you can specify only entities based on those specifications as intermediate nodes.

Bit Rate	(Optional) Enter a required bit rate to ensure that path analysis finds paths with sufficient capacity. For example, enter 64 for a 64 Kbps connection. Usually, this value is entered automatically from the pipe's capacity-required information. If path analysis fails to find a path using the automatically entered bit rate, you can remove it and run path analysis again. If a path is returned, you can make design changes to accommodate it.
UOM	(Optional) Enter the unit of measure that applies to the bit rate. For example, choose kbps if the bit rate was specified for that unit of measure. Usually, this value is entered automatically from the pipe's capacity-required information.
Quantity	(Optional) Enter the number of connections required. This field is used for fractional TDM services such as Fractional T1. For example, if you need 256 Kbps of capacity, this translates into four 64 Kbps channels. Usually, this value is entered automatically from the pipe's capacity-required information.
Include Partial Paths	(Optional) Select Include Partial Paths if you want to see partial paths through the network in addition to continuous paths. By default, path analysis returns only paths that are continuous through the network from source to target.
	Selecting this option enables the Distance from Source and Distance from Target fields. Enter the required distances and select the corresponding units to view the partial path of a certain distance.
	For example a path from San Francisco to New York may be continuous to and from Dallas, but include a gap in connectivity in Dallas. If you view partial paths, you can see this potential path and possibly decide to build additional connections to complete it.

Algorithm	Select the algorithm to control the topological view of the path analysis.

Viewing Pipe Enablement Information

After you have enabled a pipe, you can view its enablement information in the Manual Configure page for unversioned pipes or in the Pipe Configuration page for versioned pipes. (These are the same pages from which you perform manual enablement.)

Both of these pages display enablement information in lists. If the pipe is configured for single enablement, a single list is shown in the Primary Path Enablement section. If the pipe is configured for secondary enablement, the page displays two lists: one in the Primary Path Enablement section and another in the Secondary Path Enablement section. The Secondary Path Enablement list can be empty if the pipe is configured for secondary enablement but does not yet have a secondary connectivity path.

For each enabling path, the list includes a series of rows, one for each pipe in the path. For each of these pipes, columns display the sort order, parent pipe information, child pipe information, and assignment status.

The parent and child pipe and termination point information enables you to see information about all pipes involved in the enablement, including their parents. For example, a cable pair pipe is likely to be a child of another pipe, such as a 100-pair cable. When you include a cable pair in the enablement, the cable pair's name and termination points are shown in the **Child TP** and **Child Pipe** columns. The **Parent TP** and **Pipe** columns show the name and termination points of the 100-pair cable pipe.

The **Originating Termination Point** and **Terminating Termination Point** fields above the list allow you to set the originating and terminating termination points. In the Pipe Configuration page, the termination points of the pipe being enabled are displayed as links next to these fields. You can use these links to change the resource assignments of the termination points for the configuration. See "Assigning Resources to Termination Points for Versioned Pipes" for more information.

You can modify the enablement from this page. See "Modifying a Pipe Enablement" for more information.

To view enablement information for an unversioned pipe:

In the Pipe Summary page, select Manual Configure from the Related Pages menu.

The Manual Configure page appears. If the pipe is configured for secondary enablement, the page contains both a Primary Path Enablement and a Secondary Path Enablement section. If it is configured for single enablement, only the Primary Path Enablement section is displayed.

To view enablement information for a versioned pipe:

Open a Pipe Configuration page.

If the pipe is configured for secondary enablement, the page contains both a Primary Path Enablement and a Secondary Path Enablement section. If it is configured for single enablement, only the Primary Path Enablement section is displayed.

You can export information from Primary and Secondary Path Enablement separately.

Manual Configure Page

You use the Manual Configure page to specify and view enablement details for an unversioned pipe (a pipe that has no configuration versions). If the pipe is configured for secondary enablement, the page contains both a Primary Path Enablement and a Secondary Path Enablement section. If it is configured for single enablement, only the Primary Path Enablement section is displayed.

Section	Description
Primary Path Enablement	Specify the pipes that enable this pipe of the configuration. If secondary enablement is not selected, this is the only enablement section. See "Manually Enabling an Unversioned Pipe" for more information.
Secondary Path Enablement	If the pipe is configured for secondary enablement, specify the pipes that provide secondary enablement for this pipe. See "Manually Enabling an Unversioned Pipe" for more information.

Modifying a Pipe Enablement

You can modify a pipe enablement that you have performed manually or with path analysis.



You can modify enablements only for pipes, not pipe configurations. To modify a pipe configuration enablement, you must create a new version.

Removing Pipes From a Path

You can remove one or more individual pipes from a connectivity path. In most cases, deleting a pipe makes the path incomplete, so you have to add new pipes to replace the ones you removed.

To remove a pipe from a connectivity path:

- 1. Open the Manual Configure or Pipe Configuration page.
- 2. In the Primary Path Enablement or Secondary Path Enablement section, select one or more pipes in the list.
- Click Delete.

The selected pipes are removed from the list.

- If necessary, add pipes to the path to replace the ones you removed. See "Adding Pipes to a Path" for more information.
- 5. Click Save and Update.

UIM updates the connectivity path, checking for required capacity and creating gap pipes as necessary.

Adding Pipes to a Path

Adding pipes to a connectivity path may cause the connectivity to break, so you may need to delete paths or change the arrangement of existing pipes.

To add a pipe to a connectivity path:

- 1. Open the Manual Configure or Pipe Configuration page.
- 2. In the Primary Path Enablement or Secondary Path Enablement section, click Associate.

The Add Pipes dialog box appears, containing a search section. The search relates to the entities based on the specifications that are defined as options for the Transport configuration option. If no specifications have been defined, you can search for any pipe.

3. Search for the pipes that enable the parent pipe or add new ones.

The Add Pipes dialog box displays the search results or the new pipes.

4. In the Add Pipes dialog box, select the pipes and click **Create**.

The new pipes appear in the Primary Path Enablement or Secondary Path Enablement section.

- 5. Do one of the following:
 - In the Manual Configure page, click Save and Update.
 - In the Pipe Configuration page, select Update from the Actions menu.



UIM updates the connectivity path, checking for required capacity and creating gap pipes as necessary.

Replacing Paths by Using Path Analysis

Replacing a primary path by using path analysis requires replacing the secondary path if one exists.

Replacing a secondary path without changing the primary path is the same as adding a secondary path where one did not exist previously. See "Adding Secondary Paths to Enablements" for more information.

To replace a primary connectivity path:

- Open the Manual Configure or Pipe Configuration page.
- In the Primary Path Enablement section, click Alternate Primary Paths.
 The Path Analysis page appears.
- 3. Follow the steps in "Enabling Pipes Automatically with Path Analysis" to complete the path analysis and select a connectivity path.

Adding Secondary Paths to Enablements

You can add a secondary connectivity path to an enablement that does not already have one. You can also replace an existing secondary path.

To add a secondary connectivity path:

- 1. If necessary, configure the pipe for secondary enablement. See "Configuring Existing Pipes for Secondary Enablement" for more information.
- Open the Manual Configure or Pipe Configuration page.
- 3. In the Secondary Path Enablement section, click Alternate Secondary Paths.
 - The Available Paths page appears. The **Secondary Paths** list shows all the available secondary paths for the current primary path. If no secondary paths are shown, none are available.
- 4. Select a secondary path and click **Update**.

The Manual Configure or Pipe Configuration page appears, displaying the new secondary path in the Secondary Path Enablement section.

Viewing a Pipe Enablement Visualization

You can view a visualization of the enablement of a pipe or pipe configuration. The visualization displays the following:

- Primary and secondary paths. If a pipe is enabled by two connectivity paths, the visualization shows both. You can highlight one or the other of the paths to see it more clearly.
- Termination points. If the termination points are not terminated on a resource, they are labeled with their IDs. If they are terminated, they are labeled with the ID and name of the resource or its parent. For example, if a termination point is terminated on a device interface, the visualization displays the name and ID of the logical device that holds the interface. Boxes representing parent resources surround the termination points. If two termination points are terminated on the same parent resource, they are displayed in the same box.



- Pipes. Pipes are labeled with their IDs and names and the names of their parent pipes (if any). For example, if the second channel pipe of Facility Pipe LS_BW_A is included in the enablement, it would be labeled LS_BW_A (LS_BW_A-2) in the schematic view.
- Gap pipes. If gap pipes were created during the enablement, they are shown as a thin line connecting the thicker lines that represent other pipes.

The Enabled By Visualization page includes tools that you use to control the view. Many of these tools are common to all similar features in UIM. See "Working with Visualizations and Diagrams" for more information. In addition to these common tools, the Enabled By Visualization page allows you to expand and collapse termination points to see their resource termination.

If a pipe is enabled with two paths, both are shown in the enablement visualization. You can highlight either of the two paths to make it more visible. The unhighlighted path is shown in blue. The primary path is highlighted by default.

To highlight a path in the enablement visualization:

 In the Paths section of the Enabled By Visualization page, click the Primary Path or Secondary Path link.

The path whose link you clicked is highlighted in red. The other path is displayed in blue.



Viewing Termination Point Resource Terminations

You can expand termination points in the visualization to view their resource terminations. You can expand individual termination points or all termination points simultaneously.

To view individual resource terminations:

- 1. Open the Summary page or the Pipe Configuration page of the Pipe entity for which you want to view individual resource terminations.
- 2. From the **Related Pages** menu, select **Graphic View**.

The Enabled By Visualization page appears. See "Enabled By Visualization Page" for more information about the fields in this page.

- 3. Select a termination point.
- Click the switch icon in a termination point.

The termination point expands to show its resource termination.

- Click the switch icon again to collapse the termination point.
- (Optional) In the toolbar, click Open Subgraphs.

All termination points in the visualization expand to show their resource termination. Click **Close Subgraphs** to collapse all the termination points.

Setting Pipe Capacity and Signal Structure

Pipes use bandwidth (the capacity to move data). Pipes can require capacity, provide capacity, or both. A pipe's capacity is typically defined in its specification. For example, a Pipe specification could define the capacity required and provided as 100 Mbps of bandwidth. (Capacity types and their units of measure are also defined in Design Studio.)

There are two ways to define a pipe's capacity:

- By associating Capacity Required and Capacity Provided specifications with the Pipe specification. For example, you can define a PVC service trail's capacity required as 56 Kbps. Packet-switched and other non-channelized pipes define their capacity this way.
- By associating the specification with a signal structure that defines how capacity can be broken into channels. The signal structure in turn is associated with a Capacity Provided specification. For example, an OC3 facility can provide 155.52 Mbps divided into three STS1 channels, each of which is divided into 28 VT1 channels. Signal structures are used to define capacity for channelized pipes, such as TDM (Time Duplex Multiplexing) pipes.

For a more detailed overview of capacity and signal structure and how their specifications are defined, see *UIM Concepts*.

Because capacity is defined in Pipe specifications, it is set up automatically when Pipe entities are created in UIM. Usually, you are not required to configure capacity in UIM.

In cases when a signal structure has not been associated with a specification, you can map a signal structure to a pipe. You can also open a tree view of a pipe's signal structure. Additionally, you can view and update a pipe's Capacity Required and Capacity Provided information.

About Signal Structure Channels

When a signal structure is associated with a Pipe specification, channels are not usually created automatically when you create a Pipe entity based on the specification. The structure is in place, but the actual channels are not created until they are required by an enablement. No child pipes will be shown in the Pipe Provides page you open from the Pipe Summary page until they are created by an enablement.

For example, the signal structure of an OC3 pipe divides its capacity into 3 STS1 channels, each of which can be divided into 28 VT1 channels. These channels are not created when you create an OC3 pipe entity because it is not possible to predict exactly how the channels will be used for enablement. An entire STS1 channel or just some individual VT1 channels may be required to enable a pipe. The channels are created only when an enablement requires them.

The one exception is when a signal structure has only two levels. For example, a DS3 signal structure might have only one level of child signals, for 28 DS1 signals. In this case, when you create a Pipe with the DS3 signal structure, 28 DS1 child pipes are created automatically. In this case, there is no ambiguity about how the DS3 will be channelized, so the channels can be created safely. They will be visible in the Pipe Provides page immediately.

If a pipe has a signal structure, you can see a tree view of the structure and the status of items it contains.

To view a pipe signal structure:

- Open the Summary page of the Pipe entity for which you want to view an associated signal structure.
- From the Related Pages menu, select Signal Structure.

The Signal Termination Point Structure Search page appears.

3. Search for the Signal Termination Point specification that defines the signal structure.

Each item in the structure has an icon that indicates its status:



- A plain icon indicates that the item exists in the structure but has not yet been created in inventory.
- An icon with the letter C indicates that the item has been created in inventory.
- An icon with a red cross through it indicates that the item is unavailable because it is already enabling a service trail.

Mapping a Signal Structure to a Pipe

If a signal structure has not already been associated with a Pipe entity by its specification, you can map one manually. You can choose from the signal structures defined by Signal Termination Point specifications created in Design Studio.

There are two types of Signal Termination Point specifications: Trail Termination Points, which define the top level of a signal structure, and Connection Termination Points, which define lower levels of the signal structure.



Signal termination points are different from pipe termination points. See "Working with Termination Points" for more information about pipe termination points.

To map a signal structure to a pipe:

- 1. Open the Summary page of the Pipe entity to which you want to map a signal structure. The Pipe entity must not previously have been associated with a signal structure.
- 2. From the Actions menu, select Map Signal Structure.

The Signal Termination Points Search page appears.

3. Search for the Signal Termination Point specification that defines the signal structure you want

4. In the Search Results section, select a Signal Termination Point specification and click **OK**.

You can remove a signal structure from a Pipe entity if channels have not been created.



The removal process includes no confirmation step and is not reversible.

To remove a signal structure from a pipe:

- 2. From the Actions menu, select Remove Signal Structure.

The pipe's signal structure is removed.

Maintaining Capacity Information

Capacity is defined by Capacity Provided or Capacity Required specifications associated with a Pipe specification in Design Studio, either directly or as the result of a signal structure.

It is unusual to change the capacity information, but this may be necessary if a facility pipe has been upgraded after installation. The following rules apply to changing the capacity-provided amount.

- You cannot change the capacity-provided information if the pipe has a signal structure.
- If a pipe is not enabling any other pipes (has no capacity consumed), you can increase or decrease the total capacity provided.
- If a pipe is enabling another pipe (has some capacity consumed), you can only increase
 the capacity provided. You cannot lower the percentage of capacity that is consumable
 because that would lower the effective amount of capacity provided.

There are no rules concerning changing the capacity-required amount. You can increase the capacity required after a pipe has been enabled by another pipe, even if you increase it to more than the capacity available on the enabling pipe. Changing the capacity required on a pipe that is already enabled by another pipe does not change the amount of capacity consumed on the enabling pipe.

You can view and update a pipe's capacity information on the Pipe Summary page, which includes Capacity Provided and Capacity Required sections that display information about the pipe's capacity. See "Updating Capacity Information" for more information.

Creating Pipes and Channels for CWDM and DWDM

You can create optical fiber pipes and their corresponding channels for Coarse Wavelength Division Multiplexing (CWDM) and Dense Wavelength Division Multiplexing (DWDM). The UIM package includes **ora_uim_basewdm** cartridge, which you can deploy to access the optical fiber specifications for CWDM and DWDM.

You can create the optical fiber pipes and their corresponding channels using the following pipe specifications:

- CWDM Optical Fiber: This specification has a parent pipe (CWDM_Optical_Fiber) and a
 child channel type (CWDM_Fiber_Channel). The CWDM_Optical_Fiber pipe has
 unlimited capacity so that it can adapt to any bit rate, according to the connectivity. See
 "Creating CWDM Pipe and Channels" for information on creating a CWDM pipe and its
 corresponding channels.
- DWDM Optical Fiber: This specification has a parent pipe (DWDM_Optical_Fiber) and a
 child channel type (DWDM_Fiber_Channel). See "Creating DWDM Pipe and Channels"
 for information on creating a DWDM pipe and its corresponding channels.

Creating CWDM Pipe and Channels

To create a CWDM pipe and its corresponding channels:

- In UIM, go to the Pipes page.
- 2. Click Create.
- 3. In the **ID** field, enter a unique ID.
- 4. From the Specifications menu, select CWDM_Optical_Fiber.

By default, the **Medium** field displays the value **Fiber** and the **Transmission Signal Type** field displays the value **Optical**.



Note:

You can change the values in the **Medium** and **Transmission Signal Type** fields.

- 5. (Optional) Select ITU Channel Numbering.
- 6. Click Save and Continue.

The Pipe Summary page appears.

 To create a channel(s) as a child for the pipe, click Related Pages and then click Provides.

The Pipe Provides page appears.

8. Click Create.

The Pipe-New page appears.

- 9. In the **Number of Channels** field, enter the number of channels you want to create.
- 10. In the Starting Wavelength list, select a value.

Note:

The available wavelength values range from 1270 nm to 1810 nm. You can customize the minimum and maximum wavelengths within a range of 1000 nm, by updating the **Fiber.properties** file.

Note:

You can associate these wavelengths with colors. You can also customize these wavelength-color associations by updating the **Fiber.properties** file. See Table 12-1 for the default wavelength-to-color associations.

11. Click Save and Close.

The Pipe Provides page appears and displays the list of channels that are created.

Creating DWDM Pipe and Channels

To create a DWDM pipe and its corresponding channels:

- 1. Go to the **Pipes** page.
- 2. Click Create.

The Pipe-New page appears.

- 3. In the **ID** field, enter a unique ID.
- 4. From the **Specifications** menu, select **DWDM_Optical_Fiber**.

By default, the **Medium** field displays the value **Fiber** and the **Transmission Signal Type** field displays the value **Optical**.



You can change the values in the **Medium** and **Transmission Signal Type**.

- 5. (Optional) Select ITU Channel Numbering.
- 6. In the **Offset** list, select a value.

Note:

The available options for offset are 0 GHz and 50 GHz.

- In the Channel Spacing field, select the spacing required between the channels. The available channel spacing values are 100 GHz, 200 GHz (Even), 200 GHz (Odd), and 50 GHz.
- 8. In the Grid Type field, select Flex Grid or Fixed.



The Fixed grid option uses the values from **Channel Spacing** for creating the channels. Whereas, the Flex Grid option creates the channels based on the **Starting Frequency** and **Flex Grid Channel Spacing** that you select while creating the Provides.

 To create a channel(s) as a child for the pipe, click Related Pages and then click Provides. The Pipe Provides page appears.

11. Click Create.

The Pipe-New page appears.

- 12. In the Number of Channels field, enter the number of channels you want to create.
- **13.** In the **Flex Grid Channel Spacing** field, select a value.



This option is available only for Flex Grid type.

14. In the Starting Frequency list, select a value.



The available frequency values range from 190.1 THz to 197.20 THz. You can customize the minimum and maximum frequencies within a range of 10 THz, by updating the **Fiber.properties** file.

The **Name** of a channel is generated automatically by the concatenation of Fiber Channel ID and Wavelength.

Viewing Pipe Information in Map View

You can view pipe design in a map from the Map View page. The Map View page for a pipe uses the default settings present in topologyProcess.properties file.

To open the Map View page and view the pipe design on a map:

- 1. Open the Summary page of the Pipe entity for which you want to view in the map view.
- 2. From the **Related Pages** menu, select **Map View**.

The Map View page appears.

Use the Map View page of a pipe to view the primary and secondary paths that are configured in the Manual Configuration page of the pipe. See "Map View Page" for more information.



You cannot make any changes to the pipe from the Map View page, but you can use tools to control the map display. You can make any changes to the pipe from the Manual Configuration page of the pipe.

4. Double-click on any location in the map to view the corresponding latitude and longitude coordinates.

Working with Networks and Network Visualization

In Oracle Communications Unified Inventory Management (UIM), you use several different kinds of entities to manage networks in your inventory:

- Network entities represent the network as a whole.
- Network configurations represent the resources assigned to the network at a particular point in time.
- Network nodes are specific locations in the network. They can represent physical or logical resources and can be associated with places and property locations.
- Network edges represent connectivity between nodes.

You configure network entities by using the Network Visualization page, where you add network nodes and network edges. You use nodes and edges to represent entities and describe how they are implemented. For example, a network node can represent a logical device, and a network edge can represent a connectivity. See "About Network Visualization Page" for more information about this page. The Network Visualization page appears by default and can be changed to the Network Topological View page instead. See "Network Topological View Page" for information about the fields in this page.

You can also see networks in a map view. Nodes appear in the geographic locations determined by places associated with them. See "Using the Map View" for more information.

There are three types of networks in UIM. You specify the type when you define a Network specification in Design Studio.

- An infrastructure network is a resource-based network such as SDH, ATM, Ethernet, or MPLS.
- A packet virtual network (PVN) is collection of the interfaces and connectivities that support
 a packet-based connectivity service. Multipoint ethernet virtual circuits (EVCs) are
 examples of packet virtual networks.
- A service network consolidates service locations, network access connectivity, and supporting virtual networks to provide a unified view of a connectivity-based service.

The network type and the network technology are interdependent. The network type is not displayed in Network Summary pages in UIM, but can be inferred from the specification on which the entity is based. For example, the Ethernet EVC Network specification, provided in the Carrier Ethernet cartridge, defines a PVN network. Similarly, the Ethernet Transport Network specification in the same cartridge defines an infrastructure network.

The network type determines the functionality that is available in the network visualization. For example, the Design Steps feature is available only for packet virtual networks and service networks.

Network entities share the features of many other entities. You can associate places and roles with them and you can include them in business interactions. See "Working with Inventory Entities" and "Working with Roles" for more information.

Network entities are topology-enabled, so you can search for them in the topology diagram using the UTIA application. See "Working with the Inventory Topology" for more information.

Creating Networks

When you create a Network entity, the specification you use determines the possible values for other data elements. For example, if you select a Network specification that has a defined technology, then the **Technology** data element of the Network entity is automatically set to that value. The technology in turn can determine which **Network Topology** values are possible.

To create a network:

- In the navigation section, click Network.
- 2. In the Search Results section, click Create.
 - The Network New page appears.
- 3. From the **Specification** list, select the specification you want to use for this network.
 - If the specification includes a technology, the **Technology** field updates to include it. The rest of the page refreshes to include any customized fields from the specification.
- If the ID field is available (does not include the text AUTOGENERATE), enter a unique ID for the network. The ID cannot be changed later.
- 5. (Optional) In the **Name** and **Description** fields, enter a name and a description.
- (Optional) From the **Network Topology** list, select the topology that describes the network. The values you can choose from may be constrained by the technology defined by the specification.
- 7. Click Save and Continue.

The Network Summary page for the network you created appears.

- 8. (Optional) Click Save and Add Another to create multiple networks.
 - The network you created is saved and the Network New page reappears.
- 9. (Optional) Click **Cancel** to dismiss creation process.
 - The Network page appears.

Selecting the Network Topology

When you create or modify a network, you can select from a number of different topologies that describe its shape and how its nodes relate to each other. The following table lists all possible values in the **Network Topology** list, but the technologies you can select from can be defined by the Network specification.



Topology	Description	
No topology selected	(Default) The Network Topology data element is not used or is not specified.	
Bus	A topology in which a single backbone connection carries signals to nodes connected to it. This topology is typical of older token-ring networks.	
Chain	A linear topology in which nodes are arranged sequentially, with each node connected to its adjacent node or nodes.	
Hybrid	A topology that combines characteristics of other topologies, such as mesh and star.	
Linear Add/Drop	A chain-like configuration with intermediate nodes where signals can enter and exit. Used in SONET and SDH networks.	
Mesh	Each node in the network is connected to every other node. A fully-meshed network is one where each node is directly connected to the others. A partially-meshed network is one where some of the connections are indirect. Meshed networks are commonly used with Ethernet, IP, MPLS, and SONET.	
Multipoint to Multipoint	A network topology in which all nodes are visible and accessible to all other nodes.	
	For example, a multipoint Carrier Ethernet network includes three or more UNIs that are all visible and accessible to each other. A service network example is an E-LAN service.	
Point to Point	The topology is linear with all edges terminating at two end nodes.	
	For example, a point-to-point EVC network contains exactly two UNIs. Point-to-point EVCs carry Ethernet Line (E-LINE) services.	
Ring	A closed topology in which signals are passed from node to node in predictable pattern. Ring topologies are common with SONET, SDH, and Ethernet.	
Rooted Multipoint	A multipoint network topology in which one node is designated as the root.	
	For example, in an EVC network, one UNI can be assigned a Root UNI role with the remaining UNIs assigned Leaf UNI roles. A service network example is an E-Tree service.	
Singleton	The network includes only a single node with no connectivity.	
Star	The network includes a hub node with leaf nodes connected to it. Also called hub-and-spoke. Commonly used with Ethernet, IP, MPLS, and SONET.	
Tree	Similar to a collection of star networks in which a leaf in one star is the hub of another.	
Unknown	The network topology is currently unknown or unspecified.

You can create configurations for Network entities. Network configurations are used to assign resources to networks, including custom network addresses, custom objects, and logical devices. As you create new versions of the configuration, you create a record of resource assignments and characteristics assigned to configuration items.





Network configurations do not include the network topology, so the version history does not reflect the evolution of the topology.

Searching and Filtering Nodes or Edges in Network Visualization Page

You can click on the **Search** icon at the top-right corner of the canvas just above the **Settings** icon to open the **Search and Filter Topology** panel on the left side of the screen. To search and filter nodes or edges in Network Visualization Page:

5. In the search bar click on the selected filter option.

A list of values for the selected option appears.

You can choose any number of options from this list.

The filter option changes to reflect the value chosen.

7. The searched nodes or edges are highlighted on the canvas.

	 Custom Layout: Displays the topology in a customized layout. See "Using Custom Layout" for more information on using custom layouts.
	 Forced Layout: Displays the topology graph's components. It is the default layout.
	 Geo Map Layout: Displays the topology graph in a geographical map view.
	 Circular Layout: Displays the topology components in a circle.
	 Grid Layout: Displays the topology components in the form of a grid.
	 Hierarchical Layout: Displays the topology components according to the hierarchy and without any overlaps.

Using Custom Layout

Created User	Displays the name of the user who created the entity.
Created Date	Displays the date the entity was created on.

Using Zoom settings and Mini-Map in Network Visualization Page

You can zoom in to view a specific component by using the zoom settings bar at the right-bottom corner of the canvas and adjust viewing scope. For viewing all components in a topology graph, you can click the **Fit to Zoom** icon in the zoom settings bar.

There is also a **mini-map** on the left-bottom corner of the canvas. It shows the position of a selected topology component in the whole graph. You can click on the **collapsible legend** below the **mini-map** to see a list of specifications with their corresponding colors and icons present in the topology graph.

Viewing Maps in Network Visualization Page

You can view the topology graph of a network over various geographical maps in the Network Visualization page. These maps are available in the **Geomap** option under the **Advanced Settings** subtab in the Settings tab. To change the map type, you can simply select one of the different types in the **Advanced Settings** subtab. You can remove a node directly from the Network Visualization page even when it represents an entity. But deleting the node will only disassociate the entity and remove it from the topology graph.

To delete a node from a network:

- 2. Select the node to be deleted.
- 3. In the Actions toolbar click on **Delete** icon.



A dialog box will appear asking you to confirm the action. If you are deleting a node with an edge, then the dialog box shows a message that the edge will be deleted along with the node.

Click Proceed to delete the node.

The node (and its associated edge) is deleted from the canvas.

Isolating, Collapsing and Expanding a Node in the Network Visualization Page

You can isolate, collapse or expand a node from a network to view only the neighboring nodes it has connections with. This option hides all other nodes not connected to the selected node, allowing you to view the selected node independently of the topology graph.



The **Expand node** option is only available when a node is collapsed or isolated.

To isolate, collapse and expand a node:

- 1. Open the Network Visualization page of a network.

- Right-click on a node.
- 3. Select the **Isolate** option. The corresponding keyboard shortcut also appears next to it. You may directly use this shortcut to isolate a node.
 - Only the selected node and its associated nodes are visible.
- 4. (Optional) Select the Collapse option. The corresponding keyboard shortcut also appears next to it. You may directly use this shortcut to collapse a node.

The nodes associated with the selected node are hidden from view.

(Optional) Select the **Expand** option. The corresponding keyboard shortcut also appears next to it. You may directly use this shortcut to collapse a node.

All the hidden nodes are visible.

You can hide all links (connectivities, pipes and edges) a node has with its neighboring nodes. This action allows you to view a particular node in relation to other nodes in the topology. This option also allows you to hide edges of nodes that are overlapping.

To hide edges of a node:

- 1. Open the Network Visualization page of a network.

- Right-click on a node.

When a node in a network diagram represents a child network, you can expand the node to display the nodes and edges in the child network.

To add nodes to a subnetwork:

Adding an Internetwork Node to a Subnetwork in Network Visualization Page

Internetwork nodes are the nodes of a subnetwork which have a connection with other networks. You can add internetwork nodes to a subnetwork in the Network Visualization page.

To add internetwork nodes to a subnetwork:

Representing Resources with Nodes

You can use nodes to represent resources in your network. Separating nodes from the resources they represent makes it possible to keep up with equipment changes without having to update the network topology.



Some network node specifications limit the types of resources that can be represented by the node. For example, the DSL Network Node specification might allow representation of only DSLAM Logical Device specification entities.

If a Network Node specification does not limit representations, a node can represent a custom object, custom network address, device interface, equipment, logical device, network, place, party, physical device, or physical port.

Each entity type has a distinctive icon that replaces the generic icon displayed for nodes that do not represent resources. When you select a resource for the node to represent, the node's icon changes to reflect the entity type. You can click this icon to get information about a node's association. See "Getting Information About Nodes" for more information.

In addition to representing a resource, a node can be associated with a place that defines its location. See "Associating Places with Nodes" for more information. Place associations and resource representations are independent of each other.

To select resources represented by nodes:

- 1. Open the Network Topological View page for a network.
 - See "Opening the Network Topological View Page" for more information. See "Network Topological View Page" for information about fields in this page.
- 2. Right-click a node in the network and select Represents.
 - A list of resources appears.
- Select a resource type.
 - The Network Node Associate dialog box appears.
- 4. Search for or create an entity of the type you selected.

- 6. Click OK.

The node icon changes to reflect the entity type.

You can associate places with nodes to define their geographic location. If the place associated with a node has latitude and longitude coordinates or is associated with an address that has latitude and longitude coordinates, the node can be displayed in the Map View page. See "Using the Map View" for more information.

You make place associations separately from selecting resource representations.



A network node can represent a place or it can be associated with a place. If the node represents a place, you cannot also associate a place to the node. You can, however, change a place representation to an association. If a node currently represents a place, selecting a different entity for the node to represent automatically converts the place to an association.

You can associate a network edge with one or more pipes or connectivities. You can leave the network edge undefined if the connectivity is not known or if it is through a dynamic route in another network. You can also associate a network edge with one or more Custom Object entities that define a type of connectivity not available in the default model.



In packet virtual networks, only connectivities can be associated with network edges.

In the Network Topological View page, edges are shown as lines that connect network nodes. The line is dotted if the edge is not associated with a pipe, connectivity, or custom object. The line is solid if the edge has an association with one of these entities.

Some network edge specifications limit the associations an edge can have. For example, a Network Edge specification could limit the edge to associations with T1 and T3 Pipe specification entities.

To associate a pipe, connectivity, or custom object with an edge:

- 1. Open the Network Topological View page for a network.

- Right-click an edge in the network and select Associate Pipe, Associate Connectivity, or Associate Custom Object.

An entity Search page appears.

You can automatically create nodes and edges in the Network Topological View page based on pipes or connectivities that you select. UIM creates edges associated to pipes and connectivities and nodes to represent their termination points.

As with all network nodes, the nodes that UIM creates represent parent devices, not the interfaces, ports, or other entities that they provide. For example, if a pipe is terminated on a device interface, the network node represents the logical device that provides the interface. If a pipe or connectivity is terminated on a physical device that is associated with a logical device, then the node represents the logical device. See *UIM Concepts* for more information about how the UIM topology represents device hierarchies.

Automatically Creating Nodes and Edges for Connectivity Entities

You can automatically create nodes and edges based on existing connectivities.



If the connectivity is terminated on a property location and not on the device interface of a logical device associated to the property location, then the network node is not associated with the property location, but has the same name as the property location.

To automatically create nodes and edges for a connectivity:

- 2. In the toolbar, click the **Associate Connectivity** icon.
 - The Associate Connectivity dialog box appears.

- 4. In the Search Results section, select one or more connectivities and click **OK**.
 - UIM creates nodes and edges to represent the selected connectivities and their termination points. The nodes and edge are displayed in the Network Topological View page.

Automatically Creating Nodes and Edges for Pipes

You can automatically create nodes and edges based on existing pipes.

When a pipe is terminated to a network, the network node has the same name as the network but is not associated with it.

To automatically create nodes and edges for a pipe:

- 1. Open the Network Topological View page for a network.
 - See "Opening the Network Topological View Page" for more information. See "Network Topological View Page" for information about fields in this page.
- 2. In the toolbar, click the **Associate Pipe** icon.
 - The Associate Pipe dialog box appears.
- Enter search criteria in the Search section and click Search. See "Searching for Entities" for more information.
- 4. In the Search Results section, select one or more pipes and click **OK**.
 - UIM creates nodes and edges to represent the selected pipes and their termination points. The nodes and edge are displayed in the Network Topological View page.

Adding Flow Interfaces to Packet Virtual Networks

There are two ways to add flow interfaces to packet virtual networks:

- Adding Flow Interfaces to Packet Virtual Networks from the Network Topological View
- Adding Flow Interfaces to Packet Virtual Networks As Configuration Items

The result is the same with both methods. The flow interface is added to the network configuration and to the network topology.

When you add a flow interface, you select a parent device interface and specify the termination type and technology values. UIM uses these values to select an appropriate specification to use for the flow interface.

If there is already connectivity terminated on the parent media interface of the flow interface you are creating and you select a termination type or technology that is incompatible with the connectivity, you see an error message. For example, if you select **Internetwork** as the termination type and there is network access connectivity already terminated on the media interface, UIM displays an error message.

You also set a bit rate for the flow interface. The sum of the bit rates of the flow interfaces under a media interface cannot exceed the bit rate of the media interface. For example, you cannot add more than ten 100 Mbps flow interfaces under a 1 Gbps media interface.

After you add flow interfaces to the packet virtual network, you can monitor its consumption in the hierarchy of its parent logical device and device interface. See "Viewing Information About Flow Interface Consumption".

Flow interfaces can be added automatically to network configurations and topologies in some scenarios. For example, the UIM Carrier Ethernet cartridge includes specifications that have the capability to add flow interfaces automatically.



Adding Flow Interfaces to Packet Virtual Networks from the Network Topological View

Because the only nodes that can be included in a packet virtual network are those that represent flow interfaces, the Network Topological View page toolbar includes a **Flow**Interface icon instead of the Insert Node icon for packet virtual networks. You use this icon to add flow interfaces and nodes to represent them. The flow interfaces you add in the Network Topological View page are added automatically to the network configuration.

To add flow interfaces to a packet virtual network from the topological view:

1. Open the Network Topological View page for a network.

See "Opening the Network Topological View Page" for more information. See "Network Topological View Page" for information about fields in this page.

In the toolbar, click Add Flow Interface.

The Network Node Flow Interface Associate dialog box appears.

3. In the Logical Device Search section, enter search criteria and click Search.

The logical devices that meet your search criteria are displayed in the Logical Device Hierarchy section.

- 4. In the **Termination Type** list in the Assign Flow Interface Details section, select the termination type (**Access**, **Trunk**, **Internetwork** or **Unknown**).
- In the Flow Interface Bit Rate field, enter the bit rate to be used for the flow interface. The bit rate is required for Access and Internetwork flow interfaces and optional for Trunk flow interfaces.
- In the Technology field, select the technology.

The valid values for technology are ATM, Frame Relay, Ethernet and IP.

- 7. In the Logical Device Hierarchy section, expand a logical device and then select a media interface to provide the flow interface you are adding. (A media interface is a device interface that is at the top level of the device interface hierarchy.)
- Click Create or Create and Close.

UIM verifies that there is sufficient capacity on the selected device interface for a flow interface of the specified bit rate. If there is sufficient capacity, the flow interface is created. If there is insufficient capacity, you see an error message.

If you clicked **Create and Close**, the dialog box closes and the network topology canvas includes the flow interface you added. If you clicked **Create**, the dialog box remains open so that you can create additional flow interfaces.

You can assign a flow interface to a packet virtual network by assigning it as a configuration item in the network configuration. A network configuration is added automatically when you create a packet virtual network.

To add flow interfaces to a packet virtual network as configuration items:

The Choose Configuration Items to be Added dialog box appears.

- 3. In the Quantity column of a Flow Interface row, select a number of interfaces to be created.

The dialog box closes and a rows is added to the **Flow Interface List** folder for each interface created.

- 5. Select a row in the Flow Interface List folder.
- 6. In the Specification column of the selected row, select the specification of the flow interface you want to add to the network configuration.
- In the Actions column, click Assign.

The Network Node Flow Interface Associate dialog box appears.

8. In the Logical Device Search section, enter search criteria and click **Search**.

The logical devices that meet your search criteria are displayed in the Logical Device Hierarchy section.

- 9. (Optional) In the **Termination Type** list in the Assign Flow Interface Details section, select the termination type (**Access**, **Trunk**, **Internetwork** or **Unknown**).
- 10. In the Flow Interface Bit Rate field, enter the bit rate to be used for the flow interface. The bit rate is required for Access and Internetwork flow interfaces and optional for Trunk flow interfaces.

Assigning a Bit Rate to Flow Interfaces

When you associate connectivities to a network, UIM automatically creates flow interfaces for those connectivities. The newly created flow interfaces have a bit rate of zero. Rather than setting the bit rate for each flow interface individually, you can assign a bit rate to all flow interfaces in the network or to selected flow interfaces.

If you assign a bit rate in this way to a flow interface that already had one, the old bit rate is overwritten with the new one.

To assign a bit rate to flow interfaces:

- Open the Network Topological View page for a packet virtual network.
 - See "Opening the Network Topological View Page" for more information. See "Network Topological View Page" for information about fields in this page.
- 2. (Optional) Select the flow interfaces to which you want to assign a bit rate.
- 3. Click Design Steps in the toolbar, then select Assign Bit Rate.
- 4. In the Assign Bit Rate dialog box, enter the bit rate value and select the unit or measure.
- 5. Click **OK**.

The dialog box closes and UIM assigns the bit rate to the selected flow interfaces or to all flow interfaces (if you did not select flow interfaces).

Adding Cross-Connects Between Flow Interfaces

You can use the Network Topological View page to add interface-bound cross-connects between two flow interfaces in packet virtual networks. UIM automatically creates edges to represent them.

There are several rules that govern when you can create a cross-connect between flow interfaces:

- Only two flow interfaces can be selected.
- For Access and Internetwork flow interfaces, the two flow interfaces can be provided by different media interfaces on the same logical device or on media interfaces of different logical devices that share a common parent.
- An internetwork interface can be cross-connected only to a trunk interface.
- A trunk interface can be cross-connected to any other interface, including another trunk interface.
- An access interface can be connected to an internetwork or trunk interface, but not to another access interface.

The UIM Carrier Ethernet cartridge includes specifications and rulesets that have the ability to create cross-connects automatically. When you create an Access flow interface and then a Trunk flow interface on the same device, UIM creates a cross-connect automatically.

To add a cross-connect between flow interfaces:

- **1.** Open the Network Topological View page for a packet virtual network.
 - See "Opening the Network Topological View Page" for more information. See "Network Topological View Page" for information about fields in this page.
- Select a flow interface node.
- 3. Press and hold the **Ctrl** key and select a second node that represents a flow interface provided by the same media interface.
- 4. In the toolbar, click the **Create Flow Interface Interconnect** button.
 - UIM creates the cross-connect and represents it with a dotted line between the two nodes.
- 5. (Optional) Apply a specification to the edge.

Adding Connectivities to Packet Virtual Networks

When you add connectivities to packet virtual networks, UIM automatically creates nodes and edges in packet virtual networks. You can add only existing packet connectivity entities.

When you select a connectivity, UIM creates one or two flow interfaces to be represented as a node or nodes in the Network Topological View page. Two flow interfaces are created unless the selected connectivity is a network access connectivity. In that case, only the flow interface for the device interface on the Z location (the network location side) is created and added as a node to the network canvas.

The automatically created flow interfaces have a bit rate of zero. You must assign a different bit rate to these flow interfaces or to all flow interfaces in the network. See "Assigning a Bit Rate to Flow Interfaces" for more information.

If an access or internetworking flow interface is added and a trunk flow interface already exists for the same logical device, UIM automatically adds a cross connect between the two flow interfaces.

The connectivities are added as references to the network configuration. They are not assigned to the configuration.

After you add flow interfaces to the packet virtual network, you can monitor its consumption in the hierarchy of its parent logical device and device interface. See "Viewing Information About Flow Interface Consumption".

- 3. In the Quantity column of a Connectivity row, select a number of interfaces to be created.
- 4. Click Save and Close.

The dialog box closes and a row is added to the **Connectivity List** folder for each interface created.

- 5. Select a row in the **Connectivity List** folder.
- **6.** In the Resource Specification column of the selected row, select the specification of the connectivity you want to add to the network configuration.
- In the Actions column, click Reference.

The Connectivity search dialog box appears, with the specification you selected already entered as a search criterion.

- 8. Enter additional search criteria in the Search section and click **Search**.
- 9. In the Search Results section, select a connectivity and click **OK**.

The connectivity ID appears in the selected row in the connectivity list. The connectivity and its termination points are also added as an edge and two nodes to the Network Topological View page.

Assigning Flow Identifiers in the Network Topological View

You can assign and reference flow identifiers while you are designing packet virtual networks. You can assign flow identifiers to the network as a whole or to individual flow interfaces.

- If you assign a flow identifier to the network as a whole, UIM assigns the flow identifier to the network configuration and adds it as a reference on all flow interfaces in the network.
- If you reference a flow identifier to an individual flow interface, UIM adds the flow identifier reference to that flow interface only.

To assign a flow identifier to the network:

1. Open the Network Topological View page for a packet virtual network.

The Flow Identifier Search page appears.

Unassigning Flow Identifiers in the Network Topological View

You can unassign and dereference flow identifiers while you are designing packet virtual networks. You can unassign flow identifiers from the network as a whole or from individual flow interfaces.

If you unassign the flow interface from the network as a whole, UIM unassigns the flow identifier from the network configuration and removes references to it on all flow interfaces in the network.

If de-reference a flow identifier from an individual flow interface, UIM removes the flow identifier reference on that flow interface only.

To assign flow identifiers in the topological view:

Open the Network Topological View page for a packet virtual network.

Working with Child Networks

Nodes in a network diagram can represent child networks that are part of a larger parent network structure. Representing child networks as single nodes makes it possible to keep the parent network diagram relatively simple.

You can drill down to see details about a child network, and you can also create edges between nodes in a child network and nodes in other locations.

Viewing Nodes in Child Networks

When a node in a network diagram represents a child network, you can expand the node to display the nodes and edges in the child network. You can edit nodes within the child network.

You can have multiple child networks expanded at the same time in the network diagram.

To view nodes in a child network:

- 1. Open the Network Topological View page for a network.
 - See "Opening the Network Topological View Page" for more information. See "Network Topological View Page" for information about fields in this page.
- Click the asterisk to the upper-right of the cloud-shaped icon for a child network.
 - The cloud icon is replaced by a rectangle containing the nodes in the child network.
- When you are finished working with the child network, click the asterisk in the upper-right of the rectangle to collapse the node.

When a child network is expanded in a parent network diagram, you can create edges involving the child network's nodes. All of the following situations are supported:

- Edges between nodes within the child network
- Edges between a node in the child network and a node in the parent network
- Edges between nodes in two separate child networks

Edges to nodes in an expanded child network are connected to the appropriate individual nodes. When the child network is collapsed, however, these edges are connected to the network node. If there are multiple edges to different nodes in a child network from the same source, only a single edge is displayed.

You use the same procedure to create edges in child networks that you do in parent networks. See "Adding Edges to a Network" for more information.

Adding Specifications and Identifying Information to Nodes and Edges

You can assign or change the specification assigned to a node and also change the automatically generated node name and ID. If the Network specification has relationships with Network Node or Network Edge specifications, you must choose one of those specifications.

Some node or edge specifications include additional, customized fields into which you enter information. Specifications can also limit the kinds of resources you can associate with nodes.

To add specifications and identifying information to a node or edge:



1. Open the Network Topological View page for a network.

The removal process includes no confirmation step and is not reversible.

Using the Map View

If UIM has been configured to support maps, you can view nodes and edges visually on a map. Nodes appear on the map based on the valid latitude and longitude of places, property locations, or network entity code associated with them. Edges appear as lines connecting nodes.

By default, nodes are represented by icons that represent various entity types. You can find the icons and the corresponding entities using the Map Legend option on the Toolbar. You can customize these icons by creating the specifications in Design Studio. See *UIM System Administrator's Guide* for more information.



For nodes and edges to appear on a map, they must be associated with a place, property location, or network entity code that is associated with an address that includes a latitude and longitude. See "Working with Places and Place Configurations" for more information about latitude and longitude.

The information in the Map View page is read only (you cannot make changes to the network composition from the Map View page). See *UIM System Administrator's Guide* for information about configuring map support.

Opening the Network Map View

To open a Map View page for a network, you must have set up a map profile for the network. See "Working with Map Profiles" for more information.

To open the Map View page and view a network on a map:

- Open the Summary page for a Network entity for which you want to view on a map.
- 2. Click the **Visualization** tab, and then click the **Map View** subtab.
 - The Map View page appears, displaying the network on the map specified by the appropriate map profile. Nodes are represented by icons and edges by solid or dotted lines. See "Map View Page" for more information about the fields in this page.
- Double-click on any location in the map to view the corresponding latitude and longitude coordinates.

You can click any node in the Map View page to view information about the node. By default, you can see the node name, node ID, resource ID, resource name, place ID, and place name. The Map View page can be customized using the Map Builder tool.

You can also open the Summary pages of resources represented by and places, property locations, or network entity codes associated with nodes. For nodes that represent child networks, you can open a separate Map View page of that network, or you can click **Sub Networks** from the Toolbar that displays the child networks available in the parent network.

You can view all the nodes with same latitude and longitude coordinates under **Multiple Nodes**. You can also open the Summary pages of all the nodes in a Multiple Node.

When getting information about the nodes in a Map View page:

Opening Summary Pages for Associated Resources and Places

You can open the Summary page for a resource represented by a node or a place associated with it.

To open a Summary page from a node:

- Open the Map View page. See "Opening the Network Map View".
- 2. Right-click a node (other than a node that represents a network) in the map.
- Select Place Summary or (if the node represents a resource) the command that corresponds to the resource type. For example, select Logical Device Summary.

The Summary page for the place or resource appears.

- Select Zoom To Country, Zoom To City, or Zoom To Street to zoom into the corresponding country, city, or street in which the node exists.
- Select Zoom Out to go back to the world map view.

- Click on an entity to view the information about it.
- (Optional) Right-click on an entity and select an option from the context menu to view the corresponding information.

Viewing Multiple Nodes with Same Location

You can view multiple nodes that are in the same location, with same latitude and longitude coordinates, under a single Multiple Node from the Map View. You can also navigate to the corresponding summary pages of all the associated nodes under a Multiple Node.

To view multiple nodes with same location:

- Open the Map View page. See "Opening the Network Map View".
- Right-click on a Multiple Node in the map.
- Select **Place Summary** or (if the node represents a resource) the command that corresponds to the resource type. For example, select Logical Device Summary.

The Summary page for the place or resource appears.



Note:

If the node is a Multiple Node, the corresponding resource option does not appear.

Select Associated Nodes.

The Inventory Association List page appears, containing the list of all nodes with same location.

- 5. (Optional) Click a node in the list to see the detailed information about it.
 - The Summary page of the node appears.
- Select Zoom To Country, Zoom To City, or Zoom To Street to zoom into the corresponding country, city, or street in which the node exists.



- Select Zoom Out to go back to the world map view.
- 8. Click Close to close the menu.

Getting Information About Edges in the Map View

You can click an edge in a map to get information about the edge. By default, you see the edge ID. You can also open a list of pipes represented by an edge. From this list, you can go to the Summary pages of the pipes.

To get information about edges in the map view:

- 1. Open the Map View page. See "Opening the Network Map View".
- 2. (Optional) For Networks, right-click an edge and select Associated Pipes.

The Associated Pipe List page appears, containing a list of all the pipes associated with the edge.



For other entity Map View pages, right-click an edge and select **Connectivity Summary** or **Pipe Summary** that navigates you to the corresponding summary page.

3. (Optional) Click a pipe's link in the list to see detailed information about it.

The Summary page for the pipe appears.

Working with Map Profiles

UIM uses a map profile to determine which map to display when you open the Map View page for a network. For example, for a national network, you may want to open a map of the entire country; for a local network, you may want to open a city map.

The map profile also determines the map center and zoom level, along with other parameters. Entering some of this information requires knowledge of how mapping has been enabled on your system. See *UIM System Administrator's Guide* for information about setting up mapping.

You must save a map profile for a network before you can view a map of that network. See "Setting Up Map Profiles" for more information.

Setting Up Map Profiles

To set the map profile:

- 1. Open the Summary page for a Network entity for which you want to define a map profile.
- 2. Open the **Map Profile** tab under the **Visualization** tab.

The Map Profile page appears.

- 3. Enter or change values as needed.
- 4. Click Save.

The new values are stored.

Map Profile Page

You use the Map Profile page to define characteristics of the Map View page, such as the map to display, the map center, the zoom level, and so forth.

Field	Description
Base Map	Enter the name of the map that is displayed for the network. See your system administrator for a list of available maps. The default is ELOCATION_MAP .
Application Datasource	Enter the UIM data source location. The default is UIMDATA.
Map Tile Server URL	Enter the URL used for an external mapping service, such as the Oracle Map Service. The Oracle Map Server URL appears by default. Leave this field blank if you are using an internal map rather than a map service.
Copyright	Enter the copyright text to appear on the map.
	The default is: Copyright \u00a9 2007, 2021 Oracle Corp
Zoom Level	Enter the zoom level of the map when it opens. Values range from 0 to 9 and correspond to the increments on the zoom slider in the Map View page.
Map Center Latitude	Enter the latitude on which the base map is centered. This value defaults to the center of all the nodes in the network.
Map Center Longitude	Enter the longitude on which the base map is centered. This value defaults to the center of all the nodes in the network.

Map View Page

Use the Map View page to view nodes and edges visually on a map. You cannot make changes from the Map View page, but you can use tools to control the map display.

Field	Description
Zoom	Move the slider in the upper-left corner up or down to increase or decrease the zoom area of the map.
Legend	Click to view the map legend. This button is in the lower-right corner of the map
Scale	Displays the scale in both kilometers and miles. This button is located in the lower-left corner.
Pan	Click any of the pan directional arrows to move the map in the direction of the arrow. These buttons are located in the upper-left corner.
Center Map	Right-click a node in the map and select to re-center the orientation of the map.
Show Edges Hide Edges	Right-click a node in the map and select to hide or displays edges.
Toolbar section	The Toolbar section enables you to view the map using the following options:
	 Clear option clears all markings that you added to the map using toolbar.
	 Circle option marks a circle with any required radius on the map and highlights all the nodes within the circle.
	 Rectangle option marks a rectangle on the map and highlights all the nodes within the rectangle.
	 Redline option enables you to draw any shape on the map to mark the corresponding area.
	 Distance option enables you to draw line(s) on the map and provides the actual distance of the line(s). You can draw connected lines that provides Total Distance of all the connected lines and Sub Distance of the latest line.
	 Zoom option enables you to select any area and zoom in to the map.
	 Magnifier option enables you to hover the mouse cursor over the map to enhance the view of an area.
	 Overview Map option enables you to view a small overview map, which initially appears zoomed out by a factor of three. The overview map appears in the lower-right corner of the map.
	 Legend option shows the list of icons and the corresponding entities.
	 Print Map option enables you to print the map.
	 White Board option enables you to enter any customized text on the map upon selecting an area or a location. The Add Text page provides multiple options to customize the text style.



Network - New Page

You use the Network - New page to create new networks.

You use the **General Information** tab to view basic information about the Network entity, most of which was defined when you created the entity. Click **Edit** to change this information. Some data elements cannot be changed after the entity is created. See "Creating Entities" and "Network - New Page" for more information.

Configurations Tab

You use the **Configurations** tab to view any network configurations created for the entity. You use network configurations to assign resources to networks.

This section is available only when the specification on which the network is based includes a reference to a Network Configuration specification.

The fields that appear in the Configurations section are common among multiple entities. See "Entity Summary Page" for more information. See "Adding the First Version of a Configuration to an Entity" and "Adding Additional Configuration Versions" for information about creating configurations.

Associated Resources Tab

You use the **Associated Resources** tab to view information about the associated logical devices, associated pipes and connectivities, IP resources, and network nodes of the logical device.

Subtab	Description
Associated Logical Devices	(Infrastructure networks only) Displays a list of logical devices represented by nodes in the network. See "Representing Resources with Nodes" for more information.
Associated Pipes/ Connectivities	Displays a list of the pipes and connectivities represented by edges in the network.
IP Resources	Lists IP subnets assigned to the network. Click Assign to assign a new IP subnet.
Network Nodes	Displays a list of the nodes in the network. See "Adding Nodes to a Network" for more information.

Consumers Tab

You use the **Consumers** tab to view information about assignments, references, and business interactions of the network.

You use the **Groups and Infrastructure** tab to view information about the places and roles associated with the network.



You use the Network Topological View page to configure network entities visually. You add network nodes and network edges and select entities that they represent.

When a packet or service network design is in place, you can validate, save, and complete the design. After the design is complete, it can no longer be modified.

Validating the Design

You can validate a service or packet virtual network design to ensure that it is complete and correct. During the validation, UIM checks:

- That all service locations associated with the network (parent) service are present in the service network.
- That there is a connectivity between each service location and associated network device.
- That all connectivities have completed design versions.

To validate the service network or packet virtual network design:

- Open the Network Topological View page of the service network. See "Opening the Network Topological View Page".
- 2. Click **Design Steps** in the toolbar, then select **Validate Design**.

UIM validates the design and displays either a confirmation message or a list of errors to correct.

Completing the Design

When you complete a network design, the network configuration version is set to Completed. Changes to this version are no longer allowed.

To complete a service network or packet virtual network design:

- Open the Network Topological View page of the service network. See "Opening the Network Topological View Page".
- Click Design Steps in the toolbar, then select Complete Design.
 UIM validates the design. If the validation succeeds, UIM completes the current design.

Creating a New Version

You can create a new design version only after the previous version has been completed.

To create a service network or packet virtual network design version:

- Open the Network Topological View page of the service network. See "Opening the Network Topological View Page".
- Click Design Steps in the toolbar, then select Create New Version.

UIM creates a new version of the design.



Working with Flow Identifiers

A flow identifier is a type of network address that is associated with a collection of flow interfaces that trace the path of a multipoint or point-to-point connectivity-based service through the device interfaces and connectivities. For example, flow identifiers can represent VLAN IDs for Ethernet; VPIs and VCIs for ATM; DLCIs for Frame Relay; and other virtual channel parameters such as VPLS IDs for MPLS.

Flow identifiers are defined in their specifications as provider-managed or unmanaged:

- Provider-managed flow identifiers are created by service providers and used to manage the flow of traffic in their own network.
- Unmanaged flow identifiers are provided by a third party (such as another service provider) or by the customer to tag the flow of traffic in the service provider network.

You can create flow identifiers one at a time or in ranges based on the identifier value. For example you could create a range of VLAN IDs with identifiers from 1 to 4095.

You can assign Flow Identifier entities to network configurations and flow interface configurations. You can also include them in reservations and apply conditions to them.

Working with IP Addresses

In Oracle Communications Unified Inventory Management (UIM), you can manage IPv4 and IPv6 address resources. UIM IP address management provides the ability to allocate, classify, and track IPv4 and IPv6 addresses.

An IP network is the foundation of IP infrastructure. All IP address management takes place within an IP network, which you can partition into subnets that can contain multiple IP address ranges.

Working with IP Networks

In UIM, IP network entities represent blocks of IP address spaces in your inventory. All address space within an IP network is occupied by one or more contiguous IP subnets. When you create an IP network, UIM automatically creates a default IP subnet that occupies the entire address space. You can partition the default IP subnet into multiple smaller subnets.

Creating IP Networks

When you create an IP network, UIM automatically creates a default IP subnet that occupies the entire address space.

The prefix length represents the network portion (also called subnet mask) of the IP address. The larger the prefix length, the fewer IP addresses are available on the network.

The IP address you enter must be in standard IPv4 or IPv6 form, such as those shown in the following examples:

For IPv4:

- 10.20.0.0

 Selecting Activate changes the Inventory Status of the IP network from Unavailable to Installed.
- Deactivate is available only for IP networks with an Inventory Status of Installed.

Working with Telephone Numbers

You can include telephone numbers in Oracle Communications Unified Inventory Management (UIM). You can manage and assign telephone numbers as items in your inventory, or you can include them only as information that applies to other entities, such as parties or locations.

Specifications can define different types of telephone numbers that vary by geography. For example, you could have specifications for North American numbers and UK numbers. You may also have specifications that define numbers for specific purposes, such as wire line numbers or Centrex numbers.

The formatting of telephone numbers is governed by rulesets defined for each specification. These rulesets determine the length of a number and arrangement of its digits. A default ruleset applies when a specification does not include its own. See *UIM System Administrator's Guide* for information about setting the default values.

A configuration file entry controls whether zeros are allowed at the beginning of telephone numbers. By default, leading zeros are stripped during validation, but you can change the setting to allow them. Some countries, such as South Africa, use leading zeros as an integral part of telephone numbers. See *UIM System Administrator's Guide* for information about changing this setting.

You can include telephone numbers in conditions, involvements, inventory groups, business interactions, network address domains, and reservations.

The Telephone Number landing page contains icons that enable you to do the following:

• Search, edit, and delete telephone numbers. See "Searching for Entities", "Viewing and Updating Entity Information", and "Deleting Entities" for more information.



If a telephone number is reserved or if it has a Blocked condition, then that telephone number is not retrieved in the search results when you do a telephone number search by selecting **Unassigned** from the **Assignment Status** list.

- Search for telephone number entities in blocks of sequential numbers (telephone number blocks). See "Searching for Telephone Number Blocks" for more information.

Telephone number bulk operations enable you to perform various operations on multiple telephone numbers at a time, based on the data you provide as input in a spreadsheet file. You can perform the following bulk operations on telephone numbers:

- Load and associate telephone numbers
- Create ported-in telephone numbers
- Assign ported-in numbers to services
- Transition ported-out telephone numbers
- Transition snapback telephone numbers
- Transition winback telephone numbers
- Assign winback telephone numbers to services

Loading and Associating Telephone Numbers in Bulk

You can load and associate telephone numbers in bulk using the Telephone Number Operation - Load And Associate page. Loading and associating telephone numbers implies that in a single operation you can do the following:

- (Optional) Create logical devices.
- (Optional) Create logical device accounts.
- Associate logical devices with telephone numbers and logical device accounts. The telephone numbers must already exist in the inventory.

To load and associate telephone numbers, UIM provides a sample spreadsheet that contains the following tabs:

- **SIM:** Use this tab to specify information to create logical devices, which represent the subscriber identity module (SIM). This tab is optional.
- **IMSI:** Use this tab to specify information to create logical device accounts, which represent the international mobile subscriber identity (IMSI). This tab is optional.
- SimMapping: Use this tab to specify information to associate SIMs with IMSIs, and to
 associate Mobile Station International Subscriber Directory Number (MSISDNs) with
 IMSIs. On the SimMapping tab, telephone numbers represent MSISDN. Associating
 MSISDNs with SIMs is optional. In other words, you may choose to not specify telephone
 numbers in the MSISDN column, in which case UIM ignores the MSISDN column and
 associates only the SIMs with IMSIs.

UIM uses separate transactions to process the information in the **SIM**, **IMSI**, and **SimMapping** tabs. The **SIM** tab is processed first, and next the **IMSI** tab is processed, and then finally the



SimMapping tab is processed. If the processing of a tab fails, UIM does not roll back the successfully completed processes of the other tabs. For example, if the processing of the **IMSI** tab fails, UIM does not roll back the logical devices that are created as part of processing the **SIM** tab.



In the sample spreadsheet, you must retain the column headers even if all the rows in a column are empty.

On the **SIM** tab, you provide the required information in the following columns to create logical device entities in bulk:

- action (for example, CREATE)
- name
- specification
- description
- characteristic
- deviceIdentifier
- networkLocation

On the **IMSI** tab, you provide the required information in the following columns to create logical device account entities in bulk:

- action (for example, CREATE)
- name
- specification
- description
- characteristic
- SIMName
- SIMId

On the **SimMapping** tab, you provide the required information in the following columns to associate SIMs with IMSIs, and to associate SIMs with MSISDNs:

- action (for example, ASSOCIATE)
- MSISDN
- SIMName
- IMSIName



Note:

In UIM, entities must have unique IDs but can have the same name. In other words, UIM does not to distinguish between entities of the same type that are not uniquely named.

For example, when associating SIMs (logical devices) and IMSIs (logical device accounts) using the Load and Associating bulk operation, ensure that you specify a unique name in the **SIMName** column on the **SimMapping** tab of the Load and Associate spreadsheet. If you specify the same name for multiple logical devices in multiple rows under the **SIMName** column, the Load and Associate bulk operation may not work as expected and may fetch the same logical device from the database and associate it with different logical device accounts/telephone numbers.

UIM uses the spreadsheet file to load and associate telephone numbers in bulk.

To load and associate telephone numbers in bulk:

- In the Inventory Resources group of the navigation section, click Telephone Numbers.
 The Telephone Number landing page appears.
- Hover the mouse cursor over the Load And Associate icon and click Load And Associate.
 The Telephone Number Operation Load And Associate page appears.
- 3. In the **Field** field, click **Browse** to navigate to and select a spreadsheet file that contains information about the logical devices, telephone numbers, and logical device accounts that you want to associate.
- **4.** (Optional) Click **Download Excel Template** to download the sample spreadsheet file in which you can provide the required telephone number information.
- Click Process.

UIM processes the input data you provided in the spreadsheet and associates SIMs with IMSIs, and if you provided information about MSISDNs (telephone numbers) in the spreadsheet file, then UIM associates MSISDNs with SIMs using custom involvements.

Working with Ported-In Telephone Numbers

UIM uses separate spreadsheet files to create ported-in telephone numbers and to assign the ported-in telephone numbers to services.

 UIM uses the TN Type characteristic to identify telephone numbers as ported-in.
- description

To create ported-in telephone numbers in bulk:

- In the Inventory Resources group of the navigation section, click Telephone Numbers.
 The Telephone Number landing page appears.
- 2. Hover the mouse cursor over the Port In icon and click Port In.

The Telephone Number Operation - Port In page appears.

- 3. In the **Field** field, click **Browse** to navigate to and select a spreadsheet file that contains the required information about the ported-in telephone numbers.
- 4. (Optional) Click **Download Excel Template** to download the sample spreadsheet file in which you can provide the required telephone number information.
- Click Process.

UIM processes the input data you provided in the spreadsheet, creates multiple ported-in numbers and reserves them based on the specified quarantine period.

The quarantine period is configured in the **telephoneNumberBulk.properties** file. See *UIM System Administrator's Guide* for more information.

Bulk Assigning Ported-In Telephone Numbers to Services

You can assign ported-in telephone numbers to services using the Telephone Number Operation - Port In Service Assignment page. The ported-in telephone numbers must not be in Reserved status for the bulk assignment to be successful.

In a spreadsheet file, you provide the required information in the following columns to assign the newly created ported-in telephone numbers to services:

- action (for example, PORTIN)

- Search paths between the source and target entities and analyze the path results in a topological view
- Generate outage reports that provide details about system outages that occurred because of simulation failures

Evaluating Outage Impacts

Outages may occur because of simulation failures such as:

- Field failure
- Interrupted lines
- Protection failure
- Single point failure

To understand and evaluate all connectivity services or outages that are impacted, you can generate an outage impacts report. The outage impacts report provides a list of all system outages that occurred because of any impacted connectivity services or simulation failures and their associated contacts. The report is generated in the form of a spreadsheet that shows the list of circuits or services impacted using which you can analyze the outages.

You can generate outage reports using the REST API. See *UIM REST API Guide* for more information about REST APIs.

Topological View of Path Analysis

You can view and analyze the operational paths in a topological diagram. To do so, you must search for a path by specifying a source entity and a target entity. In the topological view of path analysis, you can isolate any entity and view all the nodes connected to it.

The topology diagram changes based on the algorithm that you select, even for the same set of source and target entities. If you select Simple Linear and Mesh algorithms, the topology diagram displays all the paths between the source and target. If you select Full Mesh algorithm, the topology diagram displays all the paths you have searched so far and highlights the source and target from your latest search.

The topology diagram shows the following:

- All possible paths between source and target entities according to the search criteria
- Nodes or entities that are used to determine the paths
- Partial paths that are determined for feasibility analysis
- Pipes and connectivities connecting the entities in each path
- Locations of source and target entities
- Overview of the topology diagram, which is useful if the diagram has a large number of entities. The overview helps to find the exact location of your current entity or path.

Viewing and Analyzing Path Analysis in a Topological View

To view and analyze path analysis in topological view:

- 1. Perform path analysis by searching for paths between source and target entities.
 - The **Path Analysis Results** pane appears.
- Click the Topological View tab.

The topological diagram appears with all path results between the source and the target entities.

Note:

The source and target entities are highlighted in the diagram.

- Navigate to the Display Path or Find Entity pane by clicking the Restore Pane button on the top-right corner.
- 4. Select the required path in Available Paths.

The selected path is highlighted in the topology diagram.

5. Select an entity in the **Entity Name** field.

The selected entity is highlighted in the topology diagram.

Note:

You can view the information about the selected entity in the **Editor** pane on the right side.

Select an entity or pipe in the topology diagram and navigate to the Editor pane by clicking the Restore Pane button on the right side, to view details.

The details of the selected entity or pipe appear in the **Editor** pane.

- a. Click the **ID** value to open the corresponding entity page.
- b. Click the Network/Entity Location value to open the corresponding network or entity location page.
- 7. To view the summary, right-click the entity and then click **View Summary**.

The summary page of the selected entity appears.

- 8. To adjust zoom options, use the following options in the top-left corner:
 - Zoom to Fit
 - Zoom In
 - Zoom Out
- In the Overview panel (in the bottom-right corner), check the overview of the topology diagram.

You use Media Stream entities to represent media content and to manage its delivery in UIM. For example, you can use Media Stream entities to represent provisionable or subscription video services such as tiered services and a la carte packages.

Logical devices control how users gain access to the media streams they subscribe to. To represent this relationship in UIM, you associate media streams to logical devices.

Media Stream entities include many of the same features as other entities. You can reserve media streams, assign conditions to them, and include them in business interactions. UIM manages media stream life cycles the same way it manages other resource entities.

The service configurations included in the orchestration request are completed when the orchestration request is completed.

You cannot reopen an orchestration request after you have sent it.

To send orchestration requests:

Alternatively, search for the orchestration request and select it in the search results.

The Information page for the orchestration request appears.

2. From the Actions menu, select Send Request.

NFV Orchestration invokes the custom extension logic that you associated with this action and displays any resulting error messages in the upper part of the page. If no problems are found, no messages are displayed.

Depending on the custom extension functionality that you associated with the send request action, the relevant entities in the orchestration request are created, deleted or modified in the inventory.

You can also associate custom extension functionality with the other actions in the **Actions** menu.

You cancel network services when NFV Orchestration fails to instantiate the network services and the partially allocated resources are not rolled back completely after you tried instantiating the network service. When you cancel a network service, all the resources that were allocated to the constituent VNFs and the PNFs are released and become available for consumption by



other network services. You also cancel network services when you do not want to use the network services that you created and saved for later use.



When you cancel a network service that failed to instantiate, NFV Orchestration does not roll back the resources in your VIM. You must remove the allocated resources in your VIM manually.

To cancel network services:

1. Open the summary page of the network service that you want to cancel.

Alternatively, search for the network service and select it in the search results.

The summary page for the network service appears.

2. From the Actions menu, select Cancel.

 - Scale In to remove existing VDU instances of each constituent VDU of the VNF in the
 network service based on the scaling quantity defined for the constituent VDUs in the
 VNF descriptor. As part of VNF scale in, you can remove VDU instances only up to the
 minimum instance limit defined for the constituent VDUs in the VNF descriptor. Even if
 one of the VDUs in a VNF has reached its minimum instance limit, and the other VDUs



in that VNF have not reached their minimum instance limit, NFV Orchestration does not allow you to further scale in the VNF.

At the top of the VNF Summary page, a message appears informing you that the VNF has been submitted for scaling. After the process is completed successfully, a message appears informing you that the VNF has been scaled.

Extension Point Rulesets	Displays the ruleset and extension point combinations that are associated with the descriptor.

VNF Descriptor - Details Page

You use the VNF Descriptor - Details page to view information about VNF descriptors. The information in this page is read only.

Section	Description
Descriptor Information	Displays basic details about the VNF descriptor, including the descriptor name and the entity type to which it applies.
Descriptor File	Displays the text of the descriptor in XML format.
	You can search for specific words and values or navigate to any specific line in the content.
TOSCA Deployment Template	Displays the text of the VNF descriptor in a Topology and Orchestration Specification for Cloud Applications (TOSCA) deployment template form.
	You can search for specific words and values or navigate to any specific line in the content.
Composition	Displays the hierarchy of the VNF composition. See "Viewing Specification Relationship Information" for more information.
Characteristics	Displays detailed information about the descriptor's characteristics. Each characteristic appears as a link that you can click to navigate to the Characteristic Specification page. Additionally, this section indicates whether a value for the characteristic is required for this VNF or VNF descriptor. The Required option defined for a descriptor can differ from the default setting.
Extension Point Rulesets	Displays the ruleset and extension point combinations that are associated with the descriptor.



Working with Products

Products represent a customer- or market-oriented view of a service provider's offerings. Products represent bundles of services and other products that are sold to customers.



Product entities are included in UIM for backward compatibility with previous versions. The UIM navigation section does not include a **Product** link unless the user is authorized to access the Product Search page. Access is turned off by default. See *UIM System Administrator's Guide* for information about authorizing user access.

In UIM, you can use Product entities to represent products. You can define the composition of Product entities to include services, products, or a combination of the two. Product specifications can require that particular product or service entities be included. You can validate a product to ensure that all required products and services have been included. See "Validating Product Compositions" for more information.

You can associate Party entities to products and qualify those associations with roles. Products can also be included in inventory groups. See "Working with Inventory Groups" for more information.

Defining Product Compositions

A product can include both services and other products, arranged hierarchically. Products (including the original product) can be both parents and children in the hierarchy; services can be only children.

The products and services you can include in the composition are determined by the Product specification. If the Product specification defines relationships with Product and Service specifications, then only entities based on those specifications can be included. If the specification does not contain these relationships, then any Product or Service entities can be included.

Validating Product Compositions

Adding Products or Services to Product Compositions

A product composition includes Product and Service entities that you create specifically for that product. You cannot add existing Product and Service entities to a product composition.

If the product's specification defines required products or services, you must add entities of the required Product or Service specifications to complete the composition. You can validate the product to determine if its composition is complete. See "Validating Product Compositions" for more information.

After you create a product or service as part of a product composition, you can modify it using the normal procedures for those entity types. For example, you can add a configuration to a service.

To add a new product or service to a product composition:

- Open the Summary page for a Product entity.
- 2. In the Composition section, expand the hierarchy and right-click the position where you want to add the product or service.

A product in the hierarchy can be a parent or a child, but a service can only be a child. If the product composition currently contains no products or services, a single item is displayed to represent the product.

Select Add Product or Add Service.

The entity Information page appears.

4. Enter the required information and any relevant optional information.

Specification and **Name** are required for both products and services.

5. Click Save and Close.

The product or service appears in the Composition section.

After a product's composition has been defined, you can update product and service names and descriptions.

To update a product or service:

- Open the Summary page for a Product entity.
- 2. In the Composition section, expand the hierarchy to display the product or service you want to update.
- 3. Right-click the product or service and select **Maintain**.

An Information dialog box for the product or service page appears. You can update only the **Name** and **Description** fields.



4. Update the product or service information and click **Save and Close**.

The dialog box closes and the product or service information is updated.

To remove a product or service from a composition:

- 1. Open the Summary page for a Product entity.
- In the Composition section, expand the hierarchy to reveal the product or service you want to remove.

Validating Product Compositions

You can validate that a product composition has all the products and services required by its specification.

To validate a product composition:

- 1. Open the Summary page for a Product entity.

The validation results are displayed at the top of the page. If the validation succeeds, a message reports the success. If validation fails, an error message details what is missing from the product composition.

You use the Products - New page to create new products.





The fields that appear on this page are determined by the specification used to create the entity. The specification is created in Design Studio. The fields in the following table are common to most specifications of this type.

Field	Description
Specification	Select a specification to use to define the new product.
ID	This field displays AUTOGENERATE and is read only.
	By default, most entity specifications are defined in Design Studio so that IDs are generated automatically.
Name	Enter the name of the new product.
Description	(Optional) Enter a description of the new product.

You use the Products - Information page to edit the information that appears in the Summary page Information section. Some data elements, such as the ID, cannot be changed after the entity is created.



The fields that appear on this page are determined by the specification used to create the entity. The specification is created in Design Studio. The fields in the following table are common to most specifications of this type.

Specification	Displays the specification used to define the product. This field is read only.
ID	Displays the ID generated or entered when the entity was created. This field is read only.
Name	Edit the name of the product.
Description	Edit the description of the product.

You use the Product Summary page to define the content for a product.



The sections listed in the following table are specific to the Product Summary page. See "Entity Summary Page" for information about Summary page fields that are common among all entities.

Section	Description
Information	Displays basic information about the entity, much of which was defined when you created the entity. Click Edit to change this information. See "Products - New Page" and "Creating Entities" for more information.
Inventory Group	Displays any inventory groups to which the product is associated. You use inventory groups to organize entities for a particular purpose.
	The fields that appear in the Inventory Group section are common among multiple entities. See "Entity Summary Page" for more information. See "Adding an Entity to an Inventory Group from the Entity Summary Page" for information about associating products with an inventory group.
Composition	Displays the services and other products, arranged hierarchically, associated with the products. The products and services you can include in the composition are determined by the Product specification. If the Product specification defines relationships with Product and Service specifications, then only entities based on those specifications can be included. If the specification does not contain these relationships, then any Product or Service entities can be included.
	The fields that appear in the Composition section are common among multiple entities. See "Entity Summary Page" for more information. See "Defining Product Compositions" for information about adding new products or services to the composition.
Parties	Displays any parties that are associated with the product. You can associate parties to products to identify related individuals or organizations. If the parties have roles assigned to them, you can specify the role that is relevant to the association.
	The fields that appear in the Parties section are common among multiple entities. See "Entity Summary Page" for more information. See "Associating Parties to Entities" and "Deleting Party Associations from Entities" for information about managing party associations.



Administrative Tasks

Within the Oracle Communications Unified Inventory Management (UIM) navigation section, the **Administration** group contains links for administrative tasks such as maintaining data and topology rebuilding. It also contains links that enable you to search for projects, rulesets, sequence specifications, characteristics, and entity specifications. It also contains links that enable you to search for projects, rulesets, sequence specifications, characteristics, entity specifications, and tags.

UIM uses specifications, rulesets, and other artifacts that you define in Oracle Communications Service Catalog and Design - Design Studio. In general, you cannot make changes to the content of this information in UIM, but you can view it and perform some actions. For example, if you want to see how a particular Pipe specification is designed, you can view the specification in UIM.

Maintaining Data

You use the Execute Rule page to run rulesets that maintain data in UIM. You select a ruleset to run and, if necessary, a configuration or input file. You then run the ruleset. You can run rulesets supplied by Oracle or install your own by using cartridges. For example, you could write a ruleset to clean out test data from the database.

Several rulesets are supplied as part of the **ora_uim_base_rulesets** base cartridge. These include System Import and System Export rulesets that you can use to export and import data in such a way that you can move data from one UIM database to another. The System Export ruleset requires that you specify a configuration file and System Import requires an input file in **.zip** format. See *UIM Developer's Guide* for more information about base rulesets, including a description of each base ruleset, and the specific syntax of any input files required to run a particular base ruleset.

Running Rulesets

To run rulesets:

1. In the Administration group of the navigation section, click Execute Rule.

The Execute Rule page appears. See "Execute Rule Page" for more information about the fields in this page.

- 2. In the **Ruleset** list, select the ruleset you want to use.
- In the File field, enter the path and file name of the configuration or input file for this ruleset.
- 4. Click Process.

UIM performs the operations defined in the selected ruleset and its configuration or input file.

Running Rule in Business Interaction Context

You can run rules in Business Interaction context.

To run a rule in Business Interaction context:

1. From the left navigation pane, under Administration, click **Execute Rule**.

The Execute Rule page appears.

2. Select a Business Interaction from the context list.



You can find the context list on the top-left corner of the Execute Rule page.

- Select a rule from the Ruleset list.
- (Optional) Click Choose File to select a ruleset file.
- Click Process.

The rule is run in the selected Business Interaction context.

Execute Rule Page

You use the Execute Rule page to run rulesets that maintain data in UIM.



To view the UIM base rulesets, you must first install the **ora_uim_base_rulesets_cartproj.jar** base cartridge. See UIM *Developer's Guide* for detailed information about each of the UIM base rulesets.

Field	Description
Ruleset	Select the ruleset you want to run.
File	Select the configuration or input file for the ruleset. Click Browse to navigate to and select a file.
Process	Click to perform the operations defined in the selected ruleset and its configuration or input file.



Rebuilding Topology

If topology updates are turned off in UIM, you must rebuild the topology before you use features that rely on it. See *UIM System Administrator's Guide* for information about turning off topology updates.



Caution:

Only system administrators should be authorized to rebuild topology. When you rebuild the topology, the old version is deleted and a new one is created. Back up your old topology before rebuilding to ensure that you can return to it, if necessary.

If UIM is installed in a cluster environment, only one instance can be rebuilt at a time. When a rebuild is in progress on one instance, the rebuild operation is disabled for other instances.

You should schedule topology rebuilds as maintenance tasks during times when no changes to the inventory will take place.

To rebuild the UIM topology:

- In the Administration group of the navigation section, click Rebuild Topology.
 The Rebuild Topology page appears.
- 2. Click the Rebuild Topology button.

The topology begins to be rebuilt. You can refresh the page to see status updates. When the process is complete, the page reverts to its original appearance and the **Rebuild Topology** button becomes available.

You use the Rebuild Topology page to rebuild the UIM topology when automatic rebuilds are turned off.

Specifications are the blueprints used to define entities in UIM. Entity specifications are deployed into UIM when you install base cartridges, cartridge packs, and other cartridges defined in Design Studio.

Although you can view the specifications in UIM to see how they are structured, you cannot change specifications in UIM. They can be changed only in Design Studio. See *UIM Developer's Guide* and *UIM Concepts* for more information. You can, however, delete specifications under certain circumstances.

Even though you cannot make changes to specifications, you can view them to discern information about entities based on them, such as minimum and maximum quantities of related entities.

The following sections are common to multiple types of specifications. Some specifications, however, include additional sections. For example, Pipe specifications have sections for the associated Capacity Required specification, Capacity Provided specification, and Signal Structure. specification Summary pages for Entity ID specifications include the prefix, suffix, and Sequence specification used to generate IDs. Layouts	Displays how data elements and characteristics for entities based on the specification will be displayed in pages. See "Viewing Page Layouts " for more information.
Characteristics	Displays detailed information about the properties of the specification's characteristics. Each characteristic appears as a link that you can click to navigate to the Characteristic Specification page. Additionally, this section indicates whether a value for the characteristic is required for this entity or entity configuration specification. The Required option defined for a specification can differ from the default setting.
Extension Point Rulesets	Displays the ruleset and extension point combinations that are associated with the specification.
Transition Groups	Displays the transition groups to which the specification belongs.
Composition	Displays child specifications related to the specification. For example, a Logical Device specification could be related to one or more Device Interface specifications. See "Viewing Specification Relationship Information" for more information.

Characteristics are user-defined data elements that supplement the default data elements in specifications. For example, Place specifications may have characteristics for city, province or state, and postal code.

Characteristics are defined and added to entity specifications in Design Studio.

While you can view characteristics to see how they are structured, you cannot modify characteristics in UIM. They can be changed only in Design Studio. See *UIM Developer's Guide* and *UIM Concepts* for more information. You can, however, delete characteristics under some circumstances.

Testing Queries

You can test the query used to populate a list. Testing the query allows you to see the values that will be included in the list.

To test a query:

- 1. Open the Characteristic page for a list that is populated by using a query.
- 2. In the Query section, click Test.

The Add Value Query dialog box appears.

Click the Test button.

The matching entities are displayed in the Query Results section.

4. Click Cancel to close the dialog box.

You can delete characteristic specifications but you cannot delete characteristic specifications that are used by entities that remain in the inventory.

To delete characteristic specifications:

Section	Description
Characteristic Specification Information	Displays basic identifying information about the characteristic.
Values	(For lists only) Displays values and value ranges that have been defined for the list.
	The values that appear are either defined for the characteristic specification or are override values defined specifically for the entity or entity configuration specification.
Query	(For lists only) Displays the query string used to populate the list. You can test the query to see the results that will be displayed in the list. See "Testing Queries" for more information.
Entity Link Information	(For lists only) Displays the entity link that is defined to populate a list with the names of entities created from a specification.
Specifications	Displays a list of the specifications that include this characteristic. You can click links to go to the corresponding Specification Summary pages.

Working with Sequence Specifications

UIM uses Sequence specifications to define ranges of numbers and how numbers are incremented for entities. For example, a sequence specification can determine the range of numbers used for VPN ID indexes and how the numbers increment when new VPNs are created. Sequence specifications are also used to define how entity IDs are generated.

You create Sequence specifications in Design Studio. You cannot create or modify them in UIM, but you can view them. You can delete Sequence specifications that are not in use.

You can search for Sequence specifications by name, description, validity dates, minimum value, maximum value, and increment value.

Sequence Specification Summary Page

You use the Sequence Specification Summary page to view information about Sequence specifications, which you use to define ranges of numbers and to determine how numbers are incremented for entities in UIM.

The Sequence Specification Summary page contains a Summary section that displays basic information about the entity, such as the name, description, and effective dates. Additionally, this page displays the minimum, maximum, and increment values defined for the specification (in Design Studio). See the Design Studio Help for more information about creating Sequence specifications.

Working with Tags

User-defined tags store information about a configuration item. For example, user-defined tags may further describe a configuration item, describe a set of technical actions, or describe any type of custom information needed for service fulfillment. User-defined tags are returned in the response from the UIM Service Fulfillment Web Service GetConfigurationDifferences operation.

User-defined tags are created in Oracle Communications Service Catalog and Design - Design Studio and added to configuration items within Service, Logical Device, Logical Device Account, Network, and Place configuration specifications. In UIIM, tags are view-only, but you can delete orphaned tags.
